

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



...I'm writing about an article published in *Lifelines*, Vol. 12, No. 1, by Donald R. Lapointe, about Pierre DESFAYETTE & M-Joseph PAQUETTE. In the article, Mr. Lapointe says that Pierre Desfaillette, whose marriage record is lost, is descending from Joseph Fayet and Catherine Tabeau, this is according to Drouin.

Since I've been researching this case myself, I had doubt about the conclusion of Drouin. First, because there are no evidences to sustain such a conclusion, second because of many other records that Pierre DEFAYETTE in New France arrived c.1762, probably as a soldier.

Recently, as I was researching in the Jettés *Dictionnaire des familles québécoises*, I found the marriage of Francois DESNOYERS dit LAMONTAGNE to Marie Perreault in Montreal, 9 Nov 1696. His parents were stated as Francois & Catherine DEFAYETTE, of St-Pierre, Lescar, Béarn, Pyrénées-Atlantiques, France.

Needless to say this made me very excited, since Pierre DESFAYETTE, of Laprairie, who married M-Joseph PAQUETTE-LARIVIERE c.1766, was also nicknamed *LEBASQUE*. The Basques people live in the Pyrénées, a mountain chain boarding France and Spain. Chances are Pierre DESFAYETTE may come from that region too, hence his name.

Looking through the Parchemin notary bank (1612-1765), I retrieved two notary contracts for Pierre DEFAYETTE/DE FAILLETTE: one land grant from the Sulpician Brothers, owners of the

seigneurie of Laprairie (Panet De Méru, 24 Feb 1762), and one land sale to Charles Supernent (LAN LANE, 19 Feb 1764).

I also discovered another land grant to Bertrand DE FAILLETTE (Pierre's brother?) (Panet de Méru, 24 Feb 1762).

I now strongly feel that Droin made an error when he linked Pierre DEFAYETTE to Joseph Faille-Faye & Catherine Tabeau, especially because Joseph's ancestor Claude Faye is from St-Jean d'Aubrigoux, in Auvergne (Haute-Loire). This wouldn't be the first time Drouin's researchers made a wrong guess.

This shows that Droin, Tanguay or any other source should always be double-checked. Since no marriage records exist for Pierre DEFAYETTE & M-Joseph PAQUETTE, we must then rely on the baptisms of their seven children to link their respective parents. Since no FAILLEs or FAYEs were cited as sponsors for any of them, my conclusion is that Pierre Defayette arrived in Quebec c.1762, and that Bertrand (Pierre's probable brother) returned to France after 1764.

Further research is needed to link Pierre DEFAYETTE to his ancestors back in France, but with the advancement of genealogy, and the efforts of researchers on both sides of the Atlantic, this mystery will eventually be resolved.

Julien or Gregorian (Calendar That Is)

Julien calendars used through the Middle Ages in Europe were inaccurate by 3 days every 4 centuries.

By adoption of the Gregorian calendar in 1752, the dates were now ahead by 10 days.

Exp.: If someone born before 1752, but lives beyond 1752 (Julien method, *old style*), and you wish to record the event by the Gregorian method (*new style*), add 11 days to the date to make it accurate.

Exp.: If a person is born before 1752, but dies after 1752, record the exact age, subtract the age from the date, then subtract 11 more days to obtain the Julien, or *old style* equivalent.

The Greek Church did not approve the calendar revision, and consequently Greece, Bulgaria and Russia were on the *old style* calendar until the first World War, when they were thirteen days ahead of sun time. For the dates when the other European countries changed from the Julien to the Gregorian calendar see the tables in Archibaud F. Bennett, *A Guide to Genealogical Research* (1951) p. 323 and Dr. Ethel W. Williams, *Know Your Ancestors* (1969), pp. 35-36.

History of the Winters Family

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Our oral history tells us that the original family name was German, and possibly Wynters (pronounced "vintners"), meaning "wine-makers." The first Wynters was a mercenary soldier from Hesse-Hannau Germany, who came with one of his brothers to America during the Revolutionary War to help the English put down the rebellion of the colonists. He was shot and wounded at the Battle of White Plains, NY. After the war, he was indentured to a gristmill in Upstate, NY. His brother decided to return to Germany, but this soldier ancestor decided to marry the gristmill's daughter and stay in America. We know that there were also Hessians at the Battles of Bennington and Ticonderoga, so probably he settled in Upper New York State, where our records begin.

The first Winters that we have any record of is John Winters of Woods Falls (near Mooers), NY, located just below the Canadian border, and just West of Lake Champlain. John Winters was married to Harriet Reynolds. They had at least nine children, that we know of, and the youngest was a son named Amos, who was the grandfather of Paul Vinal Winters. The others were: William, Reuben, John Wesley, James E., Sarah, Harriet, Ann, and Charlotte. Charlotte died "in her 16th year," so says her gravestone.

The family belonged to the Methodist Episcopal church in Mooers. They at first attended the main church in Mooers Town, and later removing to the new church in Centreville (Mooers Center). From old church records we learned that Harriet attended on a regular basis with Charlotte, Emma Ann, and Zadah. Amos, John, John Wesley, James, and William, were members of record. Harriet's death is recorded there. She died on December 30, 1881. John had died on September 3, 1872. Amos was Steward of the Church from 1886 for three years. The family kept close contact with the Mooers church even after they had moved to Lowell.

Henry Boardman Taylor was a famous Meth-

odist Minister who preached there for a while. He was a very famous Minister, who was confined to a wheelchair since early age. In 1850, he started an institute at Fort Edward for Adolescents and later started another Institute at Poultney, Vermont. Henry Boardman Taylor spoke for Amos and James Winters on their pension applications, even helping James reverse a denial.

The Mooers Census record of 1850 (see article in this journal on page 23), tells us that John, John Wesley, and William were sawyers and Reuben was a millwright. The history of the town of Mooers says that there were several sawmills there in the 1800's, including a gang-saw mill on a small stream northwest of Mooers Forks, as well as shingle-factories, chair-factories and turning mills. Lumbering was for many years the chief industry of the town. At Mooers Forks, there was a fine gristmill, a lumber-mill and a store, as well as a large Iron Forge.

William married Zadah Knapp, and had at least one child, named Delia. William's, wife, Zadah, died in 1878, and sometime later, William removed to Hesperia, Michigan and married Hestera Augusta Holmes Shoemaker, widow of Mr. Shoemaker, who had one daughter, Laura P. Shoemaker Maze, wife of William Maze of Elbe, Washington. William died in Hesperia in 1908, and Hestera died in Tacoma, Washington in 1922.

John Wesley Winters married Mary Belden. They had at least three children; Emma Annette, who died single at age 68, and a baby boy, Jenbert, who died at 5 months, and Jennie M. Jenbert's gravestone says, "He sleeps till morning." John, Mary, Emma, and Jenbert are buried in the Mooers Forks Union Cemetery in Mooers Forks, NY.

James E. Winters, married a girl named Lovina Corkins (or Calkins). They were married ca. 1859, by the Reverend Hemenway. They had ten children, including Cora T., who died at 2 years of age; Bell L., who died at age 1; and Eugene U.O., who died at 12 years of age. James, Lovina, Cora, Bell, and Eugene are buried in the Mooers Forks Union Cemetery in Mooers Forks. James' family lived in Clinton Mills in 1877 and Black Brook in 1883.

Later, according to James' Pension papers, he removed to 196 Vine St., Nashua, New Hampshire in 1892, and then in 1914, lived with his daughter, Hattie, at 76 Dewey St., in Worcester, MA, where he died. The seven children who, presumably, removed to Nashua with them were: Arnold B., Lot R., Hattie C., Gertie E. May R. Asa G. and Ralph. Lovina died on May 5, 1906, in Lowell, MA. Daughter Hattie married a Mr. Hills and cared for her father in his elder years. James died on February 6, 1916, in Worcester, MA. He is buried in Mooers. His pension papers show grandchildren,

James M. Warwick, and Mrs. Winnifred Warwick, who state that Hattie Hills was their aunt. I would guess that Mr. Hills had a sister who married a Warwick.

Mooer's census records of 1892, list a family of Merrit Winters, born in 1865, a wife, Eva L., born in 1859, and children: Pearle J., born in 1884, and Willie N., born in 1887. We do not know the parents of Merrit. However, Amos Winters refers to Merrit and Pearl in a letter to Mrs. C. W. Drake, dated December 6, 1912, from Lowell, so we believe he is connected to us. A church record from Mooers shows Merrit J. Winters married Eva L. Kriman on October 28, 1880.

William N. Winters' grave is in Mooers. It says he was born March 10, 1887, and died April 19, 1967. He served in WWI in Ma. (BNSGT MAJ. US Army). William N.'s grave is near James and Mary in Mooers. James and Mary's children are listed on James' pension papers, but there is no William there. We will need to find William's military record to place him in the family.

John and James were very active in the Masons, being initiated as members of Champlain Lodge #237 in Champlain, NY in 1865. They were both charter members of Mt. Horeb Masonic Lodge #707 in Mooers, [which] originated on June 8, 1871, and John is noted on page 69 of *The Historical Review of the Town of Mooers, (1776-1976)* written in 1976 for the Bicentennial by the Bicentennial Committee. In the *History of Clinton County*, it states that John was Senior Warden of Mt. Horeb Lodge #707, and was Master on 1877. He also served as Marshall. James E. was Master in 1876, and he also served as Treasurer.

Amos and at least three of his brothers, William, James, and John were all in the Civil War.

Amos and James were in the 124th New York Vols. William was a Sergeant in Co. H of the 96th regiment. John was in the 92nd regiment. All survived the war, and lived to a good age, Amos lived to be 72, John 82, and William 84.

William enlisted on December 10, 1861, and probably fought at Gettysburg. His enlistment papers say that he had brown eyes and black hair, dark complexion, and was six foot one and a half inches tall. He was appointed a Corporal on January 18, 1862, and promoted to Sergeant on March 10, 1862. He is listed as having participated in the following campaigns: Williamsburg, Fair Oaks, and Seven Days Fight, all in Virginia.

On January 8, 1862, he was admitted to the hospital. On June 1, 1862, he was stricken with Typhoid fever and was left sick at a barn at Malvern Hill. He was found later, mistaken for a deserter and arrested. He was then restored to duty with no loss of pay. He was ill again and left at Poplar Hill on June 28, 1862. He was captured 30, 1862 at Savage Station and taken prisoner. He was taken to Libby Prison on July 13, 1862, where he was later "paroled" (exchanged) and brought to City Point Hospital. On August 3, 1862, he was brought to Hammond Hospital, Lookout Point, Maryland, where he was discharged on October 14, 1862, for "dementia." His pension was later granted for dementia, deafness, piles, and chronic colitis. We know that William recovered from his dementia, as he became a mill boss before 1877, and remarried when he was 60. In 1898, he states that he has no living children.

James Winters was in Co. E. of the 124th regiment. He enlisted on September 17, 1864. His military papers lists his height as six feet, his hair as light brown, his eyes as gray or brown, and his complexion as fair. He was injured falling from a bridge at Hatcher's Run, and was lame the rest of his life. He served 8 months, was discharged on June 17, 1865.

John Wesley Winters was in the 92nd Regiment, Co. B. He enlisted on October 10, 1861. I have military records for Amos, William, and James, and have sent for the records on John. Reuben and Henry are not listed as having been in the military.

Amos Winters was 19 years old when he

enlisted on September 13, 1864, at Plattsburgh, NY. His papers say he had gray eyes and light hair. His height was five feet eleven and 3/4 inches. His mustering out papers show he was discharged on June 4, 1865. He served nine months. Records of his unit show that he may have fought in several campaigns, including Appomattox, Va., where General Lee surrendered to the Union Army (Ulysses S. Grant) on April 9, 1865. It is not clear whether Amos was still hospitalized at this time.

In November of 1864 he was taken ill from bad water after the battle near Petersburg and in December spent time in Nugent Hospital. He also fought at Hatcher's Run, on February 1, 1865, where he suffered exposure from sleeping under the supply wagon he was protecting all night. He caught malaria fever, which resulted in a trip to City Point Hospital. On April 16, 1865, Amos was in Carver Hospital in Washington, D.C., with chills and fever. President Abraham Lincoln was shot on April 14, and died on April 15. We have a letter written by Amos to his father, John Winters, at Woods Falls, Clinton County, NY, postmarked, April 18, 1865, which describes Washington, D.C. in mourning. The spelling and punctuation are left as written. The letter reads:

Washington, D.C., April, 16, 1865

Dear Father, I take the pen in hand this afternoon to write a few lines thinking you would be anxious to know how I got along. I am now in Washington Carver hospital. I hav bin troubled with chills since I rote last and hav bin sent hear, but I hav not had any very latly. I think I am al quite well now except I am somewhat week. Every thing is nice hear and we hav a good doctor. Yesterday he asked me if I would like a furlough and gave me a recommend. I took it before the lord and was examined and think it will be along in about a week for 30 days, but I am not sure but hav not herd any thing to the contrary. They giv a furlough and a transportation ticket and it is taken out of the pay. You must not rely to much on this it may not be granted, but I think it probable. I rote to you while at city point and hav rote to James since I came hear to send me all of mi letters that was to this regt. Well, father, this city was turned from rejoicing to mourning yesterday. The awful news of the brutal

murder of the president and the other harm done to secretary Seward and family causes great excitement hear of flags at half mast, flags of mourning and many other sorrowful tokens. The head quarters of the hospital are trimmed with black crepe today. The particulars you have got before this I suppose. All business was stopped in the city yesterday. The news is today they had not ketchd the murderer. I can find no more to write this time. I expect to get my letters from the regt in a few days. I shall have to send this letter as I did the other, but it don't make much difference as long as you have to keep me in stamps. So I must close. Give my love to all of the family and friends. Good by from Amos Winters

Amos was furloughed on April 24, for 30 days. It is presumed that he went home to Mooers for a visit.

Amos' pension papers show that he never fully recovered from the Malaria fever, and suffered chronic intestinal problems, piles, hemorrhoids, bouts of diarrhea, etc. Later he developed chronic bronchitis, and eventually died from pulmonary hemorrhage. He also was almost deaf and blind at the time of his death, and had also developed "heart disease."

After he was "mustered out" from his duty in the Civil War, Amos married Ellen Jayne Bull on October 7, 1866, in the original Methodist Church in Mooers. Pastor Orin Gregg officiated.

Ellen was the daughter of Benjamin J. Bull and Ann Eliza Barker. She was born in Elizabethtown, NY, just down the shore of Lake Champlain. Benjamin J. Bull was from Watertown, and Ann Eliza Barker was from Herman. They lived in Elizabethtown when Ellen was born, and later resided in Mooers, where Ann Eliza Barker died in May of 1874. They were also members of the Methodist Episcopal Church there. There was an Elias Bull listed with them, who was probably the brother of Ellen, and later a Benjamin J. Bull listed as their grandson. A Charles Bull of Lowell was a witness on Amos Winters pension papers.

After the Civil War, Amos and Ellen soon began a family in Mooers Forks which is located just south of the Canadian border, and just west of Lake Champlain. Amos was at one time a "hammersmith": and at another time a sawyer. There was a huge Iron Forge in the Woods Falls section

of Mooers, on a waterfall of the Great Chazy River where Amos probably worked as a hammersmith. There were at least two sawmills in Mooers, a starch mill, and a gristmill.

James Winters and Henry Winters lived in Clinton Mills, a town next to Mooers. William lived in Cannon's Corners (part of Mooers). There was a huge fire there in 1877, which destroyed these two towns and their mills. It is written up on page 303 of *The History of Clinton and Franklin Counties*. These men worked in the mill of W.R. Adams and Co. They all lost their homes to the fire. People had to flee for their lives. The article states that "Mrs. James E. Winters carried an invalid lady in her arms over a mile." This woman may have been William's wife Zadah, who died in 1878. Good job, Lovina! The article lists James as a millwright and William as mill boss.

The children of Amos and Ellen were: Jennie Ella, born in 1867, and lived for a year and one month; Ina Margretta, born in 1868, she grew up to marry Halsey Rock in Lowell; Hattie, born in 1870, died in her 15th year, she "Asleep in Jesus;" Carrie May, born in 1872, and died at age 5 years and 6 months, "She sleeps in the valley so sweet;" Edgar Amos, born in 1874, the eldest son, married Gertrude Cobb and had four children; Mary Elizabeth, born in 1876, married Melvin Gooch and had two children; Kittie Annette, born in 1878, married Charlie Drake, they had no children; Charles Benjamin, born in 1880, married Marion Katahdin Vinal and had two sons: Paul Vinal Winters and Robert Lincoln Winters; Emmett Harold, born in 1883, married Georgena Hardie, they had two children: Emmett Theodore, who supposedly had the original family Bible, and Maude Lane, who died ten days short of her tenth birthday and is buried in Lowell.

Sometimes between 1886 and 1894, the family of Amos and Ellen moved to Lowell, Mass., leaving three daughters buried in Mooers. History tells us that the lumbering business depleted the forests, and the Iron Forge closed down. Industrialization had come to Lowell, and there was work there for everyone. James had moved his family to Worcester, MA in 1892.

Amos was very active in a veterans unit, the Grand Old Army of the Republic. We still have some of his GAR buttons from this time, and a

picture of Amos in his GAR uniform. Ellen was active in the Ladies of the Grand Old Army of the Republic. Amos also belonged to the Masons in Lowell, as did his son, Charles Benjamin.

It appears that the Winters family was among the elite of Lowell. Pictures show them very well dressed. Young Charles is very well attired. Charles went to Bartlett Grammar School, as we still have his diploma from there. As a young man, he played the trombone in the Excelsior Band of Lowell.

The family of Arthur Vinal was also very elite. He was a wealthy landlord, but a bit tight with his money. We've been told that he walked the railroad tracks in Lowell, picking up coal for his furnace. He had a daughter, Marion, born to Georgianna Anderson, a singer and dancer on the steamboat, *Katahdin*. He did not marry Georgianna, but took his daughter to raise. When Marion was five, he married Fannie Dunham, and they later had a daughter, Hazel Leona.

Marion had been in love with a man who went off to the gold fields in California, and asked her to wait for him. However, she did not wait. She was told that Charlie Winters was a good catch, so she married him in May of 1904. Later, sometime after their son Paul was born in 1906 in Lowell, they moved to Manchester, NH, where Charles was Paymaster in the Stark Mills, and he also worked in the Amoskeag Mills. They lived at 760 Beech St. in Manchester.

We have a letter dated, March 3, 1911, from Grandpa Charlie's sister, Ina Margretta, asking someone to get "a woman hand for mother." Ellen Bull was very ill, and died in Lowell a year later of chronic bronchitis.

Charles B. was very active in the Masons in Lowell, even after he moved to Manchester, taking the 7th and 8th degrees in 1915. He eventually became a 33rd degree Mason in Lowell.

In 1918, when Paul was 12, his grandfather, Amos, died at the home of his daughter Ina Margretta. We have one picture of Paul and Amos together. Amos suffered from chronic bronchitis and intestinal problems ever since the Civil War.

In 1922, Robert Lincoln Winters was born to Charles and Marion. Paul was 16.

During the Depression, when the mills were failing, Charles used \$60,000 of his own money to

try to save his company. When the mills failed, Charles and Marion lost everything, including their home. They were taken in by Charles' sister, Kittie Annette Winters Drake.

Robert Lincoln Winters attended Northeastern University for three years and then enlisted in the Army, serving in WW II. He served at the Battle of the Bulge, and received honors. He suffered shell shock and was permanently disabled. He died in Enfield, Conn. in 1996, under the guardianship of his niece, Susan Winters Smith.

Paul Vinal Winters attended the Massachusetts School of Art in Boston, and became a noted artist in *Who's Who of American Art* and *The Dictionary of American Art*. He is noted for his many religious statues in the Boston area, including the *Christ of Peace* in the St. Mary's Cemetery in Salem, MA, and the *Sacred Heart Statue* in Weymouth, which has been copied all over the country. In 1955, he moved his family to Shady Rill, Vermont, freelancing in commercial art. He made the dioramas for the Battle of Bennington and the Battle of Hubbardton. He was Vermont State Art Director for a number of years.

Paul married twice, first to Emma Whittemore. They had two daughters, Marcia Ann and Beryl Clay. He married second, Jennie Ada Badger, they had six children: Peter, Susan, Sheryl, Paul, Jane, and Kathryn. There are many grandchildren and great grandchildren. Paul died on 2 Dec 1971, at home in Shady Rill, Vermont of cancer of the bladder. □

Francois Frechette, born 15 August 1830, the ninth child of Antoine Frechette and Elisa-beth-Isabelle Lemire, Baie-du-Febvre, Yamaska, QC, married Eloise Gill, born Baie-du-Febvre, daughter of Augustin Gill and Angele Caya, 20 April 1857 in the parish of Saint-Thomas de Pierreville, Yamaska, QC. The family had four children born in Pierreville, then decided to settle in Grand Rapids (now Wisconsin Rapids), Wood County, WI. The WI, 1870 and 1880 US Census' enumerate the family as Hotel Keepers with boarders, raising two more children.

A Chance Meeting of Cousins

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Fifteen years ago, my dad's work transferred him to White River Junction, Vermont. Both Mom and Dad have retired in the past few years and have made the decision to buy a home in Florida. For the summer they've bought a mobile home that sits on the property of my dad's boyhood home in West Chazy, New York. So, while I was visiting this past summer — and since I now know how to use my photo scanner back at home in Tennessee, I thought I'd take the opportunity to go through the box of family photos in pursuit of more ancestral material. My mom has always kept the box of obituaries, mass cards, wedding clippings, and old photos tucked away in the furthest and darkest place in the house (thankfully in a dry, dark spot). Among my finds was a picture of my great-grandmother from Tupper Lake, NY, whom I would have never dreamed of getting a glimpse. She was pictured along with a few of her daughters (my mom's aunts) whom I vividly remember from my youth. I found some "antique" stickers (I let my kids play with the ones that were in the worst shape) and I found a newspaper clipping from the 1950's of my grandfather picketing the US air force base where he had been employed as a welder.

One thing I found got me both very excited and slightly dismayed. I found a letter dated October 23, 1990:

Dear Sir, After talking with you yesterday I checked into my mother's family history — as much as I have, and come up with the following: Mother, Ella M. Payne, born in Plattsburgh, NY, 27 Jan. 1885; her father, Thomas Payne (no date of birth or place of birth known to me, nor a date or place of death); her mother, Eva R. Stafford (no other info.). Mother's paternal grandfather seems to have been Mayo Payne and her father Walter Stafford (Eva's father). This is about the extent of the information I have on my mother's family. Perhaps the names of Thomas and/or Mayo

might ring a bell. Mayo is certainly not a usual or commonly used name. Nice talking with you — Regards, Roy (or Ray ?) Stiles.

There was no address, no phone number...

My genealogy of my PAYNE line was recently printed in the Northern New York American-Canadian Genealogical Society's Journal, *Lifelines*, Fall 1996, whole # 25. The biggest question I had was, "What happened to the children from Thomas Payne's first marriage to Eva Stafford?" They were: Lulu or Hazel, b. 1884 and Cella or Cele, b. 1885 (the handwriting in census records had been difficult for me to decipher). This man's mother, Ella M. Payne, b. 27 Jan. 1885, was the missing link.

I have so much fun with my genealogy research and I admit, I'm a bit of a fanatic. So, when I came across this letter in my parent's "box" I ran to them. "WHERE DID YOU GET THIS?" My father, Jay Payne, had met this "Mr. Stiles" (Roy or Ray?) at a business meeting somewhere, maybe in Vermont — maybe in New York... my dad doesn't remember... ("For gosh sakes, Jennifer! It was seven years ago!"). I flew to the local phone book and called every Stiles (there were 14 of them, I said, I'm a fanatic...) asking for a "Ray" or "Roy." No one knew a Ray or Roy or anything close. One family directed me to the *Stiles Affiliated Families of America* in Penn Yan, New York. Everytime I've called the line's been busy.

I have yet to find Ray or Roy Stiles — the author of this letter. It's ironic. Two strangers around the age of 60 met in a business meeting. Family names became a brief topic of conversation. One of the men wrote later in response to their conversation, but didn't include his address on his letter. They had never met before and they may never meet again. They parted as strangers. They were not able at that time to know or enjoy that they were actually first cousins.

Captain Lot Chamberlain

[This is the death notice of Captain Lot Chamberlain as printed in the Plattsburgh Republican on March 2, 1872.]

Captain Lot Chamberlain almost universally known in the Valley of Lake Champlain, for over 40 years, died in New York City on Friday, the 23rd, after a short illness of only a week.

He was born in Burlington, Vermont, on the 28th of June 1810. When a boy commenced as a sailor on Lake Champlain & rose to command of a vessel at age 17. For many years after he commanded some of the finest sailing vessels on Lake Champlain. In 1840 (or 46) he was given command of the steam propeller *James U. Hooker*. From then until war broke out he commanded steamers on the lake, having been captain during that time of steamers *Boston*, *Saltus*, *Montreal*, and *Canada* respectively.

In the fall of 1861, through his influence, Plattsburgh was made a post for organizing regiments and the 16th and 118th regiments of infantry, and the 16th regiment of cavalry were organized here—to all of which regiments while recruiting, he acted as commissary.

He took a lively interest in politics [and] held office of Collector or town of Plattsburgh 1842-46. He was elected Sheriff of Clinton County in the fall of 1853. He was appointed paymaster of U.S. Volunteers in 1864 & at the time of death was inspector of Customs for the Port of New York.

He leaves his wife, now living in Plattsburgh. Remains arrived in Plattsburgh for services & interment on February 27. Services were at the Peristrome (Presbyterian) Church, a very impressive discourse given by F.B. Hall. Then taken to find resting place in Plattsburgh Cemetery.

A man of great energy of character, with a heart full of tenderness & kindness for every one. Whether in family, social circle, on board steamers, or at a political meeting, his presence & smiles were a perpetual sunshine. His songs, his kind words, his kind deeds will be remembered until the present generation shall pass away.



My French/Canadian Boudriau/Baudriau dit Labonte/Labounty Family Line

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Excitement ran high in New France, in the year 1665. Since Samuel de Champlain had met with a hostile Indian party in 1609, on the lake that would be later named for him, the French had not been made welcome in this Iroquois territory. Nevertheless, the French had established colonies along the St. Lawrence River for the purpose of trading—mostly furs—and for Christianizing the native peoples. Now, after almost 50 years of Indian raiding, scalping and terrorizing by the Iroquois, the famous and highly trained French Carignan regiment who had fought so valiantly in Europe for the French, were arriving by ship to protect and fortify the new French colony.

The first ship of soldiers arrived with the newly appointed Governor of New France, de Courcelles, early in 1665. Several more ships arrived in the months following until 1000 of France's best trained warriors were in place ready to push the Indians into the interior (the Governor planned to annihilate the Indian population) so that the French colonists could get on with the act of creating a more viable French trading colony.

Andre Poutre dit LaVigne was on one of the ships that arrived August 17, 1665. He was twenty-seven years old—no doubt brave and valiant. By that age, he had probably already proven himself on many battlefields in Europe on behalf of the French crown. Back in France, until this moment, there had been little for the highly trained Carignan regiment to do and the King could scarcely afford to keep the thousand men on the payroll. The answer to his dilemma was to ship them off to the new colony across the ocean to help extract its wealth in furs and cod.

Two years later, King Louis XIV and the Roman Catholic Church arranged for 1000 French women to sail to New France to marry 1000 eligible men there—many of who were Carignan soldiers. These women were called *The King's Daughters* or "Filles du Roi" because they came

with a dowry from the King of France as compensation for their courage and willingness to cross the ocean, enter into marriage with men they had never met, and to help populate the new French colony.

Of the 1000 women who sailed, 800 actually arrived, 200 having perished enroute. Among those women who arrived in Montreal in 1667 was eighteen-year-old Jeanne Burel of Normandie. In a few months, she and Andre Poutre dit Lavigne were married, and consequently produced twelve children.

After Andre's retirement from the military, he worked as a cordonier or shoemaker/cobbler. In 1712 he gave his daughter, Jeanne Poutre dit Lavigne, in marriage to Antoine Boudriau dit Labonte, a soldier in the Chassaigne Company. Labonte had been born in France and arrived in Montreal on August 24, 1705, at the age of twenty-one. By that time the Indian people were well contained, or otherwise out of the way, and French soldiers were needed for occupation and keeping British interference in check.

Jeanne and Antoine Boudriau dit Labonte's children were born in or around Montreal from 1710 to 1722. Their son, Pierre-Antoine Boudriau dit Labonte, born, November 9, 1720, at Rivieres-des-Prairies, Montreal, may have fought in the American Revolution with Livingston's Regiment. He would have been 55 years old in 1775 (and/or perhaps he fought in the "Seven Years War" around 1750). He may have married Marie-Anne Bombardier (daughter of Andre Bombardier and Marguerite Demers) on 13 July 1744 at Pointe-aux-Trembles, Montreal. (There is some confusion as to the facts, but, it is possible he received bounty land in New York for his service to the American Revolution consisting of an 80-acre lot, No. 175, and a 420-acre lot, No. 224. Presumably after his death, his children sold the land in 1804. If a soldier or his family did not plan to settle or farm

the land granted to him, it was common practice to simply sell the grant to a land speculator/investor. The family got cash, the investor got valuable real estate.)

Pierre-Antoine and Marie-Anne Boudriau dit Labonte's son, John-Baptiste Beaudrias dit Labonte was born in Montreal, and baptized, March 9, 1751, at St. Joseph-de-Chambly. At age 25, he was married on, September 16, 1776, at Notre Dame, Montreal to Marie Botquin dit St. Andre (age 22, daughter of Jacques Botquin/St. Andre and Marie-Francoise Baigne/Bonnier). John-Baptiste and Marie were both buried at St. Valentine in 1835 and 1834 respectively. John-Baptist also served in the American Revolution and was granted land in New York, possibly on a tract in Black Brook, Clinton County, New York reserved for French-Canadian settlement. His son, Francois Baudriau dit Labonte may have been an heir to this property since he eventually settled there.

Francois Baudriau dit Labonte was born in 1794, in Canada and was buried in the U.S. He was married, October 10, 1814, in Chambly, Que-

bec to Marie Decelles born around 1799, in Canada (daughter of Basile Decelles dit Duclos and Charlotte Colette). They relocated to Black Brook, New York, in Clinton County by 1855. It is not yet proved, but it is probable that Francois settled his family on the land that was granted to his father, John-Baptiste Beaudrias dit Labonte, as mentioned above. Later, the family appears on the 1880 Federal Census in Bellmont, New York, Franklin County.

Perhaps my Labounty ancestors emigrated to New York partly or wholly due to British control of Quebec. I have determined that Francois Labounty entered the U.S. sometime following the Papineau Uprising of 1837 and by 1855. Two generations of this French-Canadian line supported the U.S. and opposed the English. British control of their homeland may have been good cause for this family to leave Quebec and settle the land they already owned in the U.S.

Records indicate it was with the move to New York State that the "Labonte" name became "Labounty."

(National Archives and Records Service, Revolutionary War Pension Applications microfilm series M804, file of John Gauley). There is a discrepancy here. There was such a soldier who received as bounty land in NY, the 80-acre lot no. 175 and the 420-acres lot no. 224 (NARS, RG217). However, the soldier who received these lots died before 1804, when his children sold his land. They were: Benjamin, John-Baptist, Marie Reine, m. to Joseph Lafontaine, and Clemence (see NARS, series M804, file of Louis Gosselin). The 1830 claimant would seem to have been the son of the soldier, a man bearing the same name. The marriage of the soldier was a Antoine [sic] Baudrias (son of Antoine Baudrias and Jeanne Plumereau), 13 July 1744, Point-aux-Trembles, Montreal to Marie-Anne Bombardier, daughter of Andre Bombardier and Marguerite Demers. Other information indicates that the name of this man was Pierre-Antoine Boudiau/Labonte, baptized 8 Nov. 1720, Riviere-des-Prairies, Montreal. Aids to Navigation — Lake Champlain



From *Beekmantown News* (town bulletin)

- 1822 Lake Champlain Canal opened connecting the Lake with the Erie Barge Canal, the Hudson River, and points north to St. John sur Richelieu in Quebec.
- 1823 United States Congress authorizes the erection of lighthouses to aid navigation on Lake Champlain.
- 1838 Split Rock: 2nd Lighthouse on Lake (on Vt. side). Built by Peter Comstock — 19 lamps and reflectors. Replaced in 1857 with Fresnel Lens visible for 18 1/2 miles — light 100 feet above water on a 39 foot tower.
- 1838-1929 Cumberland Head: built by Peter Comstock. Tower of blue limestone — 55 feet above ground, visible 14 3/4 miles. Rebuilt in 1868 on a new site more visible — 50 feet above ground.
- 1857-1933 Isle La Motte — fixed white light, 46 feet above surface, visible 13 miles (made navigation safe on north end of lake).
- 1858 Windmill Point: fixed white light 52 feet above surface — visible for 13 miles, 40 foot tower built of dark blue Isle La Motte limestone with covered way and dwelling. Located at north end of Lake Champlain. A bridge had been constructed across the lake in 1851, at Rouses Point.
- 1868-1989 Point au Roche: built by Solomon Clark of Westport — 50 foot tower of blue Isle La Motte limestone — 6th order lens & fixed white light visible for 13 miles (attached to a white wooden dwelling). This place was named by the Geographer of Canada, Samuel de Champlain, who discovered the *Point of Rocks* (the Point au Roche Reef, a long arm of rocks, extending out into the lake to the east. This dangerous reef necessitated the placing of a light in Beekmantown as located. This light stands at latitude 44 degrees 48 minutes north and longitude 73 degrees 50 seconds west.
- 1858 Crown Point: built by Solomon Clark — dark gray tower, 55 inches with 5th order lens and fixed white light, 83 feet above surface of lake — visible for 14 3/4 miles. Memorial tower rebuilt in 1912 as a memorial commemoration to Samuel de Champlain (1858-1926).
- 1868 Plattsburgh Breakwater: 27 feet high — 32 feet above lake surface — visibility 8 1/2 miles. Early lights mounted on skids to protect them from crushing spring ice breakup. Aid to Plattsburgh Harbor.
- 1871 Colchester Reef: built on dangerous rock called, "Middle Bunch" — 7 feet below surface — one mile from Colchester Point near Burlington, Vt. Recommended passage for a ship was 200 feet to the west. White wooden house with Mansard roof. Fixed red light inside 6th order lens, visible for 8 1/2 miles. Structure 35 feet tall with light — 51 feet above lake. In use 1871-1933. Removed to Shelburne Museum in 1952.



- 1871 Barber Point: Blue limestone house and 36 foot tower with 5th order lens and fixed white light, standing 83 feet above lake surface, and visible for 14 3/4 miles. Brown Mansard roof. 1871-1934.
- 1874 Bluff Point: built on west shore of Valcour Island — dark blue Isle La Motte limestone, the dwelling with brown Mansard roof — fixed white light in a 5th order lens in a 36 foot high tower held 95 feet over water of lake. It was the last lighthouse built on Lake Champlain. Decommissioned by US Coast Guard in 1931. Listed in 1993 in National Register of Historic Places. Entrusted to Clinton County Historical Association.
- 1875 Delaware and Hudson Railroad starts operating out of Plattsburgh, on newly built road bed connecting points on the lake with Montreal, Albany, Whitehall, and points south to New York City.
- 1887 Salary of Point au Roche Lighthouse Keeper was \$480 per year.
- 1891 Rouses Point Pierhead — brown post holding fixed red light — a lens lantern 32 feet above surface, built on outer end of Rouses Point Breakwater.
- 1891 Gordon Landing Pierhead: built on outer end of breakwater on western shore of Grand Isle (Vermont side where Cumberland Head Ferry docks). Fixed white light in a post 32 feet above water.
- 1897 US Government had built 11 lighthouses on Lake Champlain and 15 post lanterns on Whitehall Narrows from Ticonderoga, south to Whitehall.

Note: The Barber Point, Bluff Point, and Colchester Light are Sisters with Mansard roof. Following the building of the railroad south out of Plattsburgh, freight tonnage on the lake diminished, echoing the death knell for commerce on the lake. □

Congratulation Stacey

Anastasia Pratt Receives University of Michigan Fellowship

[This is an excerpt from *focus on Plattsburgh, State University of New York*, published by College Relations and Development for the College Community, March 12 1998.]

Anastasia Pratt calls her recent all-expenses-paid acceptance into graduate school at the University of Michigan good luck.

Honors Program Director David Mowry calls it something else.

"Stacey is an exceptional, exceptional student," he said. "This is an example of how highly she is regarded."

"This" is the equivalent of \$140,000 worth of graduate-level education. Pratt has been accepted into the American Studies doctorate program at the University of Michigan. Her acceptance letter spells out the conditions: She will receive full tuition plus a \$14,000-a-year living stipend for three years, which translates into about \$98,000. The program may be extended another two years if necessary, bringing her fellowship to more than \$140,000.

"It's been overwhelming," said Pratt, an unassuming 22-year-old American Studies major from South Plattsburgh. Pratt said she thought the offer is the results of what she calls "a very good match."

"There are many American Studies programs around the country that mostly focus on ethnic studies," she said. "I'm studying vernacular architecture, which draws on sociology, theology, literature, art, and architectural history, their program draws on faculty from all those departments."

Pratt said she enjoys "trying to figure out how Americans figure out their sense of place. I really want to explore the American sense of home. When people say, 'I really feel at home here,' or 'There's no place like home,' I want to know what that means."

Her passion for this field was developed when she took a historic preservation class with history professor Dr. James Lindgren where she had to explore the history of three houses in Plattsburgh.

"I learned I loved researching, figuring out who lived in these homes and what they were like," Pratt said. The next year she began a project researching workers' houses and selected houses in the French quarter of Plattsburgh on Montcalm,

Champlain, and Lafayette streets.

A love of research isn't the only thing to which Pratt attributes her success. She holds the Honors Center and its programs in high esteem.

"I was on the Honors Council four years and in the Honors Student Association," she said, "[and] I found a lot of people with similar goals, and the Honors Seminars made me decide to be a history major. The seminars were so important, you're not sitting in a lecture hall, looking at the backs of heads. It's 15 people sitting around a table with the teacher and everyone has an equal voice, you really get into it, discussing the issues."

Pratt said she tried to go into every class as prepared as she had to be for the honors seminars.

"I would never walk into a seminar unprepared. I know I'm completely prepared and ready to talk, listen and interact," she said. "Those seminars gave me an idea how much time was necessary for a college class. They helped me know I could push myself very far and I could get the same kind of (high) grades I was used to getting in high school."

"She is an absolutely superb student in every way," Mowry said. "She's in a class by herself."

A College Foundation Presidential Scholar who has, among other honors received the Benjamin Feinberg American History Award, the Heisler Music Scholarship, the Eugene P. Link Scholarship and awards from the history and music departments. Pratt is also a member of Phi Kappa Phi, an interdisciplinary academic honor society, the history honor society Phi Alpha Theta, the freshman honor society, Phi Eta Sigma, and the national honor society. Omicron Delta Kappa. Graduating this May with nearly a 4.0 gpa. Pratt has also found time to play string bass in the college string quartet.



Our President, Barb Séguin, found this while looking for something else. (something all of us can relate to) It was from the Tri-Cities Gen. Journal in Washington State.

If, when checking tombstones, where the birthdate is missing, use the 8870 formula.

Example: Ancestor died 6 May 1889 at age 71 yrs. 7 mons. 9 das.

	18890506 — died 1889 May 6
Subtract	<u>710709</u> — age at death
	18179797
Subtract	<u>8870</u> — the magic number
	18170927 — born 1817 Sep 27

When you have more than 30 days in the days column, subtract 30 from the days and add 1 to the month column. Likewise, when you have 12 in the months column, subtract 12 and add 1 to the years column.

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
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
