
CASTLE GARDEN

If your ancestors immigrated to the United States prior to 1897 and arrived at New York City, then chances are, they were processed at Castle Garden, not Ellis Island. Between 1855 and 1890, nearly 8 million immigrants from Northern and Western Europe entered Castle Garden. Six million of these were German or Irish.

Prior to 1855, there was no immigrant processing center. The shipping companies presented passenger lists to the Collector of the Customs, the immigrant made whatever customs declaration was necessary and then went on their way. In August 1855, the State of New York opened the first examining and processing center for immigrants on an island off the southwest tip of Manhattan.


What was Castle Garden and where was it located?

Between 1807 and 1811, a circular fort was built in New York Harbor in preparation for the impending war with England. The fort, known as the Southwest Battery, was built on the islands just offshore(later joined to Manhattan with landfill). Although fully armed and staffed, the fort never had an occasion to fire upon the enemy. It did however, serve as a jail for British prisoners. In 1815, it was renamed Castle Clinton in honor of DeWitt Clinton, the first governor of New York. The army vacated the fort in 1821 and the structure was deeded to the city in 1823. Shortly after, two entrepreneurs, Philip French and Christopher Heiser, leased the site and transformed the fort into a restaurant and entertainment center.



It was renamed Castle Garden because of the grounds which were planted in beautiful flower gardens. A large stage and theater accomodated 6,000 people. Besides opera and ballet being performed there, singer Jenny Lind and circus owner P.T. Barnum, also entertained audiences. Castle Garden had become a fashionable drinking and entertainment establishment. In 1854 the lease expired and the city found another use for the fort, much to the disappointment of New York City residents.

Because of the Potato Famine in Ireland(1845-1849), millions of immigrants were arriving on U.S. shores. The government designated Castle Garden as an immigration receiving station on August 1, 1855. The building was refitted with long wooden benches, desks, and offices for registrars, railroad ticket agents and money exchangers. The purpose of Castle Garden, like Ellis Island after it, was to deny entrance to undesirable aliens, and to provide a safe haven to the new immigrants. Immigration officials preferred to accept white northern Europeans and readily rejected black, Asian and Hispanic immigrants. The immigrants who were accepted had a difficult time, as crime was rampant in the center. Naive foreigners were often fleeced of their money and personal possessions because of the high costs of food and railroad tickets. By 1890, Congress initiated a formal investigation into the corruption at Castle Garden and closed the center. On April 18, 1890, immigrants from the steamers, *Bohemia* and *State of Indiana* were the last to be processed at Castle Garden. The Secretary of the Treasury Department would now handle all immigration requests at the Old Barge Office near the Customhouse in Battery Park, Manhattan. Eventually the Immigration and Naturalization Service(INS) was formed to oversee immigration. From 1890-1892 more than 1 million immigrants were processed at the Old Barge Office.



During the 1880s, almost 70 percent of all immigrants to America were received at Castle Garden.

Ellis Island opened on Jan. 1, 1892, to handle the massive wave of immigrants to the U.S. In 1897 a fire destroyed the original wooden building on Ellis Island where all the immigration records from 1855-1897 had been stored. Ship Passenger Lists were held by the Collector of Customs. However, the Immigration Lists, which contained more personal information, were destroyed. Thus Immigration Passenger Lists begin in 1897 for the port of New York City.

Castle Garden housed the New York City Aquarium from 1896-1941. In 1950 the National Park Service, dedicated the park and site as a national monument. Today, Castle Clinton National Monument is a visitor center featuring exhibits of New York history. Tour boats to Liberty Island and Ellis Island leave from the park daily, taking visitors in search of their ancestors past.

It has been estimated that some 65 percent of the original immigrants to Canada during the French Regime came from Northern France, especially Normandy. The northern French husband/wife relationship differed radically from that which prevailed in England and in the Colonies. Under English Common Law, wives were treated as chattel, with their husbands allowed to dispose of any of their possessions as they saw fit-with or without their permission. If the wives protested too vigorously, their husbands under English Common Law, were permitted to physically admonish them just so long as the stick used was no thicker than his thumb (the historical origin of the expression, "Rule of Thumb").

During this time (1607-1759) in Canada under French Law, everything acquired during the marriage was split fifty-fifty. The wife was considered to be just as responsible as her husband for any wealth created, and wives were always identified under their maiden names. Father Antonio Loiselle extracted the marriages of the Catholic parishes in the dioceses of Quebec, Madawaska and Eastern Ontario. Each entry in the Loiselle, gives the surname and Christian names of the bride and groom. It also gives the date and place of marriage and the names of the parents. The Loiselle Marriage records are a wonderful resource and are available through the Family History Libraries and other large repositories.

These records were referred to as the Bishopric records. Contact the diocese for the particular parish, and most likely the records exist.

He always kept his luggage packed, this man who had no fame. And every twenty years or so, this rascal changed his name.


His parents came from Europe, they should be upon some list Of passengers to the USA, but somehow they got missed.





MARQUETTE COUNTY MINE INSPECTOR REPORTS

The iron mining industry has been crucial in determining the development of Marquette County, beginning with the discovery of iron ore in Negaunee in 1844 to present. The Marquette County Board of Supervisors, annually reviewed and published reports from all county officers, including the mine inspector. These reports can be a good genealogical source.

Beginning with this issue and continuing, the Mine Inspector Reports will be published here in the Lake Superior Roots. The earliest report found was 1889. In that year, over 10.000 men were employed in 47 iron mines, 8 gold mines and 2 stone quarries. There were 30 fatal accidents.

By 1891, the names of the accident victims were given and continue in subsequent years. **Reports from 1889-1891** are included in this issue.

Mine Inspector Broad submitted his annual report, given below, which was accepted and adopted and ordered placed on file by vote of the board:

To the Board of Supervisors of Marquette;

Genety:

General County:

General Compliance with the act governing my appointment as mining inspector, I herewith submit my second annual report. In the absence of any proscribed form by the law, I have had blanks prepared, one of which is filled for each mine or quarry, the vital statistics, being those carefully kept by meduring the year, and which are herewith filed.

My visits to the various mines during the year have been governed by the conditions

of the several proporties, and have been as frequent as official attention seems to have been demanded.

been domanded.

It affords me great pleasure to report that the several managements have strictly complied with all requirements of the mining law, and in most instances have taken extraordinary precaution for the security of their respective mines—in a number of cases exceeding the real contemplation of the law.

I have attended all inquests held, and from a caroful consideration of the evidence adduced, have coincided with verdets which have in every justance, exon-

dicts which have, in every instance, exon-erated the mining companies from all

blame.

In summarizing the accompanying report, it will be found that of the fortyseven iron mines, eight gold mines and two stone quarries, employing 10,047 men, there were but thirty fatal accidents, which shows a gratifying decrease in the fatality as compared with the report of last year, being but about one-half the per cent.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

GENTLEMEN:-In submitting my annual report as inspector of mines, it affords me the highest satisfaction to say that there has been a substantial decrease in the numhas been a substantial decrease in the number of casualties as compared with the record of any former year. This decrease is marked, and in my opinion may alike be accorded to the increased care of the employes and the improved equipments of mines, and of the methods of management. By way of making the report comprehensive in general and in detail, I have prepared blanks, one of which is used in connection with each mine; showing the date of the accident, name of person, occupation, cause, nationality, and nature of injury. In a compilation of these various reports the result is reached that of the 12,000 men employed in and about the mines of the county there were but forty-five fatal cases, and five permanently disabled, a record that may be pointed to with the greatest confidence, and one which will compare favorably with that of any af the industries employing alike of skilled and common labor. Having examined every mine of the county this last year carefully, I am especially gratified to be able to state that there has been no failure on the part of any mining company or mine owner in supplying any demand that might in the least contribute to the safety or healthful condition of the respective mines.

Your silent tents of green
We deck with fragrant flowers;
Yours has the suffering been,
The memory shall be ours.
--Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

Genealogy makes history come alive because through our research we come to know our ancestors and about their participation in battles and wars of long, long ago. To us, our soldier ancestors' graves are much more than silent tents of green.

The custom of placing flowers on graves is an old one that exists in many countries. Today, almost everywhere, people have a special day to honor and remember those who gave their lives in battle and family members and friends. Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day and Poppy Day (after World War I), is a legal holiday, observed annually on the last Monday in May in most of the United States. It began at the end of the American Civil War — a long and brutal war, in which brother fought brother and the best of friends became the worst of enemies.

Today it is a time to honor the nation's armed services personnel who were killed in wartime, our ancestors who died in many longago battles, and an occasion to remember all of our loved ones and friends who have died. Traditionally this holiday is marked by parades, memorial speeches and ceremonies, and by decorating graves with flowers and flags.

Several communities lay claim to having had the first Memorial Day, but since 1966 Waterloo, New York has been sanctioned by the federal government as being its birthplace. In 1865, Henry C. Welles, a druggist in the village of Waterloo, mentioned at a social gathering that honor should be shown to the patriotic dead of the Civil War by decorating their graves. He again mentioned this subject in the spring of 1866 to General John B. Murray, then clerk of Seneca County. General Murray embraced the idea and a committee was formulated to plan a day devoted to honoring the dead.

The Waterloo townspeople adopted the idea wholeheartedly. Wreaths, crosses, and bouquets were made for each veteran's grave. The village was decorated with flags at half mast and draped with evergreen boughs and mourning black streamers. On May 5, 1866, civic societies joined the procession to the three existing cemeteries. They were led by veterans marching to martial music. At each cemetery there were impressive and lengthy services.

However, the location of the first observance of Memorial Day is in dispute. Some claim the custom of honoring our war dead began in Boalsburg, Pennsylvania. Others say the custom was originated by some Southern women who placed flowers on the graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers after the Civil War. Still others claim the first Memorial Day service took place on May 30, 1866 in a burial ground for Union soldiers at Belle Isle near Richmond, Virginia. Regardless, it is a day to remember all of our ancestors.

Great Idea for Cemeteries:

You might wish to copy the following poem and type it on a 3 x 5" card, add your name and address and relationship. Laminate the card and attach to a single stem artificial flower. Place the card and flower on the graves of your ancestors when you visit. The flower should be placed as close to the marker as possible. A small version of your pedigree chart could also be included. This way, the next person who might be researching the same family can get in touch with you.

Dear Ancestor:

Your tombstone stands among the rest neglected and alone, the name and date are chiseled out on polished, marbled stone.

It reaches out to all who care, it is too late to mourn, You do not know that I exist, you died and I was born.

Yet each of us are cells of you, in flesh, in blood, in bone, Our blood contracts and beats a pulse, entirely not our own.

Dear Ancestor, the place you filled so many years ago Spreads out among the ones you left who would have loved you so.

CEMETERIES- NOT UST FOR HALLOWEEN ANYMORE

Death records are one of the three cornerstones of genealogical research. Along with birth and marriage records, they help create the outline of a family's relationships to each other. They are often also the records that are easiest to obtain for documentation of your family. But what if there is no death certificate available for an ancestor you're seeking?

Getting Started With Cemetery Records

There are several ways to find out where your ancestor is buried. If you don't know the name of the cemetery in which your ancestor was buried, look in obituaries, wills and on death certificates- they often list burial information or the name of a funeral home that you can contact. Make sure that you also ask other family members if they are aware of any family plots. Also check the records of the church that your ancestor attended.

If you don't know the location of the cemetery, you can find it in several ways. First look in telephone books for the area or ask at the local courthouse, library, genealogical society or even local churches. Second, look at U. S. Government Geological Survey maps of the area, available in larger libraries and often sporting goods stores. These maps show all of the roads, houses, and even the small graveyards. Finally check your local libraries for the American Blue Book of Funeral Directors, published in NY by the National Funeral Directors Assoc. It lists cemeteries by location.

If your ancestor is buried in the cemetery and you plan to visit, find out when the cemetery office is open so that you can find out exactly where the plot is. This will save you the trouble of having to search the entire cemetery.

Other Sources Of Cemetery Records

You may not actually need to visit a cemetery in order to look at cemetery records and gravestones. Many of these records have been transcribed and are available in the archives of

various organizations and societies. Another development in cemetery record research is the creation of on-line transcription archives. Some contain electronic versions of transcribed inscriptions and some like Virtual Cemetery, provide a photo of the gravestone and contact information for the person who submitted it. Many people use computerized cemetery record indexes to help find records they need. Some libraries have computerized indexes.

Do try to find and verify any gravestone or cemetery information you find through these types of sources- there is always possibility of error in a transcription you find as a secondary source. Plus, it is often a moment of real connection when you finally do find the grave site of a long-sought ancestor; that sense of family place is well worth the trouble.


Christmas Party

- * The Immigration and Naturalization Records for Marquette County will arrive at Northern Michigan University Records Center on Monday October 2, 2000. The Immigration and Naturalization Records comprise 28 cubic feet of material and cover the years 1852-1971. These records provide extraordinary primary source of information for demographic, social, and genealogical studies. Access to these records are free and open to the public during the Archives' normal business hours, Monday-Friday, 8am to 5pm.

WHAT ARE...?

The following list will help introduce researchers to groups of people who came to the New World in the very early years of settlement.

HESSIANS: German troops used by the British in the Revolutionary War, many of whom deserted and remained in America.

HUGUENOTS: French Protestants that fled from persecution mainly from 1685 onward. They went to Prussia, the German Palatinate and then came to America. Those in the French West Indies escaped to the Southeastern coast of America, others went to England and Ireland.

MENNONITES: A Swiss Protestant group founded in 1525 and migrated by way of Alsace, England and Russia to America. They settled in Pennsylvania, Minnesota and Kansas.

MORAVIANS: The United Brethren is a Protestant group formed in Bohemia about 1415 and spread to Poland, Russia, Germany and England.

PALATINES: In 1688 Louis XIV of France began persecuting German Protestan on the west band of the Rhine River. Queen Anne of England helped a group to come to America in 1708. More than 2,000 arrived in New York in 1710 and settled along the Hudson and Mohawk rivers.

QUAKERS: The Society of Friends was founded in England in 1648. Early restrictions brought them to New Jersey in 1675 and some 230 English Quakers founded Burlington, New Jersey in 1678. 1681 was the year William Penn was granted the territory of Pennsylvania and within two years there were about 3,000 Quakers there.

SCOT-IRISH: The descendants of the Presbyterian Scots were placed in the northern counties of Ireland by British rulers in the early part of the 17th century. Most came to America from 1718 until the Revolution. Settling in Pennsylvania first, the movement was then to the south and then westward with the frontier.

WALLOONS: From southern Belgium, the language of the Walloons is a French dialect. Cornelis May of Flanders, Holland, and about 30 or 40 families came to America in 1624 and established Fort Orange. It is now known as Albany, New York.

MARQUETTE COUNTY MINE INSPECTOR REPORTS

The iron mining industry has been crucial in determining the development of Marquette County, beginning with the discovery of iron ore in Negaunee in 1844 to present. The Marquette County Board of Supervisors annually reviewed and published reports from all county officers, including the Mine Inspector. These reports can be a good genealogical source, because many of the yearly reports list names and dates of death, of the miners.



Accident No. 1. Erick Fish, by occupa-Accident 30.1. Brick risk, by occupied than inner, was killed at the Davis mine. October 20, 1892. Deceased was one of a gang engaged at the fifth level of the mine in removing a pillar. Operations had been pursued to the second tier from the bottom of level, when the sets gave way, a portion of which struck the doceased and death ensued, timbering here was from setts of small dimensions which were insufficiently braced. braced.

No. 2. At the Escanaba River Land & Iron Co's mine, John Jewel met death by a fall of ground November 3, 1892. Jewel and his partners were running ground against orders from the back of level No. 3,

against orders from the back of level No. 3, when a portion of the back lost its cleavage to a slip and fell upon the spot where decased stood. Death was instantaneous. No. 3. On the 16th of November, at the Suffalo mine, Henry Lathe, cage touder, after giving signal to hoist, essayed to lean upon the moving cage. He lost his balance and fell with head projecting toward the shaft, when back of level was reached the head was torn from trunk of body, causing of course instant death of course instant death.

No. 4. At the Salsbury mine December 13, 1892, Charles Freetley was killed by a fall of timber, at the fourteenth level of the mine. Freetley and his partners were cut-ting out for a new room in side of level when the taking up cap slipped from posi-tion and struck deceased as it fell to the ground below. When deceased was picked

ground below. When deceased was picked up life was extinct.

No. 5. At the Winthrop mine February 11, 1873, Gabriel Johnson, while loading timber into the skip and walking backward toward the shaft, his hand hook slipped from the rolling log. He fell backward and down the open shaft to a depth of two hundred feet and was killed. His body was reached in the rolling log.

dred feet and was killed. His body was caught in the mouth of the skip as it stood in that point of the shaft.

No. 6. At Republic mine, February 17. 1893, while removing a pillar about 125 feet from surface, a rock weighing 50 pounds turned out from the side of same and killed an operative employed at that place, James Hocking was the name of the victim of this accident. accident.

accident.
No. 7. At the Richmond mine, February 25, 1893, James Connors met death by falling down the shaft, he having lost his hold in climbing when near the surface. Distance of the fall 55 feet.
No. 8 Buffalo mine March 3, 1893, it was in the 3rd level of the above mine and at the date already given, that Charles Swanson was crushed to death by a fall of ground. Mining was conducted by the use of the square set timbering. The bottom of level had been reached within two tiers when lagging above gave way. One whole when lagging above gave way. One whole set was filled by the quantity of rock that came down from above.

No. 9. Herman Kutimackey fell 73 feet down the shaft at the Buffalo mine March 3, 1833. He died from the effect of injuries received, on the following day.

No. 10. J. H. Richards was engaged at the "C" shaft, Pittsburg and Lake Angeline mine, on the 25th of March, 1803, in mining out a pillar. Due to faulty bracing a cap was pushed out of position by the weight of overhanging ground. Deceased was killed by the falling ground. Operations had been extended to the third level at the time of the accident.

No. 11. While removing pillars at the 9th level of the Salsbury mine a portion of ground turned out from one of the sides and crushed to death Richard Rupi. Preparations were being made for a new set of timhers at the time of the untoward event here recorded, date April 19th, 1893.

No. 12. At the Lake Superior mine, Sec.

No. 12. At the Lake Superior mine, Sec. 15, April 25, 1893, John Varcee lost his life by attempting to jump from amoving skip: he missed his footing and fell backward into the shaft and was precipitated down the distance of one level to the bottom of the mine.

No. 13. A fall of ground from the back of stope killed John Peterson while employed

at the Republic mine. May 13, 1893.

No 14. Salisbury mine, May 3, 1893, John Lace sustained fatal injuries at the Salisbury mine, ninth level, from a fall of ground out of the hanging wall, which also crushed away the timbers used in mining out a pillar at that point. Deceased was working alone at the fatal moment, having returned to duty immediately after lunch, and was found immediately after lunch, and was found buried beneath one set of dirt by his partners within thirty minutes after the occurrence. Work was being prosecuted by means of raising sets. The distance from the bottom of the level was 24 feet. Three sets of timbers had been erected. 4. Ole Hammer, was killed at the Volunteer mine Feb. 16, 1894. He was engaged in the 490 foot level, second stope west of shaft, and at the time of the accident was barring down ground after a blast. He was precipitated down a distance of 25 feet by a huge rock which struck and smashed the ledder on which he stood at work. The the ladder on which he stood at work. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

5. John Dunn, was killed at the Republic mine March 6, 1894. He was repairing the trolley in the open pit when by means of a displaced nut from one of the bolts the lad-der fell across No. 6 shaft throwing him down an entire distance of 245 feet. The verdict of the jury was accidental death.

U. Alex Youare, died from the effects of an accident received at the Platt mine. He an accident received at the Flatt mine. He was hurt March 13, and expired April 2, 1894. He was struck on the back by a rock which fell from the hanging wall, in the east stope of of the 200 foot level. Death by accident was the verdict of the jury.

7. Richard Jeffrey, died April 6, 1894, from the effects of injuries sustained in the Narauman wine on the preceding day. Negaunes mine on the preceding day. He was working in the 720 foot level, 120 feet was working in the 720 foot level, 120 feet west of the shaft, 218 feet north of the second room, on the second tier above. 10. Jacob Teskala, was killed at the Jackson mine, June 7, 1894, by a fall of ground in the bottom level of the sand shaft. At the time of his death he was tramming dirt from the west stope, when a portion of the back came down upon him, killing him instantly. Accidental death was brought in as the verdict of the jury.
11-12. Richard Jackman and George Folland were killed at the Swanzey mine, June 1, 1894. They were in the shaft at the bottom, when a bucket of tools came down from above and produced the fatal result. The verdict of the jury was, killed by accident. 13. Jerry Sullivan, was killed July 1, 1894, at the Nelson mine while descending from the 750 foot to the 1,000 foot level. The verdict of the jury was accidental 14. Matt Harogan, was killed at the Volunteer mine, on surface, July 26, 1894. His injuries were caused by a car of leaded ore, he having been caught beneath it and the track beneath. 15. Timethy Sheehan, was killed: at the Lillie mine, Aug. 20, 1894. Deceased was a miner on duty at the 500 foot level, 250 feet southwest of the shaft, raise No. 5, 6 feet above main level. He went down with the ground that caved below him. Verdict of the jury was, death caused by cc-laborer from a blast fired in an adjacent room against the orders of the captain and shift bosses. cidental death. He was working on fourth tier, two tiers wide, ground came down, pushing cap off leg and burying Chapman. Mining done on square sets in this stope, Jury's verdict was accidental death in this case.

Accident No. 7—Erick Makki, atranimer, was hurt on March 20th, 1895, at the Champion mine, on the 14th level, in the 4th stope west of No. 4 shaft, a piece of rock fell from hanging wall, striking him on the head, he died the following day. There was no inquest.

Accident No. 8—Abraham Hakola, a miner, was injured at the Winthrop mine, at the 240 foot level, 675 feet south west of No. 2 shaft, on Jime 1st, 1895, by a fall of ground, from the effect of which he died on June 2nd, 93. The decased was working in a drift stope, one set wide, with power drill, he was leaning over the machine when a piece of ground fell from overhead and struck him on the back with above results. Accident No. 9—James Harrington, a surface laborer at the Gilfs shaft mine, was instantly killed on Friday Juno 7th, 1895, while engaged with a party of 5 others in taking down a old smoke stack, from the boller house. Stack broke in two while heing taken down, and he was struck by a falling piece of the stack. Verdict of the jury in this case was "killed while engaged in taking down a smoke stack."

Accident No. 10—Andrew Halstead, a miner employed at the Queen mine, was killed while engaged in taking down a smoke stack."

Finding Maiden Names

In the lower left-hand corner of most deeds, you will find signatures of two to four witnesses. The first one is always from the husband's side. The next one is always from the wife's side. This is to protect her one-third dower right under the law. Nothing you will ever use will give greater clues to maiden names then witnesses to old deeds!

Also in the 1800's and before, it was traditional when the daughter got married, as part of her dowry, the father either covered the loan or carried the note for his son-in-law. If you know the husband's name and you can find out to whom they were making their mortgage payments, about 70 percent of the time it was her father.


