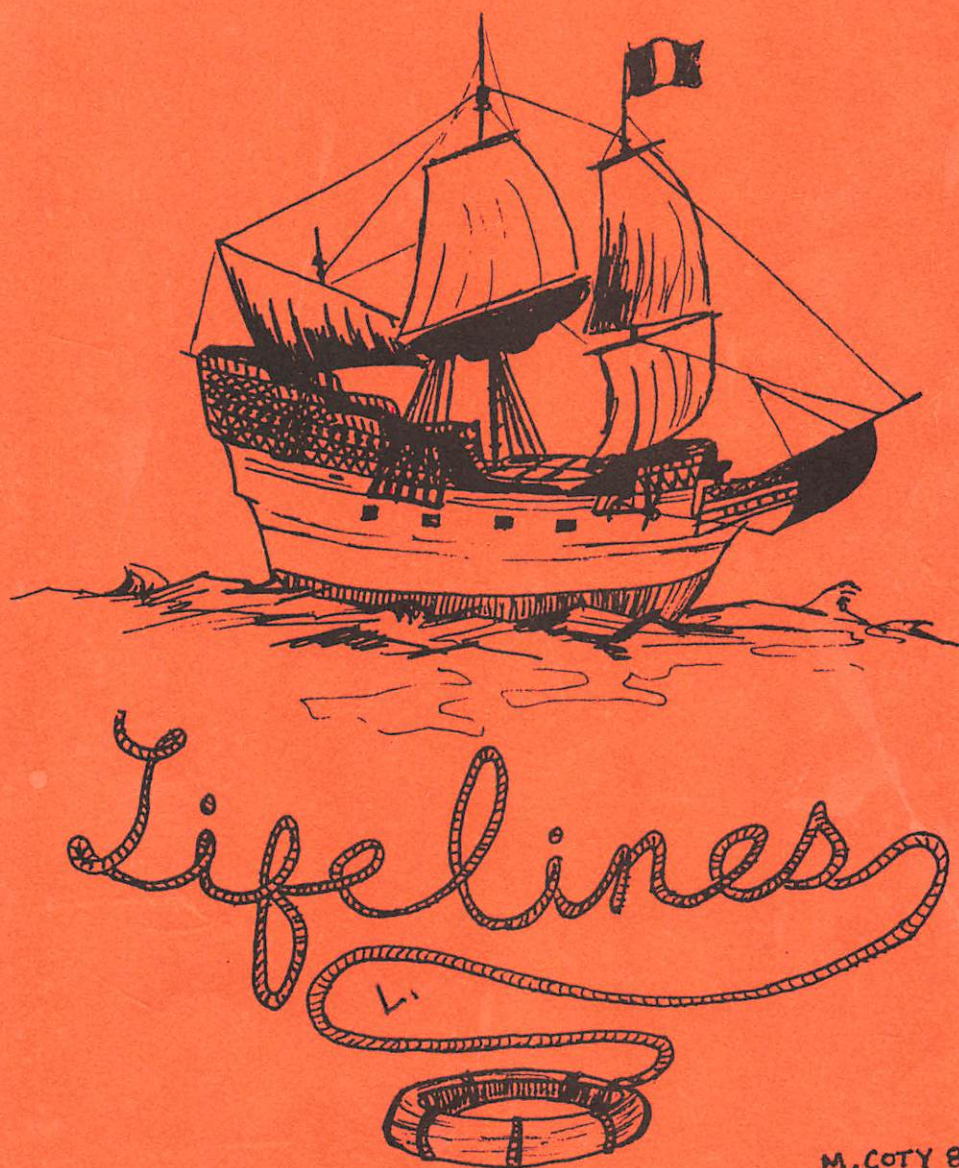

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## PRESIDENTS'S MESSAGE

As our society's first year nears its end, I'm proud to announce that we have almost 500 parish marriage repertoires from the province of Quebec. Plus many Maine and New Hampshire parishes. By no means will we stop here for there are over 2,000 Catholic parishes in the Province of Quebec and about 90% of them have had their church records printed to some point in time. The Catholic parishes, for the most part, recorded much family information, whereas other religions did not. Our own Clinton County Catholic parish records have been recorded up to the year 1880 by Mr. Benoit Pontbriand of Quebec City; they will be published this fall and many in our society as well as others with roots in Northern New York await them. Our society would love to buy repertoires of protestant church records if ever recorder either in Canada or Northern New York. Someone mentioned to me that the records on one of our Protestant churches for marriages one year consisted of an entry the minister listed: "I must have married 100 couples this last year"!!

I hope everyone enjoys this journal as many long hours went into its preparation. I tried to put something in it for all the members. As of our next journal, the query section will have to change; each member will be allowed only one free query per issue. The query section of this journal proved to be the most difficult part of the journal to prepare. A couple of queries were returned because I couldn't make out exactly what the question was. Remember, this is only a query section not a story of the family section. Non-members will still be allowed to submit queries; the rate will be five dollars for each query and members will be allowed to submit additional queries at the rate of three dollars each, at no time will a query be more than fifty words not counting name and address. It cost the society this time sixty dollars just to print the query section.

I hope you also like the journal's cover, it was drawn by Michael Coty (#0049) he did a great job on it. Our next Journal will be out in October this year to correspond with our fall meeting and will be about fifty pages, and our spring 1985 journal will again be about eighty pages. To make a journal takes a steady flow of articles from you the members. I wish to thank all the members who donated articles this time.

I have stepped on a few toes by making this society slanted towards the Franco-Americans. I have been associated with the Franco-American societies now for many years and perhaps I'm a little bias in that fact being of Franco-American decent and being born and raised in Maine. I met my wife Shirley while stationed here in Plattsburgh in the Air Force. Our society will continue to slant toward the Franco-American as long as I'm president. We do however welcome all ethnic groups and I can often give them guidance in the write direction and often that's all it takes. We will continue to publish a mixed journal with articles of interest to all ethnic groups, and will buy any repertoires of other persuasions if and when they become available from Canada and Northern New York. But our library will continue to have a Franco-American flair through the means of or library and conferences. In the fall conference I will try to mix it up a little and find an Irish or Scotch speaker. Please write me and let me know how you like this journal and also send in any suggestions you may have. I hope to have better meeting in the future and teach more. This last year has been a learning experience for me also. Let me know what you would like to have classes in and I will try to work in your favor. I also wish to thank my many genealogy friends that have helped us get started. The American-Canadian Genealogical Society in Manchester New Hampshire donated a complete set of Tanguay to us. I also wish to thank all our guest speakers and others who worked to make this first conference a success. I hope with the help of others to have our library open at least every Saturday this summer I can not do it all myself, it will be open each Saturday from 10am to 8pm for research our library is located in the Community Center upstairs, its the old High School directly across from St-John-Bapt. "MORE THAN 13 MILLION AMERICANS OF FRENCH DECENT"

NEW YORK-More than 13 million Americans-many more than previously estimated-are of French ancestry. This was revealed in the figures from the last official census in the United States.

Moreover, the majority of these Franco-Americans are descendants of Quebecois.

According to the U.S.Census Bureau, 13.6 million Americans in 1980, responded that they were of French origin, or French-Canadian, Acadian, Cajun, or French-Creole.

This is the first time that the census questionnaire distributed by the Americans asked a question about national origins. The figures obtained must be considered a conservative count, given the fact that many people would have refused to answer the question.

Previous census have limited this type of question to asking about the mother tongue, the language spoken in the home and the place of birth.

These statistics Moreover, do not distinguish between those whose ancestors came from Canada and those whose ancestors came from France. According to the Franco-American Association, many more than half of the 13.6 million Americans are immigrants from Canada, or the descendants thereof. Their high numbers are explained by the high birth rate among French-Canadians, which persisted until the 1960's.

These numbers are surprising even to the leaders of the Franco-American community, who believed that, contrary to the overseas French, the French-Canadians were traditionally hesitant to identify their origins. Many modified their names on arrival in the States and did not participate in the political and social life of their new environment.

Professor Yvon Labbe, University of Maine, estimates that the Canadian French are less visible than certain other ethnic groups who have migrated from this same continent, and certainly less visible than European immigrants.

Half of the population of Quebec emigrated south between the years 1850 and 1900. Unable to survive on the overcrowded farms in Quebec, They sought work in the steamy cotton mills of New England. They arrived in family groups and thereby preserved their social structure, but they had the feeling of having betrayed French-Canada and abandoned their ancestral homeland.

Some were apostates from the Catholic faith who had lost their way in a Protestant land. Most of these were the very young who were caught in a cross cultural conflict between the traditional values of their parents and the new world around them. This emigration constituted a black page in the history of Quebec and even today the government of Quebec resents the effects of it.

Franco-Americans represent some very important groups in the New England states where they constitute more than a third of the population of Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. More than 3.1 million people from New England and New York are originally French.



Today, less than 22% of the French-Canadians live in the northeastern United States. Louisiana, with its unique Cajun heritage, adds a million of French descent, California has 1.3 million, Michigan 943,000 and Texas, Florida, Illinois and Ohio about 500,000 each.

Some Franco-Americans, they have a different and more positive attitude in regard to Quebec and the French language.

There is a tendency, most notable in the last few years, claims Professor Labbe, for many groups of French-Canadian origin to rediscover their roots and to join associations dedicated to the preservations of their heritage.

##### "7 FRENCH ARMY OFFICERS AMONG U.S. MARTYRS"

Seven French army officers who were burned at the stake by Indians in Mississippi in 1736 may some day be declared Saints of the Church. The military men died at the same time as Father Anthony Senat, S.J., and they are like him included in the list of 111 Americans martyrs whose beautification is being sought by the U.S. Hierarchy. Here is the official document sent to Rome to promote their cause.

Commander Pierre D'ARTIQUETTE (born, France, 1700)

Captain Francois Marie BISSOT DE VINCENNES (Born, Montreal, PQ 17 Jun 1700)

Captain Louis D'AILLEBOUST De COULONGE (Born, Montreal, PQ 21 Nov 1699)

Captain Louis Charles DUTISNE (Born, Montreal, PQ 29 Dec 1708)

Captain Francois MARIACHAU D'ESGLY (Born, Quebec, PQ 17 Dec 1708)

Captain, Pierre Antoine De TONTY Jr. (Born, Montreal, PQ 8 Oct 1710)

Captain Louis GROSTON De St-ANGE Jr. (Born, Montreal, PQ 1702)

TIME: 25 Mar 1736 (Official date)

PLACE: Pontotoc, near Fulton, Mississippi, Diocese of Natchez.

##### MARTYRDOM

These seven officers, with 13 soldiers, were burned at the stake at the same time as Father Senat (Martyr No. 69). Since the Chickasaw Indians, who put them to death, were allied with the Protestant English and appear to have hated the French but also the religion of the French, the names of these officers are given here. Encouraged by Father Senat, they died with truly Christian fortitude.

ALONG WITH THE MOVEMENT OF OUR FAMILY  
CAME THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

From 1820 to 1840 the population of Clinton and Exxex counties rose from 24,881 to 51,791. During this period there was a series of battles in Canada, known as the Papineau Rebellion, which forced many French-Canadians to leave for the United States. A large epidemic of cholera caused many people to leave Montreal for Plattsburgh in the year 1832. In addition, this period also saw the influx of many Irish people, who combined with the French-Canadians to greatly increase the Catholic population in Plattsburgh, NY.

Majorie Lansing Porter's book the "History of Plattsburgh" (George Little Press, 1964) states that; "Catholic services were held at private homes and in the red store on the Delord property not long after the settlement of Plattsburgh was established, priest coming from Canada to serve persons of that faith.. In 1832, the first resident priest, Father Rogers, young recently ordained, began an ambitious program of membership and organization. A lot was purchased from Judge John Palmer in 1834 (site of Plattsburgh City Hall) on which to build a church, but Father Rogers left Plattsburgh in 1835 and it wasn't until May of 1836, under Rev. George Drummond, that the church was incorporated as the first Roman Catholic Church of the Town of Plattsburgh... Father Rooney, long-time administrator of the parish, brought about completion of the building which had been started under Father Drummond. The square limestone edifice had a seating capacity of four or five hundred persons and was dedicated on September 25, 1842 by Archbishop Hughes.. in 1848 Keesville became a separate parish and in 1853 French people of the congregation withdrew to form an organization under the oblate Fathers... In 1867, under Father Maloney, lots fronting Margaret St., Broad and Oak Streets were purchased and on July 1, 1868, the conerstone of St. John's Church was laid. The St. Peters Church building, begun in 1854, was dedicated on November 19, 1865. St. Peters Church of Plattsburgh was incorporated December 16, 1855, but the church edifice wasn't completed until 1865... In 1907 a dispute arose relative to the right of the French-Canadian congregation to bury their dead in the Old Catholic Cemetery (corner Elizabeth Street and U.S. Ave. -NOTE). Records indicated that the cemetery was bought in 1851 for the Roman Catholic Church of Plattsburgh, of which the Frence people were then members. It was purchased by Bishop McClosky for \$200 of which a fair portion was contributed by the French."

St. Peters Church soon became the hub of the religious lives of our family and many others in the Plattsburgh area. Sermons were preached in French at the church, and the population was served by the Oblate Fathers. Many of our old relatives such as Toussaint Petit-dit-Lalumiere, Louis M. Lalumiere, Paul Lalumiere, and Charles Hebert helped to establish St. Peters Church as we know it today.

I am continuing to research her mother's side; her mother was Delia Young (Yon-Dion-Guyon). During the course of my research,I compiled a file of the Lamontagne-Lamountain names as they appear in the 1900 Census Soundex Index. I have finally gotten around to listing them on paper and making copies available. I trust this pamphlet will be usefull to others doing research on the Lamontagne-Lamountain family.

### Information

Taken from the 1900 Census Soundex for New York State for the names Lamontagne and Lamountain as they appear in the National Archives microfilm. The information is listed as it appears on the original index cards;that is,with misspellings,inaccuracies and errors. Most of the problems occur with the given names. In some cases,I have made suggestions for clarification (e.g., Theophile for Pheophele). However,some cannot be identified and I have left them as they appear (e.g.,Mesadus). The names are listed alphbetically by the given name of the head of the household. Below the names are listed the month and year of birth, place of birth,and citizenship status. Also under list the County,Town and sometimes the address with street number. Below this information are listed the other members of the household and their relationship to the head of the household, their birth information and citizenship status are also given. The "head of household" status includes people who are living in someone eles's home as a servant or boarder,school children, and inmates in institutions. Anyone interested in searching for a surname in the 1900 Soundex Card Index should obtain a copy of "1900 Federal Population Census: A Catalogue of Microfilm Copies of the Schedules," to determine the microfilm publication number and roll number for the state and code number of surname being researched. The catalogue also explains how to determine the code number.

Here is a brief description of the code number, It is alphanumeric. The letter is derived from the surname (e.g., L for Lamontagne). Following the letter are 3 digits derived from the numbers assigned to letters:

The following letters have no numbers: a,e,i,o,u,y,w,and h, If there are not enough numbers to make 3 digits,zero's are added (e.g.,Dion, coded as D500). When 2 letters or equivalents appear together or one letter immediately precedes or follows an equivalent,the 2 are coded as one letter by a single numner (e.g.,Kelly,coded as K400;Buerck as B620). There are many codes used in the soundex but only the ones used in the Lamontagne,Lamountain are listed below.

BO=Boarder, BL=Brother in law, D=Daughter, M=Mother, S=Son

Citizenship Status A=Alien(Usally AL was used,NA=Naturalized although NR was also used more often, PA=First papers filed,Can=Canada,Fr=French.

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#### BOOK REVIEW

"Dictionnaire généalogique des familles du Québec--Des origines à 1730" by René Jetté. Les Presses de l'Université de Montréal, 2910, bd Edouard Montpetit, Montréal (Québec) Canada H3C 3J7, 1100 pages, Price \$200.00 Canadian.

This fine book is based on exhaustive computerized data incorporated in the ongoing series "Répertoire des actes de baptême, mariage, sépulture et des recensements du Québec ancien" of the Programme de recherche en démographie historique (P.R.D.H.) of the Université de Montréal (22 volumes to date, to 1730, to continue up to 1765). René Jetté's dictionary is supplemented by reliable data from other sources, such as Archange Godbout, Auger, MSGCF, Trudel, Mme Montagne, etc., making it a distinctively, genealogical work.

As Tanguay was once indispensable, so will Jetté's work be and we hope, a subsequent volume up to 1800. Improvements and corrections in typography, geographical nomenclature (especially, place names in France), paleographic research, and scientific accuracy are evident on every page. It should be in every public library in Canada and the United States.

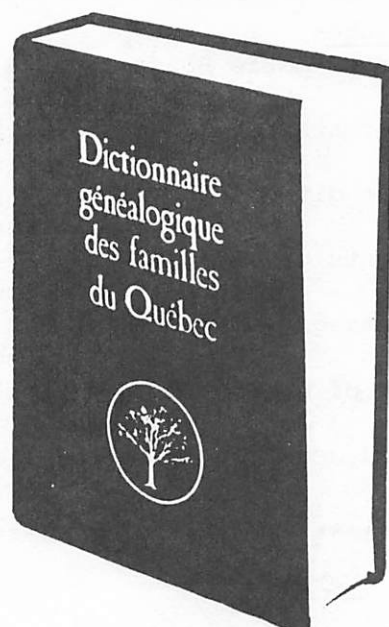
Inevitably, some omissions will be noticed, for instance marriage contract 1654 Ameau, discovered a few years ago (T.-R.) between François Lemaître and Judith Rigaud, which gives his origin and parentage; Judith Rigaud's death (1703, Montréal) is likewise missing. Also, the De Billy family genealogy (cf. "L'Ancêtre" 1978). We also suspect that more data is, or will be available on the Gelineau, Drouin and Roland Auger families. Such data and other data yet to be discovered both in the New World as well as in Europe could probably be incorporated as a supplement to a future contemplated volume up to 1800.

No New France-Canadian family of importance has caused more genealogical and historical misconceptions than that of the LaCornes. While a longer work is being prepared the following is submitted. To shorten references,with titles often excessively long,a list of abbreviations is appenden. For brevity,the family will be called LaCorne.

1. JEAN-LOUIS DE LA CORNE, Sieur de Chaptès,was born in the little village of Chaptès in the Commune of Beauregard-Vandon, Puy-de-Dome,France on October 26,1666 and died in Montreal on May 6,1732. For two hundred years his progenitors had been ennobled by the sword. As a young officer he had,in 1684,lost an eye during the siege of Gironde. Among his wounds in Canada,to which he came in 1685,were severe ones to an arm and his thigh. Made a Captain in 1703,granted the Cross of St.Louis in 1713,he became successively town mayor of Trois-Rivières in 1714,garrison adjutant of the regular Colonial Troops at Quebec in 1722 and King's Lieutenant of Mntreal in 1726 (GD duC,2:18). Eight years before his death he had been given a pension of 400 livres. It was far too small to surport LaCorne or help in the education of his large family. By his sole marriage he had become co-seigneur of Contrecoeur,one of the fiefs vital in the defence of Montreal from Mohawk depredations. Governor Beauharnois permitted trading licenses to two poor widows in the right of their husbands. Stretching a point,he gave one to Mme.LaCorne in 1730 (DCHNY 9:1028). She may have used it to help the commercial ventures of one of their sons. From an historical viewpoint Chevalier LaCorne is remembered for successfully urging the construction of a fort near the southern end of Lake Champlain. His memoire stresses both defence against and attact by the English and their tribesmen (DCHNY 9:1022). No one dared to let the mother country know the extent of smuggling operations to and from Albany. The fort could hold it to a reasonable amount.

On June 11,1695 Jean-Louis LaCorne married marie Pécaudy de Contrecoeur (1677-1752). She was a daughter of Captain Antoine Pécaudy de Contrecoeur of the Carignan-Salières regiment,who elected to stay in Canada,and Barbe Denys de la Trinité (DCB 2:327). Her father had been ennobled by letters of patent in 1661. In the right of his wife he became co-seignior when her father died circa 1682. In a time of high infant mortality,it is remarkable that only one of the twelve children died young. The average age of the eleven others was sixty.

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NOTE:

Some lines of descent have not been carried to the present. Louis LaCorne (#17) (1748-1775) may have married and had children. If Manette (#22) existed she may have left issue. Louis-Archambaud de Douglas (#34) Left prosperous descendants at Montréal in Bugey. Well Cared for documents, including many letters from him are there. In 1948 or 1949 the Countess of Douglas graciously permitted Pierre Gauthier, M.D. of Bourg-en-Bresse (Ain) France to make a leisurely study of the muniments. Some copied were printed (Revue d'Histoire de l'Amérique française Montréal, Québec, Volume III (1949-1950) pages 30-44. The two Tarieu de Lanaudière lines have not been followed, Nor have those of Baby, Aubert de Gaspe, Joliette and Leodel

2. LOUIS LACORNE, l'aîné, baptized 24 Jun 1696, buried at his siegniory of Terrebonne 2 April 1762. It was he who as a young officer commanding only eight soldiers built the Magasin Royal at the head of navigation on the Niagara River at the start of the eight mile portage; a stockaded trading post about 40' X 30' early in 1720 (Severence, Frank H., NY 1917, Volume 20, Buffalo Historical Society Publication; An Old Frontier of France 1:183-186). This brief fur-trading experience was valuable to him in later years. He served in the mother country from 1721 to about 1731 in the Royal-La-Marine. While an officer of the Quebec regulars he became a Captain and was granted the Cross of St. Louis in 1751 (DG duC 2:18 and A.F. page 151). He married on 1 September 1740 Marie-Elizabeth (1707-d. after 1776), a daughter of Claude de Ramezay and Marie-Charlotte Denys de la Ronde, thus becoming a brother-in-law of J.B. Nicholas-Roche de Ramezay and Louis-Henri Deschamps de Boishebert. Two sisters-in-law, Francoise-Louise (1705-1776), a shrewd, unmarried business woman with commercial intrests from the lower St. Lawrence to Lake Champlain; the other, Marie-Marguerite-Charlotte (1697-1767) as a nun became famous Mère Saint-Claude de la Croix. General Murray wished she had been a man so he could make her a grenadier (Knox Journal 2:367-368).

- +14. I. Marie-Charlotte LaCorne (1741-before 1770).
- II. Jeanne-Louise LaCorne (1743-1743).
- +15. III. Elizabeth-Louise LaCorne (1744-after-1787) A nun at Loches.
- +16. IV. Marie-Angelique LaCorne (9/22/1746-1815).
- V. Marie-Anne LaCorne (1747-1747).
- +17. VI. Louis-LaCorne (1748-1775) Seigneur of Terrebonne on death father.
- +18. VII. François-José LaCorne (3/23.1750-12/14/1800 at Gen. Hosp. Quebec.

3. LOUISE-URSULE LACORNE, born on 9 October 1697 at Trois-Rivière and died in its Ursuline Convent in 1753 having made her Profession in 1722 (Les Ursulines des Trois-Rivière, etc. Volume 4, page 479). She adopted the name of the Spanish mystic St. Theresa who had done so much to strengthen the Carmelite Order. She is described as a charming woman and noted for her beauty. It is to her we owe our knowledge of the bravery and ability of her relative, Marie-Anne de St. Ours. When the latter was only nine she and other children in a canoe were over a mile from the St. Ours fort when it was attacked by Iroquois. Her brains and ability to swim saved not only the children but a soldier who, futhur down the river, fell in. The Hazel nuts and crayfish the children had gathered were the only loss (Ibid, 11:245-252 and 4:479).

4. CLAIRE-FRANCOISE LACORNE, (1699-1783) was also beautiful and charming. She made her Profession with her sister in 1722, taking the name Mère de l'Enfant Jésus, as an Ursuline in Trois-Rivière. In order of admittance they were numbers 20 and 21. She outlived her blood sister by thirty years. The records give both the same place of birth (Ibid, same pages as above). That the date is missing may indicate that she was born on shipboard or in France. On 4 June 1698 her father and family were granted leave to go to the homeland. Because of his wounds it was twice extended (DCB 2:327).

5. MARIE-MADELINE LACORNE, born in France in 1700 and buried in Montreal on 13 March 1762. When only eighteen she became a member of the Congregation of Notre-Dame of Montreal. When her vows were made in 1720 her religious name was Soeur de Saint-Sacrament. for forty-four years she gladly shared the apostolic activities of her Profession in Montreal and in the parish of Sainte-Famille on Ile d'Orleans. A brother, always called Chevalier, had been drowned in the wreck of the Auguste on 15 November 1761 leaving no children. She was one of his six legal heirs. Her father had been too poor to pay for her entrance into her Order. A special arrangement had been made with his friend, Bishop Saint Vallier (LaCroix). It was honored by the English. General Thomas Gage, Than Governor of Montreal, ordered one of her brothers, St. Luc LaCorne, to pay the Congregation 2,000 livres with intrest from 1720 (DCB 3:333). Letters in the Archives of the Seminaire de Quebec indicate that payment was divided among the heirs (DCB 3:332-333).

6. LOUIS-LUC LACORNE, baptized 6 Jul 1703, died 15 November 1761. He and contemporaries have caused endless confusion in using other given names; Pierre, Jean-Louis, Louis-François, etc. (DCHNY indexes him as Pierre twenty-six times). He was granted the Cross of St-Louis on 1 May 1749. Due to the custom of using the word Chevalier for a younger son, he has been referred to in history as "The Chevalier de la Corne". As an officer of the Marine he gained fame from present Nova Scotia to Saskatchewan. Several acres of grain planted at the latter post grew to be harvested and thus he was the progenitor of western agriculture. His fur-trading ventures were profitable. He and three nephews were last on 15 November 1761 in the wreck of the Auguste near present Dingwall, Nova Scotia. His younger brother, St. Luc, was one of the seven survivors. on 29 January 1728 he married Marie-Anne, a daughter of Renè Hubert and Francoise de la Croix. They are believed to had only two stillborn children. His wife died at Repentigny at age 91 in 1768 (DG duC).

7.(PIERRE)ANTOINE LACORNE, Sieur de la Colombière, Seigneur of Beloeil. Born December 1708. Died 23 September 1780 at Loches. Chevalier of the Royal and Military Order of St.Louis,an honor granted on 1 May 1757. He used "Pierre" rarely,possibly to avoid confusion with the elder brother who misused that given name. Once was on 22 June 1743 in his oath of foi and homage when he was presented with his seigniory (RAPQ 1921/22,page 104). He,like his four brothers,rose through the ranks as the Marine,or Colonial Troops, and as they did,profited from legal fur-trading. At times they acted as partners,but at others independently. On 6 November 1744 he married Marguerite,daughter of Charles Petit de Livillière and Madeleine de Varennes,widow of Louis-Joseph-Marie Robert de la Morandière. She died at Loches in 1770. They had four children.

19. I. Pierre (1745- ).

20. II. Marguerite (1746-1747).

21. III. Antoine (1755- ) Said to have been a priest.

22. IV. Rev.LeJeune wrote that the above three children had died at birth. He added,nevertheless,that there was another daughter,Manette,who married at Loches in 1767 Sieur de-Villers,who had while in Canada been "Contrôleur de la Marine",who had courted her during his stay(DG duC 2:20 and DCB 4:124,Jean de Villers).

8.FRANCOIS-JOSUE LACORNE, Sieur Dubreuil. Born 7 October 1710. Died 17 October 1753. His untimely death precluded his gaining the Cross of St.Louis. One of the LaCorne family talents was the ability to get along with and control the various Indian nations. While Commandant at Fort Kaministiquia his rhetoric convinced the Ojibwas to hunt and trap in peace with their natural enemies (the Sioux and the Sauks) in the Snake River region west of Lake Superior. As was natural he was involved in the military and commerical life of interior Canada along with his brothers.

In February 1747 he and his eldest brother snowshoed to the western Great Lakes to obtain savages to aid New France in the east. They separated at Detroit so each could go to the tribes where their influence was greatest. He traveled to St.Joseph, Chicago,Rivière à la Roche,the Sauks,the Puants and the Folles Avoines and obtained 140 good warriors as he wrote in his service record (FV Carton 9,#9). Earlier he and his brothers la Colombière and St.Luc had been officers serving under Paul Marin the Elder in the famous 1745 destruction of Old Saratoga,on the Hudson River, where among others the Philip Schuylers was killed. A few days after his return to Montreal he was married to a cousin of St.Luc's first wife. His first reported serious illness was in late 1748 when he was carried back from Fort St.Frederick,Crown Point,NY believed to be dying of dropsy,as Mme Elizabeth Bégon wrote to her son. Again under Marin during the French occupation of western Pennsylvania he surveyed the relatively new route from Lake Erie to the upper Ohio and supervised the construction of canoes and dugouts. Many succumbed to disease. Marin died there in October 1753. Dubreuil lived long enough to get to Quebec where he died on 17 October 1753 (DCB 3:333).

He had married 28 December 1745 Marie-Michelle (1720-1773), a daughter of Leonard Hervieux (1678-1747) and Catharine Magain (1684-1744). Her elder sister,Marie-Anne Hervieux had in 1727 married Jean-Baptiste Lecompte Dupré,producing a number of children,including a son who married a daughter of St.Luc LaCorne Q.V. The Hervieux emigrant and founder of this well-known fur



trading family was Isaac. He married twice. Jean-Baptiste Hervieux, a son of Isaac by his second marriage, had a daughter, another Marie-Anne, who became the first wife of St. Luc LaCorne Q.V. The Hervieux family was of the Bourgeois-Seignioral class. Marriages linked them to other important families, including those of Marin de la Malgue, Hertel de Rouville and Sanguinet (Tanguay, 500-501).

LaCorne Dubreuil and his Hervieux wife had three children. Only the first is usually recorded.

23. I. François-Michel, baptized 18 May 1748 (DG duC 2:20). This young Cadet was one of over 100 lost in the sinking of the Auguste on 15 November 1761. As noted elsewhere an Uncle and two first cousins also died.
24. II. Un-named child, buried 27 May 1751 (FV Carton 9 Liasse A #4.
- 25 III. Marieanne Michel, Posthumous, born late in 1753 or early 1754. She died unmarried and was buried at Notre-Dame in Montreal on 15 September 1831. She shared in the estate of her Uncles (FV Carton 9 #13, #26, etc.).

9. LUC LACORNE DE SAINT LUC, Born 1711. Died at Montreal on 1 October 1784, and buried at Notre-Dame on the 4th. This soldier-partisan-leader-merchant-trader-traveller-writer-orator-slave owner was a tough man of wealth. The Cross of Saint Louis was granted him on 1 January 1759. For him and his estate see RAPQ 1947-1948 as later corrected by Pierre Tousignant, who wrote his biography in DCB 4:425-429. He was always maligned by American historians. Vast amounts of material in print about him are in error. The great propagandist, Benjamin Franklin, while in France, invented a two-pronged impossible story about him that was published in French and English newspapers. It was designed to help the Whigs in England to terminate the American Revolution and to gain French aid for the thirteen colonies. His actions during the American invasion of Canada in 1775 are controversial, but defensible. As Superintendent of Indian Affairs he kept the Caughnawaga Indians from being destroyed while they in turn dealt with both sides. It was common knowledge that Montreal would fall. He did his best to assure that the city would not be looted and burned. Sanguinet, who wrote part of Verreau's "Invasion", and St. Luc were not friends, so one has to assess carefully that part of the book. Four of his sisters were Nuns. Two of his brothers were priests. There is abundant proof that he was a staunch Romanist and hated by the New England Protestants. As one of the noblesse he stood for the ancient feudal system. The announced American plan was for the Canadians to vote for and elect delegates to the American Congress. Those remaining in Canada swore fealty and homage to King George. St. Luc, and probably all of his class, adhered to their oaths with pride.

St. Luc married three times. The first marriage contract was signed on 10 December 1742. By then he was worth 30,000 livres, all gained by his own efforts. The bride was Marie-Anne Hervieux (1715-1754), whose family relationship were given supra. They had seven children.

- +26. I. Marie-Anne, born 31 March 1744. Buried at Notre-Dame in Montreal on 12 March 1813.
- \*27. II. Louis-François, born 11 March 1745. Drowned in the shipwreck.
- \*28. III. Luc-Jean-Baptiste, born 14 January 1746. Drowned in shipwreck.
- \*29. IV Louis-Marie, born 13 April 1747. Drowned in shipwreck.

- +30. V. Geneviève-Elizabeth (called Babet), born 28 August 1748.  
Died 30 March 1817.
- \*31. VI. Michel, born 20 October 1749. Drowned in shipwreck.
- +32 VII. Marie-Louise-Charlotte, born 18 September 1750. Died  
25 January 1771.

\* These four all perished in marine disasters. Two circa 1758 and their brothers on 15 November 1761 in the horrible wreck of the Auguste. They were listed by the father, both Cadets à l'équilette, as "MM.LaCorne de St.Luc and the Chevalier de la Corne". By the usage of the times these were courtesy titles and the first name was senior to the other. On 3 March 1762 John Welles wrote Sir William Johnson that St.Luc had almost saved two sons "about four years ago he lost two sons by shipwreck" (WJ 3:644).

St.Luc LaCorne married second on 3 September 1757 Marie-Joseph, daughter of Charles Guillimin and Françoise Lemaitre LaMorille, and widow of the LaCorne family friend, Jacques Legardeur de St.Pierre (1701-1755), a famous warrior killed by the stupidity of Baron Jean A.Diesku. She died 11 Apr 1769. St.Luc was one of the last to leave the bloody field of Lake George, N.Y. Their marriage contract unusual in that neither shared in the goods of the other. Among Marie-Joseph's assets of 60,000 livres were 4,500 liters of brandy. Evidently St.Luc believed he would die first. At the end of their contract there was an odd clause that gave the wife the entire authority to dispose of all his worldly goods. They had no issue.

St.Luc LaCorne married third on 20 March 1774 to Marie-Margurite (1739-11/19/1819), eldest daughter of Pierre, the third and principal seigneur of Boucherville and Marguerite Rimbault. They had one child, his eighth:

- +33. VIII. Marie-Marguerite, born 3 Jan 1775. Buried 29 May 1845.

10. JOSEPH-MARIE LACORNE, baptized at Vercheres, PQ on 2 November 1714, died 7 December 1779 at his Abbey of Maubec in France. He entered the Séminaire de Québec in 1730, received the Tonsure in 1735 and was ordained in Rennes, France in 1738. In 1739 he became the parish priest of St.Michel de Bellechasse. In 1747 he became a Canon of the Québec Cathedral and the next year a member of the Governmental Council. He returned to France in 1750 as legal representative of his Chapter, where, in spite of his longing to live in his native Canada, he remained the rest of his life except for visits to England on political church matters. He became administrator of Maubec and its several benefices. The Abbey of Maubec had been founded by King Dagobert in 532. It had passed to Mgr.de Laval by brevet on 14 December 1662 (J.Viger, Saberdache Bleue 10:159). By 1759 he had become a noted ecclesiastic and was given by Louis XV the rich Abbey of L'Etoile in the diocese of Poitiers. At the conquest he lent and gave considerable sums to his Canadian confreres. Shortly thereafter the Vicar Generalship of Louisiana and Mississippi was added to that of Québec. He was a man of great energy and one of Canada's great diplomats (DCB 4:429-430).

The Abbé de L'Etoile kept in close touch with his family in Canada and with those who fled to France after the cession. Often he handled their financial matters. He begged his sister-in-law Mme.LaCorne Dubreuil and neice to Join him. Much of the correspondence is preserved in the Fonds Verreau at the Séminaire de Québec. His signature was usually "lacorne ab de l'etoil et de moebec" (sic). He was strong in defending his twin brother, who was

often maligned as the black sheep of the La Cornes. The career of the Abbé is well documented (DCB 4:429-431).

11. JEAN-LOUIS LACORNE, baptized at Vercheres, PQ on 2 November 1714, died 1778 at Bourbonnais, France. He's a twin of the Abbé l'Etoile, was a controversial Récollet priest. His religious name was Father Maurice. Like his five non-twin brothers, he was more of a warrior-trader than a priest. During the last troubled years of New France his missionary post was on the Miramichi, where one of his duties was to care for the Micmac tribe. Some years the land and sea gave a surplus of peltries. Father Maurice sold the skins and purchased a schooner. With it he built up a coastal trade ranging from Cape Breton to Québec. Few knew the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence as well as he. Armed vessels from New England were a continuing menace. There had never been peace on the Gulf. Father Maurice and his native crew could gain from capturing poorly defended enemies. On one occasion when twenty-four miles from Gaspé Harbor his little ship was cornered by two English privateers. He and his crew of ten were able to get to shore and survive the nineteen-day walk to Québec. There the well-informed Intendant, Gilles Huguart, knowing that the survival of the several tribes as well as Canadians depended on LaCorne's skill in carrying food, clothing and ammunition to them, gave him the well-armed king's brigantine, *Le Soleil Levant*. Fearing criticism, he put on record that the ship was worm-eaten by service in the West Indies, adding that the expense of refitting her was trifling (DCHNY 10:14, 15, 17, 43, 72-74, 111, 118, 124, 149). About this time Father Maurice changed his name to Captain Jean Barthe. By various methods that must have included freebootery he amassed an adequate fortune. Nevertheless, this Franciscan Friar was twice elected for two-year terms as the Superior or Guardian of his Order, from 1756-1759. The Montreal records are incomplete (Bulletin des Recherches History, Volume 34, page 19). He may have acted as the Provincial of New France. The British had put a price on the famous Father Le Loutre's head. The trusted Father Maurice was looked on as a replacement in Acadia if Le Loutre was killed. These were the only two given the signals which would identify the French fleet making rendezvous at Chibouctou (Halifax) in September 1746 (DCB 4:459). In his defence his twin brother the Abbé, wrote that he was always sick and that his chest and stomach were in a bad state. Were these his stigmata? He went to France where he was secularized on or about 6 February 1759. There he drove his carriage and associated with females (LaJeune, DC duC 2:21). Louis de Courville, who had been stationed in Acadia in 1754 wrote in his *Mémoires* similar reports to those of William Smith in his 1815 History of Canada to 1763.

Captain Louis LeNeuf de la Valière was stationed at Beauséjour only a few yards from the British Fort Lawrence on the Misseguash, the river that divides present New Brunswick from Nova Scotia. There can be no reason to doubt his official report for 15 September 1750 to 28 July 1751. An English officer, Edward How, was accustomed to walk on his side of the river calling across various promises designed to subvert the listening Acadians and Indians. A dyke made the place ideal for an ambush. On 15 Oct 1750 "At eight in the morning Etienne Bâtard, an Indian, called Père la Corne, carried a flag (white) along the bank near the place of ambush." M. How too had a similar flag. They talked a while. Then Etienne gave the signal. Those hidden by the dyke jumped up, fired their pieces, mortally wounding M. How. Etienne remained some time before joining the Micmacs who had returned to the Miramichi (Archives Report, 1905, Volume II, part III, pages 324-330, as translated by Dr. J.C. Webster, 1930. The Forts of the Chignecto, pages 131, 132, 136, 140).

(Assuming that the translation is correct, LaValière clearly showed Etienne's relationship to the LaCorne family. Also, he was in error in writing that Etienne la Bâtard was also the Chief Jeab-Baptiste Cope (Francis Parkman, ed. of 1925, Montcalm and Woofe, 1:123).

Letters from his youngest sister may indicate that Father Maurice had not been a secularist, but had been freed of his vows. Writing from Loches, the new home of many expatriate Canadians, she mentioned that in 1775 he had suffered from gout. Early in 1778 four of the LaCorne brothers were with her. These she refers to as St. Luc, la Colombière, Abbé de l'Etoile and Abbé de Chap, i.e. Father Maurice. She wrote "We hope that the Abbé de Chap will come to live with us after his return from taken the waters. He was in a sad shape one half of his body is paralyzed. He can not walk." (Archives du Séminaire de Québec, FV Carton 9, #33). He never returned to Loche, but died in the warm baths the Romans called Aqua Bormones, the Bourbonnaise of his day.

12. MARIE-ANNE LACORNE DE CHAPT, was born in Montreal probably in 1716, and not in 1712 or 1713 as generally thought. She became a sister at Notre-Dame des Anges, the General Hospital of Québec. She was thirty-eight when her final vows were made 29 December 1754. Her entry number is 55 and her religious name became Mère de la Croix. She was one of the saintly nurses who cared equally for friend and enemy during the siege of Québec and after the battle of Ste. Foy. In the last French victory she undoubtedly tended the wounds of her brothers, Louis l'aine and St. Luc. With the influx of English merchants and settlers her world had so changed that she believed her skills were more needed in France, to which many of her friends and relatives had gone. Thus, when she was fifty years old she embarked for France in 1766, where she again took up her profession at the hospital at Loches. She died in 1797 having suffered terribly in the French Revolution (Monseigneur de Saint-Vallier et L'Hôpital Général de Québec, pages 384, 385, 720, 721). Her entry into religious life had been delayed as it was she who cared for her aged mother. She and three sisters had little chance of marriage to one of their social class. Though both their parents were noblesse they were too poor to provide the girls with any dowry. Governor Beauharnois tried to help by giving their mother a coveted fur trading license (DCHNY 9:1028). Both parents were in debt when they died (see also FV Carton 7 #58).

14. MARIE-CHARLOTTE LACORNE, born 10 August 1741, died prior to 1768. She married on 13 April 1757 Chevallier and a Captain of the Languedoc Regiment Vicomte François-Prosper de Douglas (1725-1781). Before returning to his native France he had served under Dieskau and Montcalm as a good, but not brilliant, officer. In 1767 Douglas wrote his mother-in-law from Paris. He was on winter leave from his regiment in Corsica. Twice he called his younger son abbé. He seems to have been preordained for the church. He may have been the abbé de Douglas executed in Paris on 2 September 1792 (FV Carton 7, #79 and #58).

From early in the 1700's and long before Sholto was a common given name of the Scotch-English Douglas's, but used by that family (Oxford Dictionary of English Christian Names, 1947 edition). Sioltaich Dhu Glas was the phrase giving the Douglas name in Gaelic. Siolataich means "Sower". (An alternate spelling is Scholto).



On 15 November 1770 the Vicomte de Douglas wrote a receipt in duplicate for the interest paid him on his deceased wife's dowry of 20,000 francs and the 4,000 franc inheritance from her aunt Licotte (sic) de Ramezay. He names his sons. He wrote from Montréal in Bugey (FV Carton 7, #10). They had three Children below.

+34 I. Chevalier Louis-Archambaud, imprisoned during the terror of 1794. He survived.

+35. II Charles-Luc Sholto

36. III. A child born in France who died young, unmarried.

15. ELIZABETH-LOUISE LACORNE, born 31 Jul 1744 and died after 1787. She did not marry Charles Tarieu de Lanaudière as Tanguay wrote in his Dictionnaire Genealogique, 3:286. The error was copied by Pierre-Georges Roy, the prolific archivist of the Province of Québec in his 1922 history of the Lanadières. Elizabeth-Louise evidently was the Babet who lived at the General Hospital at Loches with her aunt, Marie-Anne (1716-1797) known as Mère de la Croix. Before the death of her uncle, Joseph-Marie (1714-1778) the Abbé de l'Etoile, she became a nun known by Mère St. Pierre (FV Carton 7, #58).

16. MARIE-ANGELIQUE LACORNE, born 22 Sept 1746, died in 1815. She probably was the Lilique in her sister's letters. She married on 31 Mar 1766 Chevalier Pierre-Paul Margame de Lavaltrie. They had on child.

+37. I. Susanne-Antoinette, born 1772, died 1822.

17. LOUIS LACORNE, born 1748, died 1775. Seignior of Terrebonne on the death of his father. A likeable young man with quick temper who had difficulty in getting his habitants to join the militia. Loyal to his oath, he was killed at Fort Chambly fighting against the nearly successful American invasion of Canada.

18. FRANCOIS-JOSUE LACORNE, born 23 Mar 1750. Died 14 December 1800 at the General Hosiptal at Quebec. A Captain in the French navy, he served in the Indies under Admiral Pierre-Andre de Suffren successfully against the English. Ill health caused his retirement in 1785 but he gained the Cross of Saint Louis the next year. During the French Revolution he was a Royalist and emigré-refugee in England. In 1792 the British Government sent him to Canada with the Abbés Desjardins, Raimbault and Gazel to make arrangements for the relocation of other Canadian refugees. He did not marry (AF, page 231).

28. MARIE-ANNE LACORNE, born 31 Mar 1744, buried at Notre-Dame in Montreal 12 March 1813. In 1763 she married Captain, latter Lieutenant Colonel John Campbell of Glenaruel, Argyleshire, Scotland (ca. 1/23/1731-6/23/1794). St. Luc helped him get appointed Inspector of Indian Affairs in 1765 (DCB 4:129). He served in the Caribbean and in Abercromby's defeat at Ticonderoga, where he was wounded. His regiments were the Black Watch and the 27th Foot. Before and after he went on half pay the couple were often in the British Isles and France. His French was adequate, but his letters in that language were almost ludicrous. In 1775 he was the leader of the small force that captured Ethan Allen in his premature attempt to take Montreal, an honor often attributed to one of Sir William Johnson's half-breeds. Later that year he and St. Luc were captured by the Americans. Both spent a year in Jail at Kingston, N.Y. and near Philadelphia. Before his own death in 1774 the grasping Sir Williams Johnson did all he could to hurt him. His anti-Johnson backers included the Rt. Hon. Henry Seymore Conway, Lady Ailesbury,

General John Campbell, Colonel Gabriel Christie, and probably the third Duck of Richmond and Lennox. There is a chance that he was a relative of Major John Lennon Q.V. ante. I find no record of Cambell-LaCorne issue. Both are often mentioned in family correspondance (FV Carton 7, #9 and DCB 4:129-131).

30. GENEVIEVE-ELIZABETH LACORNE (Called Babet), born 28 August 1748. Died 30 Mar 1817. On 10 April 1769 she married the Chevalier and Anglophile, Charles-Louis Tarieu (10/14/1743-10/2/1811). He was the only surviving child of the Honorable Charles-Francois Xavier Tarieu de Lanaudière by his first wife, Louis-Genevieve Deschamps de Boishebert. By the father's second marriage to a daughter of the Baron Longuerriél their issue was ten. One of these, a second Charles, assumed Gaspard as a given name. It was he who married a granddaughter of LaCorne l'âiné. One of Babet's husband's half-sisters, Marie-Anne, married the Honorable François Baby, who left a mass of correspondence of value to historians. Another, Marie-Catherine, became the mother of P.A. de Gaspé, the author. Charles-Louis Tarieu de Lanaudière, as a 16 year-old Cadet served under Montcalm on the Plains of Abraham in 1759. The next year as Aide-Major of the La Sarre Regiment he was badly wounded in the last French victory at Ste. Foy. He went with that regiment to France. By 1767 he was an aide of the French Ambassador to England. In many visits to that country in dress, manners and thought he resembled an English-Lord-even though in Canada he was of the noblesse and owner of a number of seigniories. One of these, given to him in 1768, was that of Maskinongé. There, together with the right of High, Middle and Low Justice, he had full Indian trading privileges. In 1775 he was one of the three who were with General Carleton in his escape from Montreal and became the Governor's Aide de Camp. As one of the Canadian volunteers under Burgoyne in 1777, he, with St. Luc, was ordered to rush from the upper Hudson to Québec to obtain aid for the floundering English-German army. He and Babet had three Children.

38. I. Charles-Luc Tarieu-2/28/1770

39. II. Marie-Elizabeth-Joseph Tarieu (usually called Marie-Anne). Born 10/6/1777, died 1/26/1823. Her seigniority of Maskinongé was unprofitable. She sold it in 1814 for 2,000 lives.

40. III. Catherine-Elizabeth Tarieu-3/27/1779-2/20/1784.

32. MARIE-LOUISE-CHARLOTTE LACORNE, born 18 Sept 1750, died 25 January 1771. She married in late November 1769 an older man and widower whom her father never liked. The groom was Hippolyte-Georges Lecompte-Dupré (1738-1797). He normally signed as St. George Dupré. She and their baby died in childbirth.

33. MARIE-MARGUERITE LACORNE, born 3 January 1775, buried 29 May 1845. At the Church of Christ in Montreal she married Lieutenant John Lennox (ca. 1770-1802) of the 60th Regiment of Foot, as her first of two husbands. His father was Colonel Alexander Lennox. Colonel Alexander Lennox helped Mme. Lennox's mother obtain a small British pension (FV Carton 9, #1 & #2). The widow LaCorne mentioned this in a plea to have it increased since her 20,000 pounds sterling value French funds had been seized by that government (so too had St. Luc's Paris town house). St. Luc was called the "first Canadian Loyalist" to support General Carleton in 1775. When Mme. Lennox married second Jacques Viger both were low in funds and had her four children to support. About a year later their circumstances changed for the better when Mme. Viger and the children received the inheritance from a

Lennox estate settlement. There may be a clue to John Lennox's antecedents in the name given the son. Kew was a North England name, so was Manners. It is positive that there was a descent from King Charles II via a bastard and possible legitimate line involving the Duke of Richmond and Lennox. Marie-Marguerite followed him to his military assignments. Referred to as the Honorable John Lennox, he became a Captain of the 60th Regiment on 7 September 1795. He died as a Major at Barbadoes in 1802. Mrs Lennon returned to Montreal with their children.

41. I. An unnamed son who died young, unmarried.
42. II. Catherine-Elizabeth, alive and apparently unmarried in 1860.
43. III. Marie-Anne-Marguerite, alive and apparently unmarried in 1860
44. IV. Charlotte, alive and apparently unmarried in 1860
45. V. John Manners Kew (1802-2/22/1832) A Quebec attorney (JV 8:50, (JV 8:50, etc.)).

On 9 October 1833 the girls received a small legacy, probably from their brother, who had become a lawyer and often represented and corresponded with his mother's second husband.

Marie-Marguerite LaCorne Lennox married second at Montreal on 17 November 1808 Jacques Viger (5/7/1787-12/12/1858). His parents Jacques Viger Sr., and Amaranthe Prevost liked the given name Jacques so well he was the third of their children to bear it. As early as 1779 Jacques the younger was Seigneur of Saint-Jean, once a part of Boucherville. This well-educated son became a surveyor, inspector of roads, and the first mayor of the city of Montreal in 1833. During the War of 1812 he served as an officer in the branch of the Anglo-Canadian army named the Voltigeurs. They were a Hussar-like organization as brilliantly uniformed as their light cavalry counterparts in Europe. Attached to their sword belts to hang by their sabers was a leather pocket about 4"X 9". In it were kept dispatches, orders and maps, but also personal items such as tobacco and tallow candles to grease their boots. Viger nicknamed his sabretache "Ma Sabredache". This title he gave to his historical collection; one of incalculable value. He willed it to his Lennon step-daughters who, when positive it would be well cared for, sold it on 15 November 1860 for \$3,046.02. He was a man of vigor and pride for Canada as well as being a famous raconteur, a poet, a man who loved to sing, an author, a humorist, an artist, a caricaturist and one whose epigrams could cut down an opponent. According to Amédée Papineau he was the most lovable of men. But not so to J.G. Barth, who wrote he was sarcastic, adding that his wife was friendly to all and carried the honors of the house to perfection. Though almost twelve years older than her husband, they were devoted to each other and he to her children. Viger held several civil offices. He was president of the Society of St. Jean-Baptiste, founder of the Montreal Historical Society and a Chevalier of the Order of St. Gregoire.

There were two daughters born to this union, both of whom died young. There was also one son.

46. I. Eugenie, died young
47. II. Hermine, died 10/29/1812
48. III. Charles-Joseph-Auguste-Wellesley Viger, born August 1814. This third child also died in infancy on 17 September 1814 (JV 4, #63 and RAPQ 1955-57, pages 31-176).

34. LOUIS-ARCHAMBAUD DOUGLAS, Chevalier, Viscomte de Douglas, knight, co-seigneur of Terrebonne in America and of Beauregard. Lived in Nantua. He had the registered power-of-attorney from his brother, Charles-Luc Sholto. He used the same coat of arms as the Scotch-English Douglas family, believing there was descent from Archibald, the 5th Earl of Douglas and the 2nd Duke of Touraine. He was imprisoned during the terror of 1794.

35. CHARLES-LUC SHOLTO DE DOUGLAS, Canon of the Cathedral of Auch in Touraine. He was for some time under the guardianship of his uncle, Messier Pierre-Valentin de Douglas, seigneur, Abbot of the Royal Abbey of Sablonceaux. During the French Revolution an Abbé de Douglas was investigated by the tribunals and found innocent. The mob cried for his head. He was executed on September 2nd. On the 4th his bank account of 50 Louis disappeared (FV Carton 7, #58). In March 1792 the Abbé Douglas was reported as being in plenty of funds; and the court's wife was pregnant. This seems to indicate that it was Abbé Charles-Luc-Sholto de Douglas who was executed (FV Carton 7, #49).

37. SUSANNE-ANTOINETTE LACORNE, born 1772, died 1822. She married in October 1792 Charles (Gaspard) Tarieu de Lanaudière (1743-1811). Susanne is believed to be the Suzette of her aunt's letters from Loches. There were three children of this marriage: Pierre-Paul Tarieu Lanaudière who left issue; Marie-Charlotte who married the Honorable Barthelemy Joliette; Suzanne who married Dr. Pierre-Charles Leodel.

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF PRISQUE ASHLINE OF CHAMPLAIN, NEW YORK

In the name of God Amen: I Prisque Ashline of the town of Champlain, county of Clinton and state of New York being mindfull of my mortality do this sixteenth day of January in the said year of our lord one thousand and eight hundred and fifty two make and publish this my last will and testament in the manner following. First I desire to be decently buried without any funeral ... and with as little expence as may be. Also I give and bequest to my sons Prisque Ashline, Antoine Ashline, Joseph Ashline, Amable Ashline, Francis Ashline, Levis Ashline, John Ashline and Abraham Ashline and to my daughter Urraille Peltier and to my three grand children Antoine Peltier, Fabien Peltier and Amelia Peltier children of my daughter Amelia deceased and the late wife of Antoine Peltier all my real estate which I now own to be divided equally amongst them with the following exceptions to wit: The said Amable is to pay to the estate the sum of sixty eight dollars or to have that amount deducted out of his share of the land, and the said John Ashline is to be paid fifty dollars worth of land over his equal share. My three grand children aboved named are to have one equal share being one tenth of the said land above named and the said Prisque Ashline above named is to have sixty dollars paid to him by the estate or to have sixty dollars worth of land over and above his equal share, and the said Antoine Ashline is to pay to the estate the sum of thirty dollars or to have thirty dollars deducted from his equal share of land, the said Amable, Francis and John above named worked for me after they were twenty one years of age, for which service, I have given to the said Amable and Francis a deed of twenty acres of land, and the said John a deed of six acres of land, which land and what I have paid to him otherwise paid to him and the fifty dollars aboved mentioned for him is to pay him for the said labor.

Also I give to my daughter Urraille one cow. All the rest of the residue of my personal estate whatsoever and where-ever of what value, kind and quality....the same may be and not herein before

given and disposed of, I give and bequest to my nine children and the grand children abovenamed to be equally divided between them, except the three grand children are to have but one share being one equal tenth part. In .... whereof I do subscribe and seal this as my last will and testament this sixteenth day of January in the year of our lord one thousand and eight hundred and fifty two in the seventy sixth year of my age at Champlain in the residence of Able Ford and Fabien Fesette to whom I have declared it to be my last will and testament and require them to subscribe the same as witnesses.

The Adirondack Genealogical-Historical Society was founded in Saranac Lake, NY a number of years ago by a group of people in the tri-lakes area (comprising Saranac Lake, Lake Placid and Tupper Lake, NY) who were interested in helping each other trace their lineage. Another purpose for the forming of the group was to assist researches living outside the area who were attempting to find information about their ancestors who lived in this area at one time. Finally, it was the aim of the society to collect and preserve information relevant to genealogy, as well as historical data as it applies to genealogy. This information, or data, was to consist of cemetery records, microfilm, manuscripts, ancestral charts, maps, photographs and books.

Although the funds were limited, the society purchased the federal census on microfilm from 1850-1910 for the counties of Clinton, Essex, and Franklin. In addition, the group has purchased an impressive number of books, genealogical in nature, including atlases, "how-to" books, Munsell's "American Ancestry" (12 Vols.), Savage's "Genealogical Dictionary of the First Settlers of New England" (4 Vols), Evert's "History of St-Lawrence County", and many others. All of the above material has been deposited in the genealogical section of the Saranac Lake Free Library. The library has purchased other books on genealogy. In addition, some of our members have loaned books from their own collection, for a limited period of time, for the use of the society's members. It is possible, therefore, for anyone to do research on families of the tri-lakes area, as well as the outlying area, and early New England families as well, at the Saranac Lake Free Library.

The members of the society have every right to be proud of their accomplishments in respect to the recording of cemetery inscriptions. All of the southern portion of Franklin County has been covered, whether the cemetery be large or small. While these holdings are not indexed at present, they have been bound into notebooks and are available to the general public at the Saranac Lake Free Library on the open shelf.

The genealogical shelves of the library also contain a surname file. This consists of 3x5 cards on which members, correspondents and visitors to the area have placed information indicating their surname interest, date and locale. This has proven to be an ideal source for researches to locate someone tracing a similar name.

Some of the members have undertaken the task of indexing those books of which were published without the invaluable aid of a complete index. These include the popular books by Vermontville author, Helen Escha Tyler. A card file for this purpose is available on the genealogical shelves of the library.

The Saranac Lake Free Library has a separate room known as the Adirondack Room, dedicated to the memory of William and Ruth White. This room contains many donated books, manuscripts, photographs and memorabilia pertaining to the Adirondack region. The North County Community College Library also has a separate room which houses an impressive number of Adirondack books, county histories and out of print books. As in the case of the Adirondack Room, the N.C.C.C. room is restricted to use of the books in that room only and items do not circulate.

Another source of information in the area for genealogist is at the Center for Music, Drama and Art in Lake Placid, NY. The CMDA Library contains a fine collection of Adirondack books, pamphlets and maps belonging to the Lake Placid-North Elba Historical Society. This library is open weekdays to the general public. The Adirondack Center Museum in Elizabethtown is another facility which contains a storehouse of information of interest to the genealogist. The inscriptions of many of the Essex County cemeteries have been deposited at this museum, which is open to the public on a limited basis.

The Lake Placid Public Library has microfilmed copies of the Tupper Lake Free Press from 1911. In addition, the latter library is proud of their extensive photograph collection.

The tri-lakes is very fortunate in that its history has been recorded by local authors. These serve to augment the numerous county histories, Donaldson's "History of the Adirondacks" and other earlier published works. Here is Saranac Lake, the popular lecturer, historian and author, Maitland DeSormo has written eight books on Adirondack places and people. His most popular book is "The Heydays of the Adirondacks" published in 1974. Geraldine Collins wrote about the town of Brighton in her "Brighton Story" published in 1971. Lou Simmons of Tupper Lake wrote an excellent book on the area entitled "Mostly Spruce and Hemlock" which contains many biographical sketches of Tupper Lake residents, past and present.

George Carroll of Lake Placid wrote of that resort village some ten years ago, and has been commissioned by the Education Foundation of Lake Placid Club to write a history of the club and the people associated with it. Paula Trim is working at the present time on a history of the St. Regis Falls area and this book should be available later this year. The Saranac Lake Women's Civic Chamber compiled an interesting book, profusely illustrated, entitled "A Past to Remember-a Future to Mold" which is based on the Saranac Lake Area.

Our society has not made any attempt to copy vital records or church records of the area. The date for the meetings of our society is the second Tuesday of each month at 7pm in the Cantwell Room of the Saranac Lake Free Library. Anyone who has an interest in this area, genealogical speaking, is invited to send a query to our society in care of the Saranac Lake Free Library, 100 Main Street, Saranac Lake, NY 12983. Membership in the society is open to anyone and visitors are always welcome at our meetings.

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# CENSUS OF CANADIAN REFUGEES IN NEW YORK STATE, 1784, 1785, 1787

by John Andrew Bilow # 0003

I have discovered in the New York Collection of the *Fienberg Library* at Plattsburg State University a manuscript containing names of most of the Canadian Refugees involved in the American Revolution. Due to a loan of papers known as the *Bailey Collection* this has provided information that was impossible to ascertain previously.

The long manuscript (grand format) is in very bad shape and should be restored. It contains eight columns, the first one lists the family name with numbers of members occasionally and the remaining seven columns are self explanatory. The names were copied as they appeared and as this was done by Murdock McPherson who has spelled them as they sound in English. An example would be my family name Boileau, was Boilo on the returns. Under the column for Sex I have abbreviated: M- Man, W- Woman, C- Child. Under *time of leaving* I believe the writer of the manuscript was not too accurate, through various sources I have discovered that some of these dates differ. Not much attention should be paid to the classification of *soldier* or *refugee* as in most cases the males that were old enough to bear arms were both. In regards to *present location* it can not be ascertained where New City was located and possibly Country could have been anywhere from Lake Champlain to Albany. N.Y.

This production will include a census record for 1784 at Albany, 1785 overall picture and refugees at Lake Champlain, N.Y. 1787. Of course not all refugees are listed unfortunately.

Of interest of those doing research on the Canadians who served with the Americans during the American Revolution one should consult an excellent work completed by Ernest L. Monty in *French Canadian and Acadian Genealogical Review*, Vol. I, No. 1, Spring 1968, entitled *Major Clément Gosselin*, also *Moses Hazen and the Canadian Refugees in the American Revolution* by Allan S. Everest, copyright 1976 by Syracuse University Press, Syracuse, N.Y.

This is a list of those soldiers and refugees who were entitled to lands in Champlain and Chazy, New York, for their services to the United States Government. They were given lot numbers, and if one chooses to know where this land is located, he may take these numbers listed in columns two and three, and compare it with Beer's *Atlas* published in 1869. The numbers are listed on the map itself. The fourth column is a listing of the Bounty Land Warrant (BLWT) number or pension number when available. These numbers can be used when applying for a pension record at the National Archives, in Washington, D.C. W: widow; S: Survivor; R: Reject.

Some of these records contain a good deal of personal information on the soldiers. This record can be found at *Plattsburg State University* in the Ballot book. Some names on this list may not have been with the Canadian Regiment, usually where no lot number is given.

SHARKIR, Theodore

Theodore Chartier, baptized 1734 at Montreal, PQ son of Jean-Joseph Chartier and Marie Coutemanche. His father John Carter was the son of Samuel Carter and Mercy(Brooks)Carter and a captive of the 1704 raid on Deerfield, Mass. Theodore Chartier m.12 Jan.1756, Chambly, PQ to Therese Loupe-dit-Rochelais daughter of Francois Loupe-dit-Rochelais and Therese Poyer-dit-Lapintade. The wife supposedly died c.1778-79 at Albany, N.Y. Theodore Chartier died at Lacadie, PQ. He was buried of \_\_\_ Jan.1796, "died the day before yesterday," aged 62 years.

Theodore's son Jean-Simon Chartier, baptized 26 Oct.1766, Chambly, PQ. He married 19 Aug.1788, Chambly, PQ to Louise Chartier (of an unrelated family), daughter of Etienne Chartier and Marie-Louise Charly. He left descendants in the parishes of St-Mathias and St-Hyacinthe, PQ.

Theodore's son Laurent Chartier, baptized 10 Oct.1769, Chambly, PQ. He married (1) 27 Jan.1800 at Vaudreuil, PQ to Suzanne Eugenie Brabant, widow of J.Dubois of Pointe-Claire, PQ daughter of Augustin Brabant and Marie Lalonde; he married (2) 20 Dec.1844 at St-Polycarpe, PQ to Marguerite Durieux, widow of Joseph Vanier, apparently no children.

Theodore's daughter Marguerite Chartier, baptized 26 Apr.1768, Chambly, PQ no marriage has been located.

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LONGWAY, Joseph

Joseph Langlois, son of Jean-Baptiste Langlois and Marthe Fortin, baptized 24 Jun.1734, at St-Thomas-Montmagny, PQ. He married Marie-Therese Chartier, daughter of Theodore Chartier and Therese Loupe-dit-Rochelais. He was buried 29 Nov.1800, Lacadie, PQ, aged 64 years. The marriage (probably in the U.S. during the Revolution) recieved an ecclesiastical rehabilitation at Chambly, PQ 18 Aug.1788, with the acknowledgment of three children: Joseph-Marie, Jean-Baptiste who had been born 18 Mar.1784, and Francois-Xavier, born 2 Jan.1788. This family settled at Lacadie, PQ after 1788 and left numerous descendants.

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CAYUS, Joseph

He received a Revolutionary pension as Joseph Cayeux. In 1825 he was at Hemmingford, PQ having resided previously at Chazy, N.Y. He had married in Feb.1779 at Schenectady Barracks (by Lt.Alexandre Ferriole), to Mary Fontaine, who in 1825 was aged 62. In 1839 the widow resided at Champlain, N.Y. with a son Michael Cayeux. She is on the 1840 U.S.census as a pensioned widow under the name of Mary Currier, with son Michael Currier. This identifies Joseph Cayus/Cayeux as the soldier Joseph Carrier, son of Andre Carrier and Suzanne Poudret, whose marriage to Marie-Reine Lafontaine, daughter of Joseph Lafontaine and Marie-Reine Boudrieux-dit-Labonte, recieved an ecclesiastical rehabilitation 28 Aug.1787 at Beloeil, PQ.

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TYON, Michael

Michel Taillon, son of Jean-Baptiste Taillon and Angelique Trudeau, had an ecclesiastical rehabilitation of his marriage to Marie Beaudriau-dit-Labonte, daughter of Pierre Beaudriau-dit-Labonte and Marie-Anne Bombardier, 8 Oct.1787 at Chambly, PQ "the said parties having been united by marriage contracted in New England in the presence of witnesses." A Clinton County, N.Y. deed gives her name as Clemence (i.e. Marie-Clemence) Labontee.

Note--The effect of large families in mixing generations means that Michel Taillon's wife is an aunt of Joseph Cayus's wife.

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Annotations Cont. V.E.D.

BUMBARD, Joseph

Joseph Labombard came from the parish of Beloeil, PQ being reported "absent with the rebels" by the government of Canada in 1776. His father was still residing in that parish (Haldimand Collection, B.171). He became a private in Livingston's First Canadian Regiment.

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TREHON,

Probably Etienne Trahan, who joined the American army at the parish of Beloeil, PQ. He was the son of Pierre Trahan and Marie Boudriau. On 25 Aug. 1788 at Chambly, PQ he married Anastasie Gosselin, daughter of Louis Gosselin and Anastasie Bourgeois. They resided at Lacadie, PQ and their children were baptized there. He was buried at Lacadie, PQ 23 Dec. 1809; aged 67. His widow was dead by 1833.

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RICHARD,

Unidentifiable.

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TUCKER, Dan

Daniel Tucker, Quartermaster, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. He was formerly an officer in the British service and a marchant. His widow Martha married Abraham Bogart at St. Peter's church, Albany, N.Y. In 1800 she was residing at Albany again widowed (U.S. National Archives, Claims, RG 217).

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FONTANE, Joseph

As Joseph Lafontaine, he was a private in Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. Joseph Fontaine, son of Etienne Fontaine and Marie-Marthe Dagneau of St-Pierre-du-Sud, PQ married 2 Aug. 1763, St-Charles-sur-Richelieu, PQ to Marie-Reine Boucricieux-dit-Labonte, daughter of Pierre Boudricieux-dit-Labonte and Marie-Anne Bombardier.

Their son Joseph Fontaine married 26 Aug. 1788, Beloeil, PQ to Marie-Josette Vivier daughter of Joseph Vivier and Marie-Josette Carpentier.

Their son Peter probably married Esther Ethier/Etienne and continued to reside on Lake Champlain. If so, he had a family of five children, aged from 9 years to 6 months, baptized 16 May 1800 at St-Mathias.

Rosett is probably their daughter Marie-Josette who married 21 Nov. 1786 at Chambly, PQ to Claude Monty Jr., son of Claude Monty and Marie-Anne Boyer.

Their daughter Marie-Agathe Fontaine was baptized 10 Nov. 1769 at Chambly, PQ, her parents then residing on Lake Champlain. In 1790 she married "outside the borders of Canada before witnesses" Francois Martin son of Basil Martin and Marguerite Gregoire of Vercheres, PQ. This marriage recieved an ecclesiastical rehabilitation 17 Jun. 1800 at St-Mathias, PQ, with baptism of the children.

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GREEN, Joseph

Joseph Grigne-dit-Melancon, of an Acadian family that had been resettled in the Quebec Province parish of Yamachiche before the American Revolution. In 1810 he was residing in Philadelphia, Pa., where there was a large settlement of Acadian Catholics. See Raphael Bellemare, "Les Bases de l'Histoire d'Yamachiche 1703-1903. Montreal, Beauchemin & Fils, c.1904.

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WHITE, Stephen

Unidentifiable. The wife's name should be Amable, which is French-Canadian.

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MONTY, Flavie

No Flavie as a soldier. The possibilities are Amable, Claude, Hohn, Joseph, and Placid, none of whom show on this list otherwise. The Montys were a large set of brothers and cousins.

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LABONTE, Peter

Possibly Pierre Beaudriau-dit-Labonte, the younger. He was a son son of Pierre Beaudriau-dit-Labonte and Marie-Anne Bombardier. He married 1 Oct. 1798 at St-Matias, PQ to Marie Jacob, daughter of Jean-Baptiste Jacob and Marie-Josette Gervais.

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BOOVN, Charles

Charles Boivan was a private in Robichaux's company, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment.

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CHAVELEAR, Joseph

Joseph Chevalier, private, Robichaux's company, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment.

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LAVOY, Peter

Land Books at the New York State Library show Pierre Lavoy, private, Livingston's Regiment. The muster rolls showed him as Simon Lavoy. Probably both refer to Pierre-Simon Lafond, but if so there is a dule listing here.

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LUBILIP,

Probably Latulip, private, Livingston's Regiment (New York State, Land books).

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CARTIER, Prust

Unidentifiable.

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LAFFO,

Probably Pierre-Simon Lafond, baptized 11 Dec 1753, Baie-du-Febvre, PQ, son of Claude Lafond and Marie Joffrion. Married 28 Nov. 1781 in Military Quarters, Schenectady, N.Y. by Lt. Alexandre Ferriole to Marie-Louise Chartier, baptized 24 Aug. 1761 Chambly, PQ, daughter of Theodore Chartier and Therese Loupe-dit-Rochelais. She was the widow of Joseph Brault. The marriage recieved an ecclesiastical rehabilitation 23 Jun 1792 at Lacadie, PQ "married thirteen years previously in the colonies." children: Pierre, who was over 21 in Feb. 1808; Pelagie, baptized 28 Dec. 1789 at Lacadie, PQ aged 3 years 7 months; Jean-Baptiste, baptized 28 Dec 1789 at Lacadie, PQ aged 3 months and 20 days; Jean-Francois, baptized 2 Sep. 1792 at Lacadie, PQ. Pierre-Simon Lafond died Sep. 1795/96 at Lacadie, PQ. His widow survived until 1848, when she died at St-Valentin, PQ. She recieved a pension.

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SALLY,

Probably the family of Toussaint Lavarney (properly, in French, Livernois). He died 15 Mar. 1845 leaving a son Lewis of Ellenburgh, N.Y. and sons Charles and Antoine of Chazy, N.Y.

It is not certain that it is the same family, but on 30 Jul 1803 at St-Luc, PQ was baptized Antoine, son of Toussaint Livernois and Marie-Rosalie Choret, farmers domiciled on Lake Champlain.

The father of this man is said to have taken part in Ethan Allen's raid on Montreal. The full family name will be Benoit-dit-Livernois.

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LAFRAMBOIS,

Jean-Baptiste Lafoye-dit-Laframboise, French soldier from the parish of St-Martin, Amiens, France, was garrisoned at Fort St. Frederic, Crown Point, N.Y., before the seven year war. As a son of Jean Lafoye and Suzanne Michaud he married 5 Jun. 1742 at Ft. St. Frederic to Marie-Charlotte Lienard-dit-Durbois, daughter of Francois Lienard-dit-Durbois and Marie-Madeleine Bonhomme of the parish of St-Foy near Quebec City, PQ.

Their son Nicolas Lafoye-dit-Laframboise, baptized 11 May 1754, Fort St. Frederic.

Their son Jean-Baptiste Lafoye-dit-Laframboise, the younger, baptized 16 Aug. 1749, Fort St. Frederic.

DUGGAN, James  
William

Jeremiah or. Jeremie Duggan, merchant, son of Jean Duggan and Marie Cook of Mallow, Cork, Ireland, married 9 Dec. 1760, Quebec, Anne-Francoise Levitre, daughter of Joseph Levitre. He was Lieutenant-Colonel of Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. By 23 Jul. 1786, his wife had returned to Canada. See "Act for the Relief of the Heirs of Jeremiah Duggan," N.Y. 24 Feb 1795.

James Duggan, their son, left Montreal, PQ 26 Aug. 1781, came to Albany, N.Y. with intelligence (Public Papers of George Clinton, VII, pp. 339-340;) he had lived since 1782 at Halfmoon, Saratoga County, N.Y. and was a schoolmaster. William Duggan was his brother. Prior to 1776 he lived at St-Ours, PQ (National Archives, Claims, RG 217).

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VERLY,

Michel Verly, French soldier of the Seven Years War, son of Michel Verly and Marie-Catherine President of Versigny, diocese of Amiens, Picardy, France, married 21 May 1764, St-Pilippe-de-Laprarie, PQ to Marie-Josephte Raymond-dit-Toulouse, daughter of Jean-Baptiste-Bertrand Raymond-dit-Toulouse and Marie-Francoise Laroche. A daughter Catherine Varley, born 5 Nov. 1780, was baptized 7 Oct. 1781 near Fishkill, N.Y. by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer from St. Joseph's Church, Philadelphia, Pa. Sponsors were Joseph Laurent and Mary Boileau. She married 25 Oct. 1802 at Laprairie to Pierre Donat-dit-Laverdure.

Francois Verly, son of the above, baptized 1772, Chambly, PQ Drummer, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment.

Benjn. Verly. Probably the same as Bernard or Pierre-Bernard Verly, fifer, Hazen's Regiment, born 15 Apr. 1766--died 28 Oct. 1847 at West Troy, N.Y. Married 9 Jun. 1792 Reformed Protestant Dutch Church of Albany, N.Y. to Rachel Boesom/Bolsom, daughter of Solomon Bulson of the town of Watervliet, N.Y. As a widow, she was residing in 1848 at Buffalo, Erie County, N.Y.

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PICKER, Mrs.

Probably the family of Pierre Picard, private in Robichaux's company, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. This soldier's land grant was sold 3 Sep 1800 by John Picard of Champlain, N.Y. and on 21 Mar. 1803 by a son Charles Pecard of Rensselaer County, N.Y. On 12 Nov. 1790, Pierre Picard was at St-Ours, PQ. He was deceased by 1803 (Clinton County, N.Y. Deeds, Book B).

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McPHERSON, Betty

Probably the family of Murdoch McPherson, Lieutenant, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment. His wife Elizabeth died 6 Apr 1801, age 49 (Sullivan, "History of the Town of Chazy").

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SHERK, Lewis

Unidentifiable.

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BRESKIN, Thads

Unidentifiable.

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LIVINGSTON, Richard

Probably the family of Col. James Livingston. However his brothers Abraham, John, and Richard also had families in the area.

Baptism 22 May 1773 at Chambly, PQ of Isabelle, born the 18th of the preceding month of Elizabeth Simpson, Irishwoman, and acknowledged according to the report of the midwife and the godfather by Jacque Livingston, merchant at Beloeil, PQ. Godfather was Francois Cousy, chief commissary of the said Livingston.

Unidentifiable.

PICAR, Alexr.

Corporal, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment, 7th Company.

PAUL, Robert

Private, 8th Company, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment.

DARAVORT,

Unidentifiable.

MARNE,

Unidentifiable.

MARNARD/MAINARD,

Unidentifiable--probably one of the Menard soldiers.

SHODVILL,

Odds are in favor of Demers-dit-Chedville as the proper form of this family name. A Jean Demais, private, was listed in Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment.

LAROSS,

Unidentifiable.

REGIMAN,

Unidentifiable.

FRISON,

Pierre Frison/Frissant, private, Hazen's Regiment. The New York State Library Land Books papers stated that he had never been in Canada.

GABOU,

Unidentifiable. Possibly Guibord?

CROIX,

Unidentifiable. Possibly Pierre Roberge-dit-Lacroix.

JOLLIBOIS,

Jacques Jalby-dit-Jolibois, Lieutenant, Livingston's Regiment; mentioned in Gates Papers, 1777, among Canadians formerly serving with the army; probably a French soldier of the Seven Year War, of the Royal-Rousillon Regiment, born at St-Guiraud diocese of Beziers, Languedoc, son of Francois Jalby and Claire Palet, marriage contract 4 Apr. 1758, Contrecoeur, PQ with Suzanne Beaudin, widow of Gabriel Leroy-dit-Potvin, daughter of Rene Beaudin and Louise Circe-dit-St-Michel; in 1797 he was of the parish of St-Ours, PQ according to Clainto County, N.Y. Deeds, Book B.

RATTEE, C.

Charles Rate, private, 17th Company, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment.

BUFOR,

Antoine Philippin-dit-Beffort, French soldier of the Seven Year War, Regiment of Guyenne, married on 6 Feb. 1758, at St-Ours, PQ, with no parentage given, to Marie-Agathe Emery-dit-Coderre, daughter of Jean Emery-dit-Coderre and Marie Meunier. Two sons married at St-Ours, PQ; a daughter married at St-Antoine-sur-Richelieu, PQ. He was a sergeant, Capt. Allen's company, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. Reported "absent with the rebels" 1776 by the Canadian government (Haldimand Collection, B.171).

MONTY, Jacque

Born 1752, living 1819 at Chazy, N.Y., probable a son of Amable Monty and Angelique Latourneau of Chambly, PQ. Private, Loiseau's company, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. On 10 Mar. 1788 he had a wife Anny and was living at Pointe au Rouché (Clinton County, N.Y. Deeds, Book B).

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MARNEY, Mr.

Louis Marney-dit-Richelieu, French soldier of the Seven Years War. At age 33, son of Jacques Marney and Renee-Jeanne Morineau of St-Georges-de-Faille-Lavineux diocese of Poitiers, Poitou, France. He married 6 Feb. 1758 at Notre-Dame-de-Montreal to Marie-Josephthe Couturier, daughter of Jean-Baptiste Couturier and Marguerite Beauchamp. On 5 Oct. 1781 near Fishkill, N.Y., his wife served as godmother to Louisa Monty (Registers of St. Joseph's Church, Philadelphia, Pa.) A daughter Amable married 27 Nov. 1787, Chambly, PQ to Jacques/James Carr of Lancaster, Pa., son of James Carr and Marie Veine, a former soldier in Moses Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment.

Mrs Misan will be the widow of the soldier Michel Moisan, cormoral, 5th Company, Hazen's Regiment. She was at Chazy, N.Y. in 1787 as "La veuve Moisan" or Widow Moisan. The Revolutionary War Pension Records, file of Nicolas Constantine, mention that Michel Moisan and his wife were married at Fishkill, N.Y. by Capt. Antoine Paulint (Paulin), but they do not give the bride's name. Therefore, it is of interest to find her in the Marney household.

Marguerite Marney, daughter of Louis Marney, married Thomas Sauvage/Lesauvage and settled in the Lake Champlain region. She had children baptized at Chambly, PQ and Lacadie, PQ.

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M. LABONTEE,

Probably Pierre Boudrieux-dit-Labontee. He recieved a land grant as a Canadian refugee in the Chazy tract. It was sold in 1803 by his children: Benjamin, John-Baptist, Marie-Reine wife of Joseph Lafontaine and Clemence wife of Michel Tyon (Clinton County, N.Y. Deeds, Book B, and U.S. National Archives, Rev. War Pension Records, data found in the file of John Gauley).

This man married as Antoine Baudrias (sic) on 13 Jul. 1744 at Pointe-aux-Trembles of Montreal, PQ, as a son of Antoine Baudrias and Jeanne Plumereau, to Marie-Anne Bombardier-dit-Labombarde, daughter of Andre Bombardier-dit-Labombarde and Marguerite Demers-dit-Chedville.

The marriages of his children are as follows: Marie-Reine married 2 Aug 1763, St-Charles-sur-Richelieu, PQ to Joseph Fontaine (q.v.); Marie (Marie-Clemence), marriage rehabilitated 8 Oct 1787 at Chambly, PQ to Michel Taillon/Tyon (q.v.); Jacques-Benjamin married 12 Aug 1771, Chambly, PQ, to Marie-Louise Brignon, daughter of Pierre Brignon and Catherine Mandeville; Jean-Baptiste, age 25, of Chambly, PQ, married 16 Sep. 1776 at Notra-Dame-de-Montreal to Marie Bouvier, age 22, daughter of Jacques Bouvier and Marie-Francoise Baigne; Pierre (q.v.), married 1 Oct. 1798, St-Mathias, PQ to Marie Jacobs.

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LAMAGON, Battest

Probably John Baptiste Lamontagne, who in 1776 was recorded as a private in Capt. Augustin Loiseau's company, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment, according to the Revolutionary War Pension Records, file of Lewis Picard.

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YOUNG, John B.

Private in Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. If the name is an anglicization of Lajeunesse, he was probably a brother of Prudent Lajeunesse and settled after the Revolution at Longueuil, PQ where he married four times and left numerous descendants.

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PIRROW, John B.

John Baptiste Pero/Perin/Porot--probable Perreault. He was a sergeant in Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment and resided in 1808 at Pompton, Bergen County, N.J. according to the Revolutionary War Pension Records.

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GORNE'S

Unidentifiable.

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OLIVER, M.

Laurent Olivier, Captain and Major, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment. A French soldier of the Troupes de la Marine in the Seven Years War, he abjured Calvinism 8 Sep. 1760 at Quebec (Rapport de l'Archiviste de la Province de Quebec, 1951-53, p.101). He was a son of Pierre Olivier and Claire Pare of St-Maurice, diocese of Ellisine, France, and married 10 Nov. 1760 at Quebec to Marie-Josephte Guibord, born 1735, daughter of Louis Guibord. She served as godmother at Fishkill, N.Y. in 1781 (Registers St-Joseph's Church, Philadelphia, Pa.). He died in 1816 at Rouses Point, N.Y. and his wife shortly thereafter. See Rev. Daniel T. Taylor, "The Shores of Lake Champlain", Moorsfield Press, 1979.

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ROUSE, Louis

Louis Rousse-dit-Languedoc, born about 1725, probably in France. He married about 1750 to Marie Comeau, born about 1730, daughter of Francois Comeau and Anne Laure of Chipoudy, Acadia. He is found as an Acadian refugee at Quebec in 1755 and at Yamachiche in 1764 (See Bona Arsenault, "Histoire des Acadiens", vol 4, p.1569). He was a merchant. On 10 Aug. 1776 he was granted 32 dollars by the Continental Congress for his services as nurse and attendant on the sick and a present of 40 dollars on account of his humanity to them (American Catholic Historical Review, New Series 3, 1907, p.250). As Louis Rouse the father, he was reported "absent with the rebels" in 1781 by the militia captain of Yamachiche (Haldimand Collection, B.171).

His son Jacques Rouse gave the name to Rouse's Point, N.Y. Born about 1754 in the middle of the expulsion from Acadia, he is the only child of Louis Rousse whose baptismal record has not been located. He died c.1820-22. He married Therese-Clara Olivier, niece and adopted daughter (q.v.). As Jacques Rousse the son, he was reported "absent with the rebels" in 1781 by the militia captain at Yamachiche (Haldimand Collection, B.171). There is extensive documentation of his career in the Revolutionary War Pension Records.

Michael/Michel Rouse, son of Louis Rousse and brother of Jacques Rouse, also settled in Clinton County, N.Y.

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BOOGER,

Unidentifiable.

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CATTER? Lorg?

Unidentifiable.

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HAMMEL, Michael

Private, Livingston's Regiment, according to the Land Books in the New York State Library. He does not appear on the muster rolls. It is more probable that he was the messenger named Hamel utilized by Boyer Pillon in pro-American intelligence work at Montreal.

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DEFORT, Michael

Michel Dufault/Defo, private, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment. The Revolutionary War Pension Records, file of Nicolas Constantine, say that he was married during the war at Schenectady Barracks by Lt. Alexandre Ferriole, but they do not indicate the name of the bride. He was from the parish of St-Ours, PQ, reported "absent with the rebels" by the Canadian Government (Haldimand Collection, B.171). He received a survivor's pension.

HONO Loar (Possible Henry Lord) (see church records Lacadie & St-Luc)

Unidentifiable.

HERBER,?

one of the two Hubert/Hebert soldiers, either Paul or Pierre. Both were actually named Pierre-Paul, a very common name combination in the family, but distinguished themselves in the army only using half of the combination.

"Pierre" was Pierre-Paul Hubert, son of Pierre-Paul Hubert and Suzanne Laporte of Contrecoeur, who married 3 Aug. 1750 at St-Antoine-sur-Richelieu, PQ to Marie Chartier, daughter of Jean Chartier and Marie Courtemanche (and sister of Theodore Chartier, q.v.).

"Paul" was his nephew, Pierre-Paul Hubert, son of Louis Hubert and Marie-Jeanne Boisseau of St-Ours, PQ who married 10 Jan. 1786 at Lacadie, PQ to Angelique Chartier, daughter of Jean-Baptiste Chartier and Marie-Angelique Roy (and the niece of Theodore Chartier, q.v.).

BeKORN, Mr.

Unidentifiable.

LAPPIR, Anthony

Unidentifiable.

DeCLOC,

Probably Alexis/Alexander DuClos/DeClous, who served as a private first in Livingston's and later in Hazen's Regiment. He was assigned 5 months pay as private and given permission by the Continental Congress to enlist again on 10 Aug. 1776 (American Catholic Historical Review, New Series 3, 1907, p. 250).

LAFROMBOIS, J.

Jacques or James Lafoye-dit-Laframboise, son of Jean-Baptiste Lafoye-dit-Laframboise (q.v.) and Marie-Charlotte Lienard-dit-Durbois, baptized 14 Dec. 1751 at Fort St-Frederic, Crown Point, N.Y. He married Marie-Jeanne (although the registers call her Marie-Anne) Chartier, baptized 11 Jan. 1764 at Chambly, PQ born in Dec. 1763, daughter of Theodore Chartier (q.v.) and Therese Loupe-dit-Rochelais. The marriage received an ecclesiastical rehabilitation 19 Feb. 1787, Chambly, PQ. The same day were baptized Therese, age 5, and Jacques-Etienne, age 4.

On May 1823 this family still resided at Chazy, N.Y., according to the pension records. The wife Jenet was 58, and the unmarried daughter "Fenissa", always sick was age 41.

BOILO"s

Amable or Pierre-Amable Boileau, Lieutenant, Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment. He was a son of Rene Boileau and Marie-Anne Robert of Chambly, PQ, baptized as Antoine-Amable Boileau in May 1734 at Chambly, PQ. He married 23 Feb. 1756 at St-Mathias, PQ to Ursule (or Marie-Louise) Vigeant-dit-Taupier, daughter of Jean Vigeant-dit-Taupier and Marie-Anne Perrier-dit-Olivier.

His son Amable, baptized 24 Jul 1770, Chambly, PQ was a private in Hazen's Regiment in spite of his youth and received a pension. He married Marguerite Fontaine and resided at Champlain, N.Y., from which residence he had several children baptized at Canadian parishes: Amable, born 30 Mar. 1799; son Michel born 17 Oct. 1804 and baptized 3 Jun. 1805 at Lacadie, PQ; son Andre, baptized 21 Oct. 1813, Lacadie, PQ; daughter Marguerite-Adelaide, age 13 months, baptized 14 Feb. 1803, St-Luc, PQ. His other children were Mary, born c. 1796, married to Peter Dumo; Joseph K. Bilow, born c. 1808 at Champlain, N.Y.; and Sarah, born c. 1816. See the history of the family by John A. Bilow of Plattsburgh, N.Y.

His daughter Marie-Louise, born 11 Mar. 1775, Chambly, PQ. She married Prisque Asselin, the younger.

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MONTY's

Francois Monty, Lieutenant first in Livingston's and later in Hazen's Regiments. He was the son of Jean Monty, a French soldier who married Marie-Marthe Poyer and settled at Chambly, PQ. Francois Monty married 21 Jan. 1760 at Chambly, PQ to Josette Bergevin-dit-Langevin, daughter of Francois Bergevin-dit-Langevin and Therese Villeneuve. They had a series of children baptized at Chambly, PQ 1761-1774 and two younger ones, John and Louisa, who were baptized 5 Oct. 1781 at Fishkill, N.Y. by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer (Records of St. Joseph's Church, Philadelphia, Pa.). He died 8 Feb 1809 Chazy, N.Y.

His daughter Marie-Catherine Monty was baptized 6 Aug 1769 at Chambly, PQ. She became the third wife of Major Clement Gosselin, the marriage taking place in a civil ceremony 8 Nov 1790 at Chazy, N.Y. before Murdoch McPherson, J.P. and receiving an ecclesiastical rehabilitation 12 May 1791 at St-Hyacinth, PQ. After 1800, they settled again in Canada and their children were baptized at Lacadie, and St-Luc, PQ though only one daughter, Genevieve or Jane, survived to adulthood. There is a complete record in Gosselin's Revolutionary War Pension file.

Francis Monty. Probably a duplicate listing--see below.

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MONTY, Julien

There is no Julien in the soldier list. He is either an otherwise unrecorded son of Lt. Francois Monty or could be Amable, Claud, John, Joseph, or Placid.

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LEZETT,

Louis Lisotte, veteran of Hazen's Regiment. He supposedly had a first marriage to Margaret Gookey (Gauthier?). He married 17 Aug. 1784 at Albany, N.Y. to Mary Monty, daughter of Lt. Francois Monty (q.v.) In 1838 she was age 74/80 and had sons Luis and Joseph. He was possibly Louis-Alexandre Lisotte, son of Joseph Lisotte and Therese Lebel, baptized 15 Feb. 1752 at St-Roch-des-Aulnaies.

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MONTY,

Francis Monty the younger, the eldest son of Lt. Francois Monty, born c. 1760 died 10 Aug 1818 at Plattsburgh, N.Y. He married Mary Heath, daughter of Joseph Heath (Sullivan and Martin, "History of the Town of Chazy").

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BALLONGER,

Noël Belanger in 1776 was reported "absent with the rebels" from the parish of St-Ours by the Canadian Government (Haldimand Collection, B.171). He was baptized 13 May 1754 at l'Islet, son of Jean-Francois Belanger and Marie-Louise Caron. He married Marie Boileau, daughter of Lt. Amable Boileau (q.v.). The marriage received an ecclesiastical rehabilitation 26 Jan. 1789 at Chambly, PQ, he being a resident of Lake Champlain, "the marriage contracted in New England before witnesses". In 1793 he was resident at Chazy, N.Y. The wife was Marie-Ursule Boileau, baptized 28 May 1759, Chambly, PQ.

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BALLONGER, Julien

Baptized 21 Oct. 1752 at l'Islet, son of Jean-Francois Belanger and Marie-Louise Caron. He married 14 Aug. 1786 at St-Mathias, PQ to Marguerite Vigeant-dit-Taupier daughter of Laurent Vigeant-dit-Taupier and Marie Boileau. His widow Margaret was on the 1840 pension roll, Chazy, N.Y., age 74. She died 20 Sep. 1842, "age 70". They resided at Chazy, N.Y. but had their children baptized at Chambly, and St-Mathias, PQ; Antoine, baptized 7 Feb. 1787 at Chambly; Jean, baptized 13 Jun. 1790 at Chambly; Julien, born 2 Nov. 1793 and baptized 25 May 1795 at Chambly; Marguerite born 9 Mar. 1794 (sic) and baptized 25 May 1795 at Chambly; Marie-Catherine, born 9 Feb. 1796 and baptized 9 Jun. 1796 at Chambly; Francois, baptized 26 May 1799 at Chambly; Marie-Josephte, age 16 months, baptized 14 Sep. 1802 at St-Mathias, PQ.

MARNEYS, L.

Louis Marney-dit-Richelieu the younger, son of Louis Marney-dit-Richelieu (q.v.). He was born about 1759. On Nov. 3, 1783, at Fishkill, N.Y. was the ecclesiastical rehabilitation by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer of St. Joseph's Church, of Philadelphia, Pa. of the marriage of Louis Marney and Genevieve Boileau. She was a daughter of Lt. Amable Boileau (q.v.), baptized Jan. 27, 1763, at Chambly, PQ. As a widower, Louis Marney Jr. married secondly 14 Oct. 1816 at Chambly, PQ to Louise Quintin, daughter of Antoine Quintin and Veronique Brunelle.

The following of their children were baptized at Chambly, PQ: Genevieve, born 14 Feb. 1784 in New England and baptized 6 Sep. 1784; Genevieve-Victoire, born 15 Jan. 1787 and baptized Jan. --, 1789; Therese, age 5 months, baptized 7 Jan. 1794; Louis, born 16 Apr. 1795, baptized 18 Jun. 1795; Lucille, born 25 Mar. 1797, baptized 26 May 1797; Laurent, age 9 months, baptized 16 Feb. 1800; Rene, age 5 months 4 days, baptized 14 Sep. 1801.

Louis Marney Jr. resided in 1798 at Rouses Point, N.Y. His pension was granted in 1798.

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PAULINT, Joseph

Unidentifiable. Also spelled Paulier and Poullier on the muster rolls.

PAULINT, Clemet

Unidentifiable. Also spelled Paulier and Poullier on the muster rolls.

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VASHRO, Lewis

Louis Vacheron, private, Allen's company, Hazen's Regiment. Louis-Noël Vacheron, son of Julien Vacheron and Angelique Lebert, married 12 Nov. 1787 at St-Philippe-de-Laprairie, PQ to Rosalie Poupert, daughter of Joseph Poupert and Marie-Charlotte Lamare. He died 27 Jan. 1809, age 48, and the widow still resided in 1845 at St-Philippe according to the Revolutionary War Pension Records. Their children also married and left descendants at St-Philippe-de-Laprairie, PQ.

GOOLEY, John

He is in the pension records as John Gauley, with an immense file containing data on many other Canadian soldiers. Jean-Baptiste Boulet, son of Jacques Goulet and Marie-Joseph LeNormand, married 15 Apr. 1765 at St-Denis-sur-Richelieu to Angelique Briere (also found spelled Labruyere, Labrillere, Labriere), daughter of Augustin Briere and Angelique Plouffe. After the war he returned to Canada and settled at St-Hyacinthe, PQ (also called Petit Maska), where his sons married and left numerous descendants. In 1830 he was residing again at Rouses Point, NY, aged 90. He had lived at the parish of St-Ours, PQ before the Revolution, where in 1778 he was reported "absent with the rebels" by the militia captain, leaving a wife and one child on the land (Haldimand Collection, B.171).

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CONSTANTINE, Nicolas

Canadian reference works spell this family name Coutancineau, in the 17th century style, but it is found as Constancineau in the parish records from the 1730's onward. The military and pension records give Constantino and Constantinault. He was baptized 1 Oct. 1757 at St-Ours, PQ son of Jean-Francois Constancineau (then aged 65) and of his father's third wife Marie-Therese Leclerc/Leclair. He married in Feb. 1779 at Schenectady Barracks by Alexandre Ferriole, according to the pension record, to Charlotte Chartier, baptized 9 Mar. 1760 at Chambly, PQ, daughter of Theodore Chartier (q.v.) and of Therese Loupe-dit-Rouchelais. This marriage received an ecclesiastical rehabilitation 3 Nov. 1783, near Fishkill, N.Y. by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer of St. Joseph's Church of Philadelphia, Pa.

Daughter Charlotte, born 3 Feb. 1799, baptized 6 Oct. 1781, near Fishkill, by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer of St. Joseph's Church Philadelphia, Pa.

Daughter Genevieve, born 8 Aug. 1781, baptized 7 Oct. 1781, near Fishkill, N.Y. by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer. As Genevieve-Elisabeth Constancino, she married 2 Jul 1798, at St-Antoine-sur-Richelieu, PQ to Joseph Guertin, by whom she left numerous descendants around the Plattsburgh, N.Y.

Nicolas Constantine died c. 31 Dec 1840/41 at Beekmantown, N.Y., age 84. The widow Charlotte died 12 Nov. 1845 at St-Pie, PQ Canada, where she was living with a grandchild, "age 91". Her application for a widow's pension had been rejected because at the time no one could locate the church record of her marriage. It is at Philadelphia, Pa., where the Jesuit missionary deposited it.

BATMAN,

John Bateman, Lieutenant and Adjutant, Livingston's First Canadian Regiment. According to Heitman's compilation on officers in the Revolution, he left the regiment 23 Jun. 1779 on leave for 12 months and did not rejoin.

MORANT, Charles

Charles Morand, private in Loiseau's company, Livingston's Regiment, and later in Hazen's Regiment.

CALDUR, ? Peter

Unidentifiable.

AMLIN, Battest

Jean-Baptiste/Charles Amelin. As a son of Jean-Baptiste Amelin and Marie-Francoise Sulliere, on 11 Aug. 1788 at Chambly, PQ, he had an ecclesiastical rehabilitation of his marriage to Agatha Bureau, daughter of Jean Bureau and Marie-Angelique Girardin. They acknowledged and baptized a daughter Marie-Angelique, born 15 Sep 1787 and baptized 7 Aug. 1788.

Other children they had baptized in Canadian parishes were: Joseph, born 15 Jun 1791, baptized 14 May 1797 at Chambly; Judith, born 2 Jul 1794, baptized 25 May 1795 at Chambly; Genevieve, born 15 Aug 1796, baptized 14 May 1797, Chambly; Michel, born 19 Aug 1798, baptized 26 May 1799, Chambly, PQ; Placide, age 15 months, born at Chazy, N.Y., baptized 21 Jan 1811, St-Luc, St-Jean co., PQ.

According to the pension record, in 1822 he was age 67. His widow Agate resided 1840 at Chazy, N.Y. with John Breete or Becete, she aged 72. He was a shoemaker and died 3 Jul. 1829.

MARTIN, Francis

There were two soldiers of this name in Hazen's Regiment, one a private in the 11th company and the other a drummer in the 17th company. This is probably the same man who became husband of Marie-Agathe Fontaine, daughter of Joseph Fontaine (q.v.)

BOILO, Peter

Probably Pierre-Jean Boileau, baptized at Chambly, PQ between Jun. & Aug. 1737, son of Rene Boileau and Marie-Anne Robert, thus being a brother of Lt. Amable Boileau (q.v.). He probably married firstly about 1760/62 to Josette Bourdon and had by her at least four children who were baptized at Chambly, PQ. She was buried 5 Mar 1773, Chambly, aged about 30. In 1776 he was reported "absent with the rebels" from the parish of Chambly by the Canadian government, leaving three children in the parish (Haldimand Collection, B.171).

He apparently remarried during the Revolution to Genevieve Boileau, daughter of Peter and Margaret (Mena) Boileau, born Oct. 10 1781, was baptized 31 Oct 1783, near Fishkill, N.Y., by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer of St. Joseph's Church, of Philadelphia, Pa. Additional children appear after the war in the Chambly registers; Alexis, baptized 12 Jun. 1786, son of Pierre Boileau and Marguerite Mainard; Marie-Madeleine, daughter of Pierre Boileau and Marguerite Menard, aged about 10 months, was buried 4 Dec. 1784 at Chambly, PQ.

According to Mr John A. Bilow, Plattsburgh, N.Y., he resided for a time near Rouses Point and Champlain, N.Y., but disappeared by 1800.

DEROY, Francis

Unidentifiable.

LEVANT, Anthony

Antoine Lavan, private, Hazen's Regiment. In 1790 he sold his refugee allotment to Benjamin Moores (Clinton county, N.Y. Deeds, Book B).

LESPERANCE, Jos.

Fifer, Hazen's Regiment, born 1760--died 1829, married to Tryphena Plumbley (DAR Patroit Register).

LALIM,

Unidentifiable.

FABTE?, Charles

Unidentifiable.

VENETTE, John

Probably John Baptiste Vinette-dit-Lalime, drummer, Hazen's Regiment. He lived c.1820 at Champlain, N.Y., where he left a pensioned widow name Amable, who, in 1834, aged 72, resided at Champlain, N.Y. (See Revolutionary War Pension Records, file of Augustin Levesque, and U.S. National Archives, RG 233). Amable may have been a second wife, for on 3 Oct. 1820 he testified he was age 62, with a wife Tirza, age 52. In 1819, he said he was 64.

He signed his name with great literacy and gave testimony frequently on behalf of other French-Canadian Revolutionary veterans.

BRUSH(ESE), Jaque

Probably Jacques Brusiere or Brugiere, private in Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment, 7th company.

PRETYBOIRE,

Possibly a duplication of Preat Abore?

GEROIR, John

Either of two soldiers: Jean-Baptiste Girouard (or Jervais, Gevoire, Jervais, Gerway, Geroire, Gerwas, Girouard, Jollywood, Gervis, Gerouar, Geroar, Geroir, Gerrard) married Anne/Hannah Bufford on 27 Dec. 1781 at Boston, Mass. He settled after the Revolution at St-Jacques-l'Achigan, PQ where he left descendants through his daughters. Or Jean-Baptiste Giroux, son of Francois Giroux and Claire Vivier, married 27 Jul. 1795, St-Philippe-de-Laprairie, PQ to Marie-Hypolite Deniault, daughter of Pierre Deniault and Marie-Joseph Baudin.

Both of these men were soldiers in the Canadian Regiments and both drew pensions.

BASSIN, Ignas

On the muster rolls of Livingston's and later of Hazen's Regiments as Ignas/Aeneas Boisiau/Boisse/Boisee/Boste/Boissy/Boisset. He was baptized on 24 Jan.1756 at Fort St.Frederic,Crown Point,N.Y. as Ignace Boissy, son of Ignace Boissy,blacksmith,and Marie-Anne St-Michel.

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LEBA,

Unidentifiable.

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MORRONS, John B.

Unidentifiable.

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DAPORA, John B.

Unidentifiable.

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LABBA,

The Leba and Labbah on this list could refer to three possible solders: Francois Labbe,Joseph Labbe,and Joseph Lebeau. Both of the Joseph's drew Revolutionary pensions,with Joseph Labbe leaving a widow,nee Ursule Ducros.

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POLLABORE,

Unidentifiable.

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VAN PAINE,

Unidentifiable. The Revolutionary War Claims (RG 233) Refer to a Christian Pain among the Canadian refugees.

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LAVOY, Lewis

Louis Lavoix,private,6th company,Hazen's Regiment. According to Sullivan and Martin,"History of the Town of Chazy",in 1786 he was at Lancaster,N.H.

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MONTCALM,

Unidentifiable.

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DUPLOSSIER

Probably Henri Duplossier,private,11th company,Hazen's Regiment. He was mentioned in the correspondence of Major Clement Gosselin with his first wife Marie-Beuve Dionne,so he was probable from the region of Ste-Anne-de-la-Pocatiere,PQ. On 5 Dec.1797,he was at Ste-Anne,Canada (Clinton County,Deeds Book B).

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EMMON,

Jean Aymand/Aimont,sergeant,Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment.

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SANSOUCI,

Unidentifiable. There were three soldiers with this nickname,but there is no genealogical data for any of them.

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LAROSE, Iasebell ?

Unidentifiable. There was an Augustin Isabelle,private,6th company,Hazen's Second Canadian Regiment,but there were also soldiers with the Larose nickname.

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CLOUTER, Charles

Charles Cloutier,from St-Pierre-du-Sud,PQ son of Joseph Cloutier. He was a private in Major Clement Gosselin's company,Hazen's Regiment. in 1792 he was at Pointe Levy,PQ Canada,and in 1797 at Plattsburgh,N.Y.,according to Sullivan and Martin,"History of the Town of Chazy". In 1820 when he claimed his Revolutionary pension,he was residing at Saratoga,Saratoga County,N.Y.with wife Polly,age 79.

ABORE, Preat and children of Joseph and Mary Delugau, Canadians, by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer of St. Joseph's church, Philadelphia, Pa.

"Prêt-à-boire" was a common military nickname of French army soldiers, signifying "ready to drink". This man was in the 7th company, Hazen's Regiment. Possibly he was Noël Rainaud-dit-Pretaboire (no parents given in the registers) who married 20 Oct. 1760 at St-Ours, PQ to Marie-Magdeleine Dilier or Didier, daughter of Jean Didier and Marie-Joseph Rondeau. A Noel Pretaboire in 1777 was Sergeant, Major George Chardin Nicholson's "Detachment of French Cadets" at Albany, N.Y.

PLUMADORE, Joseph

Joseph Plamondon-dit-Lafleur, private, Hazen's Regiment. On 21 May 1783, near Pompton (probably New Jersey), There took place the ecclesiastical rehabilitation of the marriage of Joseph Plumadon and Mary Delugau, Canadians, by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer of St. Joseph's church, Philadelphia, Pa.

There was a baptism 6 Oct. 1780, near Fishkill, N.Y., of Mary LaFleur, by Rev. Ferdinand Farmer. Sponsors were Louis Marney and Charlotte Chartier (Registers, St. Joseph's church, Philadelphia, Pa.).

Commentary on Annotations V.E.D.

The research upon which these annotations are based was done for the series "Canadian Participants in the American-Revolution--an Index" which has been in process of publication quarterly, since 1980, in the periodical Lost in Canada. That series also provides an introduction to the campaign and complete bibliographical citations. All in all, including the Province of Quebec, Nova Scotia, and the Canadian West, over 2200 men were identified.

The major archival series in the United States that were utilised for the series were the Revolutionary War Pension Records (Microfilm Series M804) and the Revolutionary War Muster Rolls (Microfilm Series M246) from the U.S. National Archives. As can be clearly seen from the above annotations, the files for one soldier very frequently contain information pertinent to the career of another soldier, so the identification of all the men and the more or less simultaneous reading of all the files divulged much more data than a researcher working on a single family or individual would be likely to discover.

The church records of the Catholic missionaries who made the long journey to Fishkill, N.Y. to serve these families are to be found today at St. Joseph's Church in Philadelphia, Pa, which was headquarters for Jesuits who covered all U.S. territory from Philadelphia north to the Canadian border. The territory from Pennsylvania southward was covered from Baltimore.

One word about the marriage customs may be worthwhile. Under the Catholic canon law that was in force before the 1914 revision, marriage was a sacrament of the Catholic church, and as such a channel for God's grace to his people. However, it was possible for Catholics to contract a civil marriage, if no priest was available, that was valid and binding in all legal senses, but not sacramental in character. In such cases, Catholics were to arrange for the saying of the nuptial mass and the blessing of the marriage by a priest as soon as feasible. This process was called the "rehabilitation" of a marriage. According to testimony in the pension file of Alexandre Ferriole the younger, the majority of these civil marriages during the war were performed by his father, Lieutenant Alexandre Ferriole, who kept a careful written record of them and issued certificates naming the witnesses. For a civil marriage to be valid, it had to be publicly contracted in the presence of at least two witnesses. At least a few of the marriages were performed by Captain Antoine Paulint, who also was careful to follow the prescribed forms.

One of the most interesting cases where we can follow this process today exists in the registers of Vincennes, Indiana, in the 18th century, where the French notary Etienne Phillibert-dit-Orleans kept a careful register of the civil marriages, and the missionaries noted the rehabilitations in the margin on occasion when they visited Vincennes every five years or so.



## Commentary on the Annotations Cont. V.E.D.

A similar procedure was followed with baptisms. In reading the Canadian registers, when children aged a few months to a few years were presented by their parents for baptism, the phrase is written, "sous condition, l'enfant ayant été ondoyé"---conditionally, the child having been baptized privately. This means that the father or a neighbor had conducted a simple baptismal ceremony with water in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The priest would now supply the "ceremonies of baptism", assign godparents, and record it formally in the church records. In many cases in the Canadian registers, the name of the person who performed the private baptism was recorded by the priest, which would seem to indicate that they often issued some form of certificate. In most cases, it seems that an officer of the regiment was invited to perform the baptism, since the men knew that they were literate and could read the ceremony properly out of their missals.

This group of French-Canadian soldiers of the American Revolution formed a tight, cohesive, and mutually supportive community. If the pattern of parish origins that emerges in the annotations is observed, it is clear that many of them must have been friends and neighbors before they allied themselves with the American cause. Many of them were already intermarried before 1776, while additional interlocking matrimonial alliances were forged during the war and during the immediate postwar years.
