SPEAKER FOR THE OCTOBER 2011 MEETING

Judy Webb, a Marquette County Genealogical Society member told us about 2 of her ancestors; Sarah Elizabeth Ham and Thomas Elmore. Her ancestress Sarah was born in England and was kidnapped and placed on a ship headed for the new world. The Captain of the ship deemed that it would be too risky to try and return her to her homeland, so he placed her with a respectable family. She was employed by the Ware family as a servant. Her future husband, Thomas Elmore was born in County Meath, Ireland and left for the new world, landing in New York. He was hired as a coachman for the Ware family. Sarah and Thomas were married in New York circa 1844. Their first child, a daughter named Mary A. was born about 1845. Sometime after the birth of Mary, they moved west to Wisconsin. They removed to Watertown, Jefferson County, Wisconsin where they stayed until the 1860's. By 1864 they had again removed this time to Marquette County, Michigan and Sarah and Thomas operated a boarding house on Superior Street (now Baraga Avenue). Sarah died 08 November 1888 and Thomas died 05 April 1874 in Marquette.

ANOTHER LOCK-IN SUCCESS

For the last three years the Marquette County Genealogical Society and Peter White Public Library have worked together, along with Onagomingkway, a local chapter of National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, to do a genealogy workshop. On Friday October 21, 2011 people interested in genealogy research came into the Library after-hours, got "locked-in," and did concentrated work with volunteers dedicated to assist them. For three hours, attendees worked on genealogy, learned what resources are available in Marquette County, heard guest speakers and got help with troublesome "brick-walls." A TOWN NEARLY DESTROYED BY FIRE

A very destructive fire occurred at Marquette, Michigan last night. Over 100 buildings in the business portion of town, including 40 stores, the United States Land Office, Customs house, County Treasurer's office, and all the records were destroyed. The railroad and other docks were also burned. The loss is estimated at \$5,000,000, insurance very small.

The fire that occurred in Marquette on 11 June 1868 was started at the machine shop for the Marquette and Ontonagon Rail Road on Main Street. A night watchman, James Anthony, employed by the Marquette and Ontonagon Rail Road, discovered the fire. By the time he signaled the town, the blaze was already out of control. The Marquette and Ontonagon Rail Road trestle dock along with the Lake Superior and Jackson Docks were destroyed. This fire destroyed all businesses north of Superior Street (now Baraga Avenue) and between Washington, Front, Main, Third and Spring Streets. The newly built Town Hall which was located on Superior Street also burnt, along with the Post Office. Postmaster T. Moore, lost his post office to the fire, but did not lose any mail or packages. The fire destroyed the Burt Block, said to be the grandest of buildings, it was four stories high and housed many businesses. It was built of brick about 1866 and was on the east side of Front, between Washington and Main Streets. The Adams, Frazer and Company building which was located on the corner of Spring and Front Streets, succumbed to the fire. The Cleveland Block which was owned by Peter White, had a tavern, pool hall and a historical society went up in flames. The Everett Block where the library was located with 1,500 volumes also burnt. Another victim of the devastating fire was the Murray & Robbins Store. The iron doors and shutters buckled in the immense heat allowing flames to ravage the inventory. This store was located next to the Wetmore & Brothers Company, which was a store warehouse, which did survive the inferno with water buckets and persistence. The uncompleted First Presbyterian Church on the corner of Front and Bluff Streets remained standing, however the furnace, pulpit, pews, wainscoting and finishing lumber which were stored in a railroad dock went up in flames. The church was dedicated in November 1868. The Tremont House, which was a boarding house on the north side of Superior Street, was saved because a party of citizens kept the boarding house drenched by throwing water on it and covering it with wet carpets.

The Lake Superior Mining Journal, (the precursor to the present day Mining Journal) couldn't publish the biggest story ever, because their only printing press was destroyed by the fire. Instead the people of Marquette had to get their news from the Negaunee newspaper, which at that time was the "Manufacturing and Mining News", which ceased publishing on 15 August 1868.

After the devastating fire of 1868, the city decreed that all business buildings must be built with sandstone, which was readily available in Marquette. The city of Marquette also installed fire hydrants throughout the city, in the hope that city would never again deal with such devastation. On 03 March 1869, Peter White, J. W. Edwards, F. B. Wetmore, S. P. Ely, W. L. Wetmore and Hiram Burt met to organize the Board of Water and Fire Commission.

Note: In 2009, while excavating for the new hotel located on the shore of Lake Superior, charred debris from the fire of 1868 was found.

RAKKAUSTARINA MISTA SUOMI AMERIKKAN

The following is an account of the lives of two Finnish immigrants who met in America, fell in love, subsequently married and raised a family in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Much of this information is taken from a memoir written by my maternal aunt, Helmi Wayrynen Loosemore, who resides in Skanee, Michigan.

Matti Vayrynen—Born in Saraisniemi, Oulu Province, Finland on 30 September 1884 Died in L'Anse, Baraga County, Michigan

Tilda Hiltunen—Born in Rantsila, Oulu Province, Finland on 19 February 1887

Died in South Range, Houghton County, Michigan on 24 January 1955

Matti left Finland about 1902 and settled in the Copper Country of Michigan's Upper Peninsula where he had relatives who had immigrated to America earlier. He settled in South Range. At the time of his arrival there were many friends from his homeland in the area and he connected with them and the relatives who were already here. Matti first worked on a farm as he had done in Finland, but later found a job in one of the copper mines.

An aunt through marriage often talked to Matti about her beautiful young sister Tilda, who was coming to America and Matti became interested and looked forward to meeting her. Between 1903 and 1905, Tilda's sister Anna Greta (who lived in Hancock) wrote to Tilda and urged her to come to join her and her husband, Kalle Halonen. Tilda had no money for the voyage but agreed to borrow the money needed and in July 1905 she and a cousin (Sofia Isoviita) left their homeland. After a dreadful journey by ship to Liverpool, England, the young women boarded a larger ship for the three week Atlantic crossing. Their accommodations were in steerage but conditions on this ship were much better. There even was musi and dancing on board. It was then that Tilda met a handsome young man named Jack. The two saw each other repeatedly during the trip and discussed the possibility of seeing one another in America. When the ship arrived in Boston, the two parted, each traveling to different destinations. Tilda and Sofia boarded a train for the Upper Peninsula where they were met by Tilda's sister, Anna Greta and her husband. When the young women arrived at the station; Matti Vayrynen was waiting to greet them as well.

As far as Matti was concerned, it was love at first site! Tilda was a bit reticent, still thinking about herbrief shipboard romance with Jack. However, as she got to know Matti better, she realized he was the one she loved and Jack became a romantic memory. Tilda and Matti became engaged. In order to repay money she had borrowed from her sister and to buy warm clothing for the upcoming winter, Tilda found a job at the Douglass House Hotel in Houghton. In spite of the language difficulties, she was a hard worker and performed her duties well. It took her many months to earn enough to repay her financial obligation to her sister.

On 28 April 1906, Matti and Tilda were married at the Baltic-South Range Evangelical Lutheran Church. Matti and Tilda became parents of 13 children, 11 of whom survived to adulthood. My mother, Helga Anna Sylvia, was their second child and was born in January 1909.

My grandfather worked many years for M. Kivi & Company in South Range, a retail store. For the first few years of my grandparents' marriage they lived in rented homes in the area. In about 1910 they settled in a home they purchased at 25 Fourth Street in South Range, where they resided for the rest of their wedded life. They had been happily married for almost 49 years when Tilda passed away in 1955. My grandfather missed her terribly and was never the same after her death. He continued living in their home until he began suffering from dementia and other ailments and for his safety began living in an assisted living facilty in Covington.

My mother married my father, Edward Isaacson, in 1928 and after living in several local apartments, they purchased a home at 22 Fourth Street, across the street from my grandparents. My parents lived in this house until December 1985 when my father passed away. My mother died in April 1992.

An interesting footnote to this story is that the home at 25 Fourth Street (where my grandparents resided) is now owned and lived in by my first cousin and his family.



A DREADED DISEASE STRIKES HOME

In May of 1936, my mom, Joan Hainault, who would not be four years old until September, contracted what was called infantile paralysis, now more commonly known as poliomyelitis (polio). No one at the time knew what caused her illness; she had been playing in the garden while her dad was working manure into the soil for

planting so they thought perhaps there was something in the soil or manure that caused it. She shared a bed with two of her sisters and neither of them got sick. She ran a high fever and was in a coma for 7 days. During that time, her aunt, who was a registered nurse, took care of her. She also had two doctors, Dr. Burke and Dr. Wickliffe, who would come to the house to check on how she was doing. There were nine older siblings still living at home. All of them except the oldest, had to go live with relatives or friends because the disease was thought to be highly contagious. They were gone for three weeks before being allowed to return home. I talked with one of my aunts who said she was just staying across the street from home but had never been away from home before and was so homesick. They weren't even allowed to go to school during this time but would visit the nuns just the same.



There was a young boy in Lake Linden, Mercer Fisher, who also had infantile paralysis. He had recovered from the illness. One of the doctors, mom doesn't remember which, extracted fluid from the boy's spine and injected it into my mom. Her oldest brother told her that they laid her on the dining room table to do this. Imagine that happening today! Mom doesn't remember how long it was but she thinks it was only a matter of a day or so and she woke up. Her mom, being a devout Catholic, had a great devotion to our Blessed Mother Mary as well as to Lourdes water. While my mom was in the coma, her mother would put Lourdes water on her neck. One day, the doctor walked in and saw her doing this. He asked when she died and Grandma said she didn't and she wasn't going to! As a kid, I remember the story and how it was told that Grandma and Grandpa had been told that she would not live and prepare for her funeral. Thank goodness they were wrong.

One of the things mom remembers after she woke up was asking for the ice cream she was eating when she went into the coma. Being that they didn't have any refrigeration at the time, the ice cream was long melted.

Mom says she had to learn to walk again. She doesn't know if she was told or if she remembers but she would crawl across the street to her favorite neighbor's house. My aunt says that mom was very thin after this and became quite spoiled. In the years to follow, my mom said she wondered if the polio would affect her ability to have children. Not a problem! Mom and dad had 7 children, which I am the oldest.

The young woman seemed to be perplexed that Miss Vada would hand over the books to her, and approximately 20 minutes later the young woman said to Miss Vada who was sitting at her desk doing other tasks, "Do you think you could hurry it up a bit, my boyfriend is waiting in the car with it running". Miss Vada in her silky sweet southern voice said to the clueless young woman "perhaps you should find another hobby that won't consume so much of your busy social life."



CITING YOUR SOURCES

How do you want your research described by others?

Many factors combine to create "quality" in genealogy. But there is one so obvious, so fundamental that quality is never possible without it: proper source citations.

There is only one fault so obvious, so fundamental that instantly brands your work as the product of an amateur or careless researcher: poor source citations.

We may know of a set of records better than anyone else, however if the material extracted is not identified in a manner which allows others to relocate those records that were used, our information is suspect. Neither our knowledge nor our skill will be trusted.

Whether we are family historians, genealogists, writers or researchers, there is no other standard than to document and we must document well.

Reference notes will address two basic research needs: the need to know where a specific record is located; and the need to understand the record.

Source citations have their own basic elements that we must learn.

Book:

Name of author
Title of book (either in italics or underlined)
Place of publication
Name of publisher
Year of publication
Page and (possibly volume) number

Periodical:

Name of author
Title of article (in quotation marks)
Title of periodical (in italics or underlined)
Volume number
Date of publication (month & year)
Page number

Original Record:

Title of document

Date(s) written or recorded

Collection name (Probate Files, etc.)

Book or page of document (if recorded in bound manuscripts)

File or box, and document number

Repository name

Repository location (city & state will suffice for public institutions), if document is in someone's possession give street address

FAMILY CREST & COAT OF ARMS SCAMS

In early December I went to a craft show and was appalled at the blatant selling of family crests and the ubiquitous coat of arms. This is a cautionary tale, because a woman at this show plunked down \$125.00 for 5 different family names. I wanted to run up to her and tell her of the fraud that was perpetuated upon her. There is absolutely no such thing as a family crest unless of course you are a member of a Royal family in Europe or the Scandinavian countries. A coat of arms belongs to an individual, not to a family or a surname. The coat of arms was then passed on to a single child (a son), who then in turn passed it down to his son. Using someone else's coat of arms is akin to taking their genealogy and adopting it for your own. As a general rule, commoners did not have a family crest or a coat of arms, so beware that most of what these companies are selling you is a false bit of information and lineage.



OVER THE BORDER RESEARCH

I checked into this resource while in Ashland, Wisconsin on other business. I had been honored by Northland College with an invitation to speak at the 100th Commencement of this private Liberal Arts College, which had grown considerably since I first attended 66 years ago. As one of the old grads, who could still stand and talk at the same time, I spoke for thousands of graduates all over the world who earned their degrees and kept returning for their reunions.

We roamed my old haunts in Ashland and finally found the Northern Great Lakes Visitor Center, which I had been meaning to visit for quite a while. It "is a four-season facility, capturing the unique qualities of this multistate region". A theatre, exhibits and special programs are designed to tell the stories of the regions cultural and natural history. A friendly hospitality staff and visitor information services will help guide you on your journey. The highlight for the genealogist is the archives of the Wisconsin Historical Society.

We Michiganders often forget that much of our history might be found just over the Michigan-Wisconsin border, and it is good to take a wider perspective.

The archives are open Tuesday-Friday 1p.m. to 4:30 p.m., or by appointment. It is located 2.5 miles west of Ashland, Wisconsin.

EXCERPTS FROM THE DAILY MINING JOURNAL 15 FEBRUARY 1912

Ishpeming

WILLIAM BENBOW, a former well known resident of Ishpeming, died recently in Globe, Arizona. Mr. Benbow was a fine baritone who sang at many programs and also in the Ishpeming Choir. The deceased has been ill with pneumonia for a time and died Friday morning. He leaves his wife and a 16 year old son, Alphonse.

Mr. and Mrs. FRANK DECAIRE of the National are the parents of a baby daughter.

Mr. and Mrs. OTTO LAITINEN of 402 S. Third Street are the parents of a son.

Mrs. PATRICK O'BRIEN of W. Division Street passed away yesterday. She was born in Ireland and had spent a majority of her life in Michigan. Her husband died at the Lake Superior Mine in 1893. She is survived by a son Alderman P. J. O'BRIEN of the First Ward, and two daughters; Misses Mary and Emily O'BRIEN.

FRANK J. KEOUGH has moved his Turkish bath business from St. Luke's Hospital to quarters at 126 Spring Street, where desirable sleeping quarters are in connection with the bath house. Mrs. ANNA M. GATES of Grand Rapids is visiting her brothers; J. J. DUTMER and H. G. DUTMER.

The remains of LOUIS RICHTER, a former resident of Marquette, who died at Eveleth, Minnesota, will be brought here for burial. Mr. RICHTER was 28 years old and had been in Eveleth for a number of years.

Negaunee

JOHN BRITZ, who makes his home at the Lathrop and is well known to the citizens of Negaunee, was adjudged insane in the Delta County probate court on Tuesday. He was ordered confined in the Northern Hospital for the Insane at Newberry. Mr. BRITZ was ill a long time and his family cared for him until his mind became unbalanced. It is hoped that his mind may be restored with proper care and treatment.

STUART GAFFNEY, 18 year old second son of Mrs. JAMES GAFFNEY, passed away yesterday at the family home on Teal Lake Avenue. He would have graduated from Negaunee High School in June, had he been able to attend. The deceased died from the lingering effects of Tuberculosis.

The trial of WILLIAM NADEAU of Negaunee is underway. He is charged with the murder of MATT SAARIKOSKI. The incident occurred on 05 September 1911 at KOTILA's Saloon. The jurors are; JOHN LOSSELYOUNG, JOHN F. NICHOLS, THOMAS HEARD, AUGUST LUNDBLAD, JOHN HOCKING, SAMUEL PEARCE, JOHN WILLS, ED ARVIDSON, FRANK P. NEEDHAM, WILLIAM GIBBS, GUST A. LINDBERG and WILLIAM HENWOOD.

ED SWANSON, who fractured a rib and injured himself internally by falling from a step ladder on the second floor of the Sundberg block Monday afternoon, is getting along nicely. Naturalization hearings were held on Tuesday and two applicants were denied citizenship papers. JOHN CURTIS, of Negaunee was denied with prejudice for not being a man of good character. BISCOMB, of Duluth, arrived in the city this week to take a position as a bookkeeper with N.G. DeHAAS. Mr. BISCOMB was formerly a bookkeeper in the office of

F.B. SPEAR, but left about a year ago to take a position with the Consolidated Elevator Company, of Duluth. Mrs. BISCOMB and child arrived in the city yesterday.

WILLIAM GAUTHIER who escaped from the Marquette County jail about 6 weeks ago, and was recaptured Tuesday afternoon near Chocolay by WILLIAM FOARD, who found the man working on a farm owned by Mr. LEVEQUE. 



Our speaker was Dr. Russell Magnaghi, Professor of History at Northern Michigan University (NMU). Dr Magnaghi, a transplanted Californian who somehow ended up in Marquette. His specialty is the preservation and history of the peoples of the Upper Peninsula (UP). One of the many projects undertaken by Dr. Magnaghi and his students was to take the 1910 United States Federal Census (UP) and separate the residents by City, Township, Ward, Ethnic groupings and occupations. Another project that he was involved in is the Oral History Digitization Project. This project was to interview Italian-Americans from many diverse locations, concentrating on the UP, he visited many communities and those interviews are available to hear by logging on to the Northern Michigan University Archives website; http://www.nmu.edu/archives/node/1. Here is a sample of available resources that the archives have, which include, Cleveland Cliff Iron Company Records, Naturalizations, Timber Industry, Logging Camps, Farms and Dairies, among others. Please visit the website for more information. The archives are open Monday-Thursday 8:00-12:00 and 1:00-5:00. Please call ahead at (906-227-1046) to make sure they have what you are looking for, as some of the records are held off site and they will need to retrieve them. SOME DISEASES FOUND ON DEATH CERTIFICATES

Aneurism—rupture of an artery.

Apoplexy—hemorrhage of a blood vessel in the brain; a stroke.

Atelectasis—collapse of lung tissue, affecting part or all of one lung.

Bilious Fever—a fever said to be due to a liver disorder.

Black Death—a form of bubonic plague.

Black Pox—black smallpox.

Bright's Disease—kidney ailment.

Cholera—infectious disease caused drinking contaminated water, usually fatal.

Consumption—(Pulmonary Tuberculosis) highly contagious bacterial infection.

Diptheria—a highly contagious bacterial infection.

Dropsy—swelling of soft tissue due to the accumulation of excess water.

Enteritis—inflammation of the bowels.

Gastroenteritis—irritation and inflammation of the stomach and intestines.

Inanition—exhaustion from lack of nourishment.

La Grippe—influenza.

Marasmus progressive deterioration of the body due to severe malnutrition or intestinal disorders.

Phelibitis—swelling of a vein caused by a blood clot.

Puerperal Exhaustion—condition where woman died during childbirth (labor).


Puerperal Fever—septic poisoning which occurred during childbirth.

Scarlet Fever—major cause of death for children, a contagious bacterial infection with a skin rash and a high fever, usually caused death in 24 to 48 hours due to circulatory failure.

Teething—an infection of the mouth that (before the advent of antibiotics) could cause death.

Tetanus—an infectious disease which attacks the muscles of the neck and lower jaw.

Typhoid Fever—infectious disease, transmitted by contaminated food or water.

A GENEALOGY ODYSSEY

When our children were born in 1961 and 1962, I might have sent them back where they came from if I'd realized that I would someday look up into the family tree and find over 38,000 relatives!

The nudge that got me started was a centerfold of a magazine (not Playboy) that was handed out to new parents at the hospital where our son and daughter were born. It was my first issue of Parents Magazine, and the centerfold showed a blank form for a pedigree (yes, people have them, too) which provided spaces for parents and grandparents.

Nosy me...I couldn't make myself quit. So I found out more about the grandparents on both sides of the family (Cornish and Swedish), and found myself wanting more. I spent some time looking up the birth dates and places, spouses and dates of marriage, death dates and places and found that I had to cross the Big Pond to find out more.

My father, Johan Arvid Johnson's cousins had travelled to Sweden to visit their second cousins, so they had some names and addresses to write to. Inger Palmer, the wife of my father's second cousin contacted other relatives, a pair of sisters who lived and worked in Uddevalla, and spent their vacation time in Gothenberg's genealogy archives. They sent me a lovely hand-drawn chart of what they had learned, which gave me a lot more information.

The children were taking up my time, and I set aside genealogy for a while. After I went back to work in the schools as a Media Center Specialist, time to research for myself became even more scarce, until retirement. I learned of a tour to Scandinavia with Debbi-Tours. I found a traveling partner and wrote ahead to a cousin of a cousin, for help in reaching more relatives, so that perhaps I could meet some of them on the tour.

The Swedish part of the tour fell into place nicely, but I was still searching for a connection in the Eastern part of Sweden, now called Finland, across the Bay of Bothnia. My primary researcher finally found my grandfather, Herman Abrahamsson Sparf Kock's family on the Raipaluotto Archipelago, a little west of Vasa, now reachable by a new elegant bridge. Hans Soderlund, my expert on Raipaluotto genealogy, set me up for years of excitement, with the data he gave me.

The most recent fruit that fell from that tree appeared on my computer screen last summer. On my Cornish-L mailing list, I stared at a message from a Peter Gundry, who was from Zimbabwe, and I had to reply to him immediately!! You see, my 3rd cousin twice removed, Johan Gabriel Osterlund, had moved to that part of Africa even before it was named Rhodesia. You may remember it as a country rich in diamonds, and it was Cecil Rhodes who headed this industry. My Johan Gabriel, I found later, moved there at about the same time, as a young man, and got into the trucking/transportation end of that business.

I replied to the Cornish-L list, saying "Hey Peter, if you ever run across a man with the name Austen (which the family had changed from Osterlund), please ask him if he is related to my Johan Gabriel?" Well, within two weeks, Peter e-mailed me, and said that he had gone to a store where he did business, and noticed a name tag on a man there... "Austen". When he asked if this man could possibly be related to my Johan Gabriel, the man said, "Yes, he's my grandfather!"

Even though I have not yet had a response from him, after sending him some family information, I hope that he will get around to it someday and tell me what happened to his parents, 7 uncles and aunts who were born there, and fill in that story for me. Cross your fingers for me!





DEVON RECORD OFFICE

For those who have ancestors located in the Cornish parishes of Devon, a wonderful resource has been found. It consists of Church Rate Lists for 78 parishes; some of the lists are from the first half of the seventeenth century, which may provide more information on your ancestor. The church rate lists were usually done annually so this may help in locating where your ancestors may have attended church in a specified time period. 19 September 2012 Meeting

Joan Ball, President of the Marquette County Genealogical Society, gave a presentation entitled "Introduction to Naturalization Records". Since many of our ancestors came from other countries it was interesting to know what they had to do to before becoming United States citizens. Early immigrants who wanted to become citizens had to be a resident of the United States for 5 years and have references stating that they would be a good citizen. In about 1866 women and children automatically received their citizenship papers when the husband/father got his. Immigration and Naturalization records prior to about 1900 did not have much detail, other than the applicants name and the country where he came from. Records after 1900 have much more detail, which may include his birthplace, children's names and dates. In the early 1920's the "Married Women's Act of 1922" was passed which stated that women had to apply for their own citizenship papers, even though they may have been married to a United States citizen. For those lucky enough to have ancestors that left after 1925 these records can shed light of their journey to the new world... perhaps even telling you where they embarked for their journey, the ship's name and finally their new home.




ECONO FOODS RECEIPTS


