

Old Resident of Marquette Succumbed Wednesday After a Lingering Illness.



## "The Original Irish Sweepstakes"

The Ishpeming Iron Ore, March 13, 1948

This week's column has been turned over to Arvid C. Braastad, lifelong resident of Ishpeming and well versed in its history. He has chosen for his subject, "The Original Irish Sweepstakes," and we are positive that our readers will derive a good laugh from a local historical fact. Here it is:


During the early days in Ishpeming, the men had to make their own fun, which consisted of vicious fights between the different nationalities, sectional feuds, saloon brawls, ski jumping contests, dog races and picnics. Finally, funerals came into this category and the custom prevailed up to the advent of the atuomobile.

The funerals at this period were largely attended. Not because everyboy knew each other or didn't. For most of them it was simply the urge for excitement, a relief from their humdrum lives.

It can be said, tho, that if a widow was left in financial difficulties, there wasn't a person, friend or foe, but that would pitch in with financial aid or sympathy.

As the cortege rounded a corner, the mourners and their close friends would lean out and count the rigs. If the count was extra high there would be great exhultation. It seems that the popularity or worth of the deceased was measured by the length of his funeral procession

Whenever the rumor circulated that some neighbor was seriously ill, or dying, the men would rush to the livery stables to engage their favorite horse for the prospective funeral.



The prime requisite was speed. Some of the business men had standing orders for a horse for every funeral, regardless of the race or creed of the deceased. They figured it was good business.

Many of the horses, especially Nellie, Prince, Duke and John W, just to mention a few, were in great demand on account of their speed but usually could not be hired unless one tipped the barn-boss.

One barn-boss in particular would promise the fastest horse to everyone provided he was given a fifty cent tip. Of course he would have to do a lot of explaining to the losers after the funeral.

Sometmes one of the boys would ring in an exceptionally fast horse from Negaunee which would upset the calculations of the local contestants

The procedure at the grave did not have the refinements of the present-day. The casket was lowered into the grave by four pall bearers by means of two wide leather straps, and the delivery down was very shaky. Sometimes one of the pall bearers would accidently let go his end of the strap a little too soon and the casket would drop with a thud, which was an excruciating shock to the mourners.

The sermons were unusually long; aggravatingly so.

However, the second the services were concluded everybody seemed to become electrified and rushed to their rigs. And now the mad race to town was on, with whips lashing, madly galloping horses and clouds of dust.

The women who were sitting alongside their husbands were popeyed, grimly hanging on to the side of the seats, screaming, and imploring their husbands to slow down. But there was no denying the old boys; for them it was a Roman holiday.

Now, the idea of these races was that the last man to enter a certain popular saloon on Division street had to buy the drinks for all the contestants.

Some of the contestants who were hopelessly out-classed in the race would sneak into a side street and head for the barn. The one who came in first would be highly honored. The last one in, of course, would have to pay on the barrel-head, and was unmercifully razzed.

After all the side bets had been squared up, the bar-keeper and some of the more opulent sports would set up a few rounds and then the arguments would commence regarding the merits of the different horses. As usual, the arguments were finally settled in the good old-fashioned way — by a free-for-all fist fight. And the usual result—a lot of blackened eyes and bloody noses. But, at the next funeral everything was forgiven and forgotten.

About the year eighteen hundred and ninety, a local Chinaman died. Ordinarily be would have been hauled out to a pauper's grave. However, there hadn't been a funeral for some time so a few of the more enthusiastic sports sensed an opportunity for another race and they accordinly arranged a fairly decent funeral for the Chinaman. The race after this funeral proved to be the fastest and prettiest race of the year and was the talk of the town for weeks

To people of the present-day the races mentioned might seem to border on the sacrilegious, but they were definitely not intended as such. The old-timers had such a very limited outlet for their pent-up energies and love of competition that they grasped at any opportunity to satisfy their craving.



## \*\*PROGRAM FOR ROTARY



The Michigamme House run by Mrs. Schwendeman still a recident of Michigamme and the actor House later called the north- Western Hotelowned and speraled by Mrs. Heigel. a large school was built the first superintendent being James Haley, Mica Many Canning was principal and the other teachers were: Mind aley I'M eill, Miss Kaley, and Muss Mellie Molan. Simils would was station agent in 72. Dr. Joseph Van Deventer was the doctor at the mines, there was no hospital, Thous needing hospital care being sent to Marquette. There was one family of Indians, Reople yuned Iwens. The Spur Mine, one mile west of Michigamme, was opened up in 1882 by Maj. J. B. Brooks and Prof. Pompelli a new private corporation. a man named Morrison was the first captain. In 1882 the Beaufort from Mining Co and the Titan Iron Mining Co started shipping ore from the Beaufort Mine four miles west of Michigamme.

In the heartbreak of the ages.


Today we saw where the grandparents lay



## FOR YOUR INFORMATION

Hints on removing creases in a map, by "Ask Heloise"

This is a hint from a major map manufacturer: Try using an iron! This will help to remove most creases or folds. Note: Older creases might come out, but the color in these areas tends to fade. Set your iron on LOW heat. Lay the map on a protected, flat surface and place a sheet of brown paper or a cloth over it. Iron on both sides.

Caution: DO NOT let the iron directly touch the map! This should do the trick, but if you have any doubt about doing this yourself, take the map to a professional-this is especially true if the map is old.

## Ancestor worked for a railroad?

The U.S. Railroad Retirement Board can provide information on deceased retiree's for genealogical purposes, but you should include with a request, a copy of the retiree's death certificate and state your relationship to the person. If your ancestor had a Social Security number whose first three numbers fall between 700 and 728, your know that he received railroad retirement benefits.




# AncestryPlus Search Tips

AncestryPlus is the enhanced version of Ancestry.com's celebrated genealogical database that provides information on 1.7 billion names, more than 3,000 databases, primary source documents and a variety of genealogical research tools. AncestryPlus also includes Gale's Passenger and Immigration Lists Index, featuring published lists of 2.8 million passengers who arrived in America from the 17th to 19th centuries, and Biography and Genealogy Master Index — a database of more than 13 million indexed biographical sketches.


### SEARCH TOOLS

AncestryPlus features a variety of easy-to-use search options. There are four main ways to access the data. The **Global Search** on the home page will search all of the AncestryPlus databases. Enter a first and last name in the search box and click **Search**.




### SEARCH BY RECORD TYPE

The home page is organized primarily by record type. Record categories include the following: census vital and church; military; biography and history; court, land and probate; reference; immigration; directories; periodicals and newspapers; and compiled genealogies. By choosing a specific database wihin a record type, you may search a number of fields specific to that database.




### SEARCH BY LOCALITY

The home page also includes a feature to search by geographic location. Selecting a state will display all of the databases that contain information for that state. You can also select a country to learn more about that country.



### ADVANCED SEARCH

Click on **Advanced Options** to access the **Advanced Search** page. This search option allows you to select the type(s) of databases to search (including reference material), to perform Soundex (or "sounds like") searches, specify date ranges and to specify search proximity.

## Send "Friendly" Email

Email is a great boon to family historians. It allows us to keep in touch with friends and family members, to contact libraries and archives, to receive electronic newsletters (like Everton's own daily *Family History Newsline*), and to be part of online discussion groups. And, we can do so without the added expense of postage stamps.

As useful as email is, it also bears its own set of etiquette rules. To keep on the right side of those who receive your email, follow a few simple guidelines:

Keep it simple. Up front that means keeping your initial email message short and concise. If you've already established an online relationship with someone, feel free to be as longwinded as they will allow. But, for first contact, stay on topic and state your business forthrightly. Give enough details for a reasonable response if you're asking a question, but don't go overboard with extraneous items.

Stick with plain text. Some email software is automatically configured to send your messages in fancy type or as a Web page. This may be fine if you're corresponding with someone who knows what to expect, but it can be a major problem for someone whose software or hardware can't handle "fancy" messages, and it can make it almost impossible for a computer program (especially list managers like *Majordomo* and *Listserv*) to handle your requests. Turn this feature off unless you have a special need for it.

Avoid sending attachments, for several reasons; the first is plain courtesy. It can take precious minutes to download a large attached file, and some mail systems don't allow them. Second, since attachments can contain viruses, many people delete email with attachments immediately. It's OK to send an attachment to someone, but make sure they know it's coming beforehand, and that they have your permission to send it.

Send URLs instead of attaching a Web page or a photo. Found something on the Web that you just have to tell everyone about? Save everyone time and reduce the load on the Net by sending just the URL (the Internet address) for the website, news article, or picture you saw. Your email will get through faster, and the recipients can access the information at their leisure.

Use the Blind CC: function. When you send the same message to a group of people, don't list all of their addresses where everyone can see them. This takes up extra bandwidth, and could expose addresses to people who shouldn't see them. Find your email software's Blind CC: function, and use it.

Check the destination address before you send the message. You may be surprised at the number of people who send out email without making sure it's addressed to the right person. When you send it to the wrong address you irritate the person who received it but shouldn't have, and you deny the intended recipient the value of your message.

Email is a great way to build friendships that last. Make sure it works that way for you by being "friendly" in the way you use it.



#### PURE GENEALOGY or FAMILY HISTORY?-Midge Waters

The bare bones of pure genealogy provide a framework for an absorbing family history. I am now seeking not just names, with the vital statistics of birth, marriage, children, and death, and the relationships that they show, but how my ancestors lived their lives amid



political struggles for land and power between nations and kings, economic hardships, and coping with the uncertain matter of existence in an age of very little medicine and many health problems.

My recent travels in Sweden and Finland allowed me to learn much more of the world of my forebears, and changed my views from a two-dimensional black and white to 3-D and living technicolor. It seems that my contacts in Scandinavia, my researchers and guides (now my friends) and all the relatives, also share an interest in how we live as well. While in Sweden and Finland, I was interviewed by two newspapers; they printed the story of Americans seeking their past and about the ancestors we sought, with photos of the people and places, and our experiences during the search.

Among my adventures was the tour with an e-mail friend, with whom we stayed, to learn about the 1809 conflicts among Swedes, Russians, and Finns. We drove through the Gunsmoke Trail near Savar, on Sweden's east coast and visited the memorial in honor of those who died in battle erected near Umea. We traveled by ferry across the Bay of Bothnia to Vasa, where I'd been

guided previously on another trip to the site of the final battle in that conflict in Finland, in 1809, at Oravais. This time, in a beautifully preserved home of a relative in Björköby, I had coffee in the room where military decisions had been made during those battles. My family lived through these wars on their own land.

History plays a large role in our family study....and I learned from hosts about the historical significance of Solna, home of our host family, which was important before Stockholm was the capital. Göteborg was the main port from which emigrants left, and my 7th half-cousin once-removed made sure that I learned something of that city's history and attractions. In all the cities I visited, I was Struck by the careful preservation of old historic buildings, and the importance of remembering the old ways of life. Many of the smallest towns have their own "museum", usually an old home furnished with items of its day. I can recommend those of Göteborg, Uddevalla, Sigtuna, Stockholm (especially Skansen), Gammalgården in Bengtsfors, and a couple on privately owned farms in Replot, Finland and Tallberg, Sweden.

All that amid the highttechnology of the present, reflects their interests now....these people are very cosmopolitan, well-traveled, speak several languages, and are dressed in modern styles that may reach the USA in a year or two. The communities are neat and clean, with gardens and fountains, and even the farm and forest dwellers keep their properties tidier than we see in this country. But even with their advanced technology and great educational system, they honor the old ways and customs, too. The works of their authors, composers, and artists reflect this, and one can always find the crafts and customs of their past, use of the "folk drakt (traditional costumes), the wonderful foods, and holiday celebrations that were typical of the "old country".

Going back even further, geologically, we visited a site which had intrigued me from the time I spotted it from the air several years ago.. Söderfjärden, where over 500 million years ago a meteor had crashed south of Sundom, Finland, and changed the face of the earth there for many miles around. At first there was a lake in the center of the crater, but as the centuries passed, the lake shrank, and finally drained so that it could be farmed instead of fished, as it had been.


Visiting Höga Kusten (high coast) on Sweden's east coast was a highlight of my last trip...this area is how a World Heritage Site, and provides scenery and insight into the huge uplift of land that happened in the millions of years that followed the retreat of the ice age glaciers which covered that land to a depth of miles at one time. The land here (and across the bay in Finland) is still rising slowly, adding acreage to each country gradually. A small creek that my ancestors could once navigate illustrates this, and so does my exhilarating ascent in a ski-lift to the top of Skulegerget, a mountain which at one time showed only its top above the waters of the Bay of Bothnia.

The Bay of Bothnia between Sweden and Finland was a sea-going travel corridor, and the "Postrudden", formerly ammail delivery route by sailboat, still is re-enacted annually over the Kvarken between the two countries. My 5th cousin, who takes part in this, has told me about this re-enactment which takes a lot more time, with much more danger, than the ferry ride we took, which lasted only a few comfortable hours.


Even in Uddevally, the site of the old family farm Sigelhult, my e-mail friend Gita presented me with a shell that she herself had excavated

from the ancient shell banks there, the oldest in the world, which had been deposited by geological changes and forces some 10-11,000 years ago, when that part of the land was re-shaped. And everywhere, one can learn of the ancient people through the archeological digs still in progress.


I have a new appreciation of this part of the world, with its careful preservation of the past combined with acceptance and even leadership in the technological and educational modern life. To see their light, bright, and squeaky-clean homes, too, is to view a tasteful mix of the modern conveniences and artful decoration with the antique and historic artifacts they have grown up with. I returned home to find that I had to cope with a culture-shock....in my own country!



#### LINEAGE CHART OF DIANE HANSEN JONES




#### Pedigree Chart of Brett Dicken Brown 4 April 2003





If your answer was 1896, then you are correct! The "fad" of genealogy has lasted over 100 years!






#### Murphy's Law and Genealogy......

- Your sister neglects to mention that the data she gave you, which you have researched, and sent to other researchers, was just a guess with no foundation, and she guessed because she "didn't like leaving that line blank."
- Your mother neglects to mention that, "Oh, yes, we knew they changed their name."


