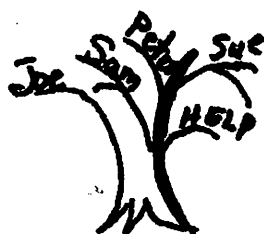
*** Birth Index included**

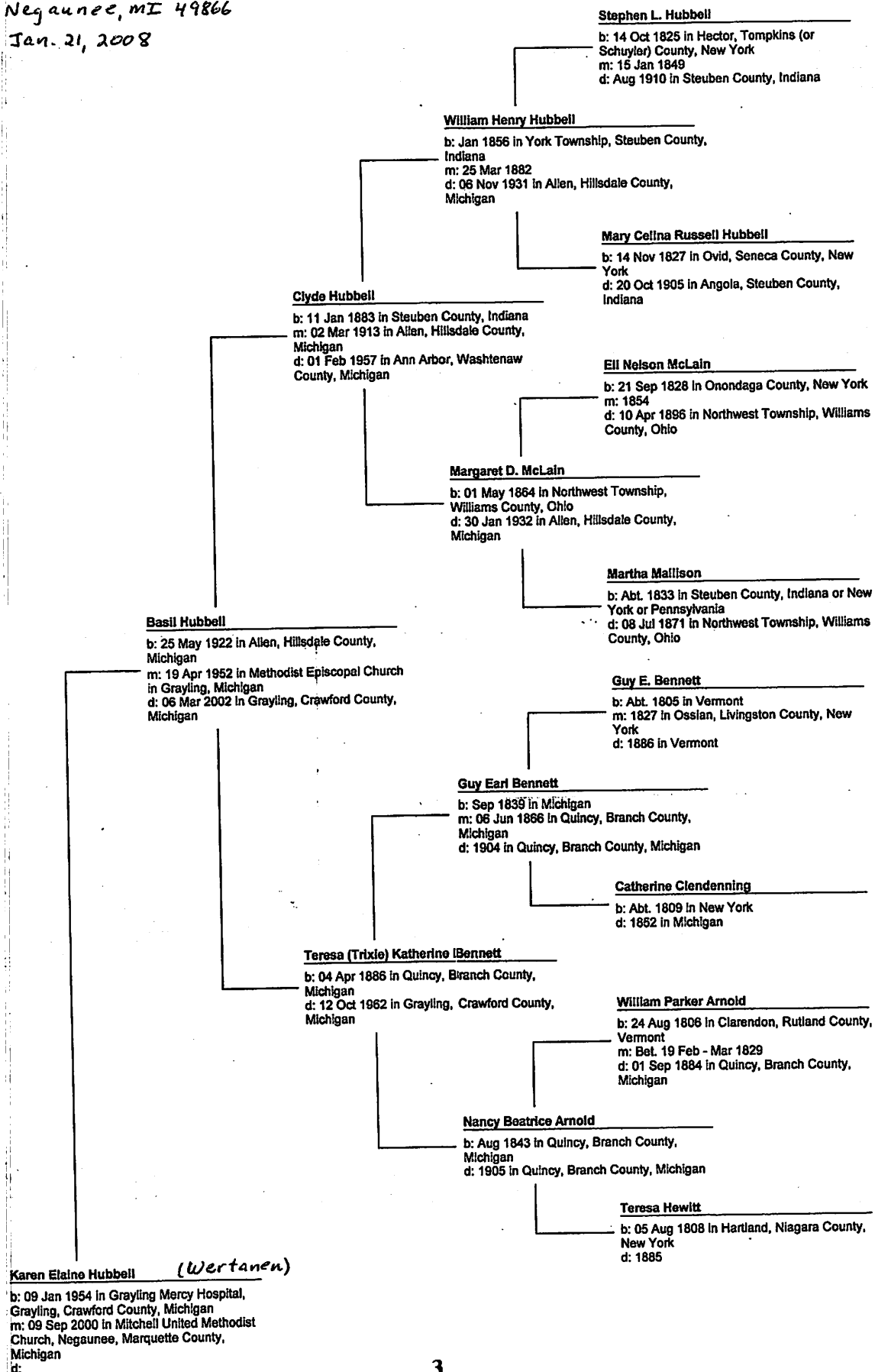

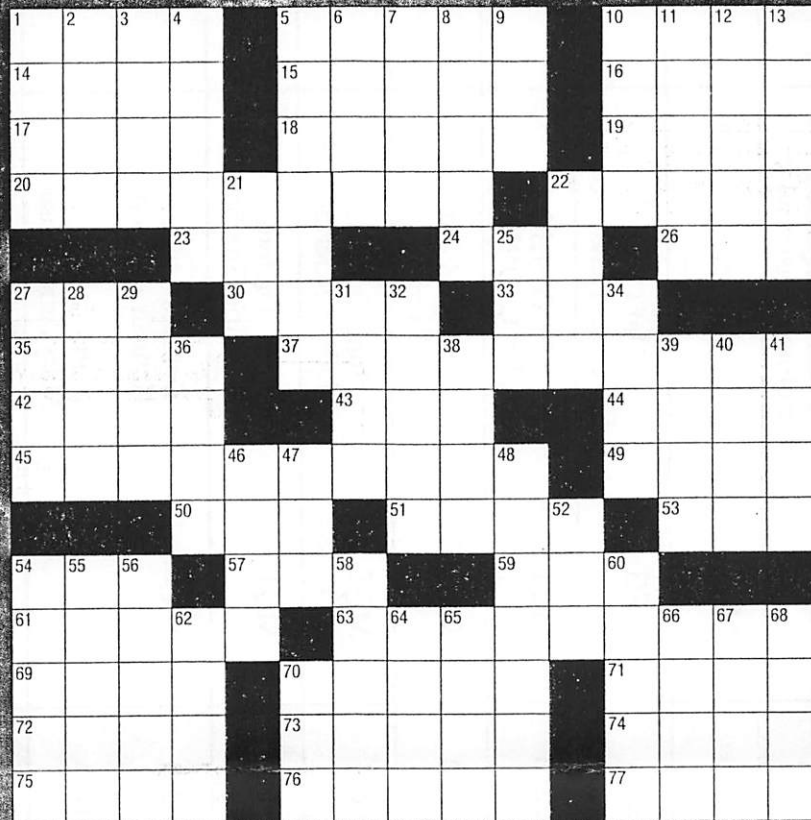

From what country did you or your ancestors come to the United States?

Canada when 6 months old, during the time of the 1837 uprising. My father, Joseph Derigle de Laplante being one of the insurgents, fled to the U. S. with the Americans who took part in that war, and later became a U. S. Citizen.

Any facts or anecdotes relative to the history of Marquette County, Michigan, may

be added here or on the reverse side of the sheet.

* Arrived in Marquette on the steamer Manhattan, the trip took about two weeks to complete, which in those days was considered pretty quick time. Bands played, and celebrating in general marked the arrival of each ship; the people would gather on the bluff near where Hotel Marquette now stands, and would cheer the new arrivals, and extend to them a hearty welcome. Some of the ships that came in were overcrowded, and those that were not fortunate enough to have staterooms or berths, had to shift as best they could for themselves, and make their bed on the deck. There were no facilities here then

for handling lake traffic, and it was quite a problem to unload a ship. The passengers had to be transferred to row boats, in order that they might reach the mainland. In some cases, where live stock was to be unloaded, the task was accomplished by pushing the animals into the water, and allowing them to swim ashore! Rumors of the discovery of silver mines in this district, were spread in the eastern states, which occasioned a number of boomers to come here. Church services were at first held in the school houses, later, churches were built. The house we now live in, was about the farthest north of where Washington St is. There was an indian village close by, in the district between ^{where} High and Spruce Pr. ~~now~~. There were no hospitals here in those days, in fact there was no need of them, because the people led a vigorous healthy outdoor life. ~~with a little sickness~~. Doctors, Dr. Clair and Jones were on hand when medical assistance was necessary. The leading hotel was that owned by Mr. Harlow, where dances were held occasionally. We obtained our water from wells, which were in general use up to about thirty years ago. My memory has been failing lately; these are a number of things that occurred in the early days of Marquette that would be of interest, which I cannot recall right now.

MARQUETTE PHYSICIANS WILL
WATCH OUTCOME OF TEST
CASES, WHICH MAY BE
BROUGHT THIS YEAR.

Marquette physicians are awaiting with considerable interest action on the part of the state board of health in cases of violation of the law providing for the registration of births by the attending physician. Registration clerks in several parts of the state have made complaint against practitioners who who have been negligent in reporting births.

Advices from Lansing are to the effect that the registration of births under the law, which went into effect Jan. 1, 1906, have been more complete than was hoped for, but in some localities the physicians and nurses have shown a hostility to the law, which has resulted in failure to register some births. From the first Marquette physicians have joined with others throughout the state in complaints against the law, but as a rule they have lived up to it faithfully.

No compensation is provided the physicians for their work in filling out the certificate of birth and filing it with the registrar. They object to the law in the first place on account of that work being forced upon them, they claiming that the parents of the child should be required to fill out the certificates. The framers of the law held that in some cases the parents would not be able to fill out the certificate in proper form, and that it should therefore be left to the physician to attend to the matter.

Though the compensation which would be given the person filing the certificate of birth would necessarily be small, the physicians assert that inasmuch as no compensation is allowed them they should not be made liable to a fine in case of failure to comply with the law. A test case would be gladly welcomed, although it is not likely the physicians would win, for the law is plain and the courts would not be likely to go back on it. The physicians will doubtless continue to bear the burden imposed on them, for the opposition to the law is not so strong, especially in this district, that the medical men would be willing to take the chance of paying a fine for failure to file the certificate, delaying compliance with the law too long.

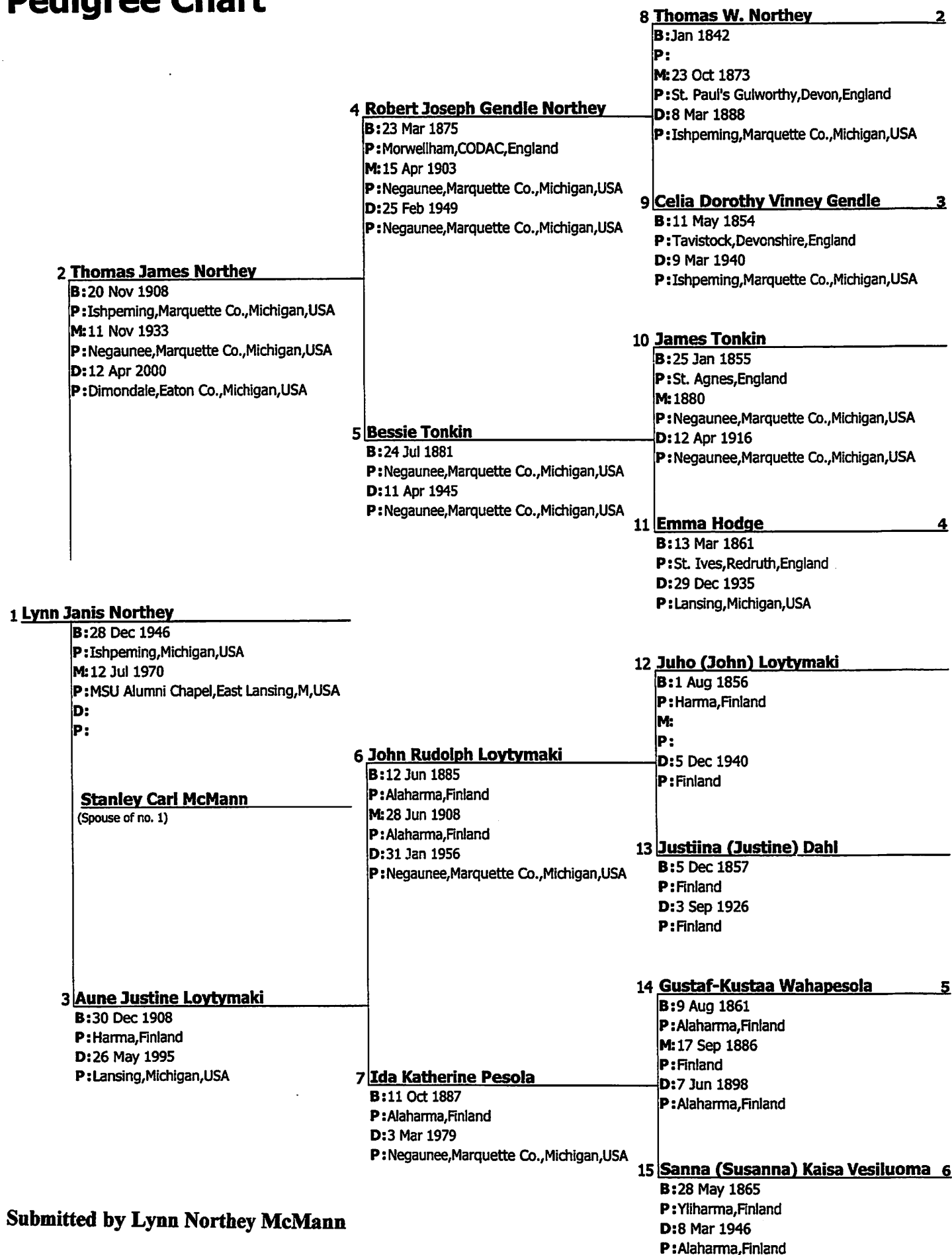

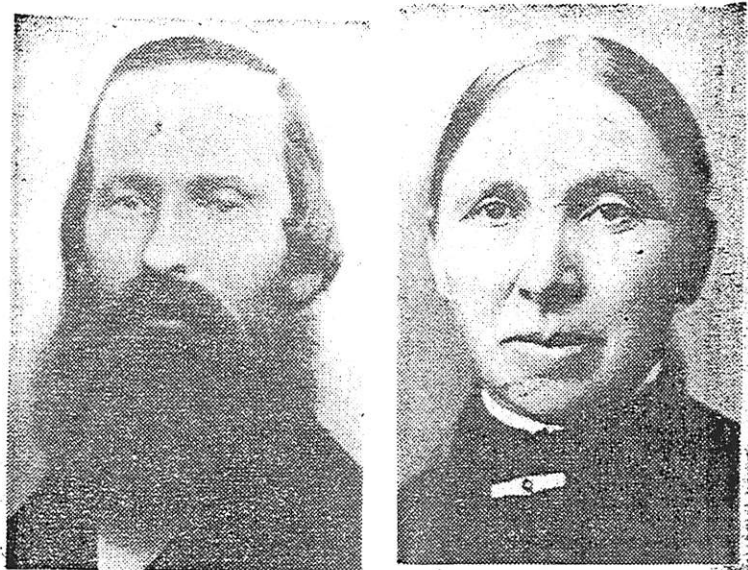

Any facts or anecdotes relative to the history of Marquette County, Michigan, may be added here or on the reverse side of the sheet.

I lived on the farm owned now by Father Pinten. There were no railroads at the time, and I had to take in anyone in for the night who happened to be passing. The first railroad was ^{begun to be} built by Herman Cly in 1856. It was not finished by him, but finished later by another man. The people could work at building the railroads only during the ~~no~~ summers, and they made ties during the winters. The railroad first went as far as Bancroft. In 1869 - the course of the railroad was changed from a

straight course to a curved one. In the trains they burned wood at first, for they had no coal. In 1870, the people from Negaunee and Marquette Eagle Mills came to Marquette to form the township. This I remember well, because they stopped at our place. Marquette itself was mostly pine woods. The Methodist church was in the place of the ^{present} French Church. The school-house stood in place of the city hall, and the school-house was smaller than the present West Bluff street school-house. In Negaunee, in 1857 there was a furnace, and fourteen people living in 7 shanties.

Came To Marquette In 1849



George Rublein (left, above), who was a native of Germany, came to Marquette in August, 1849, and built and operated the first brewery in this area. It was then known as the Franklin. In 1855 he married Catherine Steinle, of Cleveland (right). They had eight children, of whom two are still living — Mrs. Emma Snell (82), 354 West Crescent street, and Frank Rublein (75), 214 Adams street. The first brewery was burned in 1867; it then became the Rublein farm and now is known as the Pinten farm. Mr. Rublein built the brewery that still stands near the western entrance to Marquette and later sold it to Charles Meeske. Mr. Rublein was 66 when he died in 1891 and his wife lived until Dec. 17, 1925. Besides destruction of the old brewery Sept. 2, 1867, the Rubleins' home was burned Aug. 10, 1871, and the rebuilt house on the farm was burned in 1885.

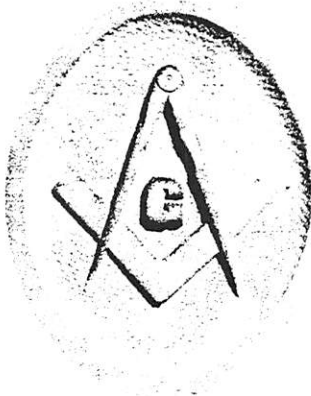

Freemasons/Masons

(AAONMS) (AASR) (AF&AM) (F&AM)
(IGGCRSM) (K of M) (RAM)

The primary symbol of the Freemasons is the square and compass. Often, inside the symbol is the letter G, which some say stands for geometry while others say it stands for God. Sometimes the symbol also contains clasped hands. The square and compass represent the interaction between mind and matter and refer to the progression from the material to the intellectual to the spiritual. The Freemasons have a gift for clouding the origins of their organization, but historians say the roots of Freemasonry were among the stonemasons who built the great cathedrals in Europe. Since they went from job to job and were essentially self-employed, they were *free* masons. When they worked on a large job they banded together to form lodges. The Masons have grown to become the largest fraternal organization in the world. They are noted for their wide use of symbols and secret handshakes.



Besides the square and compass, also be on the lookout for other Masonic symbols such as the all-seeing eye, often with rays of light, which is an ancient symbol for God. Although many cultures have eye symbols, some good and some evil, when seen in a cemetery it usually means that the person was a Mason. This symbol is familiar to us as one of the mysterious images on the reverse of the dollar bill. Its placement on the dollar bill is largely the result of America's founding fathers, among them George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Hamilton, Paul Revere, and John Paul Jones, who were Masons. In fact, one scholar describes Washington's Continental Army as a "Masonic convention."

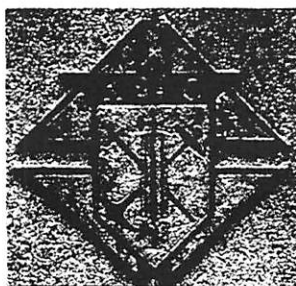


Symbols of Secret Societies Clubs and Organizations as found on cemetery tombstones

Eagles (FOE)

Ladies Auxiliary of the Eagles (FOE)

The Fraternal Order of Eagles, originally named "The Order of Good Things," was founded in Seattle, Washington, in 1898 by a group of theater owners.



Knights of Columbus

(KC) (KofC)

The Knights of Columbus, founded in 1882, has often been described as the "Catholic Masons" because Catholics were forbidden by a Papal edict from joining the Freemasons.

Shriners (Mystic) (AAONMS)

The Imperial Council of the Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, better known as the Shriners, was founded in 1872 by Freemasons Walter M. Fleming, an M.D., and William J. Florence, an actor, who apparently weren't having enough fun at Freemason functions.





American Legion (AL)

The American Legion was founded in Paris, France, in 1919. It is primarily an association for ex-servicemen, and works especially hard for veterans' rights for the wounded, infirm, and elderly. Because of its substantial membership, it also exercises quite a bit of political clout. The American Legion has gone to great lengths to explain the symbolism of their emblem. Here is the official explanation:

The Rays of the Sun form the background of our proud Emblem, and suggest that the Legion's principles will dispel the darkness of violence and evil.

The Wreath forms the center, in loving memory of those brave comrades who gave their lives in the service of the United States, that liberty might endure.

The Star, victory symbol of World War I, signifies as well honor, glory and constancy. The letters U.S. leave no doubt as to the brightest star in the Legion's star.

Two Large Rings, the outer one stands for the rehabilitation of our sick and disabled buddies. The inner one denotes the welfare of America's children.

Two Small Rings set upon the star. The outer pledges loyalty and Americanism. The inner is for service to our communities, our states and the Nation.

The words American Legion tie the whole together for truth, remembrance, constancy, honor, service, veteran's affairs and rehabilitation, children and youth, loyalty, and Americanism.

Knights of Pythias (KP)

The Knights of Pythias was officially founded in 1864 as a secret society for government clerks.



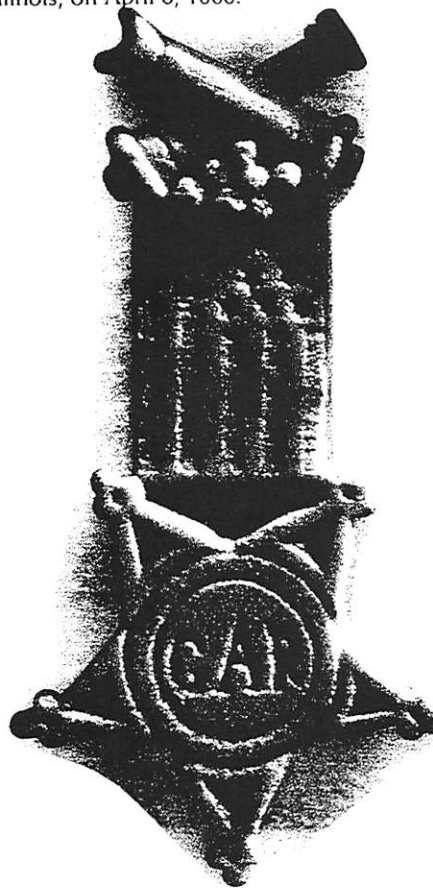
Odd Fellows (IOOF)

The IOOF is an offshoot of the Odd Fellows, which was formed in England in the 1700s as a working-class social and benevolent association. The United States branch was founded in Baltimore, Maryland, on April 26, 1819.



The Grand Army of the Republic (GAR)

The GAR was an organization with built-in extinction, since membership was limited to honorably discharged veterans of the Union Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Revenue Cutter Service who had served between April 12, 1861, and April 9, 1865. Benjamin F. Stephenson founded it in Decatur, Illinois, on April 6, 1866.



Elks (BPOE)

Tombstones of Elks are easy to identify. They have an emblem with an elk in the center, surrounded by a clock with roman numerals and the letters B P O E (Benevolent Protective Order of Elks). The clock's hands are frozen at eleven o'clock, a sacred time to all Elks.

Biographical Record of John F. Van Brocklin

What is your full name? John Franklin Van Brocklin

When were you born? June 11th 1853

Where were you born? Brantford, Ontario, Dominion of Canada.

What was your father's name? Philip Cady Van Brocklin

What was your mother's name? Phoebe Mahala Van Brocklin

Is either of your parents still living? No Where?

When were you married? May 1st 1876 Where? Ishpeming, Michigan.

To whom were you married? Caroline White

Is your wife or husband still living? Yes

When did you come to Marquette County? November 18th, 1872

From what place did you come here? Paris, Ontario.

By what means and what route did you get here? Great Western Ry, Michigan Central, C & N W Ry

In what work have you engaged, since coming here? Railroading, Clerking, bookkeeping.

(State name of employer or company for whom you have worked) Marquette, Houghton & Ontonagon, Ry.

L. S. & I. Ry, Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co.

Where are you now living? (Give Post Office address) #208 East Ely Street, Ishpeming, Michigan.

When I came to this county in 1872 there was still to be finished the railroad between Green Bay and Escanaba and we crossed Green Bay, an arm of Lake Michigan, on a boat and I remember quite distinctly it was snowing then and after entering the train at Escanaba to make the trip to Negaunee it was snowing hard. When we reached Centerville, now known as Lathrop, it was snowing so hard and the snow was so deep we had to take the side track and wait there till a snow plow, which had been dispatched from Escanaba, arrived and piloted us through to Negaunee. That snow which fell Nov 18th did not disappear till the following Spring and big snow falls succeeded that storm and it was one of the hardest winters the railroads ever had. The late D H Merritt was Superintendent of the M H & O Railroad and a man named Ed Gay was Genl. Freight Agent and B H Bicknell was Train Despatcher. They are all dead.

I was sent out with a snow plow crew that winter to open up the road between Marquette and Champion. I didn't do any shoveling but was instructed to call up the Despatchers office at Marquette and report when the Plow passed the "Gorge", a point about where the L S & I Ry now curves in towards the D S S & A, as the former road comes down the hill from Morgan. The "Gorge" is now known best as Bagdad. The Plow had four big locomotives behind it and at the first attempt to open the gorge the plow did not penetrate the drifts over 50 feet. At the next attempt I was dropped off at the "Station", an empty caboose set down on the ground, the wheels removed, and inside was a relay, key and sounder, and I called up the despatchers office and reported results up to that time and it took the plow three times going at terrific speed propelled by those big locomotives to break through. The first attempt buried the "Station" out of sight and it took the men sometime digging to find it and each time the plow went by while I was inside, the "Station" literally rocked on its foundations.

This time I speak of there had been no rail communication with Champion for almost a week. At that time trains ran between Marquette and Champion and another train and crew ran between Champion and L'Anse. From there passengers for the Copper Country staged it in the Winter and during the summer the Str. Ivanhoe carried freight, Passengers and mails. The late Jason Mc Gregor was Conductor on the Marquette Champion run and Frank Benedict was Conductor between Champion and L'Anse. Beef ~~cattle~~ were brought from Chicago, unloaded sometimes at Negaunee and driven to their destination, Marquette, Ishpeming and Houghton. At that time it was a hard matter to get through ~~cows~~ from Chicago to Houghton and the rates were so high the owners drove the cattle on the hoof right to the markets.

When I boarded the train at Negaunee and entered the smoking car I was astonished to see numerous men with belts containing revolvers, a small hatchet and now and then a formidable knife, their pants in their boots and wearing what appeared to me to be the most outlandish clothing I had ever before seen but that winter I understood why the "Mackinaw" clothing was worn by so many people. The revolvers, hatchets and knives were worn because the men were "Cruisers" or land lookers and spent weeks in the woods exploring, etc:

Seven ton "Jimmies" constituted the equipment used to transport iron ore from the mines to the dock in Marquette. Compare those "Jimmies" with the seventy five ton cars in use now a days. The "White" fleet towed by the ocean going tug, Niagara, made regular trips to Marquette in those days for ore. These boats comprising the "White" fleet carried 800 and 900 tons of ore each.

Of course I have seen many changes since 1872.

From what country did ~~your~~ your ancestors come to the United States? From Holland in 1642.

My Father and Mother were both born in the United States, the former in Oneida County, New York and the latter at Salisbury, Vermont. and both are buried in Reading, Pa.

Any facts or anecdotes relative to the history of Marquette County, Michigan, may be added here or on the reverse side of the sheet.

It would seem strange if I failed to record here reminiscences of the older inhabitants but space won't allow an extended review. James P Pendill of Marquette was the largest merchandiser in the early days, having stores in Marquette, Negaunee and Ishpeming.

The late Fred Braastad, later on did more general merchandising than any other one person in this line. Edward Ryan of Houghton County was also a big merchandiser.

Judge O'Grady was judge of the Marquette county court and at that time the circuit was much larger than it is today. Judge Hardy was judge of the Probate Court.

A P Swineford was editor and publisher of the Mining Journal. Col. B F H Lynn was editor and publisher of Ishpeming's first weekly paper and was succeeded by Hiram Morley, both publishing the Iron Home.

The early days in the Upper Peninsula were remarkable for the production of strong men. Land looking, cruising and exploring called for an able body of men and there was no lack of material and the development of the country was brought about in a very rapid way by these men of indomitable courage.

My first recollection is of Robert Dallar, the Powells, the Mitchells, Stephensons, for timber, Iron and Copper Mines were opened up and mining was being carried on in a crude sort of way-nothing like the present manner of extracting the ores, miners not having the tools to work with as they have today. In those early days it was the strong arm way, one man holding the drill with two and three hammers pounding down on it till the desired depth of hole had been obtained. The ore was shipped just as it came from the blast. If any rock was mixed with it the rock went with the good ore, no attempt being made to separate it.

In those days there were no established laboratories to secure analyses of the ores as there are today and the science of mixing ores to get results to uphold sale percentages of iron were unknown.

Gilbert Johnson was Mining Captain, Superintendent and general manager of the Lake Superior Iron Co, now one of the subsidiaries of the Oliver Iron Co, a subsidiary of the U S Steel Co. The elder Frank P Mills was the Mining Captain of the Cleveland Iron Mining Co, and Jay C Morse was the Agent.

Samuel P Ely was the District representative of the Lake Superior Iron Co and lived in Marquette. Alfred Kiddier was agent for the Champion Iron Co and John Wilson was Mining Captain. Wilson was later succeeded by Capt. James Pascoe. Peter Pascoe was Mining Captain for the Republic Mine

and was without doubt one of the most popular men in the county fifty years ago.

Harvey Diamond was Mining Captain for the Pittsburgh & Lake Angeline Iron Co in the early days. Mr Kidder was also Agent for this company.

Joseph Kirkpatrick was Agent for the Lake Superior & Pittsburgh Iron Co with mines at Cascade. Mr Kirkpatrick was Chairman of the Board of Supervisors for years and was a very public spirited man in every way. A P Swineford was the first Commissioner of Mineral Statistics and the reports he sent to Lansing every year were the only really intelligent reports ever sent in, by any of his successors.

Swineford used to publish a book called "Cinders" which was issued every year and was a compendium of all the items of interest which appeared weekly in the Mining Journal in a column headed "Cinders" and some of them were hot "Cinders" at that. This book was a combination of news items and contained an almanac as well and some of the forecasts were amusing in the highest degree. Poetry was attempted also and altogether it was a very interesting publication and was in great demand. I am the proud possessor of one of these books and value it very highly.

I have a map made in the early days showing Ishpeming in 1871. At that time the city was confined almost entirely to that portion

lying South of the C & N W Ry tracks. There were very few houses North of the tracks at that time and sidewalks were a luxury, not a necessity, at least one would judge so by their absence. I have walked through the "Swamp" on

poles set at convenient distances but it was dangerous and one was always prepared for a misstep and a ducking in the swamp water. Partridge Creek was the sewer in those days and what it didn't carry away was left to rot and spread germs which later on was responsible for much of Ishpeming's sickness.

At the time of the big fire in Ishpeming, I was entering the Post Office along with Harry Harwood, who worked for Julius Ropes the P M and who also run a drug store in connection with the Post Office, and Joe Mac Cumber a brother telegraph operator. As soon as the alarm sounded we ran to the place of the fire which was in Sam Rice's store near where the Anderson Block stands now. It was soon seen that it was going to be a big fire and that that part of the town was doomed. All we had to fight the fire with was one of those hand pumps. with horizontal handles along each side and 20 men could work at a time but it was of little use and the fire really exhausted itself after wiping out half the business section. Later we bought a Silsby Fire Engine, the "Robert Nelson" and in a year or two, another which was named the "J P Outhwaite"

If we had at that time, either the Nelson or the Outhwaite Ishpeming's big fire would not have gone down in history for it could easily have been confined to the one building. Drs. Bigelow, Heaton and Carpenter were the leading physicians in Ishpeming, Drs Clark and Northrup in Marquette, Drs Mac Kenzie and Cyr in Negaunee.

F P Mills was mayor of Ishpeming, rt Negaunee and of Marquette. Horse Racing was a great winter sport

on Lake Angeline, Ishpeming. A Mr Lyons made Peat for Ishpeming's first blast furnace located at Lake Angeline. John Henrietta and H F Elson, partners and Frank Austin were the principal Meat Marketers. Myers & Bigelow operated the "Rock Store" as general merchandisers. The "Nora Store" was managed by Fred Braastad and he had a big crowd of Scandinavian partners. Prime Emerson & Co occupied the store where the Johnson Bros conduct a clothing establishment now. They were general merchandisers.

"Patient should not have died, as he fully recovered from his sickness."

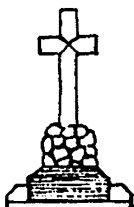
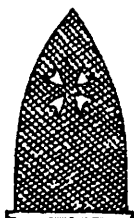
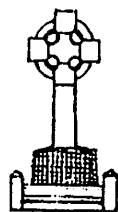
"The cause of death was his mother died in infancy."

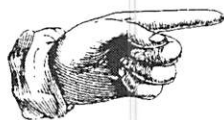

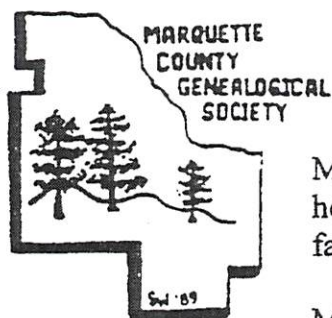
