* MCGS has recently acquired over 4,000 records of patients from Morgan Heights Tuberculosis Sanatorium dating from 1911-1960.

Thanks to BILL HAGER of Ishpeming who brought the records to the Society's attention and is graciously providing temporary storage space.

MCGS signed an agreement with Marquette County to obtain the records, the original of which will eventually be sent to the State Archives, Lansing, Michigan.

MCGS plans to index the 88 boxes of case histories by name and admission date. Medical information on patients can only be released to family members. Information in the case histories includes: Name; place of birth; address; nativity; ancestry; naturalization papers; property deeds; insurance policies; next of kin; years of residence in the county; Social Security number.

st. Patrick's Day

Details of St. Patrick's life were not recorded for two centuries after his death, so much about him is legend. The son of an English magistrate, he was born in Britain during the late fourth century. At the age of 16, he was carried off by pagan Irish raiders and sold into slavery in Ireland. Time alone on a mountainside tending his master's sheep awakened his spirituality, and God became the focus of his life. After seven years in captivity, he had a vision directing him to the seashore, where he would find a ship to take him to freedom. Patrick followed the path revealed in his dream and escaped.

Upon returning to his homeland and family, he was haunted by memories of Ireland. Though born British, Patrick considered himself Irish for it was in Ireland that he discovered his faith in God. Again he had a vision, this time compelling him to return to Ireland to preach the Gospel.

As a missionary in Ireland, Patrick suffered many trials, even imprisonment by the Druids. However, after winning favor with local kings, conflict with the Druids lessened, and he converted many peasants to Christianity. For 28 years, Patrick traveled across the countryside, spreading the word of God. His followers, overcome with grief at his passing from old age in the year 460, embraced him as their patron saint.

In the centuries following his death, St. Patrick became a legend credited with driving the snakes out of Ireland, the blessing of the shamrock, and carrying the Gospel to the entire country. He was said to have spoken much about the Trinity-Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Some say he used trefoil leaves, or shamrocks, to explain the Trinity to followers as he ministered on the hillsides. After his death, a sprig of the three-leaf shamrock became a symbol of the beloved saint. It and its color—green—are now commonly associated with St. Patrick's Day.

Families living in Ireland today celebrate St.

Patrick's Day as their ancestors did by attending a holiday Mass, visiting friends and relatives, then gathering for an evening of singing, dancing, and drinking toasts to St. Patrick.

Celebrations in Ireland are accompanied by much less fanfare than those in the United States. There is a parade in Dublin, but it is much smaller than those in New York City and Chicago.

In fact, the first St. Patrick's Day parade took place not in Ireland but in New York City. During the American Revolution, the British Army marched 400 of its Irish soldiers up Broadway in parade fashion, accompanied by fife and drum. At the end of their march, the Irish were greeted by British officers who served them a festive St. Patrick's Day banquet.

In the eyes of the Irish soldiers, the banque: was given as a bribe to win favor for the King's cause. This scheme, however, did no good. The Irish aetested British rule over their homeland and resented being forced to serve in the British Army. Not long after the parade and banquet, hundreds of freedom-loving Irish soldiers deserted the army and joined the colonists' fight for independence.

The first purely secular St.

Patrick's Day celebration was held in Boston in 1737 by the Irish Charitable Society. The Friendly Sons of St. Patrick began celebrating the holiday in 1784, and by the late 1800s, people all across the United States celebrated being Irish on March 17. Today, there are more people of Irish descent living in the United States than in Ireland itself.

Fifteen centuries after his death, St. Patrick's life and accomplishments are still being lauded and celebrated by Irish throughout the world. The religious significance of the holiday has faded, and the day has become more festive, and a time to proclaim unity among the Irish.

THE IRISH IN UPPER MICHIGAN

Between 1841 and 1926 the population of Ireland fell from 8 million to 4 million, mainly due to emigration. Thus forty million Americans today can trace part of their ancestry to the 7 million that left Ireland.

The Irish first came to Upper Michigan in the 1840's to work in the copper and iron mines of Houghton and Marquette counties. In the 1850's they were also involved in the construction of the Soo Locks. By 1870 the Irish immigrants in Michigan were concentrated in Wayne, Kent, Houghton and Marquette Counties. As mining jobs dwindled, many Irishmen and families moved west to Montana and Idaho for better railroad or mining opportunities. While in Marquette County, the men preferred jobs in railroading and in the fire departments and police forces. Women were emoployed as domestic help or school teachers. Some teachers in Marquette included: Miss O'Reilly; Miss Mulvey; Miss Cleary; Theresa Hennesey; Hazel Bush; Irene Finnegan; Mary Deasy; Marie O'Meara; Mary Atfield; Eileen Scully; Nellie O'Keefe; Nora Deasy; Leona Tierney; Mary Tierney. John Voelker in his article," What Happened to the Irish?" mentions these families in Ishpeming: the Fitzpatricks; Tim Hughes; John Nolan; the Gleasons; John Burke; the McGinty's, Mooneys and Mullins families; teachers Nora, Bridget and Kate Laughlin; Maggie Connors; the Harringtons and Doneys; the Kennedys; the Quinlans; Tom Hughes; the Farleys and McCarthys; Pat Gallery; Jim and Margaret Malloy; Jeremiah Hares; the Thorntons; Jack and Vina Lacey; Paddy Collins; the Hickeys, Sullivans and Navins; Paddy O'Brien; the Cronins, Devines, Slineys, Geelans, Coffeys, and Coughlins; the Flynns, Fishers, Meehans and Ryans; Dennis Hughes; Jim Murphy; Jack Hughes; the Redmond and Kenney brothers; Jack Navins; Mr. Gallagher. In Marquette a few of the Irishmen were: Tim Foley; John Tierney; John Downey; Buller Warren; Tim Hurley; Don McCormick; the Hogans, Griffins, Flanigans, O'Neils and Dunlevys.

At the center of the Irishmans life was the Ancient Order of Hibernians, a fraternal society open to Irish Catholics who were "of good moral character". The Hibernians initially devoted their energy to helping recent immigrants adjust to life in America. Later they raised money to build halls and organized bands who marched in St. Patricks Day parades. As devout Catholics, Irishmen were credited with building churches, including St. Peter's Cathedral in Marquette. Many names of Irish men and women can be found in the early census records and city directories of Marquette County. Today the Irish population in Upper Michigan is relatively small.

Research of Irish ancestors is difficult because of a 1922 fire in the Public Records Office in Dublin which destroyed some parish records and many civil records. Many repositories must be searched such as: The Public Records Office; The Registrar General; The Genealogical Office; The Registry of Deeds; The Royal Irish Academy; the National Library, all of Dublin. In Northern Ireland, the Public Records Office (PRONI) in Belfast, is the main source of genealogical information.






DOG-SLEDGE MAIL (From a sketch by Col. Charles A. Booth)

THE MAIL SERVICE IN THE NORTHWEST

Those dwellers in cities who grumble because their letters are delivered but once a day on national holidays would be quite unhappy in the hyperborean regions of Lake Superior, where the scene of the accompanying graphic picture, a dog-sledge mail, is laid. This moreover is no fancy sketch, but was drawn on the spot at Sault St. Marie, or St. Mary's Falls, the capital of Chippewa County, Michigan, on the St. Mary's River, 440 miles north-northwest of Detroit. For more than one-third of the year the inhabitants of this delectable country are almost as effectually cut off from the outside world as any arctic explorers......The nearest railroad station is at Marquette, about 180 miles distant. Twice a week a sledge, drawn by a couple of dogs harnessed in tandem with ropes, and bearing the mail, sets out from Sault St. Marie, over the snow and ice, under convoy of an Indian runner, and if the weather is fine, and there are no detentions, arrives at Marquette in time to enable a person to send a letter to New York and receive an answer in a little less than two months.

Finnish History

The Finns settled in Finland around the time of Christ. They were hunters and fisherman by occupation. Vikings from neighboring Sweden eventually settled the coasts of Finland and Crusaded throughout Finland, Christianizing the Finns. The Swedes soon governed the country. During the Crusades all parishes formed were Roman Catholic. Not until 1593 did Lutheranism become the dominant religion. Parishes began keeping records in the late 1600's. Some records were destroyed during the Great Wrath War of 1717-1721. From then on, Finnish records of births, deaths and marriages are quite complete. Other records such as confirmation and church membership records were also kept by all parish pastors. By 1850 over 600 Lutheran parishes existed in Finland, with 84 of these recorded in the Swedish language.

Many wars ensued between Finland and it's Swedish and Russian neighbors. As a result, in the 1800's Finland was made a grand duchy of the Russian Empire after Czar Alexander I attacked and occupied Finland. Finns were granted the freedom to develop their own government, religion, language, and culture. However by 1894 the Russification of Finland began with the introduction of the Russian language and mandatory service in the Russian Army. In December 1917, Finland declared it's independence from Russia. Through many treaties, land was given to Russia and the final peace treaty was signed in 1947.

Emigration

The first known migration of Finns to America was in 1638 to the Delaware Colony. John Morton, a descendent of Martti Marttinen of Rautalampi, Finland was a delegate from Pennsylvania who signed the Declaration of Independence. His signature can be found below his friend's, Benjamin Franklin.

The peak years of emigration of Finns were 1901-1905. Over 350,000 Finns left for America and 80,000 left for Canada. See the chart below:

Finns could not leave Finland until parishes and government officials issued documents and passports. At first the emigrants left from Göteborg and Malmö, Sweden. By 1883, most Finns emigrated from Hanko (Hangö) in southwestern Finland enroute to Hull, England. Steamship records (Höyrylaiva Luettelot) are very complete for these emigrants from 1895-1940. Passage to North America cost about \$28.00 around 1900. Finns arrived in North America mainly through the ports of New York City, Boston, St. John, Montreal, and Quebec. The number of Finns entering the United States through Canada is almost the same as the number entering through New York City. Canadian Immigration records are an important resource in locating ancestors.


The Institute of Migration in Turku, Finland can be contacted, if all passenger lists, and emigration and immigration records fail to reveal an ancestors place of residence in Finland. The Institute will search it's archives for Finnish records for an hourly fee.


Because of parish documentation of residents, the records in Finland are fairly complete. Today it is estimated that there are over one million third generation Finns in North America.

SEVERAL WAYS TO USE YOUR COMPUTER FOR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

By Harry Liggett

Have you thought of all the ways you might use your computer for genealogical research? There are five basic classes of software for your computer which is used in genealogical research. They are (1) the genealogical program (2) word processing (3) database managers (4) communications, and (5) graphics. Here are some ideas on how each can be used.

GENEALOGICAL SOFTWARE

The genealogical software permits you to record information on individuals and families and to tie family lines together. You can enter notes and the sources of your information and produce ancestor charts, descendant' charts, family group forms and sorted lists. The genealogy software also permits you to keep separate data on those not yet identified as members of your particular family line.

WORD PROCESSING SOFTWARE

Your word processing software can be used for many tasks.

- △ CORRESPONDENCE: The biggest use of your word processing program probably will be for correspondence. It is important to be able to find a particular letter later. Most programs have directories and search features so you can call up all the letters you have written on a specific surname or letters you have written to a specific individual since a certain date. It is a good idea to number each letters to each individual as part of the file name [Example: JONES.003] so you can find them easily.
- △ INFORMATION SHEETS: When you write those letters, you don't have to repeat the same information every time. You can have an information sheet which states the basic information you are seeking on a particular surname and briefly outlines your problem. The sheet can be printed each time and changed where needed. Macros also can be used for automatic insertion of text, dates and closing paragraphs.
- △ FAMILY HISTORY & INDEXING: The word processor can be used for writing and indexing your family genealogy. It also can be used for newsletters and publications. It can be used for keeping documents such as wills and obituaries, indexing and sorting features can be used for many projects.
- △ RESEARCH JOURNAL: Separate files can be kept for each surname in a dated journal for research you have done.

DATABASES

Databases have many uses.

- △ ADDRESSES: Your genealogy program is a database program itself, but you will have other uses for databases. The first database you might think of is for names and addresses. A good address database should allow you to sort out your correspondence by surname. It is also nice to have the date of your first correspondence and other notes.
- △ SURNAME DATA: For keeping data that you do not want to add to your genealogy software program, you might want to set up surname data files. Many genealogy programs do not allow the entry of the kind of information you might like to keep. You can set up your own database to keep census, cemetery and many other types of information.
- △ CHECK FILE: An important use of a database can be for a card check file. Anytime you think of a particular library or courthouse, make an entry in this database. The next trip you make, you can print out the information you need to check.
- △ QUERIES: Another database might be used to keep a check on all the queries you have placed in newsletters. What did your query say in the newsletter last year? If you belong to a number of genealogical societies, you might want to keep a record of membership fees you have paid and queries submitted.
- △ BOOKS: You also will use a database of books and other references. Create the database to allow you to sort out the books you have in your own collection, the books you will ask your spouse to get for your birthday, books you have already checked at the library and books you still need to check. Books already checked should indicate whether you found nothing or whether you entered information from them in you surname database. List the name of the library and call number on all books. This database is important to tell you what research you have done.
- △ INFORMATION SOURCES: Where do you write to get information on land records? What kind of form do you use to get information? A database on sources can keep that information. It also might tell you where to get certain kinds of information or what kind of information is available from a particular source. If you chose, this could be included in your address database.

△ ACCOUNTING: Somewhere, either in a database or word processing file, you should keep an account of the money you have spent on your genealogical research. It is especially important if you do research for others for a fee.

COMMUNICATIONS

If you have a modem and communications software, you can enhance your genealogical research.

△ EXCHANGE DATA: You can communicate with others by calling into their computer to exchange information by downloading data or text files.

△ QUERIES AND INFORMATION: You can tap into the National Genealogical Conference from a local bulletin board to read more than 100 queries and information messages each day.

△ OBTAIN HELP FILES: You can download genealogy software programs and information files on genealogy maintained by many bulletin boards.

△ LIBRARY: Many larger libraries now provide dial access to their card catalogues. You can dial from home and check the card catalog on your computer.

△ OTHER SERVICES: For a fee you can also tap into other commercial services which provide all sorts of information, shareware programs, and shopping services. These services include Compuserve, Genie, Prodigy and O-Link.

GRAPHICS

Graphics programs can be used to improve the appearance of any of your work - but especially for publications. There are inexpensive programs for desktop publishing which do a satisfactory job. Graphics are good for map making or to show cemetery lots, or even to graphically illustrate an ancestor chart.



This chart will help when typing ancestors names containing umlauts, which are common in the Scandinavian and German languages. Follow these steps on IBM or IBM compatible computers.

To create a character where the cursor is:

- 1) Hold down the "ALT" key
- Press one digit at a time in the numeric pad section (right side of keyboard). Release.
- The character now appears and will print where the cursor was located.

Computers and You

Some people, usually non-genealogists, think that genealogy by computer means you press a few keys and your whole family tree appears. Computers won't do your genealogy for you but as a tool, can organize your data. You still need to search through old records and documents. But that's the fun part anyway!!!

Many genealogy programs are available for recording your family history. No one program is best. Several books can be consulted to assist in your choice of software: "Archer's Directory of Genealogical Software", George Archer "Guide to Genealogy Software", Donna Przecha and Joan Lowrey

The most important feature in a software program is GEDCOM capability. GEDCOM is a method of storing data in a file that allows it to be transferred to another database. Computer technology and software are constantly changing. With GEDCOM, all family data stored can be transferred to another program, should you choose to change software. You can also share data with other people and even transfer data from an LDS Family History Library's Personal Ancestral Files via floppy disk to your computer at home.

If you don't believe how computers and their software can help you in recording your family history, simply ask another computer user!!!







THE "DIT" NAME

This short explanation is not intended to answer the specific reason for your ancestor's name change, but rather to explain what a "dit" or "second name" is.

"Dit" is translated into English as "say" or "also known as". There is no negative connotation implied which sometimes is the case with the English "alias". Since surnames came into being for the purpose of identification, we can say that the "dit" name came into being for the purpose of <u>further</u> identification of a person or family.

The choices of the new names were as infinite as there were names. Here are some general sources of these changes.

a- Occupation/Guild

b- Place of origin

c- Physical description

d- Character description

e- Maternal identification

f- Heroic deed/accomplishment

g- Description of some object

h- Easily pronounced names

i- Seigneurial identification

j- Military

The two surnames can be interchanged at any time. Louis CLEMENT dit LABONTE may appear as LABONTE dit CLEMENT.

Therefore Louis could be baptised Clement, married as Labonte dit Clement, found in a census as Labonte and buried as Clement dit Labonte. Whenever you run into any difficulty in tracing from one marriage to the next generation, be sure to check if there are any "dit" names for this family. The best place to check is at the end of Volume 7 in "Tanguay's Dictionaire". The end of the second volume of "Jette's Dictionaire" also has a listing of "dit" names. You will also find the "dit" names for each family at the start of that families file in Loiselle's microfiche. Drouin shows the "dit" names in the left margins throughout his listings.

It's a good idea to record all the "dit" names on your 5 generation sheets just as you find them, even with misspellings. Your research should reflect your findings, and not what you think it should be.

FRENCH SOCIETY IS 50 YEARS OLD

Was Organized in Marquette in June, 1875, With Only Eleven Charter Members.

"On a cold New Year's night in 1875 a little party of Frenchmen met to celebrate the coming of the New Year at the residence of Joseph H. Primeau, which then stood just north of Washington street."

So the Marquette Chronicle of June 23, 1909, begins the history of the founding of the Marquette chapter of the Societe St. Jean de Baptiste. The article continues:

"During the evening the subject was broached concerning the organization of a society of Frenchmen who then resided in Marquette. So great had been the success of the Montreal citizens in this line and so much good fellowship had been promoted that those present at Mr. Primeau's residence thought the matter should be taken up in the Queen City."

Throughout the winter, meetings were held at the offices of Mr. Primeau who was then city recorder. The main object was the perfecting of the Society of St. Jean de Baptiste.

A constitution and by-laws were drafted by Pierre Primeau. Joseph Vannier and Joseph Bolduc and on June 16, 1875, the society became a reality. There were 11 charter members: J. H. Primeau, Joseph Vannier, Pierre Primeau, A. Desjardins, Joseph A. Desjardins, Theophile Bastien, Ollivier Villeneuve, Antoine Primeau, Cyrills Marrin, Joseph Bolduc and Norbert Proul.

The purpose of the society, as enunciated by the first president, Joseph H. Primeau, was "Benevolence and charity, as well as the preservation and perpetuation of the French language among people of French descent. We want staunch true Americans and we wish our members to be able to speak the language of their forein ers as they stand beneath the Stars and Stripes ready to protect their colors."

Anniversary Tonight.

Tonight, in Colonial hall, the society will celebrate its fifty-eighth anniversary. During the years of its life it has had the following presidents: Joseph H. Primeau, Anable W. Bernier, Joseph Bolduc, Joseph A. Vannier, Henri Dion, Albert Proulx, J. P. Dube, Eusebe Ber-

trand, Alfred E. Archambeau, Adfred Fleury, J. H. LaRochelle, Z. Vadnais, Joseph Davis, Eimle Henne, J. B. Vanchesting, Victor Gingrass, and Adelard Bertrand.

Though death has swept the ranks of the charter members, their descendants are still "carrying on" in the Societe St. Jean Baptiste. The meeting tonight will be attended by many of them.

Marquette County Was Once Three Times As Large As It Is Today Daily Mining Journal, February 6, 1954 CHOCOLAY ONOTA WEST PORSYTH BAINTAM DELTA CO. ABONVILLE BALDWIR Map shows how Marquette County was shrunk in size from a land area of almost 6,000 square miles to its present size of 1,841 square miles through a series of public acts passed by the legislature. Shaded area all was once part of Marguette County, but now form parts of Keweenaw, Houghton, Baraga, Ontonagon, Iron and Dickinson Counties. Despite heavy MADEAU chopping away of Marquette County's land area, it still is the largest county in Michigan.

An interesting study made by has shrunk in area since it was created by a public act of Michigan Legislature on March 9, 1843.

Covered Parts Of 7 Counties

At that time Marquette County covered all of its present area except for Skandia Township and the east halves of Chocolay and Turin Townships. But it also included all of what are now Baraga, Houghton and Keweenaw Counties, as well as all but the southeast corner of what is now Iron County, the north half of what is now Dickinson County and all of Bohemia Township and the eastern half of Greenland Township in what is now Ontonagon County. Thus, Marquette County originally extended over parts or all of seven present - day coun-

The Legislature was not content to let this condition exist for long, however, and only two years later - in 1845 - the first "surgery" was performed Marquette County's area. A public act which divided the Upper Peninsula into six counties resulted in creation of Houghton County, trimming it out of the northern part of Marquette County. The newly created Houghton County embraced all of what is today Keweenaw County, northern two - thirds of what is now Houghton County and the northern half of what is now Baraga County. In addition, Houghton County included Powell Township and the northern portions of Michigamme, Champion and Ishare now in Marquette County.

Iron County also embraced parts of Sagola and West Branch Townships, as well as all of Felch Township, in what today is Dickinson County.

Finally, in 1891, the Legislature created Dickinson County and added to Iron County's size by taking Hematite Township and the north parts of Crystal Falls and Mansfield Townships from Marquette County. Marquette, Iron and Dickinson Counties assumed their present boundaries as a result of this maneuver.

Between 1843 and 1891 Marquette County thus was chopped from an area of about 6,000 square miles to its present size of 1.841 square miles. SAULT STE. MARIE — Chippewa County Register of Deeds Sharon Kennedy has announced that she has gone on-line.

As of Sept. 12, information available through her office will be free of charge on the World Wide Web. This will include land records (deeds, land contract, easements, liens, surveys, tax maps, plats) and other land records on file, transfer tax on deeds, recording requirements, property and transfer tax exemptions, Proposal A, assessed values, equalized values and taxable values, assessment and exemption appeal procedures, tax rates, special assessment rates and tax billing information, and many other real and personal property-related matters.

"Getting into the courthouse or even calling on the telephone during normal business hours may not be convenient for some," Kennedy said. "After all, this is a very large county — the second largest in Michigan."

Kennedy is the only register of deeds in the state to also serve as equalization director, allowing her to answer many questions on land records and property taxation.

No taxpayer dollars are being used to provide the Website service, according to Kennedy.

my dear old Great-Grandpa was never a dad.


I think that some rascal is pulling my leg,


