



JOHN JACKSON (1794-1880) Son of Samuel and Betsy (Finch) Jackson, of Peru, NY.

Intorduction

Very little information has been collected until recently about the life and family of John Jackson, after he left his father's home, in the town of Chesterfield, as a young man. Two helpful statements were known:

- 1) The editor of the Elizabethtown *Post and Gazette* in the 19 December 1909 issue, added a postscript to the obituary of Andrew Jackson, of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, "Andrew Jackson was a son of the late John Jackson, the Mormon Elder who operated in Elizabethtown way back in the 40s. Deceased was a nephew of the late Daniel Jackson."
- 2) The Jackson Family History reports: "Although in "meagre circumstances they Daniel and Rhoda Ann (Cady) Jackson, took into their home Andrew Jackson, the son of Daniel's brother John." Source page 4, Jackson Family History by Daniel Bowen Jackson.

In August 2006, Louella Burke of Vernal, Utah, contacted Richard Greenough, a Jackson family researcher in Oregon, identifying herself as the great-granddaughter of John Jackson. Through correspondence with Louella and further research more details have been added to the story of John Jackson's life. Much remains to be discovered.

JOHN JACKSON⁴ (Samuel³, Theophilus², Robert¹) was born 29 Sep 1794 in a log cabin in the town of Peru, Clinton County, NY. John Jackson was the fourth child in a family of eight, born to Samuel Jackson and Elizabeth⁷ [Betsy] Finch (Isaac⁶, John⁵, Isaac⁴, Isaac³, John², Abraham¹). They had moved to Peru from New Concord, Columbia Co., NY about 1790 and their new home was but a short distance from what is now the Blockhouse Cemetery on Bear Swamp Road. Isaac Finch, and most likely, Abigail (Palmer) Finch, John's grandparents, are buried in the Blockhouse Cemetery. The Jackson's in 1798 owned a 54 acre farm, a log house valued at \$20.00, and a frame barn 40' x 30'. Their property had an assessment of \$624.

There are no records of John's school days but it is likely that he and his older siblings began their education by attending the school organized and taught by the Rev. Solomon Brown, Baptist Minister and School Master. Rev. Brown was encouraged to settle in Peru by Isaac Finch, John's grandfather, in order to establish a Baptist church in that area. The Brown home was especially built to accommodate a classroom. About 1800 the Jackson family moved a few miles south to the town of Chesterfield, Essex County, near Auger Lake and Butternut Pond.

Samuel Jackson and his two sons, Daniel and John, took part in the War of 1812. John is listed as a private in Captain Samuel Whitney's Company, Chesterfield Company, 37th Regiment, which participated in the unsuccessful defense

of Plattsburgh during Murray's Raid, on July 31 and August 1, 1813. Several of his Finch and Stranahan cousins are also listed as privates in this company. It is believed that this company of teenage men also participated in the Battle of Plattsburgh in September 1814. Source -The Elizabethtown Record Post, April 23, 1925. http://news.nnyln.net

John Jackson is noted in the History of Elizabethtown, by George Levi Brown, as a 'Mormon Elder' in the early 1840s in the Essex County community. From what is known of John Jackson's life and travels, it is more likely that he was active in Elizabethtown a decade or more earlier, i.e. the late 1820s. Daniel Jackson, brother of John, and his wife, Rhoda Ann (Cady) Jackson were also reported to have been members of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints, (CJCLDS) although eventually they renewed their membership in the Baptist Church. As far as is known, John Jackson continued as a member of the CJCLDS throughout his life. What influenced John Jackson to join the CJCLDS, or when he joined, in unknown.

Laura (c1797-1829), daughter of John Brown, married John Jackson by 1825, and perhaps earlier. Laura apparently died in the Plattsburgh area, sometime after 6 June 1827, when her signature is found on mortgages and deeds relating to the purchase and sale of land. From the land deeds available in Clinton County it appears that they were farming in the town of Plattsburgh from about 1826 - 1828; how much longer they lived in that community is unknown.

John Jackson's last purchase of land in Clinton County was on 12 July 1828 when for \$350.00 he bought one acre of land from his brother, Daniel Jackson. This land was situated on the Ausable River in Keeseville and appears to have been in the same area where Daniel Jackson ran a distillery in the mid 1820s. What use John Jackson made of this property isn't known.

Laura and John were the parents of Andrew Jackson, born 1826, in Clinton County. After Laura's death, Daniel and Rhoda Ann Jackson in Elizabethtown brought up Andrew and he moved to Wisconsin about 1849, at approximately the same time as other members of the Jackson and Knox families.

After Laura's death, John Jackson moved to Canada West, to what is now London, Ontario, Canada, where his sister, Sarah and her husband George Morrell were living. There he married Nancy Sawtle/Sawtell, on July 23rd, 1833, with George Morell, his brother-in-law, and Thomas Sawtle (Nancy's brother), as witnesses. (George Morrell died on 29 March 1834, leaving his wife and six children. It is quite possible that John Jackson lived with and assisted his sister during some of his time in the London area.)

Nancy was the daughter of Thomas and Rhoda (Downey)

Sawtell, originally from Sidney, Maine. The Sawtell family moved to Niagara Co., NY, between 1815 and 1825, but prior to 1825. They then moved on to London, Ontario for several years and eventually settled in Lapeer Co., Michigan.

Thomas Sawtell, Nancy's brother, settled in LaPeer County, Michigan and is found there in the census of 1850. John and Nancy became the parents of Julia Ann, born in June 11, 1836 and William Lafayette, born 20 July 1838. Both children were born in Canada. No information has been found about Nancy's death and burial; her death appears to have been c. 1840, just before her husband relocated to an area near Nauvoo, Illinois.

After Nancy died, John Jackson went to Lapeer, Michigan for a short time and there probably met with her brothers, Levi, b 1807, and John, b 1811. From available records it appears that John Jackson was the first of this family to move to Nauvoo, arriving there by 1840. Levi and John Sawtell arrived later, perhaps in 1841 or 1842. John Sawtell married Mrs. Jemima Johnson at Nauvoo, Ill. On 24 August 1842 and continued to live in Illinois. Levi Sawtell returned to Michigan, and lived in Flint for a number of years before settling permanently in Lapeer near other relatives.

By 1840 John Jackson was living in Hancock County, Illinois where many members of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints assembled from about 1840 to 1845. John Jackson was part of that movement and as a Proxy had several deceased members of his immediate family baptized. The Annotated Records of Baptisms for the Dead 1840 -1845, Nauvoo - Hancock county Illinois, Books A56 and A87, record the baptisms in Nauvoo, of Abigail Finch, Isaac Finch, Laura Jackson, and Samuel Jackson in 1841. The baptisms of John Brown, Nancy Jackson, Olive Jackson, (presumed to have been the wife of Samuel Jackson, Jr.). and Abigail Stranahan, (wife of James H. Stranahan, town of Chesterfield, Essex Co., NY.) followed on 25 September 1842 in Book C10A. The baptismal records reveal the relationship of John Jackson to each of his relatives, named above. Of particular interest to the writer were the baptisms of Abigail and Isaac Finch, followed by statements that "John Jackson was the Grandson of Abigail Finch;" and "John Jackson was the Grandson of Isaac Finch." This document establishes that Betsy (Finch) Jackson, mother of John, was the daughter of Isaac Finch and Abigail (Palmer) Finch.

Baptisms were also carried out for: Nancy Jackson, - "John Jackson was the husband of Nancy Jackson": Laura Jackson - "John Jackson was the Husband of Laura Jackson:" and John Brown: - "John Jackson was the Son-in-law of John Brown."

John Jackson was still living in the town of LaHarp, Hancock County, Illinois on 14 September 1844, when he named his brother, Daniel Jackson, of Elizabethtown, NY as his "true and lawful attorney" for the sale of his last property in Clinton County, NY. This land was sold for \$60.00 on 7 February 1845. On that date, John was still of the town of LeHarp, Hancock County, Illinois. It is not

known what, if any contact there may have been between John Jackson and his brothers and sisters in Wisconsin and New York after 1844. None is recorded, but must have existed, as family members in Vernal, Utah, in 2007 are knowledgeable of other Jackson family distant cousins in the Western US.

After the murders of Joseph and Hyrum Smith in 1844 in Illinois and the burning of 200 homes and farm buildings owned by members of the CJCLDS outside Nauvoo, in September, 1845, members of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints decided to move west. The first group to leave from Nauvoo began their journey on February 4, 1846. The first group reached the Missouri River on June 14, 1846 taking more than four months for the trip. "About 17,000 Mormons fled in wagons between March and October 1846 from attacks of mobs who were confused and enraged by the growing power, prosperity and peculiarities of the Mormon people, especially at Nauvoo." It is assumed that John Jackson was one of these. Some established a settlement called Kanesville, now Council Bluffs, Iowa, on the east side of the Missouri River. Others moved across the river into the area of present-day (north) Omaha, Nebraska, building a camp called Winter Quarters.

In 1847 the 1,000-mile treks westward to the Salt Lake City area began. John Jackson and his family participated in this move in 1849 as members of the last wagon train to leave that year. One source records that the Benson "train" included 182 people and 63 wagons. Records of the Latter Day Saints record that "John [Jackson] (55), his son (13), and daughter (11), traveled from Kanesville, Iowa, overland to Salt Lake City, Utah, leaving July 15th and arriving October 25-29, 1849." Two groups traveled together. John Jackson's trail captain was Ezra Taft Benson. George A. Smith led a second group. Smith.

Note: Brief items from several letters give snapshots of the journey:

July 4. "Left Kanesville today with our teams along with several others, traveled about six miles and encamped with Elder Benson's company on the Prairies. Tarried until the Sabbath following when we moved about four miles further, toward the Missouri river, to embrace our turn in being ferried over the same, which we accomplished on Wednesday the 11th".

"On Saturday, the 14th inst., about noon, the last wagons left Winter Quarters, and began to bend their way westward over the boundless plains that lie between us and the Valley of the Great Salt Lake. Slowly and majestically they moved along, displaying a column of upwards of 300 wagons, cattle, sheep, hogs, horses, mules, chickens, turkies [sic], geese, doves, goats and c. and c., besides lots of men, women and children, provisioned for nine months from the time of starting. They were led by Messrs. George A. Smith and Ezra T. Benson." The Last Train - Frontier Guardian, 25 July 1849, page 2.

July 31. "Camp traveled about 21 miles, over sandy and miry roads, dust flying some part of the way, so as to nearly blind ones eyes. Several wagons were mired. One axletree

and guide broken." Source: William I. Appleby, Autobiography and Journal.

"We now proceeded on our Journey to Salt Lake. We had a few stampedes on the road, one on Elk Horn, but no damages until we arrived at Willow Springs east of Sweetwater. Here we encountered a severe snowstorm, freezing 17 head of cattle and one horse in one night. Snow fell nearly to the top of our wagon covers and we had to dig our way out."

"We started on July 15th. During the long journey across the plains we encountered many hardships. Among them were a great stampede of buffalo and a terrible snowstorm. We reached Salt Lake Valley October 29th. Several of the Brethren came to meet us with ox teams at Emigration Canyon, among them President Brigham Young."

"Our statistics are [as] follows, as near as we can ascertain at present: - 129 Wagons, 4 Ponies, 74 Chickens, 2 Marriages, 467 Souls, 514 Oxen, 22 Cats, 2 Births, 125 Men, 243 Cows, 26 Dogs, No Deaths, 23 Horses, 70 Loose Cattle, 21 Ducks, 157 Guns, 1 Mule, 100 Sheep, 4 Turkies, 38 Pistols, 12 Pigs, 2 Doves," Source: letter by George A. Smith and William Appleby, 12 August 1849.

John Jackson and his family lived in Utah for about 10 years after their arrival in the west. In the Federal census of 1850 his family is found on page 39, in Great Salt Lake County, Utah. Jackson family oral history reports that John Jackson was active in the church of the Latter Day Saints at Kaysville. The dates during which he served in that location are unknown. His son, William Lafayette Jackson, married Ellen Mary Wilson, of Ogden, on 23 July 1864. She was born 25 August 1849, the daughter of Thomas Wilson and Ellen Neilson. They had a family of nine. The first three were born in Ogden Valley, (Huntsville), Utah, about 1871, William and family moved from Utah to Southern Idaho, to the Marshvalley, Downey area, where they farmed for many years and where the rest of their children were born.

Julia Ann Jackson married Lawrence Baldwin, c 1858, place unknown. All 5 of Julia Ann and Loammi Baldwin's family were born in California. Their first child, Collin W. Baldwin was one year of age by June 13, 1860, the date of the 1860 census. On 23 March 1860, Loammi. G. Baldwin, "of the county of San Joaquin," purchased a farm from George S. Baldwin and Sarah, his wife, for \$2000.00. Their farm consisted of two blocks of land; one, of 241.09 acres, which was owned outright; the other was an "undivided third interest" in 120 acres of land. (Vol. 10, pages 288, 289, 290) On 24 April 1860, Loammi G Baldwin sold this one-third interest in the 120 acres to Alexander Burkell for \$800. (Vol. 10, pages 355, 356) On 30 September 1867, Loammi and Julia Ann Baldwin sold the remaining part of their farm to David A. Learned for the sum of \$6000. (Vol. 17, pages 527, 528) It is supposed that this is about the time the Baldwin family moved to San Andreas, Calaveras County, California where Loammi Baldwin, farmer, and his family are found in the August, 1870 census. Loammi died 22 April 1872, in Stockton and his funeral was held in the First Baptist

Church in that city. Julia Ann and most of her family continued to live in the Stockton area for the remainder of their lives.

Despite several searches, John Jackson's name has not been found in the 1860 and 1870 US censuses. About John's later years we know that he was in Salt Lake City in the early 1870s for "temple work" at the Endowment House (a temporary sort of temple while the Salt Lake Temple was under construction). The IGI citation for his temple work there is clear. His sealings were recorded in Record Book H covering 30 Oct 1871 to 5 June 1873 according the International Genealogical Index (IGI) citation. In 1880 John Jackson was living with his daughter, by then a widow, and her family. It is as yet unknown when John Jackson moved from Utah to California. One can speculate that he moved to California to assist his daughter after her husband died in 1872 but no documentation of this has been found.

Julia Ann Baldwin, widow, her family, and John Jackson, farmer, are recorded in the California census in 1880 as residents of Stockton, San Joaquin County, California. Julia Ann Baldwin died Nov 13 1897, age 61, and is buried in the Stockton Rural Cemetery, Stockton, and San Joaquin County, CA beside her husband. John Jackson is buried nearby. John Jackson's tombstone is inscribed, "Born September 29, 1794, died October 7, 1880 - Native of Clinton Co., NY. - Soldier of War of 1812."

JOHN JACKSON'S FAMILY

Andrew Jackson, born in Clinton County, NY in 1826 and attended school in Pine Grove, and grew up with Daniel Jackson's family on their farm on the lower slopes of Hurricane Mountain. He went west to Wisconsin in 1849, first to Beloit, then after living at Kilbourn, Milwaukee, and Sparta, he moved to Eau Claire in 1859, where he spent the rest of his life. He owned and operated a jewelry store, and a farm, and his special interest was trotting horses. In 1860 he married Miss Marietta Blood, born 1829, daughter of Amasa Blood, of Essex County, New York. They were the parents of four children, Charles, b 1864, died 1870; Minnie C., b December 12, 1866, died March 16, 1888, buried at Forest Hill Cemetery, Eau Claire; Arthur, b 1873 who married Clara Scott Mosher on 31 January, 1894; and Amelia, whose dates are unknown. Maryette Blood died at Eau Claire, Wisconsin, in 1878, and was buried in the Forest Hill Cemetery, Eau Claire. Later that year he married Hannah E. Blood (cousin of Maryette) at Eau Claire, Wisconsin, on 2 December 1888. Andrew Jackson died in Eau Claire on 11 November 1909 and is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery.

Julia Ann [Jackson] Baldwin was born June 11 1836 in London, Ontario, Canada; she died of Meningitis on Nov 13, 1897, in Stockton, California. Julia Ann married c 1858, Lawrence Baldwin, also known as S. G. Baldwin, and Loammi. He was a native of Wayland, Massachusetts, where he was born November 1, 1822; he died 22 April 1872. Their children, all born in California, included Collin W., b 1859; Julia, b 1861; Lucie E., b 1864; George C., b 1868; and Mary E., b 1871. In the 1860 census, the Baldwin family

were living in Castoria Township, San Joaquin County, California and members included Loammi G. Baldwin, 33, born Massachusetts, his wife, Julia A, age 24, and a son, Collin W, age 1. Ten years later they were living in San Andreas, Calaveras County, Ca. with their four children, i.e. Collin W., age 10; Julia A., age 8, Lucy E., age 6; and George C., age 2. Several members of this family are buried at the Stockton Rural Cemetery. These include Julia Ann; her husband, Loammi; her father, John Jackson; George C Baldwin, and Collin Baldwin. Alice E. Baldwin and Mary Gardner, wife and mother-in-law respectively of George Baldwin are also buried in the Stockton Rural Cemetery.

Children:

- a. Collin W. Baldwin was born in 1859, probably in Stockton, California, and died in the same city on 9 December 1932. He did not marry.
- b. Julia Ann Baldwin was born c 1862; she married a) Frank K. Lewis on 25 December, 1884 in San Joaquin Co., Ca.; b) she is referred to as the late Julia A. Brown in the death notice of her brother, George C. Baldwin in 1928. Frank K. Lewis in 1884 and 1888 was listed as a drayman living at 272 Stanislaus St., Stockton. It appears that this couple moved from the Stockton area and no other Information on dates of death or family, if any, has been found
- c. Lucy E. Baldwin, born April 1861, married John L. Poynor on 20 February 1887 in San Joaquin Co., Ca. John died, near Escalon, Ca on 20 September 1936 and is interred at Park View Cemetery. Lucy died in Stockton on 4 November 1945. Their children, as listed in Lucy's death announcement, were Henry Poynor, Stockton; Mrs. Julia Lamey, San Francisco; Nell Yates, of Stockton; and Edna Poynor. Other information is unknown.
- d. George C Baldwin, was born 1 April, 1868 in Calaveras Co., Ca.; died in Avena, 6 December, 1928. He married Alice Gardiner, born 20 December 1871. She died on 16 August 1923, and is buried in the Stockton Rural Cemetery. No children.
- e. Mary E. Baldwin, known as Mamie, was born 1 October, 1870, in Calaveras Co. and died, near Ceres, Stanislaus Co, Ca., on 4 May 1945. Mamie E. married James B Poynor on 9 October 1895 in San Joaquin Co. James Poynor died in Stockton on 18 September 1927 and is buried with his wife in the Park View Cemetery. Children listed in John's death announcement were Leroy B., Douglas and Ethel Poynor, Mrs. Elma Harrison, Mrs. Ila Esterbrook, and Mrs. Althea Mondon.

William Lafayette Jackson, born 20 July 1838, in London, Ontario, Canada, married Ellen Mary Wilson on 23 July 1864 of Ogden, Utah. She was born 25 August 1849, the daughter of Thomas Wilson and Ellen Neilson. William Jackson's family lived in Ogden Valley (Huntsville), Utah until about 1872 when his family moved to southern Idaho, Marshvalley / Downey, Idaho where they farmed in Oneida County and are located in the census of 1880. William Jackson's family returned to Vernal, Utah in the fall of 1894 where William died on October 12, 1915. He is buried in the Vernal

Cemetery close to other family members. Mary Ellen died on 10 May 1924, in San Diego, California.

It is possible, but unproven, that John Jackson was also the father of John S. Jackson, born 20 October 1823 in Rochester, NY. John S. Jackson moved to Wisconsin from New York State about 1846 and lived most of his life near Eau Claire where he farmed. The Death Certificate of John S. Jackson identifies John Jackson as his father and Harriet Tyler as his mother. The Death Certificates list each parent as having an "unknown" birthplace. Daniel Bowen Jackson, author of an informal Jackson Family Genealogy, identifies John Jackson, son of Samuel, as the father of John S. Jackson. This information, one assumes, came from Jackson family sources. On the other hand, John was a very common first name in many Jackson families. No other linkage with the family of John Jackson of Peru, NY has been found. Information on this family follows in hopes that perhaps someone will be able to shed light on the origins of this family.

John S. Jackson was born on 20 October 1823 in Rochester, NY; he died 20 November 1910, and is buried in Lakeview Cemetery, Eau Claire, Wisconsin. John S. Jackson was a pioneer, nicknamed "Strawberry" Jackson, a berry farmer and nurseryman who moved to Wisconsin Territory in 1846 and homesteaded in Eau Claire County in 1855. His wife was Caroline E., (Morgan?) 1826 - 1911. Children: Fedelia, b 1848; Eveline, b 1849; William A., b 1850; Mary E., b 1853; Clarence, b 1857; Herbert J. b 1859; Carrie, b 1862; Emma, b 1863; Erva, b 1865; Erwin A., b 1865. All members of this family were born in Wisconsin.

Conclusion

John Jackson led an interesting life. He no doubt helped his father clear their pioneer farm in Chesterfield. He participated in the War of 1812 as did many, many others in Northern NY. He was probably one of the first Mormon converts in the Clinton/Essex County area and shared his faith there as a Mormon Elder. He demonstrated his faith by following the builders of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints through turbulent times in Nauvoo and Kanesville and by wagon train to Salt Lake City. He was the first of his family who is known to have crossed the Plains to Utah and California.

There is still much to be learned about the life of John Jackson who did not leave written records or other accounts of his life, his family or his travels. * Laura Brown, daughter of John (Brown), married John Jackson before 1826 and she apparently died in Plattsburgh about 1829 or 1830. It appears that Laura and John were the parents of Andrew Jackson, born 1826, and brought up by Daniel and Rhoda Ann Jackson in Elizabethtown. It is also possible that they were the parents of John S. Jackson, born c 1823, who moved to Wisconsin from Clinton/Essex Counties about 1846 and lived most of his life in Eau Claire where he farmed. (No records or family history is available to establish precisely who John S. Jackson's parents were. John Jackson then moved to London, Ontario where he married Nancy Sawtle or Sawtell with George Morell, his brother-in-law, as a witness. They were the parents of two children, William LaFayette Jackson and Julia Ann Jackson. Both were born in Canada. Nancy died before 1840/1841 and about that time John Jackson moved to Hancock Co., Illinois where Mormons had gathered and from there he and his two children moved to Utah, going by wagon train in the summer of 1849 in a company headed by Ezra Taft Benson.

In this installment are continued a listing of the many descendants of Joseph,. The Pioneer, and his wife francoise Boisselle through their fourth son Louis. The first two segments introduced us to the Grasset dit Lagrandeur family origins in France and the pioneer's settlement in New France, the third, fourth and fifth segments) began the lineage.

Unfortunately this man's descending lineage lacks completeness chiefly because of missing records and especially because of incomplete records. The church record of his own marriage could not offer better evidence of his own place among the sons of Joseph Grasset dit Lagrandeur I. Fortunate indeed is the searcher who comes upon the like. (And abashed is this researcher who neglected to copy the name of the priest). The record bears repeating.

Louis Grasset, minor son of Joseph and of deceased Marie Francoise Boicel, of this parish-married 12 Jan 1801 at ND du Rosaire of St. Hyacinthe to:

Marie Charles Brodeur dit (sic) Lavigne, minor daughter of Louis Brodeur dit Lavigne and of Marie Judith Hebert of this parish.

Present: Joseph Gracet, father of the groom, Andre, François & Nicolas Gracet, his brothers, Pierre Frichet, his friend, Louis Brodeur, father of the bride; Joseph Brodeur, her brother, Pierre Cesar Fournier, her friend

Note 1: The US Federal Census of Aug 11, 1860 shows:

Lewis Grasett, age 82, among the residents of the County Poor Farm of Beekmantown, N.Y.

There is no other information but age wise this could be Louis II.6

Note 2: One might wonder why brother Joseph 11.2 was not present at his brother's wedding. By this time, he was living up in St. Pierre de Sorel and had a wife and three small children

Joanne Stobie and Suzanne Lagrandeur Clayton contributed to the listing of names of the children. There may well be more children of Louis and Charlotte (especially a John Grasset Lagrandeur) but information is lacking to fit them in.

Of all the children (11) we have listed for Louis II.6, Louis III.121 and Charles III.126 are the only ones to carry on the Grasset name for this branch, (as far as we can find records) and we cannot find a marriage record for Louis. If any researcher can produce one, it would make many people happy, especially me. Nevertheless, there can be no doubt of his antecedents or of his progeny. His baptismal record reads:

Louis Grasset, born 10 March 1815 and baptized the 12th at St. Joseph de Chambly.

Parents: Louis, "voltage" and Charlotte Brodeur

Grandparents: J. Bte. St. Onge and Marie St. Germain

(Voltage = small soldier of an elite group, military maneuver-with horse. It can also mean a tumbler or trapeze performer. Since this Louis' father was Joseph, a soldier in the Regiment de Guyenne, voltigeur was probably used in the military sense).

Generation III

III.121 Louis Grasset & Julie Richard

We must assume that Louis III. 121 married between 1836-38 somewhere in New York. Their children will be listed as Generation IV.

The 1840 Chazy, NY Census lists only Lewis Grasset Males between 20-30; 1 Females between 60-70; 1 This would have been his mother Charlotte Brodeur.

The 1850 Chazy Census Louis Grassett - age 35- carpenter, born in Canada Charlotte - age 68, born in Canada Henry - age 4, born in New York

The 1860 Census

Lewis Grassett - age 45, carpenter born in Canada living with the family of Albert Lafayette.

This last information coincides with the information from Doane Cemetery, Chazy, N.Y. "Lewis Grassette, his wife Julia died April 12, 1849, age 27. Their daughter, Emeline died Feb. 28, 1849, age 1 year and 5 mos."

Louis Grassett III, 121 is stated by his great grandson to have left Chazy after the Civil War and to have migrated to Nebraska where he was buried. He never returned to Chazy.

Note: T means tentative. Viola's name appears only once and that is in the 1860 Census for Chazy, N.Y. She is stated to be age 6 and born in N.Y. Since Julia Richards died in 1849, Viola would have had to be age 11 or 12 to be Julia's daughter. So name and age disqualify her. But names and ages in census records are often wrong and we find Viola living in the family of a John? Rouchin. As with the case with other members of the family, the death of a mother caused the family to be broken up. Lewis himself (III. 121) was living that year with the family of Albert Lafayette, Honore/Henry was 13 and living with the family of John & laVinia Derom? We leave a few members free in case Julia married c. 1838 and had children before Honore.

Generation IV

IV. 127 Honore/Henry/William Henry Grasset must have had a difficult childhood. Motherless at age 3, at 4 he was living with this father and his grandmother. At 13, he was living with what was probably a foster family. He enlisted voluntarily in the Civil War at Chazy on 26, Oct. 1861 in the 96th Infantry, started at age 18, as William H. Grassett. He must have been 15.

Born in 1846, William Henry was not baptized until July 25, 1870 at St. Joseph du Corbeau. Basile Belanger was his godfather. On 1, Aug. 1870, at ST. Joseph de Coopersville, N.Y., William Henry, age 24 married Melie Belanger (Amelia Baker) and that Bazile Belanger became his father-in-law and Modeste Richer, his mother-in-law. The witnesses were Jacob and George Richer. It makes one wonder if William's mother, Julie Richard was once Julie Richer.

Before his marriage, William Henry had served two periods in the military. 1861-1863 (where his birth date was stated as Oct. 6, 1843), and again in 1864-1866. He applied for a pension on Jan. 31, 1888, at age 45. He had three children then. On Jan 3, 1927, he states he is 83. His grandson states he died in 1936, just before his wife died.

Nowhere do we find a record establishing this Charles as son of Louis Grasset and Marie Charles Brodeur, but his descending line is well documented. It is here that we find the best evidence of Charles ancestry in the death record of his son, Charles in 1913, where the informant is recorded as Wm. H. Grassett of Revere, Massachusetts. Until then, we must rely on census records, gravestone inscriptions and research done by Joanne Stobie and Suzanne Clayton.

Here again, we lack a marriage record but the death records of both are informative. Rose Wells died at age 53, on May 31, 1898 in West Ferrisburg, VT., married. Referred to in the records as Mrs. Grasset, born Clintonville, N.Y. to John Wells and Phoebe. She was buried in the cemetery plot of Charles Grassett and Mary Tarte as Rose Wells in Burt Cemetery between Boquet and Whallonsburg, N.Y.

For Charles, we have the burial record indicating his death at Mary Fletcher Hospital on Sept. 21, 1913 in Burlington, VT of diabetes and gangrene with burial on the 22nd in Westport, N.Y. His usual residence is given as Ferrisburg, VT, a widower age 66 years, 6 months and 13 days, born N.Y., a farmer, wife Rose Wells, his father Charles Grassett, born N.Y., mother Mary Tart, birthplace unknown. Informant: Wm.H. Grassett, 80 Calmet Street, Revere, Mass.

He was too young to enlist in NY and many under-aged New York males joined the Grand Army of the Republic in Vermont. He was wounded in 2 different battles. One record is found at Spottsylvania Court House which was a saber wound. The other was a fracture of the left arm above the elbow on 6/3//1864 by a "minnie ball" in the battle of Cold Harbor, Virginia. These were to be among the bloodiest battles of the Civil War. At the time of injury, he was serving in Captain Pearl Blodgett's G, Second Regiment.

Isephere spent the next six months at Brattleboro, VT, Military Hospital for recovery of his wounds. He mustered out at age 19, by the adjutant in Jay, NY, on 1/18/1866



Introduction

The Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) was created in another time and another country. There is no company in modern Canadian history like it.


The HBC was founded on 2 May 1670 when King Charles granted a charter to his cousin Prince Rupert and his associates. The charter created the HBC as a corporate entity. Several supplementary charters, which modified the original one, have been granted since, most recently in 1970. The HBC's full name is the Governor and Company of Adventurers of England trading into Hudson's Bay. The governor was the chairman; the Company of Adventurers were those who owned stock, as they were adventuring or risking their money. The stockholders were called proprietors and their meetings were called general courts. They elected the governor, deputy governor and committee (board of directors). The HBC was set up as a joint-stock company and the permission of the Governor and Committee was needed for the sale of stock. In 1863

there was a major re-organization as a result of which the HBC was capitalized by shares publicly traded on the open market.

The charter of 1670 made the Hudson's Bay Company 'true and absolute Lords and Proprietors' of

Rupert's Land, the vast drainage area of the Hudson Bay basin. This is equal to almost a million and a half square miles of western and northern Canada, more than 40% of the modern nation. Charles believed that the land was his to give because no other Christian monarch had claimed it.

By the Deed of Surrender in 1869 the HBC agreed to transfer Rupert's Land back to the crown. In 1870 the territory was incorporated into the new Dominion of Canada. In compensation the HBC received a large sum of money and substantial land holdings.

From it's founding in 1670 until 1870 the fur trade was the chief focus of the HBC. Its range of activities broadened considerably after that as it took advantage of new opportunities. At the beginning of the 21st century HBC is best known as a general retailer.

Although the HBC has changed with the centuries, its history is full of continuities. It is these continuities which make its archives so rich a resource.

Trading

More than anything else, it is records of the fur trade that draw researchers to the Hudson's Bay Company

Archives (HBCA). The Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) was involved in this multi-faceted business from the voyage of the *Nonsuch* in 1668 until it sold its Northern Stores and Fur Sales in 1987 and 1988. It operated fur

trade posts and agencies from Newfoundland to Vancouver Island and from the St. Lawrence to the Arctic. In the 1800s the HBC also traded in the American Pacific Northwest; its Snake Country Expeditions may have reached as far south as Spanish territory in what is now Texas. It also had posts in Alaska and Hawaii. In the 1920s there were HBC posts in the Russian Far East.

The fur trade brought the HBC into contact with a wide range of people. They traded with the Aboriginal people of North America and learned from them about the country. Many fur traders had Aboriginal wives and families. The HBC was also involved with other fur trade companies such as the North West Company, the American Fur Company, the Russian American Company and Revillon Freres.

Since the fur trade was the exchange of goods for furs, the essential role of fur-bearing animals should not be forgotten. The trade also brought the HBC into contact with the suppliers of goods and the buyers of furs. In the 1900s the HBC began to sell furs on consignment from all over the world in addition to furs collected at its posts. It became one of the greatest fur auction houses in the world, rivaled only by the Soviet government.

The year 1870 was a major watershed in the HBC's history. The incorporation of its territory of Rupert's Land into the new Dominion of Canada meant that the HBC had to adapt as agricultural settlement began to transform western Canada. HBC retail stores began to appear in towns and cities across the prairies and British Columbia, leading to their slogan "The Great Traders of the Great West." From the 1960s to the early 1990s the HBC expanded across Canada, acquiring other retail companies such as Morgans, Freimans, Zellers, Simpsons, Towers and Woodward's. Wholesaling and a mail-order liquor business during Prohibition were other 20th century enterprises.

The HBC was also involved in the sale of farm lands and town lots. Its mineral rights in its properties across the west were the basis of its venture into the oil business, which lasted from the 1920s to the 1980s.

During the First World War the HBC acted as the chief shipping and purchasing agent for the governments of France, Belgium, Russia and Romania. The "French Government Business," as it was called, was on such a huge scale that a subsidiary, The Bay Steamship Co. Ltd., had to be created to handle the HBC's merchant fleet. In the 1920s the HBC participated in a variety of unlikely businesses reindeer herding, frozen salmon, even comic films.

Getting Around

The fur trade connected Britain and North America. Wooden-sailing vessels originally made this connection possible. The Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) was founded after the 1668 voyage of the *Nonsuch* had demonstrated the commercial feasibility of sailing through Hudson Straits and into Hudson Bay in order to acquire furs. Maritime voyages remained an important part of the HBC's life until the sale of its last ship, *M.V. Kanguk*, in 1987. In the 1800s HBC ships sailed around Cape Horn to the west coast of North America; in the 1900s they sailed to Canada's Arctic and the Russian Far East. In the First World War the HBC, as the chief purchasing and shipping agent of the French and other Allied governments, operated a great merchant fleet.

Inland travel on the North American continent tied together the widespread posts of the fur trade. HBC men and their families traveled on foot, with snowshoes, on horseback and by dogsled. A variety of watercraft - canoes, York boats, stern wheel steamers plied the water routes. The HBC purchased its first aircraft in 1939.


Some of the fur traders traveled in territory that was new to Europeans though well known, of course, to Aboriginal people. This elevated what were essentially business trips to the realm of exploration. Men such as David Thompson, Samuel Hearne, Philip Turnor and Peter Fidler became famous as explorers and mapmakers.

Settling Down

The Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) played an important role in the settlement and urban development of western Canada. In 1811 it granted a vast estate in

the Assiniboine Basin to one of its controlling stockholders, the Earl of Selkirk (1771-1820). Selkirk was a Scottish nobleman who wished to settle displaced Highlanders on the fertile lands surrounding the confluence of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers, now the site of Winnipeg. The HBC assumed control of the colony at Red River from Selkirk's estate in 1836 and continued to administer it until Red River joined the Canadian Confederation in 1870.

By the terms of the Deed of Surrender, which came into effect in 1870, the HBC surrendered its territorial rights in Rupert's Land to the Crown. In compensation it was granted blocks of land around its fur trade posts. Some of these posts developed into important cities such as Victoria, Edmonton and Winnipeg. The HBC was also granted almost seven million acres of farmland in the "Fertile Belt" of the southern prairies. Farmland and town lot sales were a major part of their business for some decades.

Taking Care of Business


The Hudson's Bay Company's (HBC) existence spans five centuries — from the 17th to the 21st - and reigns of 15 monarchs, from Charles II to Elizabeth II. It began in the era of the wooden sailing ship and the quill pen. The HBC's Governor and Committee in London sent orders to their posts once a year, when their ships sailed in the spring. The replies came in the fall when the ships returned. The HBC carried on through all those changes in transport and communication that brought us a world where it is nearly possible to stay in touch with anybody anywhere all the time.

Amidst all this change, however, some things remained constant. The HBC gathered information about the lands where it did business and the people it traded with. It kept track of its finances. It invested its money. It sought legal advice. It used its understanding of past ventures to plan for the future. It recruited, trained, motivated, rewarded and disciplined its employees. It contended with rivals. It worked to

maintain cordial relations with the governments of Britain and Canada. It cultivated the goodwill of the public and often used its history for this purpose.

A Brief History of the Grand Army of the Republic

"Lest We Forget!"

After the Civil War had ended and the soldiers who survived the war had gone home, some of these veterans began to miss the friendships and camaraderie that they had shared during the war. Veterans' clubs began to spring up all around the country. Many were local and most did not last very long, but a few went on to become nationwide organizations. One of these was the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Grand Army of the Republic, often referred to as the G.A.R., was founded at Decatur, Illinois on April 6, 1866. Dr. Benjamin Franklin Stephenson founded the organization on the three cardinal principles of Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty and these principles guided the G.A.R. throughout its existence. To become a member of the Grand Army a man must have served in the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Revenue Cutter Service (today's United States Coast Guard) between April 9, 1861 and April 12, 1865. He must have been honorably discharged from the service and have never taken up arms against the United States of America.

Local organizations were called Posts and it was to a Post that a man applied for membership in the G.A.R. The Comrades or members of the Post would vote to accept or reject each applicant and if a man was rejected from one Post he was banned from joining the organization. Posts from a state or region joined together to form Departments and the Departments formed the National Organization. At each level the three primary offices were Junior Vice Commander, Senior Vice Commander, and Commander. For the National Organization the term "in-ChiefÓ was added to each of these titles. Departments and the National Organization held conventions called Encampments each year. Encampments were the ruling bodies of the G.A.R. and delegates would decide the business of the organization at these meetings.

What started as a veterans and fraternal organization evolved into a potent political force. The process started when Gen. John A. Logan was elected Commanderin-Chief in 1867. Gen. Logan is best remembered as the man who established May 30 as Memorial Day. His General Order Number 11, which created Memorial Day, is still read every year during many communities' Memorial Day services.

The Grand Army's political power grew during the latter part of the Nineteenth Century and it helped elect several United States Presidents beginning with Ulysses S. Grant and ending with William McKinley. By 1890 when the G.A.R. was reaching it's peak years the membership of the organization was 409, 489 veterans.

As the veterans of the Civil War began to pass on the membership of the Grand Army slowly dwindled away. Col. Samuel P. Town the last original member of Post #2, Philadelphia, the antecedent organization of the Grand Army of the Republic Civil War Museum and Library, passed away in 1937. The G.A.R. held its last National Encampment at Indianapolis, Indiana in 1949. Six surviving Comrades attended that Encampment. The last member of the Grand Army of the Republic, Albert Wollson, died in 1956.

The traditions of the Grand Army did not die with Comrade Woolson. Five Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic were founded in the Nineteenth Century to carry on the work and traditions of the G.A.R. and these organizations are still actively carrying on for the Comrades of the Grand Army. The five Allied Orders are Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Auxiliary to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Woman's Relief Corps, Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, and Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic. Each organization welcomes new members and each has specific requirements for membership. Information about each organization can be obtained by consulting the Sons of Union Veterans website at www.suvcw.org and then proceeding to the link for each organization.

The members of the Allied Orders and the G.A.R. Museum carry on for the Union Veterans. We invite you to join us to help preserve their legacy to our Nation. For if a Nation forgets its heritage it forgets everything.

The Star Spangled Banner

A Little History Lesson

Unless you know all four stanzas of the Star Spangled Banner you may find this most interesting. Perhaps most of you didn't realize what Francis Scott Key's profession was or what he was doing on a ship.

This is a good brush-up on your history.

(Editor's Note- Near the end of his life, the great science fiction author, Isaac Asimov, wrote a short story about the four stanzas of our national anthem. However brief, this well-circulated piece is an eye opener from the dearly departed doctor)

"I have a weakness — I am crazy, absolutely nuts, about our national anthem. The words are difficult and the tune is almost impossible, but frequently when I'm taking a shower I sing it with as much power and emotion as I can It shakes me up every time."

NO REFUGE COULD SAVE

By Dr. Isaac Asimov

I was once asked to speak at a luncheon. Taking my life in my hands, I announced I was going to sing our national anthem — all four stanzas. This was greeted with loud groans.

One man closed the door to the kitchen, where the noise of dishes and cutlery was loud and distracting. "Thanks, Herb," I said.


"That's all right," he said. "It was at the request of the kitchen staff"

I explained the background of the anthem and then sang all four stanzas. Let me tell you, those people had never heard it before— or had never really listened. I got a standing ovation. But, it was not me, it was the anthem.

More recently, while conducting a seminar, I told my students the story of the anthem and sang all four stanzas. Again there was a wild ovation and prolonged applause. And again, it was the anthem and not me.

So now let me tell you how it came to be written.

In 1812, the United States went to war with Great Britain, primarily over freedom of the seas. We were in the right. For two years, we held off the British, even though we were still a rather weak country. Great Britain was in a life and death struggle with Napoleon. In fact, just as the United States declared war, Napoleon marched off to invade Russia. If he won, as everyone expected, he would control Europe,



and Great Britain would be isolated. It was no time for her to be involved in an American war.

At first, our seamen proved better than the British. After we won a battle on Lake Erie in 1813, the America commander, Oliver Hazard Perry, sent the message, "We have met the enemy and they are ours." However, the weight of the British navy beat down our ships eventually. New England, hard-hit by a tightening blockade, threatened secession.

Meanwhile, Napoleon was beaten in Russia and in 1814 was forced to abdicate. Great Britain now turned its attention to the United States, launching a three-pronged attack.

The northern prong was to come down Lake Champlain [from Canada] toward New York and seize parts of New England.

The southern prong was to go up the Mississippi, take New Orleans and paralyze the west.

The central prong was to head for the Mid-Atlantic States and then attack Baltimore, the greatest port south of New York. If Baltimore was taken, the nation, which still hugged the Atlantic coast, could be split in two. The fate of the United States, then, rested to a large extent on the success or failure of the central prong.

The British reached the American coast, and on August 24, 1814, took Washington, D.C. Then they moved up the Chesapeake Bay toward Baltimore. On September 12, they

arrived and found 1,000 men in Fort McHenry, whose guns controlled the harbor. If the British wished to take Baltimore, they would have to take the fort.

On one of the British ships was an aged physician, William Beanes, who had been arrested in Maryland and brought along as a prisoner. Francis Scott Key, a lawyer and friend of the physician, had come to the ship to negotiate his release.

The British captain was willing, but the two Americans would have to wait. It was now the night of September 13, and the bombardment of Fort McHenry was about to start.

As twilight deepened, Key and Beanes saw the American flag flying over Fort McHenry. Through the night, they heard bombs bursting and saw the red glare of rockets. They knew the fort was resisting and the American flag was still flying. But toward morning the bombardment ceased, and a dread silence fell. Either Fort McHenry had surrendered and the British flag flew above it, or the bombardment had failed and the American flag still flew.

As dawn began to brighten the eastern sky, Key and Beanes stared out at the fort, trying to see which flag flew over it. He and the physician must have asked each other over and over, "Can you see the flag?"

After it was all finished, Key wrote a four-stanza poem telling the events of the night. Called "The Defense of Fort McHenry," it was published in newspapers and swept the nation. Someone noted that the words fit an old English tune called, "To Anacreon in Heaven" — a difficult melody with an uncomfortably large vocal range. For obvious reasons, Key's work became known as "The Star Spangled Banner," and in 1931 Congress declared it the official anthem of the United State.

Now that you know the story, here are the words. Presumably, the old doctor is speaking. This is what he asks Key:

1st Stanza

Oh! Say, can you see, by the dawn's early light, What so proudly we hailed at the twilight's last gleaming? Whose broad stripes and bright stars, through the perilous fight,

O'er the ramparts we watched were so gallantly streaming?

And the rocket's red glare, the bombs bursting in air, Gave proof thru' the night that our flag was still there. Oh! Say, does that star-spangled banner yet wave, O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?

("Ramparts," in case you don't know, are the protective walls or other elevations that surround a fort). The first stanza asks a question. The second gives an answer:

2nd Stanza

On the shore, dimly seen thru' the mist of the deep Where the foe's haughty host in dread silence reposes, What is that which the breeze, o'er the towering steep. As it fitfully blows, half conceals, half discloses? Now it catches the gleam of the morning's first beam, In full glory reflected, now shines on the stream 'Tis the star-spangled banner. Oh! long may it wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!

"The towering steep" is again, the ramparts. The bombardment has failed, and the British can do nothing more but sail away, their mission a failure. In the third stanza I feel Key allows himself to gloat over the American triumph. In the aftermath of the bombardment, Key probably was in no mood to act otherwise?

3rd Stanza

(During World War I when the British were our taunchest allies, this third stanza was not sung.) However, I know it, so here it is:

And where is that band who so vauntingly swore
That the havoc of war and the battle's confusion
A home and a country should leave us no more?
Their blood has washed out their foul footstep's pollution.
No refuge could save the hireling and slave.
From the terror of flight, or the gloom of the grave,
And the star spangled banner in triumph doth wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

4th stanza

(The fourth stanza, a pious hope for the future, should be sung more slowly than the other three and with even deeper feeling):

Oh! thus be it ever, when freemen shall stand
Between their loved homes and the war's desolation,
Blest with victory and peace, may the Heaven — rescued
land

Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a nation.

Then conquer we must, for our cause is just, And this be our motto — "In God is our trust." And the star-spangled banner in triumph doth wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

I hope you will look at the national anthem with new eyes. Listen to it, the next time you have a chance, with new ears. Pay attention to the words. And don't let them ever take it away—not even one word of it.

When I First Started to Search for Ancestors...

When I first started to search for ancestors, I was trying to help my Aunt Ruthie (sister of my father-in-law, Harold Pratt) research her family tree. I, myself, was not interested in genealogy. But Ruthie needed some work to help pull her mind away from her older sister's death, so my sister-in-law Judy and I decided to join in her quest.

The research Ruthie and her older sister, Maybelle, had done already showed that one ancestor, Joseph Pratt, had married a woman named Mary/Marion/Mary Anne Burgur/Bourgour/Bourgoyne. Ruthie, Judy, and I searched for this couple in church and civic records, to no avail. Countless trips to Middlesex, Vermont's GSA center, visits to various parish halls, and outings to town halls across Chittenden County yielded no information on Joseph and his Mary.

Years passed and I became very interested in genealogy. I joined NNYACGS and became involved with working at the library. Still, I was unable to find a reference to Joseph Pratt and Mary Burgur/Bourgour/Bourgoyne. Eventually, St. Francis Xavier Parish, in Winooski, Vermont-my home parish-published a book with genealogical records. As I searched for members of my family, I found the marriage of a daughter, of Joseph and Mary*. This woman listed her mother's maiden name as "Beauregard." Since this woman was 60 years

old at the time of her marriage, I believed her information reliable. (Surely she knew her mother's maiden name by that time!)

Armed with this new information, I renewed my quest. Again I came up empty and could hear Ruthie (by this time she had passed on) laughing at me.

Then, one day as I was working in the library, I looked in the St. Joseph's (Burlington, Vermont) Marriage Manual in order to answer a member's question. Lo and behold, this book referred to a woman named "Burgor, Mary** (C'est Davignon dit Beauregard).Ó The entry definitely excited me, though it did not convince me that the woman mentioned was my As soon as possible I checked the ancestor. Loiselle Marriage Index, where I was able to confirm my finding: Joseph Pratt married Mary Anne Davignon dit Beauregard.

Finally I had the answer we sought for about 15 years. In helping others and keeping an open mind, I helped myself. This one piece of information allowed me to trace the line back to France. Had I given up, closed my mind to the possibility that my aunts' information might not be accurate, or refused to consider alternative names, I would still be seeking in vain for a Mary Burgur/Bourgour/Bourgoyne married to a Joseph Pratt.


Many of us have experienced the frustration of finding a treasure trove of family pictures only to discover that no one wrote names, dates, places, events, etc. on the back of the photo.

Funeral services were held at St. Peter's church at 9:00 a.m. Monday December 23rd, Rev. Fr. Superior, officiating. Interment was made in St. Peter's cemetery.

The funeral was well attended by loving relatives and friends, as well as by the St. Peter's Rosary Society, of which she had been a faithful member.

Mrs. Garrant is survived by her husband, David Garrant, her mother, Mrs. Fannie Strock, her stepfather, Mr. Joseph Strock, three sisters and two brothers.

The Grand Army Badge

The badge is of bronze, made from cannons captured in battle during the Civil War, and is in a form of a five-pointed star, similar in design to the two hundred Medals of Honor, authorized by an act of Congress to be given to the soldiers and sailors most distinguished for meritorious and gallant conduct during the Civil War.

THE OBVERSE — in the center of the badge is the figure of the goddess of liberty, representing loyalty. On either side, a soldier and a sailor clasping hands, representing fraternity, and two children receiving benediction and assurance of protection from the comrades, representing charity. On each side of the group is the National Flag and the Eagle, representing freedom; and the axe, or bundle of rods, or fasco, representing Union. In each point of the star is the insignia of the various branches of service — the bugle for infantry, the crossed cannons for artillery, the crossed muskets for marines, the crossed sabers for cavalry, and the anchor for the sailors. Over the central groups are the words "Grand Army of the Republic" and under "1861 — Veterans — 1866" commemorating the commencement and close of the rebellion and also the date of organization of the Order.

THE REVERSE SIDE represents a branch of laurel, the crown and reward of the brave, in each point of the star. The National Shield is in the center, surrounded by the twenty-four recognized Corps Badges, numerically arranged, each on a keystone and all linked together, showing they are united and will guard and protect the shield of the nation. Around the center is a circle of stars representing the states of the union comprising the Grand Army of the Republic.

THE CLASP is comprised of the figure of an eagle with crossed cannons and ammunition, representing defense; the eagle with drawn sword hovering over and always ready to protect from insults or dishonor; the National Flag, which is also the emblem and ribbon of the Order.

Part of the answer for this is the fact that Sorel lies at the mouth of the Richelieu River where it meets the St Lawrence River. It had waterway access to communities all along the St Lawrence River and south through Lake Champlain, to the interior of New York State.

When you submit an article that has been entered on a computer, please both submit both hard copy and disc/CD. In addition, label the disk/CD with article title, and type of system & software used.


Additionally, the Journal now makes use of a scanner to enter photographs, line drawings, sketches, and maps.


