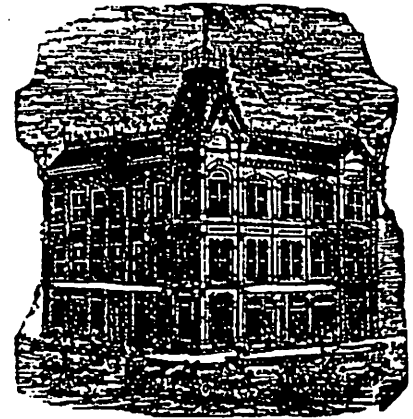

FRENCH ORGANIZATIONS OF MARQUETTE COUNTY

The following records were obtained at the Marquette County Clerk's office under Miscellaneous Records. They are the "Articles of Incorporation" for three organizations in Marquette County, in the communities of Marquette, Republic and Champion/Beacon.

The purpose of the French organizations shall be "...literary charitable and benevolent and for the purpose of aiding its members in case of accident, sickness, mental and physical incapacity and provide for their necessities and for their burial when deceased..." It was mandatory to record and conduct the meetings in French. Meetings were held in Sept., Dec., March, and June and cost 50 cents per month. All members were required to annually observe Patron's Feast Day on June 24th. Requirements for a candidates' membership were:

- 1) Must be of French descent and a Marquette County resident
- 2) Must be of good health and sober habits and free from any hereditary or incurable disease
- 3) Must be between the ages of 15 and 50
- 4) Shall be Roman Catholic
- 5) Shall have to purchase and wear an approved uniform
- 6) Must pass a physical exam
- 7) Shall be a naturalized citizen

The Society in Marquette also wrote in the following fines into their by-laws:

- 1) 10¢ for every meeting missed
- 2) 25¢ for anyone introducing religious or political topics at a meeting
- 3) \$1.00 for failing to observe the Patron's Feast
- 4) 50¢ for failing to attend the funeral of a deceased member
- 5) 25¢ for failure to give change of address notice
- 6) 25¢ for an officers' neglect of duty
- 7) \$1.00 for attending a meeting when intoxicated

For funeral benefits, the Society paid as much as \$30.00 for expenses and would attend the funeral in a body of members, with insignia and flag draped in black crape. Some societies also had a provision for widows and orphans of deceased members.

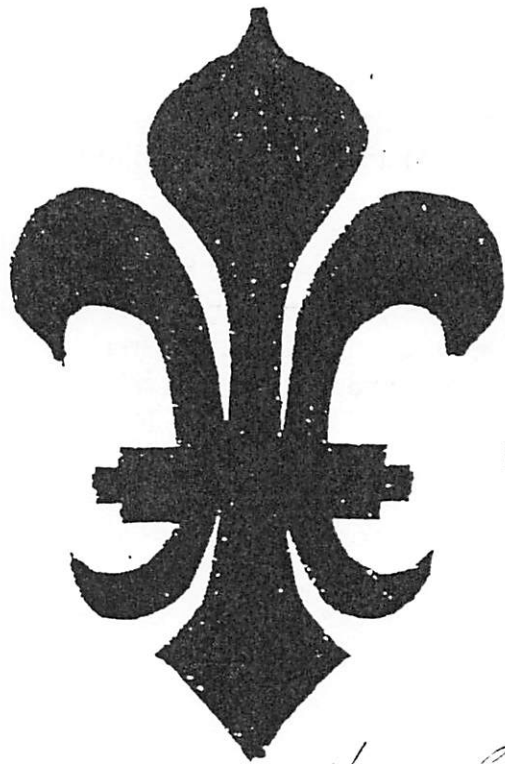

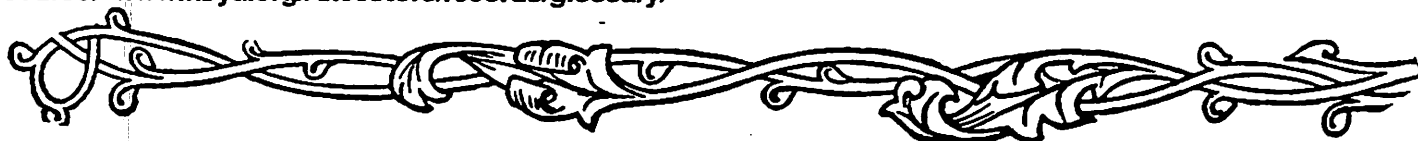
One of the most difficult challenges faced by any genealogist is keeping track of the tremendous number of phrases and terms associated with family search. To assist with this problem, the following terms and definitions are given by Ancestors:

CONTINUED FROM MAY 2002 ISSUE:

LAND GRANT	A free transfer of land from the federal or a state government to individuals or corporations (e.g., railroads); often given for military service or in return for developing the land.
LAND PATENT	A document giving the possessor ownership and permanent claim to a piece of land.
LAND RECORDS	Documents containing information pertaining to transfers of ownership of land between parties.
LETTER OF ADMINISTRATION	A document from a probate court authorizing the administrator of an intestate estate to settle the estate.
LIBRARY OF CONGRESS	The national library of the US and research arm of Congress; home to an exceptional genealogical collection, particularly of compiled records. The catalog of holdings can be searched at http://catalog.loc.gov/
LINK	Connections between web sites that allow a browser to easily travel from one site to other generally related sites.
MAILING LIST	A discussion forum where participants subscribe to a list and receive messages by E-mail; heavily used by genealogists to interact with others having similar research interests; almost the equivalent of an online genealogical society.
MARRIAGE BOND	A document obtained by an engaged couple prior to their marriage. It provided a guarantee that there was no moral or legal impediment to a marriage. In addition, the man affirmed that he would be able to support himself and his new bride.
MARRIAGE LICENSE	A document issues to a prospective bride and groom upon application at a local court house. They present this document to the person performing the marriage ceremony who in turn fills out the necessary information and returns it to the city or county office that issued it. This information is then transferred to the couple's marriage certificate.
MARRIAGE RECORD	Written notation kept by a church official about the marriage of a pair of individuals; sometimes also used to refer to civil marriage records.
MEDICAL GENEALOGY	The study of a family's medical history with an aim toward identifying and assessing health risks, preventing future occurrences in other family members, locating suitable organ or marrow donors, and assisting medical researchers in the development of cures.
MICROFILM	A widely used means of preserving records of genealogical value, microfilm is a very durable media with an estimated lifespan of more than 500 years when stored in the proper environment. Repositories such as the National Archives and the Family History Library make many rolls of microfilmed information available to researchers for viewing.

- MILITARY HISTORY** A summary of the participation of a given military unit or regiment in a war; often contains a roster of those who served, information about the engagements in which the unit was involved and other details.
- NATIONAL ARCHIVES** Commonly used term for the National Archives and Records Service(NARA) which maintains original and microfilmed copies of many documents critical to American genealogical research. These include census, military and ship passenger arrival records.
- NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY** Official home of the US's largest nationally focused genealogical society, offering a multitude of services, programs and publications including a library whose holdings may be searched in Arlington, VA. or online at http://www.ngsgenealogy.org/library/body_frame.html.
- NATURALIZATION RECORD** The documents including the declaration of intention and the petition for naturalization of an individual of foreign birth wishing to become a citizen of another country.
- NEW ENGLAND HISTORIC GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY(NEHGS)** A particularly valuable resource for those with New England heritage and the oldest and largest genealogical society in the US The society has been helping researchers trace their lineage for more than 150 yrs. In addition to a 200,000 volume library in Boston, NEHGS also supports a 25,000 volume book-by-mail circulating library, a mail-order sales department, educational programs, lectures, conferences and tours; an active publications department publishing and editorial service; and Enquiries Research Service.
- NECROLOGY FILE** Obituary index
- OATH OF ALLEGIANCE** The oath taken by an individual of foreign birth in which he or she renounces any allegiance to the government of their country of origin and pledges their allegiance to the country of which they intend to become a citizen.
- OBITUARY** A news story written about a recently deceased person; generally includes some biographical information such as age, birthplace, occupation, names of surviving relatives, place of residence, etc.
- ONLINE DATABASE** An electronic repository of information you can easily search, usually by surname, place or keyword(e.g. Social Security Death Index)
- ORIGINAL RECORD** A records created at or close to the time of an event by an eyewitness to the event(e.g. a birth record by the doctor who delivered the baby).

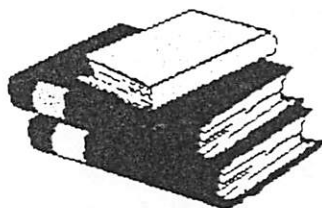

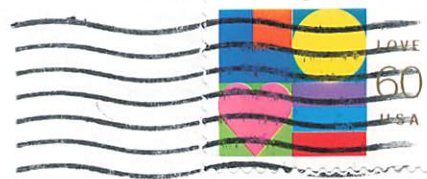

*MCGS Library Collection

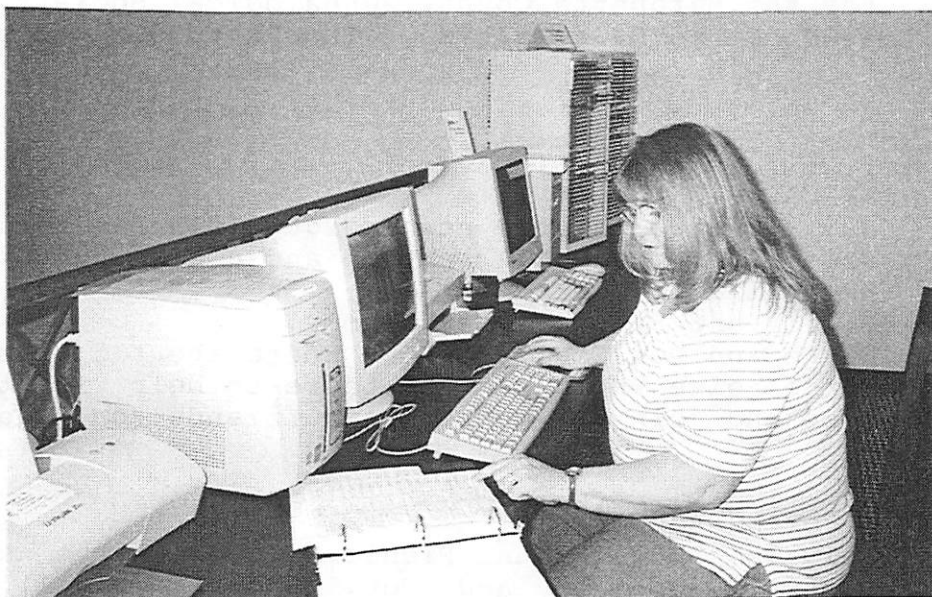

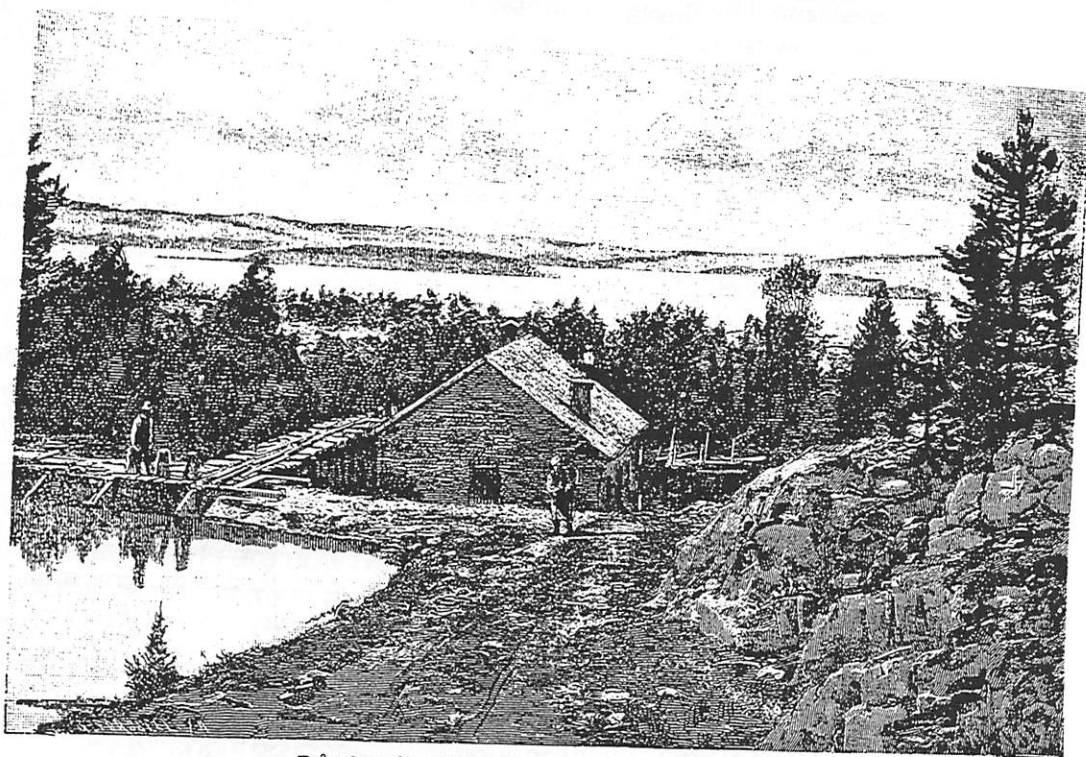

Johanness Nelson born in Tongberg, Vermland, Sweden, Sept. 21, 1821.

Anna Anderson (wife) born the same place May 8, 1821. Were married June 23, 1844. Had a family of 12 children, five boys and seven girls.

The boys were: Carl, Nels Peter, Johan, Anders Gustaf, and Magnus. My twinn brother died in 1868 at the age of 4 years.

The girls were: Lisa, Christina, Anna Louisa, Maria, Charlotte, Mathilda and Caroline, the youngest. Mathilda died at the age of 18 months.

The first who died in the family was Anders Gustaf who died as an infant. That was before my time.

It was a hard struggle to raise this big family, especially during the years of 1868-1869. Both people and animals were starving. I don't know if it was too much rain or not enough, but I remember as a little girl, it was terrible.

There were ten children home at one time and very hard to find food and clothing for all.

In 1869, my oldest brother, Carl, was married and moved across the lake just a few miles away and worked with his wife's father.

In September 1872, brother Nels left for America, which mother did not like very much because she did not have much hope of seeing him again. It wasn't easy to take a trip like that then as it is now. Well that wasn't the worst.

The same year, 1872, a terrible tragedy happened on Christmas morning. Four of the children were drowned on their way to church, "Julotta".

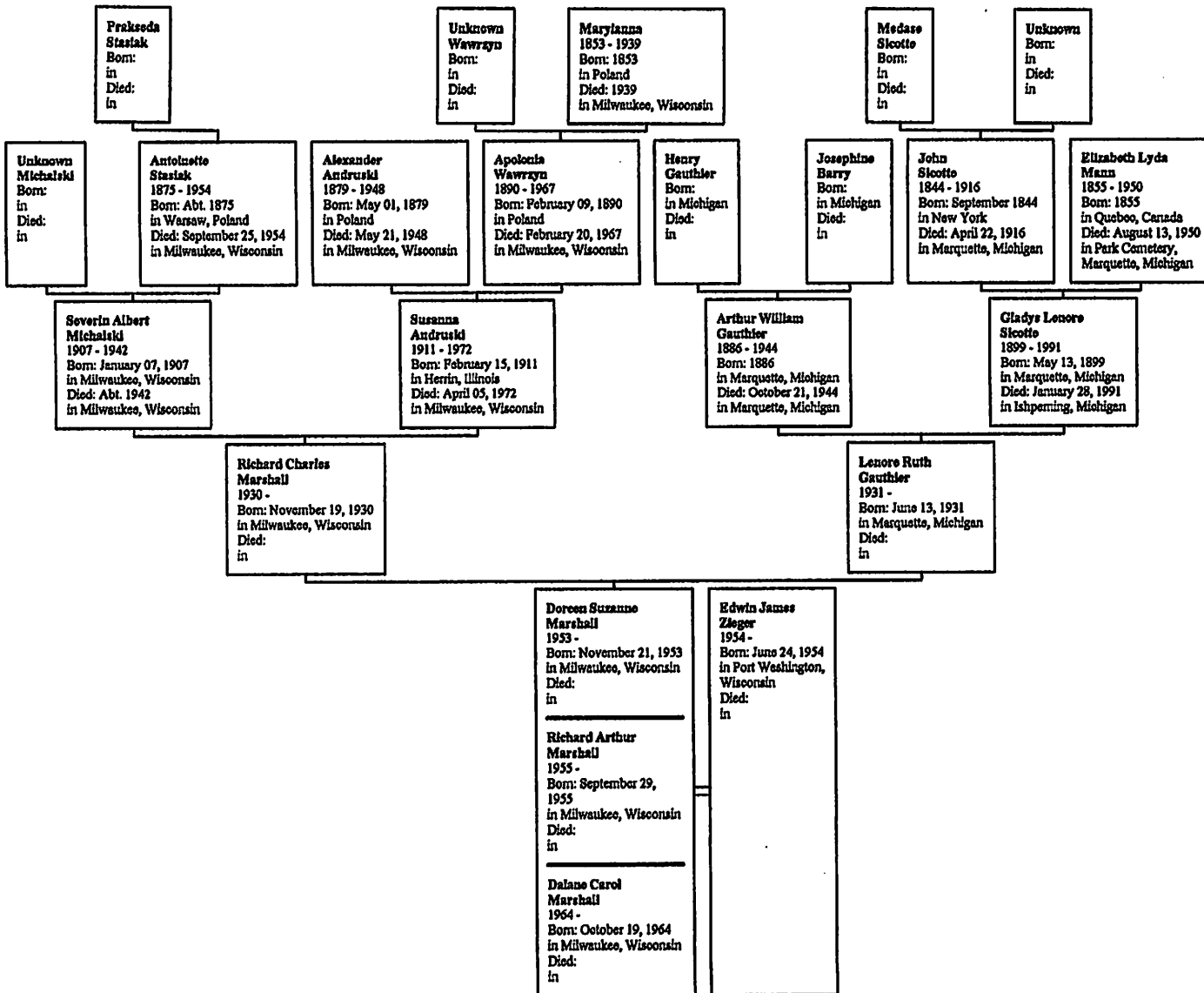

TIPS FOR PHOTOGRAPHING GRAVESTONES

Main Point of the Article:

Gravestone rubbing is a common genealogical practice, but it can result in damaging the stone itself. Photography offers an excellent replacement method.

There is so much misinformation available on the right way to document a gravestone that it is a wonder that any of them are still standing. These monuments to our ancestors are a permanent reminder of a loved one when properly cared for. Unfortunately, a lot of damage is innocently done in the name of preservation. For instance, the common practice of creating a rubbing is actually harmful and in some states is illegal. Many school groups studying genealogy make rubbings of gravestone markers to use in the classroom. However, rubbings can damage the surface of the stone by eventually wearing away the carving or loosening soft stone. Even the most careful and gentle rubbing causes decay.

Photography offers an alternative. With the right equipment, bright sunlight and a little patience, you can use images of headstones for educational purposes or add them to a family photograph archive. Taking a picture is an ideal way to document the information on the stone without causing deterioration. Once you have taken these pictures, why not add them to an on-line cemetery database to create a memorial to your ancestors? You will be able to share your discovery with other researchers. You can also transfer gravestone images into a genealogy program such as Family Tree Maker.

By using the following helpful tips, you will be able to create professional looking images of cemetery markers.

Basic Requirements

Patience

Photographing tombstones takes planning. You may have to wait several days for the right combination of factors such as light and weather in order to take the best possible images. Rushing the process will only result in poor quality photos.

Light

Bright sunlight is necessary to highlight the stone's features. Ideally midday sun that hits the stone at a 30 degree angle is best. Other types of sunlight emphasize imperfections and can make the carving look flat. The stone's location influences when that might be best. For instance, gravestones in New England often face west and are best photographed in the late morning, while stones that face north should be photographed in the late afternoon. Those facing south are well-lit all day in midsummer but not during the rest of the year.

You can improve the quality of light by reflecting it with a mirror to highlight the stone. A plastic full-length mirror works well. Ideally, the stone should not be taller than the mirror unless you are only focusing on a section, then a small mirror can be used. Since you will need to position the mirror it would be helpful to have either a partner or a tripod with you. If the sunlight is too bright

you can create some shading by either standing in front of the direct sunlight or by using a dark cloth or cardboard as shield. If the stone is located in the shadows, you may be able to use two mirrors to help reflect the light. Keep in mind that you still need a sunny day.

Equipment



Type of Camera

The Association for Gravestone Studies recommends using a 35mm Single Lens Reflex that is outfitted with either a 50-55mm lens or a wide angle 35mm lens for crowded areas. Smaller lenses distort the straight lines in the image.

Film

If you are utilizing a 35mm SLR, either black and white or color film can be used. Black and White Tri-X film is a good choice. Filters can be helpful when shooting black and whites images and an orange filter increases the contrast while a polarizing filter can reduce glare. Exposures of 1/250th or 1/500th are suggested. Color film with an ASA of 200 shot at 1/250th of a second should yield a good result.

Technique

Since you are creating a record of the cemetery in addition to photographing a single stone, you should take several images of the same marker. For example:

- *One showing the whole cemetery
- * Shoot an image that includes the closest stones and provides context.
- * Photograph the whole gravestone so that inscription and carving are visible.
- *Make sure to take at least one picture where the inscription fills the camera frame.

Unless you are extremely lucky, most of the stones you want to photograph will not be straight due to ground settling. In the case of leaning stones, tilt the camera to straighten the image.

Background

As you focus the camera you may notice distracting background elements such as telephone poles, trees and other monuments. Since you want your picture to be essentially about what you are photographing, you need to eliminate those articles. You can use a background of cardboard as a backdrop, but make sure that whatever you use is free of imperfection or it will be more distraction than the original problems. If you are going to photograph a large amount of cemetery monuments, you may wish to invest in a piece of Formica mounted on a 1/4 inch piece of plywood. Be sure to have a handhold cut into the side for easy carrying. Any store that manufactures kitchen counters should be able to provide what you need. A neutral shade lighter than gray enhances the appearance of the stone.

Other Ways to Improve the Quality of the Photograph

Cleaning the Stone

Cleaning a cemetery stone is a controversial topic. The first rule of conservation and preservation is to cause no damage. Unfortunately by using household cleaners, chalk, and shaving cream to enhance the lettering you may injure the surface in ways that are not readily apparent. Caution should be used before you destroy what you set out to preserve.

Over the centuries, several different types of stones have been used to create gravestones. Many of the stones are quite porous and fragile, while others are resistant to damage. Be careful in attempting to improve the readability of the inscription. Types of stone:

- *Prior to the Nineteenth century: Sandstone or slate
- *Nineteenth Century: Marble and gray granite
- * Late nineteenth century to the present: Polished granite or marble

There are a few things that you can do that will not cause injury.

*A soft brush or natural sponge and water will help you remove surface soil. Gentle brushing should remove surface dirt and bird droppings. Power washing should not be used. Water should flow over the stone or be delicately sprayed onto the surface. Never use hard objects or stiff brushes to clean the stone.

Not all cemeteries are regularly maintained. By trimming tall weeds around the stone and cutting the grass you may discover epitaphs under the overgrowth.

Documentation

Local historians and genealogists have transcribed inscription information for generations. Many of these handwritten efforts are now being entered into databases and some are available on-line. By using a pictorial representation of the headstone as part of the database, you are able to see what actually appears on the stone including epitaph and artistic carving. It is a record of what the marker looked like at a particular time before damage occurs or the stone disappears.

If you live near or know about a cemetery in your area, why not assist with the preservation efforts by photographing each stone in it for future reference? A local historical society or cemetery association will appreciate your efforts. Be sure to check with them before beginning the project so that there is no duplication of effort.

A basic record sheet on a cemetery should include the following;

- *location
- *map of cemetery with stones numbered
- *when photographed (time, date, and frame number)
- *transcription of the epitaph

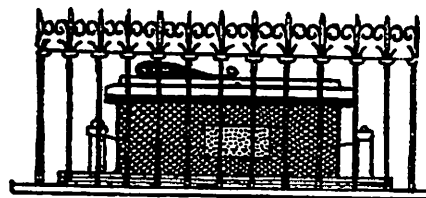

Michigan Cemetery Sources Database

Thanks to the new Michigan Cemetery Database launched in January, genealogists, historians and researchers all over the world now can easily find information about over 3,700 cemeteries in the state of Michigan.

The information in this database is based on the *Michigan Cemetery Source Book* published by the Library of Michigan in 1994. In addition to the information in that publication, the database includes sources for cemetery transcriptions added to the Library of Michigan's collection for the past nine years. It will continually be updated as the Library receives more sources in the future.

The database is searchable by cemetery name, county, township and keyword, and it also has the capability for wildcard searching. Patrons can see a list of all the cemeteries in a county, in a township or individually by name. Clicking on the cemetery name reveals detailed information on where it is physically located and identifies the sources at the Library of Michigan that include names of persons buried in that cemetery. Transcription sources vary from readings of the tombstones in a cemetery to extensive records from sextons and obituaries.

Clicking on the book or microfilm call number takes you directly to the Library of Michigan's ANSWER online catalog record for a full bibliographic description of the source. Patrons can click on "Copies" at the top of each page for more information about how to borrow or interlibrary loan sources. "Contact Us" and "Help" links are also provided for questions about the database via email.

Future plans for the database include possibly scanning the pages from transcriptions, with the publisher's permission, and linking the name of the cemetery to an online map.

TYPES OF GRAVE MARKERS

What type of gravestone marks your ancestor's grave? Though parts of the inscription may be weathered and unreadable (usually the dates, naturally), or it may have sunk into the ground so that you can't read the death date, you can still get an idea of when the stone was placed by the composition of the stone and the type of lettering. By identifying the composition of the stone, you can also tell if it's a replacement marker. A granite stone with a death date prior to 1880, for example, is not the original marker.



1830s to 1880s

Marble became popular, although its use can be dated back to the late 1700s. Marble is especially prone to staining and weathering, and it dissolves easily in acid-rain pollution. This breakdown in marble leaves inscriptions unreadable and causes a dullness to appear on the polished surface, followed by a roughened texture that eventually becomes pitted and grooved. In the early 1850s, the use of photographs (daguerreotypes) secured to tombstones began. The vast majority of these graven images portrayed the deceased alive, but some were postmortem photographs.

1880s to 1910s

Soft gray granite and cast-metal markers began being used. Raised lettering in granite became popular in the early 1900s, sandblasting replaced soft granite weathers somewhat and is prone to lichen and moss. In the early 1900s, sandblasting replaced stone carving by hammer and chisel.

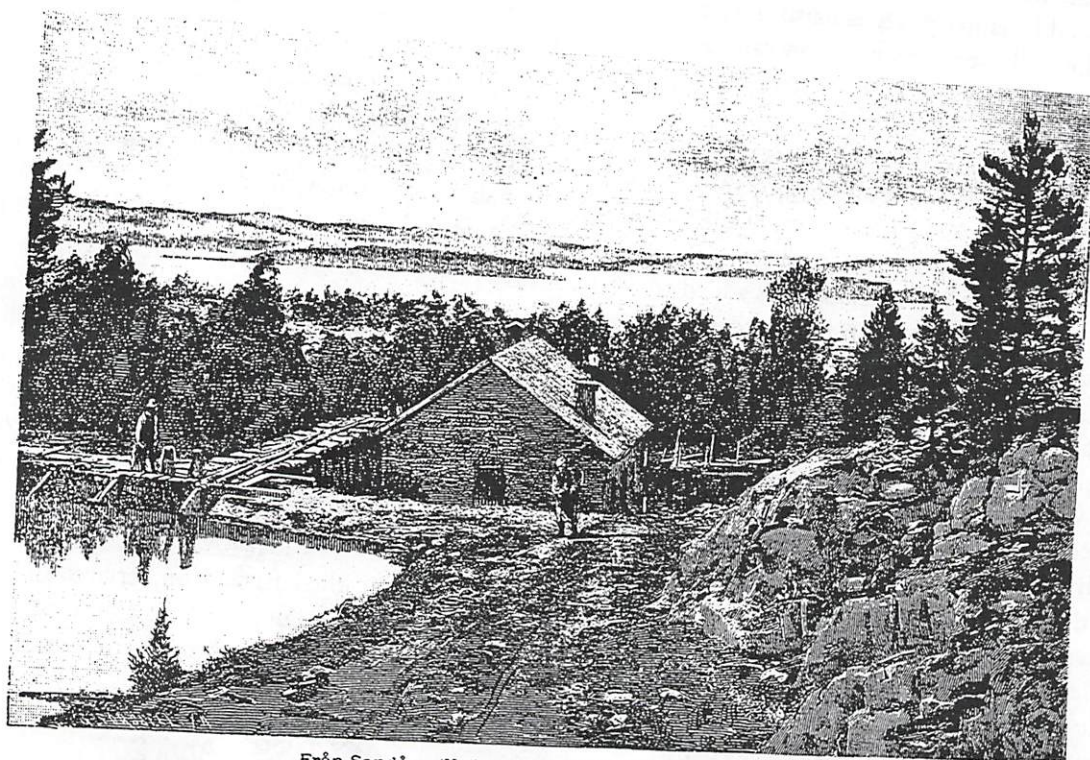
1920s to present

Granite is the most popular marker and is often polished. This polished granite appears to withstand elements such as pollution, weathering, lichen and moss.

The boys were: Carl, Nels Peter, Johan, Anders Gustaf, and Magnus. My twinn brother died in 1868 at the age of 4 years.

The girls were: Lisa, Christina, Anna Louisa, Maria, Charlotte, Mathilda and Caroline, the youngest. Mathilda died at the age of 18 months.

There were ten children home at one time and very hard to find food and clothing for all.

In 1869, my oldest brother, Carl, was married and moved across the lake just a few miles away and worked with his wife's father.

In September 1872, brother Nels left for America, which mother did not like very much because she did not have much hope of ever seeing him again. It wasn't easy to take a trip like that then as it is now. Well that wasn't the worst.

The same year, 1872, a terrible tragedy happened on Christmas morning. Four of the children were drowned on their way to church, "Julotta".

The first who died in the family was Anders Gustaf who died as an infant. That was before my time. a hard struggle raise family, especially during 1869-1872. Both Nels and Carl were much younger. I remember terrible.

About three miles from home they had to cross a small lake and about 150 yards from the shore there was a strong current. It had been raining the day before so they couldn't see anything but clear ice and water. There were some little spruce trees put up as a warning, but it was so dark they couldn't see them until they were almost on them and that was too late. Before they got down on the ice, they could see the church all lit up with candles in the windows and the two youngest girls were so happy because it was their first "Julotta" to church. There were hundreds of people around. Some were walking, other were skating and many on sleighs and horses. Our folks had a horse and a large cutter. Brother John and the hired man were standing on the back runners. Brother was holding the lines as he always liked to drive, but it wasn't so nice this time. They just started out on the ice with many others and he came too near the current and plunged right in with his precious load. The hired man jumped and he was saved. Brother was holding on to the lines and, of course, went down with the rest. The hundreds of people around did not seem to be able to get near enough to help very much until a man from the other side came over on skates. He pulled the lines out of some harness nearby, threw it in the hole and the oldest girl was still conscious and had been holding herself up with the hay that was in the cutter. She twisted the lines around her wrists and she was pulled out of the water and saved. She was taken to a home nearby and received medical attention until the next day when she was brought home.

The other four were brought home that same day and layed out, side by side in a big room where it was cold, where they remained until caskets were made for them all and preparations were made for the funeral which took place the 6th of January or what they call Little Christmas of Trettondedagen.

Poor Mother, can anyone imagine the tears and heartaches that took place in such a loving little mother as she was, but she trusted in God and He gave her strength to live through it all. However, that first day she fainted several times and as soon as she came out of one spell and didn't see her children, she went into another, not realizing what had happened, but in a couple of days they could bring her out to see them and she felt better. She thought they were all bruised from the horse kicking around in the water and that's why they wouldn't let her see them. But that wasn't so, they didn't have a scratch. They looked lovely after they were fixed up and she could see them everyday until the day of the funeral, the 6th of January as mentioned before. They were all neatly dressed in white with little sprays of green myrtle.

Their names and ages were:

Christine-21 years old

Johan-19 years old

Maria-14 years old

Charlotta-11 years old

The caskets were black with little silver stars on the sides and covers with white handles.

Sunday morning, January 6th, at 8:30, people started to come to view the bodies for the last time and, Oh! how we all cried when the caskets were closed, never to be opened again.

Poor Mother, it was hard for her to go through all that. I remember everything as if it had happened just a few days ago. I was eight years old and always at my mother's side since my sisters were gone.

The day of the funeral one of our neighbors, a deacon of the church, read some verses from the Bible and said some prayers and sang the 452nd Psalm in our Psalmbaack, Jag gar mot doden var jag gar, O.S.V.----- I never forgot the Melody of that hymn and that is still being sung at most of our Swedish funerals. They left the house around nine o'clock in order to be at church at 10:30 for the funeral service.

This was the funeral anyone had. It was a long procession. I don't know if it had to have 20 pallbearers for the two older ones and for the smaller ones. They had to cross the same lake as before, but the ice was strong by that time. All the neighbors, friends and relatives were invited to come back to the house for dinner and supper which took all afternoon and evening. Some of the relatives remained until Monday, some until Tuesday so the neighbors had to share their sleeping quarters as much as they could and everybody was very good and kind in every way.

But it was terrible lonesome for all of us, so in a couple of years they bought a nice little home across the lake which was nearer the church so mother could go and see the graves more often and that was much better. However, just when the home was fixed up nice and comfortable, father took a notion he wanted to come to this country because the two boys, Nels and Carl, were here. Another heartache for poor mother, to go and leave her nice little home at the age of 60. Now it was just the three girls left at home of the large family.

So the place was sold and the 3rd of May 1880 we left our home in Sweden.

We left Gottenburgh the 10th of May to cross the North Sea which is always rough and most everybody was seasick.

We arrived in Hull, England a couple of days later, crossed England by train and had to stay in Liverpool a few days to wait for our big ocean steamer which was called the City of Rome. There were 1000 passengers. The weather was nice except two days

that was stormy. It took nine days on the ocean after. We saw a couple of icebergs and that made us shiver for a while, besides seeing two whales and several other funny things. We landed in New York perfectly safe. There was a baby about one and a half years old that died the day before we landed in New York. The mother had been in this country before so she could talk English and they let her keep the baby until we got to New York, otherwise it would have been buried in the ocean.

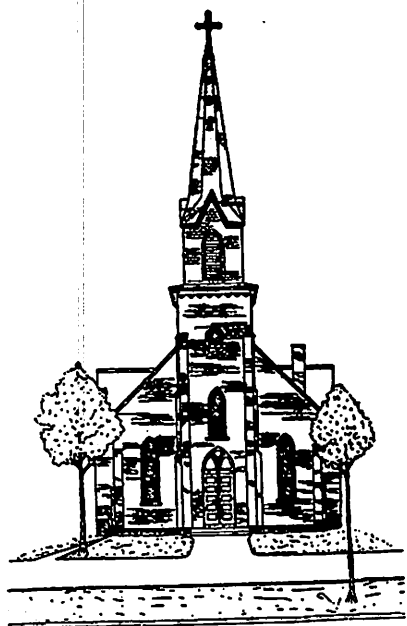
The next day we left New York for Buffalo where we had to wait again for our boat to take us the rest of the way. It took five days on a steamer called the Peerless from Buffalo to Marquette. We landed at Spear's dock at noon the 2nd of June where our two brothers, Nels and Carl met us and welcomed us to their homes to rest for a few days after the long trip. However it did not take very long until we all had places to go to work. Inside of a week we were all placed in English homes. I was only fifteen years old but the first one to have a job. I went to work the next Monday morning as a nurse girl for Ed Watson who was then six months old. My oldest sister Lisa, worked for E.S. Bice's parents who lived on Fourth St.

She stayed there until the next spring when she went to Ishpeming to keep house for Mr. Bergdahl whose wife had just died and left two small children. Later she married him and they raised a family of six, four girls and two boys. She died in November 1930. Her husband is still living at the age of 88. Quite spry for his age in 1937.

Sister Louise went to work for Mrs. McCombs, where she stayed until the following year, 1881, when her sweetheart, John Nelson, arrived from Sweden. They were married the 11th of November that same year. They then made their home on Third St., where they resided until death made a visit and called Mr. Nelson in February 1931. Mrs. Nelson died in August 1933 after a long illness and was prepared to leave. The two brothers, Nels and Carl had also passed away to be with their loved ones who had gone ahead where there is no pain or sorrow.

MESSIAH LUTHERAN CHURCH MARQUETTE, MICHIGAN

Built in 1883 on West Ridge Street
by Swedish immigrants

The parents of this large family were here to help organize our Messiah Lutheran Church in 1881 and were very active with all the church work as long as they were able. They also lived to celebrate their 50th anniversary of their wedding the 23rd of June 1894, in their little home on Third St., in the presence of their five children, 24 grand children and one great grandchild. Almost the whole congregation was invited. It was a beautiful day and we had a lovely program. An address by a student, C.O. Johnson, who was here to serve the congregation while Rev. V.A. Johnson attended the Synodical Meeting. Also a solo by Miss Anna Westman from Augustana College, who was here teaching Swedish School during the summer. Father had built what in Swedish call "Lofsall" out on the lawn. He made it from small white birch trees with an arch forming the entrance, branches all around, and a table in the center. It was lovely. The refreshments consisted of coffee cake and ice cream, which we made ourselves. Everybody enjoyed themselves very much as it was the first Golden Wedding anyone had been invited to in those days.

Mother lived a year and a half after that, but took sick in November and died December 10, 1895, after five week's illness with kidney trouble being the cause of her death. Father was quite spry until January 21, 1899 when he passed away after one week's illness with erysipelas and they were both well prepared to meet their Master.

The writer is the youngest daughter of this large family, now the only living charter member of our Messiah Lutheran Church in Marquette, Michigan.

He has been a member of the Swedish Lutheran church and will be buried from there at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The deceased leaves two sons, Charles and Neil Johnson, and three daughters, Mrs. L. Bergthal, Mrs. L. Nelson and Mrs. Lena Johnson, also twenty-nine grand children and two great grand children.

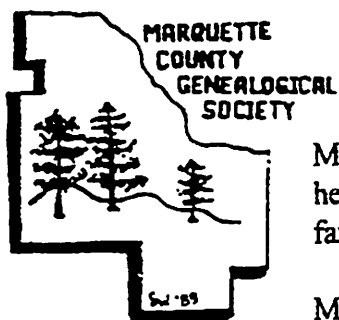
