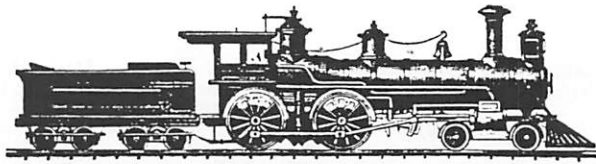

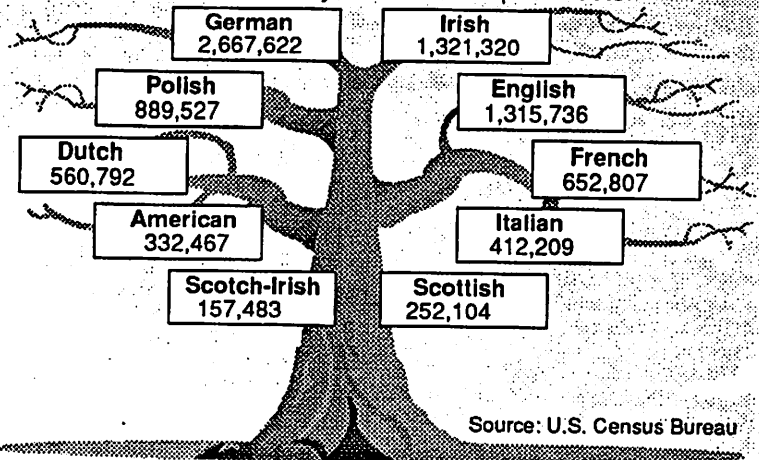

HOW TO MAKE A MAP MORE USABLE:

When you get a map, get two of them-one to use and one to keep in your files. First, you must put the map face down on an ironing board or table, a flat surface. On top of the map put a layer of thin plastic (like a dry cleaner's bag). Top that with a piece of cloth, such as an old sheet. Then press with an iron set at the temperature for the cloth. This is an up and down motion. DO NOT IRON BACK AND FORTH, just press down and move the iron to a new spot. Do this over the entire surface. This will melt the plastic and bond the paper of the map to the piece of cloth. When it is all bonded, trim around the edge of the map and cloth. Then your map can be folded, rolled, or bent and it will not be harmed. You can mark on it and use it without having it wear out at the folds. When you have completed the project, you can transfer valid markings to your file map for safe keeping. If you decide to throw away the old marked-map, there is no major loss.

SOURCES FOR LOCATING MAP PLACE NAMES

1) THE GEOGRAPHIC NAMES INFORMATION SYSTEM (GNIS)

In seeking our ancestors, we often come upon place names unfamiliar to us. Road maps and atlases can help locate cities, counties and parishes. But what about rivers and streams, or lakes and hills? It's hard to know which map to look on if you only know the state a hill was supposed to be located in, but you're not sure which part of the state to look in.

One place to look for such information is in the Geographic Names Information System, a computer database compiled by the United States Geological Survey. Currently, microfiche copies of this database are available at a very reasonable price, with separate fiche sets for each state.

Inside of each state's microfiche printout, all geographic names are listed in alphabetic order. The next column shows what type of geographic feature is referred to (lake, stream, city, hill, etc.). This is followed by the exact location of the place, given in longitude and latitude, all the way down to the minute and second. The county in which the place is found is noted, and in some cases, the elevation is given. In case you need a large-scale map, the U.S.G.S. map showing the place, is named in the final column. Such a tool can be invaluable in locating those streams, hills, or small towns mentioned in old land deeds or personal journals.

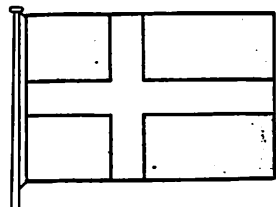

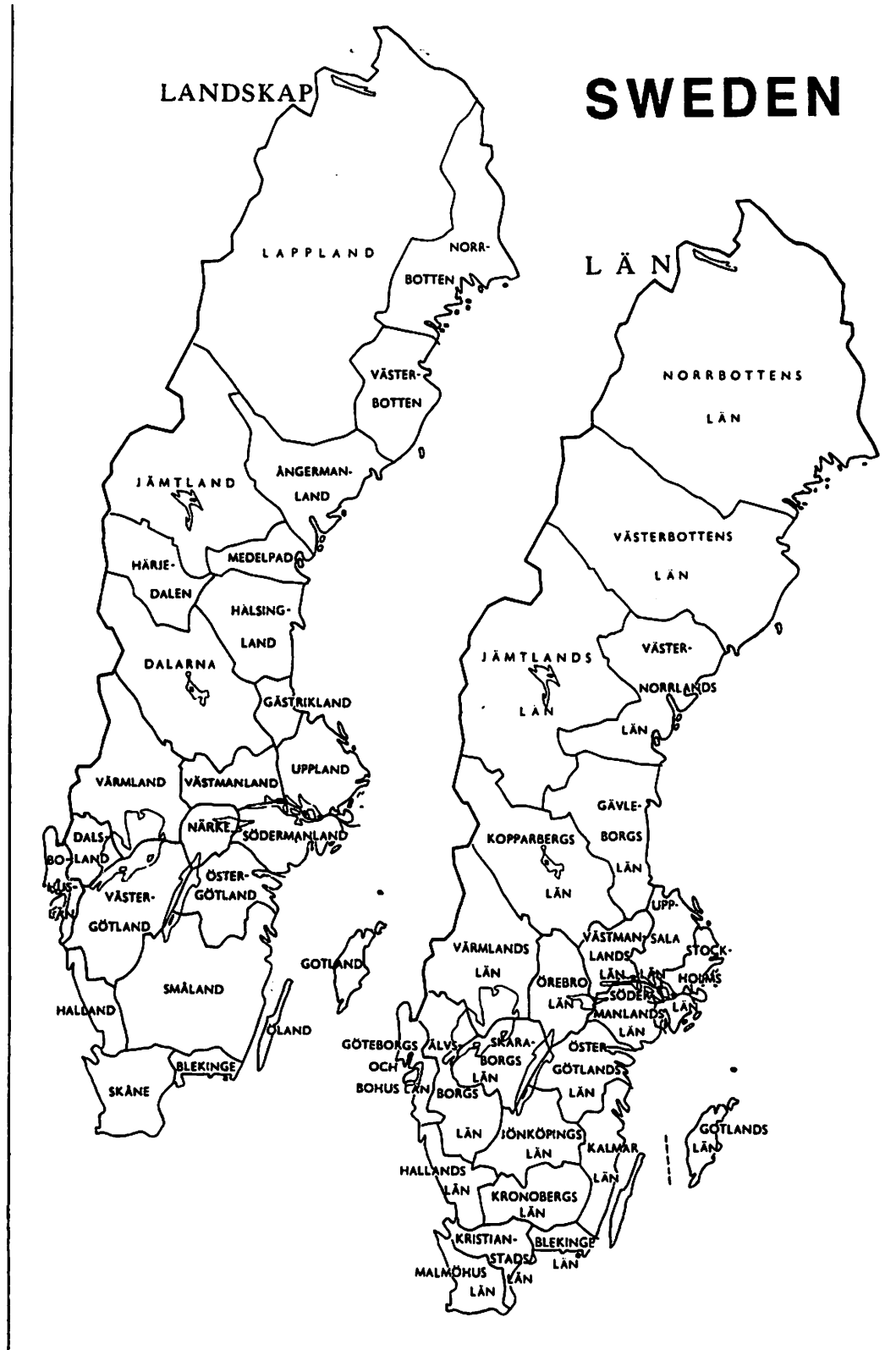

SWEDISH SETTLERS IN THE UPPER PENINSULA OF MICHIGAN

The most numerous of the Scandinavians in Michigan were the Swedes, mainly attracted to areas of the Upper Peninsula. The American Immigrant Company of New York sent an agent in 1864 to Sweden to obtain contract labor. A vigorous advertising campaign led by Amerika of Gothenberg was conducted. Advertisements appeared in Swedish-American newspapers for workmen needed in the Quincy mines on Lake Superior. The cost of transportation would initially be paid by the mining companies. A party of Swedes enroute to the Quincy mines in 1864 met a Swede returning from the mines at Marquette. This man tried to dissuade the party from going on, saying that the promised wages were not being paid. The party went on nevertheless and found wages of \$1.50-3.00 per day without lodging, the latter costing \$20-24 per month. Mine workers were expected to repay the mine companies for their travel expenses from Sweden to the mine sites, and frequently it took them years to pay off their debts. Eventually enough money was saved to send for the rest of the family, still back home in Sweden.

The development of the iron mines soon brought thousands to Marquette County. The most important Swedish settlements there were in Ishpeming, Negaunee, Marquette, Republic, Michigamme and Clarksburg. The chief occupation was mining. Ishpeming was the oldest of these settlements with the Swedes beginning to move there in 1868. The early 1880's marked the biggest influx of Swedish settlers into Marquette County.

One of the earliest Swedish newspapers in Michigan was the *Svenska Posten* (*The Swedish Post*) a weekly paper begun in Ishpeming in 1882. It was later named the *Superior Posten* and was published until 1918. This paper carried local news and obituary notices and of course was printed in Swedish.

GERMANS IN MARQUETTE COUNTY

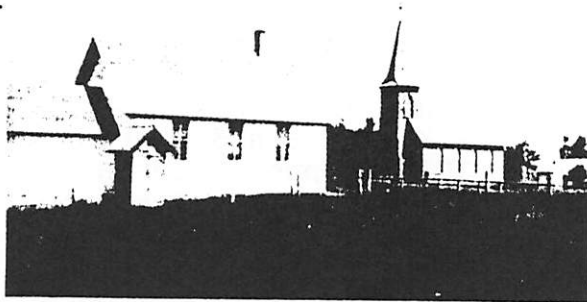
Between 1820 and 1900, over 3 million German immigrants settled in the United States. The Germans became America's largest single ethnic minority group. A small percent came to Upper Michigan.

The first Germans to Marquette County came in August 1849 from Milwaukee. They were induced by Robert Graveraet to sail to Marquette to be employed in the county's iron mines. Three of this group of men remained in Marquette County to take an important role in its development. They were: **George Rublein**, brewer; **August Macht**, merchant; **Francis Dolf**.

Other important German settlers in Marquette County were: **Edward N. Breitung**, merchant and mine owner; **Samuel Kaufman**, clothier; **John Mack**, roadbuilder; **Jacob Dolf**, sheriff and county marshal; **Ferdinand Bending** and **Philip Berdie**, businessmen; **B. Glocke**, cigar manufacturer; Captain **George Barringer**, mine foreman; Rev. **Frederick Eis**, Catholic priest; **Theodore Kruse**, construction business; **G.L. Kuhlman**, grocer; **Henry Blemhuber**, agriculture.

The Green Garden settlement, 8 miles south of Marquette, had the largest concentration of Germans in the county. It was settled in the 1860's by German immigrants who sought good farm lands. Early settlers were: **Carl Kunde**; **Siegfried Zerbel**; **Julius Zerbel**; **Ludwig Koepp**; **Martin Koepp**; **Carl Heitman**; the **Dorow**, **Priebe**, **Ewing**, and **Gentz** families.

Although small in numbers, the Germans who settled in Marquette County played an important role in the development of the county because of their frugal, industrious, and religious ethics.

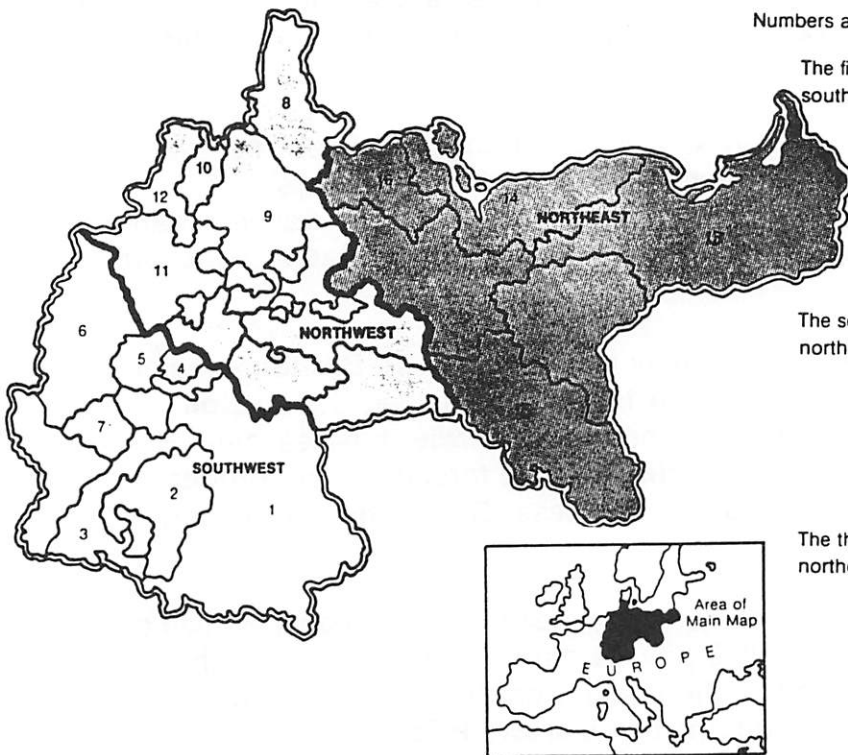

HAMBURG PASSENGER LISTS

Almost one out of three central and eastern European emigrants is found on the Hamburg passenger lists. Most who departed through Hamburg went to the United States. Other Europeans embarked from Bremen, LeHavre, Amsterdam, Rotterdam or Antwerp because those ports were easier to reach. The records for those ports no longer exist or are not available for research. The Hamburg passenger lists have been preserved and is an excellent source for locating an immigrant ancestor's place of origin. It includes such information as the passenger's name, hometown (or last town of residence), age, other family members and occupation. The original records are stored in the State Archives at Hamburg. In 1984 the Museum for Hamburg History opened a Historic Emigration Office. The office will search microfilm copies of the lists for a fee of about \$30.00 per year searched. The address is: Hamburg-Information GmbH. Museum fur Hamburgische Geschichte Holstenwall 24. D-2000 Hamburg 36, Federal Republic of Germany.

There are films available for 1850 to 1900 in the Historical Genealogy Department of the Allen County Library. The collection for 1850-1854 is indexed alphabetically by the first letter of the surname. A separate index for year or part of a year for 1855-1934 is available. The lists are arranged chronologically by ship. Surnames of heads of households are alphabetized by the first letter.

MISCELLANEOUS CEMETERY TIDBITS:

Something Worth Noting: When looking for women in cemetery records, check under the maiden name as well as the married name. Women were sometimes buried under the maiden name. It is also important to consider the possibility of a second marriage, if her first husband died. When a man and woman are buried side by side with only one stone present don't assume they were husband and wife. Usually this assumption would be true, but it is not uncommon for a brother and sister to have been together. It is better to wait for positive proof than to make your genealogy record inaccurate by including such assumptions as actual fact. Also be aware that sometimes men and women may be buried in their parents' plot if the parents bought a family plot. If the person was divorced, for example, they could be with their parents. From: Kinship Tales, Vol. 11, No. 2.

New Technique for Tombstone Rubbing: Use of a non-woven fabric called "Pellon" (medium-weight), instead of paper will result in a much better rubbing with less effort. The stone can be washed just prior to rubbing (since pellon will not tear when wet) and the fabric pulled into the shape of the stone and taped into place while the stone is still wet. Use a block of colored wax or side of a crayon to do the rubbing. If the stone has "chunks" of lichen that have hardened, crumpled pieces of masking tape will help remove them prior to rubbing. REMEMBER..... NEVER USE A WIRE BRUSH TO CLEAN A TOMBSTONE! From: Luce-Mackinac Genealogical Society Newsletter, Jan 1993, Winter Issue.

How To Remove Stains from a Granite Stone: MIX: 4 ounces of oxalic acid in a quart of hot water. Apply this solution on to the stain, let it dry. Then rinse. You can make this mixture before you go to the cemetery OR take sugarless powdered lemonade Koolaid and apply it with a damp sponge....OR...cut a lemon in half, pour salt liberally on one of the halves of lemon & rub on the stain.

EIGHT HUNDRED HOME COMERS REGISTERED

It Is Estimated That More Than a
Thousand Former Residents
Visited City.

More than eight hundred home-comers signed the register at the Ishpeming Y. M. C. A. building last week, the majority of these enrolling on the fourth and on the following day. It is estimated that nearly five hundred of the home-comers did not register, owing to the great demand for the registration book during the last two days of the week. Among the pioneers who signed the register Saturday is B. W. Wright, of Marquette, who is now deputy county treasurer. Mr. Wright located in Ishpeming in 1807, residing here continuously for about forty years. He left in 1906 for Marquette, where he now resides. During his term of residence in this city Mr. Wright was engaged in business at the Cleveland location and later was associated with A. W. Myers in the old Rock store.

During the week badges were distributed to all of the home-comers and to the pioneers of the city, these being high-

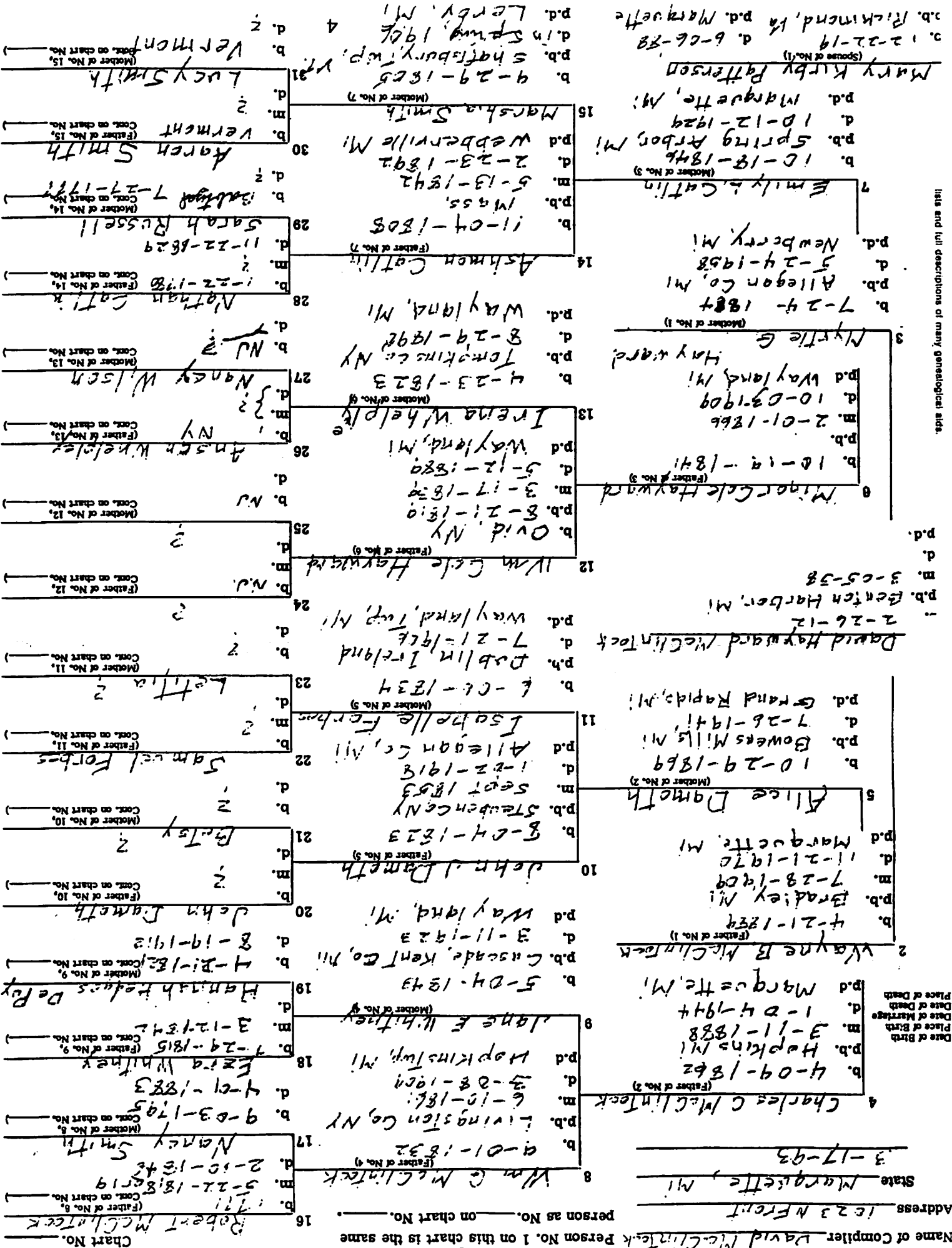

Tracing your family's history may be one of the most important things you'll ever do. It could save your life. Doctors once thought that hereditary diseases were limited to rare maladies like hemophilia or certain birth defects. But ongoing research indicates there is some genetic component in nearly all ailments-including heart disease, cancer(breast, ovarian, and colorectal), diabetes, asthma, allergies, alcoholism, ulcers and manic depression. "Each of us harbors at least 20 disease-causing genes," says Dr. Aubrey Milunsky, director of the Center for Human Genetics at Boston University. "When you compile a health history, the question to ask isn't 'Are there any genetic diseases in our family?' but 'Which ones do we have?'"

Unfortunately, many doctors pay little attention to family history during checkups. Yet, a good way to tell if you or your children are susceptible to certain disorders is to look at your health tree. In the United States, thousands of deaths could be prevented each year if people would learn which diseases run in their families.

Most genetic illnesses are probably "multifactorial," meaning they spring from an interaction of genes with environmental factors you may be able to control. For example, by exercising, and avoiding obesity, you could mitigate a family susceptibility to adult-onset diabetes. And frequent checkups can alert you to a problem while there's still time to

treat it. Here's how to investigate your medical roots:

Look through family records.

"It's amazing how much information we have buried in trunks, scrapbooks and old bibles," says Myra Vanderpol Gormley, author of Family Diseases: Are You at Risk? Also, photographs of your ancestors can show obesity, poor posture (possible osteoporosis) and abnormal physical traits.

Ask questions.

Relatives can be a tremendous source of information. Most important is to record the health history of first-degree relatives--parents, siblings and children, who have 50 percent of their genes in common with yours. Then move on to second-degree relatives--grandparents, uncles, aunts, nieces and nephews, with whom you share 25 percent of your genes. Later you may want to add cousins and more distant ancestors. The wider and more detailed your history, the better.

Gather the details.

Knowing the exact type and location of a cancer can help determine whether your relative's ailment is hereditary. It's also important to learn the relative's age when the disease struck. Inherited ailments tend to appear sooner than noninherited ones. And if the disease hit more than one relative early in life, there could be a hereditary influence.

Search for clues. If a relative was blind, deaf or mentally retarded, find out why. You can sometimes unearth clues by

asking, "Can you think of any unusual traits that run in our family?"

Obtain written records. Family lore can be misleading. Try to back up relatives' stories with death certificates (from county or state vital records departments) and medical records (from doctors offices and hospitals). Keep in mind that physicians and hospitals aren't required to save medical records indefinitely. If you have trouble getting existing records, ask your doctor for assistance.

Share your findings. Tell your physician about your family's history. Then ask how you can use the information to safeguard your health and that of your loved ones.

Sometimes a medical family history isn't as dire as it looks. Geneticist Ellen Knell of the Los Angeles Oncologic Institute says, "Almost every family has some cancer".

Whatever fruits your family health tree may bear, view them as reason not for despair, but for hope. As modern medicine continues to expand our knowledge of gene-linked diseases, your family's medical history is being seen in a whole new light-not as a death sentence, but as a lifesaver!

CORNISH WILLS

For anyone tracing their roots in Cornwall, it would be well worth the time to check out the Cornish wills. Not only are they interesting to read, but one of the few ways we have for putting families together before the first census in 1841.

As most reseachers, I have some very common surnames among my ancestors which makes it all but impossible to group children with parents. In reading the wills I have been fortunate more than once in finding not only all the children listed, but the married names of the daughters as well.

As an example, my 5-greats grandparents, William **HAMBLY** and Mary **RUNDELL** married in St. Endellion in 1756. I had no idea of where Mary was from-there were no parish vitals on the **RUNDELL** family in St. Endellion. While reading the SURNAME INDEX which is AT THE BEGINNING OF EVERY FILM, I checked all the **RUNDELLS** listed and found the will of Charles **RUNDELL** of Lanreath who listed his daughter Mary as Mrs. William **HAMBLY**. This will was the clue I needed to open up my **RUNDELLS** and add 3 more generations and 3 more surnames.

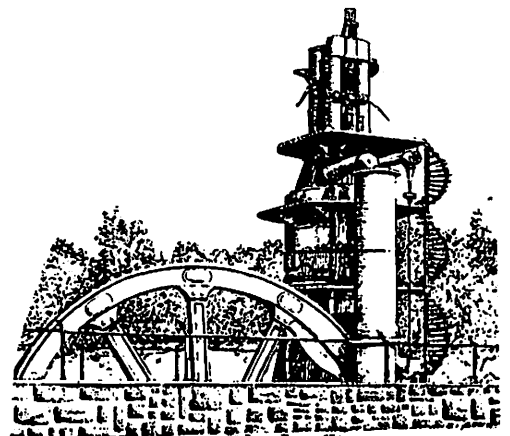
I've read wills where the names of grandchildren, aunts, uncles, sisters, brothers, in-laws, parents, cousins, etc. are mentioned, even grandchildren who inherit in the place of a son or daughter who are deceased. You will discover what your ancestor did for a living, their wealth, or lack of it, what property they owned. These people seem to come to life and you get a glimpse of much more than the usual name and dates.

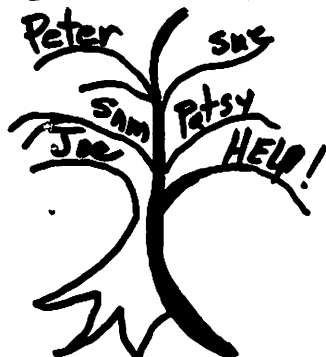

HELPS IN USING LAND RECORDS

From: Saginaw Genealogical Society, Inc.

RECORDER'S OFFICE - Office at the Courthouse which holds the property transactions. They start at the time of the county formation.

GRANTEE - Property Buyer.

GRANTOR - Property Seller.

DEED - Legal document containing record of a transfer of real estate.

PARCEL - The piece of land concerned.

INDEXES - Names listed alphabetically; may be separate volumes for grantee's and grantor's or may be on the facing pages.

WARRANTY DEED - Document whereby owner conveys land to another and warrants that he has clear title.

QUITCLAIM - Concerning land whereby one party conveys to another the rights if any, that he may have. Such deeds are often among heirs in the settlement of an estate.

BOUNTY LAND - Government grant of a specific amount of land at an inexact location mainly as a military compensation. Often a specific tract of land was set aside and the grantee would choose his own parcel and then register it.

ABSTRACT OF TITLE - Condensed history of a land title.

FEE SIMPLE - An absolute inheritance, with conditions or restrictions.

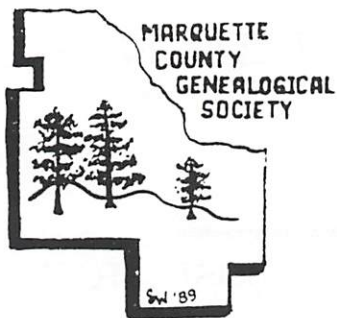
