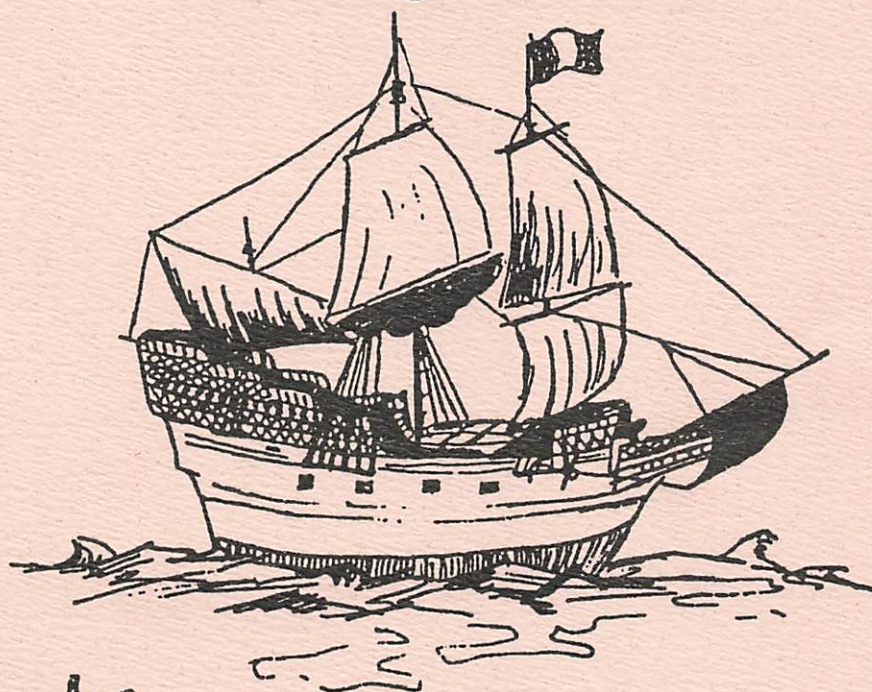

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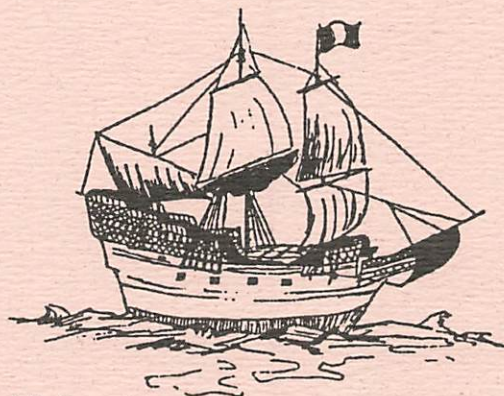
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PRESIDENT'S LETTER

The Frechette of Canada and the United States

Their ancestors came from France to New-France, now the Province of Quebec. The original family name was Frichtet or Frechet. The name changed from Frichtet, Frechet, Freschet, Frichette to Frechette.

The first to arrive in Quebec was Pierre Frichtet in 1653. Pierre, son of Jean Frichtet and Jacqueline Goyon of Mazieres, diocese of Poitiers married Charlotte Godin, daughter of Elie Godin and Esther Ramage, 9 November 1671, in the parish of Ste-Anne-de-Beaupre, Montmorency County. They had no progenitor.

The second, was Francois Freschet, who arrived in 1677, from St-Martin, Ile-de-Re, diocese de La Rochelle, province of Aunis, now Charente-Maritime. Francois, son of Etienne Freschet and Marie Belin, married Anne Lereau, daughter of Simon Lereau and Suzanne Jaroussel, 18 January 1680, in the parish of Ste-Famille, Ile d'Orleans, Montmorency County. More than 65% of Frechettes descend from Francois and Anne Lereau.

The third to arrive was Jacques Frichtet in 1697. Jacques Frichtet dit Desmoulins, son of Jacques Frichtet and Louise Gaye of Saint-Hilaire du Bourg DeBrie, Poitiers married Marie-Francoise Sarrazin, daughter of Nicolas Sarrazin and Marie-Catherine Blondeau, 11 January 1706, in the parish of St-Charles-Borromee, Charlesbourg. More than 12% of Frechettes descend from Jacques and M-Francoise Sarrazin.

There is a fourth line of Frechettes. Jean-Baptiste Secheret, son of Jacques Secheret and Louise Poirier of Gueures, Normandie married Charlotte Charron-Ducharme, daughter of Francois Charron-Ducharme and Marguerite Piet, 27 June 1734, in the parish of La Visitation, St-Francois-du-Lac, Yamaska County. Jean-Baptiste

became a widower and married Marie-Agathe Lahaise, daughter of Jean-Baptiste Lahaise and Jeanne Guilbert dit Laframboise, circa 1748, in the parish of Rivieres-des-Prairies. When the children of both marriages of Jean-Baptiste married, they all adopted the patronym Frechette. About 17% of the Frechettes descend from Jean-Baptiste and his two wives.

There is a fifth line of Frechettes. Jean Cote and Anne Martin married, 17 November 1635, in the parish of Notre-Dame of Quebec. Their fifth descendant, Jean-Baptiste-Augustin Cote, married Madeleine Bergeron, 6 June 1763, in the parish of St-Antoine-de-Tilly, Lotbiniere County. Jean-Baptiste-Augustin Cote died in 1776, leaving three sons and a daughter, aged from seven to thirteen years. Madeleine Bergeron needed someone to support her family married Francois Frechette, a bachelor, son of Jean-Baptiste Frechette and Ursule Rousseau, 27 January 1777, in St-Antoine-de-Tilly. Within less than two years Madeleine Bergeron, also died, leaving four orphans. Francois Frechette raised and educated these four children, Jean-Baptiste, Benoit, Joseph-Augustin, and Madeleine. In the community of St-Antoine-de-Tilly these children were called or known as Cote, Frechette of Cote dit Frechette, therefore the appellation *Cote dit Frechette* is found in some parish registers. Some of the descendants of these children took the name *Cote*, some *Cote dit Frechette*, and that eventually became *Frechette*. Today 5% of Frechettes descend from Jean-Baptiste-Augustin Cote and Madeleine Bergeron.

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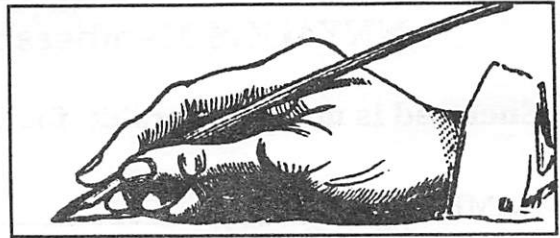
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Three Letters from Rachael Dickinson

In my capacity as Chazy Town Historian I found several letters written by Rachael Dickinson, born, 17 May 1808, and written early in the 1800's. Her mother died when she was five. The letters begin when Rachael is about 15 years of age. Her step-mothers were sickly so she had much of the work. She died at age 32, on 22 Dec 1840. She had married and left two daughters. Her last letter is dated less than a month before she died.

A brief history of the Dickinson family — Jeduthan Dickinson came from England and settled in Glastonbury, Connecticut. His son Thomas, born in 1776, later went from Connecticut to Queensbury, in Warrens County, near Glens Falls, New York. He married Sibyl Cummins. In 1806, they moved to Clinton County where they became permanent settlers. When they came to the Chazy area, they already had three sons: Hiram, born in 1798, Thomas, born in 1800, and Henry, born in 1802. Three more children were born here, Rachael, born in 1808. Her mother, Sibyl, died in 1813. Thomas married a second time, to Bertha Chapman. There were two more children, Warren and Frozilla, who died at age three. The mother of these two children died. Thomas then married for a third time, to Ida Crossett Stetson, widow of Robert Stetson. There were no children of this marriage.

The following are copies of three of the letters written by Rachael to her brother Hiram, who owned a business in Troy, NY.

Feb 1827

Dear Hiram,

Mother has not been able to do any work this four months and I have had to have the care of all the work, yet I am very contented as I consider it my duty to render Father's life agreeable as he is growing aged and has many things to perplex him.

Rachael

April 10, 1828

Dear Hiram,

Father and Henry have gone to bed, not very sick I believe but very much fatigued. They have got about a hundred and sixty logs into the river west of Mr. Lockwoods and are trying to float them down to Mr. Fassets mill west of Mrs. Chapmans

as there was no snow to draw them by land, but they have a tedious time of it and I expect every day when they will be sick and Thomas too.

Now as I have told you what the men are about perhaps you would like to know what I am doing, that is more difficult. I have such a variety of business, milking, making butter, cooking, washing, baking, and I am doing soap tomorrow if I have good luck; besides I am spinning yarn for a carpet. You need not wonder where I am going to put it for if I can't find any better place you shall have [it] to cover your shop floor, as I don't see much prospect of wanting one for any other use. I have almost come to the conclusion not to wait any longer for you to get married but come and see you as it is. I've been talking seriously of making you a visit this spring. It does not seem to be very convenient neither on account of you not having any home to receive visitors and of our not having anyone to see to business in my absence tho I expect we could hire someone as I should not calculate to make a long stay for if I were to go I must be home before the time of spinning wool and making cheese: I will say no more about it until I hear from you.

I have no news except Sally Stetson was married the 20th of February to Mr. Wolcott. He is formally from Massachusetts and intends to move there next fall. He has the appearance of being a very smart, agreeable man.

We have been very much troubled with wolves in the neighborhood. They are so bold they go into the barnyard and kill sheep and eat them there. They caught twelve for us beside a great many others. I believe I must begin to think of drawing to a close.

Perhaps you have forgotten again that I shall be twenty years old the 17th of May.

*Champlain,
Nov 24th 1840
Dear Brother;*

I have been trying to collect strength and ambition this number of days to show my gratitude for past kindnesses. For this last, the balsom, you may be sure I was much pleased as I had had no medicine for two or three months. I had seen it advertised but our folks think nothing has ever done me any good. Father even says so to me. My cough has got very distressing. It troubles me very much to breathe. I commenced taking opium that relieves me some. There was not a word said about trying to get anything for me till I finally told them it was hard to suffer so much and have nothing to take to give a little relief.

Henry says he did not know but I was following the Doctor's directions when I have not seen or employed him in three months.

I expect to have to stay here as long as I live.

Not withstanding all you have done for me I still have a great favor to ask of you. Should I be suddenly taken I wish you to see that this child has a home if her father does not provide for her and Huldah is willing. He promised me should I be taken away while we were separated that he should take care of them both as long as he lived but he writes so seldom that I don't know he is alive. The last I had was in Sept. Love to Huldah.

Mr. Boudet died a few days since. He dropped away without a struggle.

The Neverett Family of Clinton County

A request for information about John Neverett,* 1818-1900, and his wife Susan, 1817-1895, both of whom are buried at the St. Louis de France Cemetery in the hamlet of Sciota, Town of Chazy, has led to a fascinating search to learn more about this family with numerous descendants still living in Clinton County. Since the name seems to be uncommon, everyone in the United States bearing the name may very well descend from John and Susan.

Of French-Canadian origin, the family apparently used the Neverett spelling from the earliest settlement here, as John and Susan are found in the 1850 census in Mooers with their name spelled in this manner. But other Nineteenth Century records turn up various other spellings, one as late as 1900. I have found Nevet, Navert, Nevers, Neverts, Nevit, and Levert as variant spellings. Surprisingly, "Levert" may be the original name. Local descendants told me that, by family tradition, the name had also been "Levesque." But in 1851, when Joseph Neverett, son of John and Susan, was baptized at St. Joseph's Church in Coopersville, NY, the French priest recorded the name as "Levert," which means "Green" in French. At least two later church records at St. Joseph's also use this spelling. And, Tanguay's compilation of early settlers of French Canadians lists no one with any of the variant spellings of Neverett, but does list a family named Levert.

According to notes in the Chazy Town Historian's Office made by Nell Barnett Sullivan, John Neverett first settled in the Town of Champlain, next to the west boundary line between Champlain and Mooers, sometime after 1856. Actually, they were there before that date as they can be found in the 1850 census living in the Town of Mooers. Deeds in the Clinton County Clerk's Office show that John Nevet purchased land in Lot 9 of the Refugee Tract from Barney Wilson and Allen Angell in two separate transactions in 1862. He can also be found as John Nevit in the 1869 Beers Clinton County Atlas located in the south west corner of the Town of Champlain. Mrs. Sullivan said that later John Neverett pur-

chased an Angell farm in the town of Mooers, near the Chazy town line, and that he sold the Champlain farm to his son Joseph. I have the followed the deeds through to confirm this, and when Joseph died in 1900 — about five months before his father's death — he was living in Champlain.

*John Neverett — Neverett in the U. S., Levesque in Canada, m. Suzanne Nadeau.

The 1850 census for Mooers, NY lists John and Susan with four children:

All were born in New York, which would indicate that John and Susan had established a home in New York State, probably in Clinton County, by 1842. The family is also found in the 1870 census in Champlain, children at home were:

In the 1870 census the name is spelled "Neverts." I have not been able to locate them in the 1860 census.

John Neverett's wife, Susan, is listed in both the 1850 and 1870 census as having been born in New York, while John is reported as having been born in Canada. All references in St. Joseph's Church give her name as Suzanne Lavallee. Another source gives her name as Nadeau, which may be a "dit" name for Lavallee, although I have not found it listed as such. Further research is needed. The accelerated indexing system's index to the 1820 United States census of New York lists a *Joseph Lavalee* in Champlain; checking out this family would be a good starting point for finding Susan's ancestry.

*The name is Dagoon in the U.S., Ethier or Akey in Canada.

Missionary Motives: The Jesuits in New France

Descriptions of colonial New France always include accounts of the Jesuit mission to New France. Unfortunately, many of the accounts either do not address the Jesuits' purpose or attribute ulterior motives to the mission. However, the Jesuits, who were in New France for the purpose of saving souls, did not have any hidden motives.

The Society of Jesus was founded in 1540, by seven Spaniards to serve God for the salvation of souls.¹ In their Bull of Institution, the Jesuits were required by Pope Paul III to "nourish souls in Christian life and doctrine, to propagate the faith by preaching, ministering, and teaching, and to console the faithful by hearing confession." These instructions did not limit Jesuit activities.² However, although they engaged in other activities, the Jesuits focused on ministry, and on missionary works. In fact, for the Jesuits, spiritual identity was formed in large part by the centrality of personal missionary experience.³ Living in the New World among "savages", these men "identified closely with the apostles and martyrs of the early church."⁴

Soon after they came into existence, the Jesuits became active in the Catholic Reformation, which probably also made them suspect since they were advocating change. At the Council of Trent, three Jesuits occupied prominent places, and the Society of Jesus guided discussions.⁵ Besides helping to create the Catholic Church's plan for reform, the Jesuits also assisted with putting the plan formulated at Trent into practice. For this reason, the Jesuits are often associated with the Catholic Reformation.⁶ Believing the work of the Catholic Reformation essential, "their order conceived of their work as a world-wide assault upon heterodoxy, whether European Protestantism or a more exotic paganism."⁷ The Jesuits entered into work designed to save the souls of those whose beliefs were perceived as "pagan" or as damnable.

Missionary work focused the goals of wiping

out "paganism" and finding spiritual identity and salvation. In New France, the Jesuits could prove their loyalty to France while also achieving their ultimate goal of conversion of the natives. This Canadian mission was fundamental to the Jesuits.

In 1611, the Jesuit Fathers Pierre Biard and Enemond Massé arrived on the Newfoundland Banks.⁸ Two secular priests had preceded them and had baptized over one hundred Amerindians.⁹ Territorial disputes forced the Jesuits and the French out of Newfoundland in short order, though. The English had granted a Royal Charter to John Guy and a group of merchants from Bristol and London which gave them the right to settle along the coast of the Avalon Peninsula and to develop the resources of the area. Hoping for a permanent fishing settlement, the British were loathe to give up this land to the French occupying the northern parts of Newfoundland.¹⁰ In contrast, the French, led by Samuel de Champlain, had already moved to Quebec, leaving the Jesuits and French territory in Newfoundland unprotected. This allowed for the English dispersal of the Jesuits and the other French from the island in 1613.¹¹

In 1615, Champlain brought four Récollet friars to Quebec to begin a mission.¹² The Récollet order represented a "semicontemplative reform branch of the Franciscan order"¹³ and the first French order to come to New France and undertake a full-fledged mission. As the first missionaries in the St. Lawrence river valley, the Récollets found themselves in need of a missionary plan. Believing the Huron nation, both populous and sedentary, to be the best prospects for conversion, the Récollets focused their mission on the Huron and Montagnais.¹⁴ Although the Récollets acquired a rudimentary knowledge of the Huron and Montagnais languages, they believed that the Amerindians should learn French. The Récollets also believed, as did most Franciscans, that natives had to live among and like Europeans after conversion.¹⁵ Since the Récollets refused to live

among the unconverted Hurons, it was difficult to affect conversion.¹⁶ Combined with their failed efforts to promote trade with Amerindians, the distancing of the Récollets from the people they hoped to convert diminished their effectiveness as missionaries.¹⁷ Rather than regarding the Récollet missionaries as friends and community members, the Amerindians regarded them as shamans and malevolent sorcerers.¹⁸

Since they were having no success in the conversion of Amerindians and because of their difficulties with the trading company, the Récollets sent Father Piat to France in 1624 to find others to help them in their mission.¹⁹ The new Viceroy of New France, Henri de Levis, duc de Ventadour, who had a Jesuit confessor, used his own funds to send three Jesuits to Quebec one year later to assist the Récollets.²⁰ Through funding the Jesuits, Ventadour sent a group that could and did provide the mission in New France with more leverage at the centers of power in New France and in France (where many governmental officials and political elite had Jesuit confessors and patronized the order) and with more personnel.²¹

The combined effort of the Récollets and Jesuits did not last long, though. When Armand-Jean du Plessis, Cardinal Richelieu, became the chief of the royal council for Louis XIII, he began to strengthen the king's position in New France and in the world.²² Until Richelieu's rise, New France was little more than a series of fur trading posts. But, Richelieu gave at least the semblance of support to the colony through forming the Company of One Hundred Associates in 1627.²³ This Company, which was modeled on the British East India Company, was meant to control and sustain colonists while encouraging positive measures for settlement.²⁴ However, the Company did not truly succeed in the settlement of New France. And, after English intervention in New France, the Jesuits and Récollets were captured and taken to England.²⁵ Richelieu was able to regain control of New France in 1632, at which time he decided to send the Jesuits, who had been returned to France along with the Récollets, to rebuild the mission.²⁶ Continuing to be suspicious of the Jesuits' loyalty and of their ultramontane tendencies, Richelieu watched over the Jesuits in New France care-

fully.²⁷ Regardless of his suspicions and the Jesuits' attempts to prove their loyalty to the crown, Richelieu's decision helped to create an entirely different colony in New France.

From 1632 to 1659, the history of New France became the history of a mission colony.²⁸ The faith and institutions of Roman Catholicism became central to New France and important to a degree unequaled by and within other colonies,²⁹ with salvation of souls becoming the ultimate French goal.³⁰ The Society of Jesus was the primary shaper of the colony and its spirit.³¹ And Paul LeJeune became the man who shaped this mission.

As the first Superior General of the Jesuit mission in New France, Paul LeJeune (1591-1664) conceived of a plan to effectively carry out the mission. His plan called for making nomadic tribes sedentary, repairing the chapel, building a residence to form the center of the mission, building hospitals and schools for the Amerindians, and carefully selecting the European population of New France.³² As a result of this plan and his efforts, historians have judged LeJeune as the founder of the Jesuit missions in New France.³³

After repairing the chapel and building a residence which would be used to house reinforcements, the Jesuits named Quebec as the headquarters of their mission. Sacramental wine, chalices, and clothes were stored in this headquarters from which priests were briefed before travelings to outlying posts and from which orders were received from and reports were composed and compiled to be sent to the Provincial of Paris.³⁴ The Jesuits did not spend a lot of time sitting around in Quebec, though. Instead, they immediately started to work towards the salvation of souls. By 1635, LeJeune reported seven mission posts, including two at Quebec.³⁵

Focusing on education, the Jesuits also started to build schools within New France. A seminary, which was intended to produce a population of native-born, home-trained priests for New France, was formed.³⁶ In 1635 the Jesuits also founded a college at Quebec, the goal of which was to educate the rapidly growing population while also educating and preparing the young for professional tasks within a religious framework.³⁷ At the time of its formation the college only provided religious in-

struction. However, reading and writing were quickly added to the expanding curriculum. Later, Latin was added at the request of the parents; other subjects were added gradually.³⁸ Filling a need within the French society starting to form in New France, the college also provided for Amerindian students, of whom twelve were expected in 1636.³⁹ A series of misunderstandings meant that not all of these young boys arrived and stayed in Quebec. However, other students were rapidly and steadily recruited.⁴⁰ All of the Amerindian boys who attended the Jesuits' college at Quebec were potential converts to Christianity. The Jesuits first targeted this young Amerindian population for conversion because they hoped that the young would learn French and rudimentary facts about French geography, government, and customs that would eventually help the Jesuits convey religious ideas.⁴¹ So, the Jesuits' primary goal in establishing a college for boys was the conversion of souls.

Within New France, the Jesuits also found a need for the educations of young girls. The Jesuits arranged for the Ursuline nuns to come to New France in 1639.⁴² Because of various endowments, the Ursulines were able to open a seminary for girls at Quebec.⁴³ As a principal goal, the Ursulines' seminary worked towards the education of girls and the acculturation of Amerindian girls through giving them the same education as the European girls.⁴⁴ By the winter of 1640-41, the Ursulines had forty-eight students, all of whom had been baptized; they had also registered "more than 800 visits from savages."⁴⁵ In this respect the Jesuits were successful in working towards the salvation of souls. For, although the Ursulines worked with the young female Amerindian population, the Jesuits were responsible for their very presence in New France and of the missionary plan of New France which the Ursulines also followed.

The Jesuits were also concerned with the physical health and well-being of the Amerindians. So, they also arranged for the Hospitalières to come to New France in 1639.⁴⁶ This order of nuns formed a hospital in Quebec after having lived among the Amerindians at the Sillery reserve.⁴⁷ Not solely concerned with physical well-being, the Hospitalières, like the Jesuits and the Ursulines,

were also concerned with the salvation of souls. However, the Hospitalières went about this salvation in a different manner: they sought recruits for their order locally, among French immigrants, Canadian girls, and Amerindians. (Sadly, only one Amerindian took the veil.)⁴⁸ As a Canadian order "brought into existence by the Jesuits", the Hospitalières and their unique mission were a success.⁴⁹

In order to affect the salvation of souls, the Jesuits promoted colonization and tried to persuade the Amerindians to forsake their nomadic lives.⁵⁰ While developing their own *seigneuries* and finding wealthy donors to provide the colony with public institutions (which "vastly exceeded in importance what such a small European population might have been expected to possess"), the Jesuits also attempted to form a town for the natives.⁵¹ In 1637 the Commander of the Order of Malta, Father Noël Brulart de Sillery, sent workmen to begin clearing the land and building the reserve. Set at the foot of the cliff of Cape Diamond — a spot frequented by the Montagnais because of its sandy bay — the reserve was given up by its original concessionaire of the missionary cause.⁵² In 1641, the reserve contained about thirty families; by 1645 the reserve was home to 167 baptized converts as well as to houses, the Church of St. Michel, a hospital run by the Hospitalières, a windmill, an oven, and a brewery.⁵³ On March 13, 1651, the reserve was granted in seigneurie and in freehold to the newly converted Amerindians, under the guardianship of the Jesuits.⁵⁴ Hoping that the reserve would tangibly illustrate the principles of Christianity, the Jesuits tried to encourage agricultural domesticity.⁵⁵ During its first year, the reserve was very successful with over fifteen arpents of land were under cultivation in 1646. More importantly, the Montagnais and Algonquin converts from Trois-Rivières formed an intensely religious community under Christian chiefs who "imposed rigorous discipline on drunkards and on Christians who married pagans or associated with them."⁵⁶ However, the atmosphere of the reserve changed and both groups of Amerindians returned to a semi-nomadic lifestyle.⁵⁷ So, the Jesuits shifted their emphasis, choosing instead to send missions to the Huron population.⁵⁸

The Jesuits were linked to the fur trade because of their mission to Huronia. However, "the Jesuits were neither partners nor rivals of the fur company."⁵⁹ Understanding that trade was their entrée into the Huron, and Amerindian, society, the Jesuits used the trade network. The Jesuits were not operators of the Fur Trade; instead, they understood "that trade constituted the basis of positive French contacts with native peoples and was the source of whatever influence the French could exert over them."⁶⁰ Therefore, whenever it did not conflict with their perceived religious duty, the Jesuits cooperated with the trading company.⁶¹

Remembered mostly for their work among the Hurons, the Jesuits used the fur trade to bring about conversion. After learning about Huron social organizations and religious customs, the Jesuits manipulated trading privileges and access to guns in order to convert Hurons.⁶² Exercising their control over the French population and over the fur trade, the Jesuits decided to remove the *coureurs de bois* from Huronia because they were not seen as good examples of Christian life.⁶³ Since the *coureurs de bois* were seen as tangible

evidence of French good will and as an exchange for the native children sent to live with the French, their role could not be left vacant.⁶⁴ In their place the Jesuits sent *donnés*, who were under their direct supervision, to live among the Amerindians.⁶⁵ The Jesuits only used this tactic to insure that their religious mission would not be undermined by the *coureurs de bois*, who were seen as immoral.⁶⁶

All of the actions taken by the Jesuits in New France were designed to advance Christianity. The Jesuits, as an order and as missionaries, were not interested in making a profit from the fur trade. They were not interested in promoting a French society void of Christian characteristics. They were not interested in shoving the Amerindians out of the colony and serving only the needs of the French community within New France. Instead, the Jesuits wanted to save souls. Conversion of the Amerindians was the principal goal of the Jesuits in New France. In fact, no other goals existed, with the possible exception of serving the needs of the French population in New France. The Jesuits brought no ulterior motives to their work in New France.

Addoms — Townsend — Collins

Richard Ward has just given us photocopies of record sheets of birth, marriages, and deaths taken from the Collins Family Bible, so before I file them away, I will try to make a record of what we know about the Collins family and the connection it had to our family.

Johathan Townsend Addoms was the brother of Sallie Addoms who married my great, great, grandfather, Luther Hagar. They lived on the tip of Cumberland Head in the Major John Addoms House, the children of Major John Addoms and his second wife, Mary Townsend.

Jonathan Townsend Addoms, was an itinerant minister and helped found several church groups in this area. He married Harriet Young and they settled on the land just off from the Military Turnpike northwest of Plattsburgh. We were told many accounts by my mother, Cornelia Hagar Allen, who was rather close to the descendants of that family when she was growing up. Jonathan Townsend Addoms donated the land on which the Wesleyan Church was built at the corner of the Turnpike and [Pellerin] Road. Fuller [Allan] remembers that a road originally passed by the old Collins House, but it has been abandoned. It probably was known as the Rogers Road.

Harriet Townsend Young, Jonathan's daughter, used this house as a boarding school there for *Refined Young Ladies* from 1835 to 1837. However, an epidemic of diphtheria hit it hard one winter, one of the girls died, so it was closed. Their daughter, Julia Maria Addoms, married Alonzo Collins in 1854, and they lived there the rest of their lives.

Their daughter, Harriet Ruth, married Dr. Julius Ransom, a physician from Dannemora Prison. Their daughter, Ruth Ransom, was injured at birth — reportedly her leg was broken or dislocated and she remained a cripple the rest of her life. She was about Mother Allen's age so they corresponded often and we stopped to see her in Sarasota, Florida in 1947.

Mother Allen always insisted that the Collins house was part of the Underground Railroad, but it remained just *her story* until about 1976, when

the property was sold to Eugene Pellerin. After the old house burned, he was in the process of excavating for his new house and his heavy equipment found underground cavities. These revealed well-built underground shelters with secret entrances to the cellar of the old house.

Brother Paul and I went out to investigate. Four or five areas in the yard around the foundation were caved in — all within 75 feet from the house. One was partially caved in at the top. We entered and found a hemisphere-shaped construction about 12 feet in diameter made of stone and plastered over with smooth surface and branches all around. It was connected to the cellar, where a removable stone concealed the passage. There were several of these so that if one was discovered alternatives could be used. It was very impressive as we sat on these benches and pondered who had sat on them one hundred years ago. What impressed me was the smooth fine all-white surface. We had no doubts that this was part of the Underground Railroad that Mother had always told us about. Because it was illegal nothing had been put into writing. She did write about it in her final *My Story*.

This 27-room house was constructed in the early 1800s by Johnathan Townsend Addoms, son of Major Addoms, brother of Sallie Addoms who married Luther Hagar, and lived on Cumberland Head. They were my great, great grandparents. He was one of the early itinerant ministers of the area and established the church in Malone. The first Methodist conference was held in this house.

Subsequently it was continuously lived in by the family as their home, then by their daughter and husband, Alonzo Collins with their family. Since my mother always connected her friendship with Ruth Ransom with her childhood visits to the Collins place, it can be assumed that when Harriet Ruth Collins married Dr. Ransom they must have lived in the Collins house for a while before moving to Dannemora.

How Mother's Day Began

Anna M. Jarvis — 1864-1948 — first suggested the national observance of an annual day honoring all mothers because she loved her own mother so dearly. At a memorial service for her mother on May 10, 1908, Miss Jarvis gave a carnation, her mother's favorite flower, to each person who attended. Within the next few years, the idea of a day to honor mother gained popularity, and Mother's Day was observed in a number of large cities in the United States.

On May 9, 1914, by an act of Congress, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. He established the day as a time for "public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country." By then, it had become customary to wear white carnations to honor departed mothers and a red to honor the living, a custom that continues to this day.

Grace C. Nye — January 2, 1865*

[Ed. This little exercise book is a combination of many entries; Miss Nye, age 14 in 1865, had many drawings of people, especially women, hairdos, and she sketched the plans of many of the houses of the people she mentioned, especially when she listed parents with children and their ages. These people appeared to be neighbors. Included here are parts of the contents that might have some interest to those living one hundred thirty-two years after Grace C. Nye first began to put down her thoughts. This article ends with President Lincoln's death, although the journal does go on for some pages further. As you will see from the genealogy of the Nye family, Grace died when she was 21 years old.

Text in italic belongs to G.N., those in brackets or normal type are those of the editor.]

*Although G.N. lists the book as beginning on January 2, 1865, the first date listed is Dec. 29, 1864.

Inside cover: These names are listed: *Mr. Charles Pratt, Miss Carrie Warn, Cousin Mary, Cousin Alice Bartlett, Cousin Mary Pratt*, and the note that *Mother will be home tonight or tomorrow*. Next page: *Grace C. Nye*, the words, *Pot Ashes* — then, *And the Jewish Passover was nigh at hand* — and many went out of the country — up to Jerusalem before the Passover to purify themselves. — written upside down was: *Mother owes me 31 cents from washing veil.*

Next page: *Grace C. Nye, Dec. 29, 1864, Exercise Book* two drawings one a young woman with the inscription *a beauty*, the other a young man with flowing mustache, also: *Sophia Wilbos and I*. Pages 1-11. Now G.N. has numbered the pages. Each page consists of several sentences written in French, as any child might do for a school exercise. Page 12. First three lines start out as a French exercise, then: some drawings of women, one with a very distinctive hair-do. The name *Grace C. Nye Champlain, NY*, then: *Matilda, Barnes, Rose,*

Page 16. continuation of Latin notes and the following: *Mr. Sprague, Christmas morning the express package came from Mother, — Mollie and I were surprised and delighted, at receiving those beautiful birds from you, for which please accept many thanks. They are on the brackets in the bay window and are admired by everyone. We had a very nice Christmas, in spite of mother and the rest being away, and I had very nice presents.*

Page 19. *I seem to me to be so far off, and yet so near, as though one could travel on forever through it — yet — all the while feel as thou a great — black wall was forever in the way, it seems, as though you could look deep into its depths either way, and yet — as though you saw. but I think it must be [a] covering spread around us,...I dwell in the great cool shadows of the rocks and, in the — caves of the mts. — and envelope with — a pitying veiling touch the mores of man., so full of fault — and imperfections, while it — descends with — vengeance on the — perfect of evil.*

so long so long ago but it did not come and did not come until I got all out of patience ...the troublesome pencil came at last and I thought I would send it to you and get it off my hands you know I owe you ...and now Mr. Whiteside you can't complain for I paid you up. I'm afraid, I am having a splendid time here it is quite gay here.

Page 36. Drawings: 5 profiles of women's faces — 3 full face — 1 of a child - perhaps a boy sleeping in bed—and the caption: *he looks fair like the little Cook boy*

Page 37. Commenced Feb 6, 1865: Mr. Pratt went back to Cambridge this morning, he is very pleasant I was quite sorry to have him go. I feel just like writing a letter, but have no paper so I will write in my journal. I am going down to the village this afternoon to get my picture taken and to get some paper from the office. The Hall is finished, all but the seats. Mother owes me 24 cents — tomorrow I guess I will get [it]. Nell is going to school next year (God permitting) she will go to Cambridge, I guess. Mrs. Bartlett sent me a box of honey [unreadable] paints, I am so much obliged to her.

Feb. 7: This afternoon Mollie took a ride with Mary Averill, Jeannie & I went with her. Mother has a very bad headache.

Feb. 8: Mother is better today, but Grandma is in bed did not come to breakfast. Danny [is] going to take music lessons. Nellie got a letter this morning. He bought me a new book yesterday.

Page 38. — Feb. 9 1865: Last night two hundred and eighty (280) soldiers came here, the other 140 are going tonight and tomorrow — there was no place for the new ones so Uncle had to let them take the hall. Tonight is Maggie Finleys birthday, we are going there to a birthday party. I must get me a scarlet box this afternoon... Mollie is cross and is going too. Uncle is down. I take music lessons of Miss Sarah Savage. My head aches. Cousin Alick and Cousin Nellie Race and Cousin Isa Myatt have come down to New York [down? are they Canadian?]. Sophia stays at Cousin Johns.

Feb 16: I am reading the diary of Kittie Trey?lion. mine is so silly and worldly beside hers. I told Charlie that I hated him this very morning and I told him so yesterday, and I wish I could be a better girl. I try. Tonight is the concert I have got to practice 35 minutes, yet I am so sorry. I have had no valentines, I guess those day are over. We have

a new girl, [a] great fat one, I am glad that we have one at last. Mother won't let me have any coffee, it is so hard. I have had the backache besides the headache three days. I wanted some coffee very badly this morning. I am going to crochet a half yard to day on my trim?. I owe Frank Whiteside a ? present what shall I give him? I guess I will write to Maggie and see. I am painting another picture. I wonder if I will be an artist and if I will go to Cooper's I must try and do all I can now. I shall try and do some good today.

Feb. 19: I have just begun to read a [Bible] chapter morning and night I am reading Luke now. Auntie Angelina has a little baby, a boy, I am rather sorry that it is not a girl. There will be four now and Carrie will be the f? of the family she is a sweet little [thing].

Page 40. Charlie and Mother are going down to the Lake to get Daisy this morning. I wonder if Uncle will let me have the gold of mine to get mother the "Waverly Novels" Oh I hope he will. Nellie and I are going down to the hospital this afternoon to see the sick soldiers and take them some oranges and things, I feel rather afraid to go on account I shall never know what to say.

Feb 23, 1865: Willie Moore has a little brother, he was born last Sunday. Chippie and he are staying up here. Just a minute ago Chip came to the door and wanted to get in, I guess, and as she could not she kept pushing the covering (that covers the lock) to and fro, we all laughed.

Feb. 27: Today as we were all sitting quietly in school Chippie came outside the door and screamed "Mollie Mollie" so droll.

Page 43. 27 Dec 1865: My name is Grace C. Nye. I have read the Vohonberg Cotta Family and thought that I would write a chronicle. I don't know a single thing to write about, except that I live in a little village in the northern part of New York which just supports a bank and a poor newspaper. My father has been dead ever since I was five years old. I am now fourteen. Mother's living and I have six brothers and sisters: Lizz, Magg, Nell, Charles, myself, Mollie Belle [does not look complete, as Bart is not mentioned] pet and darling. Mother and Maggie are in Cambridge where Nellie is at school, Maggie is 20, Nellie 18, Charlie who is 16 and is so handsome, witty and kind is in Exter preparing for college, he expects to go next year. Mollie is fat

merry and obstinate at times, she rooms with me and is eleven, and Mother she is what she should be so generous, unselfish, and kind, and when she reproves us it is done so gently and kindly. But we have one more, my grandma she is not at all like the Calla family grandmother, she is small fair and her hair is white, she does not speak much, but although her manner is not pleasant she is kind of heart. We have a tutor. Uncle Freeman and Aunt Ruth are a great pair, that live a mile and a half from our house. Uncle's wife died when I was a baby her name was Aunt G, I was named for her, when she died Aunt Ruth, his sister, came here to keep house for him, he is a grand country gentleman, hale, hearty handsome and kind, his hair is as white as snow, and is splendid, and to go up to the house is a great pleasure.

York at Mrs. Hoffmans school, Charlie in college, Maggie, Lizzie, and Bart at home. On Nov 21, I am going home, it is my birthday. I study music drawing, arithmetic, Latin, geography, reading, writing and —

Page 50. The summer sun has sunk to rest quietly The brilliancy of the western horizon, alone is life - to show its departing glory, and the gray mists of twilight - are gathering thickly around. While the soft balmy breeze comes from the sunny south gently fanning the weary laborer as he returns from the toil of the day, and lifts lovingly the damp locks from his heated brow, as he sits enjoying its refreshing coolness. No sound comes to disturb the

thoughts save that of the wind, as it plays among the leaves over head, or of the murmuring brook as it glides merrily by. Thought wanders back into the past, or onward to pierce the hidden recesses of the mysterious future. The orphan and the wanderer may go back in thought - and feel the sweet influence of the home circle.

His hearse is to be drawn with six horses led by grooms and is hung with white and black velvet, and plumes nodding on the top, the inside is white satin or velvet. I went to church it was all draped in black, the organ and back of the pulpit were covered with flags draped in black, and the pulpit was shrouded in black and right up in front was a picture of Lincoln. The soldiers all marched in and took the left side of the church. We had a good many cannons shot too...

Ha! Ro! — Ha! Ro! — Ha! Ro!

Rollon — The Ravaging King of The Normands who had established the Duchy of Normandie in the year 911 and which he solidified by marrying the daughter of the King of France.

As King of the Normands Rollon was known to his subjects as being fair and just and the renderer of "True Justice," and that he preferred to dispense justice as much as pillage the surrounding kingdoms.

He loved to travel on horseback through his vast domain, and hold audiences and court in the middle of the road whenever and wherever he felt like it. An individual who had a grievance to present to the king could throw himself on the ground in the path of the mounted monarch, Rollon, and cry out three times, "Ha! Ro! — Ha! Ro! — Ha! Ro!" (Note: Ro being the short form of Rollon), and the complainant would say, "Please help me my Prince, an injustice is being done to me." Such an action and cry would immediately impart a hearing by King Rollon. Right then and there in the middle of the road the King would hold court. He considered the facts of the matter and rendered a decision there on the spot. Rollon was not one to let matters of injustice go on without action and immediate attention.

The custom of using the cry "Ha Ro" in seeking justice was perpetuated by his successors. Over the years, yes, over the centuries the cry *Haro* remained an expression used in the courts of France and in some jurisdictions of the courts of England, such as on the Islands of Jersey and Guernsey — in the English Channel. As late as 1870 when the exclamation *HaRo* was used in a railroad right-of-way brief. When a railroad company was trying to take private lands through eminent domain take-over, the complainant threw himself at the mercy of the English court with the cry for justice of *Haro!* He won the case and the railroad had to by-pass his property.

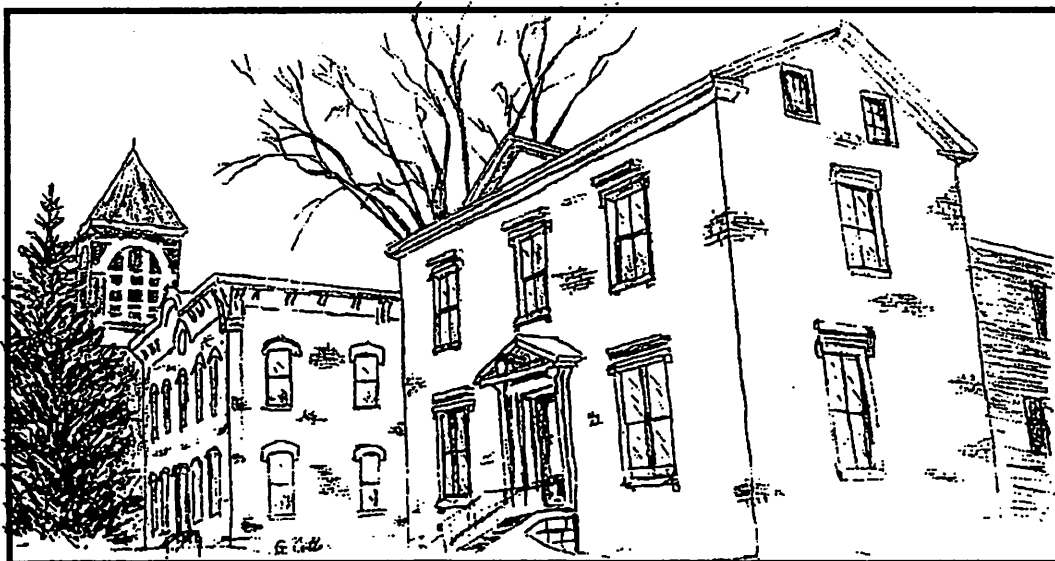

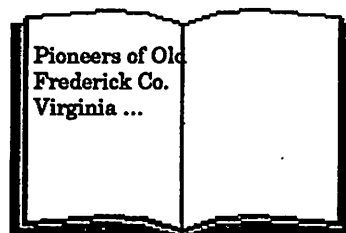

...Book Review...



Pioneers of Old Frederick County, Virginia by Cecil O'Dell — is very impressive in both looks and content. The boundaries of old Frederick County today encompass 12 counties: Frederick, Clarke, Warren, Shenandoah and Page counties in Virginia; Jefferson, Berkley, Morgan, Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, and Grant counties in West Virginia. During the 1700's a land dispute between a Colonist and an Englishman developed into a lawsuit. The suit was between Jost Hite, the plaintiff, and Lord Thomas Fairfax, defendant. Fairfax claimed to inherit all the country known at that time as the Northern Neck of Virginia from his father and maternal grandfather, Lord Thomas Culpepper who had received the land in a grant from King Charles II in 1664. During the 18 years of the court battle no land was legally disposed of, resulting in no legal land documents to search for the names of the settlers that inhabited the area. It created a veritable dead-end for anyone tracing their heritage in this territory.

This book is a comprehensive study of the settlers of old Frederick County. Who they were, where they came from, where they lived in old Frederick County, and where they went to.

This book took ten years of personal research — in addition to 460 hours by professional genealogists in West Virginia, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, and New York; and an additional 80 hours of research in London, England's Public Records Office and the British Museum. This is the most comprehensive volume available on this subject and area.

Within the pages of this book genealogists will find not only the names of settlers of the area, but a field guide of sorts that will direct them to their lands. Family names have been used as subheads within each chapter for easy and quick referenc-

ing. It makes references to 315 settlers — the original land owners, as well, as those to whom the land was willed or sold. Present-day county, state and federal highways on or near the individual pieces of property are described. Access by highway to the individual parcels are described in the book. It is hardcover — 7"X10" — has 623 pages; 1 four color 26"X29" map of 12 counties, displaying tracts, roads, and streams; 1 map 25"X40", Circa 1736 — London; 1 map 25"X40", Circa 1751 — London; and 15 maps 7"X10", displaying the location of tracts of land.

Fragmenta Genealogica by Frederick Arthur Crisp. 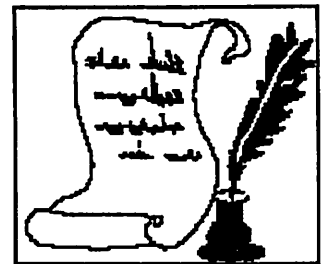

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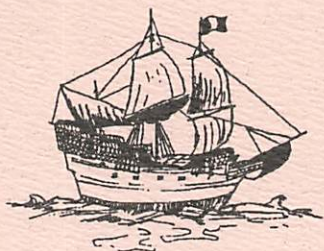
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
