

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WMJ, 27 July 1878, p. 1, c. 3
REPUBLIC-A sad accident occurred here on Wednesday which resulted in the death of two men and injured another. Fritz BAUMGARDNER, Henry WILMOT and William ANDREWS were working together in No. 2 pit, when a mass of rock fell from the hanging wall and instantly killed BAUMGARTNER and WILMOT and seriously injured ANDREWS. BAUMGARDNER, who leaves an invalid wife and four children, was buried today (Thursday), at Clarksburg and WILMOT was buried here.

MICHIGAMME BREVITIES-The remains of Mrs. BAUMGARDNER, who died
Thursday last, were interred in the Michigamme Cemetery Sunday,
having been kept until that time to allow of her son, who was in
Texas at the time of her death, attending the funeral. The
funeral was one of the largest held here in some time.

The following death's, which occured at Ely Township/Clarksburg, were registered with the Marquette County Clerk. Due to the loss of the Ely Township records by fire, it is unknown whether these burials took place in the Clarksburg Cemetery or not. Only the deaths for the years of 1872, 1873, 1874, and 1875 have been extracted because it appears that most of the burials took place during that time frame.

ITALIAN HISTORY



After centuries of foreign domination, Italy finally became a free state in 1866. Italy had the potential to become a powerful nation because of it's good climate, industrious people, diversified agriculture, prosperous silk production, some mineral wealth and a good merchant sailing fleet. One thing lacking in this new nation however was the capital needed to compete with other industrial countries. In 1870 the price of grain fell, a customs tariff war began with France, and a blight devastated the vineyards and silk cocoons. The Italian countryside soon became impoverished.

Thus between 1880 and 1920, more than 4 million Italians immigrated to America, the largest wave of immigrants from any particular country during a 40 year period. It is estimated however, that from 30 to 50% eventually returned to Italy, dissatisfied with life in America.

Italians entered America mainly at the ports of New York City, Baltimore, and Boston. They settled in major northern and western cities and in remote mining areas such as Upper Michigan and Northern Minnesota.



Italian Settlement Patterns

By 1900, Upper Michigan boasted 74% of the state's Italian populations with the main concentrations in Houghton, Dickinson, Iron and Marquette Counties. The major settlements of

Italians in Marquette County were in Gwinn, Austin, Princeton, Negaunee and Ishpeming.

Generally the Italians in most towns except Ishpeming, came from Northern Italy: Piedmont;

Lombardy; Venetia. Those in Ishpeming emigrated from Southern Italy: Calabria; Sicily.

The earliest Italian pioneers were Philip and Josephine Marchetti (Marketty) who arrived in Negaunee in 1864. Marchetti joined with Batista Barasa to form the Barasa Iron Mining Company. Other early Italian families were the D'Angelo, Borgi, Bastedo, Mazona, Dighera, Tasson, Chiabetto, Valenti and Marietti families.

In 1910, over 80% of the Italians in the county were employed as iron ore miners and resided in the above mining communities. Other occupations they held were railroad workers, saloonkeepers, and grocery or bakery owners. In the 1900 census over half the Italian families listed had boarders, often single men from their home town in Italy. This occupation kept women and children busy with household chores and supplimented the family's income.

Many Italian organizations were formed to provide accident, sickness, and death benefits to members. For a 50¢ monthly fee, members could receive \$100-200 for funeral expenses. Social groups planned ethnic events such as dances, bocci ball tournaments, parades and celebrations of the 4th of July and Columbus Day. Over 125 Italian organizations formed in Upper Michigan. Today the Paisano Club and the St. Rocco Society promote Italian heritage to third and fourth generation Italians.

* Helpful Hints for Census Searches:

Census enumerators were instructed to take the census "as of" the census date, regardless of the visit date. Babies born after the "date" were not included, but deaths were. Although not all enumerators applied this rule you should know and heed it when researching.

Sometimes the early census was taken over a year after the "as of" date. Other times the census was begun much earlier than the "as of" date. This would account for the difference in ages from one census to the next, i.e. 11, 19, 30, etc.



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

POLL TAX

What is A Poll Tax?

A poll tax, or head tax is a uniform tax levied against each adult person in a community. The poll tax is the same regardless of each person's income or property.

Poll taxes were originally levied on conquered people by the ancient Greeks and Romans. In England a poll tax was first imposed in 1377 and re-imposed at intervals until 1678. In the 17th century, this tax was an important source of

revenue for financing wars. In medieval times, taxes were paid not in money, but in the form of labor or other payments, such as work on local roads or supplies of grain or other farm produce.

Poll taxes have been criticized as an unfair burden on the poor. In the United States, poll taxes were levied infrequently until after the Civil War. They were then adopted by the southern states as a way of circumventing the 15th Amendment to the Constitution, which guaranteed former slaves the right to vote. Poor people without the means to pay the tax were refused voting rights. Not until 1964 were poll taxes prohibited.

Poll Tax Lists As A Genealogical Tool

Tax records are an important source of genealogical information and are usually located in the Treasurer's office or the Register of Deeds office in each county. Tax records can be used to locate an ancestor in a community. When many census schedules were lost, they were replaced by poll tax and property tax lists.

Adult males between the ages of 21 and 50 were taxed annually. However, poll tax lists are not successful in locating some ancestors such as women, children, slaves, men older than 50, paupers, ministers, justices of the peace, military officers and tax assessors.

Poll tax lists arrange the names in initial order. In other words, the surnames beginning with "A" are together, but not alphabetical. By examining several years of poll tax lists or property assessment lists, one can find an ancestor in a community, often in years between the federal censuses.

Pages 7-10 are published Marquette City Poll Tax lists from the <u>Weekly Mining Journal</u>, June 1876.

The following is an excerpt from the 1891 Marquette City Charter, explaining poll taxes:

Section 9. The common council shall have power to assess and collect from every male inhabitant of said city over the age of twenty-one years and under the age of fifty years (except paupers, idiots, lunatics and persons otherwise exempted by law), an annual capitation, or poll-tax, not exceeding one dollar, and they may provide by their by-laws for the collection of same; provided that any person assessed for a poll-tax may pay the same by one day's labor upon the streets, under the direction of the street commissioner, who shall give to each person so assessed and electing to pay the same in labor, notice of the time and place, when and where such labor will be required, and the money raised by such poll-tax or labor in lieu thereof, shall be expended or performed under the direction of the common council.

U.S. MILITARY RECORDS

I. General Information

Military records of the US many not provide a solution to every genealogical problem, but they often contain excellent supplemental pedigree information.

Records relating to conflicts prior to the Revolutionary War are mainly historical accounts and contain little genealogical data. Records created since the Revolution often contain facts relating to birth, marriage, death, parentage, migration as well as other important genealogical events.

Military records of major genealogical importance consist mainly of service and pension files. Service files contain documents relating to events which affect personnel during their tour of duty; from enlistment or induction to separation or discharge. Pension files often include more genealogical information than service files and relate to the individual after he was released from service.

With the exception of a few record groups which were destroyed in 1800 and 1812-15, most service and pension files have been preserved. Most records in existence which related to early wars, and in peacetime during the same periods, are in the National Archives in Washington, D.C. Most Confederate veteran's records are not in the National Archives but are mainly located in their respective states. A majority of existing records relating to World War I have been centralized at a Federal Records Center in East Point, GA. Records relating to pesonnel who served during World War II and in later conflicts have been centralized at a Federal Records Center in St Louis, Missouri. Personnel currently in the service, whether on active duty or in the Reserves, usually are of record in Headquarters Unit of their parent organization. Duplicate and supplemental records relating to service personnel who have served since the beginning of World War II may also be found in regional offices of the Veterans Administration.

II. Revolutionary War Records

Service files relating to the Revolution were destroyed when the British burned Washington during the War of 1812.

Pension records relating to service in the Revolutionary War were created under various Congressional acts beginning in 1776 and continuing to the 20th century. The burden to provide the actual bernefits rested first with the states and applied mainly to officers. Important pensions acts in 1818, 1828, and 1832 liberalized pension requirements; allowing the enlisted man, his widow, and his orphans certain benefits. Under acts beginning in 1776 and continuing to 1855, "Bounty Lands" were granted to veterans of U.S. service or of State Militia.

Documents relating to a particular soldier, his widow, or to his children, have been combined in a single packet or file in the National Archives and are available to the genealogist. Xerox or microfilm copies of existing documents can be obtained from the National Archives at a reasonable cost. The files have also been microfilmed and are available through the LDS Genealogical Society in Salt Lake City. The microfilmed files are alphabetically arranged by the name of the soldier and a published index also exists.

III. American Loyalists Records and Regular Army Records.

After the peace treaty of 1783, both the U.S. and Great Britain provided means whereby "Loyalists" could be compensated for property losses and records pertaining to these claims have been preserved. Microfilmed copies of "American Loyalist's" Claims, Series "I" are in the Genealogical Society in Salt Lake City and are indexed on microfilm GS #62,010. Several volumes of published material relating to Loyalists can also be found at the Society in Salt Lake City.

The Regular Army also known as "The United States Army" was created as a permanent establishment in 1789 and records relating to its personnel have been preserved. Records of both officers and enlisted men are reflected in registers of enlistment which were prepared from various original documents created during the acutal period of service. Registers are in the National Archives arranged in two major groups; those for the period 1789-1821-1912.

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IV. Pension Files of other Early Wars

The "Old Wars" series of pension application files relate to claims for service rendered between the end of the Revolution (11 April 1782) and the beginning of the Civil War (4 March 1861). The files are currently in the National Archives. An alphabetical name index has been reproduced on seven rolls of microfilm and is available at Salt Lake City and Brigham Young University.

The War of 1812 Pension Records are also in the National Archives. The records related to service between 1812 and 1815 and are similar to those of the Revolutionary War. The face side of each jacket or envelope has been reproduced on 102 rolls of microfilm.

Indian Wars Pension Records and Mexican War Pension Records are also in the National Archives. Indians War Pension Records related to service between 1817 and 1898 and are indexed on 12 rolls of microfilm,. Mexican War Pension records related to service between 1846-48 and are indexed also.

V. Civil War Records

Service and pension files relating to Union forces are in the National Archives and are well indexed.

Service and Pension files relating to Confederate forces are in their respective states though "A Consolidated Index to Confederate Veteran's Compiled Military Service Records" has been created.

Conscription is the compulsory enlistment of persons to serve in the armed forces. Also known as the draft, conscription began in the United States as a result of the Conscription Act of March 3, 1863, during the War Between the States, or Civil War. If you know the state and county where your ancestor lived in 1863, you can look up the congressional district in the "Congressional Directory for the Second Session of the Thirty-Eighth Congress of the United States of America" published by the U.S. House of Representatives. Once you know the congressional district, you can request that the National Archives staff search for the registration file for your ancestor.

There were two types of records produced as a result of the Conscription Act of March 3, 1863: consolidated lists and descriptive rolls. The consolidated lists provide the person's name, birth date, state or country of birth, place of residence, occupation, and marital status as of July 1, 1863. The descriptive rolls add a physical description and a place or birth to the information found on the consolidated list. These records are all maintained in the Provost Marshall General's Bureau.

The conscription and service records for the Civil War are in the process of being transcribed in a project sponsored by the National Parks Service.

For men born from 1872 to 1900 and who were drafted for WWI, microfilm of their draft registration cards is located in the National Archives.

Wisconsin Vital Records

As of March 1, 1997, it will be unlawful in Wisconsin to make copies of birth, marriage and death records before 1907 from microfilm at any genealogy research place except the Courthouse where there will be a charge of \$7.50 per copy. There will be a \$10,000.00 fine for those who make illegal copies.





CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS OF MICHIGAN' SUPPER PENINSULA TO BE SPECIALLY REMEMBERED

Of the 90,000 Michigan men who went to war between 1861 and 1865, 1,209 were proud residents of the Upper Peninsula. Most of these men joined volunteer infantry and cavalry regiments that were organized in Michigan. Some would also serve with Wisconsin volunteer units. Those who survived and returned home, were joined by hundreds of other Civil War Veterans, drawn to the area by the expanding copper, iron and lumber industries.

. Several veterans' groups were formed after the American Civil War, but the organization that is best remember today, was known as the GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC (G.A.R.). From its beginning in 1866, the G.A.R. became the largest and most influential of the fraternal and patriotic Orders formed by Civil War veterans. It should be noted that the observance of MEMORIAL DAY, our nation's most honorable tribute to the memory · of American Servicemen, was created by the G.A.R. Originally designated as "DECORATION DAY," the tradition began on May 30, 1868.

Local Posts of the G.A.R. were formed in communities of all states whose volunteer regiments served the Union - and in areas of the country where Union Civil War veterans resettled after the war. Seventeen such Posts were organized across the Upper Peninsula.

As membership was granted only to men who honorably served the Union during the Civil War, the G.A.R. was destined for extinction. The organization disappeared from the Upper Peninsula with the death of its last surviving member, James F. Lyon, in 1946.

Long before the demise of the G.A.R., its leadership supported the efforts of some of its members to establish a separate organization that would carry on the G.A.R.'s traditions as a "permanent and perpetual organization, composed solely of the sons of deceased or honorably discharged soldiers, sailors, and marines who served the Union and descending in due time to their male descendants." Local chapters of such an organization began to appear in 1878. The first national session of THE SONS OF VETERANS, U.S.A. was held in 1882. In 1925 the name was changed to SONS OF UNION VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR (S.U.V.C.W.) To better identify the heritage. After its national encampment of 1931. the G.A.R. officially designated the S.U.V.C.W. as its legal heir. The S.U.V.C.W. was officially incorporated by an Act of Congress (Public Law 605) in 1954.

Today, efforts are under way to established a local chapter (Camp) of the S.U.V.C.W. in the Upper Peninsula! This is a proud, first step to honor the memory of all who served in the Civil War, all across Michigan's U.P. This first Camp has been authorized to open with the name and number of the original 266 Post No. G.A.R. Menominee.. It was named in honor of James F. Lyon's brother, Albert, who was mortally wounded at the Battle of Kenesaw Mountain, Georgia.

20 WAYS TO AVOID GRIEF IN YOUR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

The following suggestions and recommendations will be helpful to beginners and hopefully will prevent misfortune when learning how to do genealogical research. Many of these tips are "old hat" to experienced genealogists, but it is always worthwhile to remind ourselves of the basics of sound research.

- 1. ALWAYS note the source of any material you photocopy. If the information is from a library book, note the name, author, date, publisher and also the library where you found the book, or photocopy the title page. Occasionally you will find that you need to refer to the book again, or photocopy more information from it.
- 2. Make photocopies or carbon copies of ALL letters you write. This will save you from wondering which of your correspondents' questions you answered already, and which of your questions they have or haven't answered.
- 3. Don't procrastinate in responding to letters or messages you receive. If you don't have time to write a detailed reply, send your correspondent a quick reply or postcard to acknowledge receipt and give him/her a rough idea of when a reply will be forthcoming. Then be sure to write back as you've promised to.
- 4. When searching for relatives in records, don't pass over the entries that are almost but not quite right. For example, if you are searching for the marriage of John Brown and Mary Jones in 1850, make a note of the marriage of John Brown and Nancy Smith in 1847: this could be a previous marriage in which the wife died shortly after.
- 5. When writing to libraries or genealogical/historical societies in your areas of interest, ask them for the names and addresses of out-of-print booksellers in the area. Write to the booksellers and ask if they have any old local histories or family histories pertaining to the area.
 - 6. Don't forget to make frequent backups of your computer disks.
- 7. Store backup copies of your computer disks and photocopies of your irreplaceable documents in your safety deposit box or someone else's home.
- 8. Remember that "if it's in print, it ain't necessarily fact." Information in recently published local and family histories is often based on that from older published works. If the older books are incorrect, the erroneous information is simply repeated and further disseminated.
- 9. The earlier the time period in which you are researching, the less consistent our ancestors were about the spelling of their surnames. Also, many of them were illiterate and could not tell a record keeper how their names should be spelled.
- 10. Family traditions of close connections to famous figures are usually false, but there may be a more obscure relationship involved. Perhaps the famous person spent a night at your ancestor's country estate instead of (as the legend goes) marrying into the family.
- 11. Try not to let your research get behind. Establish a filing system for your papers (using file folders or 3-ring binders) and file each page of notes, document, photocopy, etc. as you acquire it. There are few things more disheartening than contemplating a foot-high stack of unfiled papers, wondering if the birth certificate you desperately need to refer to is somewhere in it.

- 12. Double-check all dates to make sure they are possible, for example, a woman born in 1790 could not be a mother in 1800.
- 13. Be on the lookout for nicknames. A request for a birth record for Sadie White may be rejected if the name on file is Sarah White.
- 14. Beware of mail-order promotions offering personalized genealogies of your surname with titles such as "The Amazing Story of the BLANK Family" or "The BLANK Family New World Registry." These are usually little more than computer-assembled lists of names from telephone directories. Notify the Better Business Bureau and consumers' advocate agencies when you encounter these -- let's put these people out of business permanently!
- 15. Don't assume modern meanings for terms used to describe relationships. For example, in the 17th century a step-child was often called a "son-in-law" or daughter-in-law," and a "cousin" could refer to almost any relative except a sibling or child.
- 16. Remember that indexes to books rarely include the names of ALL persons mentioned in the book and, in addition, occasionally contain errors. If it appears that a book is likely to have valuable information, spend some time skimming its contents rather than returning it to the shelf after a quick glance at the index.
- 17. Be precise when making notes and especially when sharing information with others. Write dates using an unambiguous format: Americans interpret 5/6/1881 as 6 May 1881, but in many other countries it would be read as 5 June 1881. Always capitalize or underline surnames, some of which can be mistaken for given names, e.g., HENRY, HOWARD. Note place names in full, including parish or township, county, state or province, and country.
- 18. You will often encounter conflicting information and you will have to weigh it against other evidence to try to determine which is the most likely to be true. Periodically review and verify the conclusions you have reached concerning each of your ancestors' lives: this will help to prevent you from wasting time following blind alleys.
- 19. Place names and boundaries have changed constantly over the years. Always verify them in historical atlases or genealogical texts pertaining to the area. For example, the boundaries of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania have changed four times since it was first settled.
- 20. Whenever and wherever possible, advertise the surnames you are researching by submitting them to genealogical directories and surname lists published by genealogical societies that you belong to. This will put you in touch with others who are researching the same surnames, possibly for a much longer time. After all, the most rewarding genealogical research is that which no-one else has already done!
