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## **BOULAY - BOULET**

The following information was submitted by James B. Boulet. The BOULET family is mentioned many times in the foregoing Diary of William Shepherd, and appropriately this background information, on at least one of the families who were living in Acadia and Vermilion Parishes at the time of Rev. Shepherd, should be told here.

Robert Boulay was the founder of this branch of the Canadian Boulay family and arrived in Canada in 1662, along with his wife Francoise Garnier and daughter, Jacqueline. Although information on his life in France is not available, one document is invaluable in the search for his origins. It is a bond drawn up in 1662 in which Robert Boulle' (Boulay, Boulet) obligated himself to Charles Turgeon as follows:

"Before Pierre Moreau, notary, Toyal scrivener and hereditary note-keeper in the city and government of La Rochelle personally established, Robert Boulle' plowman of the place of Mortagne, Le Perche, parish of St. Germain de loise' and Françoise Garnier his wife, duly and sufficiently authorized by him for this purpose, being at present in this city on the point of embarking on a vessel to go to the country of Canada, who together and jointly, each for the other and each separately for all, renouncing benefits of division, dues and rights of eviction and discussion of property, of their free wish (and will have recognized) and confessed to justly owe Charles (Turgeon living in the) said place of Mortagne, Le Perche, also were present and stipulating, the sum of twenty tz (Tours) livres because of a loan of the same sum made by the said Turgeon to the said Boulle' and his wife prior to these (p(rese)nts, to pay for the expense incurred by them in coming from the said region of Le Perche to this city As the said couple has d(ecla)red and recognized, and having received the said sum in louys of silver and o(th)er in legal tender according to the ord(onnanc)e, to which they indicated they were satisfied, in payment of which sum of twenty livres the said debtors jointly as stated, promise and will be held to pay to the said Turgeon or to his order, one year from today, and for any delay under penalty of all expenses, damages and interests And to do and accomplish by the said debtors without opposing it, they are jointly obligated as stated, and bound to the said Turgeon for each and all of their goods, furniture and real estate, present and future, and moreover the said Boulle' to serve in prison in person as for State revenues etc. (the tenure and effect of which he has) promised and sworn and judged, etc. Done at La Rochelle ... this twenty-third day of June, 1662...

The twenty livres which Robert Boulle' borrowed from fellow citizen Charles Turgeon, was to carry himself, his wife and four year old daughter, and baggage

from Mortagne to La Rochelle. Once there, Turgeon required a formal agreement in the form of the above bond executed.

Robert Boulle', his family, Turgeon and approximately three hundred other passengers sailed on the two vessels "l'Aigle d'Or" and "Saint-Jean-Baptiste". The passengers must have suffered terribly from hunger and thrist, because the crossing took longer than was anticipated. Thirty-three of the hundred workers which were included on this voyage died during the course of the voyage or soon after arrival.

Once the year was up, Boulay honored his committment and regained possession of his bond.

All of the Canadian Boulays are descended from this same Robert Boulay of St.-Germain de Loise'. None of the parish records exist today, but from the Mortagne notarial register is evidence that the Boulays were at Loise' from the 16th century. And from these Canadian Boulays descend our Louisiana Boulets.

Baton Rouge Genealogical & Historical Society's publication, "Le Baton Rouge", Vol. V., No. 1, Feb. 1985 has a list of genealogical and historical societies in Louisiana and their publications.

St. Louis Genealogical Society Quarterly, Vol. XVIII, No. 1, Spring, 1985 begins publication of the Marriage Records of Ste. Genevieve Catholic Church, Ste. Genevieve, MO 1759-1839. Many of the Frenc's names mentioned in this church register are also common names in LA.

Arizona State Genealogical Society's publication "Copper State Bulletin", Vol. XIX, No. 2, contains a "Genealogical Vocabulary". It is a list of terms genealogists may find when searching records for family history information. For example, did you know that the work "relict" refers to a widow or widower or that the term "quitclaim deed" means a deed conveying the interest of the grantor at that time.

Riley County, Kansas Genealogical Society's "Kansas Kin", Vol. XXIII, No. 1 has a short but interesting article on Prince Murat (Charles Louis Napoleon Achille Murat, Prince of Naples), nephew of Napoleon Bonaparte. His wife was the great-grandniece of George Washington. Achille and his wife were among the most colorful figures during Florida's territorial period.

The Louisiana Genealogical Register, Vol. XXXII, No. 1 has a listing of "Abstracts of Some French Sacramental Registers", 18th, 19th, & 20th centuries. The French parishes named are located in the Dept. of Sarthe, mainly. Many familiar Louisiana names are included in these registers.

#### BOOK REVIEWS

ANCESTORS OF EXZELIA ELIZABETH BOUDREAU AND BRANCH LINES OF THE BOUDREAU, SENEZAQUE, SENET AND MENARD ANCESTORS Vol. I, Betty Lou Madden, 811 Madden Rd. Apt. 3, Hastings, Nebraska 68901. 8½ x 11, soft cover, 476 pages, indexed. \$25.75. The author takes each generation of her mother's paternal grandparents (Boudreau & Senesac) and maternal grandparents (Senet & Menard) from the 1800 period back to the mid-1500 period in France. In addition Volume I has the descendants of the children down to mid 1700's of each of the children of her mother's ancestors of the Boudreau, Senezaque, Senet and Menard families who left France and went to Canada and Acadia. This book is very thorough, well documented, and easy to use with much background information, introductory material, maps, photo copies of birth, baptismal, marriage and death records. This book should be of interest and very useful to anyone with Canadian and Acadian ancestors.

DESCENDANTS OF EXZELIA ELIZABETH BOUDREAU'S PATERNAL AND MATERNAL GRANDPARENTS, Vol. II, Betty Lou Madden, 811 Madden Rd., Apt. 3, Hastings, Nebraska 68901. 8½ x 11, soft cover, 482 pages, indexed. \$27.50 plus \$1.30 postage & handling. Volume II which is a companion work to Volume I begins in the 1800 period in Quebec Province, Canada and follows these families trail to the St. Joseph, Kansas area. The descendants of Joseph Boudreau and Louisa Senez and brothers and sisters are traced to the present time. Volume II has many photographs, records and maps, and as in Volume I is well documented and easy to use. The author has done a monumental work in both of these volumes. (Both of the above books have been donated to our Society Library for use by our members.)

ONE MILE AN HOUR, The Priestly Memories of Rt. Rev. Msgr. William J. Teurlings, adapted by Rosalind Foley. Claitor's Publishing Co., P. O. Box 3333, Baton Rouge, LA 70821, \$10.00. 5½ x 9, hard cover, 104 pages, indexed. This book was first published in 1959 and this is a revised second printing of 1985. Msgr. Teurlings was born in 1872 in Holland and died in 1957. He came to Louisiana in 1895 and subsequently served the Catholics of Cameron, Abbeville, Lafayette, and Washington. In the preface Rosalind Foley states "Father Teurlings is a legend in the places where he lived. Favorite stories about him abound, invariably told with animation and often with a chuckle. They would fill a much thicker volume than this." He was the driving force behind the building of churches, church schools, a chapel, and St. John's Cathedral in Lafayette. He was an extraordinary man who labored in an unusual locale. His first parish was one hundred and twenty miles of coastal lowlands (Cameron). "There was challenge in the rugged life of the marshland, the primitive challenge of man against nature," he wrote. "Most of all, there was challenge in winning the friendship and ultimately the souls of people so different from any I had ever known before." Though not strictly a genealogical book, this volume is enjoyable reading and mentions many of the people with whom Father Teurlings was acquainted during his lifetime in Louisiana. (Many thanks to Father Donald Hebert for his donation of this book to our Society Library.)

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## SOME EARLY SOUTHWEST LOUISIANA TOWNS AND SETTLEMENTS

There are many small towns and settlements in Southwest Louisiana that are unheard of today or abandoned, but have played a role in the development of Southwest Louisiana. Among these are:

INDIAN BLUFF is on the east side of the Calcasieu River where Swain's Bayou starts across the Sabine River.

JONES' BLUFF is a piece of high ground on the east side of the river just south of the Jefferson Davis parish line. It is 68 miles from the Gulf of Mexico, and was formerly important as a shipping center.

THE KAOUGH PLACE, at the north end of Moss Lake, named for Mrs. Sarah Ann Kaough, was settled about 1848 and named for the principal land owner.

KEARNEY was a tiny station on the Kansas City Southern Railroad near the Sabine River.

LUCAS, another station of the KCS line, southwest of DeQuincy, is where Edward Lucas began early oil prospecting.

LUNITA was a station of the KCS line where lumber activities were carried on.

MALLARD JUNCTION was a point where the Lake Arthur branch of the SP railroad joins the main branch, a few miles east of Lake Charles, and named for Charles Mallard, a railroad official.


SITTING PLACE, a settlement on the left bank of the Calcasieu, is 2 miles southwest of Hecker. It was established in 1855 and had a mill and a store. The purchase of the land and mill by Daniel Goos in 1863 was his entry into local affairs. The place got its name from the builders of the mill.

WHITE OAKS, a point on the east bank of the Calcasieu a short distance above Marion, was named for the groves of white oak trees which were there.

We were able to research original church books (in French, of course), dating back to the early 1700's. The early settlers in Montreal were known as French Canadians, not Acadians. I will be glad to share my information with any person who may be interested.



## THE TRAGEDY OF L'ILLE DENIERE (LAST ISLAND)

(Residents of the Gulf Coast are well aware of the danger and recent destruction of property and loss of lives by hurricanes. In the last century, however, one such tragedy is still recalled when the subject of hurricanes is brought up. Without modern means of communication and weather reporting, full details and exact identification of those lost will never be known. Early newspaper files and available books and articles on the subject were used as references in the following article, as was Lafacadio Hearn's novel "Chita; A Memory of Last Island".)

I'Ille Derniere (Last Island) was located off the coast of Terreboone Parish near the mouth of Bayou LaFourche in the Gulf of Mexico. It was about twenty-five miles long and a mile wide. The warm golden sands of its beaches and the tropical waters surrounding it made the island a popular summer vacationing spot for the elite of Louisiana.

The small fishing village on the island became a tourist resort in the 1840's when vacationers from the prominent families of the Teche country, from Assumption and LaFourche Parishes, from Opelousas, New Orleans and other places along the Mississippi River made it their summer playgound. An advertisement in 1847 in the Franklin "Planter's Banner" stated that "The steamboat Meteor No. 3, Captain Faussett, planned to leave Franklin Saturday July 13 for Last Island, offereing a chance to the people to enjoy sea bathing and fishing." The boat was to remain at the island for six days. A cotillion band was also scheduled for the trip.

The island was remote and could only be reached by boat, so steamships made regular runs. The trip to the island was scenic and festive. Food served on the steamers was a treat, plentiful and varied. According to an advertisement, the "Meteor" could provide berthsfor sixty persons, but could accomodate eighty without crowding. The arrival of the steamboat was a happy occassion, as it brought supplies, letters and friends from the mainland.

Many families owned summer homes or cottages at L'Ille Derniere, among them the former governor of Louisiana Paul Octave Hebert. Other tourists boarded with year-round residents, stayed at Muggah's Hotel or visited friends and family. One account says that there was a magnificient Trade Winds Hotel on the island, but his hotel was never actually built.

Estimates on the number of summer cottages on L'Ille Derniere range from as few as twenty-five to as many as one hundred, but the exact number is not known. Businesses on the island included a large timbered hotel and billiard parlor run by the Muggah brothers, and a store.

August was the peak month for vacationers, and summer guests swelled the population of the tiny island to four or five hundred. Some were summer residents, while others came for a week or two to enjoy the sand and surf and the other festivities of the popular resort. Some came to visit friends or family. Some came to find relief from the oppressive heat of Louisiana's hottest month, while others came to escape a possible yellow fever epidemic, which was always a danger during the heat of summer. The exact number of visitors and their servants on the island was never known.

On Saturday, August 9 the weather was typically hot and muggy. The steamer "Southern Star" was overdue on her regular run from Bayou Boeuf. When she failed to arrive that night, it was thought that she had run into bad weather, sought a safe mooring in the dark and would arrive in the morning hours.

Sunday, August 10 was a gloomy, grey and rainy day. Breakers were large enough to discourage even the strongest swimmer. A summer squall had descended upon the vacationers' paradise, but it was quite common for a squall to blow in out of the Gulf. No one was alarmed, although there was no way off the island until the "Star" arrived. The buildings were solidly built and had weathered other storms, and the hotel was strong enough to withstand "a blow anything short of a tornado". Old timers and experienced seamen had not predicted a storm, so there was no need to worry.

By mid-morning, much to the delight of the islanders, the "Star" arrived. Captain Abraham Smith, who cammanded the vessel, fought his way to the island through the ever increasing wind and the churning waters of Caillou Bay. He won his race with the storm, but suddenly the wind veered and forced the "Star" aground near the hotel. Now there was no chance of leaving the island until the storm subsided.

As the afternoon wore on, the force of the wind increased, and the squall became a gale. All over the island preparations were made for the coming storm. Loose items were lashed down and animals were put into shelters. Dark clouds whirled above, rain came down in torrents and the wind-driven sand and spray stung faces and eyes, making it almost impossible to see. By two o'clock the rising waters of Calliou Bay to the north and the turbulent waters from the Gulf to the south had encroached on the island, covering more than half of it. The high point of the coastal island was only five feet above sea level. All but the most optimistic of the vacationers had started to worry.

By late afternoon the wind had reached hurricane force and water covered the entire island. Heavy waves pounded the beaches and the wind had blown down fences, ripped off roofs, uprooted trees, and blown down shacks and even a few cottages. Wind-driven projectiles. fenceposts, shingles from roofs, branches of trees. were deadly and capable of stunning, injuring or even of decapitating a person in their path.

By evening, although there had been some damage, some injuries and perhaps

even a few deaths, the winds became calmer and it seemed that the worst was over. Several accounts mention an eerie sunset, a scarlet sun seen through a gap in the clouds, setting in a greenish sky. This was probably the eye of the hurricane that was passing over L'Ille Derniere. The island was in the north-east quadrant of the storm, the most destructive part of a hurricane.

Dancing in the hotel ballroom had been almost nightly entertertainment and this night was no exception. The large galleried hotel was thought by many to be stronger and more apt to survive a storm than their summer homes, so for security as well as for company, the islanders had flocked to the hotel. Most were now sure that the storm was over, so there was a reason to celebrate. The music and merriment went on and plans were made for a tomorrow that many of them would never see.

Suddenly the wind rose from the east-southeast, more intense than it had been before. The sea sent huge waves crashing into the island and the waters rose to new heights. Fear soon turned into panic as water poured all over the dance floor. While cottages on the island were blown down or washed out to sea, the hotel stood, moaning and creaking. Then there was a loud sound like unbroken thunder. The tornado struck! The hotel disintegrated in the giant waves! The island which had been the favorite watering spot for all the wealth and beauty of the Creole parishes broke apart under the power of the wind-driven sea.

Screams rose over the sound of the wind. Panic reigned! Survivors clung to anything that would float...doors, window frames, furniture, trees. The wreckage of the hotel and houses was swept out to sea. The darkness of the night was punctuated by jagged streaks of lightning and by screams of terror from the living...some crying for help, others calling for their loved ones. In the space of five minutes it was estimated that at least two hundred people died on the island.

The "Star" fought for her life, buffeted by the wind and rain, and battered by the swirling waters and tremendous waves. Captain Smith had stripped the "Star" of her smokestacks, pilothouse and cabins, leaving only her bare hull to better withstand the fury of the storm. Captain Smith and his crew heroically saved many of those who were near enough to reach the beached boat. Many of the survivors were injured; all were dazed and shocked.

Each person, survivor or victim, went through his own nightmare of terror. Concern for family was added to personal fear. As in every crisis, the best and the worst in mankind was brought out. Acts of heroism and self-sacrifice were almost commonplace, but cowardice and greed also reared their ugly heads. Tales of the survivors were varied, and accounts of miraculous escapes from death filled the newspapers many days after the "over-flowing" of Last Island.

About half of the people on the ill-fated island lost their lives that night. Some were drowned; some were swept out to sea or into the coastal marshes and swamps to the south. Some were half-buried in the sand. Some of the bodies were found on shell banks or chenieres; some were found hung on bushes or branches; some were floating in the surf. Some of the bodies were not able to be indentified. Some vanished completely, never to be seen again.

Ladies were prime victims for drownings, burdened as they were by the voluminous skirts and petticoats of the era. The weight of this mass of wet material dragged down even the strongest swimmer.

At sea the hurricane ravaged the shipping lanes. The death toll at sea may have been as great as that of L'Ille Derniere. The steamship "Nautillus" with Captain John C. Thompson in command, enroute from Galveston to New Orleans, was carrying the U. S. mail and thirty passengers. It was in the path of the

of the storm and was sunk. The "Samuel Marsden" bound from Liverpool to New Orleans with thirty-three passengers was lost, with only two crewmen surviving. The "Manilla" from France, bound for New Orleans, was lost with ten of her crew. The schooner "Ellen" commanded by Captain Stewart, whose wife and family were on board, was lost off the coast of Houma. Many other ships, towboats, flatboats and sailing vessels were damaged or destroyed, with partial or total loss of crew and cargoes. The beaches of the Louisiana coast were awash with kegs of wine and brandy, bolts of expensive material, timber and other valuable salvage for the "wreckers".

On L'Ille Derniere the water fell as rapidly as it had risen, and in the wake of the hurricane came the vultures, both winged and in human form, hunting whatever plunder that the storm had brought their way. Bands of "wreckers" inhabited the bayous and swamps along the coast and preyed on shipwrecks and other calamities. These scavengers were the first at the scene of the disaster at L'Ille Derniere. They found fine leather trunks with expensive clothing, money and jewels, casks of wine, furniture and all sorts of belongings of the wealthy victims of the catastrophe. In their greed the looters often mutilated the bodies in order to obtain valuables worn by the dead. The looters even tried to board the "Star", but were prevented from doing so by Captain Smith and his crew.

Some accounts state that the only house remaining on the island was that of C. Bethel. The stables of Michael Schlatre also survived the storm, and one of Mr. Mille's servants rode out the tempest there. Other reports state that no house remained standing on the island. Of all the animals that had been on the island, only one cow remained alive. She was slaughtered to provide the only food that the survivors had. There was no fresh water left on the island after the storm.

Survivors, dazed and injured, picked themselves up and started the search for friends and family. Clothes had been tattered and torn by the strom, and exposure to the intense sunlight and heat coupled with thirst and hunger, compounded their misery. Grief and isolation from the rest of the world drove some of the survivors into deep depression.

During the next few days some persons who were thought to have died in the storm made their way back to the island. Accounts of their trials and escape from death competed with grim tales of the deaths of loved ones.

Newspapers were full of reports of the storm's violence. Crops were ruined; animals drowned; buildings blown down; ships wrecked; lives lost. It was one of the worst storms to strike the coast of Louisiana in recorded history. It was not until August 12 that reports of the tragedy of L'Ille Derniere reached New Orleans, and in the confusion accounts of the victims and survivors were often inaccurate, unreliable and difficult to evaluate.

The steamboats "Major Aubrey" and the "Archer" were sent to the relief of L'Ille Derniere. There were about one hundred people aboard the beached "Star" and about that many more who were on what remained of the island.

A group of men from Franklin and the surrounding areas organized to search the swamps and bayous south of the island for possible survivors, and to find and identify the bodies for burial. A group of vigilantes was formed to prevent further looting and to track down and punish those guilty of desecrating the dead. Tales from these men are interesting.

As far as can be proven from the old accounts and records, we have listed both survivors and victims of the storm of August 10, 1856 which ravaged Last Island. It is both possible and probable that whole families with their guests and servants were swept out to sea and never reported among the missing. Slavery existed at that time, and often the names of the slaves were not known to any

but the family they served, so it is thought that the number of victims is actually more than shown here.

The death toll would have probably been much higher except for the fact that some families had already left the island because of an unusual invasion of gnats and mosquitos.

Today there is no sign of the fashionable Gulf resort island. Last Island exists only as a chain of barrier islands that provide protection to the wetlands futher inland. These islands are often called by the more appropriate French plural, Iles Dernier.

This tragedy is a testimony to the awesome power of the sea.

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#### FROM OUR EXCHANGE PROGRAM

"The Newsletter" of the Lincoln-Lancaster, Nebraksa Genealogical Society, Vol. 9, No. 6 reports that 11 tons of ship manifests are now being computer-indexed. These records will include about 35 million immigrants to the U. S. from 1820-1924 at ports from Boston to New Orleans. It is estimated that over 100 million Americans are descendants of these immigrants.

In 1978 the National Archives planned to dispose of these records to make room for other records. Fortunately, enough protest resulted in the project to preserve and index these records.

#### ACADIAN BICENTENNIAL

This year descendants of the exiled Acadians who were sent to France before they were transported to south Louisiana are celebrating the bicentennial of that "Acadian Odyssey".

The government of Charles III of Spain welcomed the Acadians who came as early as 1755, as well as those who joined them three decades later in the "Great Migration" of 1785.

These "85ers" suffered many hardships and humiliations in addition to the loss of their homeland. One goup of about 1500 who landed in Virginia, were expelled and sent to England where they were treated as prisoners of war. After seven years of misery, they were sent to France. A second group of 2000 were sent directly to France, but 1300 died in shipwrecks. The rest were not accepted by France and were sent to England. A third group escaped from various parts of the American colonies and went to France in 1763 after the Treaty of Paris.

The French government made several attempts to settle the exiled Acadians in the islands of St. Pierre, Miquelon, Sierra Morena and the Faulklands, but these attempts failed.

In Nantes, France Peyroux de la Coudrenniere, a wealthy druggist, and Oliver Terrio, an Acadian shoemaker, persuaded the Acadians to go to Louisiana to join their exiled countrymen. The Spanish government arranged for seven frigates to transport about 1600 of the Acadians to Louisiana. The first ship "Le Bon Papa" set sail for Louisiana with about 125 aboard on May 10, 1785, and the last ship arrived on December 12, 1785.

The arrival of these exiles marked the end of the "Acadian Odyssey". They found a new home in Louisiana.

Celebrations throughout the state this year mark the arrival of this large group of Acadians two hundred years ago. The Acadians, called "Cajuns" in Louisiana, have contributed much to the unique culture and cuisine of our state.

The Acadian Odyssey Bicentennial Commission has announced the following events and dates in conjunction with the Bicentennial Celebration:

ARE THERE ANY "FULL-BLOODED" ACADIANS IN SOUTHWEST LOUISIANA?...If there are, the Acadian Odyssey Bicentennial Committee wants to identify them as part of the Bicentennial observance.

"Some genealogists have said that they doubt that any "full blooded" Acadians are to be found in our area", said Dr. Donald Millet, retired professor of history at McNeese State University, and Chairman of the Committee. A full-blooded Acadian would be one who is able to trace all of his or her ancestral lines back to the families listed in 1714 census in Nova Scotia, Dr. Millet explained.

It is estimated that descendants of the Acadians in South Louisiana now number more than 500,000. The Committee would like to locate any descendants of those Acadians now living in the civil parishes of Calcasieu, Cameron, Jeff Davis, Allen and Beauregard civil parishes who can trace all of their ancestral lines back to Nova Scotia.

"If we can identify any of these, and they have the genealogical data supporting their claim, we will honor them during our observance of the 200th anniversary of the arrival of the seven ships of Acadians," Dr. Millet explained.

Those who are all-Acadian, or who know of such persons, should notify the committee, Dr. Millet said. He announced that a sub-committee made up of Harvey Adams and Mrs. Michael Sedotal would review the genealogical data sub-mitted. They are invited to get in touch with Adams, at 1301 Westmoreland, Lake Charles, LA 70605, not later than Oct. 1.

Other events other than those listed are planned for Southwest Louisiana, including an all-day Acadian music festival and dance, to be held in October, and a display of Acadian artifacts in which museums and libraries of the area will be invited to plan displays.

"This is something for which we want the widest possible participation," Millet said. "You don't have to be Acadian or to speak French to join with us. We want everyone to participate, because the Acadian Odyssey was an event that affected our entire state and the effects are with us still today."

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#### BOOK REVIEW

A GUIDE TO PRINTED SOURCES FOR GENEALOGICAL AND HISTORICAL RESEARCH IN THE LOUISIANA PARISHES, compiled by Yvette Guillot Boling, CG. 4724 Ashbury Drive, Jefferson, LA 70121. 8½ x 11, soft cover, 99 pages, \$10.00 plus \$1.00 postage & handling; may be ordered from the author. The author states that "the work is intended as a finding-aid for those who want to locate indices to Louisiana church and civil records, transcriptions of censues, and similar material that has appeared in print." Each parish is listed alphabetically with pertinent information about the parish (date of founding, etc.); and sources of printed records which have appeared in periodicals, including cemeteries, censuses, churches, civil records, history, newspapers, and schools. One of the sources listed is "Kinfolks". Printed census sources for the State of Louisiana (1667-1840), plus church records, deaths, civil records, and history are also included. Appendices contain miscellaneous research tools, such as a list of some New Orleans Archiocese churches and addresses; maps showing the development of the parishes of Louisiana and boundaries of the Catholic dioceses. This book is very easy to use and a useful tool for simplifying Louisiana genealogical research. Thanks go to Yvette Boling for her tremendous contribution!

#### RESEARCHING AT LDS LIBRARIES, contributed by Anna Hayes

I had read many times about the sources available at the Genealogical Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Salt Lake City. Always, the suggestion is, "check there to save time and money". Since financially and geographically I knew going to Salt Lake City was out of the question for me, I decided to go to a branch library in Lafayette, La. to see how I could use their resources through the branch.

In November of 1984 I made my first visit. The volunteer in charge was very helpful and patient with me as a first-timer. I was able to do the following:

- 1. Check microfiche of the IGI (International Genealogical Index) for my lost ancestor (also known as CFI Computer File Index). It is an index to names submitted for processing in LDS temples from 1970 to present. Many names come from historical records and sources are well identified. It contains over 73 million names. If there is an entry for your ancestor a copy of the original can be ordered for 15¢ per page (\$1.00 minimum).
- 2. Check microfiche of the index to the Accelerated Indexing System (AIS). It is divided into nine sets or nine searches, which cover nine time periods from 1790 to 1906. Sources are mainly federal censuses, but also include special censuses, tax lists, military lists, church records, land records and others.
- 3. Check the microfiche of the FR (Family Registry), arranged alphabetically by surname, then by given name. Purpose of the FR is to coordinate research dealing with the same person. Anyone can list their lost ancestor with the FR plus pertinent information. This is done in hopes of hearing from someone who has connection with that ancestor. There is no charge for this service.
- 4. Check a book which lists the microfilm holdings of the LDS Library arranged by country, state/region/department. The first roll is general in nature but assists in obtaining exact information and roll number for a precise place; cost is \$2.50/roll.

The film I ordered took 10 weeks to arrive in Lafayette and was available for my use for two weeks, and 50¢ for an additional week or \$1.00 for six months. In February of 1985 I made my second trip to Lafayette. I did the following:

- 1. Viewed the film I ordered on my first trip.
- 2. Obtained catalog numbers of 5 more rolls of microfilm which contained information dealing with the precise place I needed. The listings were by area and then city name. A brief explanation of what is contained on each roll was included. For example, one of my rolls read, "baptisms, marriages and deaths as obtained from the church registers of St. Sauveur, Diocese of Blois, Loir-et-Cher, France, 1568-1791". Listings also tell you if the rolls are handwritten and indexed. I ordered the five rolls mentioned above.

In five weeks my film was in; I was notified by mail and told dates rolls had to be returned. So in March I made my third trip to Lafayette. My search of the rolls proved I was searching the wrong department of France, but I do not feel that my efforts were wasted because I have gained a small working knowledge of how to use the LDS Library's vast collection and the time and money involved in using it.

#### FROM OUR EXCHANGE PROGRAM

If you are interested in Dutch research read "Genealogical Research in the Netherlands" by Neeltje M. (Nell) van der Wekken in Gems of Genealogy", Vol. XI. No. 2 from Green Bay, Wisconsin. The article is reprinted from the "International Genealogy Consumer Report", and gives information on Civil and Church records, as well as other types of records such as Guild records (1240-1798), Citizens Books (1240-1811), Land Registers (1200-present), Tax Rolls (1240present), Notorial records (1530-present, Impost Taxes (taxes on burials and marriages), etc.

"Treasure State Lines", Great Fall, Montana, Vol. 10, No. 2 has an interesting article entitled "Genealogy...by the numbers??". Using a five generation chart and simple arithmetic, one can determine to what extent each ancestor is responsible for his or her genetic makeup. From the total of thirty ancestors listed on the chart, each one represents 3.3% of the credit for your characteristics. The suprise in this approach comes from the fact that each parent is only 3.3% responsible for their children....Since each successive generation serves only as a "pipeline" for transferring genetic traits to later generations, and the further back one works on a pedigree chart the greater number of individual involved, the cumulative responsibility for our genetic makeup increases correspondingly. By this rationale, one eventually concludes that our parents had practically nothing to our own personal traits compared to all other ancestors combined.... do with
