Over 350 residents of Marquette County were interviewed in the 1920's by college students of Professor Chase of Northern State Teachers College (now Northern Michigan University). These interviews were conducted in most of the Marquette County communities and tell the story of immigration, families and times of old. A sample is as follows:

# WHERE IS MY ANCESTOR'S TOMBSTONE?????

As genealogists, most of us try to locate the tombstones of our relatives. Many hours are spent walking around cemeteries searching for the location of our ancestors burial place with the goal in mind of taking a photograph of the headstone. We often come upon broken markers or worse yet, no markers or crosses where some should be.......

The following articles from the *Marquette Weekly Mining Journal*, September 1905, reveal why some markers will never be found. This story confirms my conviction that it is our responsibility to our ancestors to record information from the tombstones in our local cemeteries, so that future generations can learn about their relatives. [Ed.]

# RAIDED GLADSTONE

Sept 23, 905

CEMETERY VANDALS WRECKED TOMBSTONES THERE LAST WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

Damage in Two Cemeteries at Escanaba Estimated at \$5,000—Mysterious Package Left by Unknown Man at Oconto.

Gillett and Oconto Falls, Aug. 31. Green Valley, Sept. 9. Lena, Sept. 12. Oconto, Sept. 13. Peshtigo, Sept. 14.

Birch Creek, Menominee county, Sept. 16.

Escanaba, Sept. 19. Gladstone, Sept. 20.

The above is the itinerary of the Catholic cemetery raiders during the past twenty days. At none of the towns visited have the officers been able to obtain a tangible clew to the mysterious vandals, although strict watch was maintained at all depots and public places along the lines of railways in northern Wisconsin and in the southern part of the upper peninsula.

Two Cemeteries Raided.

At Escanaba, the damage done in St. Joseph's and St. Anne's Catholic ceme-teries is estimated at \$5,000. Nearly every marble and granite cross in the cemeteries was either completely demolished or dislodged from its base, while wooden crosses were chopped down with axes, and piled up in great heaps in different parts of the cemeteries. The Escanaba authorities believe that three men constitute the gang of raiders, as the footprints of the men at places in the cemeteries show three different sizes of shoes worn. The officers also think that it would have been a physical impossibility for one man alone and unassisted, to have done the wrecking in the two cemeteries, as over two hundred monuments were attacked, and hundreds of small wooden chopped to pieces or uprooted.

For nearly a week prior to the raid, guards patrolled the two cemeteries, but owing to a misunderstanding, the watchmen did not appear Tuesday night, when the raiders carried out their work.

Left a Mysterious Package.

In connection with the cemetery raid at Oconto, A. V. Classon, prosecuting attorney of the county, furnishes an interesting story which may later suggest a solution of the mystery. Classon left Oconto on the date of the raid, going to the northern part of the state, and only returned Wednesday last. When he entered his office he found on his desk a package containing a number of copies of the Review and Sabbath Herald, a paper published at Washington, D. C., in the interests of the Seventh Day Adventist faith. The papers were wrapped in manila paper, and tied with black sewing thread. On the wrapper was written the following:

"Please study up the question of Sunday laws. You will some time be called upon to defend religious liberty, which is fast being taken from us. Will call up-

on you soon."

Gladstone Cemetery Raided.

The following, an Associated Press dispatch from Escanaba, was received by The Mining Journal Thursday:


"A large number of crosses and monuments were broken and overturned in the Catholic cemetery at Gladstone last (Wednesday) evening. This is the third raid made on Catholic cemeteries in this district within a few days, and the people are so wrought up that it is believed the vandal will be lynched if caught.

"A mysterious stranger who was ar-

"A mysterious stranger who was arrested vesterday afternoon and was released later is suspected. When he left town he went along the Gladstone cemetery road. Later when watchers went to the cemetery to guard it for the night, they found the damage done. Scores of people are now searching for this stranger."

Suspect in Custody.

A later dispatch said: "A man giving the name of Charles Gallagher, of Battle Creek, Mich., has been arrested at Gladstone on suspicion because his shoes fitted footprints found near the damaged crosses/in the cemetery."

# WRECKER OF GRAVE STONES TAKEN HERE

sept, 30, 1905

KOSE KAZIMER CAPTUREL THURS-DAY MORNING WHILE ENGAGED IN HIS NEFARIOUS WORK.

# IS APPARENTLY INSANE

Offered No Resistance to the Officers-Believed to Be the Man Responsible for All the Work of Ruin in Catholic Cemeteries.

Kose Kazimer, a thinly clad, half-starved Hungarian, forty-six years of age, is the man who has been engaged in wrecking tombstones in Wisconsin and Northern Michigan towns the past few weeks. He was captured Thursday morning by Marshal John Lehman and Deputy Marshal Emanuel Trevarrow, while in the act of breaking monuments in the Ishpeming Catholic cemetery.

Officers had been on duty at the Ishpeming cemetery for several days. Sunday morning, when news of the raid on the Negaunee cemetery was received, Mayor Persons ordered Marshal Lehman to put on officers during the day as well as during the night. The marshal and deputy went to the cemetery at 5 o'clock to relieve the two night men, remaining there until 7 o'clock, when the two day officers arrived. Thursday morning they left the city at 4:30, and entered the cemetery from the west end below the hill, taking secluded positions behind tombstones in the tall grass.

#### Heard Breaking of Stones.

Thomas Ryan and Gust Peterson, the night officers, departed as soon as Lehman and Trevarrow arrived. At 6:10 Lehman heard a noise. He looked up and saw a man in the act of breaking a stone. He crept within 100 reet of the fellow, before the latter turned and saw him. The officer covered Kazimer, who immediately threw up his hands.

Kazimer offered no resistance. Lehman soon saw that he was not a desperate character, and asked him why he had broken the stones. The reply was: "Good for the God." Kazimer was arrested in the act of breaking a stone cross he had pulled from one of the smaller monuments in the Volker lot. He had already broken crosses from the monuments in lots owned by the Perrault and Russett families, all being in the northeast corner of the cemetery, within a few feet of the Third street fence and almost opposite one of the entrances. Kazimer smashed the crosses by striking one against the other, and carried no hammer.

#### Belongings in a Bandana.

The officers hurried the man to the city lock up. Kazimer walked along willingly and talked freely in his broken tengue. The officers understood very little that he said, except when he repeated the expression with which he answered the marshal when asked why he was breaking the stones.

The marshal telephoned Prosecuting Attorney Bell, Sheriff Rough and other officers of the county. Kazimer's belongings were tied in a red bandana. In another bandana he carried several pieces of a large raw turnip, which judging from his appearance had constituted the principal part of his diet for some time past. The larger bundle contained a pair of socks, a shirt, a pair of spec-facles in a case: an awl, a piece of leath-er about three inches square, a small piece of wire, a knife with half a blade, and about a dozen slips of paper on which were printed religious embloms and prayers in the French and Hungarian languages. In a carefully wrapped package was a St. Ignatus silver medal. In another package, even more carefully wrapped, were nine small sticks of wood, varying in length from one and a half to four inches, a short lead pencil and a large safety pin. From the care with which these were wrapped, it would seem that Kazimer valued them more highly than anything else he carried. He had two silver dollars.

#### Tallies With Description.

Kazimer's appearance tallies very closely with the description of the man suspected of wrecking tombstones at Gladstone, Escanaba and other points. He is about five feet, five inches tall, thin, weighing about 130 pounds, has a heavy mustache, gray and black, the former predominating, and a gray beard less than an inch in length. He wore a black slouch hat, with a white cord around the band, a faded blue frock coat, a light gray shirt, no vest, and a brown faded trousers. His shoes are worn and patched.



John Fisher, engineer on the Northwestern passenger train running between Green Bay and Escanaba, called at the jail Thursday and identified Kazimer as having asked him for a ride out of Escanaba about 8 o'clock the evening the Giadstone cemetery was wrecked, which was the night following the vandals' visit to the Escanaba cemetery. Marshal Lehman was advised by an Escanaba officer that the man wanted there wore a shoe that had a patch on the sole. Both of Kazimer's shoes are patched on the sole. His appearance tallies exactly with the description given by Mrs. Frank Phinney of Octono Falls, Wis., as the man she saw leaving the Oconto cemetery the night it was wrecked.

#### Kazimer Denies Charges.

While confined to a cell in the jail Thursday morning Kazimer talked freely to those who were permitted to see him, but his English was so poor that he could hardly be understood. He told several persons that he had been at Escanaba, but when examined later in the day he denied having visited either Gladstone, Escanaba or Negaunce. He said that a few weeks ago he was at Savanah, Wis., where he worked five days on a farm owned by John Britain, and asserted that he has no sisters or brothers living, but that his parents reside in Hungary, where he was born.

Kazimer denied that he had broken any stones or crosses, and maintained that he had not been near the Ishpeming or any other cemetery. His replies were interpreted by Andrew Zulkey of the Winthrop, who speaks the Hungarian language. While being examined, also later while posing for a picture, Kazimer numbled to himself and acted as if displeased. As he sat in the chair facing C. D. Cole's camera Marshal Lehman commented on the improved appearance of his face, as a result of the two big meals he had received in the jail. The prisoner was bound over to the circuit court, the charge preferred against him by Prosecuting Attorney Bell being the malicious destruction of tombstones. His bonds were placed at \$1,000.

#### Signs of Mental Derangement.

Kazimer shows unmistakeable signs of mental derangement. The hording of the nine little sticks, so carefully wrapped in cloth, is a peculiar feature of his case. At the hearing he seemed to be very little concerned, and he paid no particular attention to the strangers who were permitted to see him. He talked about the breaking of crosses as being "Good for the God," and mumbled something about looking for work at a lumber camp. He seemed but little concerned because of his confinement. After people called and talked with him in the cell he would resume his place on the bunk, as if desirous of resting. He looked tired and haggard, but was calm at all times.

#### Slept Near Cemetery.

Kazimer slept in John Anderson's barn near the cemetery Wednesday night. Neither the marshal or deputy marshal saw him enter the cemetery, but it is thought he crawled through the grass and dodged behind the stones until he reached the point where he started to smash the tombstones. He was seen in the vicinity of the cemetery Wednesday, when he crossed one of the nearby fields. The officers then on duty saw him crawl through the barb wire fence and enter the barn. They paid no more attention to him, thinking he was a tramp. He carried the two red bandana handkerchiefs which he had with him when arrested Thursday morning.

Wednesday Kazimer was at the Deer Lake location, about a mile north of the cemeteries. He asked for and received food at one of the houses, but did not remain at the location long. It was after this that he was seen crossing the field and entering the barn.

#### Was in Ishpeming Tuesday.

Both Marshal Lehman and Deputy Trevarrow saw Kazimer in the city Tuesday afternoon between 4 and 6 o'clock. He then carried the larger bandana, which contained his belongings. The marshal spoke to him, and he said he was seeking work. He was asked if he had money, and reported that he was not "broke," whereupon the officer informed him that he must find a place to stay or get out of the city. The meeting took place on Main street, near the railroad crossing. That was the last the marshal saw of Kazimer until he captured him.

#### Could Have Been at Pound.

The raid at the Pound (Wis.) cemetery occurred last Monday night instead of Tuesday, as was reported here the previous day. Kazimer could have done the work there and arrived in Ishpeming Tuesday afternoon on the 4 o'clock train. It is not generally thought here, however, that he did the smashing at Pound, as his appearance does not indicate that he has had money enough to pay for his transportation to the different places. In view of the fact that he tried to secure a free ride out of Escanaba with Engineer Fisher, it would seem that he has been stealing his way. His appearance is such as would attract attention most anywhere.

#### Crowus at the Jail All Day.

Crowds of men and boys eager to get a glimpse at Kazimer stood about the city building most of the day. When C. D. Cole had the prisoner seated in a chair in Judge Andrews office preparatory to taking his picture there were nearly 100 men outside endeavoring to climb up to the windows. At 1:15 when it was thought he would be taken to Marquette there were several hundred men and boys at the South Shore station and another large crowd congregated at 5 o'clock, when he was finally taken away.



#### DECIPHERING OLD ENGLISH HANDWRITING





Just about anyone who takes genealogy seriously is destined to face the challenge of reading original (or microfilm copies of) records written in an unfamiliar cursive style. If your research takes you back to at least the 19th century, you'll encounter census records, wills, deeds, and multifarious other records that you'll strain to decipher. Records from the colonial period will elicit a double-take if you've never seen them before. You'll run into "ff" where you might expect an f," and an "f" will actually stand for "s." The ancient abbreviation "Maps" should be read as "Mass" for Massachusetts. The letters "U" and "V," as well as "u" and "v," were used interchangeably. On the whole, the following lowercase letters are most difficult to read, especially in 17th-century documents: "c," "e," "h," "r," "s," and "t,"


Once you've figured out what the letters are, you'll need to bone up on old abbreviations for terms in common usage today. For instance, "o.s.p." is short for "died without issue." "Yt" stands for "that." "Als" signifies an "alias." "D.v.m." means "died while mother was living," while "d.s.p." also means "died without issue." Did you know that "B.L.W." means bounty land warrant, or that "do" was short for "ditto, or the same as above," a notation you'll encounter repeatedly in census records?

The challenges don't end there. One has to learn to decipher numerals as well as letters. Even after you get familiar with a certain era's lettering, you may find that what was conventional in 1700 is unrecognizable 50 years earlier. Then, of course, there is the problem of individual styles of writing.

For the novice, decoding early handwriting can be an intimidating task. If you are a beginner, you may wish to get your hands on Kip Sperry's excellent handbook, READING EARLY AMERICAN HANDWRITING, the best tool we know of for teaching you how to read and understand the handwriting found in documents commonly used in genealogical research. This guide explains techniques for reading early American documents, provides samples of alphabets and letter forms, and defines commonly used terms and abbreviations. Perhaps best of all, the volume presents numerous examples of early American records for the reader to work with. Arranged by degree of difficulty, from the relatively easy-to-read documents of the 19th century to those of the 17th, the documents showcase examples of handwriting styles, letter forms, abbreviations, and terminology typically found in early American records. Each document--there are nearly 100 of them at various stages of complexity--appears with the author's transcription on a facing page, enabling the reader to check his/her own transcription. This strategy allows the researcher to attain proficiency in reading the documents at a natural rate of progression.

#### \* Born at Sea?

Question- If someone was born aboard an immigrant ship traveling to America, how and where is the birth recorded?

Answer-Babies born at sea are generally listed on the last page of a ship's passenger manifest, or at the bottom of a page where the ship's clerk could find room. Parents could seek birth certificates for newborns once they arrived at their destination. That doesn't mean they always did, particularly before state mandated birth recording. In modern times, when a birth or death occurs at sea or on an airplane, the birth or death is reported at the next port of call.

Phone books back to 1880 have been made available online, making it easier to trace family histories. Telecom giant BT, joined forces with ancestry.co.uk to launch the new service which will also help residents of Britain explore the history of previous residents of their homes. The British telephone books from 1880 up to 1984, are a fascinating, important addition to the online records of Ancestry.co.uk.







John Dundon and Mary Coakley, his father and mother, were natives of Brooklodge, County Cork, Ireland. They came to the United States and located at West Stockbridge, Berkshire county, Massachusetts. In 1860, with seven sons and one daughter, they came to Marquette county, Michigan. The older brothers became proficient in the manufacturing of iron while in Massachusetts, and after coming to Marquette county they engaged in the same line of business. In the early days, Richard and Patrick were foremen at the Pioneer furnace at Negaunee. Richard afterwards had charge of the furnace at Clarksburg, and later of that at Menominee, Michigan. Patrick had charge of the furnace at Collinsville, and afterward of that at De Pere, Wisconsin. James had charge of the furnace at Champion, and later of that at Appleton, Wisconsin. Maurice had charge of the furnace at Greenwood and Lawrence that at Morgan, going later to the furnace at Green Bay. Edward succeeded James at Champion. In 1882, Richard and Edward moved to Washington, to take charge of furnaces in that state. It is doubtful if in any other family could be found so many members of which have been prominently identified with the iron industry of the upper peninsula.

May 9, 1892, Thomas J. Dundon married Miss Margaret Stack, and they are now the parents of two daughters and four sons.

Then I arrived in Ishpening in 1881 I found a bustling overcrowded, little town, fining conditions were very congested. Teaple considered themselves very little box-like towns over a store at that time the city extended only as far as the top of the hill in the northward direction.

The fapulation was a little less than 16 000. The mines were aperating and it is safe to say that Jengeming has never since fassed through such a frosperous period.

### CAN ANYONE HELP WITH THIS REQUEST?

# **Query from Richard L. Belmore**

I have never made a query like this before, but I have hit a wall and need help!

My grandfather, Ralph Belmore(Raphael Bellemare) was born in Trois Rivieres, Quebec, Canada on August 15, 1863 and died July 15, 1949 with burial at Holy Cross Cemetery, Marquette, Michigan. During this time he was married to Agnus Aubertin on Oct. 27, 1879. She was born Feb. 7, 1864 and died about 1886. All of this took place in Quebec. (Note: There is some confusion regarding Ralph's birth date. If in fact it was 1863 and he married Agnus in 1879, he would have been 16. I have some conflicting info that he was born in 1860, but have no birth cert. to prove it.)

My problem begins now. After Agnus died, my grandfather immigrated to the U.S. via St. Ignace, MI on Sept. 27, 1890. Earlier in that year, April 10, 1890, he married Frances Daily. The record indicated that both were married once before and Ralph was 30 and Frances was 28.

I next found them in Sault Ste. Marie, on Oct. 11, 1890 where they were residing and he had set up a snowshoe making business. The next information was in the "Soo" directory of 1893, Belmore, Frances(widow Ralph L) domestic, living in a house on the north side of Spruce St and three houses west of Stephen Rd.

I assume that sometime between 1890 and 1893 Frances died. I searched City Clerks and cemeteries in St. Ignace, Sault Ste. Marie and Marquette, but with no luck.

Can you help solve this problem?

To continue with this saga, Ralph is now being married to Josephine Belmore(maiden name) on Nov. 4, 1895 in Marquette, MI. Their marriage produced 15 children between 1896 and 1930, when Josephine (my grandmother) passed away.

Do you think Frances Belmore could have been buried in Marquette?

I would appreciate any help.

#### What's a "zygocephalum" of land?

Question: While searching my ancestry I found a reference that a distant relative of mine once owned a "zygocephalum" of land in the late 1700's. I can't find this term in a dictionary. Can you help?

Answer: In America's early days, settlers and farmers in many parts of the country had no surefire way to determine where their property ended and a neighbor's began, because a standard method to measure real estate hadn't yet been adopted. So they resorted to a measuring system that had been used for centuries in the countryside of Merry Olde England- the "zygocephalum", defined as the "area of land a yoke of oxen could plow in one day".

This wasn't exactly the most accurate way to establish property rights, perhaps because some oxen moved faster than others(and some farmers worked harder than their neighbors). So the zygocephalum eventually gave way to our current system of "metes and bounds," which uses a property's physical features to determine its boundaries.

#### What is a "bal maiden"?

Did you know that women had jobs at the tin mines in Cornwall? According to the book, "The Cornish Miner in America", older women hammered the rude ore to pound it down to a smaller grade and then passed it on to the "bal maidens", adolescents of 16 or so who "bucked" the ore with a flat iron hammer to reduce it to the size of ½ inch marbles. The wages at a mine near Gwennap were determined according to age; 12-14 years, twelve shillings a month; 14-17, fifteen shillings; and eighteen shillings for all women over 17 years of age. Stooping over piles of ore apparently affected the figure of a Cornish girl, increasing her chest size but doing nothing for her lower limbs. It appears that girls never worked underground but could really swing a stone mallet on the ore pile!

#### Umlauts, Acutes, and Accents: Using Character Codes

One of the difficulties with genealogy is entering symbols and characters that are not available on a standard keyboard. A prime example is a name that requires an accent, such as René. Many people don't know what key to press after typing "Ren," but luckily there is an easy solution.

Every character on the keyboard has a numeric code (number) assigned to it, and characters that aren't on the keyboard have their own assignments. For example, the capital letter X is assigned to ALT + 088. The é that is needed to type René is assigned to ALT + 0233. Luckily we don't need to use the ALT + 088 sequences to type X into a program such as a word processor, but you will need it for the é.

ALT + indicates that you need to hold the ALT key down, and without releasing it, press the assigned numbers on the numeric keypad, one by one. If a code starts with a leading zero, you will need to include it. Don't use the number keys at the top of the keyboard; use of the number keypad is required. These have different codes assigned to them.

I recommend using your left hand to hold down the ALT key while your right hand types the desired number. Release both when through.

At the bottom of this article, the RootsWeb Chart has been reprinted for your convenience. These character codes work in many online websites along with other commonly used genealogy and word processing programs.

In most Microsoft products you can also insert special characters by going to the "Insert" menu and selecting "Symbol".

When using a computer with Windows, you can also insert special characters by copying and pasting them from a character map. To access a character map in Windows, click the Windows "Start" menu in the bottom left-hand side of the screen, then select "All Programs". Select "Accessories", then "System Tools", and then "Character Map".


