### **First Annual UP-Wide Genealogy Society Meeting Held**

The 1<sup>st</sup> annual UP Genealogy Society Meeting was held Saturday October 29, 2005 at Peter White Public Library in Marquette. Over 30 members representing 5 different societies (Chippewa, Iron, Gogebic, Luce-Mackinac, and Marquette) were present. Joan Ball, president of the Marquette society, gave the opening welcome and then speakers from each society gave reports on their society's projects, holdings, meetings, and speakers. A discussion was held concerning future meetings and it was proposed that Peter White be utilized for future meetings due to its central location and availability of meeting rooms. In addition it was suggested that future meetings be held in September due to better weather and longer daylight hours for driving. There was also an exchange of handouts and items to purchase, during which there was much sharing of ideas and information between the societies. After lunch Vicki Mann, Peter White librarian, gave a presentation on using the Ancestry, Heritage Quest, and Sanborn Maps online databases.

The meeting adjourned after the presentation and members were then free to utilize the library's genealogy collection and online computers.

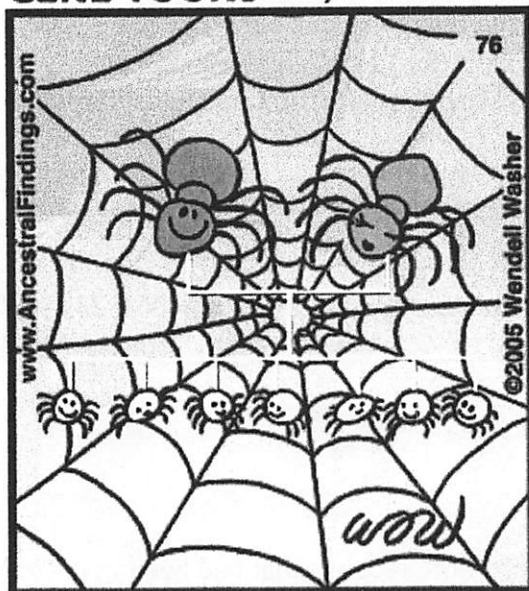
## **GENEALOGY WORKSHOP PLANNED**

Mr. Joseph Bashaw was born in Ausable Forks, New York and when four years old migrated to Marquette with his parents. They came by rail and stage as far as Detroit and from that place to Marquette by boat. The boat that they came on was an old side-wheeler. They arrived in Marquette in the month of December. In those days the boats didn't stop running until the lakes were completely frozen over. It took about twenty days to complete the trip from New York.

Marquette was not a very large place when Mr. Bashaw first came here. Michigan street was the last street on the north side and Washington street extended as far as fifth street. In the early days



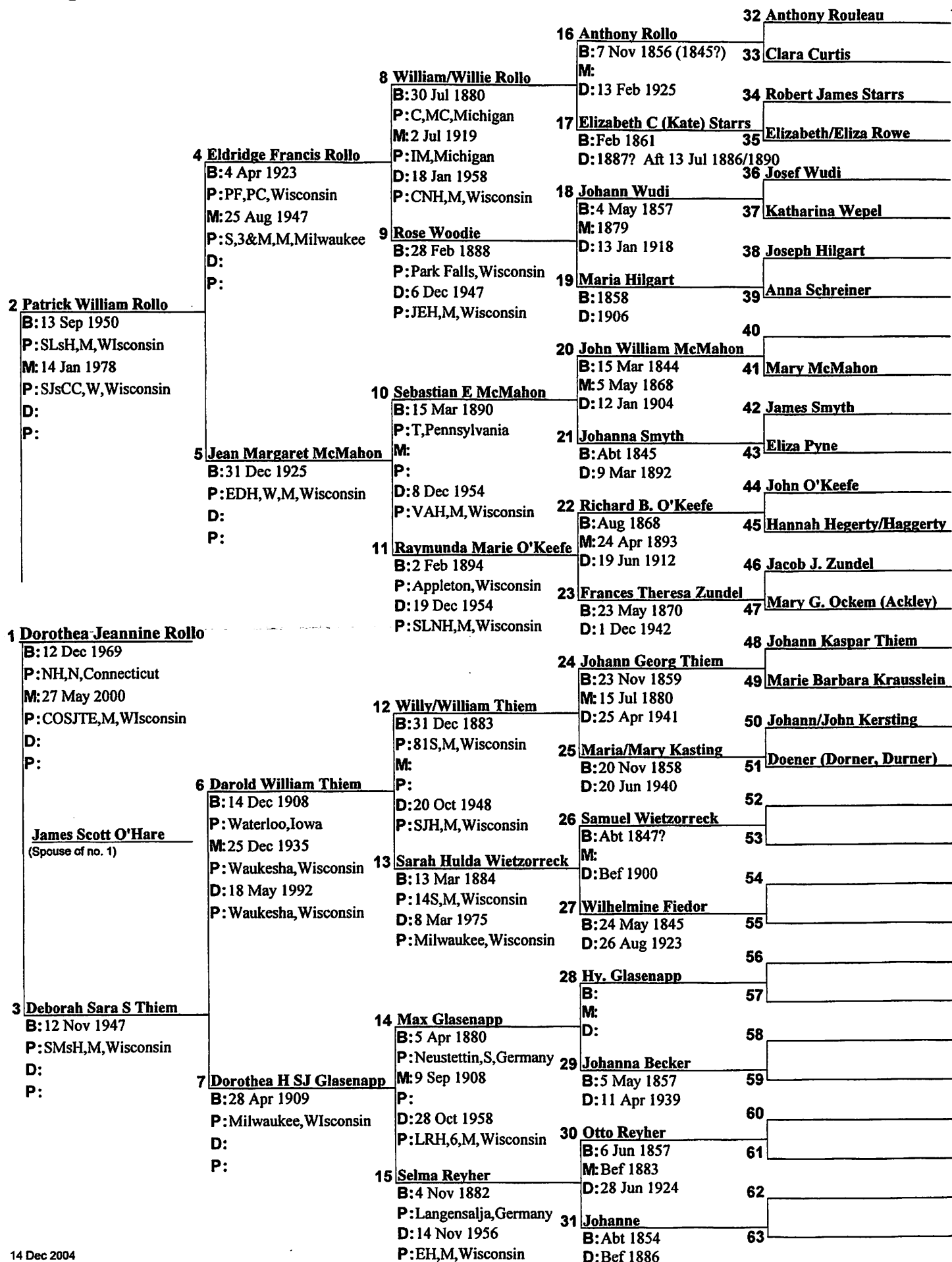
there were only two butcher shops in town. One of these was owned by a man by the name of Rendill. He also owned a slaughter house located near where the Palestra now stands. There being very little farming in those days, cattle were brought in on sailing vessels and later by rail. A great deal of trouble was experienced in getting in provisions for the populace and for the horses. If the boats were late in the spring a shortage of provisions would occur.

In the early days there used to be as high as fifteen sailing vessels in the harbor at one time. This was due to the fact that it took so long for loading and unloading. It took three or four days to load one ship. The ore was hauled from Megaunee by teams on a plank road or tramway. The method of unloading coal vessels was very slow. An empty steel oil barrel was used a hoist-bucket. This was lowered into the ship and filled. It was then hoisted to the deck of the vessel, through the use of horses, and loaded into wheelbarrows, which were in turn wheeled to the dock and emptied.

The only means of heating the offices in the early days was through the use of coal stoves. Each office would have a coal ben located in the hall or in some cases right in the office proper. Mr. Bashaw recalls that as a boy he used to earn twenty-five cents a ton for carrying the coal from the street to the bens in the different offices. Mr. Bashaw also recalls that many places of business have changed locations. The South Shore railroad shops were at one time located on the ground where the passenger depot now stands. The opera house was up over Flanagan's livery stable. There were iron furnaces located at Forestville, Chocolay and the Carp furnace near where the State's Prison now is. Mr. Bashaw, when a young man cut cord wood, at forty-five cents a cord, for the Carp furnace.

## NEWSLETTERS ONLINE



**FREE!!!**

Genealogists are free to buy products or services, but when useful things come to your computer completely free of charge, it is wise to make use of them, since they offer tips of all sorts, information of new products and services, and connections with other family researchers who share helpful advice and interesting experiences, and finally....inspiration!

These free items are the e-mail newsletters, which arrive daily, weekly, or monthly. I find these seven interesting and useful, and read each issue thoroughly. There are some issues which do not have anything that will benefit me, my other e-mail contacts, or the society, but often there is an article or announcement which I feel should be brought to the attention of others.

Many researchers are interested mainly in their own families, and this is fine, but one never knows when you will discover a new mailing list, another website for your special interest, or tips that will help you in your own hunt for relatives. Many beginners restrict their search to their own family, but as their interest and abilities grow, begin to understand the larger field of genealogy, and want to know more about how it works. And this is good for our society, too. The more an individual member knows about research, the more help he is to the other members of our group. Eventually, the whole genealogical field is better off, as knowledge is shared. We may not want to become certified genealogists, but our desire to learn is satisfied.

The first newsletter on my list (alphabetically) is Ancestry Daily News, which usually contains certain features besides its notices of new topics and maps that have been added that day to Ancestry.com., which we can use in the library, free of charge, too.

- 1) an article by a well-known genealogist or other expert, which can be forwarded to others by e-mail, or saved by using their printer-friendly version of the article.
- 2) Quick tips sent in by readers, which are archived for retrieval when needed;
- 3) Clipping of the day, which reprints special reports of historical events, etc.
- 4) Fast Facts, which report on new computer applications and products,
- 5) Thought for Today, a quote which I look forward to and sometimes save.
- 6) And of course, some of the features and benefits of using Ancestry.Com, the sponsor of the newsletter.

Second: Dear Myrtle, which appears sometimes twice a day, or every few days, whenever something of interest to computer-users and genealogists comes across her desk. It includes down-to-earth practical advice, and one can use the Digest mode or receive each message individually. Readers send in their offerings, and Myrt lists new websites and databases, and happenings such as seminars and classes. This column also goes live with interviews by genealogists and other speakers.

Third: Eastman's Online Genealogy Newsletter (EOGN), which is available in two versions, the standard edition or the Plus edition, which includes special articles and costs \$19.95 and comes to you weekly. The contents of these weekly issues are archived for later retrieval. New articles are posted daily at their website <http://www.eogn.com> and if your provider has filtered out your copy, you can read it online, using a password and User ID. You have better luck if you do not use AOL.

Fourth: Genealogy Research Spotlight, sponsored by Genealogy.com. It arrives monthly, and includes Tip of the Month, Ask the expert, This month in History, How do I..., and Success Story, This Month in History, and other lists of free resources, online articles to click on, news of genealogy classes, etc.

Fifth: Global Gazette, sent by the Global Genealogy and History Bookstore; includes a lot of information about Canadian resources, news about available records, software update about genealogy computer programs, and news of upcoming events concerning history and genealogy, and special offers from the company. It is a good way to keep abreast of publications in the field.

Sixth: Rootsweb Review, a weekly E-zine, brought to you by Rootsweb.com. It includes the latest news, new databases, webpages, and mailing lists at Rootsweb. There are always tips from readers, using Rootsweb in special ways, and other features and articles which are interesting and helpful.

Seventh: UpFront with NGS is a read-only weekly mailing list, and includes information about the National Genealogical Society in Arlington Virginia. Articles, comments and suggestions from readers are printed, and one can learn about the NGS Learning Center, the Member Resource Center, annual national conferences, and genealogical events like workshops, conferences, etc. around the country..

Remember that the subjects of genealogy and family history are now listed in the top three subjects in popularity online, so there are a lot of people out there searching, and lending help from their experiences, too. In order to keep up with the new products and techniques, and all the content that is now made available on your home computer, one must reach out and take advantage of what is out there.

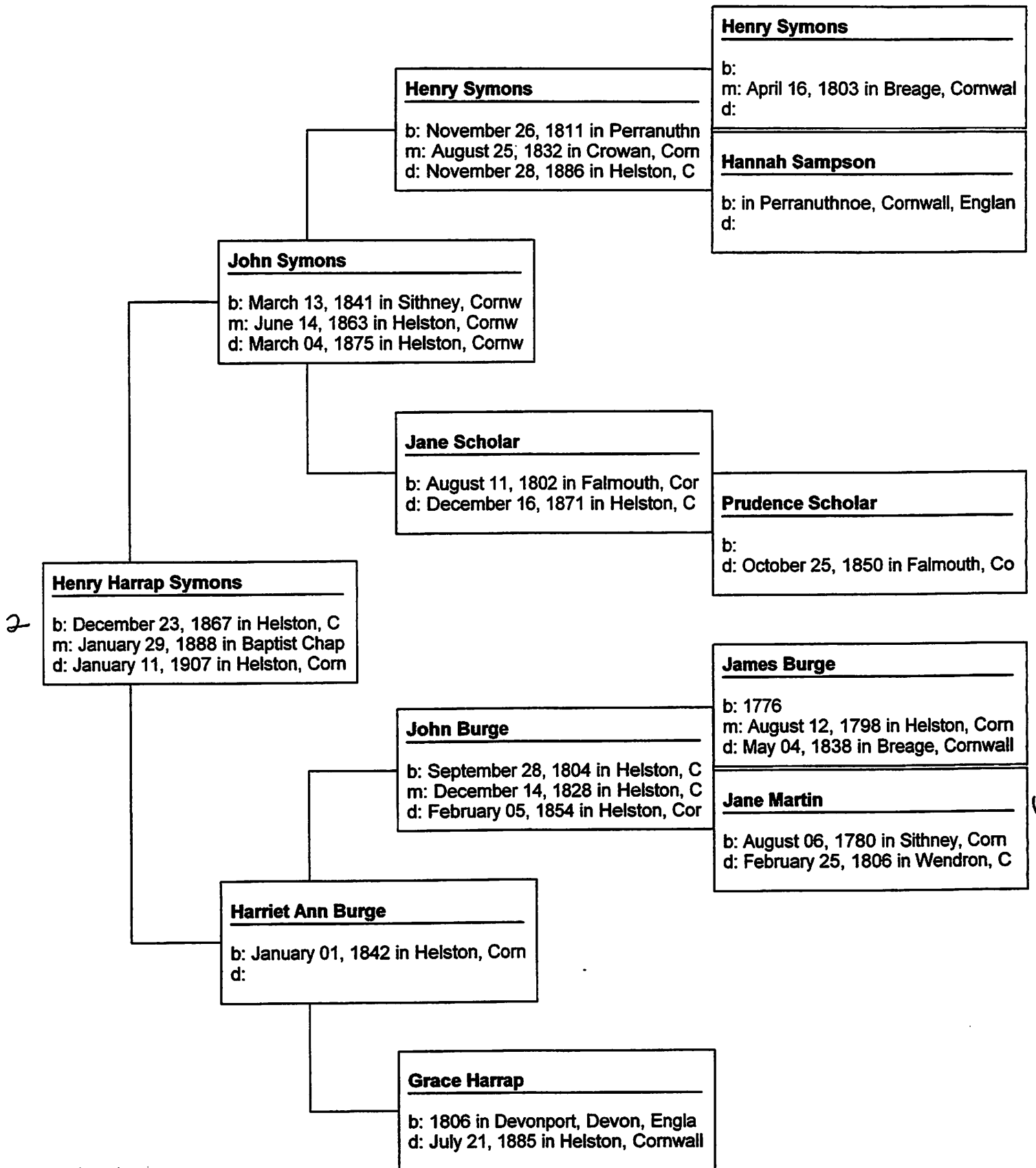

### The Society's Research Facilities

**The GRO Indexes** (formerly St Catherine's Indexes) for England and Wales. The complete indexes of Civil Registration (Births, Marriages & Deaths) 1837 - 1999, on microfiche, alphabetically arranged for each quarter. Other GRO miscellaneous indexes include War Deaths; Armed Services births, deaths, marriages overseas, 1796 - 1965; Consular indexes; etc.

**Census:** 1841 and 1851 for Cornwall (with a number of areas indexed). 1851 for Devon (indexed), 1861 for Cornwall. 1871 for Cornwall. 1881 for the whole of England & Wales (alphabetical by County). 1891 for Cornwall. 1901 for Cornwall (not yet complete).

**The International Genealogical Index (IGI):** 1988 edition for Cornwall, England and most of the world. 1992 edition for Cornwall and Devon.

**Marriages:** The Phillimore transcripts, 1538 - 1812, covering most of Cornwall, are chronological in parishes (26 volumes) and indexed by CFHS alphabetically for the county. CFHS Marriage Index, pre Civil Registration (indexed alphabetically). Ross and Boyd Marriage Indexes covering most of Cornwall, both alphabetical in 25 year periods, and containing parishes not covered by Phillimore. Ross goes to the 1870s generally and to 1925 in many cases; Boyd to 1812. All marriages recorded in Cornwall up to the start of civil registration in 1837 have been transcribed and are available for surname search on our database.

**Burial / Monumental Inscriptions (MIs)** The MIs (gravestones) for many burial grounds in Cornwall have been recorded and indexed alphabetically. Most of the Burial registers, 1813 -1837, have been indexed alphabetically. (The MIs is an ongoing project and is regularly updated)

**Other material:** Transcripts of many parish registers; many overseas records; journals of other Family History Societies including overseas; family pedigrees and histories; parish histories; poor law apprenticeship/master records; some passenger lists; strays, much material concerning emigration, particularly to the USA.

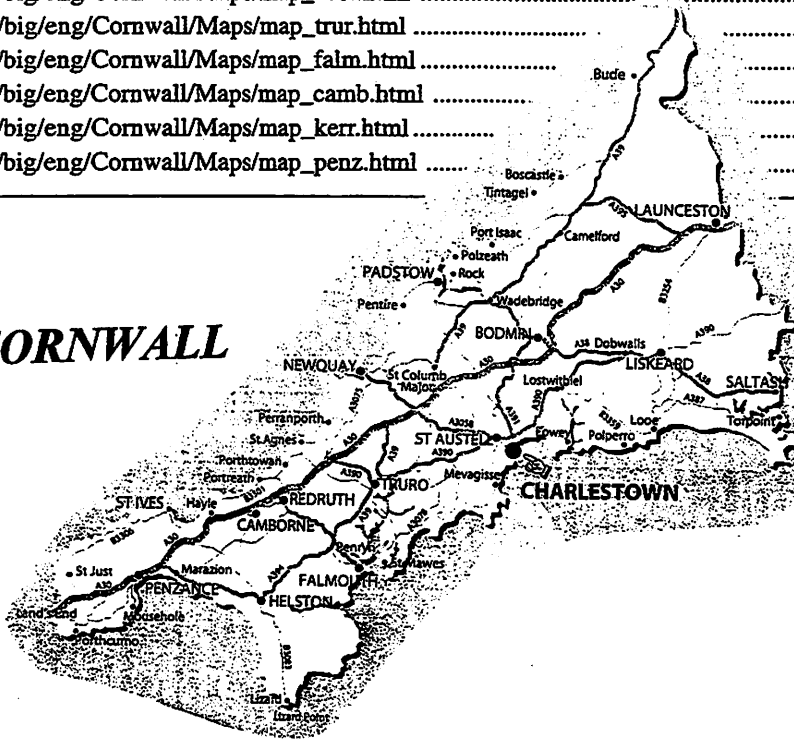

## BOOKS:

### “CHEROKEE ROOTS”, VOLUME 1 AND 2

Two new library books in the MCGS collection

To search Cherokee ancestors, use this two volume set to find indexes to the Indian Rolls from 1817-1924. Names of Cherokees enumerated on the censuses can be found in these books.

## THE ROLLS

Though it is not commonly known, western migration of the Cherokee Nation commenced well before the removal in 1838. (Known as “The Trail of Tears”).

By the time the Eastern Cherokee arrived in northeastern Oklahoma in 1839, approximately 1/3 of the Cherokee Nation was already residing there.

Records of how many people, and when, moved west are limited. It is known for a fact, that as early as the 1790's some Cherokee moved into southeastern Missouri. It is probable that there were already Cherokee settled in the Missouri area. Due to earthquakes and flooding in Missouri, around 1812, most of the Cherokee moved into northwestern Arkansas.

Because of mounting political pressure, the United States entered treaties with the Cherokee in 1817 and 1819, for the purpose of acquiring Cherokee land in the east. Out of these treaties, the Cherokee had a choice of two alternatives. They could either enroll to move to the traded for land in northwestern Arkansas or they could file for a reservation of 640 acres in the east which would revert to the state upon their death or abandonment of the property.

By treaty in 1828, the Cherokee ceded their lands in Arkansas for lands in Oklahoma. There was also some incentive for those east of the Mississippi to join the Cherokee in Oklahoma.

This brings us to our first two rolls in “Cherokee Roots” Volume 1.

**Reservation Rolls 1817:** A listing of those desiring a 640 tract in the east and permitted to reside there.

**Emigration Rolls 1817-35:** Those who filed to emigrate to Arkansas country and after 1828, to Oklahoma.

Then came the rest as follows:

**Henderson Roll 1835:** A census of over 16,000 Cherokee residing in Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee, and North Carolina to be removed to Oklahoma under the treaty of New Echota (1835).



- Mullay Roll 1848:** This was a census of 1,517 Cherokee people remaining in North Carolina after the removal of 1838. John C. Mullay took the census pursuant to an act of congress in 1848.
- Siler Roll 1851:** A listing of some 1700 Eastern Cherokee entitled to a per capita payment pursuant an act of Congress in 1850.
- Chapman Roll 1852:** Prepared by Albert Chapman as a listing of those Cherokee actually receiving payment based on the Siler census.
- Swetland Roll 1869:** Prepared by S.H. Swetland as a listing of those Cherokee, and their decendents, who were listed as remaining in North Carolina by Mullay in 1848. Made pursuant to an act of Congress (1868) for a removal payment authorization.
- Hester Roll 1883:** Compiled by Joseph G. Hester as a roll of Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians in 1883. (This roll is an excellent source of information, including ancestors, Chapman Roll number, age, English name and Indian name.
- Churchill Roll 1908:** By Inspector Frank C. Churchill to certify members of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. Like the Hester Roll, includes a lot of information including degree of blood. Rejectees also are included.
- Guion Miller Roll 1909:** Compiled by Mr. Miller of all Eastern Cherokee, not Old Settlers, residing either east or west of the Mississippi. Ordered by Court of Claims as a result of suit won by the Eastern Cherokee. See Guion Miller Roll West for more details.
- Baker Roll 1924:** This was supposed to be the final roll of the Eastern Cherokee. The land was to be alloted and all were to become regular citizens. Fortuantely the Eastern Cherokee avoided the termination procedures, unlike their brothers of the Nation to the west. The Baker Roll Revised is the current membership roll of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians in North Carolina.

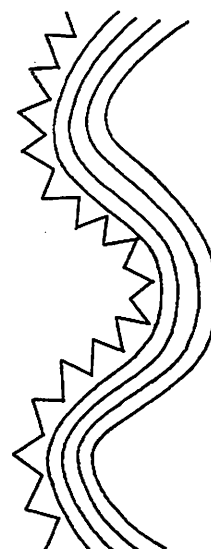
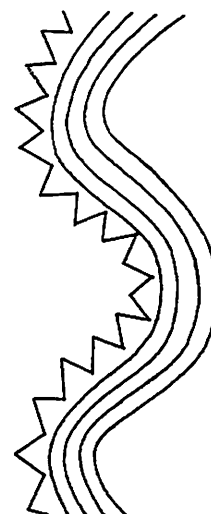
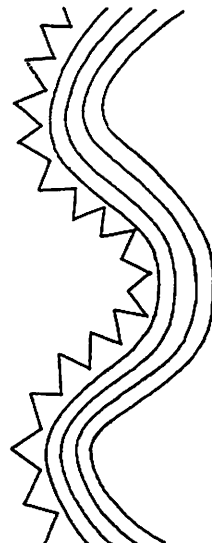
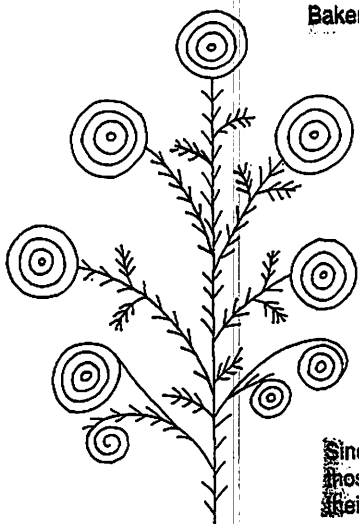
## CHEROKEE ROOTS VOLUME 2

### THE ROLLS WEST OF THE MISSISSIPPI

Since the removal in 1838, there have been numberpus census taken of those Cherokee now finding themselves west of the Mississippi instead of their homeland in the east.

The most information and cross reference can be obtained by utilizing four major census as follow:

- Old Settler Roll 1851:** A listing of Cherokee still living in 1851 who were already residing in Oklahoma when the main body of the Cherokee arrived in the winter of 1839 - as a result of the Treaty of New Echota(1835). Approximately one third of the Cherokee people at that time were Old Settlers and two thirds were new arrivals.
- Brennen Roll 1852:** The first census of the new arrivals of 1839. The New Echota Treaty group -"Trail of Tears"



**The Dawes Roll  
1898-1914**

The final roll for allotting the land and terminating the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma. Senator Henry L. Dawes was the commission's chairman, and consequently, the name Dawes is associated with the final roll. The roll turned out to not be as final as it was expected to be. Upon the reorganization of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma in the 1970's, the Dawes Roll became the only means of certifying membership. To be enrolled by the Cherokee Nation, one must prove ancestry to a person enrolled by Dawes. Information on enrollment with the Cherokee Nation may be obtained by writing to:

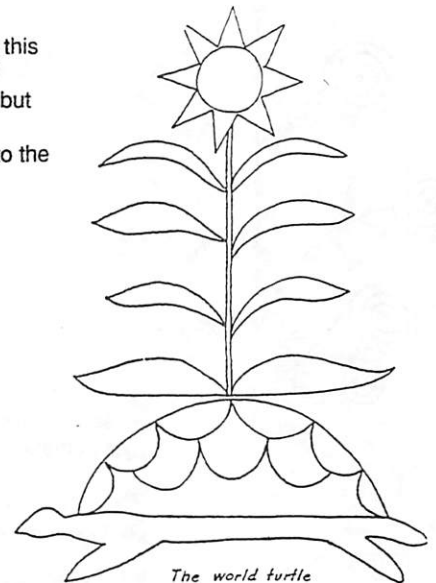
**Guion Miller Roll 1909:**

A Court of Claims suit resulted in members of the Eastern Cherokee living either east or west of the Mississippi, not including the Old Settlers, to be entitled to participate in a monetary award by the Court, as result of various treaty violations.

In order to participate, one had to be alive on May 28, 1906 and establish themselves as a member of the Eastern Cherokee, or a descendant of, at the time of the violated treaties. 48,847 separate applications were filed, representing some 90,000 individuals. Out of this number, 3,436 Cherokee east of the Mississippi and 27,284 Cherokee west of the Mississippi were certified by Mr. Miller as being eligible to participate in the award.

One lucky enough to find an ancestor on this roll can find out a tremendous amount of information. Not only is the roll detailed, but copies of the actual applications are available, which in most cases, go back to the mid and early 1800's.

Largest tribe in the southeast,  
the Cherokee wrested productive farms  
from wooded highlands—woods that were  
to shelter a moody dreamer, Sequoyah  
His dreams gave the Cherokee  
writing (page 151). Born about 1760,  
he died on a trip to Mexico in 1843.

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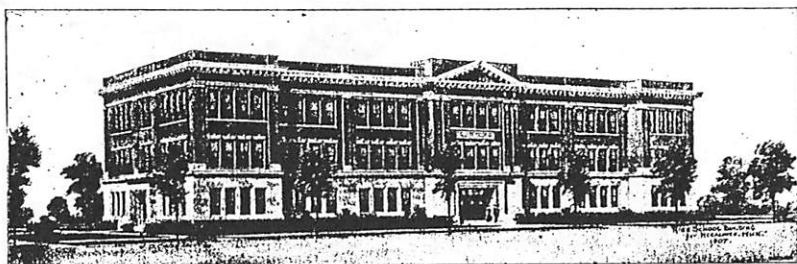

Descendants of Wisconsin residents now have the power to look up their ancestors online. The State Historical Society has launched a free online index of pre -1907 births at

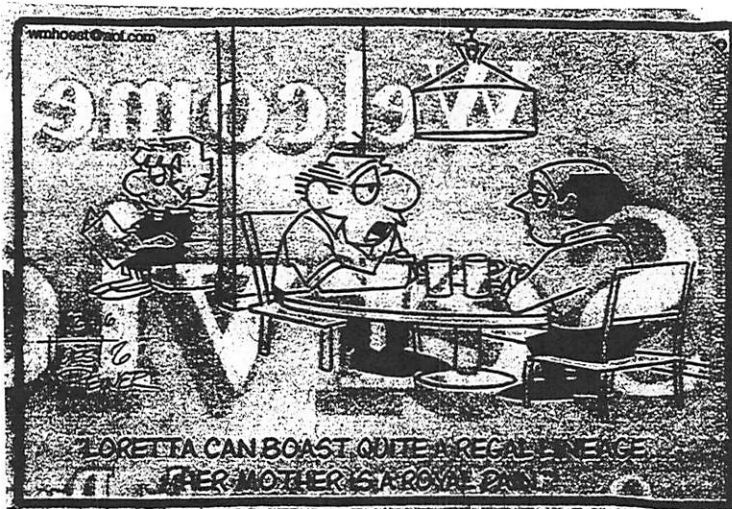

The database, built with a 1970's era microfiche index and tens of thousands of delayed birth records, catalogs more than a million Wisconsin births from the 1840's through 1907.

Search the index by just a last name, county, birth date or year of birth. If you know the birth date, you can search on it plus a first name. Or, when information is really sparse, browse by a county and a birth year. Once you find your ancestor, a quick click lets you order a \$15.00 copy of the record.

### **LDS Web Site Help**

When you use the LDS Web site [www.familysearch.org](http://www.familysearch.org) you have to enter a first and last name. At times you may get over a 100 listings of the same name. Then you have to take the time to scroll down until you get the one that may be the right one in the right area.

Now there is help on the computer to help you through all of that. Hugh Wallis (with his permission) has allowed me to explain his web site to you. Hugh's web site is for North America, and the British Isles.

LDS has organized the records in the IGI into batches. These batches relate to how and when the information was extracted from source material. Hugh has made a database of the batch numbers and the source records that they apply to. They are now searchable by town, county, and country. He has also added the time that the records represent, which is something that is very helpful to me.

So if you know the area that your family is from, use Hugh's web site to go to the town and just put in a last name. It will bring up everyone in that town with the same last name on that batch number on the LDS web site. It is much easier to look though one town than a whole country. I have used this web site many times and it has helped me when I was unsure about ordering LDS films. If the name that I was looking for was not listed in that town, I didn't order it. Saved me money and research time. But if the name was there, I ordered the film and then went looking for more family.

Any facts or anecdotes relative to the history of Marquette County, Michigan, may be added here or on the reverse side of the sheet.

My brother and I left France soon after Alsace-Lorraine fell into German hands. My father and mother died within the course of a year and half after this occurred. He could not submit to German rule. Landing in New York I married Mr. Bertal after a residence of six months; living there for seven or eight years. Then we moved to Traverse City. My children were born in New York. In 1883 I married Mr. Duval, in Traverse City, coming to Marquette in 1884. The trip was made by train and at Mackinaw City we crossed on the ferry.

Mr. Dural established his tailor shop on Front street in a building built of sandstone which was owned by Mr. Harlow. This building stood where Huetter's store is now located. He had to live over the shop for a year, renting places being very scarce, until we found a place on Bluff street. He lived there for a year. We then bought the place where I now live, moving our shop up here a little later. The streets were laid out and sewers were being put down, but we had no electric lights. He had the first electric tailoring iron. Among the persons Mr. Dural tailored for were Mr. J. B. Spear and Mr. Harlow, senior. One amusing incidence occurred during the time we tailored. Mrs. Harlow, senior, wanted us to make a pair of trousers for her husband with carpet. I tailored with Mr. Dural until his death.

Picnics were held at the brewery park, and at Forestville. Mr. Vannier who kept a book-store on Front street used to make speeches at Fourth of July picnics. Klanningans barn housed a roller rink and a dance hall.

When I came here there were no street cars. Indians lived on the island. Chief Kabugant had his house there, while some lived near the bay here on this mainland.

The old high school burned down on a Saturday. Miss Chandler was superintendent.

On the street I live were very few houses, Schunk's next door being one of them.

My great delight is my garden which I have tended and still care for every year.

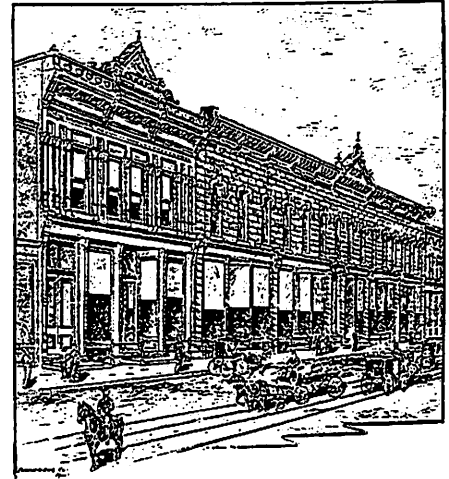

## DUVAL DIED BY GAS.

Tailor, Crazy by Drink. Turns  
on Four Jets and Com-  
mits Suicide.

ROOM FILLED WITH THE DEAD-  
LY FLUID ALL NIGHT.

### LIFE HAD LOST ITS CHARMS.

Clovis F. Duval, a French tailor with a shop under the Nester block, committed deliberate suicide by asphyxiating himself. The coroner's jury thinks he did the rash act while temporarily insane through excessive drinking. Family troubles are alleged by others to have combined with this cause.

Duval has been drinking heavily for a week back and threatening suicide as he was wont to do when he had on his drinking spells.

His wife worked with him in the shop. At seven o'clock Tuesday night she quit work and went home, expecting him to follow as soon as supper should be ready. When an hour had come and he did not come she went down town to look for him. She saw from the sidewalk that the shop was dark.

This led her to suppose that he had lain down and gone to sleep, as he did frequently, especially when he was drinking heavily. It was nothing unusual for him to sleep all night in the shop, and there have been periods of five or six days at a time when he would not come home. Knowing his habits she supposed he had lain down and would sleep off his intoxication there as well as anywhere. She turned around and went home without a suspicion of anything wrong.

It could have been only a few minutes after his wife's departure before the tailor determined to carry out his frequent threat of suicide, because when William A. Anger, who is custodian of the McKinley and Hobart club on the floor above, came back from supper he smelled gas. He and Thos. Meads who was also in the room thought it came from a leak in the pipes. They searched, but could not find a trace or a leak. Before eight o'clock the room was locked up while the Republican rally was in progress at the rink. Anger came back at ten o'clock and the gas smelled stronger than ever, but he could not locate the leak.

In the morning the odor was still worse and Anger sent for Lester Clark, the gas man. He soon convinced himself that the gas was not escaping in the club room, but in the tailor shop below. He and Anger and one or two others went down. There were half a dozen ineffectual attempts made to break the door open, and finally Anger was successful. He backed across the entryway, took a running jump at the door and carried it in.

A cloud of gas poured out that nearly suffocated the little knot of invaders. Anger, however, did not stop, but rushed across the floor to the lounge where the body was lying. One touch of the hand showed it to have been cold in death many hours. He shut off the three jets of gas in the room, which were pouring out their fatal fluid full head.

The gas had so far overcome Anger by this time that he could hardly see. Still he could hear, and feel the rush of a stream of gas from some place near the body. Men standing in the door who were less blinded by the gas than he was shouted to him to shut off the pipe which fed the little stove which kept the tailor's irons hot. He could not see the stop, but he managed to find it by feeling for it and turned it closed.

When enough gas had escaped from the room so that the party could look around, they found that in addition to turning three large burners on full blast he had disconnected the rubber tube that led from a three-quarter inch pipe to his little stove, and had drawn the tube up on the lounge and laid it along his body so that the orifice came about to his thigh. The gas rushed out of this almost in the suicide's face. He was lying on his back with one leg on the lounge and the other stretched out so it struck the floor. His mouth was wide open.

His family and the coroner were notified. Judge Cray impanelled a jury which reached the conclusion that the diseased came to his end by deliberate suicide while suffering from dementia brought on by too heavy drinking.

The unfortunate suicide held an insurance policy in the Woodmen of the World for \$1,000 and was entitled to a death and funeral benefit claim of \$500 from the St. Jean society, that is, he would have been entitled to it but for his self-inflicted death.

His claim in the Woodmen is agreed by both sides to be incontestable, because the Woodmen pay their claims without question after the policy has been in force a year. Suicide cuts no figure.

This is not the case with the St. Jean society. This is not a regular insurance order, but after its organization accident, sickness and death benefits were added as inducements for membership. None of these benefits are paid unless the member is in good and regular standing. By the by-laws any member who takes his own life is not in good and regular standing, and his family loses the benefits that would otherwise have been theirs. In regular claims the St. Jean's have been very prompt in making their settlements. In the last two cases they have paid both funeral and death benefits before the remains of the deceased were out of the house.

Funeral services were held at the house Friday morning conducted by Archdeacon Robinson.

# Social Security Records

Donna Murray Allen explains why Social Security records offer a good alternate source.

THE UNITED STATES Congress passed the Social Security Act in 1935 to provide financial assistance to the elderly. It was not intended as a resource for future genealogists to tap, but that doesn't stop savvy rooters from pursuing copies of Social Security card applications that may supply elusive data like a maiden name. They also know the Social Security Administration (SSA) will disclose a person's death date and where the last benefit check was mailed.

First a little history. The first Social Security Numbers (SSN) were issued in 1936. Originally only the worker got benefits, but in 1939 the SSA began awarding survivors' benefits to the spouses and children of workers who paid into Social Security. Since citizenship has never been a requirement to obtain a SSN, there may be records for your immigrant ancestor.

Not all workers contribute to Social Security in the past and some don't today. Federal workers hired before 1984 who chose to stay in the Civil Service Retirement System and some state and local employees whose employers have their own pension plans do not contribute to Social Security. No SSA records exist for anyone who didn't contribute to the program.

The SSA retains copies of everybody's original application for a Social Security card. These little gems usually contain the applicant's name, date and place of birth and parents' names. Citizenship status was added in the 1970s. (Applications for individuals born in 1910 or before generally do not include parents' names or the applicant's place of birth.)

Since dead people have no privacy rights, anyone may obtain a copy of any deceased person's Social Security card application under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). The SSA won't release

Unfortunately, most of the people on the SSDI died after 1962, which is when the SSA began computerizing records.

If you only want to know a death date or where the decedent lived when he or she collected the last payment, ask the SSA to conduct a search. If the person was receiving benefits, the SSA can tell you when he or she died and where the last payment was sent. (The SSA has no death records for anyone who didn't receive benefits). The cost is \$16 or \$18.

Trying to locate a long-lost sibling? The SSA will sometimes act as an intermediary. Write a letter to your brother or sister, stick it into its own envelope and mail it inside a larger envelope addressed to the SSA, along with a request that it be forwarded to your kin because it's important. Don't write your life story. Do include data like the person's full name, age and birthplace.

Unless a person is currently receiving benefits under a SSA program, the letter will likely be sent to the employer who reported earnings for that person. Since reuniting people is not a function of the SSA, the service is limited. The SSA won't tell the sender of the letter if the address has been located and no assurance is given that the letter will be delivered or that a reply will be received.

To request a copy of a person's Social Security card application, a numident or information about the death of an individual, write to: Social Security Administration, OEO FOIA Workgroup, 300 N. Green St., P.O. Box 33022, Baltimore, MD, 21290. Include a check for the appropriate amount.

information on living persons without their written consent.

A copy of an application costs \$27 if you know the individual's SSN. Otherwise you'll pay \$29 and you must furnish the person's full name, date and place of birth and parents' full names so that the record may be located.

The original application card was signed by the applicant. If you're not set on having a copy of the person's signature, request a numident or extract instead. For \$18 (\$16 if you know the SSN) you get the same data but in printout form instead of a duplicate of the actual card.

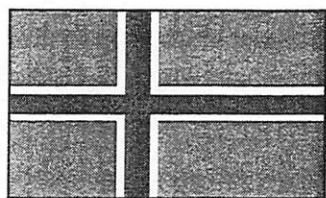
The quickest way to latch on to a copy of an application is through the Social Security Death Index (SSDI). The free searchable database can be found on sites like Rootsweb.com. Just plug in the person's name and, if you get a hit, you'll immediately learn basic facts like the person's birth and death dates. Itching to know more? Scroll to the far right side of the page and click. A form letter appears. Download it, mail it with a check for \$27, and you'll get a copy of the person's application.

## Social Security Tip.... Numbers by state

The first three number in a sSocial Security number tell the state in which the card was issued. That might help to locate records in a place ohther than where a n ancestor retired. On Social Security records you get birth date, state, county residence, zip and zip code wheere death benefit lump sum payment was sent. 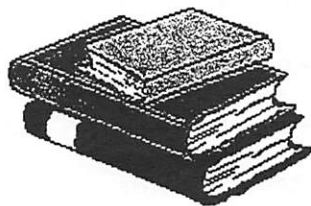

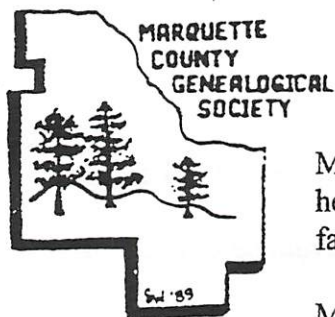
