
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
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


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
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


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PRESIDENT'S LETTER



NOBILITY OF SOME FRENCH-CANADIAN FAMILIES

Nobility began in France about 975 AD with the knights/chevalier and squires/ecuyer. The *Ecuyer* was a shield bearer with a coat of arms. This nobility came from God, not from the king. Nobles could be either land owners or warriors. In order to be a knight, one had to be from the nobility. The title was passed from father to son. The titles of nobility were retained even by impoverished nobles.

Nobility of the king began later—about 1270—with Philip III, known as "the Bold." He was a son of St. Louis IX.

Types of Nobility

There were four types of nobility: 1 of the Race, the oldest, it was acquired in ancient times and it was the most respected because it this type was a free grant from the King for serving in the military during times of war: 3 Purchased, this type was purchased from the King by persons of good status (because it was a purchased nobility, it was at times forced on people of means as a way for the King to acquire quickly needed funds); 4 of the Cloth, this grant was based on status. This status of nobility was first given to the Bourgeois of Paris by King Charles the V in 1371. It was confirmed by Charles VI (1380-1422), Louis XI (1461-1483), Francois I (1515-1547), and Henri II (1547-1559).

King Louis XII (1498-1515) broadened the nobility by ennobling provosts, merchants, and aldermen of Paris, it was then extended to the larger cities of Ile de France, to mayors, jurists, sheriffs, and aldermen of Lyons, Bourges, Angers, Poitiers, LaRochelle, Toulouse, Bordeaux, and other places. King Louis XII (1498-1515) made all men of arms noble. This was allowed to continue by Francois II (1559-1560), Charles IX (15560-1574), and King Henri III (1574-1589). Henri IV (1589-1610) revoked nobility of provosts, merchants, and aldermen. The nobility of man of arms was revoked by Louis XIV (1643-1715).

With valid proof, nobility could be repurchased. Five million Livres was made for the crown through this method. Nobility of the cloth was continued in Canada with the courtesy of naming the Governors of Canada, Marquis. In 1666 Louis XV (1715-1774) revoked the nobility of 40,000 nobles who had paid for the status. In 1750 the status of nobility was given to all military officers with at least 30 years of service. This title was passed on to their descendants. Louis XIV and XV granted 2,000 officers hereditary nobility. An ordinance in 1470 permitted nobility to be purchased from poor nobles. The Ordonnance of Blois, 1579, suppressed this nobility, it took away the noble privileges, leaving the holder a title in name only.

Transfer of Nobility

Until the middle ages nobility could only transfer from father to son. Later nobility could pass from mother to son. A person always knows his mother, but his father...well, it was thought the mothers line was more reliable. Nobility only passed to the oldest son. While younger children were noble, it was in name only as title or land were withheld. Higher

ranks of nobility could be attained through marriage. The French often did not deprive bastard children of nobility, as many times the title, but not the land, was passed on to them,

Privileges of Nobility

When you look at the privileges of the nobility you can see why they were so willing to buy them back when they were revoked. First, they were not taxed—unless, of course, you consider buying back a revoked title every time it was revoked a tax.

A noble of the Race could be presented in court with his wife, he could also be invited to ride in the King's coach and attend the hunts; only a titled person could be presented at the court of Louis XIV. This created humorous situations such as on the occasions when the King wished to see some one who was untitled. At these times the person was granted a temporary title to last just during the audience with the King. The Vicomte of Beauharnois was an example of a person not allowed at court, even though his family included marquis, counts, and viscounts.

Previous to Louis the XIV it was relatively easy to be presented to the king. If the nobleman found himself in a situation where his life was to be forfeited, he had the choice of dying by the more honorable method of decapitation rather than be humiliated by being hung. Military service, the means by which a person could often rise in nobility, was a privilege of the noble. Military school was available to the sons, as well as entry into St-Cyr for the daughters of the ennobled class. Before 1400 only the nobility were granted admission into the Musketeers -you remember the Three Musketeers and the King's Guard. Some religious orders were only open to those of noble birth. About 1710, of the hospital nuns at Hotel-Dieu de Montreal, 23 were of noble birth and the rest of the "haute bourgeoisie."

Limitations for Nobility

Nobility for merchants included only those from Brie, Artois, and Champagne, but was

forbidden in other provinces. A person of nobility could cultivate his own land, but could not for others. He could, also, do manual labor for himself, but not for others.

Military Officers

Military officers did not have to be nobles, neither did the Knights of Saint Louis. Some ordinary soldiers were of noble birth.

Titles

The titles, *honorable* and *noble*, often carried by bourgeois, merchants, and artisans, did not necessarily mean true nobility.

Proofs of Nobility


Proofs of nobility were required from 1696-99 of ancient and new nobles. Nobles of the race were "maintained" and other nobles were "confirmed" while some nobles lost titles for lack of documentation, that is, birth and marriage documents and/or notation of "ecuyer" for each ancestor. Younger nobles were dependant on the documents of older nobles. The loss of documents meant a loss of nobility. More than 20 researches of nobility were made. In 1614 all letters of ennoblement were revoked and in 1634 nobility was restored with proof and a 1500 Livres fee.

Grandeur and Decadence

The class of nobility evoked both grandeur and decadence. Nobility was a good concept, but it had its faults. The nobleman could give himself to the king, that is, be ready to fight the King's wars, give his blood as a tax instead of his money. None of us like paying taxes, the French in the Middle Ages no less. In an age of many wars, both minor and major, it was a good arrangement for both the King and the nobility. Later many nobles became impoverished. One of the reasons for poverty, aside from the obvious ones of living beyond their means, or poor investments, was that they became land poorhaving land that cost more to own than it earned. The "Cens and rents" once set were never changed from generation to generation, so that as the cost of living increased, income from the land remained the same. This flaw in the system not only brought poverty to the family, but also illiteracy. The privilege of fine schools for the sons and daughters of the nobility was

costly. Later the bourgeois became richer, and their wealth allowed this class to be educated.

Court nobles on the other hand were very well paid. In fact, by comparison, they seem to have been over paid. The average wage of tradesmen and officials in Canada was about 500 Livres per year. The Keeper of the Queen's bed received 12,000 Livres a year. The Captain of Chase at Fontainbleu re-



ceived 20,000 Livres per year. So, here was a class of nobles, potentially productive to the country, but through poverty became nobles in name only. Then there was the noble living a lavish life on the other end of the financial income scale.

Nobility in France was abolished 5 Nov 1789 by the National Assembly. Napoleon created an imperial nobility, but did not recognize ancient nobility.

Laroque, said of nobility that, it is "full of bravery, elegance, fidelity to great ideas, and of the blood it gave in defense of France."

INDIAN CAPTIVES IN NEW FRANCE

It was looking for my own captive ancestor, Mercy Adams, that initially led me to a book by Emma Coleman, New England Captives Carried to Canada between 1677 & 1760 during the French and Indian Wars 1925.

Mercy Adams was captured by the Indians, and her fa-

ther was killed, in Portsmouth. She was brought up to Canada, and married there. I wanted to find out her ancestry, but unfortunately, I picked the wrong ancestor. She doesn't have any background because her father seems to have appeared out of nowhere, without any information about his background.

There are two major sources that you can use when seeking the details of your captive ancestors. The first one is Emma Coleman's two-volume book. She deals with, perhaps, the majority of the captives who came from New England and left descendants. She gives details about the families.

Emma Coleman had to go to Canada, to the individual parishes, and do the research herself. She did not have the research resources that we have today. She had to visit the pastors, the towns, and the families. She did a marvelous job.

Emma's book followed a work that had been published before by Alice Baker, *The True*

Stories of New England Captives Carried to Canada During the Old French and Indian Wars, 1897. Alice Baker also needed to go to Canada for her resources.

The interesting thing about both these people is that they became very enamored of the French way of life, in spite of the fact that these people had had ancestors who had been slaughtered by the Indians during attacks on their towns, yet they didn't bear any resentment. They saw the French Canadian habitant as a kindly and polite individual which they enjoyed. In Canada they were shown descendants of some of the English captives, met them, talked with them, and felt an affiliation which is reflected in their books. These books are very well done.


What I am interested in doing is going back in the ancestry far as I can. These people originated in New England, why not visit there to research these people? Canada could not provide this information. What I found was that I could identify people who hitherto had been unknown and had never been identified by Emma Coleman. Emma Coleman had done a marvelous job, if she had had my resources—the resources we have today—I am certain she would have done an equal or better task than I have. Emma Coleman provided me with the basic material on which I worked. I have since expanded this and have gone far back in some cases.

A Little Background

Let me give you a little background on the

Indians and the attacking forces. In each case, remember, 'the Indians weren't the only ones attacking. It all goes back to the fact that the Indians who were in Northern Maine, and even those along the Kennebuc River, had been encroached upon by the English settlers who were pushing, and pushing, and pushing. The Indians wrote tactful letters to the governor of Massachusetts saying, "Sir, would you please



have these good people removed, they are encroaching on our property, they're inhibiting our hunting, they are taking over lands that belong to us." The English were removed, but they came back, and the Indians finally said that if the settlers weren't removed in a year, that they, the Indians, would attack.

In a year or two they attacked, but they were savage when they attacked. They used tomahawks, rapped them on the head, they killed people, they meant it. It was serious business. The majority of the Indians were Christians, but primitive Christians. They still carried some of the mentality that came from their culture, the mentality to fight, to struggle for their rights, but is that anything our own culture hasn't also done, down through the

years? It is our culture that keeps us from being a savage.

Let me say at this time, that never did an Eastern Indian sexually attack a women—never—it was not a part of their culture, which is a compliment to their sense of values. They would not hesitate, in necessity, to kill a woman or kill a baby, but to violate a woman sexually was a forbidden activity. The attacking Indians were mainly Abenakis, with some Iroquois, Algonquins, and Hurons.

Some of the French went with the Indians on their raids—LeMoyne de Ste Helene, Nicolas d'Ailleboust, Louis d'Amour, Jean Baptiste Hertel de Rouville, to name a few. In part, it was because Philippe de Rigaud Vaudreuil, who was Governor of Canada at that time, was trying to repel the English who were encroaching. It seems that there was some fearfulness on the part of the French, because the population of the Colonies was about ten time greater than that of New France, and they were afraid of being overwhelmed by the New Englanders.

The Wars

The wars between the French and English began in the New World about 1666. Every time war would break out in Europe it would be reflected in this part of the world. There were some times when the Indians would attack and there was no war in Europe, but for the most part there was a parallel between the wars. The taking of Acadia by the English, about 1666, was the start of the antipathies that arose between the French and English. The next year Acadia was given back to the French, but still, the French harbored resentment.

The Abanakis began to attack the towns along the rivers. They attacked the towns along the Connecticut River first, because they could reach the Connecticut River, by coming down the Richelieu River and crossing over to connect with the Connecticut River. The first towns they attacked were Deerfield and Hatfield, which were close by, in Massachuesetts in 1677.

This was the first time they took prisoners. Twenty-three captives were taken. That doesn't mean 23 arrived in Canada. Anyone who was incapable of making the trip was generally dispatched very rapidly. It wasn't an aggressive act on their part it was merely an act of trying to prevent the person from being their enemy in the future. Remember the French and Indians thought of the New Englanders as heretics, and for them to eliminate a heretic was an act of Christian proper behavior. We think of that as being very savage, but it wasn't necessarily a savage act, it wasn't any more than capital punishment is in some cases.

The Indians attacked Dover (called Cocheco), New Hampshire in 1689. As you can see there was quite a spell when there were no attacks. Twenty-nine people were taken at Dover.

The List of Wars From 1666 Until 1693 is as follows:

- 26 Jan 1666 Between France and England Acadia taken by the English
- 31 Jul 1667 Peace Treaty of Breda Acadia returned to France
- 19 Sep 1677 Abenakis attack Deerfield and Hatfield MA 23 prisoners taken to Canada
- 8 Jul 1689 French and Abenakis attack Cocheco/Dover 29 prisoners to Canada
- 8 Aug 1689 Abenakis, Canibas and French attack Pemaquid ME 50 captives, some taken to Canada
- Oct 1689 Abenakis attack Oyster River and Kittery 1690 Abenakis attack Wells ME
- 18-19 Feb 1690 French and Indians attack Corlear/ Schenectady NY

- 27 Mar 1690 Canadians and Abenakis attack Salmon Falls NH 54 captives taken
- 25 Jan 1691 French and Abenakis attack York ME 73 captives taken
- 23 Sep 1691 Abenakis and French attack Sandy Beach/ Rye NH

By this time there were so many prisoners that the French and English decided to have a prisoner exchange. Keep in mind the English were also taking prisoners during this time. We don't know all the prisoners who were exchanged or all those who stayed in Canada or who got "lost" in the woods, that is those who remained with the Indians, by choice or otherwise. So in 1692 there was a prisoner exchange between Canada and New England.

Then the attacks began again:
May 1693 Abenakis attack York ME
8 June 1693 Abenakis attack Kittery ME
6 Oct 1693 Abenakis and French attack Deerfield MA
1693 Canada and New England exchange prisoners
Spring 1694 French attack Pemaquid and Isles of Shoals
(As you can see attacks were made along the rivers and along the sea coast)

27 Jul 1694 French and Abenakis attack Groton MA
29 Jul 1694 French and Abenakis attack Osyter River
6 Jul 1695 French and Abenakis attack Kittery and Sandy
Beach

- 5 Aug 1695 French and Abenakis attack Billerica 25 Aug 1695 French and Indians attack Corlear
- 10 Oct 1695 we have another prisoner exchange 64 English captives. (Whenever prisoners were exchanged some were left behind, never were all the prisoners



Then more war:

Nov 1695 French and Indians attack Cocheco/Dover and Natick

20 May 1696 French and Indians attack York ME

26 Jul 1696 attack Cocheco

Then again, in the summer of 1696 there was another prisoner exchange. How many? We don't know

14 Aug 1696 a sea attack by French on Pemaquid – 102 prisoners taken

15 Aug 1696 French and Abenakis attack Haverhill MA

Deerfield A Major Battle

Deerfield was the biggest attack. The French and Indians were a combined force of about 125 attackers strong. They fortunately (fortunate for them) attacked Deerfield in the middle of winter. The snows had piled up against the palisades and they could walk up the snow to the top of the palisades and drop down inside the town. They already had arranged for some people to go inside the palisade and secure a place to sleep. The Indian women asked and were given a place to spend the night inside the palisades near the fires where it was warm. They got up during the night and opened the gates to the attackers. It was an atrocious attack, a large number of people were killed and about 123 captured.

One of the French officers who was mortally wounded was offered a drink of water by one of the New England woman. She was spared, that is, she was neither killed nor taken prisoner. There were some remarkable acts of kindness on the part of the Indians. These were Christian Indians, they stopped three times a day to say their prayers.

Where were these people taken when they became captives? Many were taken to the Indian towns, especially at first. Some stayed and blended in with the Indian tribes. Most of them stayed of their own accord. They were delighted with the freedom of the Indian way of life. These were people who came from a very Calvinistic place of habitation, where there was a limitation on the joy of life. This isn't to belittle their religion, but, I think, Calvinism tends to have a

fatalistic attitude to it, and a reduction of the joy of religious feasts. Then they entered a place where Christianity was a pleasure.

The Indians loved their religion, they sang, they prayed together, they had a great deal of enthusiasm. Many of the prisoners said that there was more Christian living among the Indians than there was among the whites. They also had freedom of movement. They could go hunting, fishing, and lead a leisurely life without being pressured as they would have been in their homes in New England. Some chose to stay because the religion appealed to them. One of the Silver girls became a nun. She said she loved her parents, but she would not give up her Catholicism.

Those who were adopted, were adopted mainly by the Abenakis and Iroquois: The Indian villages and tribes were:

Caughnawaga/Sault St Louis – Iroquois St Regis – Iroquois

Sault aux Recollect - mixed

Deux Montagnes and Oka -Iroquois and

Algonquins St Francis du Lac – Abenakis Sault de la Chaudiere – Eastern Abenakis.

Some of the captives remained in Maine and became members of the tribes. Those who became Indianized are no longer recognizable as being New Englanders. One hundred and fourteen of the captives were ransomed by Canadians or French, the cost being from 200 to 600 Livres apiece. Some married Canadians or Indians, and then some were redeemed and returned to New England.

Some of the captives were ransomed by the French. For that reason, the Indians took captives, often for the purpose of making money by selling them to the French. It was an income, done in order to buy items they needed. They would get about 300 Livres, which was about a half-year's wages for the average Canadian—per captive.

Again, some of the captives elected to remain with the whites. They enjoyed the life in

Canada. One woman whose daughter wanted to come back to the Colonies told her, when you go home you are going to have to make your own bread, and make your own butter, here in Montreal you can buy them. They are already made. They didn't have to do all the things that needed to be done, in a home, in New England. They liked the life style in Canada and stayed.

Many of those captives who returned to their homes in New England, had learned either French very well, Indian very well,

or both. They were good interpreters whenever anyone needed

to go back to Canada to visit or ransom the captives.

Often some of the Indians who had been their captors would come down and visit them. They would knock on the door and say they had come to visit their "brothers." As you can see there was a great affiliation between the captors and the captives. Sometimes they tried to capture the same ones because

they enjoyed them so much.

Some of the captives came back to New England, and of these some reluctantly, especially the children. They often left Canada with tears in their eyes. They didn't want to leave the nuns, they didn't want to leave their adoptive parents, they didn't want to go back home.

The captives were highly respected. The majority of the girls who stayed actually, married men of noble or high social standing. Witnesses at the baptisms and weddings of the captives were often the highest ranking people of the land.

Record keeping in the Colonies differed from that in Canada, in that the fathers full name was recorded, but only the first name of the mother. In Canada, both the father's name and the mother's full, maiden name were recorded. It was an unfortunate situation that the New England woman were only known by their given name. It makes for a great deal of hardship in locating relationships. The records of the captives in Canada are often the only source for American people seeking to locate their ancestor's mothers. Locating as many of the siblings as possible, and noting the mother's

name, is often how they

are found.

Chiponchukwe

In Deux Montagnes it is recorded that an English woman, named Chiponchukwe, was married to a Nipissing Indian, Onontaha. They had a daughter, born about 1725. Chiponchukwe, obviously an unknown, could have been born fifteen to twenty years earlier. We don't have her American name, who could she be? I have all the captives in a database, so I ran all the

captives through, extracting all those with the right dates of birth, and places of origin. Who came forward, but the Dolloff sisters, Abigail, born about 1706, and Sarah, born about 1702, and captured 22 July 1710 in Exeter NH. In 1715 they were, in Canada, living with the Indians. They are two very good prospects. There is no proof, but it is a lead for the next person who researches this problem. If someone researches their ancestry through her daughter, with this they have a start. She may, also have had other children we don't know about. In one of the Dolloff girl's records it states that she came and married an Indian. This is another clue to this person's identity. During the peace

of 1725 to 1745 (there was no war between the French and English during this time) she came to Exeter NH with her husband for a visit, then returned to Canada.

John Colby

John Colby was a soldier taken captive near Fort Dummer while cutting timber, 22 July 1755. He was a late captive. After England took Canada from the French in 1760 there were no more captives. He was taken to St François du Lac, the Abenakis Indian settlement. His freedom was gained when his ransom was paid by the French for 300 Livres. Documentation for this transaction has not been found. He was not, as yet, allowed to leave Montreal. In the meantime, he married a Canadian woman, Marie Josephe Lamare, on 23 Oct 1759. They disappeared. I couldn't find them until I began looking for captives in the States. I found them in Sandown NH, his home town, a year later, in 1760. They had three children in Sandown. He married a second time about 1766/ 8. Why did John Colby marry a second time? Had his first wife, M-Josephe Lamare, died? Did she get a divorce? Did she leave him? If you left

a person for five years, you were considered dead. Also, the ministers would not have considered a Catholic marriage as worth anything, so would have readily married John again. John Colby left a will in which he states that if his oldest son, John, would ever return to live in Exeter, he would have a part of his inheritance. Could this mean that John left with his mother and went back to Canada? This hasn't been proved yet, but it is a prospect.

Perhaps this problem will never be solved, perhaps this is the most we can achieve in this family search. Then again these might be the clues that are needed for the next person to make the correct connections.

Durrell Family and Samuel Gill

The Durrell family lived in Cape Porpoise, now part of Kennebuc ME. The Indians attacked Cape Porpoise on 10 Aug 1703, and the family was captured, except for the parents, who were left on the field. Emma Coleman interprets this to mean that they were killed. They weren't, because left on the field doesn't mean that they were killed, it just means not taken along.

What happened with the Durrell family, is that they captured the mother and not the father. The father was not home at the time of the attack. Captured in the attack besides the mother were the five children: Benjamin, Rachel, Susan, John, and Philip Jr. When they had gotten about two miles away from the place of capture, the mother convinced the Indians to let her go with her youngest child, baby Philip. One of the Indians picked up the baby, carried the baby to within sight of Fort Sacco, handed the baby over to the mother, turned and went back to the Indian band. This is another example of an act of kindness on the part of the Indians, which is contrary to the vicious attitude we associate with Indian attacks. The Indian behavior could certainly be a paradox. The remaining children were taken to St François du Lac.

What is interesting about this is that I think one of these girls became the wife of Samuel Gill. Samuel Gill was taken captive, about four years before, this in Haverhill, and brought to St François du Lac. He married a girl named Rosalie James, his second wife, about 1715, at St François du Lac. They had seven children in about twenty years. Rosalie was baptized Rosalie by the French. This was not her original name. James was not an existent name. I have no idea where it came from. The only James we know of does not "fit" with the

other information. It is said that her father was a minister, but there is no minister by the name of James. There was no person who went to Divinity School by the name of James. Was this name accidentally given to her? We don't know.

Rosalie is said, by her own children, to have been captured several years after her husband. Samuel Gill was captured on 10 June 1697 at Salisbury MA when he was nearly 10 years old. Rosalie was captured in 1703 at Kenibanc, what else can it be but Kennebuc, with her whole family except her parents, who were left behind. What a match! I believe Rosalie is either Rachel or Susan Durrell—a very sound possibility. Will we ever be able to prove it absolutely? Maybe not.

This Durrell family, actually came from a French family which had been taken from the Guernsey or Jersey Islands. They were possibly Huguenots at the time, and maybe, Philip Durrell, her father, was a preaching type, which would explain his being called a minister. Eventually the two sons were redeemed and returned to New England, which left the two daughters still in Canada. When Rogers' Rangers attacked St François du Lac, they destroyed the records, therefore there is no proof. What happened to Rosalie's sister? If Rosalie is Rachel or Susan, a clue might be in the missing sister. Now I want to look at all those closely associated with Samuel and Rosalie; godparents, witnesses to marriages, etc. Through this process we might be able to find out who else was related to Susan or Rachel Durrell.

The Gill family is very interesting. Some of the children of this family became prominent as chiefs in the village. One of them became the prayer chief. Another of the sons was, in 1779, appointed a Major in the US Army. He later reversed his feelings and made allegiance to the British. Some of the sons and nephews became students at Dartmouth, an Indian grant college.

Smead—"A Lost Captive, Marguerite Sergeant-Filde"

This captive is called Marguerite Field. She was captured at age five in Deerfield MA on 11 March 1704. She was taken to the Mohawk village of Caughnawaga and lived with the Indians for many years. Marguerite was married in Canada to Jean Sere dit Leveille on 7 June 1722 at Montreal. They had 13 children.

A clue as to who Marguerite is comes from the baptismal records of her children. She is called by a variety of names; among which are Filis, likely a misspelling of Fields, and Sergeant, in 14 instances. In looking at the records we see that Marguerite Fields is supposed to be the daughter of Samuel Field and Mary Price. There is no such person as Samuel Field. In some places it is recorded as John Field, but this doesn't fit either. An interesting fact is that at the time of the capture of Marguerite, she was captured with two of the Field children; four-year-old John, released in 1706 and seven-year-old Mary, who remained with the Indians and married a Chief.

In this attack the grandmother of the Field children is killed. This grandmother had married twice; first, Zecheriah Field and next, Robert Price. So this is the grandmother of the two Field children, children of John Field and Mary Bennett

It is my contention that when the grandmother was killed the three children, all her grandchildren, were visiting with her and they were all taken together. Because the other ones were known as Fields was it assumed that this little five-year-old girl was also a Field? I think so.

Marguerite's mother is listed as Mary Price, there is no record of a Mary Price married to a Field. I did find a Mary Price married to Samuel Smead in Deerfield, the only Mary Price on record in this area. According to the story, this Mary Price Smead died and was burned with her children, a boy and a girl, Sarah, in their house during the attack on the village.

How many children died with the mother? Did the father make the mistake of knowing who was home with the mother at the time of the attack? It wouldn't be the first time that someone was said to have been killed and was captured instead. I think that the one who is

supposed to be Marguerite Field is in fact Sarah Smead. This is a good possibility. The Field family can be traced back 14 generations to a Roger Del Feld, born about 1240 at Sowerby England.



MRS. LUELLA NORTH

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR JUDGE OF THE JUVENILE COURT

It was considered that a qualified woman would be the ideal candidate. One such, who possessed every qualification that could be desired and an experience which admirably fitted her for such a position was known to be living quietly in this city after several years of the very kind of training that was most needed.

This woman is Mrs. Luella North, who possesses qualifications which might almost be said to have been attained with the special object in view of fitting such a position and who might be said to have been educated with the sole intent of qualifying in every particular for such a position as judge of the juvenile court proves to be.

Mrs. North was born and reared in an environment that radiated an atmosphere of law. As the daughter of a lawyer of note and the wife of a prison reformer of the highest type she has by the right of heritage and association the groundwork of an experience which will be of the greatest benefit to her in the position of judge of the juvenile court. Add to this an analytical mind, a broad view actuated by sound common sense and the sympathy that only a mother can give and something of an idea of the qualifications of this woman can be gained.

As the daughter of former Senator Robinson, of Clyde NY, a lawyer with 60 years of experience and who is still living, she had every opportunity of assimilating more law than falls the lot of many an attorney even after he has graduated from law school. After graduating from the Genesso Normal School, Mrs. North taught Latin and Greek in the schools of the State for 12 years. She resigned as teacher at the time of her marriage to the late Dr. Charles H. North, superintendent of the Dannemora State Hospital for Insane Criminals. Here she found a fertile field for humanitarian work and the opportunity for associating with some of the best trained minds on criminology in the country. The tragic death of her

husband at the hand, of an insane criminal threw Mrs. North upon her own resources and she bravely undertook the making of a new life for herself and the educating of her three small children. How well she has succeeded we of Plattsburgh know. During her residence here she has kept in close touch with the subjects which interested her most and has been identified with many movements for the betterment of this city. Her sound judgment and clear vision have been of great benefit to the numerous organizations in which she takes a leading part. She is active in Red Cross work and holds the position of chairman of the county chapter; she was a teacher in the school of religious instruction and is active in club work, as first vice-president of the Civic League she has been in close touch with affairs of the city and county. She is also chairman of the Committee on Institutional Relation of the State Federation of Woman's Clubs and last week at the Hotel Commodore in New York City was elected corresponding secretary of this organization which numbers in its ranks over 400,000 women.

This briefly is something of the activities of the woman who said that the reform of the criminal should take place before the adult years are reached and who believes that the majority of criminals are made by miss spent youth. To correct this condition so far as lies in her power and to work for the salvation of the adult through the influence on the child is her object if elected to the office to which she aspires and which we believe she will fill as no other man or woman in Clinton County could hope to.

AND THEN THERE WAS ONE

[This was written by my grandmother, Alida (Hamel) Paquette Giff. I have tried to make corrections to make the story clearer to read.]

I am 75 years old and the youngest of 13 children. At this age I have a lot of time for my mind to wander off of the stories of long ago that were told to me as years went by. To me the stories were both history and unusual. I have always wanted to write about my family. Of true stories and also facts of our ancestors.

My family were a mixed product of immigrants, as we all are, from England, Germany, and French Canadian. And also American Indian of which I was always especially proud to have been because this makes me a real American. It happened to be on my mother's side. Her grandmother was an Indian maiden who lived with my great great grandfather in an Indian village close to a place called Napierville, some miles south of Trois Rivers in the Province of Québec, Canada. She was so beautiful that she won the heart of a big husky French Canadian guide named Roberts (I never knew his first name).

One day the Governor General of England came to visit Canada and wanted to see the beauty of that vast and beautiful country. He was recommended to and engaged this Canadian guide named Roberts. (I never knew his first name!) The Governor was so thrilled with this adventure he had with this wonderful guide that he said he would like to reward him for all his trouble and the good care he gave him. I do not know how this came about but he gave him an island somewhere around the St. Lawrence River and Roberts was very grateful.

Roberts had seen a very beautiful Indian maiden with long braids, dark soulful eyes and lovely white teeth in the Indian Village. She

could do so many things around her home and would always look at Roberts with those soulful eyes that he soon learned to love her. He had also lived in the small village and knew her ever since they were children. Now that he had this big Island with a lot of trees that was like a forest, he did not know of anyone he would like to share it with but with Fawn, as she was named by her Indian father. So they were married by the priest of this village with her father's consent. There was a lot of dancing and festivity all through the day.

So off they went to live on this big island of Robert's and built their home with the trees they cut down on their own island. Soon they had horses, cows, wagons and all sorts of things. They even built birchwood canoes and would leave their island to see more of the world. With a husband for a guide it was great fun until their little family came alone. Fawn started feeling lonely on their island and missed her people. So Roberts would exchange a piece of land for a horse or a wagon and some timber for a bit of money until they had given or sold all of their island. So they wandered like gypsies from Sorel and finally landing in the United States at St. Albans, Vermont. There they started a bakery making large loaves of savory bread that came out of stone ovens. This is where my grandmother, named Catherine, and her sister Marguerite were born. They also had sons. My grandmother and Aunt Marguerite I remember well.

The urge for them to wander again came and this time to stay for a while on a little island named? in the small village named Champlain.

There were not many homes there then. Soon it was Summer and they lived on that little island until fall. Fawn would paddle down the little stream in her canoe to what was called by everyone in the village, *Down the Rapids* and found a place she would like to build their home.

So once again Roberts built a house and lived there ever after. Their son and daughters grew up there and when old enough married not to Indians but to the white boys and girls around the Village of Champlain. In those days they would marry very young. I heard grandmother say she was only fifteen when she got married and had a baby when sixteen. She would give the baby to her mother and slide down the hill in a sled her father made for her to enjoy with

the other children.

Grandmother married a boy of 18. He was a son of French Canadian parents and had a sailboat that sailed from Rouses Point to the Isle of La Motte on Lake Champlain. The Isle of La Motte had a stone quarry and a lot of apple trees. It was with this sailboat that they made their living. Grandfather made their living carrying stone to different places from this quarry. Now my mother was one of eight children, her brother was drowned in the navy at sea when his ship sank in battle. His name is on a monument in West Point. So my grandparents got a pension for the loss of their son.

My mother married my dad when she was 17 years old.

Adelaide Hamel Paquette Giff, my Grandmother also wrote to the Times Record about her father.

#6-8th St., Waterford, N.Y. April 10 - 1961

Mr. Thomas Gerson % The Times Record Troy, N.Y.

Dear Sir.

I am writing in reference to the phone talk I had with you last week and told me you would be interested. Enclosed you will find the tin type picture of my father when he was playing in the band at the time of the Civil War. It is somewhat faded but clear enough to see his uniform and what a young man of 28 years old looked like in those days.

My father was born Dec. 10, 1835 and my sister Julia was born Sept. 15th, 1863 while my father was in the Army. so it must have been in 1862 or 63 when this picture was taken. He told me at one time that he reenlisted so he could get a bonus.

I am the youngest of the family of 13 children, 75 years old. There are three of us girls left. One lives in Rouses Point, 4 miles from Champlain, she is 93 years old and another 91 years old lives in Champlain where my father and mother were born and buried. They lived there until father decided to have a barge on the Erie Canal and a home which he built, a four family house on 25th Street, Watervliet which was when I was 5 years old and have lived in.

I understand you would like me to tell you about what band father was in. It was General Sherman's Army Band, but I could not tell you anymore about it. He told me he played in the theater where Lincoln was assassinated when they were in Virginia but not playing there at the time he was killed. He was at Gettysburgh when Lincoln gave his address. He would rave about the state of Virginia. He said it was so beautiful and even named one of my little sisters Virginia. Those who played in the band did not go into combat only to some times bring the soldiers into the battlefield, but they helped the doctors in the hospitals. Most of them with Yellow Fever. My dad got a slight case of the fever which left him slightly deaf and received a small pension. He had medals of the G.A.R. which he belonged to, but like everything else they were lost. I am very lucky I have this photo which was given to me by my aunt, my father's sister.

I only wish I could tell you more about him but he was a wonderful father and such a good man. I was 19 years old when he died. He would be 126 years old now,

Hope this will help you in your work.

RUDY VALLEE

In the latter part of the 1920s there arose a radio personality named Rudy VALLEE who was to become a stage and movie star. He was of French Canadian ancestry, baptized on 4 August 1901 as Hugh Prior VALLEE¹, son of Chafes-Alphonse Vale and Catherine Lynch. He was born at Island Pond VT 28 July 1901 and received the name "Rudy" from his great admiration for a contemporary master saxophonist named Rudy Wiedoeft.

Rudy Vallee attended the parochial school of Westbrook ME, then the local public High School. In 1917 he enrolled in the Navy two weeks before the United States entered World War I. He was released from duty when it was discovered that he was only 16 years old. He returned to finish his studies and was part of the Westbrook High School band as drummer.

He worked for a while as a clerk in his father's pharmacy, then as general utility man in the local "Star" theater. He also was in the theater band. He had taught himself the clarinet and was hired by the Deluxe Strand theater in Portland ME as attendant. He switched interest from the clarinet to the saxophone after having heard records of Rudy Wiedoeft. His saxophone was rented from a theater employee, but he bought all the Wiedoeft records he could find. Practicing up to eight hours per day he became quite proficient.

In 1921 he entered the University of Maine, but by 1922 he transferred to Yale University. After some brief musical interruptions, Rudy received his Doctorate of Philosophy in 1917 from Yale. He went to Boston, then

New York forming the Connecticut Yankees Orchestra. His "Heigh Ho Everybody" greeting at the start of his programs became well known. He was the vocalist of the orchestra, able to sing in Spanish, French and Italian.

Soon he was on the radio, more than 25 stations carrying his show. He gave 14 to 15 performances per week, and slept barely 5 to 6 hours per day. His trade mark, used to carry his voice, was the hand-held megaphone, since microphones were not used in the clubs. In his radio shows sponsored by Fleischman, his guests included: Joe Penner, Kate Smith, Burns & Allen, Eddie Cantor, Red Skelton, Bob Hope, Fanny Brice, Frank Fay, Bob Burns and others.

Encouraged by his success in his nationwide concerts, he went to London to give two spectacular radio concerts at the celebration of the Coronation. He went without his musical group, directing musicians of England. He returned to the US to continue on radio for the "Sealtest Program." He enlisted in the Coast Guard during World War II, forming the Coast Guard Band. They played in more than 500 military hospitals. He was discharged in 1944 and again returned to the radio.

Movies inevitably used his fame and talent. In 1939 with "Vaqabond Lover" he started that career. HP appeared and starred in at least sixteen more films. He also wrote his

autobiography called "Vagabond Dreams Come True" published in 1929.

Hugh Prior Vallee was married three times. His wives were Leonie McCoy, Fay Webb, and Bettyjane Green. As to his ancestry, he said he was proud of his French-Canadian ancestry and always wrote his name with the acute accent. He spoke French quite well, the result of his early parochial education, and was able to converse comfortably with such personages as Claudette Colbert and Charles Boyer.



St Peter's Cemetery Records from 1910 to 1920

St Peter's began their own cemetery in 1910. Previous to this time they shared the Old Catholic Cemetery with all the churches in the area. As you see indicated, by an asterisk, in these records many people moved their loved ones to the new St Peter's cemetery from the Old Catholic cemetery. Some of the records list a brother or other relative instead of a parent(s). In this case in the parent column. I have listed the relative indicated. An example is the entry of Dolphis Desautels, the record lists that he is the father of Michel Desautels.

As you read through these records some of the stories are obvious such as the deaths in 1918-1919 of the area's young people to the flu epidemic of that time, or the sadness of reading of the deaths of the four Larivee children in their teens or early twenties. When a person's age is recorded in years, months, and even days, it seems to be saying this person was cherished and will be sorely missed. Yet, I am sure each death has it's own particular story, some known, many others which have been forgotten, and some of these, always to be a mystery.

Are there mistakes in these records? Of course Some I'm sure of, others can be guessed at, such as the record of the man listed as an Italian, and then it is recorded that he was born in Plattsburgh. I don't think so. For it to be noted that he was Italian, we can be almost certain that he was born in Italy. There might be slight differences in the spellings of names, or sometimes the differences in given names than what the family remembers. The hope is that these records will be a help to you in your family search.

The George W Douglas Family from Clinton Co, NY and Escananba, MI

The following article was printed in the Escanaba MI Morning Press dated Sunday, 4 January 1914.

Douglas, Mr and Mrs George W, of Bark River Michigan celebrate their golden Wedding Anniversary, 4 January 1914. They are residents of Delta County, nearly 35 years. Mr Douglas born, 20 November 1844 in Clinton County, New York. Mrs Douglas, the former Orilla Pappin was born in Canada, 26 December 1846. Fifty years ago this morning, Mr and Mrs Douglas rode 24 miles on a sleigh to Keeseville, Essex County, New York where they were married. The couple remained in the east, five years and moved to Negaunee, Michigan where they remained from 1879, when they moved to Bark River. Four generations will be present at today's celebration, Mr and Mrs Douglas, their daughter, Mrs Joseph Frenchette of Bark River, their grand daughter, Mrs Frank Hirn of Escanaba, Michigan and their great grand daughter, little Clare Hirn, daughter of Mr and Mrs Frank Hirn of Escanaba. Mr and Mrs George W Douglas have five sons and five daughters. They are Mrs Joseph Frenchette of Bark River, Mrs Henry Hebert of Bark River, Mrs E J Bergman of Bark River, Mrs Willard French of Harris, Michigan, George Douglas of Bark River, Benjamin Douglas of Bark River, Edward Douglas of Escanaba, Louis Douglas of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, Mrs John Daust of Manistique, Michigan and Eli J Douglas of Van Couver, BC. Eli will be the only one not present at today's celebration.

Mr Douglas is the last surviving member of a family of seven sons and four daughters. Two of his brothers fought in the Civil War, one dying from starvation as a prisoner of war at Libby Prison. The soldier brother passed away two years ago. Mr Douglas' father was for years engaged as a trader for the Hudson Bay Company and was one of the first of that company to go from the east to the far west. The elder Douglas traveled across the continent to Oregon in 1838.

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Monty Family Through History and Reunion

Hiram Monty Sr (1852-1934)

Hiram Monty was born at Monty's Bay, in Clinton County, New York in November of 1852. He was the son of Lewis, 1815-1911 (his mother's name was Harriet, she was born in Canada). Lewis, being too old to serve in the Civil War misrepresented his age to appear younger in order to serve. Hiram was raised and educated in the public schools in the Lake Champlain area of New York State. He was one of tenchildren. In 1871, Lewis moved his family, which then included seven children, Hiram being one of them, to Benton Harbor, Michigan. Lewis died there in 1911. His wife was 96 years old when she died in 1917.

On November 25 1871, Hiram married Anna Danielson at St Joseph, Michigan. Anna was born in Sweden and came to the US as a child. Her parents were Daniel and Christine Danielson. While living in Michigan, Hiram and Anna had seven children. Clarence, Perley, Milton, Etta, George, George's twin, and Glen. Hiram and Anna's first three children died as infants. According to the 1880 Census, after being married nearly nine years, they had two children, Hiram and Anna. Then Etta was born, followed by George (his twin died at birth), and later Glen, all in Michigan.

Hiram worked in a sawmill and a brick factory. One winter with his friend, and brother-in-law, Sam Hayward (Sam married Hiram's sister Lillia) he trapped muskrats in Mississippi. In 1883 Hiram and Sam Hayward traveled to Tacoma, Washington, and worked in railroad construction for about 16 months.

When Hiram was 32 years old, he made the

bold decision to homestead in the Territory of Washington. In 1885 he moved his wife and children; Etta, 5, George 4, and Glen less than a year old, to the river banks of the North Fork of the Stillaguamish River. They lived in a tent for a while. It was a risky situation for this young family, but Hiram was determined, and made it work. The only transportation to the nearest store or doctor was more than 20 miles by canoe, down the river to Stanwood, Washington. Trafton, about two miles down the river, where there were a few settlers, became the Monty's address.

Hiram proved up on his 160-acre homestead. This homestead had an abundant supply of large cedar trees. Cedar wood has the characteristic of splitting very straight, which makes very good building lumber and roofing shingles. Hiram built a cedar split-board house, on the south side of the creek. Building the house took a lot of determination and sweat. Imagine building a house with only hand tools such as saws, froe, axe, and hammer, and all this starting with standing trees. As a means of insulating the house, Anna papered over the cracks with newspaper. A barn was later constructed a few hundred feet north of the creek. The barn had a hay loft, and was arranged to milk cows. Hiram's first crops were hay, grain, and corn for the silos. He first kept 35 cows, all good Jersey's; eight pure-bred, seven pure-bred heifers, and a purebred bull.

Hiram planted a garden, orchard, berry patch, and nut trees as soon as he was settled. The area provided itself to native berries and nuts. He supplemented his food with deer and salmon. The creek was inhabited with muskrat and beaver.

During this early period, Hiram's source of income was from trapping and working on a survey crew. He obtained a canoe of his own and, so was able to do some river transporting. The pioneers, operated their canoes like the Indians did, with the pole pushing the canoe by levering off the river bottom. He, also sold cedar shingle bolts to the shingle mills down river.

In 1889, Clayton was born, and died the same year. Then in 1892, Guy was born, Hiram Jr was born in 1894, Laona was born in 1897. She died in 1903. Thus, the Hiram Monty family was completed with Etta, George, Glen, Guy, and Hiram Jr, known as Pete. In 1892, a small one-room school was built about a mile east of the family home. All of Hiram and Anna's children attended this school. Hiram was a member of the school board.

About the turn of the century, things started to happen. Proceeds from the logging of the timber provided the means to build a larger new home in 1902. A new and larger barn was constructed in 1905. These buildings were located about midway along the north border of the farm. The building sites were on higher ground, in this way they avoided the floods which were experienced along the river.

In 1902, the railroad became operational. It went through Monty land. The construction of the railroad created considerable activity. The Cicero railroad station was about a mile from the Monty's second home. The train made it possible to sell dairy cream and other produce, along with providing dependable transportation to Arlington, and the outside world.

When Hiram attended the Chicago World Fair, he returned with sprouts of eastern trees. These included maples, willows, walnut, and many other species, which he planted the entire length of the north border of his farm. About half of these trees still exist.

Roads in the area were being improved under the guidance of the road supervisor, Hiram Monty. In 1904 Hiram bought a Brush automobile. He later had a Winton. This auto was wrecked and replaced with a Ford.

Etta, Hiram and Anna's daughter, started school at Trafton and completed her schooling at the first Cicero school. She married Mr Briton.

In 1916, when their first child was born, Etta died. The baby, Virginia, survived. Virginia married and had a family, but where she is now is unknown.

All of the Monty family helped with the daily chores. Anna was a very good cook and housekeeper. The Monty table had plenty of food; meat, potatoes and gravy, with homemade bread. Pancakes with Hiram's homemade maple syrup was a frequent breakfast fare. Hiram entertained by playing the violin. He enjoyed smoking cigars, and sipping Anna's homemade wine. Hiram always trapped, and he always had a canoe, so that he could fish the river. During the 1920's, he was an avid radio listener, staying up late at night to receive distant stations with his battery powered receiver.

The land could not be farmed until the tree stumps and unwanted logs were removed. This was a major and on-going activity. Clearing land went on from the time that Hiram started developing the land in 1885, and continued till about World War II. By then, crops could be raised on most of the farm. Clearing land was hard work, and required as much power as possible to pull the stumps and roots from the ground. In about 1910 the Monty's obtained a steam donkey, which was made to pull logs, but it also, worked well to pull stumps. The donkey cables were arranged with blocks and tackle in a manner that mulitplied the pulling force to remove the stumps and other unwanted logs into piles to about 75 feet high, allowing them to dry before being burnt.

When the rich land was cleared, the Monty farm was very productive. There had been good planning, much hard work, and devotion, so the farm was never mortgaged. In 1918 they bought their first tractor, a front-wheel-drive Moline. The Moline was not very satisfactory. In 1930, they bought a McCormick-Deering 10-20 tractor. This was an excellent tractor and contributed greatly to the farm.

As time went on Hiram's sons, mainly Guy and Pete, operated the dairy farm which produced milk that met the Seattle milk standards.

The milk was picked up by truck daily and brough to Seattle. Monty Bros (the business name) milked 60 to 70 Jersey cows. Hiram helped some, and shared in the proceeds.

It must be said Hiram and Anna raised three upright citizens; George, Guy, and Pete. They were as honest as could be and always pulled their load. George had a ranch near his parents, and has three children—Geraldine, Ralph, and Deloris. Guy married and had two children, Bertram and Melvin. In 1926, Hiram was still living at home with his parents.

Hiram Monty died 11 August 1934 at Everett, Washington. During his lifetime Hiram was a member of the Dairymen's Association, the Co-op Creamery Association, road supervisor of the district, assisted in construction of the first school in Trafton in 1888, aided the organization of the Cicero school in 1892, and served on the school board for a number of years. Snohomish County numbers him among the prosperous agriculturalists—a highly esteemed progressive citizen.

Family Reunion 1993 Chambly QE

Three hundred years ago Jean Monty was born. With all due respect and honor to Jean Monty, a family reunion was held in Chambly, Québec, on September 5, 1993. He was a French soldier assigned to Fort Chambly in 1725. Jean married Marie Marthe Poyer. They had fourteen children. The people at the reunion, all descendants and kin of Jean, included my daughter Debbie and myself.

The Montys met at Fort Chambly, where we all were issued color-coded name badges, indicating which one of Jean's children was our ancestor. Debbie's and mine were pink, indicating that we were descendants of Francois. In a matter of minutes, Paul and Karen Harrison, also wearing pink badges, spotted us. They are

from El Segundo, CA. His mother, Betty, was a Monty, granddaughter of George Barnes Monty. George was brother of my grandfather Hiram. George Barnes Monty lived in Tacoma, and operated a hardware and gun store. His son George Rank Monty moved, with his family to California. Their daughter, Betty, married Paul Harrison. They were the parents of the Paul Harrison, Debbie and I met at the reunion. Paul and Karen did not know that there was a Hiram Monty family in Washington State. We knew of George Barnes Monty and his son, George Rank Monty, when they lived in Tacoma.

At the beginning of the tour at Fort Chambly, we were given a brief history and background of the fort. One group spoke English, and the other group spoke French. The French group was twice as large as the English group. Many of the French group wore yellow badges, indicating that they were descendants of Gaspard Monty. The Gaspard descendants live in Canada, in or about Montreal. The second largest group were Clement's descendants. They live in Connecticut and eastern United States. Other pink-badged descendants were from New York, Wisconsin, and other mid-western states. We were informed that Francois Monty, our ancestor, had gone to New York and joined the Revolutionary Forces. Francois became a First Lieutenant. He was injured in battle. When he settled in Chazy, New York, he received a land grant and a pension from the war.

Fort Chambly and the history that it represented was very interesting. The original fort was built of wood in 1665, to mange the traffic on the Richelieu River, and mount expeditions against the Iroquois Indians. A later fort was built of stone in 1711. Water from Lake Champlain flows north to the St Lawrence River by way of the Richelieu River. Forts, such as Chambly, located at critical points along the Richelieu (such as at rapids, where Chambly is located), could determine who could use the river.

In the afternoon we relocated to the Monty

There were 225 Montys, including pouses, and uncounted children, that enjoyed a lunch. A tree was planted on behalf of the reunion. Debbie obtained a copy of the Monty Family Coat of Arms. We continued reviewing Monty family genealogy. I had hoped to obtain more details, particularly on the Lewis and Harriet Monty family, parents of Hiram.

At the reunion Debbie and I met Mary Monty Manchester of Plattsburgh, New York, who also wore a pink badge. We made arrangements to meet Mary in Plattsburgh on the following day. She pointed out many Monty landmarks. We visited Monty Street in Plattsburgh, saw the Monty Street Elementary School*, one of the two Monty Roads north of the city, and Monty's Bay on Lake Champlain. Mary is very knowledgeable of Monty history in North America. She overwhelmed us with information.

Louise Monty Demers, of Montreal, was chairperson of the committee that provided a well planned, event-filled, and enjoyable family reunion. I, also, would like to show my appreciation to all the people that helped me put this information together. I am grateful to Dawn Miller for her research which discovered a key document, the request by "Halo Hibbard to the Pension Department," which established the family tree from Lewis, Hiram's father to Lt. Francois, son of Jean Monty.

Since returning home, using the US census records, I have been able to reconstruct the Lewis family Members. With information from the 1850, 1860, 1870 New York, and the 1880 Michigan censuses, I was able to determine the Lewis Monty family with a degree of confidence.

Guidelines for Genealogical Field Work

There is no right way to do genealogy Preparation for research falls into four categories: research and compiling records in your own home—40% of work; collecting data at the family history society—30%; correspondence—20%; field work—10%. To do good field work, do good homework before you ever leave the house. This [talk] is about field work in Ulster/Northern Ireland with a few words about England Suggestions are given for careful preparation for a field trip, then some experience on such a trip with consideration of costs, suggested method of affording your collected results in a simple but meaningful manner. That is what I call the family tree of notations.



- ✓ do have a cousin who did family research in an appropriate and timely manner.
- do have an earlier ancestor who compiled material in a book that comes up to and includes your mother.
- ✓ put your materiel on charts reduce the size of the charts reduce again to make carry around copies. Always carry copies not originals.
- keep your papers in a notebook or on a clip board; keep your notes chronological as you go so they will be in order when you get home. Staple sets together.
- ✓ when you get where you want to be, do a lot of walking because that is what your forefathers did. Wear good shoes!
- ✓ do join a genealogy society and attend seminars in genealogy.
- ✓ follow lines of trade. People don't just live in one place or another for fun, they had to work. Commercial aspects of life are the reasons people move around.
- ✓ travel light.



- ✓ do not begin genealogy after all your elderly relatives are no longer available for consultation.
- ✓ do not think you can remember everything "in your head." Keep careful records; you aren't going to remember it if you don't write it down.
- ✓ do not carry books—they are heavy.
- ✓ don't forget to keep a log of addresses and phone numbers.
- ✓ do not underestimate the importance of planning for your trip.
- don't hesitate to travel alone if you can. There is nothing worse than doing genealogy with someone who doesn't have the slightest interest. If you have to take them, lose them!
- do not stay with friends and relatives if your time is tightly budgeted — they want you to spend some time with them. It puts a crimp in genealogy.



Be organized. Get a good travel agent to get the travel bargains. A good travel agent can often get you to where you want to go at very little added cost.



Buy a pork pie and a can of beer and go to the park and have your lunch. Pub lunches are also reasonable and a good place to meet locals.



Stay at bed and breakfasts. For about \$25 a night you can get a nice place with a full breakfast.



There are many, many places in Britain where you can get special rates if you are over 60—for travel, hotels, and other attractions. London hotels can be expensive, but around stations of Paddington, Victoria, Waterloo you can often get something reasonable. Look for square notices with the

letter "#"— this means information. Go in and tell them what you need for bed and breakfast, what you what to pay, etc. and they will get you booked for a very small charge (\$2.00 or so). Always carry a little trolley for your bags and you can go anywhere except railway stations, which have stairs.

Look for travel bargains. The rail is very cheap in Britain, especially during the month of October. Look into buying a BritRail pass before you leave the States. Miss the high season, which is the summer!

Early History and Genealogy of The Filion Family

The name Filion/Fillion/Phillion/Phillion originated from the St Germain l'au Xerrios of Paris, or the Island of France, a part of the department of the Seine. It is from here we can follow the descendants of Andre Filion and Gabrielle Sienler.

Andre and Gabrielle had two sons who left France for a new life in Québec, New France. First to leave was Michel who was Royal Notary. He arrived in Québec around 166?. He is followed two years later by his brother Antoine, a mâitre boiler by trade. Antoine arrived with his wife, Anne D'Anneville, married in Paris in 1656, and a son, Pierre. They lived within the Ramparts of the Town of Québec. The census of 1667 lists Antoine as 31, Anne as 20, and Pierre as 10 years of age. An interesting note here is that Anne's mother and sister, also came to Québec, with the "Kings Girls. They were married within five weeks of their arrival, on July 27, 1665, fulfilling their contract.

The first child born to Antoine and Anne was Jeanne, born and baptized at St. Jean-du-Perrot. It is believed she died shortly after birth. Their second child, Jean, was born 31 Oct 1667 and baptized 1 Nov 1667, at Notre Dame Church of Québec. The Godparents were Jean Soulart and Françoise Hebert. An interesting note—Françoise is the daughter of Guillaume Hebert, son of Louis Hebert of France, and the first Colonist of Canada.

On October 18, 1666 Antoine and Anne purchased a piece of property on the Seignory of St. Ignatius, Québec. There is no further mention of Antoine and Pierre following the birth of Jean. It is believed that Antoine and Pierre may have been killed by the Iroquois while living in the area as habitants. We learn, that later, in November of 1669, Anne is remarried to Jean Charon.

The only surviving child of Antoine and Anne, Jean, is found in the census of 1681, residing with his Uncle Michel, the Royal Notary.

Notes On School District 13

Township of Chesterfield and Wilsboro, Essex County, New York

By Koert Burnham #6

[These records were compiled by Koert, our late friend and fellow enthusiast in genealogy and history, in January of 1981 at his home, Highland, Keeseville NY.]

The actual record books of School Districts furnish much [information of] demographic, historical, and genealogical value. Here in Essex County, New York they were passed on to succeeding trustees and often were lost or de-

stroyed. When schools were centralized, little effort was made to obtain and

preserve these records.

Oliver A. Wolcot, an attorney of Keeseville, NY, and also District Superintendent of Schools, became my father-in-law. My father, John B. Burnham, owned several parcels of land on which he paid taxes in this district, roughly half in each township. Wolcot believed that centralization benefited the students.

He was responsible for the amalgamation of several districts to form the first Keeseville Central School. My family actively helped this fine gentleman. At the time of the final vote, a provision was made allowing the school payers to withdraw that part of the District of Willsboro, if they so voted at any further time. The location of this document is unknown and the minutes of the last meeting are not in the record book. This book was inherited by a descendant of the last trustee, who loaned it to a neighbor, who, in turn, loaned it to me for a day. Copies should be made available to researchers. My hasty notes come later.

The first school house was on the west side of Highlands Road Essex County Route 28), on the curve where the road is nearest the railroad at Port Kendall, in the 80-acre Adgate Patent of

1792. Population increases were near Warm and Hadly Ponds. After a squabble, a large frame building was erected on the Boyd 300-acre Patent overlooking Warm Pond, now known as Highland Forge Lake. It is about 150 yards

and store. Our farmer and ex-stage driver, Henry Elliot, may have been exaggerating when he told me that at the height of the local iron boom it housed 100 pupils. It is plainly shown on the map of Essex County, 1850, sheet 2, by J H French. Elliot's word and an article by Margorie Lansing Porter give a little more data on this short-lived school which may have been

supported by contributions rather than by taxes.

On November 15, 1860, Albert G. Forbes deeded land in the Peru Bay Tract, Lot 129 to Elihu Higby, as trustee of District 13 (Book of Deeds XX, page 387). When abandoned it reverted to the owners of the surrounding land. It is now a storehouse for Highland Forests, a General Partnership. Many of the prosperous Higby family have long since moved away.

Notes from the District Record Books

7 Aug 1834* Notice from the Commissioners of Common Schools of the Town of Chesterfield to Mr Alfred Fling to organize a school district on the 16th of August 1834. District #13 to comprise Lots 129, 127, Agate 80 acre, Lots

128 & 113 PBT and Lot 7 of Thorn's Survey of Norman Rowe's land.

16 Aug 1832* First Meeting To meet at Higby's house at 10:00 AM to organize this, dated 7 Aug 1832, signed H N Peabody School? on the 16th Alfred Fling Chairman, Wm D Rout Secretary, Elihu Higby Clerk, and Sylvester Rowe, John Warren, and Alfred Fling Trustees, and Gidian King Collector. The school house shall be in the SE corner of Levi Higby's pasture E of his barn near the ledge of rock. It shall be 20' X 22". E. Higby, A. Fling, and John Warren = Building Committee. Adjourned 2:00 pm.

27 Sept 1834 Second meeting Released Alfred Fling as treasurer and replaced him with Samuel Phelps. Voted to start school 1 Oct 1834

(Note: a small book—not available—contained minutes from 15 Nov 1834 thru 13 Sept 1841.)

1 Jan 1840 Report: School ran seven and one-half months yearly. Teacher's annual salary seems to have been \$35.62, of which \$13.32 came from the Commissions of Common Schools. A library had been formed in the school, with Levi Higby librarian. Elihu Higby was District Clerk. Thirty-two children from 12 families were taught: W D Rowe, four; Eilhu Higby, two; Francis Swinger(?), two; Widow (Mrs. Chester) Taylor, one; Leonard Misener, three; Loton Wilson, one; Alanson Higby, three; Albert G. Forbes, three; Thomas Cord, two; Levis Greeno?, five; Elphalet Beardsley, five; Chancy Wright, one;

Sept 1841 Report: Thirty children between the ages of 5 and 16 attended school. Rowe now had five; A. Higby, two; Derius Burns, one and Oliver Babcock, four. Lost were Misener, Wilson, and Wright. Trustees were Levi Higby, Reuben King (?) and Oliver Babcock.

18 Sept 1841 Wm D Rowe, Alanson Higby, and Martin E Lyon were the Trustees. Parents of each scholar were required to furnish 1/4 cord of fire wood each year.

18 Sept 1842 Annual meeting - Trustees for the ensuing year were Obed Taylor (son of Chestor, his mother Lucy signed with an X as

had Obed Taylor - [it seems that Obed was both a student and a trustee]), Martin E. Lyon, and Wm D Rowe. A special tax of \$1.37 [was] voted for school repairs which consisted of: 25¢ for glass, 25¢ for wire, 25¢ for plastering, 56¢ for an elbow, and 6¢ for putty. The 1/4 cord of wood each parent or guardian had to furnish for each child must be fitted to the stove.

1 Jan 1843 New Parents are James Turnbull, Lucy Taylor, Christopher Saxon, and Abraham Layloe (?), each with one child. Thirty children now attended District 13.

1843 No report was sent to E. Higby to be recorded.

16 Sept 1843 New Trustee are Jarvis Rand and Nelson Blinn, each for two years. Adjourned to 9 Sept 1844

1 Jan 1844 For a couple of years the school term was 6 months and 12 days. Twenty seven children between the ages of 5 and 16 attended school. New parents are Edward Longware, John Perry, Jacob Leach, Ephraim Rand, Widow Lyon, Joseph Debores (?), each with one child, and Charles Royal with two children.

1844 Forgotten was the correct date of the annual meeting, therefore it was simply held in October or November. School ran for 5 months and 18 1/2 days.

1 Jan 1845 Twenty-one children between the ages of 5 and 16 attended District 13. Wm Rowe now has three children, Lucy Leach, one, and Widow Lyn (Linn, Lyon?) has three.

1 Jan 1846 Dated at Port Kendall. Thirty one children are now attending school. Wm Rowe now have five, Widow Lyn has two. New families are Geo. Drazy four children, Ambroise Crop with three, Stephen Morlly (?), and John Abott, each two, and Nehemiah Floyd with one child. There are 86 books in the school Library.

5 Oct 1846 Nelson Blinn has removed. Ephram Rand and Alanson Higby elected. Jarvis Rand is sometimes the meeting "moderator" and sometimes a Trustee. There are 32 children in the district, of whom 18 attended less than two months, and fourteen for two to four months. Some of the parents listed are: Wm Nailor(?),

James Turnbull, Obed Taylor, Nehemiah Floyd, Jacob Leach, and Martin C Lyon each with one child.

28 Feb 1848 John Abbott is Moderator, Alanson Higby is Clerk, Wallace Abbott is Collector, and Barnard Rand and Obed Taylor are Tellers. School ran for 4 months and two days. At this time new parents or guardians are: Seth Bull with two children and John Barry with four. Widow Lyn was Margaret Lin, with three children. Levi Higby was "exonerated" from the office of Trustee. This year the teacher is a male.

5 Dec 1849 James A Bosworth (is believed to live and run the store and post office just north of the outlet of Warm Pond in the 300 acre lot: he is also believed to be the son of Alva, who had the first tavern owned in Frederick Knight, at the intersection of Route 9 and Mace Chasm Road), is Trustee. Oliver Barchume is Librarian. Thirty-five children were taught, of whom 12 attended for less than two months, 16 attended for two to four months, and four for four to six months. Thirty-eight children resided in the district. New parents were: Joseph Thomas, Syrenac Barrel, Alexander Bueley, Jarvis and Ephraim Rand all each had one child in school; Akin Lavarncy and John Barrel each had three: George Diazy and Thormus (?) Bruley each had four; and Henry Lado had five.

1850 Joseph Thomas is Trustee. School ran for four months with a female teacher. There were 36 pupils of whom 23 attended for less than two months.

1 Jan 1851 James D Turnbull is moderator. Thirty-five pupils attended school, of whom seven attended for less than two months, 18 for two to four months, and ten for four to six months. Forty-two children were in the District, so seven did not attend school at any time that year. New parents were Thomas Ragan (?) with three children and Joseph Perkins with six.

4 Oct 185[2] Caleb C Finch is Collector. A three month school year is voted. The teacher is a male. For the first time the wood for the stove is paid for by taxes.

1852 The School District now owned 111 books. Twenty-nine students were taught, of whom nine attended for less than two months. Thirty-two children were in the district. New parents were Peter Barrell and John Bishop, each with one child.

4 Oct 1853 H S (?) Morhous was elected Trustee in place of the removed J D Turnbull. Wm Munsel (?) was elected Trustee for three years. Obed Taylor was the Collector. Wm Munsel is removed from office. Thirty-three children attended school, of this number 22 attended for less than two months and 11 for less than four. New parents were: John Fowler with one child, Herman Hart and Henry S Morhous with two, and Henry Bowen and Wm Munsel each with three. Obed Taylor now had four children attending school.

9 Oct 1854 Henry S. Morhous had removed. If a male teacher is hired school will run for three months, if a female teacher is hired the term will be four months. Matthew Babcock is moderator. Thirty-two children attended school. Ira Fuller is a new resident with four children. Jacob Leach now has four children and James Rand has three.

18 Aug 1855 School is to run for four months between 18 August and 1 January 1856. It was voted to tax the lot known as #______PBT belonging to A C Forbes and Lot_____ in Thorn owned by Joseph Thomas. (Note: A guess is that the Forbes land was in Boyd Patent and our house).

1 Jan 1856 This report calls attention to the fact that the school was built in 1834, and is in "comfortable" shape. Twenty-two children are in the district, of whom ten attended school less than two months (24 days), ten less than four months, and two attended for four to six months. It was suggested that District 13 and District 11, part in Chesterfield and part in Willsborough are very small and poor as to pecuniary means, that if they could quietly be united it would be of mutual benefit. The parents in the district were: Yeph (?) Lena and Stephen Layow each with five children, Jacob

Leach and Ira Fuller with four, Jarvis Rand and Obed Taylor with three each, Elihu Higby and I evi Higby each had two children, and Oliver Barchum had one child.

Oct 1856 Warren Smith was elected to a three-year term as Trustee. James Rand was elected for one year as Collector. For some years they had been back to old system of for each child the parent paid part of the tax with stove wood. School an for seven months in 1856. Mary F Higby taught from 7 January to 31 March, Mary I Norton taught for three months, and Kate Owen taught for the month of December. Sixteen children attended school for varying lengths of time. New Parents were: Oscar Abbott with one child and Stephen Allen with five.

6 Oct 1857 It was voted to have no school this fall and six months "next summer." There were only nineteen children in the district. School ran for five months in 1857. The teachers were: Kate Owens from 3 Dec 1856 to March 1857, at \$2.50 per week and Harriett H Rowe from 1 June 1857 for three months for \$1.50 per week. School closed 1 September. Attendance, for 1857, was 14 students attended of the 19 qualifying. The Widow Higby had one child.

11 Oct 1857 Suddenly there are 45 children of school age in the district. They are as follows: John Mussen, six; Joseph Detuay, Charles Tromble, Richmond Hathaway, and Barney Snow, each four; Nehemiah Floyd had three; Widow Missner (?), Oscar Abbott, Jarvis Rand, and Elihu Higby each had two; Oliver Barchum and Widow Levi Higby each had one; from the Willsborough area A G Forbes had five; George Elliott, four; and Ephram Rand, one.

John Mussen was elected Clerk. The teachers were Linnetta Freeshay (?), Mary Jane _____, and Fanny Thrall. Thirty-seven children attended, of those, twelve attended for less than two months and two for less than four months.

5 Oct 1860 Listed from Willsborough are: Barney, Geo. Eliott, A G Forbes, Philip Mussen, and Ephram Rand. By 30 Sept 1860 there were 50 children attending school. The teachers were Edsall Collins, Adelia Adgate, and Harriette Lake.

John Mussen from Chesterfield had six children and Philip Mussen from Willsboro had six. On 5 Oct 1860 there were 51 children in school.

Abbott is District Clerk, Elihu Higby is Trustee, Ephraim Rand is Librarian, and Oliver Barchume is Collector. It was voted to build a new school house by taking down the two old houses as far as they will go. It was to be located on the hill SE from the Beardsley sawmill. It is to be the same size as the old one by the lake, except it will be 8 feet between floors, and a stoop is to added. It is to be built by 1 January 1861.

22 Oct 1861 The cost of the new school (a wood building) was \$169.32. For the year 1 Oct 1860 to 30 Sept 1861 school will run for six months. The teachers are to be Miss Eliza Forbes and Lunena Beach. Forty nine students attended, of whom 32 attended for less than two months, etc. New parents are: Simon Rain/Bain with four children and George Elliott with three, both from Willsborough; and Henry Smith with four, Willard Mastick, two and Newell Breakenridge with one child, all from Chesterfield. For the year ending 30 Sept 1862, 65 students attended school from ages four to twenty one. School ran for six and one-half months. The teachers were Henry M Higby from 25 Nov 1861 to 11 Mar 1862, and Fannie L Thrall from 12 May 1862 to 26 Sept 1862.

11 Oct 1864 Philip Mussen is Clerk; John Mussen, Trustee; Alferton Leach, Collector; and Oliver Babcock, Librarian. School ran for four months with a female teacher.

10 Oct 1865 Annual meeting. The Librarian was Jacob Leach.

6 Oct 1866 R C Forbes is to furnish wood at \$10 for three months.

8 Oct 1867 Meeting was called to order by H H Leach, District Clerk.

12 Oct 1867 A G Forbes was Moderator, H

C Forbes, Clerk, B F Babcock, Treasure, and J W Mussen, Collector.

- 11 Oct 1870 H C Forbes furnished the wood for the school for \$13, 25.
- 10 Oct 1871 Oscar Boen is Clerk, Wm Fountain is Collector, E O Abbott is Librarian. BFBabcock is to furnish the stove wood at a cost of \$14.62 1/2.
- 8 Oct 1872 A G Forbes is elected Clerk, John Mussen Trustee, Michael Floyd was chosen Collector, but was excused for Daniel Rand. Mrs. Elihu Higby is Librarian. It was voted that school would run three months in the winter and three months in the summer.
- 18 Oct 1873 Public money received \$99.73, raised by taxes 45.27, for fires 12.35 (A Mussen), Total received 157.35 Paid Teachers 140.00.
- 13 Oct 1873 Maryette Higby is Librarian and W H Leach is Trustee.
- 13 Oct 1874 Fred Mussen furnished wood at \$15.20.
- 10 Oct 1876 George Fuller is a Teller. Philip Mussen furnished the wood for \$12.25.
- 9 Oct 1877 Franklin P Mussen is Trustee. John Mussen furnished wood at \$12.00 for one vear.

7 Oct 1878 H H Lewis is Teller. It was voted that school would consist of 18 weeks in winter and ten weeks in the summer. Philip is to supply the wood for \$8. 25. F P Mussen will repair the school for \$7.75. P. Mussen will build a woodshed for \$19.75 and a privy for \$11.87 1/2. Henry H Lewis and John Mussen are the committee to check on work.

Oct 1879 Franklin B Babcock is Collector. It was voted the 28 weeks of school be continuous except for two weeks vacation as directed by the Trustee. Wood is to furnished by Frank P Mussen at \$13.90. Henry H Lewis is District Clerk.

12 Oct 1880 Back to winter and summer schedule.

1881 - 1882 Page cut from book.

13 Oct 1883 John Hoffnagle is Chairman. Wood is to furnished by Abbot Tromblee for \$14.50.

20 Aug 1884 F W Law is Librarian. It was voted to put an ash or oak tub, with hinged cover, on spring.

25 Aug 1885 F W Law is Trustee. John Haragan is Librarian. Philip Mussen is to furnish the wood for \$7.00.

10 Aug 1886 "Wood struck off to the lowest bidder, James Mussen, being the lucky man—\$7.89."

28 Aug 1888 Frank Pelky will furnish the wood. No figure was given.

as sole Trustee Certified that Frank Babcock refused to call a special meeting and thereby forfeited his office as Clerk, and also certified that Fred P Mussen refused to collect the school tax or to give bonds the 6th day of Dec 1888, and he appointed Frank Pelky as Collector. These last two items occurred 27 Oct 1888 and 17 Dec 1888. Then in appeal Fred Mussen vs. James M Mussen sole Trustee, District 13 before State of NY Department of Public Instructors. It was ordered, 8 Jan 1889 by State Department of Public Instructors that everything be held up pending investigation.

6 Aug 1889 Franklin Babcock is Chairman; Kate Mussen, Clerk; Franklin Babcock, Collector; Fred Mussen, Trustee; and Mrs Betsey Babcock, Librarian. The wood was furnished by John Murphy for \$10.00. It was voted to pay James Mussen \$25.00, the cost of defense of appeal by Fred Mussen. Fred Mussen is to buy shingles and nails, the taxpayers will then put on the new school roof before school starts. Kate Mussen is Clerk.

5 Aug 1890 John Murphy is to furnish the wood for the school for \$11.50.

4 Aug 1891 New floor, seat and desks. Old ones sold.

2 Aug 1892 Frank Tromblee furnished the wood for one year for \$8.00.

Aug 1893 Elected as Trustee is John Marfuley (?); John A Toomey, Clerk; and David Martin, Collector. Levi Teelyea is to supply the wood, for one year, for \$9.40.

7 Aug 1894 Elected as Trustee is George Hathaway; Collector, Frank P Mussen; and John A Toomey, Clerk.

- 6 Aug 1895 Levi Teelyea will supply the wood for \$5.00.
- 9 Aug 1896 George Hathaway will supply the wood for \$8.50.
- **3 Aug** 1897 Fred Mussen is Trustee. Voted to "rase" \$145. Will Michel is to supply the wood for one year at \$6.75.
- 2 Aug 1898 William Mitchell was elected Chairman.
- 4 Aug 1899 Levi Tyllia was elected Collector. Chalk and broom was purchased for \$40.00. School is to start 1 Sept 1899.
- 8 Aug 1901 Leon J Mussen was elected Clerk. Two and one-half cords of hard and soft, good dry wood, fitted for the stove is to furnished by Frank Mussen for \$10.
- 3 Mar 1902 Special meeting. Voted O.K. for Trustee, Frank P Mussen, to hire his daughter, Louisa Mussen, to teach for \$7.00 per week. Carried. No list of votes.

Aug 1904 William Murphy was elected Chairman; George Hathaway, Trustee; Frank Mussen, Clerk; and Levi Teelyea, Collector.

1 Aug 1905 Wm Johnpeer is elected Chairman; Peter N Johnpeer, Clerk; Frank Mussen, Clerk; and Ernest Mussen is to furnish the wood.

7 Aug 1906 Henry Elliott is elected Chairman. E L Stevens was the Clerk of the meeting.

- 6 Aug 1907 Elected was E L Stevens as meeting Chairman. Harry Stevens is Clerk. It was voted that the library be kept at school. Up to now, it seems to have been kept at Librarians house, or that of the Trustee's.
- 4 Aug 1908 E L Stevens was elected Chairman; Peter Johnpeer, Collector; and Harry C Stevens, Clerk. Robert Halen was hired to clean school house, closets, spring, school yard, and to black the stove and pipe, all for \$3.75.
 - 5 Aug 1909 H C Stevens was elected Clerk.
- 2 May 1911 John A Toomey is to be Clerk of the District.

6 May 1913 Elected was Wm Murphy, Trustee; Fred P Mussen, Collector; and Richard Tromblee, Clerk. (Note: He wrote well and signed with 2 e's). One door with lock, one door no lock, two book case doors, and repairs — "sealing" cost \$19.00.

May 1914 Richard Tromblee (Trustee) is hired to paint the entire interior and windows for \$8.00, clean the school, yard and spring for \$4.00, and furnish four cords of hardwood, and one cord of slab wood for \$16.75. Frank Mussen will get \$1.00 to see work is well done. Wm Murphy is Clerk.

- 4 May 1915 Henry E Elliott was elected Trustee.
- 12 May 1915 Special meeting. Henry E Elliott resigned. Richard Tromblee was elected Trustee in his place.
- 9 May 1916 Fred Mussen was elected Trustee; Peter Johnpeer, Collector; and Francis D Johnpeer, District Clerk. Peter Johnpeer bought the old school house windows for \$1.95.
- 1 May 1917 Same as above part of the page cut off.
 - 4 June 1918 Part of the page cut off.
- 6 May 1919 Raise \$400. Wood goes up to \$7.00 per cord. Some years four cords are used.
- 4 May 1920 George H Oliver is elected Clerk; Frank Mussen, Chairman; Fred P Mussen, Trustee; and Hubert Toomy, Collector.
- 3 May 1921 George Oliver was elected Clerk. The rest of the officers were about the same.
- 3 July 1922 A special meeting was held for 12 Aug 1922.
- 2 May 1922 Hubert Toomy is Collector. Harvie Mussen as Trustee is to get \$10 for services.
- 6 May 1924 This is the last year of entries. Peter Johnpeer was elected Clerk, Fred Mussen was Chairman and Trustee, and Ernest Mussen was Collector. Willie Murphy got the job of supplying four cords of wood at the price of \$32.50.



The Willett / Willets Families of North America, A Comprehensive Guide by Albert James Willett, 451 Hallmark Rd., Fayetteville NC 28303-2615. Price to Lifeline readers \$40.00

There seems to have been six primary Willett lines (one of which became the Willets line in the 2nd or 3rd generation) who settled in America in the 1629-1670 period, each independent of the other, and with no known common English ancestor. So far, only one of these, Captain Thomas Willett of Plymouth, has been connected with his English ancestors. The others still have no definite connections in the Old World. Although 44 Willetts are known to be immigrants, other Willetts can be assumed to be immigrants, but they have not been found in land grants, ship lists, or other documents.

The Willett Families of North America, A Comprehensive Guide traces these lines to the present. It requires nearly 600 pages to deal with the families who originally settled in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Amsterdam (New York), New Jersey, and Maryland. An additional 440 pages is devoted entirely to the south and west, and to Canadian Willett families. Nova Scotia and Québec have been particularly well recorded as descendents of Loyalist Americans. Very little has ever been published on the Virginia, North Carolina, Geor-

gia, Alabama, and Louisiana families. Numerous Willetts immigrated to Virginia in the Colonial Period, but only two are known to have left descendents. The Virginia and North Carolina lines represent original research by the author, and this is the first time they have appeared in print.

The Willett family in Brunswick County, North Carolina, are descended from Hope Willets of Cape May, New Jersey. Theirs is an interesting family in that they sent five sons to the Civil War on the same day; only one came back. What a heavy price to pay!

The Willett Families... is compiled from four sources. One source is from previously published material: Booksaver, 1907 covering all Willett families: Bartlett or Donnelly, covering one branch or line; the numerous "favor" biographies of the last century; also, many previously unpublished published typescripts have been located going back to 1927, these have been studied and footnoted. The second source is an extensive reference to the 1850 census record (about 50% of the census records have been referred to). Third is the data gleaned from an extensive correspondence with nearly 250 Willett descendents. Lastly, is the original research by the author of the primary source records for the Virginia, North Carolina, and Georgia Willett families.

This book, of nearly 1040 pages, and 26 chapters, and bound in two hard-cover volumes is truly a comprehensive resource. The index has 15,592 names. It is only the second book ever printed to deal with all the Willett/Willets families; the first, Booksaver, 1907. Anyone with a Willett ancestor can be confident that these volumes will guide them to previously published sources. The only sources better are the primary records (deeds, wills, etc.) to be found only in the individual county court houses.

Willetts walked in Puritan Plymouth and colonial Jamestown. One was beheaded by Indians in King Philips War. Willetts fought on both sides of the Revolutionary and Civil Wars; Willetts have been judges, college presidents, and even millionaires, but mostly, they have been the poor pioneers at the edge of civilization and the farmers who followed the pioneers. They are that multitude who receive scant mention in history, but are the fiber from which a nation is made. This is their genealogical story. The author hopes that these two volumes will help preserve their memory and foster an interest in a shared surname.

There is no general genealogical information in these volumes, only specific, detailed, footnoted information about the Willett families.

[Editor's note We know Jim Willett from his articles in *Lifelines*. News from Jim is that he has more genealogy works in the process, in both book form and articles. We look forward to his newest endeavors.]

This work covers all the Willets of Upper Canada and their descendents that can be found (and were allowed to publish).

There seem to be four main groups in

Ontario. The first two families, David and Catherine (Drake) Willets, and Charles Henry and Mary Ann (Manny) Willets, are from the same source, Richard Willets. The third, is the family of Edward Willets who came direct from England to Alliston, about 1906. The fourth group, is composed of the descendents of Henry and Arthur Willits who came over from England about 1900 as boys, to work on farms near Oshawa.

Resources used by the author in writing this book are: The Willett Families of North America, 1982, the Willett Family of Maryland by Sister Mary Louise Donnelly, Willett Family by Ted Lawrence Bartlett (out of print), and the works of J E Booksaver, not available in Canada.

This book has not only genealogies, but many biographies, and also, many pictures of both individuals and families.

Eustache Prevost was the son of Isaac Prevost & Jeanne Sautil, from Ste Madeleine-de-La-Bouille, Rouen, in Normandie, France. He died in Montreal 26 March 1730 at the age, they say, of 96 yeaars old. Thus, he would have been born ca. 1634. The 1681 Census, however, shows him in Contrecoeur, Qc. and that he was 35 years old, giving him a birth date of 1646. So we have to place his birth between 1634-1646, give or take. Eustache came to Nouvelle-France

(Canada) as a soldier, in the Lamothe Company of the Carignan Regiment. This family became a prominent family in Canada with many in the family becoming doctors, attorneys, members of Parliment, etc. This family was called *The Lions of the North*. M Elisabeth Guertin was the daughter of Louis Guertin and Elisabeth Camus. She died 21 March 1714 in Montreal, they had seven children of which only five lived to marry. 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We encourage our members to submit articles concerning family history and/or data, stories bearing on genealogical pursuits, and problems or unusual happenings in their search for family genealogy. When you submit an article please also give your membership number (this is appreciated in any of your correspondence with the Society). The article should be typed or printed double space if practicable.

If you submit an article that has been written on a computer, please also submit a floppy disc (Apple II, IBM-MSDOS, or Macintosh can be read; 3.5 in. disks please). In addition, label the disk with your name, member #, article title, and type of system & software used.

Since we are using a Macintosh computer to format our Journal, all articles must be keyed — if you use a computer but do not send us a disc, we must re-key the entire article. Sending a disc with your hard-copy saves us much valuable time. Also, efforts to format articles using the spacebar rather than setting tabs can result in additional work; learn to format using your software's built-in features, i.e. tabs.

Additionally, the Journal now makes use of a scanner to enter photographs, line drawings, sketches, and other graphics such as cemetery maps. Black or red ink on white paper is preferred for scanning; blue ink is a diaster! Size of graphic materials should be less than 8 inches wide and less than 10 inches high.

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
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
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
