



## THE PLATTSBURGH PLATTS

FOUR BROTHERS WHO SETTLED PLATTSBURGH, NEW YORK in 1785

[Editor's Note: Margaret Platt Myers Byrne, a direct descendant of Zephaniah Platt, has lived in Plattsburgh all her life; her grand-children are the eighth generation of Platts there. An interest in local history led her to become co-chairman of the Clinton County Bicentennial Commission and she has served as a Trustee of the New York State Historical Association.

This story is adapted from materials presented at the 1993 Spring Conference and from her book, *The Plattsburgh Platts*, which is available (82pp, soft cover, \$19.95) from the Clinton County Historical Society, 48 Court St., Plattsburgh, NY]

**Determined to untangle a shambles** of old family papers one rainy spring day several years ago, I came upon a crumbling linen drawing of a family tree. It was covered with a minute but elegant script of largely accurate names of the original Platt family of Huntington & Smithtown, Long Island, as well as all the known descendants up to about 1890. Thus began the long hunt—through magnifying glasses, libraries, cemeteries, mail (both ancient and recent), and by numerous telephone conversations; the search even led to birth and obituary columns of various newspapers.

But my story really begins over two hundred years ago in the period following the American Revolution.

At the close of the Revolutionary War, New York State was hard up for money to pay its soldiers, and instead rewarded many of them with grants of unappropriated land. With an eye for a good investment, Judge

Zephaniah Platt of Poughkeepsie, New York, with several of his brothers and friends, formed a company to buy land grants in the great wilderness bounded generally by the Adirondacks on the south, Lake Champlain on the east, and the Canadian border on the north. The state only required of the owners the promise of early settlement.

Zephaniah Platt had visions of the development that would come with the building of settlements along Lake Champlain and the rivers leading into it. Known assets in the region were ample water power for industry, enormous forests, iron ore, and potential farmland. There was also great

promise of future traffic and commerce along the waterway leading north from New York City via the Hudson River, and across Lake Champlain to Montréal, and thence to England.

In 1785, as the company of investors acquired landholdings in the northeast corner of the State — *i.e.* Platt's Old Patent, The Old Military Tract, *etc.* — Zephaniah sent his brothers north to find a likely place for a town. They came at last to the hospitable bay where the Saranac River curls downward from the Adirondacks into Lake Champlain, and where a pre-war French settlement had been abandoned. Here Charles chose to plant Plattsburgh, and he began by naming it thus and whacking back the forest in order to build a log cabin. Nathaniel set about surveying and mapping the new lands, as well as building his own house.

Lot by lot the land was sold, new settlers arrived, and the village began to grow. Mills and a blockhouse, used also as a courthouse and church, added to the village permanence. By 1798 there were about 250 people here, farms had been established and Charles, as temporary doctor, also presided as Judge when necessary. When Zephaniah finally arrived in 1797 and built his own house, he found his little village growing like a field of dandelions.

As the four brothers produced 35 children between them, they outgrew their houses like settlers everywhere. Many of their young ones moved out — mostly west, through the Mohawk and St. Lawrence valleys. So the record of the descendants of the earliest Plattsburgh brothers shows some of the movement westward — to Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Chicago, New Orleans, and eventually to the west coast.

**Zephaniah Platt**, founder of Plattsburgh, was born at Huntington, Long Island and at age 23 served as Ensign in the First Company of the militia. At 24 he moved to Poughkeepsie, New York and a year later became Captain. At 40 he was a member of the Provincial Congress, at 42 a member of the Committee of Safety as well as a State Senator. At 46 he was a member of the Council of Appointment and County Judge in Dutchess county. From age 49-51 years he was a member of the Continental Congress and at 53 became a member of the State Convention to vote upon the adoption of the new constitution.


In that convention, according to his grandson H. K. Averill, *"there were 61 delegates and there was one majority for the constitution and that was Zephaniah Platt's. That single vote in the Court House at Poughkeepsie decided that the people of this Country should have a truly National government with all its attendant blessings."*

At 56 Zephaniah became a Regent of the State of New York and took a prominent part in the establishment of Union College. In 1779, as "Colonel of Associated Exempts" in Dutchess County, he led his Regiment to Stoney Point to garrison that place after its storming by Anthony Wayne.



During the Revolution he and 32 associates formed the company which would buy title to the northern military bonus tracts after the War. They proceeded with the settlement of the new village in 1785 and Zephaniah moved north to Plattsburgh about 1797. He died there in 1807 and is buried in Riverside Cemetery with his wife Mary Van Wyck.

was the first of the Platt brothers to come north to begin the settlement of Plattsburgh in March, 1785. He practiced medicine gratuitously for many years at Plattsburgh until other physicians arrived. He also served the community as Judge.





**Nathaniel Platt** also moved from Smithtown to Poughkeepsie where he was Captain of a Dutchess County Company in the French and Indian War in 1760. He was later Captain of the first Long Island Company in the Revolution, fought in the Battle of Long Island, and with George Washington in Westchester. Following the Revolution he came north to help with the surveying and settlement of Plattsburgh.

**Charles Platt** traveled extensively in Europe, Africa and the West Indies from 1763-1773. During that time he studied medicine in Paris. He was a Captain of the Minute Men during the Revolution. Following the War he

**Daniel Platt**, the youngest of these four, served in the U. S. Navy during the Revolution, before joining his brothers in Plattsburgh.

It might be noted that two other brothers, Jonas and Jeremiah, remained on Long Island at Smithtown. Two sisters, Elizabeth (Mrs. John Rogers) and Hannah (married successively to Albert Adriance and John Frear), lived in Dutchess County. Two other sisters, Sarah and Dorothea, died young.

In order to clarify the beginnings of the four Platt founders, here is a short chart using the information and numbering system in Charles Platt, Jr.'s *PLATT GENEALOGY* (1963). His first ancestor is Richard, who emigrated from England in 1638 or 1639, and settled in Connecticut. He was the progenitor of the Platt family in America as described in Charles Platt's genealogy.

*THE PLATTSBURGH PLATTS* is organized with the same sort of numbering system, beginning with: Zephaniah, Nathaniel, Charles and Daniel (Numbers 1, 2, 3 & 4). It attempts to follow their descendants — including their daughters' families, which Charles Platt does not do — up to the present time. To the left, in the chart below, are the Charles Platt numbers. To the right are my numbers for *THE PLATTSBURGH PLATTS*:

There is a need for a numbering system inasmuch as the four Platt settlers produced 35 first cousins in the next generation — many sharing the same names. Without individual numbers we are lost in a forest of Nathaniels (for instance), because numbers 2, 19, 28, and 38 were all living at once.

Names in braces in the same chart are surnames of husbands the Platt daughters married. Families which have ten or more children are numbered similarly except that from 10 onwards the double digits are underlined, smaller, closely-paired numbers; e.g. 1102 would read "the second of the tenth of #1."

12 means the 2<sup>nd</sup> child of #1 (Zephaniah) — Hannah {Comstock}  
 110 means the 10<sup>th</sup> child of #1 (Zephaniah) — Robert Platt  
 44 means the 4<sup>th</sup> child of #4 (Daniel) — Charlotte {Cliff}

#### 6<sup>th</sup> Generation

247 162 (read backwards) means 2<sup>nd</sup> child of 6<sup>th</sup> child of 1<sup>st</sup> child of 7<sup>th</sup> child of 4<sup>th</sup> child of Nathaniel (#2). Numbers are separated in groups of three to simplify reading them.

An Index of some ten generations of family groups is included at the end of this story; it supplies all the names, *other than Platt*, which appear in the book. In the book's Index, the page(s) where those names appear, are given.

It would have been interesting to trace the origins of the husbands and wives of the founder's children—*e.g.* Treadwell (Treadwell),

Halsey, Mooers, Bailey, Brinkerhoff, Smith, Miller, etc. It is not surprising that their names crop up repeatedly, since the small settlement left few choices of marriage partners in the beginning. Now we find streets (Brinkerhoff), villages (Mooers), and other landmarks (Treadwell's Bay, Halsey's Corners) named for them. □

## References

Information for the genealogy of the offspring of the four original Platts (Zephaniah, Nathaniel, Charles, and Daniel), who founded Plattsburgh with their friends and relations, comes from the following sources: a large Platt fan/tree genealogy made about 1900, now in the Plattsburgh Public Library; from *THE PLATT GENEALOGY 1638-1962* by Charles Platt; from G. Lewis Platt's *THE PLATT LINEAGE* (1891); from repeated personal research in Riverside Cemetery, Plattsburgh, where many of the first two generations on this chart are buried; and from letters and information from Platt correspondents over many years.

# Growing Up in Northern New York

by Alden Paukett

[Editor's Note: This journal was written by Alden Paukett in December, 1972. Mr Paukett is since deceased. The journal was given to a member of our Society, Susan Pombrio, a relative, several years ago by Joseph Paukett #30, a nephew of Alden Paukett. Melve, the daughter of Alden and Gladys, married Eddie Frederick.]

**I was born on a farm** in northern New York State, 22 April 1898, in a small town called Ellenburg Center. We lived about two miles from the village on what was called the North Road, about four miles from Canada.

The village had a saw and grist mill. They were both run by water power. There was a dam built across the Chazy River that held the water back. In the winter the farmers would bring their logs on sleighs and pile them near the mill pond. In the spring they would start sawing during high water.

The grist mill was in another building from the saw mill, but they both used the same water wheel for power. We would bring our grain there to be ground. There were also four blacksmith shops where we would bring our horses to be shod. They were kept busy year-round. Everyone had horses to do the farm work. That was before the days of the tractor and trucks. All of the farm work was done with horses.

There were also four general stores that sold about everything, a butter factory, a barber shop, and a post office, and a town hall, where they had motion pictures twice a week on Wednesday and Saturday nights.

The projector was one of the first to come out, and was cranked by hand. If the operator cranked slow it would show on the screen. Of course, they were silent pictures. I saw the first Charlie Chaplan pictures there. They were all one reelers. The operator would show a reel, (then we would wait while he changed the reel with a fresh one). They were crude, but we thought that they were great.



The nearest railroad station was about six miles away at Ellenburg Depot. It was called the Rutland Railroad. It was a one track road, and went from Rutland, VT to Ogdensburg, NY. All of the farm produce was shipped to Boston. If you wanted to travel you had to go by rail. There was no other means of transportation.

My father, Joseph Henry Paukett, and my mother, Minnie Armanda Dumont, were married in 1896 at St Edmond's at Ellenburg Corners, by Father Goulet. They moved into a log cabin where I was born. The farm belonged to my Grandmother Pauquette (Mary Rozella Jeanotte), and Dad rented from her until he bought her out some time later.

I will try and describe the cabin where I was born. The outside walls were solid logs about twelve inches in diameter and were notched at the corners. The logs were peeled and the joints were filled with cow dung, which when hardened became as hard as stone. It was then whitewashed with a mixture

of lime and water. We would whitewash it about every three years to preserve the wood. The inside the of the cabin was divided into three rooms. A large room in the back that was the kitchen. The front was divided into two rooms, one a bedroom and one that was used as a living room. There was a potbelly stove for heat. The kitchen was heated with a range. We had plenty of dry hard wood to burn, so that we managed to keep warm in the winter.

It is a cold country in the winter. I have seen it go down to 40 degrees below zero. Sometimes we would get a snow storm and the roads would be blocked for a week. During these storms we always had enough to eat. We did not have to go to stores everyday like we do in the city. We always had our own vegetables and one or two barrels of salt pork. We, also, had a lot of canned goods.

My mother was the only daughter of Augustus Dumont and Adalaide Carperter. Grandmother was born in Chateaugay, NY. Besides my mother there were four sons, Jack, George, Augustus, and Elmer. Uncle Jack married Anna LeClair, they had 14 children. Uncle George married Carrie Robare and they had 12 children. Augustus became a priest, and Elmer married Jennie Duval from Ellenburg Depot, they had four children.

I never knew my grandfather, Vincent Paukett. He was born in Coopersville, Clinton Co, New York in 1835. He died at Barre, Vermont in 1895, and is buried at St Edmond's at Ellenburg Corners. He enlisted as a private in COL 16th New York Cavalry on September 5, 1864 at Plattsburgh, New York. He was discharged June 12, 1865. He served less than one year in the Civil War. The war finished in 1865.

On my father's side there were eight children, but only three of them lived to grow up. Joseph, my father, lived on the home place, Aunt Eliza (Elizabeth May, born 12 January 1882, she died in the 1950s), and Aunt Julia (Julia Marian, born 8 March 1880 and died about 1952). Aunt Eliza married a man that came from Sciota, his name was

Napoleon Dragoon. They were married before I can remember (4 April 1902, Sciota, NY). They went west and settled in Portland, Oregon. They had three daughters, Evelyn, Helen, and Lucelle. Evelyn later married and moved to the Falls, Ore. Helen became a trained nurse, married and settled in San Francisco. I have never learned their married names. Lucelle died young.

I only saw my cousins once when they came out to visit Grandmoth. They were children and stayed all summer. Aunt Julia and Grandma went to visit Aunt Eliza and there Julia met her future husband. His name was Ralph. Ralph Celtz made the army a career and was in the Coast Artillery. When he retired he was stationed in Christobol, Panama. He retired at the beginning of World War I. They never had any children.

After Grandma died Aunt Julia moved to Ellenburg Corners. After living there a while she sold her home and moved to Norwich (Vermont?) in an Old Soldiers Home. She died there and is buried at St Edmond's at Ellenburg.

We did not have running water, we had to get the water from a pump outside. My mother had to do the washing in a wash tub and scrub the clothes on a scrub-board, then hang them on a clothesline to dry, bring them in and iron them. She, also, did all of the cooking on the range. It was hard to be a wife and mother, I don't know how they did it.

My mother gave birth to nine children. They were all born at home with the help of a midwife and Doctor (Carmilper?) of Ellenburg Center, who was our family doctor for years. It did not matter what the weather was, day or night, if he was called, he would come. Where we lived everyone had large families, so he was kept busy all of the time.

He also, pulled teeth. I remember the first tooth that I had pulled, he did it with no novocaine. He just reached in with his forceps and yanked it out. It hurt some, but not for long.

We had only two cash crops that paid us any money, and they were potatoes and milk. We would take our milk to Ellenburg Center where there was a butter factory. We would then bring back the skim milk and the butter milk.

We used this for feed for the pigs and calves. We would plan on having 12 or 16 pigs by the first of May. We would feed them the milk, you could fairly see them grow. When we butchered them in the fall they would dress 150 to 175 pounds. What wonderful pork they made.

We would also, have 8 or 10 calves that were ready for market. What we did not use ourselves we sold. We would have about 2 barrels of salt pork that would last us a year. We also, had a barrel of corn beef. We had no refrigeration in those days, the only way that we could keep meat was to salt it. Towards spring dad would take the hams and bacon and smoke them. That made pretty good eating. We also had our own chickens and eggs, and all of the good maple syrup that we wanted.

Potatoes were something else again, the soil and climate was adapted to grow potatoes. We would plant from 5 to 7 acres every year. It was hard work, from the time that we planted them until they were harvested in the fall. After the field was ready and we had marked the rows, we would drop them in the holes. We went over them again and drop fertilizer, one handful on each hill. We would cover them with a hiller using a team of horses. The last thing we had to do was roll the ground. As soon as they were out of the ground, we had to start to cultivate them to keep down the weeds. We would spend the summer in the potato fields. We had to spray them several times or the bugs would ruin the crop.

When they were ripe after the first frost, we would start digging them by hand. We then had to pick them in bushel baskets and haul them to the house and put them in the cellar. What we didn't use ourselves we hauled



to market. I could drive horses since I was a little boy. So my dad and the hired man would load on a wagon 60 bushels and I would start with my load in the morning, and drive to Churubusco to the railroad. There was a buyer there by the name of Mr Humphery, I knew him very well. When I got there I would drive on the scales and weigh my load, then drive to a box car where he had men to unload me, then back to the scales to weigh the empty wagon. It would be nearly noon, Mr Humphery, would call me in the store and ask me what I wanted for lunch. I would take a small box of crackers, a piece of cheese, and a can of sardines.

I would get back in my wagon and tie the lines around the dashboard and let the horses take me home. I would stand in the back of the wagon and eat my lunch. The horses knew their way home, I did not have to drive them, and I did not have to worry about cars, there weren't any. I would get home about supper time. It would take all day to haul a load to market. We would get about 25 cents a bushel.

During World War I we got \$1 a bushel, and we thought we were getting a lot of money. Well, we were getting more then we ever did before.

We had a lot of maple syrup and only got a \$1 a gallon for it. So, we had to work all the time to get a little money. I guess that was the reason that I left the farm and learned the carpenter trade. I found that the farmer was underpaid when everything would go good. But, some years there would be a crop failure through lack of rain or early frost. Then most of our crop was ruined. So, in those times we had to work for nothing. It was discouraging. We always managed to have enough to eat and never had to go hungry.

My Grandmother Paquett lived on the farm in another log cabin. She lived there alone and would have me go and stay with her nights, as she was afraid to stay alone. I wasn't much protection, as I was only a little boy, but I was the only grandchild, and I like to go.

Grandma's maiden name was Rossella Gennett, and she was born in Sciota, Clinton Co NY. When my grandfather, Vincent Faries Paukett, came back from the Civil War, they were married. At that time the state of Michigan was a wilderness, and to get people to settle the state the government offered any veteran of the Civil War 160 acres of land if they would settle there. Well, my grandfather took up a claim there and settled at Charolavi, Michigan. They built a log cabin on the shore of Lake Michigan. My father was born there and they lived there until he was nine years old. They then sold the farm and moved to Ellenburg. I don't know why, unless they got lonesome.

My grandfather was a stone mason by trade, he worked out for someone else. My grandmother and Dad ran the farm. Grandfather lived until he was 65 years old. He was working at Barre, Vermont, when he got pneumonia and died. The year was 1896. My

father brought the body to Ellenburg, and he is buried in St Edmond's Cemetery there. My grandmother lived until she was 96 years old, and is also, buried there in the old cemetery. Grandmother thought a lot of me, maybe it was because I was the first grandchild. Later she bought a little home in Ellenburg Center and lived there alone. After I got through the eighth grade I stayed with her and went to high school at Ellenburg Depot. That was in the old High School. I did not graduate, because I started to work. I left home when I was 17 years old and have been on my own ever since.

In 1909, the Tri-centeniel of the discovery of Lake Champlain, by Samuel de Champlain in 1909, was celebrated. Well, Grandma had a sister, my Aunt Anna (Angeline b 1851 m/1 George Rondo), that lived in Rouses Point and Grandma decided to go there on a visit. She brought me with her. That was quite a thrill for me. I had never ridden on the steam cars. I stayed overnight with her, and we walked to Ellenburg Depot. There we took the train for Rouses Point. Grandma told me to "schooses" down in my seat, so she would not have to pay full fair for me. That was what I did, and we got away with it.

We arrived at Aunt Anna's, and stayed there about three days on the lake. There were three barges anchored. In the evening they had fireworks, the first I had ever seen. That was something to see. Grandmother had a brother who lived in Coopersville, about four miles from Rouses Point. We walked there by following the railroad tracks.

Her brothers name was Florence Gennett (b 17 February 1858 m Maggie Tremblay), Uncle liked to hit it up. and about the second night that we stayed there he went out and got feeling good. He got home about midnight. Grandma and I were sleeping on the second floor. Uncle started to climb the stairs, got nearly to the top when he missed a step and fell all of the way down. Boy, what a racket he made. I was half scared to death, I did not

know what was happening. He did not hurt himself. The next day we went back to Rouses Point, and the following day we took the train home.

Grandma had never learned to read and write. She had to sign with a witness mark. She knew how to handle money and to make change. She received a veterans pension from the government for over fifty years, and saved most of it.

We raised our own barley and buckwheat. This we would take to the mill at Ellenburg Center to have it ground for pancake flour. As soon as it started to get cold in the fall Mother would have pancakes for breakfast. Pancakes with homemade salt pork and homemade maple syrup tasted good for breakfast. We, also, had our own hams and bacon in the winter time.

Another chore we had was making our own butter. We did not have a separator, but would keep the milk in shallow pans until the cream would rise to the top. Mother would skim off the cream, when she had enough she would let it sour, it was then ready to churn. That was my job, to churn the sour cream until it turned to butter. Mother would put coloring and salt into it and work it with a wooden paddle. Then she put it into small jars, covered it, and kept it in the cellar. It was cool there, and would keep all summer. The buttermilk was delicious. What we did not use for cooking, we drank.

There was one time of the year that we kids loved, and that was when we started to make maple sugar in the spring. We had about 1000 trees in our sugar orchard. We had modern equipment to do the work. Dad had built a sugar house near the woods. Inside we had a large evaporator and storage tanks. First we would tap the trees, then drive in a spout, then hang a bucket on the spout. We were then in business. The sap would fill the bucket. With a wood sled and a gathering tank we would bring the sap to the sugar house. We had a ramp near the front of the sugar house

with which we could dump the sap so that it would flow directly into the storage tanks.

The next operation was boiling the sap into syrup. It takes about 30 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup. When we had a big run we would have to operate night and day. The sap would run better when we had sunny days and frosty nights. We could hardly keep up, we had to boil it until it weighed 11 pounds to the gallon. We would put the syrup in gallon cans.

When we sold any we got one dollar plus ten cents for the can. There was not much profit in syrup, but we had all we could use at home. We would invite the neighbors to what we called a sugaring off party. Mother would take a gallon of syrup and boil it until it was waxy. Us kids would fill pans with clean snow, then she would drop the hot syrup on the snow and we would eat it with a fork. It was that good with sour pickles.

After we had eaten enough, we would square dance. I used to play the violin, and we had a piano. Everyone would dance and have a good time. We did not have a radio or TV, but we made our own good time. We didn't have a phonograph, that came later. The first one that I saw was made by Thomas Edison, and had cylinder records and a large horn. It was something to hear. My Uncle Jack (Jack Dumont), got one and we would go there and hear it play.

Perhaps the reader of this journal will think that I am a little off my beam, but when I was a child we made our own soap. I did not do it, but my grandmother did. In those days you had to be a jack of all trades. About everything that was used was made at home. Grandma made the soap with the fat that came from the (annual slaughter of the) pork and beef. The fat was tried out, that is, boiled on the stove until it was clear and stored away. We burned hard wood, the ashes were saved and put in a wooden barrel. The barrel was on a flat stone, it pitched to the front.

Grandma would pour water into the barrel. This formed a lye that ran into a cast iron kettle. The lye was very strong. If any got on your clothes, it would burn a hole in them. Grandmother would put the fat and lye in the kettle, build a fire, and keep this boiling until it was soft soap. She would make two barrels (at a time). It was then stored in the cellar. This would be enough for a year. It was the only soap that we had. It was strong, but it did the job.

When it was time to butcher hogs in the fall, we would heat the water in the kettle to scald the hogs, this made it easier to scrap the hair off the hogs. Then in the spring we would scrub the kettle and use it to boil maple sap to make maple syrup. All this meant a lot of hard work, but everyone did it.

We never made candles, because in my day we used kerosene for lighting. So, we were a little ahead of the generation before me. Grandma had candle molds and knew how to make candles, but I had never seen her make any.

She knew what every herb was good for when used as a medicine. In the summertime she would pick and save different things. If anyone got sick, she knew what to brew for a certain sickness. She was a very good doctor. A lot of the drugs that are used now are the same as (the ones) she used, but are refined.

We were only four miles from Canada. The first settlers in our area were French. Then in the 1850s a lot of Irish came to this Country. I think it was during the famine when they had a potato failure in Ireland, thousands of them migrated to the United States. Quite a few settled in northern New York State. I do not remember when that happened, but my Grandfather told me about what happened. These people did not speak French, and the French did not speak English, so they did not get along with one another. About the only thing we had in common was that we were all Roman Catholic.

At that time we had one priest. He lived in Churubusco. He had built the church there and St Edmond's Church at Ellenburg Corners. He used to say mass in both churches on Sunday. When the parishes became too large we got our own priest at Ellenburg Corners. His name was Father Goulet. He was born and educated in Montreal. He could barely speak English. On Sunday he would give a sermon in English and one in French. That was so that the Irish could understand, I guess.


In my Grandfather's day the French and Irish were not very friendly. By the time I was born, I was about the third generation of our family in the United States, and (it was with my generation that) the French and Irish started to intermarry. With that we all got along better with one another.

When I was small there were more French than English spoken. I used to speak good French when I was small. I have forgotten how to speak now, but I can understand when someone speaks the language. I guess it is something that one never forgets. My Grandmother always spoke to us kids in French. She did not like it if we answered in English. Of course, when I started going to school I learned to speak and write in English.

I started going to school when I was about 7 years old. It was a one room school. Next to it was a large woodshed. In the middle of the room was a huge boxstove. The first kid that got to school in the morning started the fire. In the winter we would set around the stove until the room got warm. There was only one teacher for about 40 kids aged seven to 18 years.

I don't know how one teacher could teach that many, but they were strict and did not spare the rod. If we did not mind and our parents heard about it we were punished when we got home. I was lucky, my mother taught school before she was married. She would help me with my school work. I would bring my school work home. After the chores were done, and we had had our supper, Mother

would have me get out my books and we would review the lessons. If there was something that I did not understand I would have to learn it before I went to bed.



We used to have spelling bees once a week. I could spell down everyone in the class because my mother insisted that I learn to spell. It was good training.

I almost forgot, away from the school was the back house. It was divided in the middle, one side for the boys, and one side for the girls. We used Sears Roebuck catalogs for toilet paper.

In the summer we played ball in the school yard. We would make our own ball, and had home made bats and gloves. We would catch the ball by hand and no one was on the bases. The game was to throw the ball at the man, if he was running between bases. If you hit him he was out. The first black eye I ever got I was running between bases and got hit in the eye. I had a beautiful shiner. That was the way we played the game. We made our own rules as we played.

Every home had large families. We all grew up together and got along with one another. As we grew older we would go to dances. I used to go out with Marie Dupree to

dances. We had an agreement between us, and it was that she would dance the first and last dance with me. If she got a chance to go home with someone else it was okay with me. I also, had the privilege to do the same. There were weekly dances held at Chateaugay and Churubusco. We would go in with a horse and buggy. Marie's brother, Tom and I used to go out a lot together.

I remember we went to our first circus together. It was Barnum and Bailey Circus and it was held at Malone. We drove a horse and buggy to Chateaugay, then left the horse in a livery stable and took the train to Malone. The circus was held at the Fair Grounds. We arrived when they were putting up the big tent. It was something to see. We went inside and saw the show. We left in time to catch our train for home. By the time we got home it was nearly midnight, but we had had a good time.

One of the big events we looked forward to was going to the Malone Fair. The whole family would go. We would have get up about 3 o'clock in the morning and do the chores before we left. Mother would make a box lunch, we would bring a jug of tea, and another of lemonade. We would hitch a team of horses on a surry and drive to Malone which was about 18 miles away.

When we arrived we would drive our team inside the race track and unhitch them and tie them up. We were then ready to see what there was to see on the fairgrounds. The first time that I ever saw a gasoline engine was there. They had all models on demonstration, from two horse power to 20 horse power. They had them all running at the same time. Before the gasoline engine the only power that we had to thrash and fill silos with was a tread mill which was powered by a team of horses. We would leave for home about 5 o'clock. On the drive home us kids would go to sleep, the horses would take us home.

When we did the haying we were in for a lot of hard work. First we had to mow the hay with a mowing machine. After it dried out we had to rake it with a horse rake, then bunch it,

load it on a hay wagon, and then haul it to the barn. In the middle of the summer it would get awfully hot. We had to have a lot of hay to feed 35 or 40 head of cattle all winter. Now farmers have tractors and bale the hay in the fields. When they get it to the barns they have a conveyor that haul it in the barn.

We used to make a drink that we brought to the fields in haying time. We would take a two gallon stone jug and fill it with cold water, put in sugar, ginger, and vinegar. We would keep the jug in the shade, it tasted good in hot weather.


In the year 1910 we had the greatest drought that happened within the memory of anyone living. For three months there was no rain. The wells all dried up. The crops burned in the fields. I spent the summer drawing water from my grandfather's spring. Forty head of cattle will drink a lot of water. I would make about three trips a day.

To make matters worse forest fires started in the Adirondack Mountains and burned millions of acres of valuable timber lands. There was so much smoke that the sun was clouded over.

The winter before, my Dad had spent the winter cutting logs for a new house that he intended to build. Those logs were piled in skidways in the woods so they could dry out for a year. Well, fire started in our pasture and wood lot. To save the logs we made a bee, and with the help of our neighbors we brought them in the middle of the meadow to save them. During the winter of 1910, as soon as there was snow we loaded the logs on sleighs and brought them to the mill in Ellenburg Center.

In the spring when the waters were high they started sawing the logs. We had enough lumber to build the house. We then had to haul the lumber back home. In the spring Dad hired a master carpenter from Brainardsville. He had charge of the building. We build the new house where the log cabin stood, so we had to tear down the cabin. We moved in the

cabin where Grandmother had lived for the summer. This was the summer of 1911 that we built the new home.



We moved in September. It had more room. We had out-grown the cabin. The new house had five bedrooms, a parlor, a large living room, a dining room, and a large kitchen. There was also a large woodshed where we could store a years supply of wood. There was a back house where we could go and not have to go outside, but we still used Sears Roebuck catalogs for toilet paper.

We did not have running water yet. What we had was a system with a black sink and a pitcher pump. We used the water to wash dishes. It wasn't fit to drink. We did not get electric lights until years afterward.

In later years we got a telephone. They were called party lines. They had a crank and when you wanted to get your party you had to crank the correct number. For example you would crank two longs and one short to get a number. When you cranked all the people on the line heard you, anyone could listen, and did. Our phone was no place to keep a secret, the neighbors knew what you were talking about.

When I was about 12 years old I wanted to get a bicycle. The other kids had bikes. I knew that I could not get any money out of my Dad, so I started to work on my Mother. I coaxed her into letting me get one. We took a horse and buggy and drove to Ellenburg Depot, where there was a hardware store run by Chessman and Munsil. They had a beautiful bike there. It was painted fireman red. It cost

\$30. That was a lot of money. I had saved up \$5. I paid that down as a down payment, and gave my note for the balance of \$5 a month (until it was paid). My mother co-signed the note. I paid for it myself.

At Ellenburg Center, one of the general stores, Gordon and Gilbert, had a Victor machine with over 100 records. On summer evenings they would open the window and play their records. It was something new, something we had never seen. It was like going to a concert in the city. We country people enjoyed it because it was something new.

I remember the first car I ever saw. It came by our house and got stuck in a mud hole. There was a man and a woman in it. It was built like a buggy, it had wooden wheels, a dashboard like a buggy, no windshield, and it ran on a two cylinder motor that was under the seat. To start it you had to turn a crank. We hitched a horse and pulled them out of the mud, then the driver cranked up and went on.

The first car I ever rode in was a Model T Ford. My great-uncle Robert Dumont bought it. He gave all of his neighbors a ride. After that, cars became more common. It took the horses a while to get used to them. They were scared when they met one. I guess they thought the devil was coming after them. Later on they did not pay any attention to the cars.

We were brought up as strict Roman Catholics. One of the rules that we went by was not to eat meat on Friday. If we did we thought we would go to hell for sure. But, we did not mind Friday, as Mother would cook a dish that she called potato pie. We all loved it. She would make a dough like for a pie, put one half in a deep dish, then take cooked potatoes, mash them, add a small chopped onion, and summer savory, then put on the top crust, and bake it in the oven. Boy, was that good. So, Friday was not a penance after all.

I remember one winter when I was still at home, I got a job harvesting ice on Lake Champlain, on the Vermont side, at Alburg.

The Rutland Railroad had ice houses at every one of its stations along its line. They would get the ice from the lake. It was a big operation. They had the men and the machinery so that they could load 600 box cars a day. When we ran out of cars, they had a huge ice house where they stored the ice. From the time that the ice left the lake it did not stop until it got to the box car or the ice house.

When we started cutting ice, the ice was about 45 inches thick, when we finished it was 12 inches thick. They had a machine that would plane it down to the right thickness. In those days there was no automatic refrigeration. The railroads used ice to cool refrigerator cars when they shipped butter milk and cheese to market. This produce went mostly to Boston.

Plattsburgh is the county seat of Clinton County. It is an old town, the settlement goes back to the Revolution. Since its founding there have been soldiers stationed there. During World War I a lot of our G.I.s were trained there. At the present time the United States Air Force has a training base there for big bombers (presently their mission is refueling, no bombers).

I wonder if anyone remembers a marching song that the G.I.s sang when they were training there in World War I. It went something like this:

**"It is not the pack  
that you carry on your back  
or the musket on your shoulder;  
Or the half inch crust  
of Clinton County dust  
That makes you think  
that you are growing older;  
and its not the hike oe'r  
the hard turnpike  
that takes away your smile  
Or the sox (by) sisters  
that make such blooming blisters,  
It's the last long mile."**

*author unknown, 1917*

I got a job with Oliver and Spellman. They were road building contractors from Chateaugay. They sent me and three other young fellows over near Watertown to build a state road. When we finished there, they sent us to Ausable Forks on another job building a state road going to Plattsburgh. I boarded and roomed in Ausable Forks.

This was in 1917. The pay was 25¢ an hour, 10 hours a day. I had never earned such big wages, \$2.50 a day. I worked there until the job finished, then got a job in a paper mill. I worked there all winter at \$10.50 per week. I quit in the spring and got a job at Lyon Mountain and started to learn the carpenter's trade. I worked there for nearly a year, then went to Massena on a housing job. That was during World War I.

My uncle, Augustus Dumont, decided to become a priest. After graduating from the Chateaugay Free Academy he taught school for a year, then he went to St Viatoes College in Kankeo, Ill. He was gone for eight years because he earned his way. He would study a year, then teach a year. He worked hard to get his education. When he finished college he came home and stayed all summer. He had planned to stay in Chicago, but the Bishop of Ogdensburg offered to pay for his studies in the seminary if he would stay in the diocese.

He decided to take the bishop's offer and went to the grand seminary in Montreal. Three years later he graduated. He was ordained at St Edmond's in Ellenburg Corners in 1915. I attended his ordination. He was the only native of that parish to become a priest. His first assignment was at Clayton, New York. Then he went to Alexandra Bay. Later he went to Gabriels and Bloomingdale, New York. That is near Saranac Lake. He built a new church in each parish.

I helped to build the church in Bloomingdale. I had charge of it. Gladys, my wife, Melva, my daughter, and I left Johnson City after Easter. I had a 1927 Cheverolet four cylinder Coupe. We loaded the car with my

tools, our clothing, and the baby's bed. We had just enough room to get ourselves in the car. We made it okay. When we got there we spent a week visiting Mr and Mrs Labarge (Gladys' parents). They lived on a farm in Forest NY.

The following week we went to Bloomingdale. We rented a furnished cabin. It was 12 foot square and had electric lights. We had to heat and cook with kerosene. By the time we got our clothing in we did not have much room, but we didn't mind, we were both young and healthy. I worked there until late fall when the job was finished. Father Dumont was a swell guy to work for, and I enjoyed working for him. Our daughter Melva was two years old at the time. The year was 1930.

I think that I missed my calling when I became a carpenter, I should have been a musician. I had the gift for music. When I was a little boy, my mother had an organ. It was a gift from her father. She could play the organ. When I was too small to reach the pedals my mother would hold me on her lap and I would play tunes.

I have always loved music. When I got a little older, I had the chance to take lessons on the piano. There was a lady by the name of Mrs. Kate Honsinger who taught music. She charged 25¢ a lesson. I took three or four lessons, then I had to stop as my Dad would not give me the money for the lessons any more. Well, I learned to play by ear.

My cousin Rolla Dumont had a violin, but could never learn to play, so I bought it from him for 75¢. I took it home and before long I was playing square dances. Then I got a guitar, a mandolin, a banjo, and taught myself to play on all of them.

When I went to Lyon Mountain to work I joined a band and played an upright tenor. When I was working in Massena I played in the A.L.C.A. band, but changed to slide trombone. The Aluminum C. furnished our uniforms and paid for our director. We received \$2 for rehearsals and \$4 for a concert. In the summer we would have a concert every week

on the village square. There were several bands there at the time. When I moved to Johnson City I played in the Moose band. We had a nice band of about 37 members. I got a lot of enjoyment from playing. I had more fun going to rehearsals, all the members were nice guys. We also, played in parades. When you are young you enjoy these things.

I was married to Gladys Labarge 29 June 1926. I had been living at home with my father and mother until we got married. I had never met Gladys until she came to Johnson City. We were both born in the same town, and went to same church. Our fathers grew up together. They were both farmers. Gladys came to Johnson City with her sister and brother-in-law, Eddie Rollo. Eddie and Gladys both got jobs at E.J.s. The first time that I met Gladys was when she came to my home with my sister Adalaid.

When we met that was it, of all the girls that I had gone out with she was the one for me. We started going together from then on. This was in 1925. We became engaged and were married the following June. I had bought a new Model T Ford Coupe. It was the first car that I had ever owned. The week before we got married Gladys went home. The next week I

went out with my sister Anna, who was a bridesmaid. Edmond Laclair came out with his own car with my other sister, Adalaid. I had not had my car long and was not familiar with it. To make matters worse New York State was just starting to build state roads, and on Route 11 there was detour after detour. Some places we had to go through farmers fields. We left Johnson City about 5 o'clock in the morning and did not get to Ellenburg Corners until about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. I was exhausted when we got to my grandmothers.

I cleaned up and had a bite to eat, then started out to meet Gladys' people. I had never met any of them, they were all strangers to me. After driving about five miles on what they called the Old Turnpike Road, I finally got there and met all of her family. The next day Gladys and I went to Plattsburgh to get the flowers and her wedding gown. The day after that we were married at St Edmond's Church by Father Boyea. That evening there was an old fashioned wedding reception at Mr. and Mrs. Labarge's. All the neighbors and friends came. They fed everyone and then there was a five piece orchestra that played until 5 o'clock next morning. □



## The Return of The Cribs...

**Twice in the history of Canada** incentives and bonuses were offered and used as encouragements and rewards to produce large families.

The first time was in 1670, when on the 1st of April of that year, the Conseil de L'Etay of the King of France, handed down a decision that was clear-cut, far-reaching, and seriously intended to accelerate and increase the population of the emerging colony of France on the North American continent. The French called their land in North America New France, and at the same time facetiously nick named it Kanata/Canada.

This new law specified that...

**"any household in New France who had 10 living children born of a legitimate marriage and residing all under one roof shall be entitled to receive a yearly pension of 300 livres/pounds from the government."**

An amendment to this law dictated the following: "that 400 livres/pounds shall be allotted as a yearly pension, to families that have 12 or more living children who meet the requirements previously described above." Furthermore "for families with 12 or more living children under one roof a one-time bonus of a 100 acres land grant of farm land" was also available.

With the passing of time and because of the many historical changes that took place in Canada, particularly due to the British conquest and the establishment of English Rule in 1760, many of the French laws and

customs were discontinued and/or disappeared.

The second time of record that qualifying large families were rewarded happened in the Province of Québec in 1890. A Provincial law was passed and titled, "La Loi Des 12 Enfants"/ "The Law of The 12 Children," which accorded "A 100 acres land-grant of farmland to all families with 12 or more living children residing under one roof, and born of a legitimate marriage."

In the 16 years that followed a survey conducted in 1906 revealed that 5,143 families had claimed and received the deeds to such land-grants.

In 1944 the Canadian Federal Government passed a new all-encompassing law that allocated monetary allowances for all children in Canada under the age of 16.

This law commonly called "La Revanche Des Berceaux"/"The Return of the Cribs."



One name particularly stands out, that is the name of Joseph-Jean-Baptist-Pierre LePage. In November 1940 two newspapers in Montreal, *La Presse* and *Le Devoir* reported that the 41st child had been born to Pierre LePage. Here listed are a few details concerning Pierre LePage, his three wives and his children:

Joseph-Jean-Baptiste-Pierre LePage was born 29 June 1872 and was baptized at Notre Dame de Montreal. He was the son of Ovila Lepage and Josephine Cusson of Montreal. **Pierre LePage was first married** 23 November 1891 at Saint-Enfant Jesus Church in Montreal to Rose Delima Campeau, the daughter of Jean-Baptiste Campeau and Emma Sigovin. They had 6 children. Rose Delima died 27 April 1903 at 28 years of age.

**Pierre LePage married a third time** 10 November 1919 at St Colomban Church to Rose Delima Francoeur, daughter of Raphael and Aenoulm LaFlamme of Cap Des Rosiers, Gaspé Peninsular. They had 21 children. This makes Pierre the parent of a total of 41 children. The civil and church records can account for 38 births, and, as there were three premature births, we then have the total of 41 births.



**Pierre LePage married a second time** on 2 May 1905 at Saint Enfant Jesus du Mile End of Montreal, to Parmelia Briere, daughter of Guillaume and Salome Desjardins. They had 14 children. Parmelia Briere LePage died 18 October 1918 at 32 years of age.


In the Fall of 1940 residing on the LePage farm were 25 of the children of Pierre LePage.

Pierre Lepage died 19 September 1948 at the age of 76. Rose Delima Francoeur LePage, his widow, died in Montreal 24 March 1949, at the age of 50 years, 9 months and 25 days. If the exploits of Mr Pierre LePage are not a record of family size in North America, I surely would like to hear from the challenger. □



## Daughters of the King

**In the first century of New France** (Canada) there was a shortage of marriageable ladies. Several attempts were made to recruit women to migrate, but as it was very expensive to cross to the new world, and the voyage

took three to five months, few women responded.

In order to encourage women to settle in the new land, the King of France offered a fifty *livre* dowry, plus transportation, to any women willing to brave the hardships of this unknown wilderness.

---

### **Eight hundred women came to find husbands in New France**

---

About 800 women accepted the King's offer and most found husbands to help settle the new land. Very few returned to France.

Of the following ladies, it would be interesting to know what kinship they had to Jacques Bourgeois of Acadia, my ancestor, and other Bourgeois who helped settle Montreal. Were any of them related to her Holiness, St. Marguerite Bourgeois?

#### **Marguerite Le Previer**

Marguerite Le Previer of St Severin, Paris, daughter of Nicholas, an attorney at the Parliament in Paris, and Marguerite Bourgeois, married the surgeon Jacques Meneux dit Chateaufneuf, 23 October 1663, at Chateau-Richer. She had a dowry of 300 *livre*. Her second marriage was to Guillaume Lizot, 9 October 1696, at Quebec. She died at Quebec 11 January 1709, at the age of 66.

#### **Marie Attenville**

Marie was the daughter of Vincent and Marguerite Duval of St Eustache, Paris. She married Robert Senat, 15 October 1669 at Quebec. She married second Jean Fauconnet dit LaFeur, 20 January 1671, at Quebec. A third marriage united her to Charles Martin, 6 October 1683, at Boucherville. Widowed again, she made and annulled a marriage contract before the Notary Moreau, 13 February 1686, with Claude Bourgeois. She then married a fourth time to Francois Cesar dit De La Gardelette, 25 February 1686, at Boucherville. She died there 28 April 1723 at the age of 80.

**Francoise Bourgeois**

Francoise was the daughter of the deceased Antoine and Marie Piedmont of St Paul, Paris. She married a member of the Carignan Regiment, Paul Vigneau dit Laverdure, 3 November 1669, at St Famille. Her dowry of 150 *livre* included 50 from the King. She died sometime after 21 July 1704 at Laurent, Ile de Orleans.

**Jeanne Bourgeois**

Jeanne was the daughter of Pierre and Pauline Leclerc from St Medard, Paris. She married Andre Coudret 25 October 1665 at Quebec. She was married next to Pierre Glaumont, 11 June 1708 at Quebec. She died 16 January 1730 at Beauport at the age of 90.

**Charlotte De La Marche**

This King's Daughter was the daughter of Francois and Suzanne Bourgeois of St Jacques du Hautpas, Paris. She married Jacques Lussier/Lussye, 30 December 1669 at Quebec. Her dowry of 350 *livre* included 50 from the king. She died in 1671 at Boucherville.

**Catherine Bourgeois**

This ancestor was the daughter of the deceased Thomas and Marie Petit of St Gervais, Rouen, Normandy. She was baptized 17 February 1633. She was married to Rene Binet 19 October 1667 at Quebec. Her dowry was 300 *livre*. She died 28 September 1702 at Beauport. Her father was a lawyer in the Parliament of Rouen.

**Marie Bourgeois**

Marie was the daughter of Antoine and Marie Bloquet of St Remi, Dieppe, Normandy. She married Jacques Anet/Anest 10 June 1668 at Quebec or Chateau-Richer. She had a dowry of 300 *livre*. Mlle. Bourgeois and Anet had originally agreed to marry in 1667, but she had to sue him twice before the wedding actually took place. A son was born in 1669. In 1671 she sued for separate maintenance. Marie died 2 October 1700 at the Hotel Dieu Quebec. Anet married again sometime between 8 August 1687 and 1 April 1692 at La Durantaye, although his wife was still alive. □





## **The Monty Family North American Reunion**

Fort Chambly, Province of Quebec, approximately 12 miles southeast of Montreal, will soon be the gathering place of many of the descendants of Jean Monty, who arrived in New France in 1725.

It is of added interest that his wife's family had an earlier in-law relationship with the Sieur de Chambly, for whom the Fort was named.

On September 5, 1993, their descendants will see a reconstructed fort which is now a Canadian National Historical Park. For nine generations members of the Monty family have lived on the American continent, helped build it, fought in its wars, and have raised children who have done, and are doing the same.

Jean Monty and his wife Marie-Marthe Poyer produced 14 children. There are Montys throughout Canada and the United States, all of whom can claim these ancestors as their own.

Our American readers may note that one son, Joseph Antoine, is recognized as the second settler of Chazy, New York, where he arrived in 1774. The American Revolution began and General Burgoyne's soldiers burned Joseph's house to the ground as the British army swept south.

Francois Monty, Joseph's older brother, became a Lieutenant in the American Army, receiving the Order of Cincinnati from the King of France the same time as George Washington received this honor. Francois had served as an officer. He had trained French Canadian and French volunteers under the command of the Marquis de LaFayette.


Monty's Bay, described by Benidict Arnold as the best protected bay in the beautiful Lake Champlain, is named for Francois. He was in the group which surveyed Point au Roche and the land which is now Beekmantown in Clinton County, New York in 1783. Members of the Monty family have been in the Chazy/Plattsburgh area ever since.

Monty Street in Plattsburgh bears the family name, as does, Monty Street Element-

ary School, which was built on former Monty land. A Monty Road on the shores of Lake Champlain and a Monty Road on the town line between Mooers and Altona are other reminders of the family of Monty.

Following the September 5th reunion at Fort Chambly, an article will be written for *Lifelines*, which will detail the living, human reminders of generations of men and women — there may well be some surprises! □





## Historical Notes ... The Carignan Regiment (in which many of our ancestors served)

This regiment was raised in 1644 by Thomas Francois de Savoie, Prince of Carignan. It consisted of ten companies of 100 men each. They were all said to be men of exceptional physique and boldness of spirit. They were a picked lot. They marched under the flag of Savoie when the regiment was offered to the French King - really the Queen Regent and Cardinal Richelieu.

This was at the time Civil wars known as the Fronde were dividing France. The Carignan Regiment was important to the Cardinal. The Regiment marched under Turenne to Etampes and took part in fighting there, they then fought in the suburb of St Antoine where, it is said, to have covered itself in glory. It created for itself a legend of invincibility. To belong to the outfit was deemed an honor.


After the Thirty Years War, the Savoie family could not afford to support the Regiment, and so, gave it to Louis XIV. Savoie always took a proprietary interest in it, even after the regiment returned from Canada to France.

In 1657, the regiment was combined with one organized by a soldier of fortune, named Balthazar, who had joined the French army from Transylvania. The Carignan remained under the command of their own officers, but the regiment became known as the Carignan-Balthazar.

Following the Turkish campaign the troops were back in France and Louis decided to send the outfit, splendidly trained and a financial drain if allowed to rust in garrison, to Canada under Henri de Chapelas, Sieur de Salieres. Veterans were given the opportunity of dropping out or re-enlisting under the Salieres command. Salieres had been first captain under Balthazar, he was now made a colonel. The name of the regiment changed to honor him.

Most of the soldiers remained in service, the ten companies were up to full strength when they were sent to Canada. □

**Civil Marriage Record of the marriage of...**  
**Mary Monty and Joseph Boileau**  
**translated from the French record in the Judicial Archives in Montreal**

(This document was received by the Monty family from John A. Bilow of Plattsburgh, NY)

[Editor's note: If you've read about the civil marriage records of our French-Canadian ancestors, and weren't quite sure what they were talking about, this record should be of interest to you. This marriage record is typical of the document that was drawn up at this time in history.]

---

*Before the royal notary of the royal jurisdiction  
of Montreal, residing at Chambly, undersigned,  
and witnesses named at the conclusion, there were present*

*Joseph Boileau,  
son of Renee Boileau and Marianne Robert, his father and mother, of this parish,  
contracting (stipulating) for him and in his name, party of the first part,  
and*

*Marie Monty,  
daughter of Jean Monty and Marthe Poyer, her father and mother, also of this parish,  
contracting (stipulating) for her and in her name, party of the second part;*

*who, in the presence and with the advice and consent of their said relatives and friends,  
to wit,*

*on the part of the said future husband,  
Renee Boileau, his father, Amable and Pierre Bioleau, his brothers,  
Therese Bioleau his sister, Madeleine Boileau his aunt, Pierre Boileau his uncle;  
on the side of the future bride,  
Amable, Claude, Gaspard, Clement Monty her brothers;  
Louis Courtin, Clement Racine, her brothers-in-law,  
Gilbert Menient (Meunier) her step-father, Marguerite Monty, her sister*

---

*have together made the matrimonial agreement, clauses and covenants which follow,  
to wit, that the said*

*Joseph Boileau and the said Marie Monty*

*— have promised and do promise reciprocally to take each other  
as husband and wife,  
in laws and name of marriage,  
to do, celebrate and solemnize said marriage in the presence of  
our mother, holy, catholic & apostolic and Roman church,  
as soon as can be accomplished,  
and according as it will be discussed and deliberated between them  
and their said relatives and friends,  
if God and our Mother Holy Church consent and accede to it;  
the said future spouses will be as one, and hold in common,  
all property, belongings and acquisitions, real estate,  
according to and following the common law of Paris,  
in conformity with which their said co-ownership will be governed,  
even though the said future spouses  
would have their dwelling in distant countries (regions) or  
would make acquisitions there even should there be regulations there to the contrary;  
the said future spouses have expressly derogated and renounced.*

*They will not be held liable for the debts of each other, incurred and created before the said future marriage;  
if there are any such, they will be paid for and acquired by whomever will have created them, from his (or  
her) property, without the other party, nor his (her) property being encumbered.*

*The said future spouses take each other with the property and rights belonging to them, now and in future.  
The said future husband has endowed, and does endow, the said future wife with the customary jointure,  
or the sum of three hundred livres, as pre-set jointure at her choice and option; if the said future wife chooses  
the pre-set (prefixed), it will be her own, irrevocably, once paid, so that the said jointure can be had and  
taken, as chosen by the said future wife, as soon as it will take place, on all the property, present and future,  
of the said future husband, who as of now, has encumbered, appropriated and obligated, also mortgaged  
it, to guarantee, furnish and substantiate any jointure which the said future wife will enjoy and be entitled  
to, according to the said common law, without her being obligated to legally sue for it.*

*The survivor of the said future spouses will have and will take by preferred portion, and before partition is made of the one hundred fifty livres ...*

---

*which will be taken in furnishings, linen, belongings or other furniture according to the evaluation of the inventory which will be made, and without accrual; - or the said sum in cash, at his (her) choice and option — and the linen, belongings for their own use, and if it is the future wife who will survive, she will keep her rings and jewels and her bed and bedding, in the condition it will be in at that time, and if it will be the future husband, then he will keep his arms.*

*In the event of the dissolution of the said co- ownership, it will be permissible for the said future wife, and the children who may be born of the said future marriage, to surrender claim to the said ownership, and in doing so, to take back whatever she might have contributed to the said marriage, with whatever might have devolved on her said marriage, either by inheritance, donation, legacy or otherwise, even, in the case of the said future wife, if she survives, her jointure and preferred portion, as above. All of which to be free and clear of all debt and mortgage on the said co-ownership, even though she might have discussed it as being in question or was sentenced, in which case she and the said children will be acquitted and indemnified by the heirs and the properties of the said future husband, on which, and for said reason and all the clauses and conditions of the present contract, there will be a mortgage as of today; and for the good friendship and affection which the said future spouses bear to each other, they have made to each other, by these presents, a mutual and equal life donation, reciprocally, to the survivor of the marriage, this being accepted by the said survivor, involving each and every item of goods, furnishings, real properties, acquests and acquisitions and real estate which will belong to the first decedent, on the day of his (her) decease, amounting to whatever sum may be involved, or amounting to whatever value, or whatever may be the place where located, without anything being retained, excepted or reserved by the said decedent, in order for the survivor to enjoy the said property during his (her) life, with life-interest only; under juratory pledge to keep up the houses and inheritances in good repair for life, and pledging that they will be yielded up in good condition, when the life-interest set up by the said donation will end, provided that, and under the condition that there is no child, born or to be born, of the said future marriage, in which case of issue, the said present donation will be nil, without need of sanction; and if there may be children, and should they die before becoming of age, or provided for by marriage, the said future spouses desire and intend that the said present donation resume its force and efficacy.*

*And to have the present contract recorded in the registry  
of the royal jurisdiction of Montreal,  
and wherever it may be necessary elsewhere,  
the said parties have named and constituted their attorney  
the bearer of these presents,  
to whom they give the faculty of making, and applying for, act thereof.  
For it has thus been promised & obligated & renounced & done and transacted at said  
Chambly, in the office, (study) of the said notary,  
in the year seven hundred sixty-three, the fourteenth of February,  
at seven o'clock in the morning, in the presence of  
Sieurs Renaudet and Joseph Menard,  
witnesses living at said Chambly, who signed with  
Sieurs Boileau, Amable Monty, Menient, Villefranche, Claude Monty  
and notary, who signed,  
and the said future spouses and others above-mentioned  
and the said Joseph Menard all stated they could not sign,  
having been queried on this matter; duly read.*









Note that A John Adams Shaver, Husbandman and Vinedresser, age 35, sons 8-5, daughter 2 - Reformed (re: religion) appear on the first list of Palatines noted in England 6 May 1709. Thousands of these Germans from around Heidelberg fled the repeated warfare in the Rhineland, much of it done at the hand of Catholic Louis XIV of France in an effort to punish the German

Protestants who had harbored the French Huguenots (Protestants) who had fled France when Louis wanted everybody to be Catholic.

The Palatines became homeless, penniless refugees on the streets of London until most of them were given passage to New York in 1710. They settled along the Hudson River, many on a plantation on the east side of the river known at the time as Livingston Manor (not to be confused with the present Catskill town of Livingston Manor farther west). There they were required to try making turpentine and pitch from the pine trees (for the British ships) to help pay for their passage. Finally, around 1725 they were allowed to leave because this grand plan of pitch-making had fizzled. The Palatines moved in three directions: Pennsylvania, the Schoharie Valley, and the Mohawk Valley (St Johnsville, Fonda, Stone Arabia, Canajoharie, Herkimer), often intermarrying with the Dutch. For a more complete account of the Palatines, see *The Story of the Palatines: An Episode in Colonial History* by Sanford H Cobb, G. P. Putnam's Sons, 1897.

The area that is now Montgomery County was once part of the enormous Tryon County, and during the American Revolution (c 1780) four major militias were raised from this area.

The Second Tryon County Militia under Col. Jacob Klock included men from what is now Montgomery County. Two privates, Bartholomew Shaver and Henry Shaver, are listed in this unit and served in the revolution. See *New York in the Revolution*, from which *The Book of Names* extracted this information. There are also several men with the name Nelles in this unit, and many of them fought at Oriskany. Thus, it may be useful to consult DAR genealogies for further help in placing your Nathan Shaver. As an added note, a Nicholas Shaver appears on the list of Tyron County Rangers and Exempts, too old for active duty but called out in emergencies.

And finally, note that there are two men named Jacob F Shaver listed as members of Committees of Correspondence (remember that term from American history in high school?), one in Albany County and the other at "Manor of Livingston," which would probably have been some miles down river, on the east side.

Your note that Nathan Shaver may have come from Canada could have referred to the early trade (furs, guns, and firewater) that was common up and down the Hudson River Valley, much of it illegal

**A-577** smuggling involving the French from Canada and the Indians who traveled the rivers.  
**Shaver** My bet is that your Shaver relatives originated among the Palatines, and I am  
**Nellis** wondering if the name Schaeffer, a common Palatine name, could be an alternate

I have had very good luck with the Montgomery County Department of History and Archives, Old Court House, Fonda, NY 12068, telephone 853- 3431. Their archives include the old church records of the area, and they will research genealogical questions for an hourly fee, plus cost of any photocopies they send you. You can limit their time to two hours, three hours, whatever your budget dictates. They are happy to accept any information you have and wish to share.

My own family history (Van Etten, Sever, Frœlich, etc) parallels yours (Van Etta, v. Ette, Van Etter, Vanetta, Van Atta, Van Natter, Van Netter, Etc), so it has been fun to share this little bit. If you want a little color for your research and like Henry Fonda, try renting the movie, *Drums Along the Mohawk* to see how Hollywood has treated the tribulations of our ancestors. □

Since we are using both an IBM and a Macintosh computer to format our Journal, all articles must be keyed — if you use a computer but do not send us a disc, we must re-key the entire article. **Sending a disc with your hard-copy saves us much valuable time.** Also, efforts to format articles using the spacebar rather than setting tabs can result in additional work; learn to format using your software's built-in features, *i.e.* tabs.

Additionally, the Journal now makes use of a scanner to enter photographs, line drawings, sketches, and other graphics such as cemetery maps. Black or red ink on white paper is preferred for scanning; blue ink is diaster! Size of graphic materials should be less than 8 inches wide and less than 10 inches high.


