PROGRAM NOTES

(For those not able to be present at our March and May meetings, two interesting programs were presented. The following is a synopsis of these two programs.)

Father Jules Daigle was the guest speaker at the March meeting. A retired Catholic priest, he is the author of "A DICTIONARY OF THE CAJUN LANGUAGE."

His talk was on the Cajuns and their language. He stated that the Cajun people are not French, but Celts. In 51 B. C. Rome conquered Britain. The Celts, a sea-faring people were not willing to be dominated and crossed the channel into France not knowing that France was already under the domination of Rome. They establish their fishing industries and lived there for centuries. When France offered to colonize the Americas in Nova Scotia, these were the people who volunteered to go. They began migrating to North America in 1604.

The Cajun language, the Cajun people and the comparison of the language with other languages were further topics of Father Daigle's talk. He stated that Cajun is not bad French, nor it is a dialect of foreign French. Cajun is a separate and distinct language in its own right. Cajun is a language made in Louisiana by Louisianians; it is not a foreign language. It was not imported here from any foreign country. It is Louisiana's only native tongue. It evolved because when the Cajun people came to Louisiana they found out that their French language was wholly inadequate. Here were birds, fish, wild animals, bayous, marshes, ponds, cyprress swamps and other things for which their French had no names. They had to invent a new vocabulary, develop a new cuisine and a whole new way of life.

The May meeting featured Kathleen Stagg, who spoke on the use of distant libraries, particularly the ones on the east coast, and how to use the library without actually being there. She brought with her several volumes and supplements of family genealogies which are located in the Library of Congress. The Library of Congress does not lend its books, however, these can also be found elsewhere in other libraries which perhaps do have a lending service. She pointed out codes used by libraries found in these volumes which indicate where these publications can be found and that you can be assisted by your own library. One of the problems of genealogy is that the American Library Association, in the library loan code, states that generally genealogy material is not loaned out. Some libraries do loan, however. There are also local histories available in the Library of Congress, however, our library does not have the listings, this too can be obtained in other bigger libraries.

The DAR Library in Washington now has a publication of a volume by family names of family genealogy, of published works, notes and journals. The DAR Library will copy up to 30 pages of the material found in their library for you upon request. However, the Library of Congress is more difficult in this area, as they are the keepers of the copyright law and are extremely strict about copying. Generally, they will request a written authorization from the author that the item may be copied for you. Should you go to Washington, there are copy machines in the Library for use in copying your own material. But if you are writing for it, it is extremely difficult and expensive.

Another library which has an extensive amount of material is the New York Public Library. They have a full 12 to 15 volume book catalog of listings. Our library again does not have these volumes but other libraries close by, such as Houston, should. The New England Historical and Genealogical Society issues a series of catalogs of works published that its members, for \$40.00 per membership can borrow. As a member and with an \$8.00 fee you can borrow 3 works at a time for 2 weeks. As in the DAR, the Library of Congress, the New York Public Library, these are duplicate listings in some instances.

If you go personally to the New York Public Library or to the Library of Congress, remember to ask for their procedure, or for that matter to any other out of town library. In the New York Public Library as in the Library of Congress, you must fill out request slips for books and they will be brought to you. The Library of Congress has card files until 1981 and everything after that date is on computer. The computers have been made to be used as easily as possible. She stressed that even if you cannot go to these other libraries, there are other means available to you for works you may be interested in and it might be possible to borrow or have these things copied for you.

HURRICANE OF 1918

A devastating hurricane struck the Lake Charles area on Tuesday, August 6, 1918. Without modern weather forecasting equipment, the storm hit the area without prior warning. The Lake Charles Weekly American newspaper of Friday, August 9 stated that the storm "continued in violence for nearly three hours. The wind was terrific and during the time of the storm a heavy rain fell." An eye witness account stated that "all was going as usual at noon. Suddenly the wind began to rise and increase as the rain also increased. In a hour the wind had increased to a terrific gale. For three hours the wind blew and suddenly veered and came from the opposite direction." Damage was sustained from Vinton in the west to Welsh to the east. Early estimates of the damage exceeded \$1 million. All communication with outside areas was lost. Streets were almost impassable with fallen trees and debris. The town of Sulphur was almost totally wiped out. Lumber mills were hard hit including the Stout Mill, Long-Bell Mill and J. A. Bell Mill. Among the buildings totally destroyed were the Episcopal Church, and the Lake Charles Carriage and Implement Building. Near total losses were the Elks Home and the Masonic Temple. Not a store or place of business on Ryan Street escaped.

Victims of the storm sought refuge in Fourth Ward School, the City Hall, and the Court House. Others not able to reach buildings left standing took cover wherever they could. Many harrowing experience were related after the storm. Bert Baker, his wife and children and King Lucas were at the Baker home on South Street where Mr. Baker ran a small dairy. When the wind began the Baker's brick house began to tumble. The occupants ran to a ditch in front of the house and took refuge. They lay there during the storm and saw cisterns, pieces of houses and other debris flying past them. When the storm was over they found themselves in water up to their necks.

The ferry Borealis Rex was sunk as a result of the storm. Forty passengers were aboard when the storm struck. The boat was driven ashore and all passengers managed to escape. In fifteen minutes the boat was totally destroyed and sunk at the front of the King residence at Prien Lake.

All towns in the surrounding area suffered much damage and several injuries, but the death toll was surprisingly low considering the ferocity of the storm. For several days after the storm the list of those fatalities and injuries was given in the local newspaper. Although there may have been more unreported a list of those given was as follows:

A BUFFALO HUNT

(SUBMITTED BY SANDRA MIGUEZ)

(The following was written by Sandra Miguez's great aunt and was a part of story included in Vol. 10, No. 1.)

This is a story my father wrote about one of his experiences in buffalo hunting and is in his own words:

"Away back in the sixties in Butler County, Kansas, four men - Charlie and Eddie Fisher, De Newell and Stillman Fuller - started on a buffalo hunt. After getting four or five days supply of food, horse feed, ammunition, etc., they went fast from Wichita and on across the Niruscah River and went southwest for three days, when they were caught in a snowstorm followed by a northwest blizzard. While one drove, the others wrapped up in blankets. They were now beyond roads or trails of any kind, and the question: 'Which way are we going?' could not be answered. Finally, the driver seeing a wagon track called the others attention, and they examined the track closely, and hurried on to overtake the other party. They soon found they were traveling in a circle, and that they were following their own tracks. Realizing this, they changed their course toward a distant object in the direction of which they thought they should go, and thus overcame the difficulty.

By and by the storm passed away, the snow ceased to fall, and as the mist rose from the earth, they saw in the distance the first buffalo. One of the men, gun in hand, mounted the extra pony and was away for the chase. He fired but missed the mark. The other horses were quickly unharnessed and Eddie and Stillman joined in the pursuit. On they went over the plains, over the river, till finally a lucky shot brought down the object of their chase. After supper they cracked jokes and talked of the adventures of the day. Although the wolves howled about them the entire night, they rested well.

Early the next morning De Newell having had enough fun decided to take the extra pony and return to Howard County where he wished to visit a friend. So just after sunrise, the morning being clear and crisp, he rode off over the plains toward the rising sun, and the others journeyed to the west to continue the hunt. The returning rider spurred his horse on and on, following as he thought, the trail which they had just left. Abruptly the trail ended. Now lay before him no road or sign of life or habitation. He halted and began thus to soliloquize: 'Shall I continue and risk my life on a trackless plain? No, I shall return and find the companions I left this morning. But where are they?'

Excited and anxious, with no food for man or horse, away to the west he rode. Now there were hundreds of buffalo on every side, but they were little afraid of him. His horse was almost tired out. He came to a narrow run, rode in and the pony bogged in the quicksand. He tried his best to get the pony out, but found it useless. He then took off the saddle and bridle, and sat down on the bank, pondering over his distressing condition. 'Home and friends and I one hundred miles apart.' He almost gave up in despair. 'Shall I kill my pony to save it from being torn by the wolves? No, I cannot!' Throwing himself outstretched upon the ground so that he would not sink in the quicksand, he dug down with his hands until he came to one of the pony's forefeet. This he pulled forward, and with the strength which only a desperate man has, assisted by the efforts of the horse itself,

with much difficulty he at last succeeded in bringing the pony up on solid ground. He resaddled the pony, and again started off in the growing darkness, whither he knew not.

Meanwhile, the other three hunters had crossed the river and continued their journey westward. After driving eight or ten miles they sighted buffalo, killed two fine fellows, and skinned them and threw the hindquarters into the wagon. Turning north from there then east, they saw two more. Two of the men quickly unharnessed, mounted the horses and were off. The buffalo separated and ran in opposite directions. The one running to the left, the dogs followed. He was a swift runner and after they chased him for miles, crossing the river to the hills, raced along the valley and back again to the river's bank, suddenly the animal stopped and faced his foe. The hunters followed close by on the chase. When they reached the scene of the conflict, they fired two shots, but with no effect.

At this point, a voice in the distance startled them, and looking around they saw a horseman approaching at full speed. At the approach of what they considered to be an Indian, all thought of buffalo left them. Their rifles had been discharged so, terrified, they awaited the approaching redskin. As he galloped toward them and the distance lessened and lessened, to their unspeakable delight they knew the horseman to be the companion who had left them in the morning.

There was but little time for conversation, for the buffalo which in the meantime had been neglected, was charging with all the force of an enraged animal. The horsemen separated, and the two with empty guns retreated with the buffalo close upon them, his horns lowered ready to plunge them into the bowels of the fleeing steeds; however, he only caught the horse's tail over one horn as he passed by the hunters. The returned companion wheeled in his saddle, raised his rifle crack went the gun, and down came the dangerous brute.

The sun had long since sunk, and night was growing dark. Back they turned to the companions they had left with it. But the darkness overtook them and for hours they wandered about, not knowing which direction to take. The man at the wagon guessed the cause of their delay, and at about midnight, set fire to the prairie. The light attracted them, they hurried toward it, and at least reached the place from whence they had started on the chase. Here they camped for the night. On the following morning, having had enough of buffalo hunting, they returned home."

Sometimes the women would go along with their husbands. I recall mother telling me of one time she went along. One night it was dark and the men had not returned to the camp. They who were left at the wagons, the women and a couple of men, decided they would build a big fire so the hunters could locate the camp. Soon a group of horsemen appeared over the top of the hill. Knowing it was not the hunters, as there so many of them, they became frightened. They quickly put out the fire and arranged the wagons in a circle for protection and waited anxiously. Soon the hunting party rode up from the opposite direction. They had seen the light of the fire and found the way back to camp. Nothing more was seen of the band of Indians.

MEETING NOTES

Guest speaker at our September meeting was Jo Ann Durand of the McNeese State University Library. She spoke on the Archives and Special Collections Department at McNeese which collects and preserves historical material relating to McNeese, Lake Charles, and Southwest Louisiana. This material is available to researchers and can be found in a variety of forms; personal or family papers which include diaries, correspondence, photographs, legal and financial documents, and memorabilia; business and organizational records; church records; labor union records; etc.

Miss Durand described a few of the collections, the Rosa Hart Collection which contains personal and organized scrapbooks, correspondence, photographs, etc. collected by the co-founder of the Lake Charles Little Theatre, 1927-1966. The Sam Jones Collection consists of five scrapbooks of Governor Jones' administration from 1941 to 1944. The Lake Charles City Records Collection contains minutes of the Lake Charles City Council from July 1868 to May 1967 and a record of ordinances from 1891 to 1961, both indexed.

THE SHOOTING

Louis Cadet d'Erneville de St. Julien was the son of Sieur d'Erneville de St. Julien and Marie Adelaide Castaing (daughter of Barthelemy Castaing) all of Bordeaux, France. During the French Revolution Robespierre along with the Comite, destroyed the family lands, seized their holdings and guillotined the family members except for Louis and an older brother, Pierre de St. Julien Malacare, who were born in Vitre (in Brittany) and were the children of Pierre de St. Julien Malacare and Leanne LeFebvre. They escaped, boarded a ship, posed as sailors and landed on the Carolina Coast ca. mid- 1700's.

Louis made his way to Louisiana, met and married Delle Marguerite LeBlanc, daughter of Simon and Marguerite Guilbeau, 2 May 1891 (SM Ch. v. 4 #56). He served as "Syndic" or local official in the Carencro section of the Poste Des Attakapas. The couple had no children as the young bride was shot and killed. Herein lies the theme of this story as there were several versions of the shooting incident.

The first version involved Delle Marguerite's brother, who was a known drunkard and spendthrift, reputed to hate Louis d'Erneville, because Louis, as local official, forbade money-lending. It is said that one night, while Louis was standing in his bedroom cleaning his gun and Marguerite was lying in bed, he saw a glint in the darkness and moved aside. A shot rang out and Mrs. St. Julien was killed. Brother-in-law LeBlanc sent for the authorities and accused Louis of shooting Marguerite. Louis was jailed in New Orleans, but was later freed on the testimony of two slaves who had been sitting by the fireplace and testified that the shot came from outside. It was later presumed that LeBlanc in an attempt to kill Louis, shot his sister instead.

The second version involved the brother-in-law again and the "bad blood" that existed between the two. Supposedly, he came to kill Louis, they argued, got physical, a gun went off and Delle Marguerite, who intervened, was killed instantly.

The third version is like the first, except that, after having served two years in prison, Louis was liberated when the French bought Louisiana and the first French Governor freed all the French and political prisoners.

After his release, Louis d'Erneville sold his holdings in Carencro, moved to Broussard, La. and built a home on land acquired through Spanish land grants.

He eventually bought more and more land and became an important land owner.

George Washington Cable, in his book, Strange True Stories of Louisiana writes of an incident concerning this same man, and incorrectly speaks of him as "Treville", rather than d'Erneville, but correctly identifies him as he was better known following his incarceration, the "Hermit of Bayou Tortue".

As a means of further identifying this "interesting ancestor", let me add that he was the father of the "infamous" Major Eli Aurelien St. Julien, leader of the group known as "The Vigilantes".

ON YOUNG - LE JEUNE ANCESTRY

As Professor Robert West points out in An Atlas of Louisiana Surnames of French and Spanish Origin¹, most LeJeune families of Louisiana are all, almost certainly, of Acadian, or at least French, origin. Some Le Jeune men had arrived in the Louisiana colony as early as the 1720's, directly from France, but most of today's Le Jeune families claim the first (ca. 1760's) and second (ca. 1785) Acadian arrivals as their progenitors in the Gulf South.

We know, however, that during the 20th century, if not earlier, some Le Jeune families did Anglicize their surnames to the English counterpart "Young". With that in mind, and with the subject-document presented below as a touchstone, we are curious to know if, indeed, some supposed Le Jeune families of Louisiana had first actually been non-Latin. Such a circumstance occurred more than once in Louisiana, such as the Johnson - Jeansonne family was originally no doubt Scottish Johnson, for some two centuries became Jeansonne, and in our century reverted to Johnson. It would appear that this could have happened with some Le Jeune - Young families as well.

In 1831, for instance, even a local priest in Southwest Louisiana (where so many "Le Jeune" families are found) was confused: He annotated the baptism record of the child Helene by writing that her surname was either Le Jeune "or" Young.²

We present here one document that may be a key to further evidence in the matter of the Le Jeune vs. Young identity:

(United States)

"Communicated to the House of Representatives, January 5, 1829:

Mr. Earll, from the Committee on Private Land Claims, to whom was referred the petition of James Young of Louisiana, reported that the petitioner represents that he emigrated to said State (then a Territory)⁴ in 1782 from Virginia, where he has remained ever since, pursuing his business as a farmer. The petitioner further represents that during the revolutionary struggle he was among the first who stepped forward in defence of his country's rights, that he fought under Messrs. Ritchie, Cannon, and

Crawford; that he was hurt at Sandusky plains (Ohio) in June, 1782, and that he furnished himself; for all of which services the petitioner states that he has never received the smallest compensation from his government. The petitioner prays for that remuneration which has been guaranteed to so many under similar circumstances; and that he may have confirmed to him the title to the land mentioned in an annexed petition and order of survey. The petition mentioned by the applicant is one from himself to Estavari (sic, obviously a typographical error for Estevan) Miro, the then Spanish governor of Louisiana, dated at New Orleans the 6th day of March, 1790, in which the petitioner stated that he was an inhabitant of Opelousas, and had then been settled there seven years. That he had no land whereon to establish himself, and prayed for a grant to him of six hundred arpents of land on Buffalo Creek, in the district of Natchez. Accompanying this petition is the copy of an order of survey from Governor Miro, dated New Orleans, April 27, 1790, directing the surveying of the province to locate the said six hundred square arpents of land petitioned for, in the place designated by the petitioner."

The Private Lands Committee found "no evidence...that any revolutionary services" had been performed by James Young, only his statement saying so. He could yet have received title to the land he claimed under original patent from Spain, but he could present no evidence of actual survey, no road to or on the land had been built, and the arpents had never been cleared or improved. The committee did not approve Young's petition.

While we have by no means attempted to exhaust sources in identifying this particular James Young, we note for researchers who wish to explore the subject that one man of that name apparently lived in southwest Louisiana at the same period.⁵ Too, the surname Le Jeune appears in numerous early Natchez records during the Spanish period,⁶ and one James Young headed south with a "Georgia Passport" in 1809.⁷

Clearly, the possibility exists that some Le Jeunes are, in fact, Youngs and some Youngs, Le Jeunes today. Moreover, to add frustration to complexity, there is the Jung family of early Louisiana.

THE VINTON COLONY

Lake Charles, La. in 1880 was but a village where schooners were the major means of commercial transportation in and out of the area. In 1888 the east-west gap in the railroad between Orange, Texas and Lake Charles was closed and then began an economic, agricultural and population boom.

Lumbermen and entrepreneurs from Michigan came for the acres of long leaf pine; the North American Land and Lumber Company obtained over a million acres from the federal government to sell for the expansion of lumbering and agriculture. Prof. Seaman A. Knapp was hired for scientific experimentation and to promote re-location to this area. Thousands of circulars, brochures and newspaper advertisements were systematically and thoroughly used to attract desirable farmers, businessmen and professionals. The Southern Pacific Railroad also had an intensive advertising campaign in the mid-west, to lure settlers to this "Eden" in Southwest Louisiana. For a while this was one of the best touted areas in the country.

And these huge promotions paid off!

Dr. Knapp, formerly of Vinton, Iowa and his family settled in Lake Charles December 1886. They called their Pujo Street home "Three Pines".

Some of the Iowans came south for the winter and built homes here. To escape the winter weather and to enjoy the economic advantages in Lake Charles, they then re-located here permanently and became the nucleus of the "Vinton Colony".

In 1886 Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Bull settled here. Mr. Bull was killed in a mill accident 14 March 1895.

Minnie Knapp, daughter of Dr. Knapp, married 15 Dec. 1887 Mr. A. M. Mayo.

Others who came in the 1880's were:

Thomas O. and Adelia Lamont

Mrs. and Mrs. George Horridge, who called their home "Southland"

Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Kinney whose home was called "Sunnyside"

Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Wentz

Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Eddy who called their home "Three Oaks"

Mr. and Mrs. William M. Loree, Jr. and family; home was called "Rose Cottage"

In the Lake Charles American Weekly of 13 March 1889, there was a reprint of an editorial from the Vinton, Iowa Eagle:

"It is perhaps true that there are more Vinton (Iowa) people living outside then within the borders of Vinton...Vinton has helped settle the Dakotas...Kansas and Nebraska have shared in this exodus of Vinton people...But the colony at Lake Charles, La. is no doubt the largest one that has located in any one place. These people, by the way, are generally doing well."

Some other "pioneers" from the Vinton, Iowa area in the 1890's were:

N. D. Pope and family, Frank Roberts and wife, C. L. Loree and family (Mrs. Loree was the daughter of H. Ross), Arad Thompson and family, G. T. Rock and family, Mr. and Mrs. William M. Loree, Sr., Mrs. Maria Ankeny (mother of Helen Eddy (Mrs. H. H.)), J. W. Traer and family, H. Ross and wife, S. R. Harter, wife and son, Horace G. Eddy and family, James Eddy and family,

and Cornelius Ellis and family.

Beginning in 1892 the "Vinton Colony" had an excursion on Good Friday. This first picnic was held at English Bayou, Northside.

In 1893 they again went to English Bayou. They and their visitors went to the southern bank. They built a fire in a vacant house near and by and accidentally set fire to it. "The gentlemen present showed their experience as old firemen in putting out the fire."

On Good Friday 1894 they took the steamer Pharr up the West Fork of the Calcasieu River. Each year the numbers increased as there were often as many visitors as "Colonists".

1895 saw eighty regulars and guests going on the steamer Hazel to Rose Bluff where they picniced near the home of Oliver Moss. It was at this time that they decided to organize themselves under the name of the Vinton Colony with A. A. Wentz as secretary.

In 1896 the group, 120 strong, went to Moss Bluff on the Hazel. There were again 120 picnickers when they went to Swearingen's Ferry in 1897.

In 1898 Gulf ports were under quarantine so the annual Good Friday excursion to the home of J. H. Pack on English Bayou was small - 30 colonists and 16 guests.

The Hazel was full on Good Friday 1899 when the destination was to Spanish Point. They reported that in the Spanish American War the colony contributed the services of Major S. Arthur Knapp, Lt. George Rock, Bugler John T. Wentz, and Cpl. Mark D. Wentz. They were returned hale and hearty, having withstood the "patriotic and fascinating young ladies of New Orleans and Mobile".

Also reported was the appointment of Dr. Knapp by the federal agriculture department as special agent to Japan to study rice cultivation and uses.

The Vinton colonists became an integral, vital part of the Lake Charles community. They were active in business, commerce, education, civic and church affairs.

Mr. Kinney planted the oak trees at Central School. Several ladies were charter members of the area's first federated clubs - The Review and Enterprise Clubs. Six were charter members of the First Presbyterian Church of Lake Charles which was founded in 1888, Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Bull, Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Kinney, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lamont.

Some married local girls:

George H. Rock m. 25 Sept. 1900 Edna Bier at Episcopal Church of the Good Shephard;

Herman W. Rock m. 14 April 1897 Marion F. Kennedy at bride's residence east of Lake Charles;

Maud Eddy m. 7 Jan. 1909 Harold H. Rock in Vinton, Iowa.

They buried thier dead:

The young son of Mr. and Mrs. Wentz d. 20 Aug. 1890;

Mrs. Helen Eddy, first wife of Henry H. Eddy and mother of Clarence and Maud d. 12 Nov. 1897 of typhoid;

Mrs. L. W. Kinney d. 10 Nov. 1899;

Mrs. Maria Ankeny d. 20 Oct. 1906, age 84;

William M. Loree, Sr. d. Sept. 1894;

Mrs. William M. Loree, Sr. died spring, 1895.

Most of the colony lived on Pujo Street. Kirkman was the eastern boundary of the city. Those were the pioneer days when "cow paths and a few board walks were the only sidewalks."

Mrs. Kinney was widowed in 1899 and was left with three children to support. To do this she took a position in the Mayo Title Co. After the devastating fire in 1910 which destroyed among the buildings, the court house and city and their vital records, Mrs. Kinney's services were used in evaluating and arranging their records.

Another valuable legacy from the Vinton Colony of Lake Charles.

AN EARLY SOUTHWEST LOUISIANA PIONEER - ALZENITH ELIZABETH INSALL HODGES

Alzenith Elizabeth Insall Hodges was born near Bayou Boeuf in Avoyelles Parish, La., 29 May 1841. Her mother, Caroline Insall, moved to what is now Lake Charles about 1851.

With her family she lived in Lake Charles until she was married to Augustus Hodges 25 Jan. 1855 and remained in this locality for several years after her marriage. From Lake Charles the family moved to Sabine Parish and from there to Calcasieu Pass where they resided for nearly six years. They were living there when the Civil War broke out and Augustus Hodges being called to duty joined the army. Alzenith was left with three children at home and during her husband's absence, went to the home of her husband's parents.

After serving three years in the army, Augustus returned home and the family lived at Lake Charles until 1868. From there they moved to West Texas and after spending nine years on the wind-swept plains they returned to Louisiana, moving to Calcasieu Parish where Alzenith spent the rest of her life.

Grandma Hodges had never joined any organized church but she was baptized into Christ Church by Parson Leeds near Magnolia about 1899. She and her husband lived together 67 years and 2 months before his death on 26 March 1922. There were ten children born of this union. Among those surviving at the time of Alzenith's death were Virginia Alice Hollingsworth of Longville; W. Henry Hodges of Ragley; Elizabeth Reeves of Ragley; Caroline Isabelle Baggett of Singer; and Alzenith Elnore Baggett of LeBlanc.

Augustus Hodges' father was the first man to conduct a store in Lake Charles, and he was associated with Jake Ryan in saw milling, their mill being the first to be built in Lake Charles.

At a few minutes past 4 o'clock on the evening of 7 Feb. 1926, Grandma Hodges passed away at age 84 years. She died at the home of her son, Henry Hodges of Ragley. The funeral was conducted by Rev. Dan Hayes of Eunice and she was buried at Magnolia Cemetery. Besides her living children, Alzenith left 59 grandchildren, 134 great-grandchildren and 8 great-great grandchildren.
