FEDERAL CENSUS RECORDS NO LONGER AVAILABLE ON INTER-LIBRARY LOAN

The Calcasieu Parish Library has been informed that effective last December 1981, no more requests for microfilm on inter-library loan will be honored by the Federal Records Center at Fort Worth, Texas. Microfilm will still be available for use in the individual centers but will no longer be sent by mail on the loan system. This cancellation is due to budget cuts at the National Archives. There is also a chance that the regional records centers will not receive copies of the 1910 census due to be released next year. The National Genealogical Society is urging members to write their Senators and Congressmen to make their views known as soon as possible.

The Southwest La. Genealogical Society has a great deal of information in the form of books and publications which are available for loan to members. FOR MEMBERS WITH ANCESTORS FROM THE ASCENSION, ASSUMPTION, LAFOURCHE AND TERREBONNE PARISHES AREA THE FOLLOWING RECEIVED FROM THE LAFOURCHE HERITAGE SOCIETY SHOULD BE OF INTEREST:

Lafourche Heritage Society is sponsoring a topical history of the Lafourche Region, under the editorship of Dr. Philip uzee, which will include a genealogy section and you are being requested to participate by submitting your family history for inclusion.

The geographical scope of the book will include Ascension, Assumption, Lafourche and Terrebonne Parishes and Grand Isle. The time period is Pre-World War 11. Contributions for the book are requested on the bass of possible publication with no reimbursement, in an essay format. Family history essays

may be accompanied by family group sheet and ancestor charts.

In writing essays, the researcher could be guided by the format in New Iberia, Essays on the Town and Its People, compiled by Dr. Glenn Conrad of USL or in Historical and Biographical Sketches of La. or in any Who's Who edition. Generally, the essays could start with the ancestor of the family name who first came to the area with facts on this person and following generations: when arrived, from where, why and how; when born, where, nationality of parents and roots; religion; where did he settle; what lands did he own; education; occupations; special talents, abilities, attributes, trials and troubles; wars and honors; customs and traditions; family legends and other humorous incidents; date and place of marriage; comments on wife and family; names and birth, marriage and death dates of children; civic, religious, political activities; club organizations.

Anyone needing help to research a family name or area ancestors is encouraged to write to the Genealogy Committee of Lafourche Heritage Society. There is a June 1, 1982 deadline for submitting contributions; however, we need to know before then if you will participate. Send us a note indicating the family histories that you will submit. We would like to have the essays before the end of April. If everyone who receives this letter contributes at least one

typewritten page, we will have a wonderful book.

TENTH ANNUAL GENEALOGICAL CONFERENCE of the SOUTHEAST TEXAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY will be held Saturday, April 17, 1982 at Moncla's Catering Center, 535 Mariposa, Beaumont, Texas. NEW DISCOVERY IN ACADIAN GENEALOGY (from a recent issue of the Alumni News of the University of Southwestern Louisiana)

If your family name is BOUDREAUX, DAIGLE, GUIDRY, HEBERT, LANDRY, LEBLANC, THIBODEAUX OR TRAHAN, the University of Southwestern Louisi-ana has acquired eighteenth-century records of your possible ancestors

In researching her own ancestry, Evelyne Petry Goller uncovered official papers of these and over 30 other familiar Acadian names. She recently presented copies of these records to the USL Center for Louisiana Studies. Mrs. Goller, who lives in the community of Nina, near Breaux Bridge, found these papers on Belle Ille en Mer, a small island off the coast of Brittany, France.

She uncovered records of births, deaths, marriages and other transactions of 78 Acadian families who settled on the island in the 1760's. These families eventually emigrated to Louisiana. In addition to be above-mentioned names, she found records of such families as AUCOIN, BABIN, BILLERAY, BLANCHARD, BODARD, BOURG, COURTIN, DAIGRE, DELINE, DOUARON, DOUCET, DUHON, DUPUIS, FORET, GAUTROT, GENDRE, GRANGER, HACHE, MARTIN, MAUGER, MELANCON, NAQUIN, PITRE, POIRIER, RENAUD, RICHARD, RIVET, ROBICHAUX, SECOILLOT, TIERNARY, THERIOT, AND VINCENT.

USL will publish these Belle Ile en Mer records, translated into English where necessary, in an upcoming issue of the Attakapas Gazette, a journal devoted to the study of area history and culture. MISSISSIPPI RESEARCH

Looking for an ancestor in the state of Mississippi? The following may be of some help.

The first permanent settlements in Mississippi occurred between 1699 and 1716 on the Gulf Coast and the Mississippi River by French adventurers. The British began settlement in 1763 when they gained control of the territory. Land grants were given to retired English military officers which encouraged settlement in Natchez. Amerians moved into the area during the Revolution to avoid conflict, and were followed by thousands of new settlers following the Revolution and the opening of the Mississippi. Another major migration occurred in 1837 when the last Indian lands were opened. Statehood was granted in 1817.

State registration of births and deaths began in 1912. Some earlier records can be found in the county clerks' offices. Marriage records were begun in counties at the date of organization, but state registration did not begin until 1926. For state registration of vital records write: Vital Records Registration Unit, P. O. Box 1700, Jackson, MS 39205.

Mississippi has a variety of prominent religions, but the dominant church is the Southern Baptist denomination. Although some early records have been gathered by local historical societies and libraries, most records are located at the individual church in question. Churches such as Methodists, Presbyterians, Lutherans, Catholics, and others, keep very thorough and complete vital records, but the Baptist and Pentacostal denominations generally record only marriages, deaths, and church minutes.

Wills, administrations, and other probate matters are available in the Court of Chancery offices in each county. Also in these offices are the deed and mortgage records, divorce records and naturalization records.

Service and pension reocrds for all wars prior to 1900 are available at the National Archives in Washington, D. C. Confederate Pensions and military histories pertaining to Mississippi veterans are available at the State Archives in Jackson, Mississippi.

HEIRLOOMS/STICK TO GUIDELINE SO YOU WON'T GUM UP THE WORKS by Peg Meier, Staff Writer

What is special in your family that you want your grandchildren and great-grandchildren to have someday?

Your first thought may be photographs. Sorry, but the color pictures you're shooting this year probably won't survive more than a generation, if that.

How about the family album, with important documents and photos carefully taped or glued to the right pages? Unfortunately, you may be doing everything wrong to preserve it.

How about the wedding dress or baptismal gown, dry cleaned and hanging in the attic in a plastic bag? More bad news.

Preservation experts say the general public tends to make basic mistakes. The worst enemies are glue, tape, color film, heat, moisture, acidity and plastic. Here are tips from the experts.

Taking pictures. The photo industry admits that pictures and slides made from some films will fade noticeable in six or fewer years. That's not long enough for a first-grader to see his or her baby pictures in good condition.

Shoot some black and while film on important occasions and some ordinary days. Color pictures just won't last. Even if pictures are kept in the dark in temperature and humidity controlled rooms, dyes lose their vitality.

The acidity in color film - for both slides and prints - is much higher than in black and white film. Color film self-destructs. The vegetable dyes fade to a pale orange and then to nothing. Slides hot in the 1930's, 1940's and 1950's may look pretty good today. It's safe to guess they will last longer than the pictures taken now. Most old slides were shot with Kodachrome film, which will last much better than Kodak's Ektachrome slides which many of us shoot today. According to Elizabeth Hall, chief photographer at the Minnesota Historical Society, Kodachrome may last 50 to 100 years. Ektachrome will survive 50 years at most, she estimates. Again, that's under ideal conditions. Color prints will last even less time than color slides. And Kodak instant-print cameras produce pictures that will fade the fastest, she said. Within a few months you can see a change in the prints' colors. Polaroid's last longer, perhaps even longer than conventional color prints.

Strange as it seems, the earliest photographic processes have produced images that will last the longest. Early daguerreotypes from the Civil War employed a process of putting metal on a metal plate. The black and white images are still sharp today and will continue to be, far longer than those color pictures you took last week.

Storing Pictures. Never put them in the attic (they'll suffer from the heat in summer and the cold in winter) or the basement (too damp). They'll do much better in a first-floor closet, away from light. Heat accelerates the aging process by 10 or 20 years. Ideal conditions are a temperature of 68 degrees and humidity of about 40 to 50 percent.

If you hang pictures on the wall, you can be sure the sunlight and fluorescent light will hasten aging. (Regular tungsten electric light does less harm.) Either copy the photo and display the copy, or copy the photo and preserve the copy negative. For an especially good picture, you might want to consider buying an ultra-violet-resistant glass, which slows the fading process. Metal frames are better than wood, wood is acidic.

Keep the negatives. Black and white negatives will last a long, long time, even longer than black and white prints. Be sure to store them in non-acidic negative envelopes.

To further complicate things, photo processors are printing many pictures on resin-coated (known as RC) paper, which is highly acidic. Even black and white pictures are printed on RC paper. You might want to specify that your special pictures be printed on non-RC paper.

When you have a commercial photographer take your family picture in the studio, have him take a few black and white pictures. Ask for the negatives.

Photo Albums. Never use adhesive tape or glue. Never use magnetic albums, the kind in which photos stick to strips of glue on a page and are covered by plastic. The paper and the glue and the plastic all are highly acidic, and the photos eventually (maybe in 10 years) will stick to the glue and rip when you want to separate them. The plastic is damaging because the paper that pictures are printed on needs to breathe. Most plastic has a lot of acid. Try to find photo albums made of Mylar or Acetate, which will not hurt the pictures. Try to find photo albums with acidfree paper. (Suggested are albums from Light Impressions, a Rochester, N. Y. firm. Address: Box 3012, Rochester, NY 14614.)

Books and Important Documents. Again, it's the heat and humidity that do the dirty work. Don't keep the wedding certificate, old family letters or the family Bible in the attic or basement. Store items flat. For anything you think may be worth a lot of money or has sentimental value, see an expert; don't try to repair them yourself.

Never use adhesive tape to mend important papers; it gets gooey or brittle and ruins their value. It is suggested that they be encapsulated between two pieces of Mylar polyester, sealing the edges with double-edged tape.

Newspapers. Newsprint won't last. You can retard the deterioration by keeping them from temperature extremes and humidity, but they will crumble eventually. Old newspapers will last longer than today's paper. Rag content and therefore, quality has decreased steadily since the time of the Civil War. If you keep newspaper article with other documents, be sure to separate the others from the newsprint. Newsprint will turn the other papers dark.

Clothing and textiles. Cloth is best stored in the dark, in a place as free as possible from flucturations in temperature and humidity. A closed area with a little bit of circulation is desirable, such as a chest of drawers or a closet shelf. Optimum storage for flat textiles, such as quilts, shawls or table linens is to be laid out flat and unfolded. One layer objects like shawls should be rolled around a cardboard tube, covered first with a clean white sheet. Cover the object with another piece of sheet. Multi-layer flat objects as quilts should be folded loosely, and the folds padded with crumpled-up tissue paper.

Antique clothing and costumes are best stored flat. Many may be sturdy enough to hang in a closet. Pad the hangar with tissue paper and wrap the garment with muslin. Garmet bags are a good idea; dry cleaner bags are not. The plastic deteriorates and may stick to the fabric.

In defense of their color film and paper, a Kodak spokesman said Kodak has spent millions of dollars in research and development to find a way to manufacture color films and papers whose dye images would not change for hundreds of years, regardless of how the images were stored or displayed. "But in spite of the magnitude of our investment, neither Kodak nor other manufacturers have yet been able to produce color photographic dyes which don't change over a period of time when displayed in or exposed to light." The company says its Kodachrome film is the most stable; it should not show noticeable color change for at least 100 years. (That is for storage under ideal conditions.) For Ektachrome, the number is 50 years, Kodak says.

By 1937 property was being sold to pay off mortgages and the colony was dissolved. Many residents moved away, but quite a few, especially the elderly, chose to remain in Vernon Parish. Legal squabbles contined well into the 1960's, when a group in Reno, Nevada, and another in Leesville each claimed to be the legitimate board of directors for the dissolved community.



RACE DETERMINATION: LAKE CHARLES FAMILY CONTESTS STATE FORMULA

A Lake Charles woman who is described as light skinned with Caucasian features and straight black hair had her day in court in New Orleans last month, battling a Louisiana law that classifies a person as black with at least 1/32 "Negro blood". The case arose from a suit filed three years ago by the woman and five of her relatives when she claims she was startled to find her birth certificate listed her as a Negro, and was unable to persuade the Department of Health and Human Resources to change her classification.

The woman is the great-great-great granddaughter of a slave woman and a white New Orleans planter. Her Louisiana lineage dates back to the 1700's when the planter fathered four children by one of his slaves. The woman's lawyer presented genealogical charts spanning seven generations and an extensive family photo record. He said the slave woman was the last full-blooded black in the family and her 20th century descendants should now be considered white. Reporters were told that the black slave woman from Opelousas was declared a "free Negress" in 1762. The planter's legitimate son then went to court to have her returned to the family property. The son traveled to Opelousas, kidnapped her at knifepoint and took her back to New Orleans.

The state claims that later direct descendants intermarried with mulattos, quadroons and octaroons - qualifying them to be labeled black under the 1/32 standard. The state's lawyer also argued that birth certificates were filled out by the plantiff's parents who apparently listed their children as black because that is what their own birth certificates read. "The state doesn't classify anybody as anything", the lawyer said. "It's our position that (the plantiffs) are asserting that there's something wrong with records that their parents submitted, in which case the burden of proof is upon them."

Tulane University anthropology professor Munro Edmonson cited research indicating that American whites have an average of five percent traceable Negro genes, while American Negroes have an average of twenty-five percent traceable white genes. He said it is impossible to measure the genetic racial composition of an individual on the basis of ancestry.

The case was heard by the New Orleans Civil District Court Commissioner who will make a report of the evidence to Civil District Judge Sanford Levy, who will issue a ruling.

MILITARY RECORDS (Condensed from "The Digger's Digest", Sutter-Yuba Genealogical Society, Yuba City, CA, vol. 9 #3)

I wonder how many of us, in searching for a military record, be it the service, pension or bounty land record, send a request for information to the Archives in Washington, DC, and, if we receive a negative response, conclude that no record exists for our ancestor?

Keep in mind that the individual states probably have many military records from the colonial times through part of this century that the federal government has not obtained.

Only a small percentage of the soldiers served in the "Continental Line" during the Revolutionary War. Most served in the state militias. They were "called up" when the need arose, and were disbanded when that particular emergency passed. Many of those in the state militia did not live long enough to apply for the pension for Revolutionary service following passage of this Act in 1832. Thus, the only record of their service may have remained in the state where they served.

Service in state units was also the norm during the Civil War, especially for Confederate soldiers. The Federal Government did not obtain all of these records, many more remained in the South. The Southern States did not pay a pension according

to the state they served from, but paid the pension from the state in which the veteran was living when he applied for the pension.

Remember also--some men from the North fought for the Confederates during that war, and the opposite is also true; and, not all the men in the thirteen colonies fought against the British. If you can't locate your man in the Revolutionary War, search for the Loyalist Records for his area.

BOOK REVIEW

BAILEY - BOURET by Geneva Bailey Seymour has been donated to the Society by our member Mrs. Seymour. It consists of 62 pages, with index and soft cover.

The Bailey line begins with William Britton Bailey, b. ca. 1806 in Tennessee. He was the son of John Bailey and Jane Edmundson. William Bailey married 24 Aug. 1830 in Opelousas, La. to Sarah Clark the daughter of William Clark and Jane McClelland. They had six sons and one daughter and their descendants are outlined in this book. The Bouret line begins with Augustin Bouret b. 1844 in Leige, Belgium who married in 1867 Marie Cecile Victoire Parmentier. Two sons were born in Belgium. This family married into the Bailey family and settled in the Rayne, La. area. Interesting stories about individual members of these two families increase the enjoyment of this book. UPCOMING TV SPECIAL OF INTEREST TO GENEALOGISTS

Word has been received that CBS will present "Bruce Catton's - The Blue and the Gray", an epic eight-hour drama about the American Civil War, scheduled to be broadcast this November.

Set in the turbulent years between 1859 and 1865, "The Blue and the Gray" tells the story of two related families - one in the North and one in the South - whose lives are forever changed by the various events of the War Between the States.

While the foreground of the story is fiction, its background is populated by historical figures. The cast includes Gregory Peck as Abraham Lincoln, Sterling Hayden as John Brown, Rip Torn as Ulysses S. Grant, and Rory Calhoun as Gen. George Meade.

THE JOURNAL OF WILLIAM ARTHUR WHEELDON

(Contributed by his granddaughter, Juanita Knipp of Lake Charłes. Wheeldon is the progenitor of the WHEELDON family of Lake Charles.)

My name is William Arthur Wheeldon, pronounced Weldon and spelled in my Grand-mother's Bible "Wheldon" - I was born at 159 High Street, Shadwell - which is one of the Lower Hamlets below the Tower of London in the County of Middlesex, England. I am the third son and seventh child of John Wheeldon and Mary Davis Wheeldon, his wife. I was born on the 29th day of December in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-two and am now in this 11th day of December 1914 almost 72 years old.

My father was a Sailors' Outfitter and did business in the shop over which I came into the world. Shadwell is the third hamlet below the Tower of London down the

Thames River and High Street.

My father did business at 159 High Street for over 27 years and as was the custom, the family lived where the business was carried on. Consequently, it was impossible to judge of the standing, either in manners, wealth, refinement or education by the neighborhood in which a family lived. And as the municipal affairs were conducted under the auspices of the parish, the leading businessmen of the parish served as vestrymen, church wardens, including the overseer of the poor. Each community or parish practically governed itself. The Rector of the parish being Chairman of the Westry. My father was one of the Vestrymen. The church, St. Paul's, Shadwell, was an old style church with high pews - ours was on the right side aisle. It was customary for all shops to open Sunday morning and close a few muntes before 11:00 at which time church began. Mother, my 2 sisters (2 died in infancy) and my 2 brothers and self all dressed in our special Sunday clothes, came down and out through the shop and on up the street to church - leaving father and his assistants selling clothing and outfitti the outgoing sailors and longshoremen. Returning at 1:00 PM, we found the shop closed but the door attended by the shop boy. During the week we took our meals in a parlor in one corner of the shop; but on Sunday - dinner, tea and supper were served in the dining room on the 2nd floor. It was a noble room looking onto the street with 3 windows and the full width of the building, say 40 feet and about the same depth. It was panelled with a fireplace guarded with a brass fender. On one side was a large closet in which reposed all kinds of fine stores: preserves, tea, coffee, spices, jars of preserved ginger, tamarands, nuts, German sausages, mostly presents to mother from Captains returning from East and West India parts, China and other tropical places in South America and Africa. There was in those days very close friendship between Captains and a the businessmen. Most of the captains had wives and children living in Northern parts who would come to London to meet husbands who had probably been off on voyages covering from one to three years or longer. They would come to our house and many a tender meeting I, as a child, witnessed in our old dining room between those tanned and sunburned manly men and their loved ones. Our guests were served with a liberal supply of Stout and Allsopps Ale (I wish I had a glass now), Cheshire cheese, cold boiled beef and ham, fine pickles, a bottle of fine old Aversled Port and some brandy and water to smoke a pipe by. Old Betsy, our Welch servant, would lug me off to bed long before they broke up.

As I said before, each parish conducted its own municipal affairs - street cleaning, lighting, fire protection, taking care of the poor. My father, from the nature of his business was an important man. All his stock was made up of his own work people. He bought his goods - moleskins, corderoys, pilot cloth, canvas, dungarees, broadcloth, doeskin - by the piece; employed a cutter who gave out the work to a lot of tailors and sewing women living in the neighborhood - wives, daughters and widows of men employed round the wharves, barges, boats and docks. It was a common thing to have a man come in the shop and tell father he had got hurt and his family needed help. His address would be taken and some of the ladies would investigate and furnish relief to keep them off the parish (as once a pauper, always a pauper). I remember one

Christmas it was discovered that a woman named Deal was living in one room with four children and one just born. The father was a sailor on a salt ship which had foundered. She was seen through her trouble and when able to work, given sewing, rent paid and my father took the boy, Tom, for a shop boy. He lived with us until father went out of business. Then my brother-in-law, who had a trunk and box factory, took him and when I left London in '61, he was still with him.

My mother was Welch-English, born in the city of London, Nagshead Court, Fleet Street. Her father, John Davis, left his native place Llangallen, Wales (which was also the ancestral home of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate States), and as a Welchman, claim kin to the 16th generation. I will take that privilege. I want to say this for the Welch, they always stand and have stood for freedom. They are the original British that the Romans could not conquer. Who is the foremost man in England today? Lloyd George, a Welchman.

I never saw my grandfather Davis. He died when my mother was a girl, but I saw his son, John Davis, my uncle - and my recollection is that he strongly resembled Mr. Jefferson Davis.

My father was a well-built, medium heighted handsome man. A keen man of business, proud of his business success, his family and friends - a good provider, liable to walk in any day with a friend he had met and asked to dinner.

I was the youngest of seven - consequently my oldest sister was 15 years my senior and the next, 13 years and my elder brother John, 11 years. So I was "little Bill" not only to them but to their company as I have no recollection of when they did not have company.

Christmas Day was an event at our house. For days before there was preparations. Plum pudding being boiled and mince pies, cakes being baked and invitations mailed or delivered by hand or verbal.

The night before Christmas was a jovial time - our shop (all stores are shops in England) was large - probably forty feet by sixty with two windows in front and wide doors which were taken off the hinges at 7:00 AM summer and winter. There was shelves down both sides and counters but they were used to pile goods on. I never saw my father or any of his assistants behind them. All business was done in the open space in the centre. There was an abundance of light and as we never closed until 9:00 PM, the gas bill was a big item in expense. Saturday 12 PM was closing time.

In those days, it was not customary for wholesale houses to have delivery wagons, except for the heaviest goods and the wholesale houses from whom my father bought his piece goods employed porters - large, strong men who carried large packages on their shoulders with the aid of a "porters knot" which allowed him to walk upright.

In the course of the evening (Christmas Eve) several of these porters bearing hampers would arrive and the contents consisting of a large turkey, country sausage, game ducks, a chine of prime beef, bottles of wine and brandy, celery, oranges and apples, nuts, raisins and almonds, possibly a hannock of Welch mutton and other viands including kegs of oysters - enough to keep open house over Christmas, New Years and Old Christmas or Twelfth Night.

The porters, after being properly treated, fed and their hampers emptied and returned, went their way. Mother, with Betsy, her Welch servant, and Mrs. Jones, her Welch washwoman, laid out the campaign. In the shop there was an abundance of hot Elderberry wine and toasts for all hands and all comers. When the shop closed at 12 PM everyone went to bed pretty well tired out and full of good things and lively anticipation of the morrow.

At 11 AM Christmas morning, the family came down in full array and off to the parish church, for Christmas in England ranks with Sunday. The church was hung with Christmas greens and holly. On returning we found the shop closed and the family and invited friends assembled in the big dining room. I remember the last Christmas dinner in the old house. My father, a man of 54 - iron-grey hair and whiskers with

a clean shaved upper lip and chin, blue-eyed and aquiline nose, standing collar, black velvet vest and blueblack coat and pants, black silk handkerchief twice round his neck - no jewelry except his gold watch chain. He was a typical London tradesman - not afraid to state his opinion - a hater of pretention and loyal to his Queen. I received my middle name in honor of King George the 4th and the Duke of Wellington.

It was customary in those days for the chief bedroom to be furnished with a mahagony 4 post bedstead with a heavy canopy which was hung in winter with heavy Moreen curtains and white or colored dimity in summer. The fourposter in my father and mother's room had one that required the use of bed-steps to get into it. When the nation purchased the site and built Apsley House for the first Duke, his former residence was dismantled and the furniture sold. My father who made it his business to attend all such sales and kept a neighboring shop closed in which he stored his frequent purchases, and frequently made considerable money at them. Among other articles, he bought the dimity hangings of the Duke's bed. They were yellow with red strawberries for the pattern and I came into the world, if not on the bed of a Duke, anyway under the hangings he had slept under.

May 27, 1917

In looking thru my bookcase, I find this book with the foregoing - I note, tho' written in Dec. 1914, I make no mention of the War which broke out in the August previous. The entrance of the U. S. at this time shows that the situation is more serious than at the commencement. I note that my estimation of Lloyd George was correct, he now being Premier.

Mrs. Gladys Jacobs, widow of Curtis Jacobs, has donated the extensive genealogical records of her late husband to the Beauregard Parish Library in DeRidder. The Lions Club has donated money for a room to be added to the library to house the collection. SMITH continues to be the predominant surname in the United States, followed by JOHNSON, BROWN, WILLIAMS, MILLER, JONES, DAVIS, ANDERSON, WILSON and TAYLOR. But, according to The American Language by Henry L. Mencken, in New Orleans SMITH is still predominant, followed by WILLIAMS, JOHNSON, JONES, BROWN, JACKSON, DAVIS, MILLER, MARTIN and THOMAS with LEBLANC in eleventh place, LANDRY in twelfth and BOUDREAU(X) in seventeenth. In Lafayette, SMITH is in fourteenth place, preceded by BROUSSARD, HEBERT, GUIDRY, LEBLANC, LANDRY, MOUTON, TRAHAN, BREAUX, COMEAUX, BOUDREAUX, DOMINGUE, BERNARD and DUHON.

From "Gems of Genealogy", Bay Area Genealogical Society of Green Bay, Wisconsin:

The first census in Canada was taken in 1666. There were 3215 inhabitants. Censuses, thereafter, were taken at irregular intervals. It was not a Constitutional requirement in Canada until 1871 when the first Dominion census was taken.

"Legacy", newsletter of the Louisiana State Archives and Records Service, Vol. 6, #4 (Aug. 1982) has begun publication of a chronological listing of colonial documents of the Opelousas Post. These abstracts (1766-1803) contain land descriptions, slave sales, land grant petitions, labor contracts, suits, successions and other records kept by the Commandant of the Post. These documents were not included in the books on Opelousas published by Winston deVille and Jacqueline Vidrine. Photocopies of the records, ususally in French or Spanish, are available from the Archives for 10¢ per page (minimum \$1.00).

"The Louisiana Genealogical Register", Vol. XXIX, # 3 (Sept. 1982) has an article entitled"'Family Name' Geography in Louisiana". In the Dept. of Geography and Anthropology at Louisiana State University a project is now under way to map the present-day distribution of particular family names of French and Spanish origin that occur in Louisiana and adjacent states. A few gallicized names of German and English origin are also included. A list of the family names for which maps have been made is included with the article.....In this same issue is an article entitled "Research in the Archives of the Archdiocese of New Orleans.



FROM OUR EXCHANGE PROGRAM

L'Etoile d' Acadie - publication of the Acadian Genealogical & Historical Association of New England, Vol. II, #4 contains an excellent article entitled "Society in Acadia", 1636 to 1755 by Paul D. LeBlanc. It outlines the early history of Acadia, settlements, landscape and community organization and occupations. This article is to be continued. In the same issue is an article which we believe will be of interest to our own Acadian members:

ACADIAN FLAG

Marie Babineau (Mrs. Alphee Belliveau) is to the Acadians what Betsy Ross is to Americans and their flag. She is credited with the making of the first Acadian tri-color with gold star around 1883 after La Societe St. Jean Baptiste de Quebec had moved for a national holiday for Acadians. The first stirrings of that movement had been three years earilier in 1880 when August 15 was decided upon.

It was in those years that Acadians wanted to stand out among their Canadian counterparts. It was the first time Acadians were assembling since the dispersion at Grand Pre. Julie Albert, author of a Madawaska history prepared for that town's centeniial in 1969, wrote "the star is symbolic of Mary, Stella Maris, who guided the outcasts through storms and sufferings. The blue field it rests upon represents the persons consecrated to her; while the papal colors, gold and white, show their inviolable attachment to the Holy Mother Church."

The three vertical colors of the flag are blue, white and red. The red band is not explained but is expected to be remnant of the mariners attachment to the mother land across the Atlantic Ocean in France. The blue bank, upon which rests the gold star, is a touch of May and more of the Acadians attachment to her.

The flag, since 1883 and even before possibly in the minds of these outcast people, became a rallying point for the dispersed. They were in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and down the eastern seaboard of the fledgling United States.

Since 1978, when the flag flew over Maine's capital on Acadian Day - June 28, the flag has become a rallying point of Acadians in the St. John Valley and its Acadian Festival. Every spring, shortly after May 1, the flag starts appearing atop buildings, on flagpoles and in many windows.

As Acadian Festival week comes closer the number of flags multiply. It has made its way, in a few short years, from a banner that a few could relate to, to one that is known across the state of Maine, and the Province of New Brunswick.

It has taken its place in the Acadian Festival and become the rallying point of modern Acadians as it had become for Acadians rallying to themselves in 1883. During the festival itself, the flag will adorn churches, businesses, streets, and prows of canoes making the annual symbolic crossing of the St. John River to the flats at St. David village.

The Acadian Flag is the fabled Acadie.

<u>Les Voyageurs</u> - publication of the German-Acadian Coast Historican and Genealogical Society, Vol. III, #3 (Sept. 1982) has an article entitled "Louisiana Colonial Records and Where to Find Them". These are listed by parishes and give the dates the records began and where to locate them.

Examples of 17th century handwritings found in parish registers are very interesting. See the Feb. and March 1982 issues of the quarterly of the Madison County Genealogical Society, Madisonville, Texas.

LOST AN ANCESTOR IN ST. MARY PARISH, LA.???

The Morgan City, La. Archives may be the answer to your problem. It is an individual entity housed in a wing of the public library. Microfilming all parish and municipal reocrds is among the latest undertakings of the Archives under the direction of Mrs. Lela K. Lehmann and Mrs. Catherine B. Dilsaver. The Morgan City Archives Commission was formed in 1979. Also that year the Morgan City (Young) Fund donated \$62,532 towards building a wing for the archives at the public library, and a federal grant of \$7,000 was received for archival consultation and staff assistance.

Today's funding comes from donations, the Morgan City (Young) Fund, and the St. Mary Parish Police Jury which has provided money for the purchase of

microlfilm reader-printers.

Mrs. Lehmann and Mrs. Dilsaver, both who work without pay, are busy collecting, cataloging and indexing all local, parish and area history they can put their hands on. Legal documents, old photos, family records, they'll take it all.

BROUSSARD REUNION

On November 7, 1982 in Welsh, La. 203 descendants, relatives and friends of the late John Broussard and Victoria Romero Broussard gathered for a reunion. Six of the ten children of this union were present.

John Broussard, a native of the Mermentau, La. area was born the 25 Aug. 1875 and died on this birthday, 25 Aug. 1969. He was the son of Leo and Azelia Simon. Leo was the son of Edouard Rene and Delphine Broussard; Edouard, the son of Rene and Ann Godin; Rene, the son of Joseph and Anastasie LeBlanc; Joseph, the son of Joseph did Beausoleil and Agnes Thibodeaux; Joseph, the son of Jean Francois Broussard, born about 1654 in France and Catherine Richard of Acadia.

Victoria Romero, a native of Abbeville, La. was born the 1 Oct. 1879 and died 18 Aug. 1972. She was the daughter of Emile and Louisa Langlinois; Emile, the son of Nicolas and Melanie Frederick; Nicolas, the son of Joseph Michel and Marie Viator (Villator); Joseph, son of Joseph Nicolas and Julie Gosserand; Joseph, son of Michel (Meguel) Romero, born about 1738 in Spain, and Marie deGrano of Spain.

Married in Mermentau, 3 July 1894, Mr. and Mrs. Broussard enjoyed the rare privilege of celebrating their 75th wedding anniversary in 1969, one month before his death. At that time all ten of their children were living and able to attend the celebration.

A grand-daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Broussard, Mrs. Carl (Rosie) Newhouse of Westlake, La; who is also a member of the Southwest La. Genealogical Society, compiled an ancestor chart for the occasion, listing Broussard and Romero ancestors from France, Acadia (Nova Scotia), and Spain. Some family lines carried Mrs. Newhouse's ancestors back sixteen generations with dates back to 1450.

Descendants at the reunion receiving award plaques were: a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Broussard, Mrs. Clothilde Quebodeaux, 83, of Crowley, La., the oldest female; the oldest male was a son, Emile Broussard, 78, of Jennings, La.; Mrs. Olive LaFosse, another daughter received plaques for having the most grand-children and great-grandchildren present; a grandson, John Crader of Dallas, Tex., for having traveled the farthest; and Jared Bolton, 2 months old, of Fenton, La. for being the youngest attending. Jared is a great-great-great-grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Broussard.
