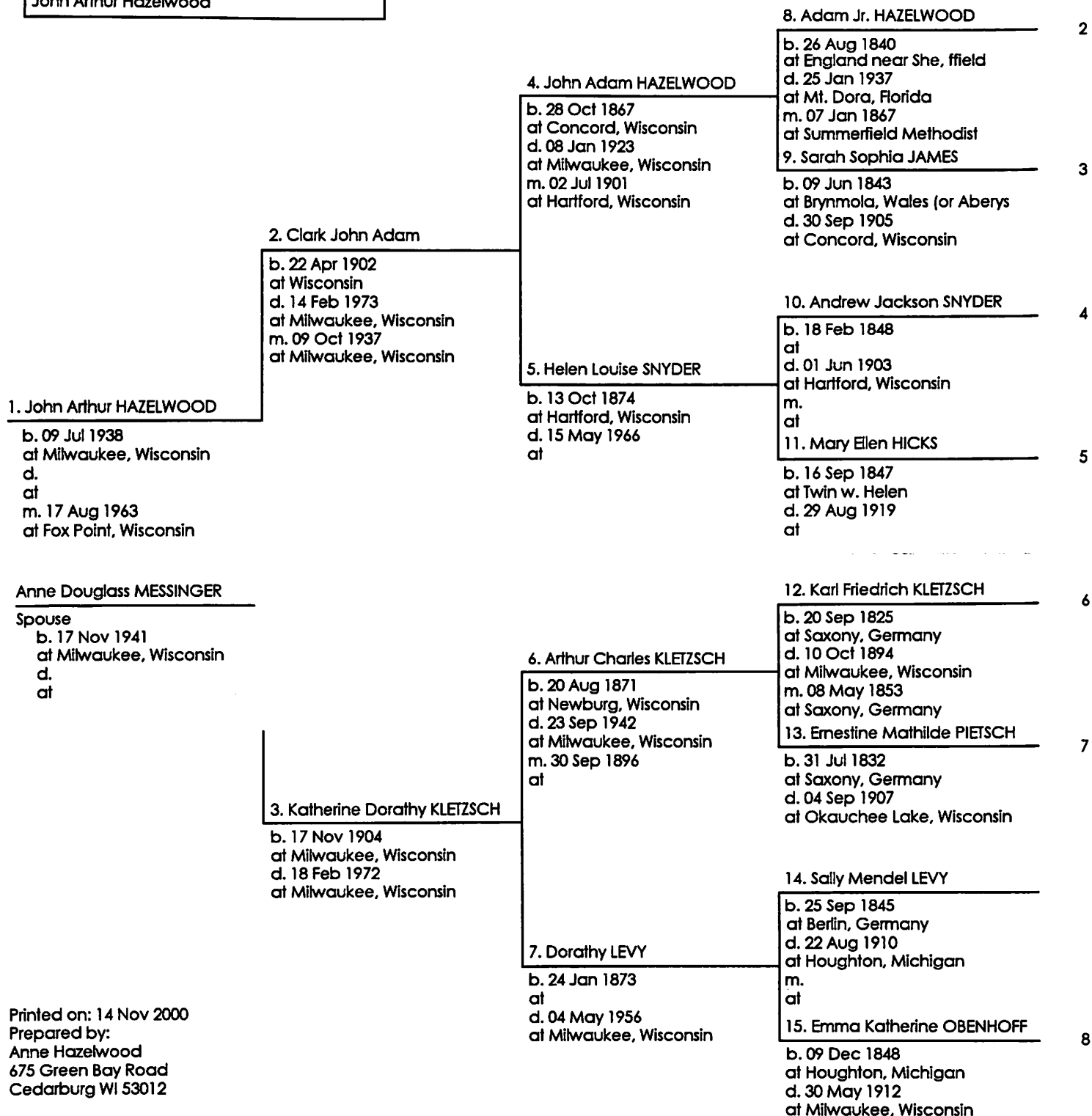

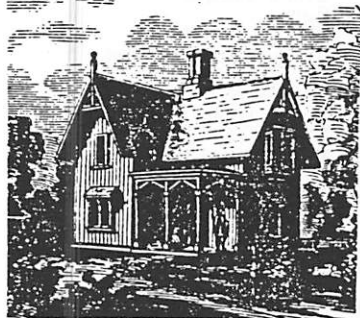

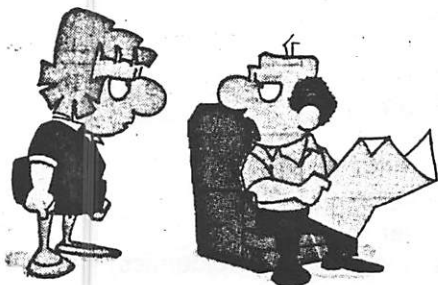

MARQUETTE COUNTY MINE INSPECTOR REPORTS

The iron mining industry has been crucial in determining the development of Marquette County, beginning with the discovery of iron ore in Negaunee in 1844 to present. The Marquette County Board of Supervisors annually reviewed and published reports from all county officers, including the Mine Inspector. These reports can be a good genealogical source, because many of the yearly reports list names and dates of death, of the miners.

Henry Uren met death at the Jackson mine on December 23, 1895, from a fall of ground. The 120 foot level of the Sand Shaft, was the scene of the accident, place 1,200 feet northwest of shaft. John Trembath was engaged on the same contract with Uren and both were employed at the time of the accident, in barring down the loose ground from a recent blast. Without warning about a ton of ore released from a slip and, while falling caught Uren, before escape was possible. He was immediately removed to surface, where he survived only five hours, expiring at 10:30 p. m. Deceased was 38 years of age, married, and born in England. Verdict of jury was "Accidental death".

Swan Erickson was killed in the open pit of Cleveland Lake mine on January 16, 1896. Erickson and his partners were employed to run the ore down the mill to the first underground level. Noticing the heavy ground overhead, John Olson, foreman, and Captain Buzzo, who happened to be present at the accident, had already ordered Erickson and his partners to cease work until everything was made safe. In disregard of orders Erickson returned to the mouth of the mill while Olson and his men were placing the ladder against the unsafe ground. He was in this manner caught beneath the dirt as it fell and was instantly killed. Deceased was of Swedish origin, married, and was 36 years of age. Verdict of the jury: "Accidental death by fall of ground".

Frank Hooper met death in the Republic mine at the 120 foot level of No. 8 Shaft, on February 6, 1896. In disregard of orders he tried to jump on a moving skip, slipped and fell 120 feet. Death occurred about three hours after he was brought to surface. Deceased was 18 years of age, single and born of English parents. Verdict of the jury: "Accidental death".

Jacob Oscar met death at the Cleveland Lake shaft, on first level on February 14, 1896. Deceased was engaged in running a chute on the level before named and was barring out a jam while standing under the apron of the chute on a ladder. The jam suddenly yielded and in the rush thus precipitated the apron was broken down and Oscar buried. "Accidental death" was the verdict of the jury.

James Doldge, William McGraw and Alfred Bolte, English, and Mathias Tagleburg, Swede, were killed at the Republic mine, on the 15th day of February, 1896. The unfortunate men, with seven others, were riding on the skip of No. 1 shaft, having climbed on at the bottom level. On reaching the 1020 foot level, the skip dumped. Seven of the men escaped but the four included in the foregoing list were unable to liberate themselves and were crushed beneath the skip on the timbering of the shaft. Though contrary to orders, it had been the custom of the men to ride on the skip in and out of the mine, and never before had an accident resulted. No cause can be assigned for the dumping of the skip, as the track, by close inspection, proved to be in perfect order. McGraw was unmarried, the other three had families. The jury brought in a verdict of accidental death.

Henry Longfield was killed at the Lillie mine on March 5, 1896, by falling into a chute while attempting to reach the ladder-road connecting the fourth and fifth levels of No. 4 shaft. Work at the Lillie mine is conducted in observance of the caving system and Longfield while working in his room supposed he heard the timbers cracking, and hurriedly jumped for the ladder, missing it he went down the chute to the level below a distance of 75 feet, and was instantly killed. Deceased was a Finlander by birth and was unmarried. "Accidental death" was the verdict of the jury.

John Johnson was killed at the Salisbury mine on the 2nd day of April, 1896. Deceased and three other men were engaged in retimbering the 15th level of "A" shaft, when about a ton of dirt came down from the back of the level and fell upon the spot on which he stood, producing immediate death. Johnson was single and born in Sweden. Verdict of the jury was: "Accidentally killed by a fall of ground."

James Rowe was killed at the Salisbury mine on the 17th day of April, 1896. The accident occurred on the 15th level, 632 feet from surface and 300 feet south of the shaft. Rowe and his partners were engaged in blasting their room together. Two holes were charged in legs of timber on second tiers and were exploded. The men stood in the level below but in too close proximity to the blast. A piece of timber came down among the debris, striking and killing Rowe. Had the men stood 10 feet further from the blast no fatality in this connection would be reported. Deceased was thirty-six years of age, married and born in England. The verdict of jury, "Killed by accident".

Peter Cardew and James Harrington were killed on the 29th day of April, 1896, at the Sec. 21 mine of the Lake Superior property. The victims of this accident were engaged at the 520 foot level and about 600 feet south of the shaft. They were working in a room three sets wide by two sets high, and were running their ground from surface. An unexpected rush of ground carried away the timbers and buried the men. Twelve hours were consumed in recovering the bodies. Both men were miners of good standing and especially reputed for care and thoroughness of workmanship. Cardew was of English nativity; Harrington was born in Ireland. They were forty-five years of age and married. Verdict of the jury: "Accidentally killed by a fall of ground."

Andrew Pavala was killed at the Queen mine on the 2nd day of June, 1896, by falling down chute No. 89, situated 500 feet north of shaft on level No. 4. He fell a distance of eighty feet and was instantly killed. Following is the verdict of the jury: "On account of his own carelessness, he not having good eyesight, ought to have been more careful, knowing there was an opening, as was known to all the men working there. No blame is attached to anyone." All the chutes at the Queen mine are protected by a strong rail fence in which only necessary openings are left for the accommodation of cars and wheelbarrows. Pavala was twenty-five years of age and single. He was born in Finland.

Charles Engman was killed at the Cleveland Lake mine on June 3, 1896. Deceased, with the electrician and bell-boy, Karen & Gray, were fixing a pulley for the rope of the pull-bell at a point about ten feet above the first level. Through a misunderstanding Gray signalled the skip down, which, when lowered, caught Engman and crushed him against the side of the shaft, and death was instantaneous. Deceased was twenty-five years of age, married and of Swedish nationality. Following is the verdict of jury: "Charles Engman came to his death on the 2nd day of June, 1896, at the Cleveland Lake shaft mine, accidentally, being struck while the skip was being lowered in said shaft."

Mattie Lind was killed at the Queen mine on June 16, 1896, by a fall of ground in stope No. 35. The fatality occurred while the deceased and his partners were completing the last set in their room, which was two sets wide, four long and five high. Lind was standing on lagging laid across sets on fourth tier and was making room for timber on tier above, when a small run of ground came down and struck him behind the head and carried him down to the level below, a distance of twenty-eight feet. "Accidentally killed by a fall of ground" was the verdict of the jury. Lind was thirty years of age, single and born in Finland.

John Gribble was killed at the Negaunee mine at 11 o'clock a. m., June 24th, 1896. He was struck by a falling rock about one ton in weight, while at work in No. 1 stope, 147 feet northeast of shaft on 3rd level. Deceased was about forty-five years of age, married and born in England. The jury found the death to be by "accident" and exonerated all parties from blame.

August Peterson died on the 4th day of July, 1896, from injuries received in the Republic mine the first of same month. Peterson was sitting, after a blast, under a portion of heavy ground, waiting for the trammers to fill the car standing on the track. It was his intention to go up the ladder already placed against the hanging wall to trim the ground after the departure of the car. While waiting, however, about twenty-five pounds of rock fell out of the roof and struck him. He was taken to surface and placed in the mine hospital, where he died on the date given above. No inquest was held. Peterson was forty-two years of age, married and Swedish origin.

Matt Larson was injured at the Champion mine on July 9th and died July 11th, 1896. The accident was singular in character. It appears that Larson was engaged on the 14th level and in east stope No. 6 of the mine. He had climbed to the top of a pile of ore in order to pull it down for the trammers, when the pile began to run carrying Larson along with it. In the descent he was struck with a boulder which inflicted internal injuries, said to have produced death. Deceased was a single man, born in Finland, and was about twenty-five years of age. There was no inquest.

John Jenkins died on the 11th day of July, 1896, from injuries received in the Jackson mine the previous day. Deceased was employed in stripping in the Band shaft preparatory to closing down, when a stretch of pipe, 1 1/2 inches in diameter and 100 feet long, slipped and caught him on the leg, necessitating amputation, which was followed by his death. Deceased was thirty years old, married and was born in England.

August Aho was killed at the Cleveland Lake shaft on the 5th of August, 1896. Aho, with his partners, was replacing timbers disturbed by a blast on the preceding shift, when a rock fell from the back, with result as above reported. Deceased was 35 years of age, single and of Finnish nationality. The jury declared that death was produced by accident.

John Kupio and John Meanapa were killed at the Section Sixteen property of the Lake Superior Iron Company's mines on the 13th day of August, 1896, by a premature blast. At the time of the accident the victims were engaged in the 3rd room of the 480 foot level. They were careful men and excellent miners and no reason appears for the unexpected explosion by which they met death. Kupio was 42 years of age and Meanapa had passed his forty-fifth birthday. They were both married and born in Finland. Verdict of the jury: "Accidentally killed by a premature blast."

The increase in the total of fatal accidents this year compared with last is a matter worthy of note. The figures for year ending Sept. 30, 1895, show 12 deaths only by accident, while those for the year ending Sept. 30, 1896, show a total of 25 deaths by accident.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF MINES.
To the Honorable Board of Supervisors.
Marquette County, Mich.

Negaunee, Mich., Oct. 1st, 1897.

Gentlemen—It is my honor to submit my annual report as inspector of mines, for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30th, 1897.

Accidents, Nature and cause:

Accident No. 1. On Oct. 16th, 1894, at the Jackson mine, open-pit, Joseph Rowe was engaged in shaking a hole and while clearing around the collar of the hole preparing for the charge, about one and one-half tons of rock tumbled out from the side just three feet above the place of operation, crushing Rowe to the ground and inflicting internal injuries from which he died the following day.

There was no inquest. Deceased was of English birth, thirty (30) years old and married, leaving a wife and one child.

No. 2. August Aili was killed at the Cleveland Lake Shaft on January 12th, 1897. Aili and his partner were working room 15 on the 170 foot level, 600 feet southeast of shaft. The room was four set wide and two set high and while mining for the third set the side of the second tier turned in and caught Aili, killing him instantly.

The fatality was due to the disregard of orders in reference to the lagging of the second set.

Aili was born in Finland, thirty-two (32) years old and married. Verdict of the jury, "Accidental death and company exonerated from all blame."

No. 3. On March 3rd, 1897, Edward Sibley died from injuries received at the Foster mine of the Iron Cliffs property. March 1st of the same year on the latter date, and at the time of the accident, Sibley was engaged on the seventh level, 365 feet from the surface, when a rock weighing 100 pounds came down the foot wall from a pillar on the fifth level, and struck Sibley on the head, producing a compound fracture of the skull, which resulted in his death.

Deceased was highly respected, of English birth, thirty years of age and single.

"No one to blame" was the verdict of the jury.

No. 4. At the Champion mine, March 16th, 1897, at seven o'clock p. m., Gust Lamila was killed by being caught between the wall plate and the cage at the ninth level, and falling from the ninth level to the sixteenth level. The cage was what is known as mining or as "double deck" cage; the fatality in this case having been due to the misunderstanding of the man on the upper deck, who signaled to surface to have the cage lowered at the very moment that Lamila was stepping from the lower deck of the cage to the level in question. The answer to the signal was prompt and caught Lamila before he had gained the level as stated above. Deceased was of Finnish birth, forty years old and married. No inquest.

No. 5. Matt Russle was killed at the Champion mine, March 23, 1897, by falling down number 4 shaft to the seventh level. The details of the accident are in a measure obscure. The last seen of the deceased before the finding of his body was when he took the ladders from the fourth level where he was engaged, to go to surface the cause of the fall therefore, cannot be ascertained beyond the supposition that he missed his footing from the man-hole to the surface at the collar of the shaft. Russle was a native of Finland, twenty-four years of age and single. No inquest.

No. 6. March 24, 1897. John Allo died from injuries received March 23 at the Ropes Gold mine. While engaged in dumping a car of dirt into the skip at the fifth level station, 300 feet from surface, the skip was hoisted without signal during the loading of the latter and crushed Allo between the car and the hanging wall, with results as stated above. Allo was a Finlander, forty-nine years of age and married. Verdict of the jury, "Accidental death."

No. 7. Elias Lockie was killed May 27, 1897, at seven o'clock a. m., in the Cleveland Lake mine, number 8 raise, second level 520 feet southwest of shaft. Lockie with his partners were raising from the second to the first level, carrying an opening four by seven feet and were thirty-six feet from the back of the second level to the top of the raise. On the date of the accident, Lockie was climbing up the ladder road for the place of mining, when he fell out of the ladder to the level below and struck with his side to the point of a lagging pole. He lived to reach the surface but expired at 11:45 o'clock the same morning. Lockie was born in Finland, thirty years old and married. Verdict of the jury, "No one to blame."

No. 8. At the Cleveland Lake Shaft on June 14, 1897, Saila Sippla was killed by falling against the trolley wire at No. 2 chute, second level, 550 feet northwest of shaft. Verdict of the jury, "Killed by accidentally falling against the trolley wire. The company is exonerated from blame." Deceased was a Finlander by birth, twenty-one years of age and single.

No's 9 and 10. Henry Aja and Ablano Kyemanen were killed June 21, 1897, by a fall of rock at the Ropes Gold mine. They were laborers and were following orders in removing rock from the sixteenth level that had been barred down from the back by the shift-boss and his helpers, who had spent five days in trimming the ground preparatory to putting in timber and had supposed that everything was secure. About a ton of loose dirt however, dropped from the back, fully sixty feet above, crushing Aja and Kyemanen and producing immediate death. Deceased were both Finlanders by birth, aged thirty and thirty-five years respectively, neither being married. Verdict, "Accidental death."

No's 11 and 12. These occurred at the Champion mine, June 30, 1897, at the sixteenth level west of number seven shaft, by a piece of ore weighing ten tons in all falling from a slip in back of slope and coming down upon three trammers there engaged, Holomon M. Sarri, Maikki Sarri and Oscar Hill. Hill recovered from injuries received, Maikki Sarri died the day following that of the accident, while Solomon Sarri was instantly killed. Deceased were born in Finland, thirty years old and single. No inquest.

No. 13. At Winthrop mine, open pit, July 15, 1897, Anton Olson was killed by a premature blast while shaking a hole sixteen feet deep. The sticks of powder had been placed in a hole and

the exploder, had been already ignited, when in his haste to push the exploder containing the ignited fuse to the point of contact with the charge at the bottom of the hole, the rod in Olson's hand was pressed too heavily upon the cap and precipitated the discharge which caused immediate death. Deceased was born in Norway, thirty-five years old and married. Verdict of the jury, "No one to blame."

No. 14. Vincent Sappitti was killed July 19, 1897, at the Lilly mine by falling down raise, number fourteen of shaft on fifth level, 300 feet from surface. The raise was up, twenty-five feet from back of level. His death occurred the day following the date of the accident. Deceased was born in

Italy, thirty-five years old and married. No inquest.

No. 15. At the Negaunee mine August 6, 1897, Isaac Isaccson was engaged on the eighth level, 450 feet east by inclined shaft and with his partners were cutting out for a set of timber on the cell floor, when about 500 pounds of ore fell from the back, a part of which struck Isaccson behind the ear, producing a flow of blood which ended in death before medical aid could reach him. Isaccson was born in Finland, was forty years of age and married. Verdict of the jury, "Company exonerated from blame."

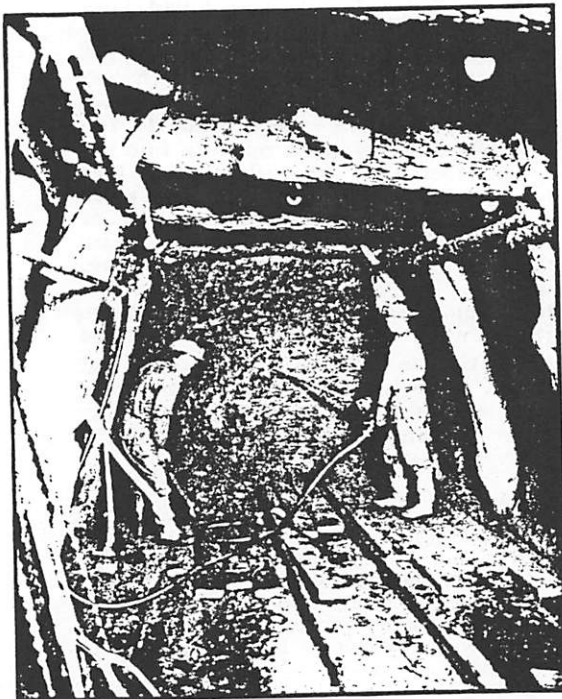
No. 16. August 13, 1897, at the Salisbury mine, Gust Ostland fell ten feet from the brakeman's platform to the drum pit, while attempting to escape from flying steam released through a broken elbow of the steam pipe. He died the following day from the effects of injuries received. Deceased was born in Sweden, was thirty-nine years of age and married. Verdict of the jury, "No one to blame."

No. 17. Jas. Harrington was killed Sept. 11, 1897 at the Lake Superior mine, Hematite property. Harrington and his partner Wm. Bone, were removing pillars on the 300 foot level, 320 feet east of the shaft, and on the date in question a solid piece of ore of about 500 pounds weight came down from the side of the pillar on which Harrington was engaged, killing him instantly. Deceased was born in Ireland, forty-eight years old and married. Verdict of the jury was that Harrington came to his death by a piece of ore falling from a pillar, the company being exonerated from all blame.

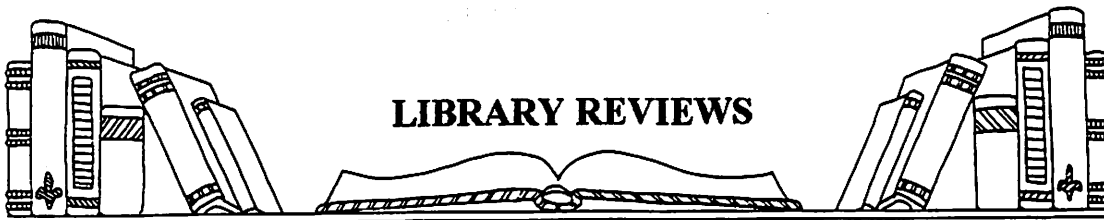

DELAYED BIRTH RECORDS

Are you looking for the birth record of someone who was still living in 1940?

Delayed birth certificates are certificates that are filed many years after the birth of people who do not have the original certificate on file. They are issued after affidavits are sworn by relatives or doctors who were present at the birth or upon proof of birth from a baptismal certificate or family Bible record. In the United States, Social Security cards were issued to all citizens in 1940. To obtain a Social Security card, citizens had to provide a birth certificate. Those who did not have one on file had to go to their county clerk's office to have one registered. Therefore, check the 1940 index for those lost United States births you have been unable to find. People born as early as 1858 had to register their births in 1940.

Editors Note: I was able to find my grandmother's birth listed this way in Wisconsin, since the original birth record in 1895 was not recorded. She applied for a new certificate in 1940, so that she would be able to get her Social Security number.

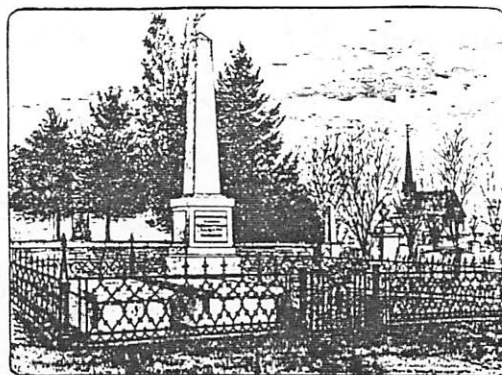
Status of Library Move:

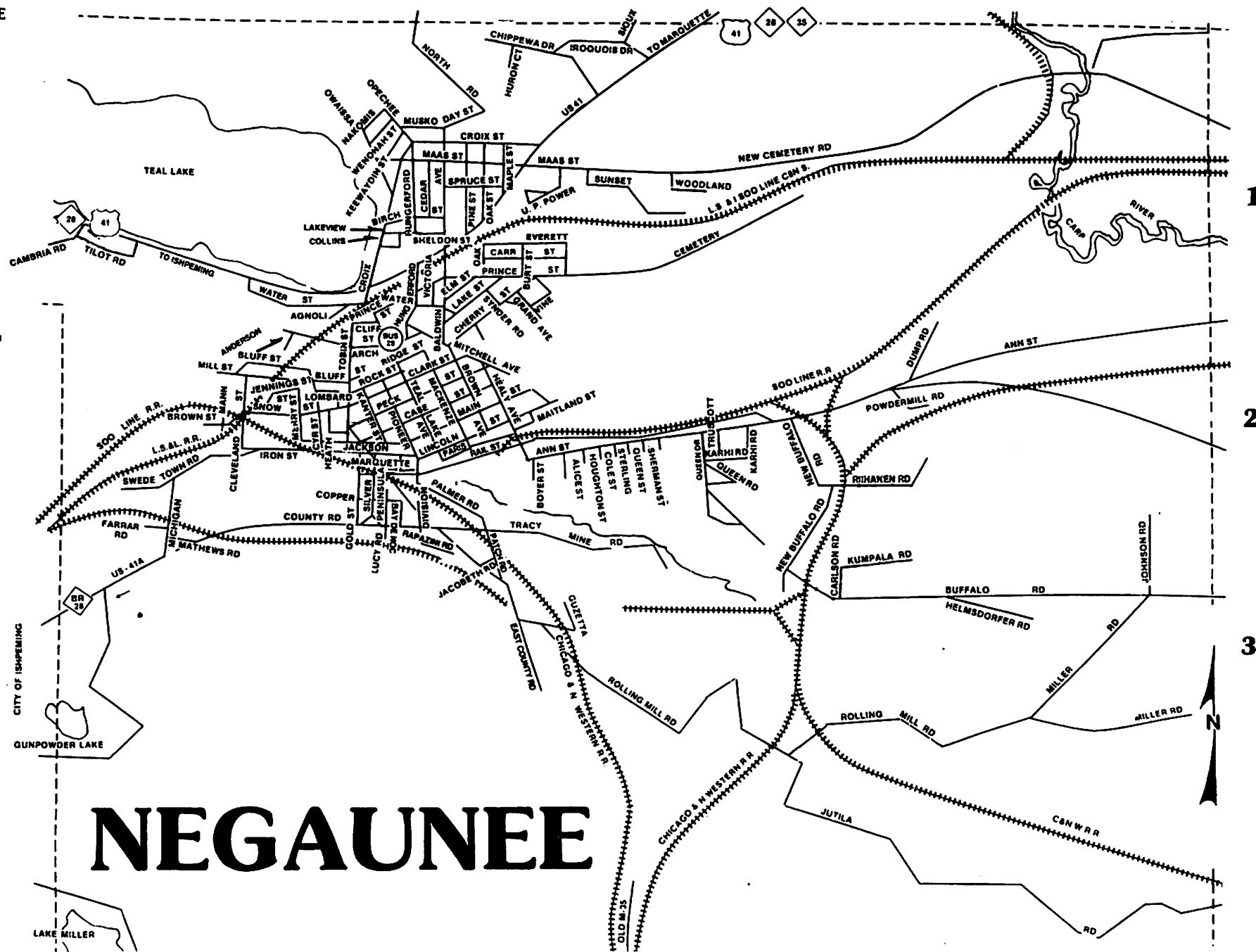

MARQUETTE COUNTY MINE INSPECTOR REPORTS

The iron mining industry has been crucial in determining the development of Marquette County, beginning with the discovery of iron ore in Negaunee in 1844, to the present. The Marquette County Board of Supervisors annually reviewed and published reports from all the county officers, including the Mine Inspector. These reports can be a good genealogical source, because many of the yearly reports list names and dates of the miners who died during that year in mine accidents.

MINE INSPECTOR'S REPORT

Ishpeming Mich., October 1st, 1898.

To the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County—GENTLEMEN:

It is my honor to submit the following official report of my doings as inspector of mines for Marquette County during the year ending September 30th, 1898:

ACCIDENTS.

Nos. 1 and 2. Gus Murtamaki and Gus Sarkala, were killed at 10:30 a. m. October 21st, 1897, preparing to blast in No. 23 stope, southwest, on first level of the Cleveland Lake mine, the stope was two sets wide, eight sets long and five sets high. It was No. 23 stope that was blasted in and caught the two men in No. 11 stope, mud running in and burying them up. Two men in No. 22 stope got clear. Verdict of the jury, no one to blame. Nationality of the two men killed, Finnish.

No. 3. Alexander Johnson, was killed at 10:30 a. m. in No. 5 open pit, of the Champion mine 100 feet from surface, October 30th, 1897. Johnson was engaged in picking down a loose pile of ore, when the ore started to run, carrying him with it and burying him up. No inquest.

No. 4. Matt Ryan was killed in No. 7 shaft, at 8 o'clock a. m., December 23d, 1897, in the Champion mine, falling from first to the third level and was killed instantly. He was engaged in repairing shaft with timbermen, age 24 years. Irish. No inquest.

No. 5. Herman Waske was killed in the northeast stope at the 17th level of No. 6 shaft, on the 30th of January, 1898, whilst wheeling ore to mill and a piece of ground fell out of the back and struck him on the head killing him instantly. One of his partners claimed to have examined the back twice in that shift and thought it to be safe. Deceased was born in Sweden, age 23 years. No inquest.

No. 6. John Hancock was injured in the Cambria mine, on February the 14th, 1898, at the ninth level. The young man was engaged as skip tender. The trammers pushed the car too far ahead and the skip coming up from below, caught the car and turning it over, jamming the poor fellow between the car and the side of the drift, dying from the injuries received the following day. Deceased was unmarried, English and was eighteen years of age. Verdict of the jury, accidental death.

No. 7. Richard Chard was killed in the Republic mine, on February 15th, 1898. Mr. Chard was engaged at the time of the accident, repairing a skip road in the Morgan pit. He and his partner had descended a short time before in the skip and did some work and were returning to surface. One of the casing planks had become loosened at the bottom end from the time the skip was lowered until it was hoisted. The end of it resting on the sleeper by the side of the stringer, the rear wheel of skip climbing the plank, which was of a greater angle than the skip road, throwing the skip off the track and deceased in the shift. He was found some distance below between the stringers. Deceased was a married man, English nationality, age 50 years. No inquest.

No. 8. Thomas Casey was killed on February 20th, 1898. Mr. Casey was employed as bellman at the top fork of "B" shaft, Cliffs Shaft mine. He had come to surface to eat his supper at midnight, and after finishing his supper he started to go to the shaft and in passing out of the engine house stooped to pass under a pump rod when he fell on his stomach and made no effort to get from under it, the rod descending caught and pulled him into the depression in the floor, breaking his back. Mr. Casey was a married man of Irish nationality, aged 57. No inquest.

No. 9. Andrew Isaksson, aged 45 years, married and of Finnish nationality, was killed on February 23rd, 1898, at the 10th level of the Salisbury mine. Deceased was engaged in charging a hole, when the powder from some cause unknown, exploded, killing him instantly. The verdict of the jury was, accidental death by a premature explosion.

No. 10. Nils Aho was killed at the 14th level of No. 6 shaft at the Champion mine, on March 11th, 1898, in the following manner: The unfortunate man was engaged "jacking up a drill post", when the jack bar slipped and he fell over the stope, a distance of about 40 feet and fractured his skull. Deceased was 34 years of age, of Swedish nationality. No inquest.

No. 11. Otto Saumpra, was killed at the Lillie mine, on April 5th, 1898, at one hundred and fifty feet from shaft. He and his partner were engaged in repairing a drift, when the timbers from some unknown cause, gave way. He tried to make his escape, but was caught by the falling timbers and ore, and to all appearances was suffocated. About one hour and thirty minutes was required to recover the body. Deceased was of Finnish nationality, aged 30 years and was married. Verdict of the jury was, accidental death by a fall of ground.

No. 12. H. Matson died on June 10 from injuries received in the Lillie mine about two weeks previous to date. Mr. Matson was engaged mining ore, but it became necessary for him and his partner to repair the raise through which they went to and from their place of work. In order to do the work they had to remove a ladder from its place in the raise and when the repairing was accomplished they replaced the ladder, but to all appearances it was not securely fastened. Deceased was descending when this particular ladder loosened, falling to the bottom of the raise and deceased with it, a distance of fifty feet, fracturing his skull. Matson had passed his 30th year, was married, and born in Sweden. No inquest.

No. 13. William Gill was killed at the Cliffs Shaft Mine, in "B" shaft, on June 25th, 1898. The young man was a trammer and was working on the night shift, and went to the shaft about 15 minutes to seven o'clock, a. m., preparatory to going to the surface on the cage. The cage at the time was being used in hoisting men from the level below, and he with some other men were waiting their turn to be hoisted to surface. Gill sat on a timber near the shaft with his partner, and after sitting there a few minutes he suddenly arose and walked toward shaft; some one called to him but he paid no attention to the call, and walked directly into the

shaft. It was generally supposed that at the time the poor fellow was in a state of stupor. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death. Deceased was 18 years of age, of English extraction and unmarried.

No. 14. Charles Niquist, was killed in the Lake Superior hematite mine on June 30th, 1898. Niquist was a miner and at the time of the accident was engaged with others in clearing a chute which had become choked with ore. They had attempted to clear it by pushing a bar down through it, but failed to move it. Niquist then stepped on the ore in the chute, when the ore suddenly loosened, precipitating him with the ore to the bottom of the chute, a portion of the ore following him, covering him and suffocated him. Deceased was unmarried, of Swedish nationality and 22 years of age. Verdict of the jury, accidental death.

No. 15. Richard Stevens, met death at the Lake Angelino mine on July 18, 1898. Mr. Stevens was a miner and had left his place of work and gone to the shaft to get some timber from the surface. When he got there skip was at the same level with a piece of timber in it. The men were unable to lift it out. They then rung the skip up to a certain point, intending to place a rope around the timber, throw the other end of it over a cap, or something of that sort, then lower the skip and pull it out. Stevens volunteered to assist them in getting it out of the skip. They then rung one bell. In the mean time Stevens put one foot on the skip and the other on the level, as he did so the skip started upward, throwing him in the shaft and killing him instantly. Stevens was a married man, of English nationality, age 35 years. Verdict, accidental death.

No. 16. Charles Runbeck was killed at the 14th level in No. 7 shaft in the Champion mine on July 30th, 1898. The sinking rope had been disengaged from the bucket and attached to a 28 stave ladder at a point four staves from the bottom, the top of the ladder was lashed to the rope. Deceased stood on the ladder about its middle, while it was being hoisted. In hoisting, the top of the ladder caught against the shieve and the stave to which the rope was attached broke, allowing the ladder to fall to the bottom of the shaft and deceased with it. He fell on top the bucket and was instantly killed. Deceased was a Finlander, unmarried, 28 years of age. No inquest.

No. 17. Joseph Malotto, was killed at the Lake Superior Section 16 mine on August 12, 1898. Malotto was a trammer. It was his duty to tram from different parts of the mine. At the time of the accident he, with his partner, were filling the car through an opening in the lap of short stull at the bottom of the raise. It seems that the ore did not come freely enough to suit him, so he went on the stull to free it. In doing so he forced a piece of loose ground, which turned out on him, killing him instantly. Deceased was an Italian, unmarried and 22 years of age. Verdict of the jury was accidental death by a fall of ground.

Nos. 18 and 19. August Carlson and Charles Olsen, were killed east of No. 4 shaft at the 11th level in the Salisbury mine on September 17th, 1898. The accident happened in the following manner: They were engaged in scrambling ore of the hanging wall, but at the time of the accident they were apparently filling the car from a chute standing in the main drift when some dirt or ore either rolled or fell from above and knocked off the cap, letting the loose dirt and timber down upon them and covered them over. It took some time to recover the bodies, and to all appearances they were suffocated. They were married men, of Swedish nationality, ages 35 and 36 years respectively. Verdict of the jury, accidental death.

My official visits from January 15th, 1898, to September 30th, 1898, were one hundred and seventy-one and those of James H. Rough, my predecessor, from October 1st, 1897, to January 15th, 1898, fifty-eight—total number of visits two hundred and twenty-nine. This against two hundred and forty-one for the year ending September 30th, 1897, makes a difference of twelve visits. The reason for this may be readily seen when you remember the office was not daily attended to from January 1st to January 15, 1898. The number of accidents for the year ending September 30th, 1898, were nineteen and those of 1897 were seventeen, an increase of two, but taking into consideration the number of men employed, the percentage of fatalities per one thousand are about equal. The nature of a number of accidents for the past year is a matter that invites consideration from you. I find in general, that those in charge of mining operations in the county are ready and willing to adopt any precautionary measures for the prevention of accidents. This fact has given me much satisfaction.

MINE INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

Ishpeming, Mich., Oct. 1, 1899.

To the honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette, Mich.:

GENTLEMEN:—It is my honor to submit the following official report of my doings as inspector of mines for Marquette county during the year ending September 30th, 1899.

ACCIDENTS.

No. 1. Joseph Pescha was injured on surface at the Republic mine on October 10, 1898, and died from the effects of the injury on October 13th of the same year. Deceased was a brakeman on a car which was being drawn by a horse from the shaft to a pocket. On this particular trip the horse fell and when it got on its feet jammed deceased between its rump and the car. Deceased was a French-Canadian. Was married. No inquest.

No. 2. A very distressing accident occurred at the Lake Superior Hematite mine on the morning of December 31st, 1898, when six men lost their lives by falling down a shaft. The names of the victims are as follows: Fred Seivo, age 27, Finnish, married; John Kulio, age 29, Finnish, married; John Kelemenpa, age 19, Finnish, single; Gust Johnson, age 31, Finnish, married; Jacob Makela, age 49, Finnish, married; Matt Tummi, age 24, Finnish, married. Five of the men were trammers and one a cage-tender and were working at the 444 ft. level. About five minutes to 6 o'clock in the morning they, in company with three other men, got onto the cage to go to surface. There is in this shaft a counter balance rope, one end of which is attached to the cage and the other to a weight of about 1,500 pounds. It is supposed, and in fact is almost certain, that in some manner this weight hung up until the cage was some distance from the bottom of the shaft. In the meantime the counter balance rope was being coiled on top and hanging over the side of the cage. Suddenly the weight became released from its place and shot down the shaft and snatched up the slack rope that had coiled on the cage, tearing off its top and tilting its floor to an angle of about 30 degrees. It is not known whether the poor men attempted to jump or were thrown from the cage. The three survivors received injuries and could not give a clear account as to how the accident occurred other than they thought it was caused by the counter balance rope dropping on the cage, as stated above. Verdict of jury, "accidental death."

No. 3. James King was hurt in the Cliffs Shaft mine about noon on January 10th, and died a few hours later. King was employed as a cage tender and bell ringer at A. shaft. He, with eleven other men, got on the cage to go to surface to dinner. The correct signal for hoisting men is five bells, but the lander and two other men working in shaft house claim there were only three bells rung, which is the signal for hoisting ore. In the shaft house there are two platforms or landings, the upper one for landing ore and the lower for men. A signal of three bells was given to the engineer to hoist. In passing the lower platform, King, so it was stated, attempted to get off the cage, which was in the meantime ascending. In passing the upper landing his legs were caught between the floor of the cage and timbers of platform, almost severing them from his body. Deceased was of English birth, 58 years of age, and married. No inquest.

No. 4. Andrew Isaacson was killed at the Princeton mine January 10th, 1899. He and his partners were employed as miners. At the time of the accident they were engaged in putting in a set of timbers before removing a leg to make room to use a wheelbarrow to wheel the ore from a crosscut they were about to put in. The crosscut was already in three sets. They had put in the set and removed the leg and were cleaning up the loose dirt under this set, when suddenly the set fell, letting down the ore on deceased. The timber was not broken, and it appears they had neglected or forgotten to put in studdals to secure the set, as there were no studdals found amongst the ore which had fallen. Deceased was a Finn, 35 years of age and married. Verdict of jury, "deceased came to his death by accident caused by a fall of ground and the company exonerated from all blame."

No. 5. Fred Philip was killed in the Lake Superior Sec. 21 mine on February 1st, 1899. Philip was a trammer working on the night shift. Between 4 and 5 o'clock a. m. he and three other men got on the skip to go to surface. They have a double set of bells for hoisting men, four and three bells on the electric line to the engineer, and four bells on the pull line to the lander. Deceased rang three bells only to the engineer, so it was claimed, and four bells on pull line to the lander. This caused the engineer to believe there was a skip of ore to be hoisted. Accordingly the skip was not stopped at the first landing on top of the shaft, but proceeded to the dump. The lander, knowing there were men on the skip, rang one bell to the engineer and the skip was stopped between the platform and dump. It is supposed Philip attempted to get off the skip while the same was in motion and in some manner was caught between skip and timbers of shaft house. Deceased was an Italian, 26 years of age and unmarried. Verdict of jury, "accidental death."

No. 6. Peter Kauppi was fatally injured Feb. 25th, 1899, in No. 7 shaft, Champion mine. He was riding down in a bucket and a short board fell from the 19th level, striking him on the side, knocking him from the bucket, and he fell to the bottom of the shaft, a distance of about thirty feet, striking on his head, and fractured his skull, from which injuries he died on July 28, 1899.

No. 7. William J. Bennetts was injured in "A" shaft of the Lake Angeline mine between the second and fourth levels on March 14th, and died at 3 p. m. on the same day. Bennetts was engaged at the time of the accident trimming ore off cribbing of a raise, which had stuck to it from constant dumping. His object in doing this was to make it safe to go still further down the raise, to a point where the raise was choked, to try and clear it. Bennetts was lowered into the raise on a seat or swing stage, which consisted of a two-inch plank, thirty-four inches long, by one foot wide. Slots or notches were cut in each corner of this board or stage. Ropes were set in those slots, passing underneath it, and forming loops above the stage. These ropes were fastened in the slots with nails, to prevent them from getting out of position. To these ropes was fastened another rope, the bite of which was in a block hung to a cap. The other end was made fast to a winch and by this appliance Bennett was lowered

into the raise. When about twenty feet from the top he called "stop," when he commenced trimming down the ore which had adhered to the cribbing. He was lowered still further, when he called the second time to stop, which call was obeyed, and re-commenced to trim down the ore, when he suddenly fell off the stage on to the ore in the raise, a distance of seventy feet. He was speedily removed to the surface and quickly conveyed to the hospital, where he died. Deceased was of English birth, 42 years of age, and married. Verdict of jury, was "accidental death," the company being exonerated from all blame.

No. 8. Thomas Peters was killed in "A" shaft of the Lake Angeline mine, at the second level, on March 29th, 1899. Peters was a miner, and the room in which he worked was one "tier" wide. He was taking out the third set of the second "tier" in height. They had blasted a hole and returned after the blast and trammed one car of ore, his partner filling the car. It was Peter's turn to fill the next car and he was in the act of getting on the first "tier" to fill the car, when there was a fall of ore and sand, which caught Peters and held him fast. His partner started to pull him out, but failed to do so. The ore and sand continued to fall until Peters was completely covered and smothered. About two hours were spent in recovering his body. Peters was of English birth, twenty-eight years of age, and single. Verdict of jury, "accidental death by fall of ground," and exonerating the company from blame.

No. 9. William Chapman received an injury in the Negaunee mine on the 19th day of April, 1899, and died at his home on the same date. Chapman was a miner, working at the 8th level, on contract No. 10, seven hundred feet northwest from shaft. The room was two sets wide and two "tiers" high. At the time of the accident he and his partner were engaged clearing away ore from the timbers, so as to stand a leg, when a piece of ore turned out of the "breast" on to Chapman. After a short time the ore was removed and he was taken to the shaft, and sent to surface, and, as soon as possible, to his home, where he died the same day, as stated above. Deceased was of English birth, 49 years of age, and was married. Verdict of jury, "Chapman came to his death by the falling of a piece of ore from the 'breast,'" the company exonerated from all blame.

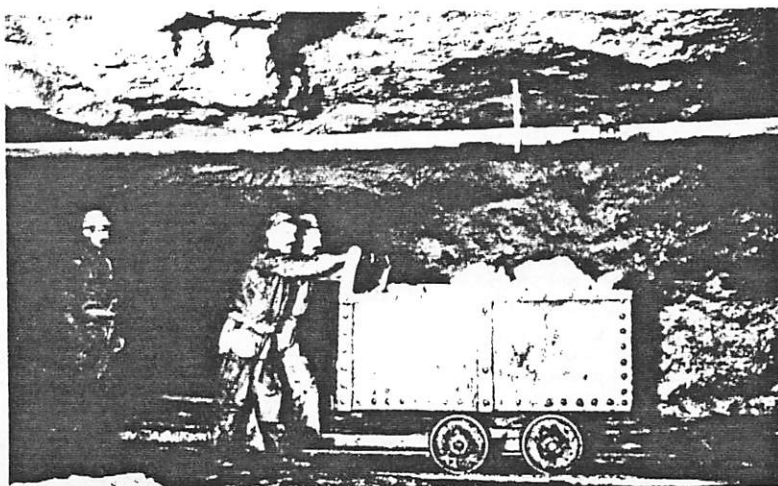
No. 10. George Johnson was injured in the Lake Superior Hematite mine, at the 300 foot level, April 26th, 1899, and died from the effects of the injury at 1:30 p. m. on the same date. Deceased was a trammer, taking the ore from a chute. The car being full, he was running it from the chute to the main line, where it was taken by rope haulage to the hoisting shaft. Deceased was riding on the front end of the car, and when passing No. 1 chute, instead of standing erect, he was in a stooping attitude and was caught between the car and chute timbers. Deceased was a Finlander, 48 years old, and married. Verdict of the jury, "Johnson came to his death by being caught between the timbers and car," no blame attached to anyone.

11. John Johnson.....

surface at the Lake Superior Hard Ore mine, May 22, 1899. Johnson was a rope splicer and high worker. At the time he was superintending the raising of a "gin pole." Standing on the crusher building, which was about 35 feet from the ground, he was struck either by a chain or the pole and fell off the building to the ground, which resulted in his death. Johnson was a married man, about 42 years of age, and of Swedish nationality.

No. 12. Walfred Pepin was injured on June 12, 1899, at the Princeton mine, and died later on the same date. The boy was working in the woods with his father, chopping wood. His father felled a tree and the boy ran in the wrong direction and was caught by it and received the injuries from which he died. The boy was about 16 years of age, and of French nationality.

No. 13. Frank Carrello received an injury in "C" shaft of the Lake Angeline mine on June 17, 1899, which resulted in his death a few hours later. Carrello was a trammer, working at the 6th level. He and his partner had come to the shaft with a car of ore. They did not have control of the car, it striking the dump block with great force, and was thrown into the skip. They were engaged in getting the car out when the accident occurred. They tied the end of a rope to the car, the other end of which was attached to a winch, and in this manner tried to pull it out, but could not, the skip being a little too low down the shaft. Carrello instructed the skip tender to hoist the skip a little. The proper signal was given and the skip was hoisted, but not quite far enough. The signal was given the second time to hoist, and Carrello at this time had hold of the crank of the winch. The engine tightened the rope leading from the car to the winch and jerked the crank out of his hands, the crank striking him on the head, fracturing his skull. Deceased was a native of Italy, was 24 years of age, and was married. Verdict of jury was, "deceased came to his death by being struck on the head by a winch crank."



No. 14. Fred Rice was instantly killed in the Negaunee mine on June 21st, 1899, at 7:10 o'clock a. m. Rice had just stepped off the cage at the first level with others. Their object in getting off at this level was that they had boxes of powder with them, which were kept there until wanted. Each took up his box and started towards the place where the powder was kept, when someone in the lead

asked if the chain was put in position. Rice, being the rear one, dropped his box and returned to put the chain in place. He walked past the chain and into the shaft, falling a distance of 50 feet, and was instantly killed. This chain was placed there as a safeguard, to prevent persons from walking into the shaft. Rice was of English birth, 40 years of age, and was married. Verdict of jury, "accidental death."

No. 15. Joseph Lomprey was killed in the crusher building July 6th, 1899, at the Champion mine. He was tramping from No. 5 shaft, when the car from No. 5 shaft (the car he was on) ran into the car from No. 6 shaft, which had been dumped and was standing in front of the crusher screen, with such force as to throw Lomprey from his car onto the screen, killing him instantly. On account of No. 5 and No. 6 shaft cars being tramped in the same track at crusher, it is customary for trammers on either to assure themselves that the other car is not at crusher before he takes his own car there. This is particularly necessary in case of the No. 5 car, because its track under the crusher building is on a curve, and the No. 6 car could not be seen, were it standing there, until too late to stop the No. 5 car. Whether Lomprey had taken the usual precautions on this occasion is open to question. Some of the men say he did, and some do not know. The fact is undisputed that the No. 6 car had been dumped by its trammers just previous to the accident, but was only in process of being prepared for removal when it was struck by Lomprey's car. When this occurred the No. 6 car was forced up against the timbers of the building and stuck there, thus making a sudden stoppage for Lomprey's car. It was this sudden stop that threw Lomprey from his car on the screen before the crusher, and caused his death. Deceased was of French nationality. No inquest.

No. 16. James Pryor was killed in the East End Lake Angeline mine, on July 8th, 1899. Deceased was a miner working in a stope at top of No. 7 raise west, and was in two sets from raise. He had finished his "shift's" work and was about to go down the raise to go to surface, and in some unaccountable manner fell in the raise to the level below, a distance of 36 feet, breaking his neck, killing him almost instantly. Nationality, English. He was 52 years of age, and married. Verdict of jury, "accidental death by falling down raise."

No. 17. Abraham Aho was injured in "A" shaft of the Cliffs Shaft mine July 21st, 1899, and died on Sunday, the 23rd day of the same month. Aho was a trammer at the second level, and had come to the shaft with a car of ore to send to surface on the cage. The cages in this mine are lowered very slowly in passing the different levels from which the ore is being hoisted, to allow the cages to set easily on the catches. At this particular time the cage was descending so slowly that Aho had ample time to raise the bar to allow the car to be pushed onto the cage, but forgot to throw in the latches. The cage, of course, continued to descend. Aho, thinking the car was on the catches, pushed the car into the shaft. He, supposing the cage was there, followed the car into the shaft, falling to the third level, a distance of 40 feet. Deceased was a Finlander, 26 years of age, and was married. Verdict of jury, "accidental death."

No. 18. Joseph Jacques was killed at the 17th level in No. 6 shaft of the Champion mine on July 28th, 1899. Jacques was a trammer. Miners were employed blasting down a floor at the 14th level, the ore dropping down to the 17th level. There is a drift driven into the hanging of the shaft of the 17th level and is connected with the old workings underneath the floor above mentioned. In this drift near the old workings there is quite a large room blasted out and a rock platform built, about the height of the car, for the reception of the ore, there being solid ground over the trammer. The opening leading from the drift to the old workings was constantly kept filled with ore, but at this time there was a hole between the top of the pile of ore and the brow of the room, through which a piece of rock fell from above. His partners got away safely, but Jacques took shelter behind the car; the piece of rock striking the car, knocking it over on him, killing him instantly. Deceased was a French-Canadian, 28 years old, and married. No inquest.

No. 19. Henry Johnson was killed in the Champion mine on August 11, 1899. Deceased was an ore or rock picker, and had completed his shift's work, and was on the skip on the way to surface, with five others. He and two others were riding on the bail of the skip. When passing a certain point in No. 7 shaft he was caught between the top of the skip and the framed timber of a shieve, and was instantly killed. Deceased was a Finlander, 16 years of age, and single. No inquest.

No. 20. Matt Wilson was killed in the Prince of Wales mine on August 12th, 1899, in room No. 4 at the fourth level. Deceased was a miner engaged in taking out a pillar of ore. He and his partners had driven a drift or room, two sets wide through the pillar, and two sets high and one set wide on top timbers, and was engaged in taking out the first set of the second tier on top timbers. Men in No. 8 room had blasted a hole and all the men in No. 8 and No. 4 went down in the main drift during the time of blasting. After the blast Wilson went up to his place to charge a hole, and while thus engaged a large quantity of ore or rock fell in No. 8 room, striking the timbers which were connected with the timbers leading through the pillar, and those in No. 4 room, and forced them out of plumb, causing the timbers in No. 4 room to fall. Wilson must have seen or heard the timbers moving, and ran back into the old room, and was caught by the falling timbers. Had he stayed in his place nothing would have happened to him, for the timbers were all standing, and no ore or rock had fallen. Deceased was a Finlander, 21 years of age, married. Verdict of jury, "accidental death."

No. 21. John Johnson was fatally injured September 19th, 1899, at the 22nd level No. 5 shaft, Champion mine. While cutting a hole in the rock to put up a machine, a small piece of rock fell from the hanging wall and struck him on the head,

causing him to fall about ten feet, striking on his head and fracturing his skull, from which injuries he died the next day. The deceased was a Finlander. No inquest.

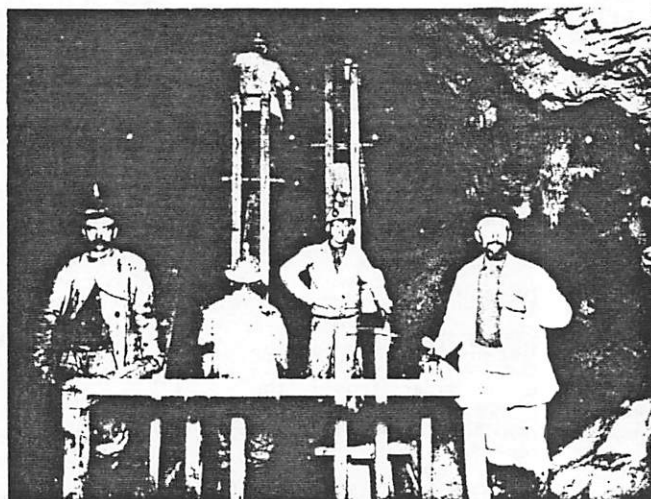

My official visits for the year ending September 30, 1899, are 246. The past year has been one of great activity in the mines of this county. A number of idle mines have resumed operations and the number of men employed has been largely increased. Explorations are being prosecuted in various places in the county, and some of them have prospects of a bright future.

It will be noticed that in the 26 fatal accidents nine occurred on skips and cages, four on surface, five fall-

ing in shafts and chutes. It is with sorrow that I have to report the loss of so many valuable lives. In my visits to the mines I have been kindly and courteously received and materially aided in making a careful inspection, and suggestions relative to changes for the prevention of accidents and the protection of men have been cheerfully complied with.

The records are the result of hearings into the worst maritime disaster in US history, in which between 1,500 and 5,000 passengers perished on April 29, 1865. The *Sultana* was transporting Union soldiers who had been released from Southern prisons in Cahaba, Meridian and Andersonville at the close of the war. The soldiers were being transported to their home in Michigan, Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio, Tennessee, and West Virginia. The ship went down just north of Memphis, Tennessee. This could be a source for that missing Union soldier.....

Burton Historical Collection Update

This renowned collection of materials for Detroit, Michigan and Great Lakes regional history and genealogy, is housed at the Detroit Public Library. Due to a flood in July 2000, the collection was unavailable to the public until December 2000. Since then the Detroit Public Library has limited hours that the collection can be used. An advisory committee has been formed to investigate the closure and short hours, the huge backlog of uncatalogued books, the chronic understaffing, the freeze on the Burton Endowment Fund, and the misguided use of this fund. The Burton Historical Collection was established in 1921 by Clarence Burton, with the purpose of purchasing books, periodicals, pamphlets, manuscripts and other historical material involving American and Canadian history and genealogy. 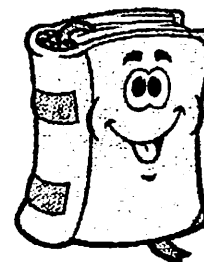

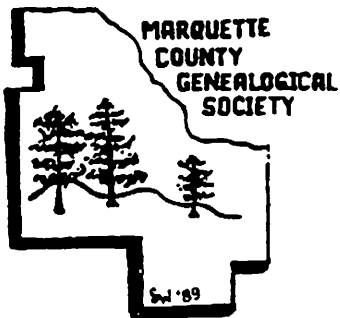

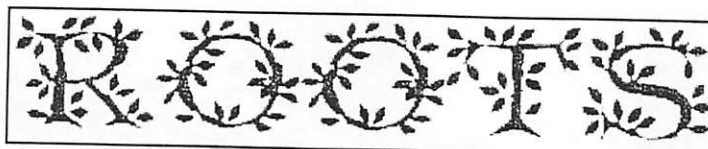
Our Annual Christmas Party will be held at the Northwoods Supper Club on December 19th at 6:30 PM. Watch for further announcements. Hope to see many of you there.

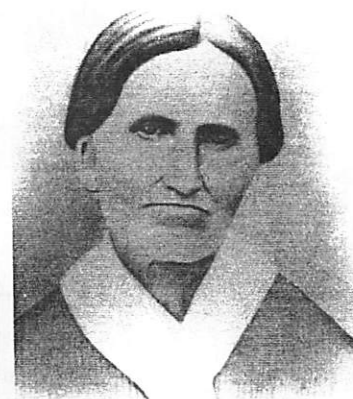

MARQUETTE COUNTY MINE INSPECTOR REPORTS

The iron mining industry has been crucial in determining the development of Marquette County, beginning with the discovery of iron ore in Negaunee in 1844, to the present. The Marquette County Board of Supervisors annually reviewed and published reports from all the county officers, including the Mine Inspector. These reports can be a good genealogical source, because many of the yearly reports list names and dates of the miners who died during that year in mine accidents.

MINE INSPECTOR'S REPORT.
To honorable Board of Supervisors of the
County of Marquette:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit the following official report of my doings as inspector of mines of Marquette county during the year ending Sept. 30, 1900.

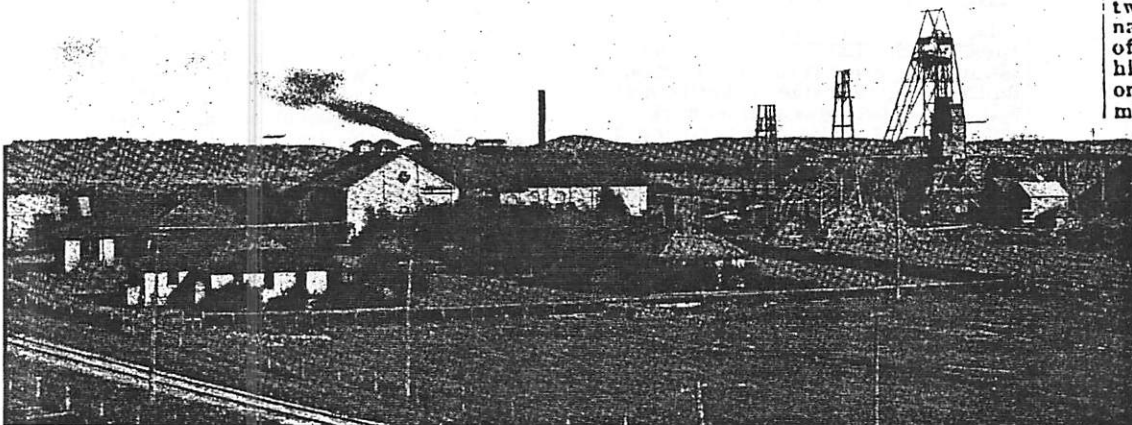
ACCIDENTS.

1. Simon Kinsman was instantly killed in the Champion mine on Oct. 11 at 11:45 a. m. Mr. Kinsman, who was in charge of the shift was riding on the skip to surface in No. 5 shaft accompanied by Mr. Walter Fitch, superintendent. Both were standing on the bale of the skip which was their usual custom. When the skip reached the second level from surface it came in contact with the steam pipe which supplied the mine pumps. This pipe had been under repairs since 9 a. m. on account of a leak. A timberman, his assistant and a mechanic had been attending to it. They found it necessary to disconnect it at a joint and had left it disconnected to go to dinner. It was probably at this point that the pipe came in contact with the skip, the latter in its progress buckling the pipe up until the increased tension on the rope was noticed by the brakeman who instantly stopped the skip. The vibration of the skip bale threw both Mr. Kinsman and Mr. Fitch off the bale, the pipe probably pushing the former off altogether, as he fell down the shaft and was instantly killed. Mr. Fitch fell astride the lip of the skip with his arm over the bale, and thus was saved from falling farther. The timbermen claim they left the pipe all right and this would seem to be the case as the skip had just made two trips with men immediately preceding the one to which the accident occurred. Mr. Kinsman was of English nationality, was married and fifty-six years of age. No inquest.

2. John Williams was killed in a shaft of the Cliffs shaft mine at 5th level in No. 8 contract on the 27th day of November, 1900. Williams had no steady place in the mine, but was used as a stemmer, taking the place of some one who was absent from the mine. He and his partner had examined their place of work and had trimmed down the loose pieces of ore caused by previous blasting and had rigged up the tripod preparatory to drilling. They then went back in the level about 100 feet for the drilling machine which was elevated on a barrel to make it easy and convenient to put it on their shoulders. The machine was taken off the barrel and placed on their shoulders. Deceased immediately fell and in all probability machine fell upon him, striking him on the head fractured his skull and died from the effects of the blow. Deceased was of English nationality, 19 year of age unmarried. Verdict of the jury, accidental death.

3. Fred Carlson was killed on Dec. 7th, 1900 in contract No. 20, first level in Cleveland Lake mine. The room in which he worked was two sets square. They had just completed timbering in the fourth set on top timbers when they heard the timbers crack. After examination they saw that one of the caps had cracked. His partner went down on the cell floor to get a prop to stand under the fractured cap. When he returned Carlson was engaged cleaning away the loose ore to stand the prop when without any further warning the cap broke knocking Carlson on his back, letting the ore and sand down upon him, completely covering him. At the same time his partner was knocked down the gangway on the cell floor receiving only slight injuries. The lagging on top of the bottom set had to be chipped to remove the body. About two and one-half hours was consumed in recovering the remains. Carlson was of Swedish nationality, twenty-six years of age and unmarried. The verdict of the jury was accidental death.

4. Alfred Gauthier received injuries in the north vein, on the first level of the Lake Angeline mine, on Dec. 11th, about eight o'clock p. m., and died from the effects of his injuries at the Ishpeming hospital a short time after. Gauthier was a miner working in top drift west. He was engaged timbering the drift. It was hard ore and two sets were already in place and preparations were being made for putting in the third set when a piece of ground slid off the side, the top of which was about four feet from bottom of drift and fell on deceased. He was quickly taken from underneath it and removed to surface, and from thence to the hospital. Shortly before the accident occurred deceased tried to bar down the same piece of ground but was unable to do so and he considered the place safe. Gauthier was a married man, twenty-six years of age and of French-Canadian descent. Verdict of jury, accidental death caused by fall of ground. ~~Standback lost his life by suffocation on the 31st day of Dec. 1899 at the 300 foot level Section 21 mine of the Lake Superior Iron Co. Deceased was engaged at the time of the accident was engaged with three others picking ore from a chute which had become packed from constant dumping. The raise or chute was 150 feet high, in which were three dumping stations of equal distances apart. The raise was at an angle of about 45 degrees so that a man could walk up or down its foot without the aid of a rope or ladder. Trammers were taking the ore from the chute as deceased and his partners were loosening it. There were three or four cars of ore at the bottom of the chute. Deceased was standing on this ore when the trammers started to run the ore from the chute into the car, making a circular hole up through it, and into this hole Standback was thrown, the ore on either side falling in upon him. One of his partners attempted to extract him but was unable to do so. By this time deceased was completely covered. His partner then attempted to uncover him and partially succeeded in doing so. Again the ore covered him. His partner then went down to the mouth of the chute at the bottom of the raise when the ore was run out and deceased came with it. He was found to be dead. Standback was twenty-four years of age, of Finnish nationality and unmarried. Verdict of the jury: Elias Standback came to his death by suffocation while picking ore from a chute in the Section 21 mine of the Lake Superior Iron Co.~~

6. John Buska was killed in B shaft, contract No. 17, in the Cliffs shaft mine at 9:45 a. m., Jan. 19, 1900. The room in which deceased met his death was twenty feet wide and about forty feet high. The back of the room is the hanging wall which is exceedingly flat at about 30 degrees with a jasper foot on one side and a pillar on the other. Buska was a miner but at this time was helping the trammers clean up the ore which had been broken as the stope was finished. The trammers had just returned from the shaft with the car. Deceased was standing between the car and the pillar above mentioned when a small piece of ore fell off the side of the pillar, killing him instantly. Buska was a married man, forty-one years old and of Finnish nationality. Verdict of the jury, "accidental death and no blame attached to anyone."

7. Richard Sampson was instantly killed at the eighth level west of B shaft in contract No. 16, Volunteer mine, at 6:30 a. m., February 7, 1900. Sampson and his partner, Coland, by name, were miners working in a drift. It was quitting time but they had two holes to blast. The holes were accordingly charged and everything was ready for blasting. They were alone and Coland suggested that they light extra lights to prevent them from getting in the dark when igniting the fuse. For this Sampson objected, saying it was not likely both their lights would be extinguished. They then applied their lights to the fuse which immediately "spit," extinguishing their lights, leaving them in total darkness. They had not sufficient time to relight their candles, but started to run out of the drift in a stooping position. This is as stated by Coland. When he, Coland, struck or ran against something, knocking him backwards. He then attempted to light a match, when the blast occurred. Sampson, it is thought, met with similar obstructions in his flight. He was frightfully mangled by the explosion. Coland received some severe cuts and bruises but will recover. Sampson was of English nationality, forty-three years of age and married. Verdict of jury was accidental death.

8. Gerard Norden was injured in No. 1 shaft, 1293 foot level, Republic mine, Feb. 13, 1900, and died from the effects of his injuries six hours later. Norden was employed as a skip tender and bell ringer. It was also his duty to put dull tools in the skip and send them to surface. He had put drills in the skip a level below where the accident occurred and got on the skip and was standing on its edge riding to 1293 foot level. When passing through the opening or collar he was caught between the skip and timbers and was very seriously crushed. Norden was a Swede, aged seventeen and unmarried. No inquest.

9. Peter Neimi was instantly killed in the Lillie mine on March 8, 1900. Neimi was a trammer and had completed his shift's work. He had got on the skip in company with others to go to surface. Neimi got on at the sixth level, 100 feet above the bottom of the mine. It appears the bottom of the skip was full of men. The shaft at the bottom of the mine is on an incline, perhaps at an angle of 30 degrees to about half way to surface and from this point to surface it is vertical. When passing the

fifth level, or 100 feet above the point at which he got on the skip he stuck his head out over the back of the skip and was caught between it and the lip of a chute, crushing and completely covering a portion of the side and top of his head, at the same time pulling him out of the skip and he fell to the bottom of the shaft, a distance of 200 feet. Neimi was a Finlander, aged

20 years and single. Verdict of the jury "accidental death, no one to blame but himself."

10. John Luoma was severely injured at 7th level, Sec. 16 mine, Lake Superior Iron Co., on the morning of March 16th, and died at 9 p. m. of the same day from the effects. Luoma was a trammer and at the time of the accident was in the act of putting a chunk of ore into a car, when a piece of rock weighing about one hundred pounds fell from the back of the room and struck him on the back. He was immediately sent to the surface and taken to the hospital where he died. The room or stope where the accident happened was about 18 feet high and 24 feet wide and had the appearance of being a very safe place, the ground being exceedingly firm and solid. Luoma was a Finlander, married and aged 24 years. Verdict of jury was "accidental death."

11. Albert Larson was fatally injured at 8th level, No. 3 shaft, Champion mine, at 11:30 a. m., March 24th, 1900, and died at 8 p. m. of the same date. Larson was a miner engaged with others blasting down a floor of ore. At being clear dinner time Larson took some dull drills and placing them on his shoulder started on the ladder of the level above. When about 30 feet up the ladder he felt the entire distance 30 feet to the point from which he started. The captain had furnished them with a rope to hold on to, and the dull drills had been attached to the rope. In all probability the accident would not have occurred. Larson was nineteen years of age, nationality, American, unmarried. No inquest.

12. August Wickstrom was fatally injured in the No. 7 shaft of the Champion mine on March 30th, 1900 at 11 p. m., and died on the following day. Wickstrom was a machine helper and at the time of the accident was engaged in filling a bucket at the 21st level. The skip was loaded with fine ore at the 19th level and was ascending to surface. When it reached the 18th level the rope broke, the skip with its load falling to the 21st level, crashing through the pentice at the 20th level. Wickstrom was working on a rock pentice at the 21st level and was caught by falling timber. Wickstrom was a Finlander, married and 34 years old. No inquest.

13. James Nicholls was killed in the Cleveland Lake mine between the 1st and 2nd levels at the south deposit on Lake Angeline side on April 4th at 3 a. m. Nicholls was a miner working on the night shift. His partner did not work on the night of the fatality. Nicholls, instead of asking the shift boss for a partner went direct to his place and was working alone. Nicholls was working in a side drift, the ore having been taken out on one side and filled with caved dirt. There was 8 feet of ore above the timbers at back of drift. Lunch time had arrived and men working in the next drift knowing Nicholls was working

alone went to his place and called him to eat with them and receiving no reply started an investigation and found that a cap was broken down and a quantity of ore had also fallen. After further investigation Nicholls was discovered underneath the dirt quite dead. Nicholls was of English nationality, married and 34 years of age. Verdict of jury "accidental death by a fall of ground."

14. John H. Johnson, a miner at the Cliffs shaft mine of the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Co., was almost instantly killed on Monday the 16th day of April at 9:30 a. m. The men working on the night shift had blasted some holes on quitting. Johnson and his partner were at the time of the accident trimming down the loose ground occasioned by the blasting. McGuire, Johnson's partner, suggested that they take down the loose ground on the hanging side first. Johnson said they would do so after the trammers had filled the car. In the meantime McGuire put up a ladder against the breast of the room and was standing upon it at the time the accident occurred. Johnson was standing almost directly under the loose ground at the hanging side already mentioned. Instantly the ground fell, sweeping Johnson off his feet, inflicting fatal injuries from which he died while being taken from the shaft house to the dry. About a ton of rock fell. The room in which Johnson worked was about 15 feet high and 11 feet wide, the back being well arched. The ground was within easy reach, it being about 4 feet above the bench on which Johnson stood. Johnson was a Swede, 45 years of age and had been married. Verdict of jury "accidental death by fall of ground."

15. Alfred Dishno was instantly killed in No. 1 shaft, North mine, Champion Iron Co., on May 10th, 1900. Dishno was a miner and at the time of the accident was engaged in barring down loose pieces around the shaft when a small piece of rock fell from the side of the shaft and struck him on the head. Deceased was a French Canadian, 24 years of age and single. No inquest.

16. Charles Wick was injured in the Blue mine at 10:30 p. m. on June 10th at 4th level in contract No. 43, and died a short time afterwards at his residence. Wick was a miner, and was engaged in taking out a pillar which was three sets square. One slice had been taken out and the second had been started. The hanging or cap rock was very solid and firm, hence there was no perceptible weight upon the timbers, square sets being used. Wick and his partner had blasted a hole and in a short time returned to their place and was standing on the timbers when they gave way. They both fell with the timbers and Wick received fatal injuries. Two sets of timbers fell, the remaining sets standing in perfect order and no rock or ore had fallen, which indicates that some portion of the timbers must have been displaced by the blast, which the unfortunate man failed to notice. Wick was a Finn, single, aged 30 years. Verdict of the jury "accidental death."



17. A frightful accident occurred at the Champion mine in No. 5 shaft on June 23rd, caused by the explosion of 125 pounds of giant powder, by which four men lost their lives. The names of those who were killed are John Floyd, shift boss, English nationality, married, aged thirty-six years; Noah Lark, skip tender, English nationality, aged seventeen; Herman Luoma, miner, Finnish nationality, single, aged twenty-eight years; Otto Parkala, miner, Finnish, aged twenty-three years, married. At the time of the explosion, three Finnish miners were working in the shaft eighty feet below the level where the explosion occurred. Two of these men were afterwards found dead in the bottom of the shaft. The third man in some mysterious manner got out of the shaft to a place of safety. Floyd and Lark were standing at the shaft end of a short crosscut in which the explosives were stored. Lark was undoubtedly instantly killed and Floyd died about twelve hours later. The cause of the explosion is unknown. No inquest, the coroner, after investigation, considering it unnecessary.

18. John Hons was fatally injured on July 13th, at the Champion mine, No. 7 shaft. At the time of the accident the skip was on the gate and a loaded car was at the shaft ready to be dumped into same. Deceased was under the rear end of the car adjusting the chain to the axle to prevent the same from falling into the skip when dumped when some unknown person gave the engineer the signal to hoist. The skip started up and caught the forward end of the car and brought down the rear end onto him crushing him so severely that he died within a few hours after being taken to the hospital. Deceased was of Finnish nationality. No inquest.

19. Otto Matson was instantly killed at the bottom of the Blue mine at 11:45 p. m. on July 13th. Matson was a skip tender. It was his duty to see that the skip was in proper shape and condition to be hoisted and give or ring the proper signals for its hoisting. It was also his duty at the end of each half shift to clean up what little ore might have fallen over side of skip into skip pit in course of dumping. It was customary when about to clean the pit to let the skip down to within three or four feet to top of skip pit then ring one bell and stop the skip, then put a piece of timber across the pit to prevent the skip from dropping into it in case anything should happen the brake or any other part of the machinery. Matson neglected to perform this part of his work and got into the skip hole. The brake immediately slipped, letting the skip down upon him, crushing out his life. Deceased was a Swede.

Twenty-seven years of age and married. Verdict of the jury was, "Matson came to his death through his own neglect in not putting in gate piece."

20. Victor Hill was instantly killed in No. 9 pit of the Republic mine on August 1st. Hill was a laborer employed in selecting ore and putting it into the mill or chute. The ore in this pit is secured by back stoping. The level is first opened out to a sufficient size to permit of the putting in of a stull, the ore being then blasted onto the stull. Mills are put in and follow the stope up as it raises. The surplus ore is thrown into the mill, the balance being left on the stull so that the men are always within easy reach of the sides and back, so as to properly trim and examine them after blasting. Hill was working on this stull when a slab of ore dropped on him from the back, killing him instantly. Deceased was a Finn, married, and thirty-one years of age. No inquest.

21. Neil Scanlon received injuries at the Negaunee mine on the 24th day of September by falling down a raise and died on September 30th, 1900. Scanlon was a miner running a drill in No. 29 raise, which is intended to make a junction with No. 2 shaft. The raise is up about fifty feet and is two-compartment, one for a ladder-way and the other for dirt. The raise at top of cribbing where Scanlon stood was covered over with lagging at the time of the accident and in some unknown manner Scanlon fell through the lagging into the raise on the dirt a distance of about 25 feet. Scanlon was of English nationality, single, aged twenty-four years. No inquest.

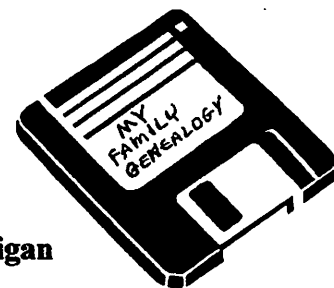

My official visits for the year ending September 30, 1900, were 275. It will be noticed that in the 24 fatal accidents 6 were caused by falls of ground and in almost every case the amount of dirt which fell has been exceedingly small. Four persons were killed by explosions, the cause of which will never be known, and 6 by skips and cars. A large number of mines have been in operation during the year and the number of men employed has been largely increased. The percentage of accidents has been considerably decreased.

Michigan Genealogical Council Meeting Minutes- July 2001, Lansing, Michigan

The Library of Michigan recently received \$100,000 from the Abrams Foundation to purchase items for the genealogical collection.

Dr. Wheeler of the Detroit Public Library, reported on the status of the Burton Historical Collection. Many materials have been taken out of the library to be cleaned and sanitized, after sustaining damage in the July 2000 flood and subsequent fire. Work is continuing to get the collection in order. To view items, call the Detroit Public Library to find out the availability and hours.

Joanne Harvey of the Research Access Committee reported that Senate Bill 56, passed on June 29 and the price of vital records increased to \$15.00 each. A second copy of the same record is an additional \$5.00. Local governments can increase the fees they charge for vital records, but not to exceed the State fees. The legislative bill to open birth records at 100 years is waiting to be drafted with the intent to introduce the bill this fall.

Higher Fees for Social Security Records

One of the most basic genealogical sources available, Social Security records, now costs more to access. This summer the Social Security Administration raised its rates to process all record requests. The new fee schedule is as follows:

- * Copy of original application for Social Security card (form SS-5), Social security number (SSN) provided: \$27 (\$29 if SSN not provided)
- * Computer extract of Social Security number application, SSN provided: \$16 (\$18 if SSN not provided)
- * Search for information about death of an individual, SSN provided: \$16 (\$18 if SSN not provided)

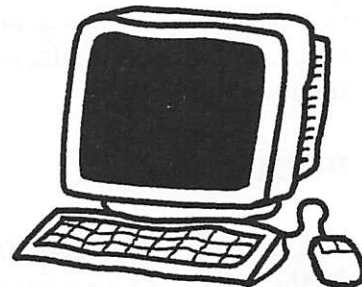
Genealogy Class On-line

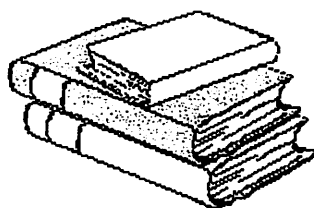

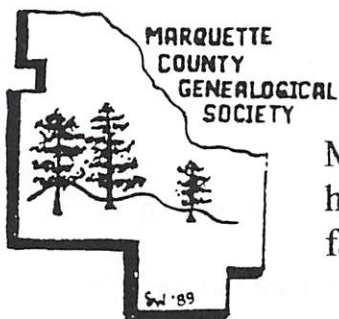
