CONFEDERATE CARPETBAGGERS

Dr. Daniel Sutherland, historian, teacher, author and Pulitzer Prize nominee, was the speaker at the May meeting of the SWLGS. His topic was "Confederate Carpetbaggers". The following is extracted from Dr. Sutherland's speech.

When we hear the word "carpetbagger", we generally think of a northerner who came to exploit the South after the Civil War. These men were usually less than honorable, and were often completely dishonest and ruthless.

However, there were also southerners who moved to the North after the war. They moved singly, not as a conscious effort as a group, to escape the devastation of their homeland. Most of these were young men, usually single, who had served the Confederacy. Many had been students and had no established professions and few economic ties to the war-ravaged South. They came mostly from the southeastern coast, particularly Virginia, and only 8 or 10 of them came from Louisiana. In general, they were more honorable than their northern counterparts.

In the 1850's there had been a large northern migration of southerners, especially to southern Illinois and southern Indiana. Therefore, shortly after the war ended, many young southerners went North having friends or relatives there to provide homes, financial aid or business opportunities for them.

The reasons southerners left the South were many. The North had a better economy, better business opportunities, and it was easier to make a living there. Many no longer had homes or families, so an invitation from friends or relatives living in the North gave a chance for them to escape the privations of a war-torn land. For others, it was an opportunity to complete their interrupted education, for advanced education was virtually non-existent in the post-war South. Some went for cheap and abundant land. The quest for adventure also played a role.

Most of these men settled in towns and cities for better business opportunities. But some of those who went North seeking land of their own had been sharecroppers in the South and managed only to become tenant farmers in the North.

There were many adjustments to make to living in the North. Living with the label of "Rebel" brought out old hates and prejudices. The weather was vastly different and caused problems. There were even different views on holidays.

Most of the "Confederate Carpetbaggers" wanted to keep their Southern identity in their new homes. Many still felt an attachment to the South and the Confederacy and wished to continue old ties. Former southerners got together to maintain relationships with each other and soon founded patriotic organizations like the United Confederate Veterans and the United Daughters of the Confederacy to maintain their ties to the South, the Confederacy and each other.

Many of the "Confederate Carpetbaggers" became successful and

Many of the "Confederate Carpetbaggers" became successful and wealthy, particularly in New York and Chicago where they made fortunes in trade and the stock market. At least six became millionaires. Most of them found ways to reinvest some of their money in the South. They built railroads and brought industry and business enterprises

to help rebuild the South. Many dedicated parks and monuments to the Confederacy and its heroes.

Among the most famous and successful of these transplanted southerners were ROGER PRIOR of Viginia, a former Confederate general who became a successful lawyer in New York, and CHARLES ROWSE and THOMAS FORTUNE, who became millionaires. Literary figures included the poet SIDNEY LANIER of Georgia. BURTON HARRISON of Louisiana, formerly JEFFERSON DAVIS' private secretary, became a prominent and prosperous lawyer in New York.

Many of the "Confederate Carpetbaggers" did not become wealthy

or nationally famous, but were well known locally, serving as sheriffs,

mayors or business men.

Although the majority of these immigrants to the North were successful in adapting themselves to a new way of life, their exodus was a tremendous 'brain drain' on the South. Newspapers and magazines featured editorials telling men to stay in the South. ROBERT E. LEE, wrote many letters urging southerners to stay and rebuild the South. And most of them did.

INDIAN TRIBE?

An interesting dilemma has been reported by several Louisiana newspapers, including the <u>Lake Charles American Press</u> and the Alexandria <u>Daily Town Talk</u>. A certified genealogist, hired by the Clinton-Choctaw community in Rapides Parish to conduct a genealogical report on the tribe so it could qualify for federal recognition, has claimed that the group is not Indian.

The Clinton-Choctaw tribe is one of the five Indian tribes recognized by the state, earning recognition from the Louisiana legislature in 1978. They then applied for federal recognition to receive health, housing and educational benefits, as well as the status of "Sovereign State", which allows a tribe to make its own laws within federal guidelines. Only three Louisiana tribes have received federal recognition.

Genealogical research, as well as historical and anthropological information, must be submitted to the Bureau of Indian Affairs to prove a group's Indian origins.

The so-called Clinton-Choctaws state that their Indian ancestors have lived in the Clinton area since the 1700's. However, the genealogist stated that after extensive research she had traced the ancestral lines of seven of the families and had found no evidence of Indian heritage. The genealogist found that some Choctaw Indians lived in the community until 1910, when they moved to Oklahoma, but that the current applicants are definitely not their relatives.

Currently the controversy to determine the authenticity of the group's status as an Indian tribe has not been resolved.

AN INTERESTING ANCESTOR, by DELORES JORDAN

"DR. LOUIS"

In the early 1850's, a young French doctor left his home and settled in the southwest corner of what was then Imperial St. Landry Parish. Dr. LOUIS ISODORE ESPARGELIERE then sent such glowing accounts of beautiful southwest Louisiana to his family near Lyon, France, that in 1890, his niece and her husband, PHILIP LAPLEAU, came to join him.

The doctor married JOSEPHINE OLIDA POUSSON of Opelousas in 1861. They made their home in Mermentau, where they raised two daughters, JULIE who died at age 15, and EVA, who married PHILBERT SIMON of Crowley.

References to Dr. ESPARGELIERE appeared in early issues of the "Opelousas Courier" and the "Crowley Daily Signal". His name also appeared in the early land transactions of Calcasieu Parish. Although his practice was in Mermentau, at one time he had a small office in Lake Charles just south of the courthouse.

Dr. ESPARGELIERE practiced medicine until a few years of his death in 1917, at age 93. Testifying to the respect and regard the doctor's neighbors had for him, they called him by his Christian name, "Dr. Louis". (In French, pronounced Louie.)

Excerpted from The FREMEAUX Genealogy dictated by LEONIE FREMEAUX in the 1930's, Ms. FREMEAUX recalls the doctor who lived near her family when she was a child. She well remembered one night when he came to her home with his little black satchel, a constant companion. That was the night her brother was born.

The doctor visited frequently with her father. He would often bring his young daughter, JULIE, and the two girls spent hours playing together.

Although JULIE'S mother had not learned to read, her father would spend hours teaching her to read and write. 'Madame Louie' was as devoted to her daughter as the doctor, but she wanted to make of her a practical, 'femme de manage' while he wanted to develop her mind and make of her one of the dainty little girls he remembered from home. One can only imagine the grief of the parents when JULIE died at age 15. The inscription on her tombstone reads in part, 'Her father's hope, her mother's joy....'.

Dr. Louis, Mermentau's pioneer physician, is interred in the QUEBEDEAUX Cemetery located near Midland, south of Bayou Plaquemine Brulee near the old ferry landing. Nearby are the graves of his wife and JULIE. The inscription on Dr. Louis's grave reads, "In a strange land, away from his beloved country, he fought his way, made friends by his charitable work, honest and kind dealings; left memories and a name which will always be an honor to his descendants. The next life was always his guiding star, and he died with the name of God upon his lips".

The name ESPARGELIERE has not been familiar in the area for over fifty years, as the doctor and his wife had no sons. I am descended from his

only daughter, EVA ESPARGELIERE SIMON.

When I first visited the old cemetery, I spoke to an elderly man, presumably the caretaker. He stopped his work to talk to me. When I told him which grave I had gone to visit, he said with great affection, "ah, Dr. Louie. I remember him very well". In the course of our conversation, I learned that the doctor had cared for his own parents. He spoke of their admiration for "Dr. Louie".

THE PRICE THEY PAID

Have you ever wondered what happened to those men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

Five signers were captured as traitors by the British, and were tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army. Another had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 fought, and died from wounds or the hardships of the Revolutionary War.

What kind of men were they? Twenty four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants; nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means and well-educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured. They signed, and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor.

CARTER BRAXTON of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

THOMAS MCKEAN was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him and poverty was his reward.

Vandals, soldiers, or both looted the properties of ELLERY, CLYMER, HALL, WALTON, GWINNETT, HEYWARD, RUTLEDGE, and MIDDLETON. FRANCIS LEWIS had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months.

At the Battle of Yorktown, THOMAS NELSON, Jr. noted that the British General CORNWALLIS had taken over the NELSON home for his headquarters. The owner quietly urged General GEORGE WASHINGTON to open fire, which was done. The home was destroyed, and NELSON died bankrupt.

JOHN HART was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their thirteen children fled for their lives. His fields and grist mill were laid waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart. MORRIS and LIVINGSTON suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians; they were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more.

Correspondence of the News.

The Enemy's Raid in Lower Louisiana Lake Charles, La. Oct. 1862

Friday, the 3rd inst., the enemy ascended the Calcasieu river, in an open boat, or launch, with sixteen men, including two commissioned officers. They captured the steamboat "Dan", and burned two schooners, one called the "Conchita", lately abandoned by a Spanish crew, at Calcasieu Pass: the other, name not now remembered, lying in the lower river. After remaining in the river at and near Lake Charles, until Sunday, the 5th inst., they departed, without a shot having been fired into them or towards them, having first laid the town of Lake Charles under contribution for a supply of beef and potatoes.

The foregoing statement is shameful enough; but, as various reports are in circulation in relation to this affair, I will narrate the events as they occurred.

At the time the enemy arrived in Lake Charles, upon which the village of that name is situated, there were fourteen white men in the town and its vicinity, and fourteen others within a distance of two I was present, and seeing no prospect or disposition to make any resistance to the enemy, started to rouse the neighboring country. No effort was made to collect the arms of the citizens, or the small parcels of ammunition in private hands, as I was assured would be done in my absence. I arrived in the vicinity of the Lake Saturday night, having rode nearly thirty-five miles that night, in company with a party of citizens, armed with rifles and shot guns. 4½ o'clock a.m., I saw two messengers who had been sent out from the Lake, and from them learned that there were three barges in the river, each mounting a six pounder cannon, and carrying twenty men each, and in addition, a schooner with two hundred men on board and six guns was in the river, a few miles below Lake Charles. Also, that the enemy intended ascending the river above Lake Charles again early

the morning, to capture a new schooner-rigged vessel lying in a small creek or cove a little above the Lake. Further, they informed me that Lieut. Col. W. W. JOHNSON of the State Militia, had arrived at the Lake, was mustering what men he could, and would be ready in the morning to operate against the enemy.

I immediately reported myself and the men with me to Col. Johnson, for duty, informing him that I would ambush my men near the banks of the small cove in which the new vessel was lying, as above stated, and would there await his orders, or attack the enemy if he attempted to carry out his purpose of capturing the schooner lying there. The position was favorable for operations on either side of the river.

We remained in this position for several hours, without hearing further from either village or the enemy. The men became impatient; and being under no restraint other than their own wills, became scattered along the road leading from near our first position to the adjacent farms across the river, on the Lake Charles road.

About eight o'clock a.m., the enemy threw a few shot and shell about the swamp in the direction of where we were stationed, but none fell nearer to us than a quarter of a mile. (I estimate the distance from the sound of the fuse.)

At 9:45 a.m., Col. Johnson joined us, and informed us that the enemy had stolen down the river on steamboat "Dan". We urged that we should follow, and at least annoy them at the bluffs and bends below.

Col. Johnson (now in command) objected to our doing so saying that the pilot was one of our own citizens, who was made prisoner by the enemy on his way up the river, and that he together with Colonel NATHANIEL CLIFTON of the militia, and eight or nine others who were on board the vessel, and said to be prisoners, would be killed by the Yankees if they were molested. The persons on the boat said to be prisoners, all signed a parole, and were put off at a point below, excepting Col. Clifton, who remains a prisoner as late as heard from.

I do not speak of the events which transpired Friday night and Saturday, as they are reported to me in a manner not at all creditable to those who were near the enemy, and I, being absent rousing the

people, have no personal knowledge of the facts. That one man actually refused to permit a party of Texans, (who arrived in the stage when the enemy was near the ferry in an open boat) to use several guns and rifles in his house and belonging to him, is true, I suppose there is no doubt. It is also certainly true that the enemy passed within shotgun range of a party of 20 or 25 armed men, who were ambushed on the shore and were not fired upon. The tale is a sad one to us. I hope the like will never be told of us again.

I make no doubt but that the late visit of the enemy to our river was but a reconnisance, preparatory to a visit in larger force, perhaps intending to establish himself here, and cut the line of communication with Texas, from Louisiana, preparatory to a contemplated winter campaign in Texas. A small force, with one six and one twelve pounder, could easily defeat any such plan as this, if stationed here before the enemy's arrival. But if he be allowed to establish himself, it will prove more difficult to dislodge him.

I will add, in relation to this visit of the Yankees, that it was no fault of the country people that no fighting was done - I mean private citizens. I never saw a better spirit manifested. When the shell were whistling in the morning, I noticed the countenances of a squad of 22 who were seated in line before me, and not a few eyes flashed with larger excitement.

AN ANCIENT LAND DEED (Lake Charles American Press, 24 Jan. 1906, p. 8)

P. J. Pavy of the Crowley abstrating firm of Pavy & Terwilliger, today filed for record in the district clerk's office one of the oldest land deeds ever filed here. It was issued by the Land Commissioner's office when all of what is now known as Southwest Louisiana was Opelousas country and the seat of the commissioners was where the town of Opelousas now stands and was known as Opelousas Church. The deed reads as follows:

Western District, Orleans Territory, Register's No. 37, Opelousas. No. 545
The Commissioners appointed for the purpose of ascertaining the rights of persons to lands within the District and Territory aforesaid; Do certify, that the Legal Representatives of Antoine Boisdore of the County of Opelousas are confirmed in their claim to a tract of land containing 1600 superficial arpens equal to 1354 & 1/100 American Acres, being for 40 arpens of front by the depth of 40 arpens on both sides of Bayou Nespique, situated in the County of Opelousas and held...By virtue of a grant under the authority of the Spanish government to Antoine Boisdore bearing the date the first day of August in the year 1784 and signed by Bernardo DeGalvez, then governor of the Province of Louisiana...Given under our hands at Opelousas Church this 24th day of May 1811 and in the 35th year of the Independence of the United States.

Vol. 33 was published with records researched beyond 1902-- a mixture of scattered records from various sources for the years 1903 through 1953 plus other materials. This present volume includes: a) a supplement of records dating from 1831 to 1900: b) the partial records of 1901 as well as the partial records of 1902 which complement and complete the records for those two years found in volume 32. The material from Supplementary mixed records (1903-1953) found in vol. 33 is also being reprinted in each forthcoming volume beginning with vol. 34.

Although material is primarily that of the southwestern area of the state, many notices concern Louisiana, the neighboring states in this vicinity, as well as some northern counties and other states, Entries include the names of ministers, witnesses, relatives, and dates and places of residence to the extent that this data appears in the original notice. Abstracts are arranged chronologically by newspaper, and there is a complete name index.

Newspaper Genealogical Column Directory, by ANITA CHEEK MILNER. 1989 Four ed. \$9.50 plus \$2.50 shipping charges.

The author points out that there are three primary ways to get your genealogical problems mentioned in newspapers. The best one when available is the one explored in this book - genealogy columns. Since not every newspaper carries such a column, some preliminary research must be made to locate them. This publication attempts to list all the columns that have appeared prior to late 1988 - about 150 in about 250 newspapers nation-wide. Even though some columns are no longer printed, it should not deter the researcher in his quest. Few columns survive for more than a few years; the reason given for such a demise is that the columnist did not receive enough queries to justify its existence in the eyes of the newspaper management. So genealogists are urged to make more use of the medium! All known columns in the U.S. are alphabetically arranged by state and county and cross-referenced for easy use. The following general subjects are also included: Black, Canadian, Irish, Jewish, and Scottish research, heraldry, and surnames.

S.; photos of family members and cemetery headstones; copies of birth and marriage records; information on wills and censuses; name index. Other lines included: WILLIAMS, NEAL, BRUMMETT, GOODIN, STONE, WEEDON, RUPE, HARDIN, LEE, PATTERSON, HALEY, HARRISON, WHITFIELD & others.

Some biographies are included as well as a chart of Mayflower descendants. Discussions on the STURTEVANT aeroplane and the STURTEVANT automobile are to be found. A second edition has been planned for 1992.

Our Colonial Ancestors: Knott, Massey, Youngblood, Hickman, Pullen, and Others, by JAMES DEWEY O'BRIEN. 1988. \$27.00 pp.

In the preface the author gives a swift over-view of the early history and pre-history of those people of western Europe and, in particular, Britain, from whom most of the early Colonial ancestors descended. Tracing ancestors is one of the best ways to learn general history. This work primarily concerns some Natchitoches and Union Parishes, LA. families. It also has copies of documents containing the original signatures and some handwritten notes by ancestors written during the preceding three centuries. Included is unpublished data on some early immigrants of general interest to genealogists, corrections, supported by document citations, to some published accounts of these families, and gives an insight into the history of those times through the lives of the subjects. 

SEPTEMBER PROGRAM

LYNDA M. LEE, director of the Calcasieu Parish Library System, spoke at the September meeting of the SWLGS. She discussed the five-year plan for the parish library system, by which she plans to update books and materials, establish reference centers at Sulphur and Central libraries, provide trained staff, adequate space, better hours, etc.

Of particular interest to genealogists was MRS. LEE's proposed move of the Genealogical Collection to the Carnegie Memorial Branch in downtown Lake Charles. MRS. LEE stated that the Carnegie Branch is well located, near the court house and in the historical district. The building is structurally sound, can be remodeled at a minimum expense, and is easily secured. MRS. LEE said that she planned to make the downtown branch The Genealogical Research Center for Southwest Louisiana, which she hopes will aid in the economic development of the area.

Many questions were asked in regard to the proposed move. Questions pertained to parking and security problems, more trained staff to help researchers, budgeting for and buying of genealogical books and materials, donations and keeping the downtown library open extra hours for researchers.

MRS. LEE stated that in 1990 there will be a tax election, including a bond issue, part of which will be used to remodel Carnegie. Questions or comments concerning the proposed removal of the Genealogical Collection from the Central to the Carnegie Branch of the Calcasieu Library System should be directed to LYNDA LEE at the Carnegie Branch of the Calcasieu Parish Library.

Our second speaker was MICHAEL D. JONES, staff writer for the <u>Lake Charles American Press</u> and member of the SWLGS. MR. JONES has contributed articles to historical magazines, is a member of several hereditary organizations and is commander of the 28th Louisiana Living History Association.

The following is extracted from MR. JONES' speech on "Newspapers in Lake Charles and Calcasieu Parish".

The first newspaper was published in Peking, China, in the early 500's and was published continually until 1935. European newspapers evolved from handwritten newsletters in ancient Rome. After Guttenberg's invention of printing from moveable type, newspapers as we now know them began to develop. The earliest European newspaper was the Strasburg Relation in 1609. The first English language newspaper was the Courant or Weekly News of 1621. The first full size English newspaper was the $\frac{Oxford\ Gazette}{Oxford\ Gazette}$, which began in 1665 and was devoted to news of the royal court.

The first American newspaper was the <u>Publickk Occurences Both Foreign and Domestic</u>, published in Boston in 1690. The first newspaper published in Louisiana was the <u>Moniteur de Lousiane</u>, which began in 1792 in New Orleans. It was, of course, published in French.

In the early 1800's newspapers were generally aimed at the political and social elite, because they were the class who could read. Newspapers cost six cents each, a sizeable amount for a laborer whose weekly income was only a dollar a week. In the 1830's "penny papers", cosing only a penny each, were circulated to reach the ordinary people and contained news of the daily happenings of the community, farm news and even serialized novels.

With the advent of "penny papers" and popular journalism, itinerant printers began newspapers in even the most remote and isolated frontier communities. I believe Lake Charles would qualify as such a community in 1855, when the first newspaper in town began publication. Until 1845 when Texas was admitted to the Union, Lake Charles and Calcasieu Parish were actually on the extreme western border of the nation. In 1855 the area was still very sparsely populated. Lake Charles wasn't incorporated and was called Charles Town, Charley's Lake, or just The Lake.

The first newspaper published in Calcasieu Parish was the Calcasieu Press in 1855. It was begun by JUDGE B. A. MARTEL and JOHN A. SPENCE, both of Opelousas. MARTEL appears to be the financial backer, but SPENCE, only 17 years old, was the actual publisher and editor of the newspaper. He moved here with his widowed mother and voung brothers and sisters and began publication. In the 1860 Calcasieu Parish census, SPENCE was listed as a printer rather than a newspaper publisher. The Calcasieu Press was apparently published irregularly until the beginning of the War Between the States, and was published even less after that. The last issue was printed on December 17, 1864, and is on display at the Imperial Calcasieu Museum in Lake Charles.

JOHN SPENCE joined a local militia unit, the Calcasieu Invincibles in 1862 and went to New Orleans to defend it against the Yankee invaders. When they got there, the city had already fallen. The unit broke up, some men going to Camp Moore to join other Confederate units and some returning home. SPENCE returned home and resumed his normal occupation. However, his young brother, EDWARD A. SETON, who joined the Confederate Army in 1861, was sent to Virginia, where with other Calcasieu boys, he fought in ROBERT E. LEE's Army of Northern Virginia. Unfortunately, SETON was captured at the Battle of Spottsylvania Courthouse and imprisoned at one of the most notorious prison camps, Fort Delaware, where he died in February 1865. His numerous letters home, many of which were addressed to his brother JOHN, gave details of what was happening to the Calcasieu boys in the various battles. SPENCE used this information for his newspaper and so you could say young EDWARD may have been a war correspondent for the Calcasieu Press, as well as being a full time soldier. JOHN A. SPENCE lived in Lake Charles until his death in 1875. He is buried in the Catholic Cemetery.

The subscription rate for the <u>Calcasieu Press</u> was \$2.50 a year and advertising rates were \$1.00 for one square of 10 lines. \$20.00 was required for the announcement of a public office, paid in advance. The second page held legal ads. For example, the policy jury announced that it was willing to pay \$10.00 for each wolf scalp turned in. On the front page two columns are filled with state and national news and the other two with legal ads, including some in French. A succession sale of LOUIS FRANGEUL gives us a look at what types of businesses were in Lake Charles at that time. At Ryan and Pithon Alley, there was a blacksmith shop and a Ten Pin Alley. On Ryan Street was the Lake Charles Coffee House and unspecified frame buildings.

In August 1858 WILLIAM HUTCHINS published the Calcasieu Gazette, which ceased publication in July 1859. It was 5 columns wide and printed on very strong, thin paper. Yearly subscription was \$3.00 payable in advance. Advertising took up much space and many of the news items were picked up directly from the columns of other newspapers, such as the New Orleans Delta, which arrived on schooners and stages. The December 18, 1858 issue contains an essay on the honest man, an argument why judges should be elected by the people, a story of JUDGE STEPHEN A. DOUGLAS' visit to New Orleans, a story about SHERIFF D. J. REID planning to take the federal census and warning him against some of the women folk in Calcasieu Parish, news from Washington and the opening of the 35th Congress. Farm news contained an article

on cotton seed and a story about growing oranges in Calcasieu Parish. The third page of the newsletter repeated the news in French and was entitled $\underline{\text{La Gazette Du}}$ Calcasieu.

During the Civil War it was difficult to publish newspapers. Northern block-ades of ports caused shortages of ink and paper. Newspaper editors were exempt from military service, but reporters, typesetters and other employees were not. Editors with supplies were limited by manpower. Calcasieu Parish was never occupied by the enemy, so Calcasieu newspapers were never shut down because of censorship by the Yankees as were many other Southern newspapers.

After the war, the Weekly Echo was established by D. J. REID, LOUIS LEVEQUE, and BRYANT HUTCHINS. In $\overline{1869}$ it was acquired by GEORGE W. WRIGLEY of New Iberia and in 1870 by C. W. FELTER.

In February 1871 the <u>Echo</u> was purchased by CAPT. JAMES W. BRYAN, who was born in Calcasieu Parish in 1834. Largely self-educated, BRYAN became one of the first school teachers in the parish and was a lifelong proponent of public education. During the War Between the States, BRYAN raised a company of infantry, nicknamed the Calcasieu Tigers, and became its captain. This unit, Company I, 28th LA. Volunteer Infantry, fought throughout the Vicksburg Campaign. After the War, BRYAN returned to Lake Charles, began a mercantile business, took over the editorship of the <u>Echo</u> and became the first mayor of Lake Charles in 1868, after the city was incorporated. The Echo continued under his leadership until 1890.

At this period the newspaper business became competitive. The <u>Lake Charles Commercial</u> was established in 1880 by JOHN McCORMICK, who came from Opelousas in 1877 and had worked for BRYAN on the <u>Echo</u>. The office of the <u>Commercial</u> was at the corner of Pujo and Hodges Streets. The newspaper was a family enterprise, with his wife, sons CHARLES and EDWARD and daughter LENA performing the duties of reporter and typesetter. The paper continued publication until 1900.

Meanwhile, J. B. WATKINS, a New York financier and land developer, established the <u>Lake Charles American</u> in 1885 to help promote his land developments to farmers in the mid-west and east. As many as 40,000 of these papers were distributed each month to induce readers into buying land in Calcasieu.

Between 1885 and 1900 the <u>New Roads</u>, a populist journal, and the <u>Calcasieu</u> Blade, operated by the black community, were established. Both were short lived.

In 1893 there were 7 newspapers operating in Lake Charles, but the Lake Charles Press, under JOE F. REED and GUY BEATTY became the city's first daily newspaper on February 8, 1895. In 1897 the American became a daily under the editorship of J. H. NEAL, nephew of J. B. WATKINS. The Lake Charles Tribune, a weekly newspaper, was established in 1897 and consolidated with the Daily American in 1898. In 1900 the Commercial was absorbed by the Daily American. By 1900 only 2 newspapers, the Daily American and the Daily Press were left operating in Lake Charles. These two merged on January 1, 1910 to become the Lake Charles American Press. This paper, under the proprietorship of the SHEARMAN family, still serves Lake Charles and Calcasieu Parish.

Other newspapers currently operating in the area include the <u>Southwest Daily News</u>, <u>Westlake/Moss Bluff News</u>, <u>DeQuincy News</u>, and the <u>Contraband</u> at <u>McNeese State University</u>.

Newspapers can be used by genealogist. There are the obvious things, like births, deaths and marriages. Be careful of the information contained in the obituaries, as it is only as accurate as the person giving it to the funeral home, which turns it into the newspaper. Newspapers also carry a list of people called

to serve on jury duty. Look for columns of news from outlying towns. Newspapers still carry news from surrounding towns, but it tends to be hard news, crimes, politics, etc., rather than personal columns that told of the everyday comings and goings of the inhabitants as they did in the past.

(Editor's Note: When researching a newspaper, be sure to record the name of the paper, the date and place it was published.)

AN INTERESTING ANCESTOR: CHARLES DUDLEY WARNER

by BILLY DUDLEY WARNER

My grandfather, CHARLES DUDLEY WARNER, was born at Pinder Ridge in Washington Parish, La. on 11 December 1845. He was the seventh child of the eight children born to WILLIAM DUDLEY JONES WARNER and his second wife, MARY MARGARET EDWARDS.

Leaving his home in Washington Parish, CHARLES DUDLEY WARNER moved to St. Helena Parish. There, in February 1863,he joined the Army of the Confederate States of America. A page from his diary states, "Feby. 1863 to April 1865. C.D. WARNER joined the C.S.A. in Feby 1863, Co. A, 18th Battalion La. Cavalry, CAPTAIN T.C. W. ELLIS, 1st. Lt. JAMES BURNES, 2nd. Lt. JNO. ROBINSON, 3rd. Lt. GEROGE W. BUNKSTON, Cap. of the Battalion, HALEY CARTER, Brigarde Commander, WIRT ADAMS. I served in La. - Miss. - Ala. - Tenn. Was discharged in April 1865 at Gainesville, Ala., got home in May 1865 ragged and dirty, walked home 600 miles". Signed C.D. WARNER.

During the war, WARNER held the rank of Corporal. He appears on a Roll of Prisoners of War, which states: "Co. A, 18th Battalion, Louisiana Calvary, Confederate States Army, commanded by CAPT. T.C.W. ELLIS, surrendered at Atronelle, Ala. by LT. GEN. R. Taylor, C.S.A. to MAJOR GENERAL E.R.S. CANBY, U.S.A., May 4, 1865 and paroled at Gainesville, Ala., May 12, 1865".

He came home to Pinder Ridge, then went west to Texas in 1875, having relatives in Texas, perhaps he meant only to visit, but he stayed. The 1880 census for Nogalus Prairie, Trinity County, Texas shows at household #241, CHARLEY WARNER, white, male, boarder, Tax Collector, broken leg, age 32, from Louisiana, boarding with JOSEPH A. DAVIS family.

In 1878, WARNER was elected Tax Assessor and Collector for Trinity County and held this office for 16 years, until 1894.

At Nogalus Prairie, CHARLES DUDLEY WARNER met and married BETHANY ANN CHANDLER. The marriage was celebrated on 20 February 1884, with Y.W. RANDOLPH officiating.

BETHANY ANN CHANDLER was the daughter of CARROLL T. CHANDLER and AMANDA WELCH, who came to Texas from Perry County, Alabama. BETHANY ANN CHANDLER was born 3 December 1859 in Trinity County, Texas.

Losing two children in infancy, tragedy struck the WARNER family again when BETHANY ANN CHANDLER WARNER suffered a fatal heart attack, falling at the cistern curb of her home on 21 October 1897. Their youngest child

died two years later.

In addition to his own children, CHARLES D. WARNER raised and educated his wife's niece, MAY and nephew, CRIT, and her cousins, the McCLENDON children. Any homeless waif was welcome at the WARNER HOME.

In 1916 WARNER moved to Angelina County, Texas and married the widow, MARY FRANCES PHARR JONES, a family connection of long acquaintance. They lived at Lufkin.

WARNER was an avid fisherman and swimmer, swimming in the Angelina River only a few months previous to his death. As a result of a sawmill accident, he walked with a cane.

He liked good horses, and once won a blue ribbon at the County Fair for his horse and buggy. He tied the ribbon to the horse's bridle and hitched the horse in a conspicious place. His prize was destroyed when an old nag came by and ate the ribbon.

On 20 February 1936, CHARLES DUDLEY WARNER died of pneumonia. His wife died several days later of the same cause. This proud, generous, industrious man was laid to rest beside his first wife in Trinity County.

La Voix des Prairies, Vol. I, No. 29, April 1989, from the Evangeline, La. Genealogical and Historical Society has an article by HOSEA LAMBERT entitled "The Forgotten Tribe", a story of the Coushatta (Koasati) Indians of Louisiana.

Family Tree, Newsletter #117, July 1989 from the Northeast Cobb Genealogical Society of Marietta, GA., has a list of old medical terms and their definitions that are helpful for genealogists. For example, many emigrants died of "ship fever" or "putrid fever", today known as typhus fever, a contagious disease transmitted to man by the bite of fleas, lice, etc.

ABSTRACTS AS GENEALOGICAL SOURCES BY ANNA MARIE HAYES

One of the most disappointing and frustrating things that a genealogist can encounter is to find that there was a fire in the court house or church where you need records. In 1910 there was a fire which destroyed most of downtown Lake Charles, including the Court House and Catholic Church. This raging fire destroyed almost all of the records of Imperial Calcasieu Parish, from 1840 to 1910, which then included the present-day parishes of Allen, Beauregard, Cameron and Jeff Davis.

However, the researcher should not despair. There might be a record in existence that contains the information for which you have been searching. This information might be found in the form of an affadavit, record of marriage contract, record of land sale, succession, etc., which may be found in a copy of a prepared land abstract of title.

Gaining access to the abstract may present a problem. If the land is still held by a family member, a simple request to read the abstract may be all that is required. You can tract the present owner by using existing records at the Court House if you know a description of the land. The present owner is under no obligation to show you a copy of his abstracts. Do not ask or expect to borrow abstracts, which represent a large investment of legal time and money.

If you know a legal description of the land, title companies will often search their records for the information you seek. However, be aware that there is a fee for the search and information from this source could be costly.

LEGAL DEFINITIONS

The following are definition records, taken from Black's La Fifth Edition.	ons of words found in successions and/or probate www Dictionary, by Henry Campbell Black, M. A.,
DATIVE	A word derived from the Roman law, signifying "appointed by public authority".
INTESTABLE	One who has not testamentary capacity; e. g. an infant, lunatic, or person civilly dead.
INTESTATE	Without making a will. A person is said to die intestate when he dies without making a will, or dies without leaving anything to testify what his wishes were with respect to the disposal of his property after death.
INTESTATE SUCCESSION	A succession is called "intestate" when the deceased has left no will, or when his will has been revoked or annulled as irregular.
SOCAGE	A species of tenure in England whereby the tenant held certain lands in consideration of certain inferior services of husbandry to be performed by him to the lord of the fee.
TESTATE	One who has made a will; one who dies leaving a will.
TESTATOR.,	One who makes or has made a testament or will; one who dies leaving a will.
TESTATRIX	A woman who makes a will; a woman who dies leaving a will; a female testator.
TUTOR	In civil law this term corresponds nearly to "guardian" (i.e. a person appointed to have the care of the person of a minor and the administration of his estate), except that the guardian of a minor who has passed a certain age is called "curator", and has powers and duties differing somewhat from those of a tutor.
TUTORSHIP BY NATURE	Upon the death of either parent, the tutorship of minor children belongs of right to the other. Upon divorce or judicial separation of parents, the tutorship of each minor child belongs of right to the parent under whose care he or she has been placed.
TUTRIX	A female tutor.
UNDER-TUTOR	In Louisiana, in every tutorship there shall be an under-tutor, whom it shall be the duty of the judge to appoint at the time letters of tutorship are certified for the tutor. It is the duty of the

under-tutor to act for the minor whenever the interest of the minor is in opposition to the interest of the tutor.

TUTOR ALIENUS...... In English law, the name given to a stranger who enters upon the lands of an infant within the age of fourteen, and takes the profits.

DE AVO..... from the grandfather

A PATRE..... from the father

DOWER RIGHT...... Widow's right to one-third of all her husband's property at time of his decease, to be held throughout her lifetime.

GUARDIAN AD LITEM...... Person appointed by the court to oversee the interests of an "infant" when his property is involved in litigation. In some cases the term "infant" was used for minors under 14 years of age.

JURE UXORIS..... in right of his wife

HOLOGRAPHIC WILL...... A handwritten will, dated and signed by the testator, valid in most states.

NUNCAPATIVE WILL...... Oral testamony, given in extreme circumstances, for final disposition of property, made before witnesses.

ARTICLE FROM "THE DAILY AMERICAN", SATURDAY, MAY 14, 1904, LAKE CHARLES, LA

An interesting and curious set of documents was received at the court house today from Woodford County, KY, to be used in proving title to a piece of property in Calcasieu Parish. One of the documents is a land grant to JOHN STEELE, forage master in the KY militia in the War of 1812, granting to him 80 acres of land. It is dated April 8, 1856, and has an engraved picture of Jefferson Davis, as secretary of war, and a picture of Lt. General WINFIELD S. SCOTT. There is also a picture of a white man rescuing a white woman and her babe from a savage who is standing over them with upraised tomahawk and another picture of a farmer with a scythe in a field showing the civilization of the country.

There is also attached the will of JOHN STEEL of Woodord County, KY bequeathing several slaves by name to members of his family and among these bequests is this paragraph, which speaks for itself:

"Item 5. It is my will that my negro man Willis, shall be emancipated on the condition that he will consent to go to Liberia and that the sum of \$500 be given him to convey him there and to support him for the first year. But should he not choose to go to Liberia, this is my will: that he shall choose either one of my three sons for his master, and the one he may select shall treat him as he de

The question is often asked, "What genealogical information is available from land records"? The following is an example of genealogical information gleaned from an abstract furnished from the U.S. Land Office at Baton Rouge, La. Although this data is in the realm of public documents, we are discontinuing it after 1913 to protect the privacy of the living.

JOSEPH SALLIER of Opelousas Parish, La. had deposited in the General Land Office, at Opelousas, whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said JOSEPH SALLIER, according to the Provisions of the Act of Congress of the 24th of April 1820, entitled "An Act Making Further Provisions For The Sale of Public Lands, etc.".
