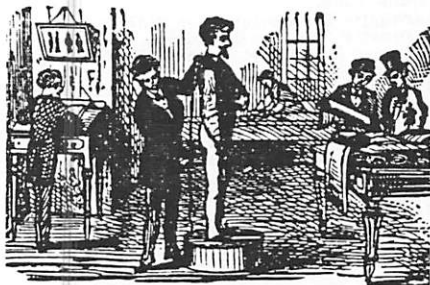

THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF MARQUETTE, MICH.

Organized Jan. 22, 1864. Charter No.390

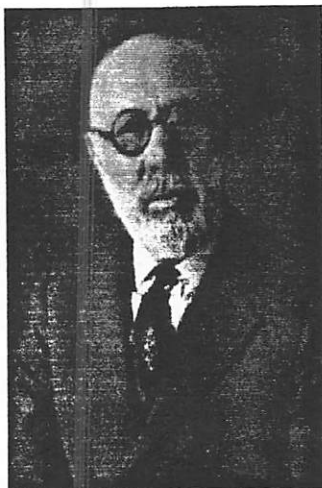
Paul and Amelia Jensine Christensen

Born in Denmark in 1852, Amelia came to the United States with her parents, Hans and Liane Jensen and settled in Marquette in 1870. She married Paul Christensen, who had also come from Denmark, on August 31, 1875. Paul was a handler of horses and teamster for the DSS and A Railroad Express.

The Christensens had nine children, four sons and five daughters. The sons were Leonard, Alfred, Paul and Hans. The daughters were Annie, Margaret, Nellie, Emily and Evangeline. All of them except Nellie resided in Marquette.

Amelia Christensen died December 8, 1920 and Paul died July 12, 1923. They are buried in the Park Cemetery.

Louis Getz Pioneer Merchant

Louis Getz, the son of Tevia Getz, emigrated to the United States from Russia, at the age of sixteen. He was a peddler in Houghton and Ontonagon Counties in the 1870's. He went from community to community and farm to farm selling clothes and other items, such as cooking items, sewing supplies, linens, and other household goods. He bought the items in Chicago. He used a cart and horses to bring to the merchandise to the people.

In October of 1879 Mr. Getz and Mr. Maurice Paradise, a native of Poland, opened a retail clothing store in Michigamme, called Getz and Paradise.

In the mid 1880's Louis moved to Marquette, and rented a store front, from the Dwyer Brothers on the corner of Baraga and Front Street. He named the store the Bee Hive. The new store carried a large stock of dry goods and notions, ladies shoes and garments, men's and boys clothing and hats. He also sold fabrics that the women could use to make many of the items for their homes.

The Bee Hive quickly outgrew the Dwyer Building, and Louis moved the store to it's present location in the Adam's Block and renamed the store "Getz's". He originally rented one of the four store fronts in the building owned by Sidney Adams at 218 South Front Street. In 1902 he purchased the entire building from the Adams family.

Louis was a business man who could neither read nor write English. However, he possessed a keen mind and a thorough knowledge of his business. He was grateful for the opportunities that America had given him and had great pride in his U.S. citizenship. Louis filed an Declaration of Intention, to become a citizen of the United States, in Marquette on the 10th day of June in 1882, and became a naturalized citizen in May of 1888.

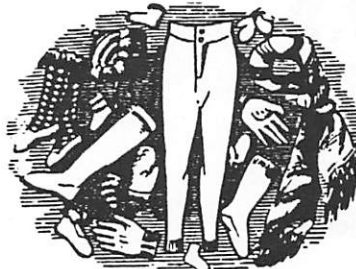
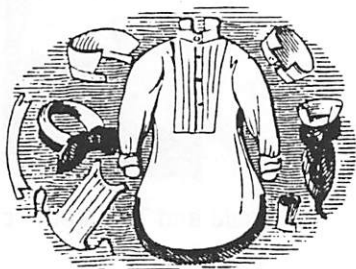

When Louis and his wife the former Paulina Gottliebson moved to Marquette, they were the parents of four children, George (1879), Jonas (1881), Freda (1883), Charlotte (1886). Louis and "Lena" as she was known also had three other children, Arthur (1889), Henry (1894) and Archie (1891). Paulina Getz, died after a short illness, leaving Louis with seven young children.

In 1905, Louis married Ethel Harris who was also a native of Russia. Louis and Ethel were the parents of two children, Lucile (1906) and Theodore Harold (1910).

Louis died in Marquette in 1935. Lucile and "Ted" took over the management of Getz's Store after the death of their father.

BECOMING AN AMERICAN

In the United States, the majority of citizens are foreign born or descended from foreign born ancestors. Since 1607, over 50 million immigrants have come to America from other countries. 1907 was the peak year of immigration, with over one million, two hundred eighty five thousand people entering the United States.

The process of becoming an American citizen took several years. Most immigrants became a citizen within 10 years of the time from when they were first eligible. An immigrant could declare his intent after residing in the United States for three years.

The Declaration of Intention or "First Papers" were kept at the local, state or federal courts prior to 1906. After 1906, copies of the papers were kept locally and also sent to the Immigration and Naturalization Services.

Declaration of Intention papers from 1852-1906 gave little biographical information. They included the name, country of origin, date and signature of applicant. From 1906-1970, the documents revealed the petition number, the name, age, occupation, description, birthplace, date, current address, port emigrated from, name of vessel, last foreign residence, name of leader renouncing allegiance from, port and date of arrival.

The example on page 14 for David Carlson is dated 1907 and reveals extensive biographical information.

After fulfilling additional residency requirements, a person could file Petition papers, also called "Second Papers" or "Final Papers", to the local court, provided "First Papers" were on file. Again, prior to 1906, little information was required. After 1906, the Petition papers included, petition number, name, current residence, occupation, birthplace, birth date, port of departure, date of departure, port of arrival and date, name of vessel, date of Declaration of Intention, the name of the leader renouncing allegiance from and the date of citizenship. After 1929, photographs were also included.

The Petition paper on page 15, for James Henry Pascoe, lists biographical information including witnesses who swore to his "good moral character".

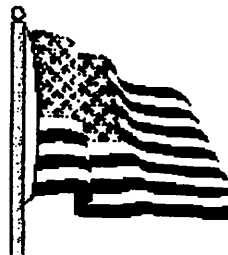
Certificates of Naturalization were issued to all who fulfilled the citizenship requirements. Naturalization papers usually only contained the name of the individual, the name of the country and the date of issue. Information on all court proceedings varied from court to court and state to state.

Prior to 1928, women and children automatically became citizens when their husband or father did, so early records list men only.

The 1900, 1910, and 1920 Federal Censuses list what year the adults in each household became citizens. That information gives clues to where the citizenship papers are filed on an ancestor, depending on the place of residence.

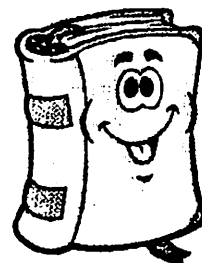

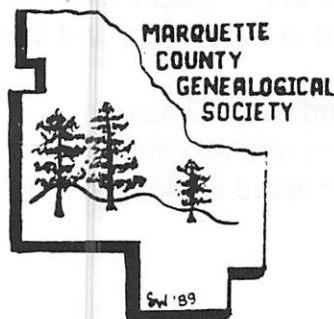

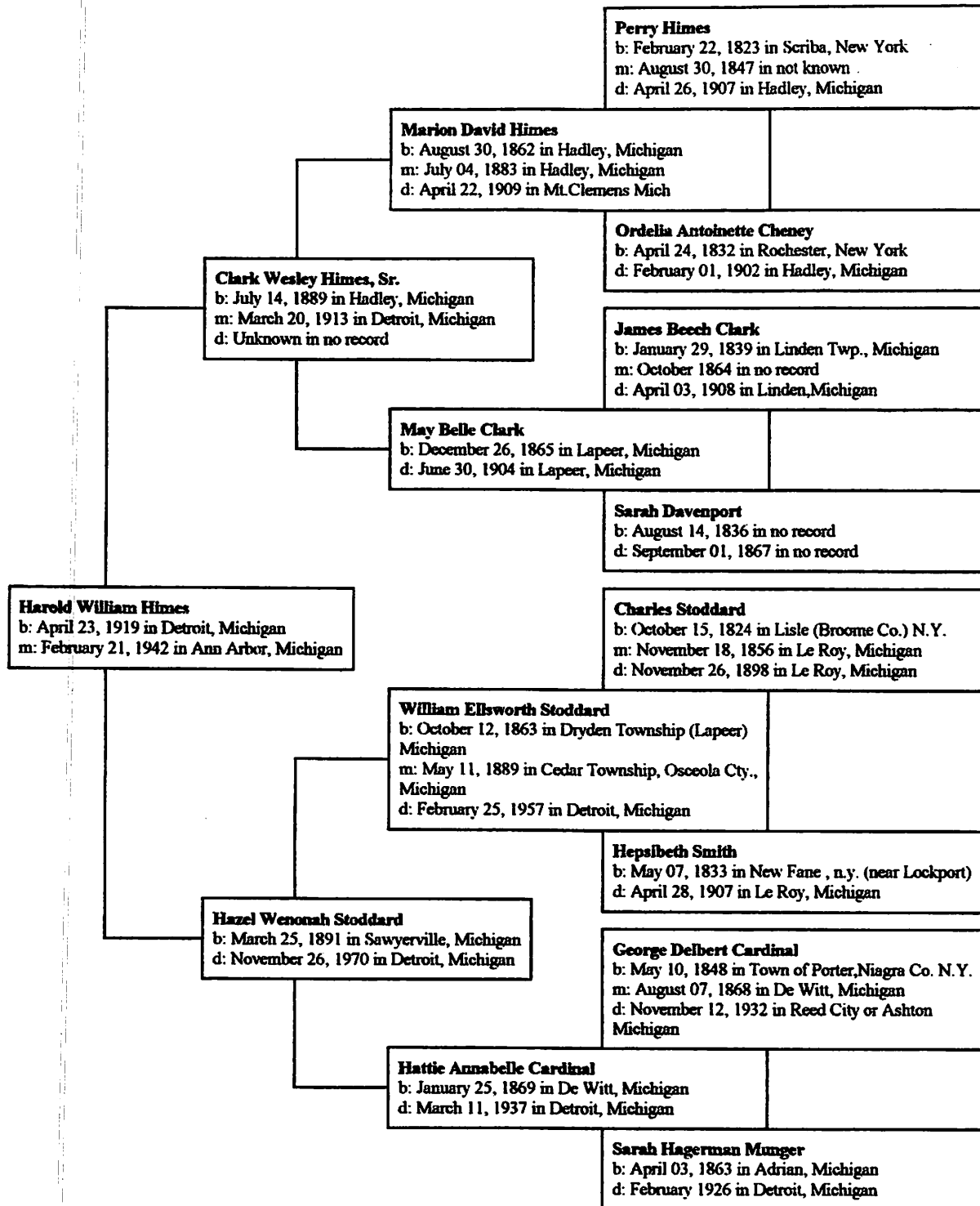

Wayne A. Jalava is seeking help/information from experts in Ingrian family history to establish his relationship to Peter the Great, through his son Alexis and Euphrosina.

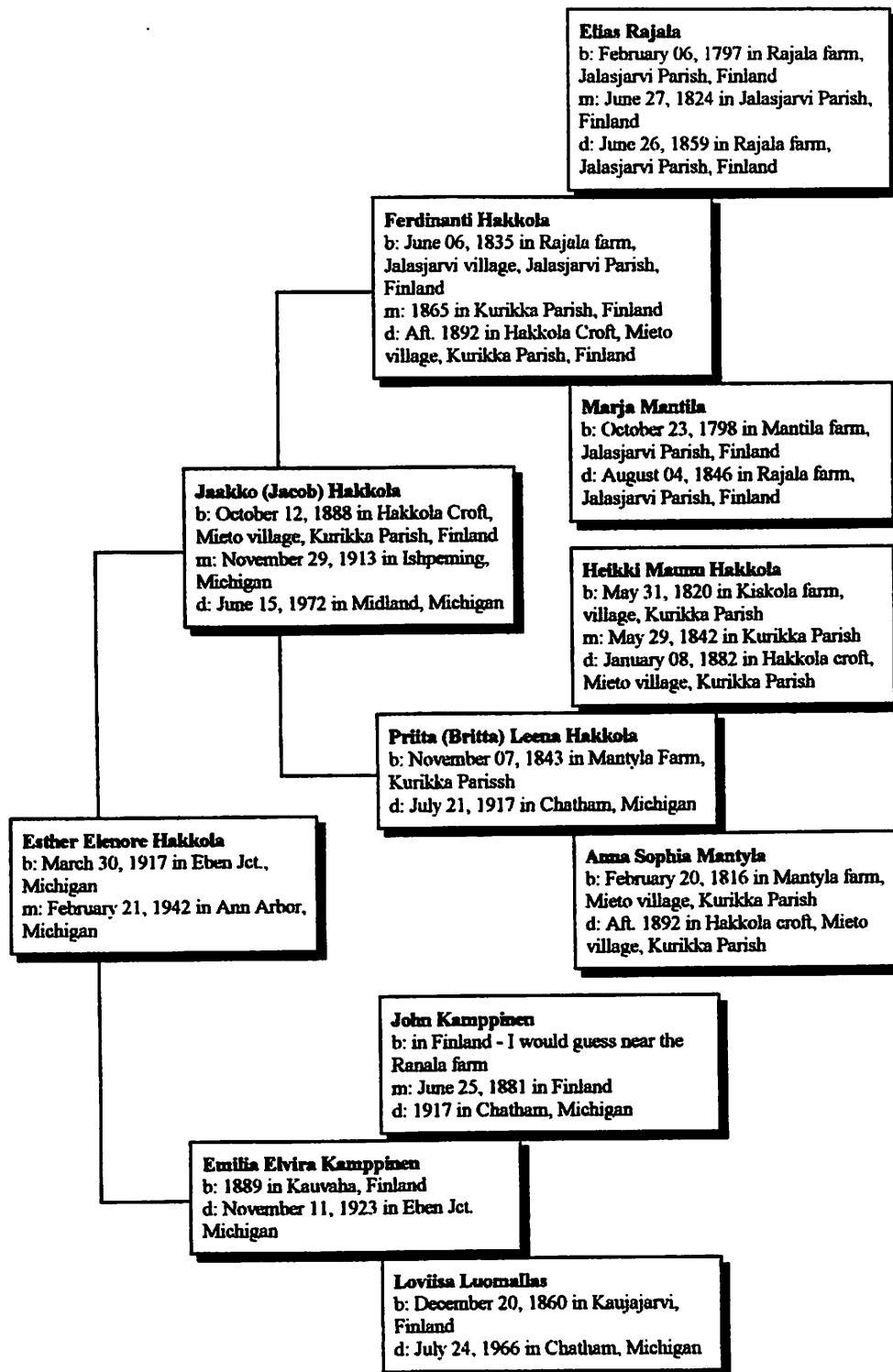
On his maternal side, Mr. Jalava is a direct descendent of Rurik of Novgorod, a Viking who formed the first fundamental government of Russia in 862 AD. Jalava is a cousin of the ½ blood to Tsar Nicholas II and his wife Alexandra Feodorovna. He is now investigating his paternal roots in Karelia and Ingria (Inkerinmaa). Peter the Great's eldest son, Alexis Petrovich, had an Ingrian Mistress captured in the Great Northern War, by whom a child was born. Peter, in thinking his son an unworthy heir to his throne, was instrumental in murdering his son Alexis in St. Petersburg in 1718. The mistress, Äfrosina (known as Euphrosina) and child were unharmed. Euphrosina lived in St. Petersburg until her death in 1748. History has lost track of Euphrosina and her child. Their descendants are direct descendants of Peter the Great and they have Finnish Roots. The present claimant to the Russian throne, or his heir, Grand Duke Vladimir Kirillovich Romanoff (born in Porvoo on the Haiko Estate, Finland) is only a second cousin to the ill-fated last Russian Tsar.

In February of 1998, we had to find a location to house our collection of genealogical materials due to the renovation of Peter White Public Library. It was felt that the society needed a location that would allow for the membership, community members, and visitors to the community to utilize the materials during the construction project, rather than placing the materials in storage.

We were able to find a suitable location at 116 W. Spring Street in Marquette. As a result of our move to our new location, our collection of materials has grown through the donations and tremendous support of our membership and the community. These include materials which are of interest to those who are interested in British, Canadian, Civil War, European, French, Jewish, Marquette County, Michigan, Native American, North American, Upper Peninsula, and W.W.II genealogy and history. We have also received donations of local city directories, telephone books, and high school and university yearbooks.

We have provided assistance to over two hundred individuals who utilized the library for research during the past year. We have also worked with students within Marquette Area Public School classrooms, and area Boy Scouts troops. We are currently working on several large projects: the indexing of the Morgan Heights records, indexing the former Jackson Funeral Home records, transcribing the old Catholic Cemetery in Marquette, transcribing Marks Memorial Cemetery, transcribing many other cemeteries, and providing assistance and certificates to descendants of the pioneer settlers of the City and County of Marquette from 1849 – 1900.

We were fortunate to find a donor who generously contributed the funds necessary to provide for rent, internet access fees, insurance and telephone service for eighteen months. This funding will end in August of 1999. The Peter White Library reconstruction project is now anticipated to last until August of 2000. Because of the need to house our collection outside of the Peter White Library for an additional 18 months, we as a society have been able to raise some of the additional monies needed in a variety of ways. In January of 1998, we sent a fund raising letter to members and friends of the MCGS which raised \$863.00. In May of 1998, we held a rummage sale, which raised \$405.00. Another \$412.00 was raised when we held a Pampered Chef Party in November. On May 8th, of this year we held a rummage sale and Beanie Baby Donation give-away. The rummage sale and give-away raised an additional \$800.00. Future plans for raising funds include, a rummage sale and another Pampered Chef Party in the fall.

In order to continue to provide a genealogical research library for the citizens of Marquette, visitors to the community, and our membership, we need your help. THE MUSOLF FAMILY OF MARQUETTE, MICHIGAN

Did you know that the city of Marquette had a Polish district around the turn of the Century? A large concentration of Polish families settled on Baraga Avenue, west of St. Peter's Cathedral. This is where the Musolf family lived when they emigrated from Poland.

Joseph Mulsoff/Musolf was born in 1840 in Stobno, Poland to Mathias and Anna Mulsoff. He married Mary Kotlenga prior to 1870 and emigrated from Poland in 1888 with children Paul, Mary, Rosa, Catherine, Anna, Frances, and Ignatz. When the family arrived in Marquette, it was a booming town of 5,000 people who welcomed the influx of immigrants needed for the growth in the railroad, mining and lumbering industries. The Musolfs lived on Superior Street (later renamed Baraga Avenue).

Less than 2 years after settling in Marquette, Joseph died in 1890. He is buried in the Old Catholic Cemetery, which was located at the corner of Division Street and Pioneer Road. His wife Mary, died in 1891 and is also buried there.

Paul Musolf was the oldest son of Joseph and Mary. He was born in Zamarte, Tuchola, Poland, an area known as West Prussia. He was well educated in Poland and spoke 7 languages. He served as a translator for many of Marquette's Polish population that didn't yet speak English. He was a member of St. Josephs' Polish Society, an organization that aided Polish people in time of illness or death. In 1893, Paul Musolf married Agnes Nowak, also a native of Poland. They lived at 600 W. Baraga Avenue and raised 10 children there. The family owned 9 acres of land on Grove Street. They walked several miles to grow and harvest garden produce there, especially potatoes. Paul was a blacksmith by trade and worked for Lake Shore Engine Works. He lived to be 91 years old, having died in 1961. His wife Agnes died in 1939. They were fondly remembered by their grandchildren as "Judga" and "Busha", Polish nicknames for Grandpa and Grandma.

The first child of Paul and Agnes Musolf was John, born in 1894. He was a machinist and served in WW I. In 1923 he married Theresa Gulczynski. They lived on the 400 block of Baraga Avenue. Seven children were born to them, John, Raymond, Bernice, William, Arlene, Catherine and Carol. John Musolf died suddenly in 1940. He is buried in Holy Cross Cemetery.

The children of John and Theresa Musolf are now the 4th generation descendants of Mathias Mulsoff who lived in Poland in the 1840's. With the addition of 2 more generations of children and grandchildren, a large number of Musolf descendants are proud to carry on the ways and traditions of a family who came to America over 100 years ago to improve their way of life!

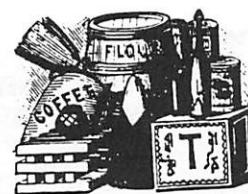

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FAMILY REUNIONS

Summer is a time when we gather with our families for reunions and picnics. At reunions, families engage in a variety of activities and traditions: picture taking and sharing, potluck dinners, barbecues, sports, games for kids and adults, family stroytelling, genealogy and lots of conversation.

If you are the planner of a family reunion, you may want to incorporate family history and tradition-related activities with food and fun.

Here are some ideas of activities:

- * Make a color photocopy of an old photograph and bring it to the reunion for relatives to identify.

- * Create a time capsule of objects from this year's family reunion.

- * Compile questions for a family history trivia game: at the reunion have one person ask members of the family for bits of information about them or their past. Write questions about each and type up the questions in a form. At the next reunion, make copies of your trivia game and ask family members to answer the questions during the reunion. An announcer can go over the answers and prizes can be awarded. Discover how many different "correct" answers there might be! Variation: create the game in a scavenger hunt format for kids to discover by asking adults the questions.

- * Start a family round-robin letter or newsletter. Ask each member or family group to write a few lines about their past year in a register book and send the newsletter to family members after the event.

- * Take a photograph of the reunion group. It's fun to see the changes in children every year as they grow. For variation: take a photograph of a group posed in the same positions as they were in an old photo.

- * Hold a family story hour for the kids with a special family members known for his/her storytelling. record the event.

- * Ask the cooks in each family to bring dishes they are known for. Recipes may be handed down in the family. Photograph the food, collect the recipes and you'll have the stare of a family cookbook.

- * Set up an interview area and tape record members recollections. Kids can have fun interviewing adults and asking questions they are curious about.

- * Have a family talent show. Everyone is welcome! Most members like to "ham it up". Select an emcee to tell jokes and keep the talent moving along, whether it be singing, tumbling, play acting, dog tricks, etc, etc. This might be the hi-light of your reunion, and certainly the funniest event!

- * Have a kids creation station with a variety of art and craft supplies on hand. Kids might want to create greeting cards using extra family photographs. Let the imagination run wild!

These are just a few ideas for activities besides the usual eating, playing games and visiting. Be sure to allow an area to display all the history of your family, including photographs, family trees and artifacts such as grandmothers quilt she made many years ago.

To help you plan a family reunion, establish a committee and meet early to be well organized. Several books which can help make the job easier are:

"Celebrating the Family" by Vandella Brown

JOSEPH CROISITIERE

A CENTURY OF YEARS – PLUS

Excerpt- *Mining Journal*
March 21, 1903



Joseph Croisitiere is now enfeebled, but appears a long way from his passing and the story of his life is an interesting one!

A resident of the Marquette County House, he is probably the oldest man in the Upper Peninsula if not the oldest in the State. For some time now he has been too feeble to work but is spry enough to be about.

Notwithstanding his great age, it is only during the past year that he has been a direct charge at the County House, although he has received county aid during the past fifteen years. He settled in Marquette in the early days and raised a large family, members of which still reside in this region. He then lived in a shanty on a small patch of ground in South Marquette. Relatives from time to time tried to look after him, but owing to the infirmities of his years, he was not willing to do as he was told.

Long after he reached an age when most men are thinking of quitting life's turmoil he cultivated his patch of potatoes and did odd jobs about the city, maintaining a precarious existence with the addition of aid received from the county. A few years ago the nuns took him in and offered to care for him the remainder of his days in return for a Quit Claim Deed for his property, but he declined the offer.

There is no doubt of the old fellow's age according to Captain Blanchard, who was the Superintendent of the County House. Several years ago Croisitiere's friends raised money which enabled him to go to the Shrine of St. Anne DeBeaupre and visit his birth place near Montreal and he obtained a copy of his birthday certificate. It was interpreted on his return and showed him to be 92 years old at that time and this incident occurred at least 12 years ago.

In his prime he was one of the strongest men in the region and his memory goes back to very early years.

OF GREAT STRENGTH

WAS THE LATE JOS. CROISTIERE WHEN IN HIS PRIME

Joseph Croisitiere, whose death at the age of 106 years was noted in yesterday's issue of The Mining Journal, is said by those who knew him to have been a remarkable man in other respects than age. His real name was Joseph De La Croisitiere, and he was born near Ottawa, Ontario, in 1799. For many years he followed the life of the woodsman in the timber belt of Upper Canada, and former residents of the region who now live here tell many stories of his feats of strength and endurance.

"I have know Croisitiere for nearly forty years," said an old settler to The Mining Journal, "and he was apparently an old man when I first met him. As a boy in Upper Canada I can remember hearing tales of Croisitiere's strength, and it was common talk among the people around Ottawa that he was the only man that could master Joe Montferraut the famous Strong Man. Joe Montferraut died in 1864, an old man, and Croisitiere was then in his prime. I don't know whether there are records of his birth in existence, but I am positive that he was over 100 years old.

"As late as four years ago I saw Croisitiere turn a handspring on the hardwood floor in a downtown office, and I think that until a year or two past he had done gardening and other light work. In statue he was a small man standing but five feet seven inches in height, but his chest measurement several years ago was forty-four inches. He was wonderfully developed physically and I think he was the strongest man in the Lake Superior Region when he came here in 1869.

"Croisitiere's reputation in Canada was not based alone on unusual strength. He took part in the Papineau Rebellion in 1837-38, and for over a year served as a spy for the celerated revolutionist leader. I recall that Croisitiere once related to me how he brought mail and other documents from the city of Ottawa to Papineau's officers and men. In those days much of travel was done by means of carts, and the cart driven by Croisitiere was provided with hollow hubs into which messages regarding the plans of the British Officers were secreted and carried to Papineau. Croisitiere remained in Canada for many years after the close of the rebellion and did not leave until in the "60s"

"Although a man possessed of unusual strength I do not recall having ever heard of him engaging in a quarrel with anyone, and I believe he once told me that he always used tobacco.

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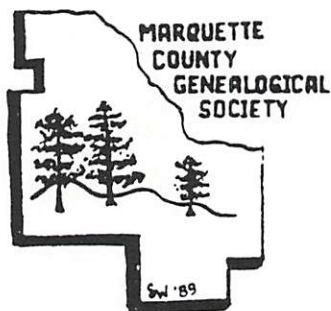
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MARQUETTE COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY
