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





THE CONFUSING STORY OF PATRICK LYNCH AND MARY BRADY

When I first started this research, I thought this was going to be easy. That was 30 years ago, and I am barely off first base. There ended up being misleading records, false information and not much family information. I thought the family information I had was going to make this a breeze, but I was in for some surprises.

I began by gathering all the family data and stories from my grandmother and her family. I learned fast this was not going to go easy. There were few people to talk to and they didn't seem to know much. So, it was clear I would have to do the digging myself.

There was a lot of information from Canada and I had a copy of the Naturalization certificate. On the Immigration/Naturalization certificate it listed Patrick Lynch was born July 22, 1847 in Kilany, County Cavan, Ireland. Great! All I needed was to get the ball rolling in Cavan Ireland and I was good to go, or so I thought. Lynch is in the top 10 most common and Brady top 3 most common names in Cavan. There would also be multiple marriages of Pat Lynch and Mary Brady. I knew right away something was wrong as names and dates were not matching up. When the information I was getting was not close enough to make a match I tabled the research for years. I moved on to my grandmother's side that was even more difficult. Now that I am done there, I returned to the Lynch family. In the years that passed I had amassed a large number of documents and material to start a more intense research.

The problem; Patrick Lynch Jr. had lied on his naturalization papers. He was not born in Kilany, County Cavan, Ireland. In my paperwork from earlier I had a note from a book in the attic of Clarence Lynch that read "Patrick Lynch and Mary Brady from the parish of Castlerahan, County Cavan, Ireland. This, along with the naturalization papers, I thought would lead me to all I would need. However, something was definitely wrong as the documents were not turning up. So, I knew I would have to go slowly and look carefully.

I had a lot of material from St-Étienne in Beauharnois County, Quebec, on Pat Jr. and his wife Alfonsine Metras, so I began working backwards. I found their marriage easily and there was Pat and Mary Brady listed as his parents. A search for Pat Jr.'s baptismal record turned up a Pat born in 1844 but died in 45. No other Pat born to Pat and Mary. So, I also looked for the marriage of Pat Sr. and Mary Brady. Nothing came up so I again thought the original information was right. He was born in Cavan so Pat Sr. and Mary must have been married in Cavan.

I ended up deciding to look a lot closer at all the Quebec records as something was not right. The nice thing about Canadian research the records are right there and in detail. Most all names of

wives are maiden names so that's a big help.

So, to go forward, I filled out all the information I had on both Pats and compared what was there. All census, baptismal, marriage and death. I listed godparents, witnesses - everything. It didn't take long to find the problem. Besides the incorrect information, I found two huge mistakes in the Quebec records, very unusual for Quebec records. First the family page of Pat Jr. below.

In order to come to the information on the previous chart the problem of the marriage of Pat and Mary Brady. The only result for them comes up as Peter Lynch. This is clearly an error. In the document it states the bridegroom has signed below and it is Patrick Lynch not Peter, plus there are

no further documents for a Peter and Mary Brady yet a lot for Patrick and Mary. This document is in English which is unusual so an obvious error.

The same problem here for the baptism of Pat, no record, but because of an error, I had this date in my grandmother's records but could not find it until I checked the original record - July 23, 1848 born the 22nd. The naturalization document says 1847.

The original has Elinore, but Patrice underneath obviously added later and for the next baptism, it has Patrice with Eleonore written in between. I am certain this is the baptism of Patrick Lynch with parents Patrick and Mary Brady. The census records for 1851 and 1861 do not list an Eleonore but do list a Patrick with an age that matches this baptism. No further records arise for Eleonore either.

So, two records in the same family that are not going to show up in a search. They are both necessary to finding this family and solving this genealogy and is a great example of why you must double check everything and dig. People make the entries in the records and like all of us make mistakes. So, check and cross check. Could this be why Pat lied, his baptism could not be found? All trees I have seen list a child Leonore and no Patrick this is why.

Another interesting detail these records show is how this family followed Irish tradition in naming their children - first child is named after the father or mother of the bride. In this case Suzanne but Mary's mother is Mary however I have also found it as Judith and Suzanne so good. Second child Peter is the name of her father so right on. The next two are after the husband's parents. Mary and Laurence so perfect. This is probably why there are so many Patrick and Peter Lynchs as well as Suzanne and Mary. They followed the traditions.

There is still the issue of why Pat Jr. lied. He surely knew he was born in Canada so why the deception? I found one item 30 years ago that I had discredited due to the Naturalization document and that was a court ruling I found. A Pat Lynch had filed a petition for restitution for loss of property in the Rebellion of Lower Canada 1837-1838, also known as the Patriots war. The article appears in "Lost In Canada Vol. 16 #1, spring 1991" Pg. 12 Lower Canada Rebellion Losses. The cases reported are the result of the rebellion on the south side of the St. Lawrence in November 1838. The claimants are almost all Loyalists.

Pg. 13 Brown, L.G. Esq. of Beauharnois 847 states:

The claimant is of well-known loyalty. He was made prisoner by rebels. The Seigniorial house in which were claimant's furniture and effects, was pillaged by the rebels during their occupation of the village in Nov. 1838, (304p, 4s/303p, 9s)

Pg. 22 Lynch, Patrick of Beauharnois 880:

The claimant is admitted to be a loyal subject. He was employed by L.G. Brown Esq. (847), at the time when the Seigniorial house was attacked by the rebels but having indiscreetly sent his goods for safety to the house of a rebel captain whence, they were afterwards carried off as the property of a disaffected person. His claim for their value cannot be admitted. (10p 3s/nothing) Is this our Patrick Lynch? Was Patrick afraid it would be known he had Loyalist ties (if this was his father?) There are other Pat Lynches in the area so it may not be him. He is listed as a farmer on later census records.

So, whether he was a Loyalist or just a farmer it seems there is still more to the story. Below that Naturalization petition for Patrick Lynch, with the birth line highlighted.

What do we know about the parents of Patrick and Mary? Not a lot but there are some documents to study. First the records in Quebec.

Here is the 1861 census of St-Louis de Gonzague, Beauharnois, with all the children still at home. No Leonore but there is a Patrick age 13. If Eleonore, born in 1848, was 13, this date and age is right on. The 1851 Census adds to the confusion as James and Patrick are listed on a page by themselves that also looks like a mistake by the enumerator. However, their ages are correct.

So, to go forward we must make the conclusion that the records are not correct, that the marriage of Peter Lynch and Mary Brady is an error and it should be Patrick as his signature indicates. Also, that the missing baptism of a second Patrick born to Patrick Lynch and Mary Brady is also an error and, as was corrected in the original records, Leonore is actually Patrick and the following record is actually Leonore where it states Patrick. Someone saw fit to make the correction in the records for a reason. This supports the above census record that paints a clear picture of the makeup of this family.

To go forward, we can look at a few records in Ireland. Though I had done research in Ireland, I did not find a perfect match for Pat and Mary; here is what I was given by the genealogical center in Cavan. With names that matched I put their birth date in Quebec in parenthesis.



Self-Authorities (Expression 1) and 22 (1) and 10 a

Patrick Lynch born to Patrick and Mary Brady born 1843 from the parish of Kingscourt in County Cavan. This is the only Patrick born to a Patrick and Mary Brady. Also born to this couple are Mary born 1838 (1842), Andrew born 1845 and Peter born 1847 (1841). It is not known if these three are siblings of Patrick as no address is given, just that the parents are Pat and Mary Brady and they are from Kingscourt. There is also a James born 1837 (1846) in the Parish of Knockbride which borders Killany. Same parents but can't say positively it is the same family.

So close, but not exact, no Suzanne and we do not have an Andrew.

The birth dates also do not correspond with what we know. This information I was told was all that existed for children born to Patrick Lynch and Mary Brady. There are records for Laurence and Mary Lynch and a baptism for Patrick Sr. that are interesting. They are in Westmeath County, Ireland in Collinstown. This location is not far from Cavan and is a bordering county to the parish of Castlerahan.

These records from Collinstown seem to fit with the records however it is not what is on Patrick Lynchs' naturalization record which we know is incorrect.


Another record from the Lynch family was the note that Patrick and Mary are from the Parish of Castlerahan, County Cavan. I did notice several records in the Collinstown records that also listed that the individuals were from Castlerahan as well, so interesting.



Baptism of Patrick Lynch son of Lawrence & Mary Lynch the 29th August 1809, Collinstown, Westmeath, Ireland. Godparents are Patrick & Judith Lynch. The chart on the next page is based on a tree I found but can't confirm the info.

We can place Mary Brady's parents Peter and Suzanne in Quebec by 1832 with the marriage of son Terrance to Anne Tracy. Patrick first shows up with his marriage 1837. I haven't proven the other children

Terence's brother Peter gets married in 1851 his mother goes by Suzanne Gorie another record She goes by Judith Suzanne. So, this is the parents of Mary Brady wife of Patrick Lynch. The Marriage of Patrick Lynch and Mary Brady is the earliest record for Pat or Laurence I have Found as of yet. So, these are the two records placing these families in Quebec. I will look for immigration records for both.

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So, what do we know so far? Both the Brady and the Lynch families were in Quebec prior to the Famine - Brady in 1832 and Lynch 1837. That there are missing documents for Patrick Lynch that can be explained by coming to a conclusion that there were errors in the Quebec records. That the Naturalization records of Patrick Lynch Jr. gives questionable information for reasons unknown.


I encourage anyone thinking about doing genealogy to talk to and record all information as soon as they can with the oldest members of their family. In my case, I started too late. My grandfather died in 1975 about 10 years before I began my research. He kept in contact with family in Beauharnois and would have been able to give some answers. My grandmother was not able to as she could not remember. She did remember one family and had photos of them. That was the Normandeau family. Pat Jr.'s sister, Rosianna, married Jean Baptiste "Batchi" Normandeau. She died 5 years later but had two sons Albert and Adrien, first cousins to Patrick Jr. I have a photo of my grandparents visiting the farm in St-Etienne de Beauharnois. My grandmother remembered these visits well. The farm is still there and appears to be the same family living there. I have been there and should have stopped and asked but my French is not great, so I didn't. I have gone to St-Etienne twice, gone through the cemetery and on the last visit was able to talk to the custodian of the church (in French) and got him to open the church so I could see the interior. He knew the Lynch family stating his bus driver was a Lynch when he was in school. Again, if I had started earlier, I may have made some connections with family and hope to someday.

Some trees I have seen have a different last name for the wife of Laurence Lynch. The great thing about Canadian records is that most records list maiden names for mothers/wives. None of the records I have found list her as another name, including the records in Westmeath where again Irish records also list the maiden names. So, until I see some proof, she will remain Mary Lynch.




My father was born in 1924 so the photo was taken in that year.

prominent ancestors. This family has many Alphonsine Metras' mother is Julie Turcot, a direct descendant of early founding father and mother Jean Turcott and Fille a Marier Françoise Capel. Jean was killed by the Iroquois at Trois-Rivières. Also, Antoine Desrosiers and his wife, Anne LeNeuf Du Herrisson, married at Trois Rivières in 1647. 
WHEN IS A FOUNTAIN NOT A FOUNTAIN?

Iphonsine Fountain died on December 22, 1869, actie age of 16. She was not married. She had no children. She was buried from St. Peter's Church in Plattsburgh NY on Christmas Day. "What a mournful Christmas that must have been for her family," we said to each other. We met Alphonsine

when we were piecing together our family history. Her youngest brother Emile was our greatgrandfather.

Alphonsine and Emile were the children of Joseph Fountain and Julia Garant. Like so many French Catholic families of the time, the family was large. When Julia gave birth to Emile in 1864, her oldest son was married and expecting a child of his own. The Fountains lived on Cornelia Street in Plattsburgh. Joseph was a well-respected stone mason. When St. Peter's Church was established in 1853, Joseph was one of the original trustees. As we pursued our research, we learned that Joseph and




St. Peter's Church and Rectory - Plattsburgh, NY

Julia had been born in Canada, and all their children were born in New York. We followed the family's development through the US census records, which showed Joseph and Julia with three children in 1850, then seven children in 1860. By 1870, the household had expanded in both directions. There were two more children plus a new daughter-in-law, and now an older generation was living there too. Joseph's 94-year-old father and 77-year-old mother had moved in. We were pleased to learn their names, Baptiste and Marianne, because we had not been able to find a marriage record for Joseph and Julia to give us the names of their parents. We filled out the details of the whole family using federal, state and church census records along with church baptism, marriage and death records. We found Joseph and Julia's obituaries in the newspaper and their wills in the Surrogate Court. We were thrilled when we stood before their grave in the Old Roman Catholic Cemetery in Plattsburgh. Joseph was buried there, along with Julia. Joseph's father Jean Baptiste was there with his name carved clearly, "John B. Fountain." Joseph and Julia's son Francis Xavier was there too, and another child whose name was too weathered for us to read. McClellan's cemetery records say the child's name was Josephine, but because the date was December 22 (illegible year), we believe this person was our Alphonsine.

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
We moved on to trace Jean Baptiste Fontaine back into Canada, but soon we hit a snag. We found the marriage record for Jean Baptiste Fontaine and Marianne Boulerice, but it said they were married in 1828, and we knew that our Joseph had been born in or about 1816. Clearly, Jean Baptiste had married Marianne after his first wife, Joseph's mother, had died. Sure enough. A we found that in 1805 Jean Baptiste was married to Marie Ann Gagne in the parish of St. Constant, La Prairie, Quebec. There too we found the birth records of their children, Joseph's five older siblings and one younger sibling. Oddly, we could not find a birth record for Joseph either at St. Constant or in any nearby parish. Pressing on and using the Canadian church records (Quebec, Canada, Vital and Church Records (Drouin Collection), (1621-1968), we were able to trace the Fountain line all

the way back to France. We felt frustrated that we had neither a birth record nor a marriage record to conclusively prove Joseph's place in the line, but the genealogy experts we consulted assured us that we had enough evidence without those documents. We concluded we had hit a wall and decided to move on to search other lines in our family tree.

Naturally, some of those other lines were also families of St. Peter's Church in Plattsburgh. Months after moving on from our research on the Fountains, we were scanning the transcribed records of St.

Peter's Church looking for the Renaud family. Our eyes fell on an entry on the same page. A 7-year-old child named Alphonsine Quintal had died on December 22, 1869 and been buried on December 25. "Weren't those the same dates as our Alphonsine Fountain?" We quickly checked and found that yes, indeed they were, but our Alphonsine died at 16 years old, not 7. Even more curious, Alphonsine Quintal's mother was Julie Garant. We struggled to understand what we were seeing. We toyed with the idea that there was epidemic in 1869. "But what was the likelihood that two different girls, both named Alphonsine, died on the same day? And how could both of their mothers have the same name? This can't be just a coincidence," we said to each other. "Let's take a look at the original."

We loaded up the microfilm and found the page. There was the name in the margin, "Alphonsine Quintal." We analyzed the entry, slowly deciphering the priest's handwriting and translating the French words. It said that Alphonsine Quintal was "seize ans" not "sept ans"— 16 years old, not 7. Her father's name was Joseph Quintal. And then the wall we had hit months earlier began to crumble. "Could Joseph Quintal be another name for Joseph Fountain? Could they actually be one and the same person?" Pieces of the family picture began to shift and fall into place. "Was the Marianne Boulerice who was living with Joseph Fountain and Julia Garant in 1870 not his stepmother but his mother? Was Jean Baptiste Fontaine not Joseph's father but his stepfather?"

This theory needed to be tested, so we immediately got started by looking up Joseph Fountain and Julia Garant's other children in the original records from St. Peter's. We didn't have to look far. When Joseph and Julia's oldest son Joseph got married in 1864, the priests dutifully recorded his name in Latin as Joseph Napoleon Quintal "vulgo" (i.e. "commonly" or "usually") Fontaine and his

parents' names as Joseph Quintal "vulgo" Fontaine and Julia Garant. Likewise, when Joseph and Julia's daughter Mary got married in 1866, her parents' names were recorded in French as Joseph Quintal "dit" (i.e. "said" or "known as") Fontaine and Julia Garant. Our theory was proven.

Next, we returned to the records from Laprairie, Quebec. There in the parish of St. Philippe we found the birth record that had eluded us. Joseph Quintal—our Joseph Fountain—was born in 1816, the son of Joseph Quintal and Marianne Boulrice, who had been married at St. Philippe in 1815. We found the death of Joseph Quintal the father in 1824. We discovered three more children of Joseph Quintal and

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Marianne Boulerice. All the dates fit with what we already knew about Marianne's marriage to Jean Baptiste Fontaine. For the first time we understood that the French words "veuve" and "veuf" meant "widow" and "widower." Finally, the wall was demolished, and we were able to see the whole picture, all the way back to when the first Francois Quintal emigrated from France to Canada in 1662.

Here is a brief sketch of three generations of the Quintal-dit-Fountain family:


Joseph Quintal was born at Boucherville, Quebec on 19-Dec-1786. He married Marie Raymond at St. Philippe, Laprairie, Quebec, on 25-Nov-1811. It was the first marriage for both. They had no children when Marie died on 15-Apr-1813.

Joseph Quintal, now a widower, married Marianne Boulerice at St. Philippe, Laprairie, Quebec, on 23-Oct-1815. The marriage was his second and her first. Together they had four children, all of whom were baptized at St. Philippe.

- Joseph was born on 11-Feb-1816.
- Theophile was born on 8-Nov-1817. Pierre was born on 29-Mar-1819.
- Clothilde was born on 6-Jan-1821.

On 27-Oct-1824, Joseph Quintal died leaving his widow Marianne Boulerice and the four children. Joseph, the eldest child, was 8 years old and Clothilde, the youngest, was 3.

Meanwhile, Jean Baptiste Fontaine had married Marie Anne Gagne on 14-Oct-1805 at St. Constant, Laprairie, Quebec. Together they had six children, all of whom were baptized at St. Constant.



- Jean Baptiste was born in 1806.
- Marie Anne was born in 1808. She died in 1810
- Paul was born on 13-Aug-1810. Chrysanthe was born on 9-Sep-1812
- Vital was born on 23-Jun-1814
- Marcelline was born on 1-Aug-1821

On 5-Mar-1827, Marie Anne Gagne died leaving her widower Jean Baptiste Fontaine and the five surviving children, all of whom were under the age of 21.

Less than a year later, on 18-Feb-1828, the widower Jean Baptiste Fontaine married the widow Marianne Boulerice. Marianne's son Joseph Quintal had just turned 12 years old. Over the next five years Jean Baptiste and Marianne had three more children, all of whom were baptized at St. Philippe in Laprairie, Quebec.

- Pauline was born on 12-Oct-1828.
- Seraphin was born on 28-Nov-1830.
- Gabriel was born on 17-Jun-1833.


In 1835, Jean Baptiste Fontaine, Marianne Boulerice, and their blended family of twelve children (ages 2 to 29) moved to Plattsburgh NY. Joseph Quintal was about 19 years old at the time. Within a few years, Joseph Quintal, commonly known by his stepfather's surname as Joseph Fountain, married Julia Garant. Together they had at least ten children.

- Joseph (1843-1919) married Elizabeth Charron/Sharron and had seven children
- Francis Xavier (1844-1875) married Helene Payette and had three daughters
- Mary (1847-1878) married John Briggs and had six children
- Theophilus (1850-1914) married Henriette Chaoude aka Hattie Sherwood and had seven children
- Pierre was born in 1852 and died in childhood
- Alphonsine was born in 1853 and died unmarried in 1869
- Edward was born in 1856. He married and had at least one child
- Charles was born about 1860 and died in childhood
- George Orill was born in 1862. He married Lucy Peterson and had three children
- Emile (1864-1909) married Josephine Renaud/Erno and had two children




So it is that a young woman who died at the age of 16, unmarried and without children, proved to be the key that unlocked the door to our family history. Thank you, Alphonsine!



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Frozen to Death.

We learn that Thomas Baggs, of the town of Peru, was found dead a few mornings since, under the following sad circumstances: He visited the house of his brother, William Baggs, to remain all night. Being ill, he got up in the night several times, going out of the house and returning. But the last time he returned no farther than the door-step. The family supposed he had come in the house and was in bed, till morning, when he was found on the door-step, frozen to death. These are the particulars as we learn them.

Plattsburgh Sentinel - January 25, 1884




Peru - Henry Robert Baggs, 76, of NYS State Route 9, Peru, died Friday, November 19, 2010 at his home under the care of his loving family and Hospice of the North Country. He was born in Plattsburgh, September 7, 1934, the son of Henry and Bessie (Weatherwax) Baggs. Robert, as he was fondly referred, grew up in Peru and graduated from Peru High School in 1953. His career with the NYS DOT, which spanned more than 30 years, was more pleasure than work for him. He took pride in his job and loved visiting about it with those interested in hearing about it. He enjoyed his family homestead overlooking the AuSable River and would occasionally take quiet walks on the family property, reflecting on the memories and history his land held. He also enjoyed spending time with his family especially his grandchildren.

SOME STATEMENTS AS TO THE ANCESTRY OF THE VAUGHAN FAMILY AS WELL AS SOME OF THEIR DESCENDENTS

Written by Nathan A. Vaughan and Copied by Miss Rebecca Vaughan Published in 1904 in San Francisco

David Vaughan was a native of Wales in the West of England. As to his birth, we have no means of knowing at what time it occurred. He had four sons, Benjamin, David, John and William. All four came to this country; William soon after returned to his native land. From those three that remained all by the name of Vaughan descended. Benjamin, eldest of the three brothers, was a practicing physician and celebrated for his skill in his profession. He settled in Providence, Rhode Island.

I cannot tell the date of their coming to this country and don't know who his wife was. He had only one son, by the name of Benjamin, who also became a successful physician and lived in Providence until 1765, then moved to Manchester, New Hampshire. He died there, about one year thereafter, leaving one son, also by the name of Benjamin, who was his father. Who his mother was when a girl, we cannot tell (as the records are lost), but her given name was Sarah.

My father, at the time his father moved to Manchester, was some eight years of age. They had another child, a daughter, who died in infancy. Sometime after the death of his father, his mother married again (as records are lost, we don't know the man's name). He lived about two years, leaving my grandmother a widow for the second time.

My father was bound out to be a farmer while still young, who being of a morose, tyrannical disposition, so abused my father that he determined to leave him. As the man and his wife were absent from home one day, he, my father, went into the house, and being able to read a little, found the papers of his indenture and took them to his mother, who very soon committed them to the flames. Then he went to learn the saddler's and harnessmaking trade. Since my remembrance he has done more or less at this business, and also done something in shoe business – could turn his hand to almost any kind of business.

He experienced religion, I think, soon after he was in the Revolution. He went into the war in the early part of it, being at the time about seventeen years of age. First enlisted in the New Hampshire State Troops and served one year. Then elisted in the Continental Army and served two years and three months and marched through with Arnold to Quebec and got there about ten days after General Montgomery was killed, and there had the smallpox.

After he served some two years in the Army, he came home and was married to a Miss Sarah Beaman, daughter of Aron Beaman, July 1, 1777, then living in Dorset, VT, after which time he again went back to the Army, and was in Bennington Battle (then said to be the hottest battle ever fought in America), in which he was wounded twice, once in one ear, again on his little finger.

Service, in all, in the Army was about three and a half years in the better part of his life. He received land warrant and pension while he lived. I have no exact date of the commencement of his preaching. He preached in Dorset, VT, and in a place called Nine Partners, NY, for some six or eight years.

By his first wife, he had six children:

August 25, 1778 David born June 21, 1779 Mercv born Daniel B. born November 8, 1781 December 31, 1783 Ira B. born Sally born April 9, 1786 William April 19, 1789 born

David died young. Sarah, wife of Benjamin Vaughan, died August 25, 1790, aged 29 years, 10 months, and 14, days. Benjamin Vaughan was married the second time, in Plattsburgh, January 23, 1791, in the 34th year of his age, and she in the 22nd year of her age to Sylvina Averill, daughter of

Nathan Averill. He preached the first sermon that was ever preached in Plattsburgh. He was a Baptist, and his second wife (my mother), was a Presbyterian. Sometime after, she came forward and requested to be baptized in the likeness of her Savior.

By his second wife, he had ten children:

Benjamin J. born November 4, 1791

Clarina born December 22, 1793' died September 1795

Noble A. born June 20, 1796 Henry born June 11, 1798

Louisa born September 4, 1800, died October 14, 1800

Nathan A. born September 11, 1801

John born April 30, 1804 Abigail D. born June 28, 1806

Eliza born December 19, 1808; died January 1843

James E. born September 7, 1811

Sylvina Vaughan (my mother) died December 12, 1812, at some 43 years of age.

Benjamin Vaughan's third marriage was at Plattsburgh, February 12, 1814, to a widow, Mary Reynolds, consort of Charles Reynolds, a very worthy woman, who proved to be a mother to the motherless.

By his third wife, he had three sons:

Charles R. born March 1, 1815 Stephen A. born March 26, 1817 Ezra born July 11, 1822

Benjamin Vaughan died February 12, 1839, aged 81 years, 3 months and 27 days. Of the above-named children, Benjamin, Nathan and Charles live in the Town of Plattsburgh, Clinton County, NY. Noble lives in Beekmantown, P. O. address, West Plattsburgh. James E. living in the Town of Ellenburg, P. O. address, Ellenburg Center. Henry lives about 20 miles west of Chicago. Ezra lives in the Town of Saranac, Clinton County, NY. Abigail D. lives in the Town of Waverly, Tioga County, NY. John lately moved to Wisconsin with his son.

Mary Vaughan, my father's last wife, died December 12, 1847, aged 66 years, 2 months and seven days.

I shall not probably be able to give a satisfactory account of all my father's family but will do the best I can.

Of Mercy, the oldest of the first wife's children, none of us can give much information. I was informed by Sally Vaughan's husband that she was married to a man by the name of Sturdivant and moved to Erie, PA. I have taken pains to write to the postmaster of that place but can hear nothing from her. Daniel B. Vaughan married in Plattsburgh quite young to a miss Content Boom, a daughter of Francis Boorn, a mechanic (spinning and flax wheel maker), a very respectable man, one of the early settlers of this town. They had nine children; Francis B., Alonson B., Daniel, Benjamin, Elizabeth, Aron, Anslen P., Content and Sarah.

Daniel B. Vaughan died May 10, 1826, aged 46 years, 1 month, 26 days. He was a man of intelligence, perseverance and honesty. For a number of years was Justice of the Peace in this Town. In time of war with Great Britain in 1812, was a captain in the artillery, and with 27 men defeated 500 of the best British soldiers, who, at what was called Waits Mill Bridge, undertook to cross the Saranac River at that place. It was five miles west of Lake Champlain where the said river empties at Plattsburgh village. There being a double log house, standing on the opposite side from where the British undertook to cross, behind which Vaughan's men took shelter and so rapidly did they discharge

their guns, and the deadly aim they took and the fatal consequences of the lead they used, that the British declared there were 500 of them (Yankees). The Redcoats fled and gave up the contest. He was afterwards promoted to a Colonel for gallant and meritorious conduct. He still lives in the hearts of a grateful people.

Ira Vaughan also married young to a sister of Daniel B.'s wife, Sarah Boorn. He was a great hunter. The country being new at that time, the woods were full of all kinds of game — bears, wolves, panthers, deer, moose and the like — and some pretty narrow chances did he run with some of them. But few were his equal to travel through the woods or elsewhere. Could turn his hand to almost any business; farmer, mechanic, hunter, traveler, trapper, and as spry as any other of his race. At this time, 1868, though some 84 years of age, I am informed surpasses many of the people now of the age of 50 appearances and agility, and but few retain their facilities as he does. They had, I think, 8 children, six sons and two daughters: Eliflett H., Ira B., Sarah B., Ruth, Esli, Eli, Erie, Anslen (there may have been more). All except Ira B., I think, live in Wisconsin near their parents, who at last hearing, were both alive and well. Ira B. lives in the Town of Saranac, Clinton County, NY, is quite a lawyer, has been Justice of the Peace a number of years and has a great many friends. He married a daughter of the late Lyman Manly. They have three children who live in the same place with their parents.

Sally Vaughan married a man by the name of Churchill Barnes, a very nice and capable man, soon after moved into the State of Pennsylvania, Town of Troy, County of Bradford, was a very useful member of society where he lived and died; was Justice of the Peace for many years, having the confidence of all and still lives in the hearts of those who knew him. His wife, Sally, died a number of years before he did. They had three children that lived so man and womanhood, and all married and have families, one son and two daughters. Daniel V. Barnes, his oldest and only son, now lives in New Jersey. He has one son, well-educated and in affluent circumstances. His eldest daughter, Clarissa, married, had three children and died. I think some of them were in the Army of the Rebellion. Some of the children, at my last knowledge of them, lived in the town of Porter, PA. The youngest, Sarah M., married a widower, had quite a family and still lives in the same place as her sister's children. Her P. O. address would be Sunashine, Porter Co., PA. She was a very capable and accomplished young lady, was able to write on almost any subject, makes a good wife and affectionate mother.

Benjamin Vaughan, Jr., the eldest of the second wife's children, married for his first wife a young lady by the name of Rebecca Baker, a daughter of the Honorable Captain John Baker, who was an early settler of Plattsburgh. Of social qualities and by his energies and perseverance and good economy, had obtained a handsome property. But in the war of 1812-14, owing to his exposures while out in that campaign, lost his health and soon after, I think in 1817, he died. He was captain of a light infantry company, patriotic to the core.

His wife was one of those resolute women who was capable above many women to manage affairs. She was left with a large family and many of them quite young. At the time her husband was out with the Army, the British came to Plattsburgh (and as I was speaking of Daniel B. Vaughan defeating so many with so few). At this time they came up by Captain Baker's house instead of taking the direct road along the river which would make it some two miles or more travel to get to the bridge across the river at Waits Mills and as they came along they halted near the home of Captain Baker and set out their sentinels, came in and wanted milk and refreshments which was permitted them by Mrs. Baker, they paying for what they had. There being a brook running between the house and a hill that lay between the brook and the river, the officers thought that the river ran along where the brook did, and they saw a smoke over the hill and asked Mrs. Baker what that smoke was. She told me them it was at Waits Mill Bridge, across the Saranac River, and then they told here they supposed the river was this side of the mill and they found they had got to pass through considerable woods to get to the river, and thinking there might be some Yankee trick played upon them, they asked her where the captain was. She told them he was out with his men defending his county, and they had quite a confab

and finally the officers told her they were going down to the bridge and if there was a gun fired upon them while they were passing down they would burn all their buildings on their return. But she told them to burn and be damned. She would not flinch an inch. Her husband and one or more of her children were out to fight, if need be, their merry men or any that Great Britain had sent here, and she was going to let them know that it was their business to fight and she would stay up their hands as long as life or property would last. And if, in consequence of her showing her patriotism and independence the property must be burned, she was going to let them know she was not daunted by their cowardly threats. They returned from the bridge the same route but passed by without molesting the least thing – wouldn't let even their soldiers go into the orchard and get apples without paying Mrs. Baker for them, and well they did return the way they came for if they had come by the river road they would have found some Yankees to grapple with. They had placed their soldiers behind a large pine log, opposite side of the river and the moment they had come alongside they would have received the contents of their rifles. My brother Henry was one of them. They had received a sufficiency from Captain D. B. Vaughan's small handful of 27 men.

Benjamin was a shoemaker by trade and his wife a weakly woman. They had two children, George B. and Nathan W., who was an infant, his mother dying in child bed. They both are living, so far as I know. George B. lives in this place, Nathan W. in Ohio, both married and have families. After a few years, Benjamin married a lady by the name of Hannah Comstock, a great worker and a very prudent, good wife. The had quite a large family.

Noble A. Vaughan, the second son of my mother, was rather unfortunate. He went to help a neighbor to move a barn and I went with him with a yoke of cattle. After we had got the barn started a

few rods, they found it necessary to take off the roof to lighten the building. I went on top of the roof to help rip off the boards and shingles and he was on the big beam inside the barn, knocking off the gable boards. I found my team had left, so came down and went for the team. About the time I overtook them, I heard a crash and saw the roof had fallen by which his hand was caught by some of the timbers and crushed to that he was crippled for life, and wonder to that that no one lost their life by the fall. He then devoted his time to study and finally taught school. He went to Vermont to teach and there became acquainted with a young lady by the name of Lovina Merriam, daughter of Joshua Merriam (a hatter by trade). They were married March 2, 1826, by whom he had eight children.

Sylvina Merriam Vaughan was born February 25, 1827. Emily Vaughan was born April 17, 1829. Abigail Celinda Vaughan was born March 24, 1831. Sally Maria Vaughan was born Friday, February 8, 1833. Adoniram Judson Vaughan was born Sunday, May 29, 1836. Elnathan Judson Vaughan was born Wednesday, October 2, 1839.



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Stephen Kingsley Vaughan was born Saturday, June 10, 1843. Elanor Eliza Vaughan was born Monday, November 2, 1846.

Sylvina the eldest, was married October 16, 1844, to Charles McIntyre.

Emily was married March 1858, to George Washer; had quite a family nearly all dying young.

Abigail C. Married Walter Chappel April 8, 1851. He died Jan 16, 1853. She died January 5, 1896. Sally Maria married Allen Chappel, April 12, 1853.

Adoniram J. married Sarah Cornelia Darling, February 4, 1859. They had seven children.

Henry Vaughan, after the death of my mother, was of great help to my father with his large family and no girls large enough to do anything about the house. He had helped my mother in her poor health, so he was quite handy in doing housework; was quite a cook, so we got along weeks at a time without any woman's help. He was some 19 years of age when he went to learn the blacksmith's trade with a man by the name of Henry Wells, a good axe maker. He, being ingenious, learned quite fast and soon became master of his trade and set up a business for himself in what is now called Nip City. H soon after married a young lady by the name of Mary Worthley, a native of New Hampshire. Her father was an excellent carpenter and joiner and worked some at the cabinet business. They had seven children, named, Alexander, Irena, Caroline, Mary Jane Cornelia and Daniel. Five I think are still living and six married. Cornelia died in child bed. Four now live in Illinois not far from Chicago. Am unable to give you all their business qualifications. Am happy to say they are well respected and honorable member of society.

I come now as the next rotation to give you some account of myself and my family. Nathan A. Vaughan, born September 11, 1801. My mother died when I was in the 12th year of my age, too young to fully appreciate the blessing of a Godly mother, but, although more than half a century has passed away since her precious remains were committed to its Mother Earth to await the sound of the trumpet which shall awake and summon the sleeping millions to that great day for which all others were made, it has not, in the least in my mind, detracted anything from her moral worth. But as days and years increased my affections for that prize (though gone) has increased and at this time, 1868, while writing these mementoes (in my mind's eye) as clear as though she stood before me. I can see the tears flowing down her venerable checks while giving that wholesome counsel to her children, pointing them to the Lamb of God who was able to save their souls. Her counsels, I trust in the providence of God, has been the means of preserving me through this length of time from many of the ills to which human nature in this world of trouble, temptations and disappointments is beset, and while this bosom heaves and its contents throb it will be with grateful remembrance of a **Beloved Christian Mother**.

I was kept at school in my early boyhood as circumstances permitted. My father having a large family and somewhat embarrassed by being bail for one of his first wife's brothers, we had not the advantages of this time, 1868, but I got a tolerable common school education. At the age of twenty-and one-half years I want to learn the blacksmith's trade with my older brother Henry, and after getting my trade, worked one year upon shares, or in company with him, then went into business for myself. I hired a shop and tools of a man by the name of John Banker, who kept a tavern, and hired my board with the same man for better than two years. '

In those days, we had no railroads. People went by their own conveyance or by stage: and this place being on a great thoroughfare from Plattsburgh to Malone, and from Essex County through to Chateaugay, French Mills and Ogdensburg, etc., it frequently brought a crowd to this house. As I was in the habit of playing on a bass-viol and singing with it frequently entertained quite a company. When I was in my 27th year, I married the second daughter of Captain John Baker, sister to my oldest on brother's wife., on October 10, 1827. My wife was in her 22nd year, born May 8, 1805, and we have had five children, three sons and two daughters. Names as follows: Calvin Demming Vaughan was born July 28, 1828. Cornelius Halsey Vaughan was born November 7, 1831. Cornelia Louisa Vaughan was born December 11, 1834, and died February 20, 1835, aged ten weeks and one day. William Ransom Vaughan was born July 20, 1839. Charlotte Elizabeth Vaughan was born June 19, 1847.

In 1839, I got the Post Office of West Plattsburgh, established here at my place and renewed the appointment of Post Master and held the same through different administrations for over 20 years, until this administration came into power, and then it seems required a man under bonds to keep the peace with his neighbors for a postmaster, so I yielded to the pressure and gave it up. It was taken away from the community and given to a few. I tried to give my children a good common-school education. Each of the three boys had some chance in select schools and each tried the occupation of teacher, one term only, and nothing could induce either of them to try the second. C. D. Vaughan, when about 21 years old, went into the County Clerk's Office as Deputy Clerk under D. H. Parsons and served the whole term, gaining many friends, after which he though to try his luck in the far West. He found a new place where the Illinois Central Railroad was locating its works in the town of Amboy. got him up a shanty and went into the furniture business. The town growing rapidly, and people coming in from a distance, required furniture to commence housekeeping, which made his business profitable, and, growing up with the place, he secured and still retains the confidence of the community. The village became a city in 1860, in 1866, he was elected Mayor of the city and was reelected in 1867. After being west about one year, he returned and married an amiable young lady, Marie Louisa Balch, a daughter of Deacon Chester Balch of Plattsburgh, and with her returned to his present location. They have had five children - named Charlotte, Hattie, Frankie, Fridie and Baby. In the latter part of the summer of 1867I his store was burned (a very large store and many goods); had only \$3,500 insurance upon the whole thing

A few days since he purchased the lot adjoining, has built up two large stores which must be by this time nearly fit to occupy. He owns several houses besides in the city. His rents, when finished will be over \$2,000 a year.

Cornelius H. Vaughan, after getting a good common-school education, tolerably attended the school at Fairfax, VT, and was much benefited by that school. He then pursued his studies with reference to the practice of medicine and improved his opportunities with Dr. L. F. Bidwell, after which he went to the medical college at Albany, NY, at which he finished his studies and graduated with honor. Located at Peckatonica, IL, was doing a successful business. His brother, C. D., in Amboy, being sick, he sold out and went to Amboy. While at Peckatonica, he married Miss Lucy Balch, a younger sister of C. D.'s wife. He remained at Amboy a year or two. His wife's father lost his second wife, stepmother to the doctor's wife, and persuaded them to come and run the farm and care for him. They did so for one season. In the meantime, the Rebellion broke out and he went into the 96th New York Volunteers as an assistant surgeon, went through the Peninsular Campaign under General McClellan, afterwards was promoted to head surgeon of the 43rd Regiment New York Volunteers, and for a while had charge of the United States Hospital at Beaufort, NC. He served through the war and nearly ruined his health. While in the Army, his young wife and

infant son died which was a great blow to him. He is now doing a successful business with Bansemer Brothers & Co., of which he is one of the firms in a wholesale grocery store in Lafayette, IN.

William R., my third and youngest son, as well as his two brothers, had a pretty good education, and thought he would go to clerking, and went finally to Saratoga Springs with Mead & Woodruff. War came on; he was drafted, but, on examination, was cleared on account of heart trouble. Not being able to do hard work, he went West as traveling agent for the firm, in which his brother was engages, with whom he is still engaged. Since he went West, by change of climate or otherwise, he has not been so much troubled with his heart.

Charlotte Elizabeth, our only daughter living, when in her fourth year went to one of the neighbor's, H. P. Darling, who had been trading in this place and who lived in one of my houses, he having a little girl a little older than ours and they were very fond of each other. They two went under the shed where his cutter was, and a large ferocious dog was lying in the cutter. They looked over and saw the dog. Charlotte spoke to the dog; he jumped and took her face in his mouth and shook her. One tooth went into her right temple and cut into the corner of her right eye and the other cut her nose in two just at the end of the nasal bone, the under part hanging to one side. Sure enough, I thought she couldn't live. Doctor Nelson was soon here, although he lived five miles away, and had to take nine stitches to fix the fragments together. To his skill and close attention, be it said, he saved the unfortunate girl from an early grave. For several years and after she was weakly and very delicate. A year or two after my wife and I went West and took her along, which proved very beneficial to her health. A few years after, she went to her brother in Illinois: the change agreed with her, and she became strong and healthy. She has since applied herself to music and the millinery business.

John Vaughan married in March 1833, to Alvira Hovey, and had quite a family - some eight or nine children - and his wife took a notice to leave him. This family has been scattered and have come up as best they could, and it nearly ruined him. Some of the children have married. One of his sons married and took his father to live with them, and last year moved to Wisconsin, since which time I have not heard from him. Two of his sons were in the Army of the Rebellion and were honorably discharged. Their names were Stephen and Albert. One of the girls married and lives near Fort Edward. Abigail D. was some 9 or 10 years of age when my sister, Sally Barnes, and husband were here on a visit from Troy, PA. Abigail went home with them, and when 19 0r 20 years of age married a man of that place by the name of Horace Woodruff. She had two children; one died young; the other. named Sarah Eliza, married a man by the name of Edward Crans, had two children, and her husband was taken away by death, leaving her in good circumstances. She is still a widow, lets out his farm and has bought a village lot in the town of Waverly, Tioga County, NY. Some two years since she lost her only son, William Crans. Her daughter, Mary Crans, and her mother, Abigail D., are still living with her. Abigail D. Married some years after her first husband died a man by the name of Isaac Pierce. They lived together for several years, he dying soon after her daughter's husband; left Abigail poor. Her health was always delicate, but she still survives.

Eliza Vaughan lived to be a maiden lady and a great nurse. We all who reside here and have families have reason to say that he possessed not only a sister's love and kindness, but also a mother's care and sympathy and affection towards us and our children. She died in 1843, and as she approached the swelling Jordan and looked upon its surging billows she was calm and complacent, and, while the attendants were bathed in tears, she exclaimed; "I was never more willing to lay me down and sleep than I am now to cross over the Jordan of Death." There, at about the age of 25 years, did she pass away as calmly as summer evenings be. Who that could behold such calm sweetness in death but in the fullness of their souls would exclaim: "Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like this!"

James E Vaughan was about 18 months old when my mother died. He had several severe spells of sickness in his younger days, experienced religion quite young and united with the Baptist Church of Plattsburgh. He married about the age of 25 years to a Miss Malvina Boynton. She, too, was a member of the Baptist Church of Keeseville. He thought he had a call to preach the gospel and was authorized by the church to improve his gifts in that capacity, and, I hope he has been the means of doing some

good. They have had, I think, three children; two of them still live with their parents in Ellenburg Center, Clinton County, NY.

I now come to the third branch of the family. Charles R. Vaughan is a farmer and worth considerable property, which he has gained under embarrassing and trying circumstances. Before he was old enough to go into business for himself, he made a living with his father and mother on what was called her thirds – that is, the portion which she received from her first husband's estate, as that was all or about all she could have of his property, as he was a good deal involved when he died – and, as my father lost his farm in consequence of being bail for one of his first wife's brothers, this third, of some seventy-eight acres, was the land they had and this depended upon by mother's life for its continuance. There was a chance for Charles to buy the right of this piece of the man who owned the rest of the farm, and this, too, after her death, but his means were very limited. So, there arose a

mutual understanding between the man and mother that he might give a mortgage on that and get the money to pay him so he could have a chance to go on for himself with this beginning. With an aged father in poor health, unable to do much, and mother getting something in hears, but a great worker (and a mother she was, indeed, to us all), the other two boys still younger to provide for, not being able to do much at that time, he started out upon the ocean, as it were, and commenced a new career for himself. During several years thereafter, he had a great deal of sickness in the family, during which time my father died. He had been unwell a long time, and a heavy doctor's bill was the consequence. One morning early, soon after my father had got out of bed and dressed, he sat by the stove. He fell forward and expired. Charles with his own hands did the las special act to prepare him for his burial. That was to take off his beard. He was well taken care of and buried in a suitable and decent manner. Something like one year thereafter he married a worthy young lady, Priscilla Mead, daughter of a wealthy farmer of this place, by whom he had three children - one daughter and two sons - names, Mary E. Vaughan, born July 3, 1844; married December 31, 1862, to William B. Dodge, son of Reverend Harvey B. Dodge, a Baptist minister; both she and her husband are worthy members of the Baptist Church of this place. Cyrenus R. Vaughan, born January 13, 1847, is now nearly 21 of age, and a nice

young man. (According to that, this must have been written in 1868). Charles R., junior, born August 22, 1850, is a steady young man and a member of the Baptist Church.

Priscilla Vaughan, C. R.'s wife, died December 29, 1850. Charles R., after living a widower for some fourteen months, married a second time to a worthy maiden lady named Mary Hobart, from Vermont. They had four children, all boys. The oldest died in infancy. Those remaining, named Jonas H. Vaughan, Omar M. Vaughan and George H. Vaughan, are quite an interesting group of good children.

Stephen A. Vaughan was married in 1841 to a young lady named Sally B. Hunter, daughter of a worthy deacon of the Baptist Church, a man only to be known to be loved, by whom he had two children, Charlotte H. and Henry Vaughan. The boy died aged about 2 years. The girl lived to be about 16 years of age — slender constitution and rather unfortunate; got run away with, was injured, and finally had the hip disease, lingered some time and endured a great deal of pain; was a very good-dispositioned person, and no doubt had gone home to rest. Stephen was an honest, industrious

person, and ever lives in the hearts of all who knew him. He died September 30, 1865. His wife

survived a little over one year, when she died. Both were useful members of the Baptist Church.

Ezra Vaughan, born in Plattsburgh, July 1, 1822, was a carpenter and contractor by trade and was quite successful in business. He was married to Prudence Allen April 24, 1845, when about 23 years of age. Two children, both boys, were born to them.

William Merritt Vaughan born February 19, 1846, died September 13, 1847.

Augustus Sylvester Vaughan, born March 17, 1847, married to Kate A. Peek January 4, 1869. Two children were born to them.

Prudence Vaughan, wife of Ezra, died March 10, 1847, aged 18 years, 8 months.

Ezra Vaughan was married to Rheuamy White, August 10, 1847. Mary E. Vaughan was born and died May 4, 1848.

Betsey Priscilla Vaughan was born May 21, 1853; married to Daniel C. Muzzy August 8, 1872; children, six boys and two girls. One boy died.

Carrie Louisa Vaughan was born October 6, 1854; married to Oel M. Collins April 16, 1872; children, five boys and four girls; Carrie Louisa Collins died July 16, 1904.

Ella I. Vaughan was born March 15, 1857.

Prudy Amelia Vaughan was born October 4, 1859; died June 5, 1864.

Chloe Medora Vaughan was born January 1, 1863; married to Stephen H. Wright December 31, 1882; children, three boys and four girls. One boy died.

Lucius Sanford Vaughan born April 16, 1864; married Annie


A. Baker August 13, 1890; children, three boys and four girls. One boy died. Ezra Vaughan died September 8, 1891, aged 69.







From Fred's Findagrave page - Fred N. Vaughan, whose name figures prominently in connection with the business development of Amboy, has, since March 17, 1906, been president of the First National Bank. His record stands in contradistinction to the old adage that a prophet is never without honor save in his own country, for he has always lived in this city, where he has carefully directed his efforts and guided his business interests, until he now stands at the head of one of its foremost financial institutions. He was born February 1, 1865 and is a son of C. D. and Louise M. (Balch) Vaughan. The family is of Welsh lineage and was founded in America during the seventeenth century, Benjamin Vaughan, the great great grandfather of our subject coming to this country from Wales. His son and namesake, Benjamin Vaughan, at the age of seventeen years joined the New Hampshire state troops and later served in the continental army during the Revolutionary war. C. B. Vaughan was a pioneer merchant of Amboy, dealing in furniture for many years and was also mayor of the city and treasurer of Amboy township for an extended period. His worth was widely acknowledged by all who knew ought of his history. He died in 1886 at the age of fifty-six years, while his widow still survives and yet makes her home in Amboy.

In Amboy on the 23d of November 1887, Mr. Vaughan was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth J. Poland, a daughter of A. J. and Carrie (Potter) Poland. Her father was train master of the Illinois Central Railroad and one of the old settlers of Amboy. He passed away January 17, 1903, at the age of seventy-one years, having for a long period survived his wife, who died February 8, 1879, at the age of forty-one years. Both were laid to rest in Graceland cemetery of Chicago. One of the ancestors of Mrs. Vaughan on the maternal side belonged to the Culver family and came from England to America on the Mayflower. A descendant of the name of Sarah became the wife of Jonathan Woodworth, who figured in the Revolutionary war. Benjamin Poland was born in Maine in 1784 and was the grandfather of Mrs. Vaughan. Three children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. Vaughan: Glenn P., a student in the University of Illinois; Jeanette L., who was formerly a student in the college of Rockford, Illinois; and Fred N., who is attending the Amboy high school.





HISTORIC GRAVESTONE RESTORATION AND CLEANING

The following is a compilation of **DOs** and **DON'Ts** for gravestone and cemetery restoration and cleaning.

Well-meaning volunteers performing simple cleaning and restoration can damage a stone beyond repair.

Only perform tasks for which you have received proper training.

Basic Cemetery and Gravestone Restoration

Volunteers can:

- Document the location of gravestones within the cemetery including transcription of stones, the layout of plots, and basic assessment of gravestone conditions
- Use photography (see below) to document gravestone description, location and conditions
- Mow and trim grass and planting in the cemetery

With proper training, volunteers can:

- Clean gravestones
- Straighten gravestones
- Reset fallen gravestones



Call a professional when:

- The stone is broken into several pieces
- The stone is too heavy to pick up without damaging it or you
- The stone is already damaged, or the integrity of the stone is compromised i.e. spalling, delaminating or sugaring

NEVER REMOVE PIECES, PARTS OR INTACT GRAVESTONES FROM THEIR ORIGINAL PLACE IN THE CEMETERY. Gravestones should always remain in their original location in the cemetery to prevent further damage to the stone, to prevent being lost, and to mark the location of the grave.

Photography

- NEVER use <u>any</u> product shaving cream, bleach, corn starch, flour, chalk, etc. to read or photograph a gravestone
- NEVER touch a gravestone when reading or photographing it
- To read or photograph a gravestone that is difficult to read, use a mirror. For this to work, go
 to the cemetery before noon on a day with plenty of sun and no clouds. Angle the mirror in
 front of the stone, reflecting the sunlight over the stone using a raking light technique. This
 allows shadows to form in the letters and symbols on the stone, making it easier to read and
 photograph.
- Alternately, go to the cemetery on a dark, cloudy day or at night, and use a flashlight. LED
 flashlights work best. By holding the light on the side of the gravestone, the same raking of
 light appears and makes the inscription easier to read.

Mowing and Trimming Grass and Planting

- When mowing, be sure to aim the grass clippings fly away from the stones. Grass sticking to the stone can cause staining, damage from erosion and biological growth on the stone.
- When mowing, never let the lawn mower touch the stones. It is better to let the grass close to the stone grow, than to get so close the stone is damaged.


- When trimming with a weed whacker, be sure not to touch the stone with the string. This causes damage to the stone with scratches and eventual weakening of the stone structure causing delamination
- **NEVER** let bushes, trees or large plantings get too large when located directly next to a gravestone. The Roots can cause the gravestones to fall over and increases the biological growth on the stone. Vines growing on the stone also affect the integrity of the stone.


Restoring

- **NEVER** attempt to reset, restore or fix a gravestone until you have had the proper training
- NEVER use steel straps, bolts, pins, etc. to restore a gravestone
- **NEVER** use Portland cement, concrete, epoxies, caulk or automotive glue to repair a gravestone
- NEVER jam rocks around the edge of a gravestone in an attempt to make it stand straight
- NEVER use metal shovels or trowels when digging around a gravestone. Only plastic trowels and wooden tamps should be used to prevent scratching the stone

Cleaning

- NEVER use any household products bleach, ammonia, orange clean, 409, etc. to clean gravestones – No matter how mild you think it is or what the internet says
- NEVER use sandpaper, hard bristle or wire brushes, or metal tools of any kind
- NEVER US A POWER WASHER TO CLEAN STONES this can cause sugaring
- USE soft bristle brushes If the brush is not soft enough to scrub your face, do not use it
- USE plastic or wooden tools to prevent scratching the stones
- The only recommended wash for cleaning gravestones is D/2 biological product
 - D/2 was developed by conservators, who know the damage that can be done by cleaners containing acid or salts. D/2 has been specially formulated without these harmful agents. D/2 is a nearly pH-neutral quaternary ammonium solution with surfactants that help carry surface contaminants away. No other solution is more trusted by architectural and monument conservators.
 - D/2 has been successfully used to remove staining from a variety of surfaces including natural stones such as marble, granite limestone, sandstone, and slate; masonry surfaces such as brick and cast stone; concrete; wood; aluminum and vinyl siding; and canvas.





- (2) 1-gallon sprayers 1 for water and 1 for D/2
- 1 gallon D/2 biologic wash
- Plenty of clean water, amount is dependent on number of stones to be cleaned NOTE: Rainwater is best or good well water without iron or sulphur or metals Municipal water may contain additives like chlorine, fluoride, etc. and well water that is softened contains salt that can discolor or damage the stones
- List of recommended supplies for each volunteer present to clean stones
 - 2 to 3 plastic buckets

- Plastic paint scrapers
- Nylon bristle toothbrush

Cleaning Procedure

An extreme case of layering of rock

- Be sure to select a date that is well after the last frost date in the spring and well before the first frost date in the fall. It is critical that a frost not occur within 24 hours of cleaning due to water saturation of the stone.
- Select a stone to be cleaned. Do not attempt to clean a stone that is damaged in any way
- Dilute D/2 with water -60% D/2 to 40% water in a gallon spray bottle.

- Saturate the stone with clean water, followed by saturation with the D/2 water mixture
- Wait 20 or 30 minutes
- Begin cleaning using plastic scraper and a large brush, rinsing with clean water as needed
- Continue cleaning using toothbrush and craft sticks to reach smaller places
- Rinse the stone with clean water
 Alternately, saturation with water, followed by full-strength D/2 may
 be performed without any scrubbing but the results are not
 immediately obvious and may or may not produce the same level
 of cleaning in the long term.



PRESSURE WASHING - may produce the desired superficial results on a gravestone, however, responsible cemetery associations are strongly opposed to the use of pressure washing. There is simply far too much risk to the stone using this method. We all think cemetery markers are indestructible, but every type, stone, metal or wood, can be delicate and have its special cleaning methods. Any water pressure over 40 psi has the potential to cause significant damage to stones, especially those made of marble or slate or older stones, depending on their condition. A standard home garden hose with a nozzle attached will put out on average about 50 psi and the nozzle may still cause the stream to be stronger than the stone can take. Many stones are antiques – would you put grandma's china in the dishwasher?

The use of a pressure washing system on a gravestone will not only remove the thin outer surface of the stone but expose the softer interior pores - a process called sugaring. These newly exposed pores will catch and hold onto biological particles, grime and moisture that travel through the atmosphere. Trapped moisture within the stone from pressure washing will lead to a shorter stone life due to the freezing and thawing cycles in the North Country. If used on older stones, pressure washing can and will flake off entire layers of old brittle stone and remove the substances that hold the stones to their bases. Once moisture gets between the stone and its base, it's only a matter of time until the stone topples.

In Clinton County, where freezing and thawing consistently wreak havoc on everything from buildings to plumbing to plant life and markers in cemeteries, why would we want to exacerbate the process by using pressure washers on our precious gravestones? We've all seen this destruction by Mother Nature in our cemetery walks.

When you make a cemetery visit, look around you. Do you want to be responsible for more destruction from pressure washing? Do you want to preserve the stones for future generations? Please recommend to your local cemetery associations that biological cleaners be used. They may take longer to clean the stone and require a hands-on approach by lots of volunteers but will help stones have a longer life.

A native of Lebanon, MA, Mr. Shay had been in ill health for the past three years, but his condition did not become critical until a few weeks ago. The girl and two other children accompanied Mr. Bleu into the woods on Thursday where he went to cut wood.


While the father was working Edna looked for berries and found some which resembled wintergreen. When she returned home she complained of a headache and was sent to bed.

NEW LAWS LETS ADOPTEES OBTAIN THEIR BIRTH CERTIFICATES IN NEW YORK

From the New York Post

People who were adopted will soon be able to obtain their birth certificates, under a new law signed in November by Gov. Andrew Cuomo.

The legislation allows any adoptee upon turning 18 to apply to their local or state health department to get an original copy of their certified birth certificate. Such a request had previously been denied.

That would allow adopted people to figure out who their biological parents are as well as providing valuable information about their family's medical history.

The law also removes a government agency's ability to impose any restrictions on an individual's attempt to obtain the information.

"Where you came from informs who you are, and every New Yorker deserves access to the same birth records — it's a basic human right," said Cuomo.

"For too many years, adoptees have been wrongly denied access to this information and I am proud to sign this legislation into law and correct this inequity once and for all."

Cuomo vetoed a different version of the bill in 2017 despite its passage in both legislative chambers.

"Why should an adult have any less rights than any non-adoptee? It has major psychological implications, and that simple piece of paper is part of their DNA and really belongs to them," the bill's Assembly sponsor David Weprin (D-Queens) told The Post.

The law officially takes effect Jan. 15, 2020, but in the meantime the commissioner of the state health department will be directed to sort out the new rules and regulations for how to comply.

New York will become the 10th state to provide the documents with unrestricted access.



Funeral services for Mrs. Virgie B. Simons, 64, north country historian and former clerk for the town of Rossie, were held Saturday afternoon at Rossie United Presbyterian church with Rev. Robert Wilson, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Myron VanOrnum, Theresa, retired Methodist minister. Burial was in Riverside cemetery, Gouverneur.

Bearers were her nephews, Harwood Bogardus, John Bogardus, James Simons, Murray E. Simons, Clarence Jenne and William Towne. Honorary bearers were John A. Bell, Town of Rossie supervisor; Maurice Evans, Rossie superintendent of highways, and Mrs. Simons' two brothers-in-law, Arnold Simons and Milton Truax.

Mrs. Simons died Wednesday afternoon in Highland nursing home Massena, where she had been a patient since March 6. She had been in ill health a year and had been in Massena since September, where she resided with her son, Elwood M., a member of the English department at Massena High School. Her son is her only survivor.

A brother, Glen Bogardus, former principal of Massena High School and superintendent of schools at Canastota 30 years, died in 1957 and another brother, J. Otto Bogardus, manager of John Hancock Insurance Co. New Haven, died in 1963.

Her husband, Murray C. Simons, who operated the family farm in Rossie and was a motor car salesman for Seaker-Graves Motor Co., Gouverneur for 30 years died Dec 30, 1963.

Mrs. Simons was born July 2, 1900 in the town of Macomb, a daughter of Fred E. and Amelia Bellinger Bogardus, both of whom were descendants of two of Macomb's pioneer families. On the paternal side she was a direct descendant of Annetje Jans Bogardus, who came with her family from Holland in the 1600's and settled in what is now New York City, and on the maternal side from Col. Peter Bellinger, an officer in the Revolutionary War.

Mrs. Simons graduated from Gouverneur High School and Potsdam Normal Training school. She taught in North Bellmore, L.I. Elementary schools five years and was married to Mr. Simons Sept 13, 1924. The couple lived in Freeport L.I. after marriage.

In August 1927 they purchased the Simons family home in Rossie and moved back to the north country. They lived in the homestead 36 years. When Mrs. Simons went to Massena to live with her son, she kept possession of her home in Rossie which is filled with articles of historical interest. Serving as town clerk for the Town of Rossie 30 ears, Mrs. Simons was never opposed in an election. She was active in Republican circles and in all events concerning Rossie. She was registrar of vital statistics, a notary public and also a licenses agent for the American Surety Co., which sells fidelity and surety bonds.

She was a member of the Rossie Presbyterian church, of its United Presbyterian Women's society and had been assistant organist. Mrs. Simons first attended Brasie Corners Methodist church and became organist there at the age of 11. At that time, Rev. VanOrnum was pastor.

She was a past director of the St. Lawrence County Historical society and was a chairman of its historical sites committee, being instrumental in securing several historical markers for north country sites. An authority of Rossie and St. Lawrence county history, Mrs. Simons was well known throughout the state and had twice entertained the St. Lawrence Historical Society at her home. She had had many articles of historical interest published in north country newspapers and had been Rossie correspondent for the Tribune Press for many years.

There are several more pages such as the one following. They are filled with notes about the Bellinger family of Jefferson County, NY. We have tried to offer them to people by putting a notice on our Facebook page, but have had no takers, so we have sent them to the Jefferson County Historical Society located in Watertown, NY, where they may be of help to people there. The society has a Facebook page and a website - https://jeffersoncountyhistory.org/. Their street address is 228 Washington Street, Watertown, NY, 13601. The museum is well-worth visiting.



ALEXANDER

Hilaire Joseph Alexandre (Eli) was born of Canadian parents on April 6, 1858, in Plattsburgh. He married Marie Louis Le Doux (Ladue). He was a tough, rugged, 6' tall man who smoked and drank. He taught his boys to hunt, fish, survive in the woods, and carpentry, plumbing and gardening skills at home. He was a miner until the age of 75. He was sent home in a rage still wearing his work clothes with his carbide light burning on his head at a time when there was no pension, social security or insurance. Eli died of old age at 90 years of age.

His daughter, Marguerite Alexander Hansen, the youngest of 14 children married her husband, Charles Frederick Hansen on June 7, 1917, at the age of 15. They were the kind and loving parents of 5 children. Charles was a very strong, hard worker who spoke in a Swedish accent. He and Marguerite raised much of their own food. He forested their wood for fuel, plus he worked full-time as a chute puller until he was killed by a chunk of iron or which fell from an overhead stope.




Marguerite had two siblings who lived in Lyon Mountain, Victoria Alexander Robinson and Clifford Joseph Alexander. Other brothers and sisters moved away for employment. Marguerite died of a blood clot after surgery leaving Muriel, Charles and John in their Aunt Vic's care.

Eli and Louisa married on October 18, 1871. They moved to Lyon Mountain in 1873, so Eli could work for the Chateaugay Ore and Iron Company.

Our parents, Alexander Kourofsky and Melvina Czienska, were born in Poland, which was controlled by Russia at the time, but they were proud Polish. They were both from the outskirts of Krckow but in different sections of the city. Alexander's father worked on the estate of a baron who owned much forest land, and also owned a railroad. He took care of the forest and did carpenter work. The son learned about good tools. As the sons grew up, they all went to work there.

In 1909, Alexander and some friends came to America and went to Mineville where there was much work in the mines. The ore was of very good quality and eventually, he became a fine driller. I know he had brothers and sisters, but he never talked about them. If his friends gathered at our house, they talked about home and family.

Our mother was one of five children. Her father died of consumption when the children were young. As soon as they were old enough, they went to work. Our mother was hired as a nurse maid by the baron. She took care of the children. While she worked there. she learned to read, cook fine foods and how to weave linen. She made beautiful towels for her hope chest. Somehow, she learned about America. She decided to save her money and come to America. She had cousins here and nothing could change her mind. In those days, it was very difficult to cross the borders from Russia. When she was ready, she notified certain people who made a business of getting through the country to the port where the ships were. They traveled by night. She could take only the clothes that she wore and what she could carry. The thought that she was on her way kept her spirits up.

Our mother used to tell us that her own mother didn't want her to leave for America. She didn't want her to take anything out of her hope chest. She worried that the ship would sink, and everything would be lost. However, she took some beautiful white long towels with her initials in red on one end. She used them for special occasions.

Our father was a tall, handsome man with light brown hair which waved, and he had blue eyes. He played the violin when he was a young man in Poland. Whenever music was needed, he was asked to play. He was allowed to leave work and travel to where he was to play. That did not go over well with his brothers. He walked bare footed and carried his violin and boots. When he got near his destination, he pulled on his boots. He played well and was very popular.

My father was in Mineville when our mother got there. That is where they met, and they were married on New Year's Day. They went to Lyon Mountain where they began housekeeping in a log cabin – all the homes were log cabins. The mines were working around the clock and many men had no homes. Each household was asked to take as many men as they could, so the newlyweds had a houseful. Our mother made the best of the situation. She had to feed the men and do the laundry. The water had to be carried from the well. The men would roll out of bed and the next shift would take their place.

They had two milk cows and chickens for eggs. Our mother planted a garden for vegetables. Some of the men would help her – Alexander always had excuses and couldn't help. When the babies came, the borders had to leave. Malancia had ten children: Anastasia, Anna, Stanley, Mary, John, Anthony, Joseph, Alexander, Francis and Walter. She had a very difficult time when John was born and had to go to the hospital shortly after his birth. All her children were born at home.

Our father had his violin and played at weddings, baptisms and wherever music was needed. He would leave and she had to attend to all the chores and get the children dressed. She always wore a very nice black skirt and a white blouse. She would walk to the house of the celebration and always had a baby to carry. The men would dance with her.

When the ore pile got too big, they had to move to another cabin on higher ground. The ore sand covered the houses. At Eastertime, Alexander would go from house to house and play the violin. We would all go with him with our colored eggs. We play the egg game. Everyone would test the eggs by tapping the end of the gg with someone else's. If your egg cracked, you lost it. Sometimes you lost all your eggs.

On Christmas, we had a special dinner. Everyone had to be home. Sometime during the day, the priest would come and left communion wafers for each person. Our mother prepared a banquet. During Advent, we fasted so the meals she prepared had no eggs, milk or meat, but special dishes were prepared. Our father brought hay into the house. It was placed on the table and our mother covered it with her best tablecloth. Christ was born in a manger. We sat down and broke the wafers with each other and proceeded with the food which was delicious. This was called, "rooha". Our father played his violin until his fingers and hands were sore. My daughters, Ann, Jean and Carolyn, learned to play it and now Carolyn has it.

Our mother had a fine voice and would often lead the singing. She knew how to tell a story. In the winter, he told fairy tales. She would often end her stories with, "I was there, and I danced." We would sit around the table and strip feathers. We'd strip the fluffy part and throw the rest away. Malancia died from a stroke in 1936. She worked hard and never complained. Alexander suffered from a lung condition and could no longer work. He died in 1946.

All that I have written are memories. Hopefully, they help us to remember.

GUERRINO DEL BEL FAMILY

The patriarch of the family, Guerrino Del Bel was born in 1889 in Azzano Decimo in the region of Friuli in northeast Italy. His wife, Maria Carolina Ossello (Osello) was from San Giocomo, a small village in the Italian Alps in the Piedmont region. Maria was born in 1894. Guerrino seems to have entered North America through Montreal.

Following her father's death in 1912. Maria came to the United States aided by her brother Matteo She entered Ellis Island in 1913, and soon joined her brother in Sault Ste. Marie. On April 4,

1914, Maria Ossello and Guerrino Del Bel married in Sault Ste. Marie, ON, where he worked as a miner. Their first child, Linda Catherine Del Bel was born on December 31, 1914, shortly afterwards, the couple moved to Worthington, ON, located near Sudbury where Guerrino continued to work as a miner. Their two sons, Nello Valentino and Elsio, were born in Worthington – August 1917 and January 1920 respectively. At some point in 1920, the family moved to Lyon Mountain.

On March 17, 1922, Guerrino suffered a severe injury while working in the mines. According to family tradition, a large bucket struck him on the head. He was taken to a hospital in Plattsburgh, where he died two and a half months later. Upon his death,

Maria and the children were evicted from company housing, as was often the case. At the time, Maria lacked a trade and spoke only Italian. A gutsy and determined woman, she sued the Chateaugay Ore and Iron Company for loss of a breadwinner and received compensation of \$8.66 a week for the rest of her life plus \$2.89 per week for each minor child.

Maria and her children moved to Plattsburgh. She placed Linda in Our Lady of Victory Convent Boarding School and the two boys in the Children's Home on Bailey Avenue and set about learning English and acquiring skills as a baker. By the late 1920s, the family was living together again in a second-floor flat across the hall from the bakery she had opened – the Ideal Bakery. She became the pie baker for most of the restaurants in Plattsburgh and could be seen carrying a huge metal tray with

four to six fresh pies for delivery.

In the early 60s, a fire forced her to close the bakery. Maria retired to a house she owned on Broad Street. Always active, she died on June 10, 1967, in the middle of trimming her favorite birch tree. Maria was true to the promise she made to her husband that, if he died, the children would receive a good education. The couple are buried in St. Peter's Cemetery in Plattsburgh. Linda graduated from

Our Lady of Victory and went on to Plattsburgh Normal School to become a teacher. She taught in Vermontville, the Albany area, on Long Island and other New York Public Schools. She received her master's degree from SUNY Albany in 1948. Among the highlights of her career were the sabbaticals she spent teaching in Japan and Newfoundland. Linda returned to Plattsburgh following her mother's death and continued to teach in Plattsburgh Catholic Schools and caring for the terminally ill. Linda died in 2008 and interred with her parents.

Nello graduated with honors from Plattsburgh High School and attended St. Lawrence University and McGill University Medical School in Montreal. Here, he met and married E. Mary Eagleson, a nursing student from Ottawa. They had four children: Linda, James, Moreen and Jeffrey. Nello received his M. D. from McGill University in 1943, and immediately entered the U. S. Army. After the war, he returned home to practice medicine. After filling in for doctors in both Peru and Keeseville, Nello established his own office at 75 Court Street in Plattsburgh. North Country people remember him for the many babies he delivered throughout the area. He retired in 1981, died in July 2000 and is buried in Mount Carmel Cemetery in Plattsburgh. His wife, Mary, who died in 2009 and his son Father James Del Bel, who died in 2013, are interred with him.

Elsio graduated with honors from Plattsburgh High School. He attended Clarkson Institute of

Technology and served as a B-24 mechanic in Italy in WWII. Following the war, he attended Columbia University and Penn State University, where he received his PhD in fuel technology. He spent most of his working life in the Pittsburgh area where he met and married his wife, Edith. He died in 2017 and is interred next to Edith in Donora, PA. Their daughter, Patricia Long, survives them.

KOWALOWSKI AND GROGAN

Thomas Kowalowski, Sr. was born in Warsaw, Poland, in 1883. There is no known record of his journey to Lyon Mountain, where he met a Lyon Mountain girl named Anna Opet. Anna was born in Lyon Mountain on November 20, 1887. Her father was Andrew Opet, born in Austria, and her mother was Mary Courela. They were married on November 7, 1909. The witnesses at their wedding were Silas Korofski and Anna

Silage. Thomas and Anna had six children: William, Walter, Patricia, Thomas, John and Anna.

We know a bit more about Waladyslaw, Thomas'

brother, than we know about Thomas. Waladyslaw (Walter) was born in 1889 in Buda, Russia. According to the, "Samland's Ship's Manifest", he was 5' 11" tall with dark hair and eyes. He sailed from Antwerp, Belgium, and arrived at Ellis Island on November 11, 1910.

The Kowalowski surname had a variety of spellings which was common on early documents. Kowalowski was spelled, Kwoliofski and at times, Kawalewska. The Opet surname was spelled with either one or two "t's". On Anna's tomb stone it is spelled with a single "t".


Thomas died in the mines at age 35 on January 25, 1919. Thomas was a skilled miner (roof man). He was crushed

under a mine car in Mine #4. His wife, Anna, lived to age 78. She died on October 21, 1966.

The Kowalowski and Grogan families came together when William James Grogan married Patricia Kowalowski on May 23, 1936. William was the grandson of James Grogan. James was born in County Cork, Ireland, in 1850. He arrived in the Port of New York on board the "City of Berlin" in July of 1880.

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THE PIVETTA FAMILY

Ves Pivetta

My grandparents, Felice and Salute Pivetta, were born in Fiume Veneto, Italy in the 1800s, a small town in northern Italy between Venice and Trieste. My grandparents were sharecroppers. They ran a small farm for an owner who was paid one half of everything that was produced on the farm. It was a big struggle to pay the rent. In 1882, their first on Giovanni, was born; his brother, Carlo, was born in 1886. Their first daughter, Regina, born in 1890, died of pneumonia when she was two years old. A second daughter, Mabile, was born in 1893.

My grandparents were made an offer to run a farm in Brazil. They moved there in 1896. It was a bigger farm, more money and more help. My father, Angelo, was born in 1897. Things were going well except there was no school. When my father was five years old, the family returned to Fiume Veneto. Their sons, Giovanni and Carlo, decided to stay in South America. Both had large farms and big families.

My grandparents' youngest son, Oliver, was born in 1903. In 1902, my father started school and continued until he was in 4th grade. He worked on his parents' farm until he was thirteen, then he and a friend migrated to Germany to work making bricks. When my father returned home in 1914, he joined the "Brisaglieri Infantry". He fought in the Alps for two years before he was captured by the German Army and became a POW. He told me he was often without food during battles and in prison. After a while, he and others made a daring escape. My father was shot in the behind, but he managed to run and hide. Some of his buddies were killed. He made his way home; my grandfather had to hide him until the war was over in 1918. My father would have been shot if captured.

In 1920, my Uncle Olivo received a letter from a buddy living in Quebec City. The letter told Olivo that there was work in factories and that he should come to Quebec. My uncle borrowed money from his father and mine to pay for the trip. When he landed in Quebec City, he had \$20 in his pocket. H had a job in a flour factory for 6 months. Olivo's next job was working in construction on the Canadian side of Niagara Falls. While there, he received a letter from an Italian friend named Joe Danussi who was working in the iron mines at Lyon Mountain. Joe told him there was plenty of work for strong men, so my uncle made his way to Lyon Mountain and had a job the following day.

My mother, Teresa, left her home in Fiume Veneto in 1914, when she was 12 years old. She became a housekeeper for a family in Milan, Italy. She returned home 3 years later and married my father, Angelo, in 1920. She was a beautiful girl and hardworking.

In 1927, my father got a letter from his cousin, Olivo, saying that there was lots of work to be had in Lyon Mountain. My father and mother talked it over and it was decided that my father would work at the iron mines for a few years and save enough money to bring the family over from Italy. A few years became 10 years, my parents did not see each other from 1928 to 1938. My dad went home in 1938, but by then, my mother was taking care of my grandmother. However, my mother became pregnant with me. I was born on February 8, 1939, a few months before my father returned to Lyon Mountain. They named me Amerigo.



WWII broke out in 1940 and my two brothers were drafted into the Italian Army. Both were captured and placed in concentration camps. My mother had a very hard time for there was little food. For the last two years of the war, the Germans took over the town. My brothers came home, but to find work, one went to France and the other went to Belgium. My sister and her husband went to Switzerland. My grandmother died in 1940. Early in 1946, my father stated paperwork to bring my mother and me to Lyon Mountain. My father was a naturalized citizen, yet it took 3 years to bring us to America. My brother, Dario, was included in the papers, but in July 1948, tragedy struck. Dario was killed instantly during a bike race when he fell headfirst breaking his neck. My mother changed completely after my brother was killed. In August 1948, we received the approval for our trip and our passports.

We started planning for our big trip to America. My mother was still in shock, crying and


visiting my brother's grave every day. We left Genoa, Italy, on December 18, 1948, on board the "Saturnia". It was a difficult trip for my mother, she was sick most of the time. "The ship arrived at the docks in New York City on December 28, 1948. We did not go through Ellis Island. My father was there to meet us. He was all dressed up in a fine suit. It was the first time that I met my dad. The next morning, we took the train to Plattsburgh. A taxi brought us to our final destination Lyon Mountain.

There I was, nine years old, and didn't speak a word of English. My English teacher gave me language lessons after school. The kids changed my name from Amerigo to Ves in honor of the great explorer, Amerigo Vespucci.

My grandparents moved back to Italy where they enjoyed their beautiful place. They grew grapes (400 gallons of wine each year) pears, peaches, figs, plums and walnuts. My grandparents lived into their 90s

THE SAGA OF ACHIEVEMENT BY POLISH IMMIGRANTS SEEN IN THE RUTKOWSKI FAMILY STORY

The contribution given to William M. Rutkowski of 164 South Street by his adopted country has been handsomely repaid. He and his wife, Antoinette, reared their 10 children and provided each with at least 12 years of schooling. With their savings and incomes, the contributed financially to further education of four of their children. Three, at present, are advancing on their own incomes, with their parents' assistance.

A retired gentleman farmer, Rutkowski still works leisurely on his one-acre farm but it hasn't always been that way.

It was 44 years ago when Rutkowski left the farmlands of his mother country to look for a better life. It was at the age of 21 when he left the village of Goworow, near Warsaw, to take up permanent residence with his brother who emigrated years earlier and lived in Center Rutland, VT.

Mrs. Rutkowski, born and brought up on a farm in the village of Kempiesta Barowa which is about 50 miles from Warsaw, came to this country in 1907 where she joined and uncle, who then resided in Center Rutland and who has since returned to Poland.

The Rutkowskis were married in 1908 by the Rev. Valentine Michulka as St. Stanislas Church in West Rutland, and after, the strong love of Poland lured them back to that country for a few years. They returned because of the unrest and confusion there. The possession of a home and children meant so much to them that they at once set out to work hard and take advantage of the opportunities offered in America.

Vigorous in mind and body with no gift of "second sigh", the immigrants attribute their accomplishments to hard work and unity. Through home influence and that of school and neighborhood playmates, their first son, Chester, now 38, cultivated a desire to study medicine. He was graduated from the University of Vermont with a Doctor of Medicine degree. His education was totally paid for by his parents except for spending money he earned during summers as a lefthanded pitcher for a baseball team. Dr. Rutkowski, who has been in practice since 1935, resides with his wife and two children in Malone, NY.

William Rutkowski is quoted as saying, "When all of our children were in school, in the fall of that year our oldest child was entering his last year in college and the youngest was just starting school. We are not different from other families," he went on, "and we have managed because everyone has been willing to live happily and help."

Chester (Chet) came to Lyon Mountain to play ball during the summer months. It was common in those days for good ball players to be paid by local companies. Baseball was big business. While Chester was in Lyon Mountain, he met a young woman by the name of Francis Marvin. Frances was

the daughter of Dr. Herman R. Marvin and Clara Beyea Marvin.

Dr. Marvin grew up in Alburg, VT, and graduated from the University of Vermont Medical School. He married Clara Beyea who was a young nurse. Clara was born in Canada. They settled in Lyon Mountain when Dr. Marvin was employed by Republic Steel to be the doctor for the men working in the mines and their families.

Herman and Clara had three children: Thomas, Frances and Paul.

STEVEN SHUSDA (SHUGZDA)

Charnell Shusda

In 1908, an immigrant by the name of Steven Shugzda and his sister, Louse, left the Kaisiadorys Region of Lithuania to find a better life in the United States. The Russian Army was taking all the young men in the region to serve in the Russian-Japanese War. Steven and Louse landed in Ellis Island after a very long trip on rough seas. They were processed through the port of entry and that is where they had the spelling of their last name changed from Shugzda to Shusda.

The Delaware and Hudson Railroad was recruiting for workers at Ellis Island to work at the Chateaugay Iron Company in Lyon Mountain, NY, and Mineville, NY.

Steven's brother, Mike, went into the Russian Army and later joined Steven and Louise in Lyon Mountain. Mike landed in Montreal, Quebec, and came through the port of entry at St. Albans, VT. The spelling of his last name did not change.

Let's proceed with our story of how Steven met Grandma, Louise Getavesky. Louise came from Poland with her husband, Andrew Getavesky. Andrew and Louise came into the United States by way of Baltimore, MD. The Chateaugay Ore and Iron Company was recruiting there for workers in the mine in Elmira, NY. Andrew signed up and went to the mine in Mineville. He worked there for three years; both of his children were born there. Andrew was approached by members of the "Black Hand" for money to protect his family. Andrew refused to pay anybody to protect his family, saying, "That is my job." Well, the gang didn't take too kindly to that, answer and took Andrew OUT. They killed him!

Andrew's friends hurried up to get Louise and the kids out of Town – they were taken to Lyon Mountain. That is how Louise ended up at the boarding house. She would take in the miners' laundry to clean and fold. That is how she met Steven Shusda. They lived on top of Sweden, second block house from the end on the right side of the road. Steven and Louise had seven children. Steven's sister, Louise Shusda, married Frank Yanulavich who lived across the street from Steven.

FISH-FRY GRANDMA SHUSDA STYLE

This would happen about three or four times a year. Uncle George would take us kids fishing in Brandy Brook for brook trout (speckles). They were only four inches long, but they were fun to catch and good to eat. It would take us all morning to catch sixty or seventy fish. We would get home and Grandma would clean the fish, I mean wash the dirt, grass and what-not off. They then went into a big iron frying pan along with leeks or green onion, a little flour, salt and pepper, they were cooked until golden brown. We ate them with fried potatoes and beans.

The families were self-sustaining. Some of the families had a garden, chickens and a couple of pigs and a cow. In the cellar, there would be bins for potatoes, turnips and carrots. There were a couple of wooden barrels, one for sour-kraut and one for dill pickles.

SISKAVICH

Francis Siskavich and Sandy Siskavich Derr

Bernard Charles Siskavich was born on August 20, 1889, in the county of Vilna, Lithuania/Russia. His father was Charles Siskavich and his mother was Lucy Rochelsky. Bernard emigrated to the United States from Hamburg, Germany. He sailed on a Russian ship arriving at the port of Castle Garden, NY, in the spring of 1909. Bernard spoke Polish, Lithuanian, Russian, and Hebrew. He learned to speak English when he came to the United States.

Bernard worked in the coal mines of Pennsylvania. In 1910, he began working for the Chateaugay Iron Ore Company in Lyon Mountain.

Bernard was drafted into the U. S. Army on June 5, 1917, when he was 27 years old. He had not yet mastered English. Therefore, his card was registered to, "Benis Yushack". There is a disclaimer on the card stating his name should be, "Benio Siskewicz".


In the "Plattsburgh Sentinel" of March 29, 1918, Benio Siskewicz is listed as one of several Lyon Mountain men who were scheduled to leave Plattsburgh aboard a special train headed for Camp Dix.

On February 27, 1922, Bernard married Eva Mackline Kaska. Eva was born in Konava.

Russia/Lithuania. October 9, 1902. Her mother was Mary Karlofsky. Her father was John Kaska. Eva Bernard were and married by Rev. Levesque in the Roman Catholic Church in Lyon Mountain. They had seven sons: Bernard Francis (Subby); (Frenchy); William (Bill); Felix; Robert (Bob); Joseph (Butch) and Edward (Eddie).



Bernard filed a petition for naturalization on March 3, 1924. By then, he had learned to write for he signed his name in block print. He was granted a Certificate of Naturalization on April 14, 1924. Eva became a naturalized citizen on December 18, 1942.



TOLOCZKO ~ TOLOSKY

Craig Tolosky

In studying genealogy, I have learned that family names often originated from the town or village where they were from. It is very likely that our name comes from the village/town of Tolochin (today's spelling). On the old maps it used to be spelled Toloczyn. It lies east of Minsk in the province of Belarus. We have confirmed that the European and historically accurate spelling of our name is Toloczko. However, in some parts of Russia is spelled Tolochko because the "H" replaces the "Z" in the Russian alphabet.

Theofil Toloczko, my great grandfather, came to America twice. We believe that his first trip was with his brother, Anthony Toloczko, who settled in Trenton, NJ. Family stories tell us that the two brothers were ski troopers in the White Army of Czar Nicholas II. They served along the western front. One day they decided to head west and kept on going.

Theofil was married in the U. S. and had two children – Jacob Tolosky and Frances Tolosky Koch. He supposedly went back to Europe after the death of his wife or when the Lyon Mountain minds had a shutdown. IN late 1980, there was a complete shutdown and some people returned to their home countries to look for work.

We have found the name of the ship, along with its manifest, that Theofil returned to America on in 1899. The "Frederich der Grosse" sailed out of Bremen Germany.

In a book titles, "Aliens Admitted", that is a part of Clinton County's and the Town of Dannemora's records shows that Teofil (spelling changed) Toloczko declared his intent to become a citizen on October 24, 1894, but he returned to Europe. The county/town records show that Theofil became a naturalized citizen on July 5, 1904. The 1910 Census records show that he first came to the U. S. in 1887.

Theofil and his second wife, Victoria came to the U. S. in 1899. Immigration records list Theofil's age as 39 and Victoria's age as 24. The children's names and ages are listed as being Jacob,


age 6; Franca, age 4 (I'm sure it was Frances) and Kasimira (Mary) age 2. The original manifest notes that Victoria was pregnant, if so, she was pregnant with my grandfather, Joseph Tolosky, Sr. Those same records list their home as Likischki, Russia.

The death certificate for Theofil's brother, Anthony, who settled in New Jersey, states that their mother and father were August and Magdalena Toloczko, my great great grandparents. Their birthplace is listed as Poland. Poland was a part of Russia at that time.

A Baronisla Kowalewska, a female age 20, was listed with Theofil and Victoria on the ship's manifest, they were from the same town. She was a few years younger than Victoria and may have been her sister. Who did she marry and could some of her descendants be in Lyon Mountain? Reviewing the records of St. Bernard's Church there are people with similar names acting as godparents for my grandfather and some of his brothers and sisters. Victoria's maiden name in the baptism records, as being mother, appears to be Konvaliewska, Kovoloska, Kovalevsky or Kowoliewski. There is much to wonder about! Theofil and Victoria must have wanted their children to go to school with the same last name and from 1909 on, the last name has been Tolosky.

We also learned that Victoria had a brother who lived in Mineville. My grandfather, Joseph, Sr., would take her there to visit. Did he at, one time, live in Lyon Mountain? Was he already there in 1899 or did he come later? Is this the Bronislav from the baptism records?

Theofil first worked in the steel mills in Pennsylvania, but soon came to Lyon Mountain to work in the mines. He was injured and the company brought the family a house in Vermont where there were more job opportunities for the family. He died in Winooski in 1915, when his youngest, Dory, was only 6 months old. Theofil's oldest son, Jacob, had crews and would bid on jobs in the mines — so much tonnage in a certain period of time. Jacob went on to be Town Supervisor in Dannemora. Joseph, Sr. also went to work in the mines at age 16 to support his family when his father was injured. He retires as Superintendent in 1965. At Joseph's funeral in 1977, his younger brother Anthony said, "I was just a little boy when my father, Theofil, died. I thought of Joe as being more of a father to me than an older brother." Two of Joseph, Sr.'s sons or Theofil's grandsons, Joseph, Jr. "Judd" and Donald "Pickles" went on to work for the company.



THE STORY OF FRANK AND LOUISE YANULAVICH

Judy Yanulavich Salveson

Frank Yanulavich (Jenulevicius or Yenulawiczus) was born in Lithuania near Vilnius, on February 2, 1891, to Bertram and Catherine. Bertram was an engineer on the railroad, probably on the line that connected Vilnius to Kaunas. Frank had a sister named Katherine, who was a telegrapher. A tintype photo of her hung in Frank's dining room for many years. Frank had some education and learned to read and write Lithuanian. He also spoke Polish; some Russian and Yiddish. In the early 1900s the Russian Tsar, Nicholas II, required young Lithuanian men to serve in the Russian Army. Frank's father did not want his son to be conscripted. There were People who could be hired to help one cross the border and obtain passage to America. In 1908 or 1909, when Frank was 18 or 19 years

old, he made his way from Lithuania to Germany, then traveled to cargo ship to the port of Baltimore. He first went to Rochester, NY, where his cousin and a good friend, Stanley Janaitis, lived. There he worked briefly in a wood processing plant. Later he heard there was work in the iron mines of Lyon Mountain and there he found work as a driller.

Louise Shusda (Shugzda) was born about 1890 and grew up on a small farm surrounded by orchards and gardens. She loved that farm and the house which was heated by a large brick and stone stove. Bread was baked in the oven during the day and at night one could sleep in a cozy bed over the stove, kept warm by the heated bricks. Louise did not go to school at all. She learned to read

prayers in her Lithuanian and Polish prayer books. She was also able to speak Polish. Her father's name was John. When Louise was about 12 years old, her parents died of a fever. Louise nearly died also. She went to live with an aunt and her cousin, Elinora, who she called. "Sister." Louise may have lived in the Kaisiadorys Region, outside of Kaunas. The last letter sent to Louise in 1958 from Antanina came Malasauskaite of Gazu Kaimas which is in the Kaisiadorys Region. Antanina referred to Louise as "Auntie", she may have been a cousin or niece. Louise used to talk about Zlezmarial Parish and Zasliai, towns with churches located near the city of Kasiadorys. The Zlezmariai Church is still noted for its sculptures and may have been a church Louise attended. There is a railroad stop in the city of Kaiadorys, on the line from Kaunas to Vilnius.



Louise's older brother, Mike, was conscripted into the Russian Army and sent to fight in the Russo-Japanese War. While he was away, the girl he loved married someone else. After he left the army, Mike went to America and found work in the Lyon Mountain mines. In about 1908 or 1909, Louise traveled from Lithuania to America with her brother, Steve. She brought one steamer trunk. Their trip by sea took a long time. It was very difficult. Sometimes the waves were so high they came over the sides of the ship. Both brother and sister were sick. They entered the United States at Ellis Island.

When they arrived in Lyon Mountain, Louise went to work in a boarding house for miners run by a Lithuanian lady named Mrs. Sileage. Louise's cousin, Bill Shusda, also settled in Lyon Mountain. Louise's father and Bill's fathers were brothers. Louise's cousin, Elinora, came to America also but she settled in South Bend, IN, where she had other relatives.

Louise's older brother, Simon, left his wife and children in Lithuania to look for work and went to Sao Paulo, Brazil. Immigrants newly-landed in America were sometimes recruited to work on Brazilian coffee plantations. Simon planned to return to his Lithuanian family, but no one in America ever heard from him again. Letters sent to his last-known address in Brazil were returned.

Louise worked long hours at the boarding house, often from 5 am til 10 at night, just for her room and board. It was there that she met Frank Yanulavich. Frank had blond curly hair and she though he was very handsome. She liked him because he did not drink and was dependable. He never missed work. She once said she married him to get out of the boarding house, although she was not in love with him at that time. She fell in love with him later. Frank and Louise were married on May 5, 1910 and moved into a two-family house near the mines. Frank and Louse had seven children, all delivered at home by a midwife. Their first son, Adam, died a few days after birth. Their next child,

Frank, was born on January 25, 1914.

Then came Mary on April 17, 1918. Alex was born on September 16, 1920 and Geneva arrived on August 26, 1922. Mrs. Stacavich delivered John at 10:30 pm on December 26, 1923, but the doctor who filled out the birth certificate recorded his birth as being on December 27th. Ignatius, born on November 19, 1926, was their youngest child. Louise longed for the farm where she had grown up in Lithuania and often said that the best years of her life were spent there. She treasured a linen tablecloth woven from flax grown on that farm.

Louise and Frank continued to walk to church until World War II when their daughter, Mary, returned home from a stay with Elinora in South Bend. Mary cared for her parents after her brothers had gone into the Navy. After John married and left home his father would wait for him to stop by for a


visit after work. Louise would make John stacks of potato pancakes using her considerable culinary skills. In later years, Louise developed diabetes. She was in the hospital off and on. Louise died in 1953.

After 42 years of working in the mines, Frank was honored by the mine operators and managers at a ceremony held at the American Legion. He was recognized as the only driller never to have lost time from the result of an accident in all his years working in the mines. However, working in the mines did shorten Frank's life. After years of working in close spaces in an atmosphere heavily laden with the dust from drilling, Frank developed silicosis. In the early days, miners were not aware of the dangers of breathing the dust raised by their drills. When drills using water to keep down the dust became available, the drillers didn't want to use them because they slowed down their work. Drillers' pay was determined by how much work he accomplished each day. Frank's complexion was ruddy, even purple when he coughed. He became short of breath even when sitting still. Frank also developed sciatica in his legs. Frank seemed to become sicker after Louise's death.


In February of 1956, his daughter, Mary, took Frank to New York City to file for his compensation claim. Frank retired that year and died in October at the age of sixty-five.


THE TRAVELS OF JONATHAN BRUCE WICKHAM IN SEARCH OF HIS FAMILY TREE

I am starting this typing on December 19, 2009 and will add to this at various times as information and the spirit moves me to write it down. This is the travel account of my journey in the gathering of all of the possible additional information that I am able to obtain in conjunction with what my Grandfather, Emmett Melville Wickham, Sr., (October 1859 to November 1949) had obtained in his journeys of discovery on or before the summer of 1910.

The information that my grandfather obtained from his family, travels and various records about genealogy, he wrote it in a book called "Genealogy of the Oldest Wickham Family of the USA". It is written in narrative style and very informative.

So, here is what I experienced in my quest to add to the record of my family:

In the summer of 1981, I was living in Centerburg, OH, after I had finished reading the genealogy, I talked to my father, Kitridge Havens Wickham (December 1908-August 2003), that it would be a good thing to go to the places that my grandfather went to see for myself the part of the country that my ancestors lived and worked and had raised their families. Both of my parents were bound for a vacation trip out west and would be gone for about a

Please find enclosed a copy of my grandfather's genealogy of the Oldest Wickham Family in America. It tells the story of how and where my grandfather, Emmett Melville Wickham, traced his ancestors through the dark pages of time and space and uncovered the truth about who and where his ancestors came from. I am sure that you will find the reading very interesting and just maybe informative.

In my own travels, to the wilds of the New England countryside, where at the time I had never been to, I found it very pleasant and beautiful and a proud place to be from. Having said that, I have found that my American History that I took in school, seemed to be just a little more personal. I really didn't know much about my ancestors before only just in passing was I informed that some were there at the beginning of this great country.

I owe a great big thank-you to my friend, Mrs. Addie Shields, who was a great help in locating and the knowledge of the area, that helped me so much. I was sad to hear of her passing, but I guess it was her time to go.

I hope that the formatting of the file is unchanged as it was typed, but it might have gone through some kind of change in the process. As usual it is the way that I typed it on my computer, but we will see. Let me know if it is correct, if not I will send a printed copy in the mail to you.

month. I was unemployed during this time and after my parents left, and receiving my unemployment check of about \$200.00, I said to myself, "I have the time and the money, let's just do it." So, I packed some things, the genealogy and a map and set off for a high adventure into the unknown areas of this country that I haven't been to before.

I was heading to Plattsburgh, NY, which is about 30 miles from the Canadian border, and a distance of about 675 miles from my home. This is where my journey begins. On June 18, 1981, I arrived in Plattsburgh in search of trying to verify the information that my grandfather had gathered in his many trips to this area in search of his forefathers. As stated in our genealogy mentioned above. forefathers lived and worked in Clinton and Essex counties. I will try to locate and make copies or pictures of the documents and gravestones of our ancestors.

Upon arriving in Plattsburgh, I went to the public library and met with Mrs. Baldwin, the local historian for the city. She is a nice elderly lady who was very helpful in showing me the reference books on Plattsburgh. I also met Dick Ward who works for the library, as a reference librarian, who told me to check with the county historical society, Mrs. Addie Shields.

I found Mrs. Addie Shields, a senior citizen, who was very helpful and full of enthusiasm and was really passionate about history of the area. She located several papers about the area. She was unaware of my family members, for nothing was known about them. My ancestor, Jonathan Wickham Jr., as referred to in the genealogy, came to Plattsburgh when it was settled in 1784, he was a miller by trade, as every community needed a miller to grind the grain. She told me about a man named Green, who had purchased land from Jonathan Wickham and Jonathan had left the area. Near the courthouse in downtown is a street named Green. This seems as close as we can get.

She made copies for me of the gravestones, that another people had made, and made a map where I could locate the graves of our ancestors. I also made her a copy of the genealogy that was pertinent to Plattsburgh. She also said that if I needed anything else that I needed, just call on her. This was my first of many more visits with Mrs. Shields. She told me to go to Elizabethtown, NY, to check at the Essex County Historical Society.

I went to Elizabethtown and went to the library and talked to a Mrs Pat Casselman, a volunteer at the County Historical Society, she only had information on file cards about area cemeteries. I only found info from Schroon Lake that had Wickham's mentioned. I wrote them down below:

It rained the whole time of my trip. As I searched the cemeteries row after row of headstones finding no matches, I would take off my wet shoes and put them on the dash of my car and turn on the defroster to dry them out by the time I reached the next destination. I then headed to Schroon Lake where my 4th great grandfather Ahaz Wickham, was buried.

On Saturday June 20th, 1981. I visited the grave site of Ahaz Wickham. I was very thrilled to have found it, because of the so many disappointments lately. Ahaz lived the last days and lived with his children, and was buried in the Presbyterian Cemetery, that is located on Huffman Rd on the south side of town off Highway Route 9, the North-South road. Huffman road from Route 9 runs to the west and crosses Interstate 87. The cemetery is located on the right side of Huffman Road. I also located the other graves of the above names in the cemetery not far from the stone of Ahaz.

The grave is by the last driveway to the cemetery and as you drive in, the grave is on the right side, third row and fifth from the fence facing east towards town. There is beside Ahaz, a Benjamin Wickham and his children. I don't know if this Benjamin is our relative or not. He is a veteran and therefore has a flag by his stone. After taking some photographs and some remembering what my ancestors went through, I pressed on to Middle Grove, NY, where Ahaz and his wife Eunice (Welsh) Wickham's gravestone is.

On Saturday night about 8:20 P.M. I found myself in the small village of Middle Grove, NY. I located Eunice (Welsh) Wickham's gravestone. It is in the Frink's Cemetery outside about threequarters of a mile outside of the Middle Grove. The cemetery is located about 150 yards beyond the first crossroads just west of the village. I believe the name of the crossroad is named Boy Scout Road.

The gravestone is located on the right side when you come in the gate. It is located on the first row of stones and the third one in the row, not counting the small group of stones in the right corner by the road. Eunice's grave is located about 30 paces from the gate at about a 45-degree angle. According to the genealogy, Ahaz and Eunice had several children born to them that died shortly after birth. Which may account for several of the little headstones in the corner.

On Sunday June 21, 1981, I went to Old Saratoga, NY, (now called Schuylerville) and found the gravestones of Joseph Welsh, his wife Eunice and their son Joseph Welsh Jr. On Broadway Street (State Routes 4 & 32) I turned onto Burgoyne Street going past the Saratoga Cemetery and the Monument raised to General Burgoyne, Revolutionary War English General, turning right at the fork in the road, and going about 100 yards on the right side of the road is the Old Saratoga cemetery. It was unkempt and in a state of needing to be mowed. I found the gravestones about fifty feet or so from the road. There were in good shape for being put there in about 1825.

In memory of Joseph Welsh who died Feb. 15, 1825 aged 88 years

In memory of Eunice Welsh wife of Joseph Welsh who departed this life November 9, 1827 aged 86 years.

In memory of
Joseph Welsh Jr.
who died July 8, 1823
in the 38 year of his age
Go home dear friends
Wipe off your tears
Here I must Lie
Till Christ appears.

I then arrived in Wethersfield, CT I spent the night here and drove around the town to locate the library.

On Monday morning June 22, 1981 I went to the Public Library. I met with Mrs. Liz Kirkpatrick, who is the reference librarian, who was very helpful in getting the information that I wanted.

I then went to the village cemetery located at the First Church of Christ 250 Main Street, to locate Thomas Wickham Jr.'s gravestone. I found it to be at the tenth row of stones from the fence which is behind a maintenance shed. In the tenth row, 10 stones from the left. The section of the graveyard is next to an access road that runs through the graveyard.

The stone is small in size and is in pretty good shape since being put there in 1730. It is several shades of red and has a chip out of it in the bottom part. This is Thomas Wickham Jr. (Coronet of the Troop) gravestone, someone else is buried over the grave of his father. The size of the stone is as follows: about six hands high, six hands wide and about two inches thick, or roughly two feet high, and two feet wide. The stone is not behind the main church but seems to be behind an addition that was built onto the church.

The church has records of the location of all of the names in the cemetery. According to the church records, Thomas Jr is buried in Section three, eighth row, tenth stone. There has been an addition of two rows of stones since the record was made and has not been corrected. This is the reason for the error in description between mine and the church record.

Wethersfield Connecticut is where the Wickham Family was started in 1648. The progenitor of the Wickham family was Thomas and his wife Susan Wickham of England. The following is the information that a Mr. Hopkins, a noted Genealogist that my grandfather consulted for information on our family.

"Born in England in 1624, and he emigrated to New England, first appearing at Wethersfield, Connecticut, in 1648. He had married in England a wife named Sarah; whose maiden name is as yet unknown. (He after words reported to me in a letter that after an extensive search of England, he found the maiden name of Thomas Wickham's wife was Goodrich.) The marriage of Thomas Wickham and Sarah Goodrich took place about the time of their leaving England for America, and the first American record of this family is the official record of the birth of their son Thomas at Wethersfield in 1648.

Thomas Wickham, Sr. was a substantial citizen of Wethersfield and a freeman in 1658. By becoming a freeman, it is meant that he had become possessed of a sufficient amount of property to entitle him to be elected a freeman, which thereby gave him the right to vote and to hold office, under the Connecticut Colonial Government. He purchased some land in Eastbury, across the Connecticut River, in 1673.

Thomas Wickham in February of 1659 reserved the homestead he had bought at Wethersfield of Matthew Sension, bounded north and east by the High Street common, south by the Thomas Curtis homestead, and west by Thomas Tracey's. Perhaps this land was formerly the original Weede homestead, which was at the northern end of High Street, about where the street now reaches the cove. What is now the cove was, in 1649, the main channel

of the Connecticut River. His house, therefore, was then on the river's bank. The river has since found a new course, one third of a mile to the eastward.

The town gave him additional adjoining land in 1662, in which year he bought the Thomas Tracey homestead, of two pieces with a house, barn, etc. He also bought Thomas Carter's lot on the east side of the river, 135 acres, and had two lots also next to the Farmington land. When a town is mentioned in New England or New York it is to be understood that what we in Ohio call a township is meant.

Thomas Wickham seems to have been a dealer in wool, of which in 1664 he bought some 400 pounds of sundry Boston merchants; and he had a shop by the river, near the cove. In 1673 Thomas, Sr. and his wife, Sarah, gave the Matthew Sension homestead, with a house, warehouse and "cellar" to their eldest son Thomas. This land was at the extreme north of the common and bordering on the river, now the cove.

Thomas Wickham, Sr. died at Wethersfield, CT on the 11th of January 1689, aged 64 years. He was buried in the yard behind the church. No gravestone is now standing in his memory. It is not known that there ever was one there, nor to his wife Sarah either. The spot wherein they both lie is doubtless close to the gravestone of their son Thomas, which bears this inscription:

Here
lieth the
body of Mr.
Thomas Wickham
cornet of the troop,
who departed this life
April 30, 1730, in the
79th year of his age.

This is the only Wickham gravestone in Wethersfield, and the only visible relic existing of the early generations of this family, outside of the town records. The gravestone of Thomas, Jr's nephew, John, in Glastonbury, dated 1719, is the oldest Wickham memorial in America.

Thomas Wickham was a signer of the petition of August 17, 1658, to the Governor and court of the colony, for a new minister. He signed not as a member of the church but only as an attendant. The house of Thomas, Jr. was the first brick house in Wethersfield, and was sold to Joseph Woodhouse in 1716. The Woodhouse family has since enlarged or rebuilt the house and it is still standing today. Sarah Wickham's will is on file at the Probate Court, Hartford, Conn. She died January 1700, aged about 70. Inventory L-31-11-00, taken Feb. 7, 1700."

Sometime later I was introduced by my cousin, Richard Reichert Wickham, at a family reunion that is held every third Saturday of August in the town of Hector, NY, which is a small town about twenty miles north of Watkins Glen in the Finger Lakes District of Central New York. Richard told me about this reunion because, at the time, in the 1970's, Richard was an officer of the reunion committee, which conducted business for the Family Reunion and such. Richard asked if I knew anything about it and I said that I didn't know anything about it.

By the 1980's I found out were they were meeting and the next year or so I ventured up to that area and was met with a great number more of 'cousins' than I have ever knew of having. This area of Hector, NY, is populated with a large number of Wickham's. Their recent 'father' was one Don Wickham. Now Don was a very industrious person who was a businessman of no small measure. He owed a small convenient store/gas station, and a propane gas business, that I know of. Just to mention a few of his businesses. I think that his brother had a peach orchard across the street. Don's son, David Wickham, among other businesses, had a winery and was chief of the local volunteer fire department. This area of New York has a very large population of grape growers.

During the reunion there were prizes given out for the longest distance to get there, and the

oldest and the youngest and so forth. Great fun and fellowship was had by all who attended. It sure was a great time meeting old friends and making new friends. I really enjoyed this time and the trip to get there.

I don't remember just when I started to go the Plattsburgh but was around 1981 or so as I previously stated in this travelogue. When I first found the state that my ancestors' graves were in, it was placed in my mind to do something to correct the matter. Many people have no idea who their ancestors are, or even care about them, but that is not the case with me. After thinking and pondering about what could be done about the gravestones, I knew that I would have to get permission from the proper authorities to carry out my desires.

On one such a trip, I went to Plattsburgh and asked Mrs. Addie Shields, Clinton County Historian, who would I have to contact to get such permission. She told me that I would have to contact the County Historian of Peru, NY, which is about 9 miles south of Plattsburgh. Since the cemetery is located in the Town of Peru. She told me his name is, Ron Allen. I think that she called him, and he



Wickham Centerburg, OH - August 2004 and I talked for a while and afterwards he saw no reason why I couldn't put the headstones in the Old Blockhouse Graveyard on Black Bear Swamp Road. So, plans were made for me to do this the following year.

So, in the several months leading up to my departure on about August 20, 2004, I had made preparations by locating a source of the stones to be used and getting them engraved and making the holders to give them some bulk. I secured the stones from Hill Stone Company of Galena, OH, and the engraving by Robert Craker of Westerville, OH.

So, on Thursday the 20th of August 2004 I loaded up the night before, and set out to go to Plattsburgh. I was working at the time for FEDEX Custom Critical, a time-sensitive freight expeditor, so I could take off anytime I wanted to and for as long as needed. I was an independent contractor. Great job to have.


The trip, as I remember, was uneventful, and on Saturday August 21, I arrived in Plattsburgh. I realized that I needed some slacks and a dress shirt for Monday's festivities, I went to Walmart and purchased the clothes and also purchased a disposable camera to take pictures of the ceremony. After finding a campground close by, I parked my van and settled down for the weekend. When Monday came around, I went to the shelter house and changed into my new clothes. That is when I found out my pants were too long and my shirt was a little tight - Oh Well, the show must go on!

I made my way over to the cemetery and dug holes for the concrete footings for the headstones. I found that it was very easy to dig being sandy soil. I only dug out about six inches of the soil. I then put some fine gravel chips in the bottom of the hole and placed the forms into the hole and then placed the headstones into the forms. A good size crowd was gathering for the show. The VA Representative helped me carry the marker for Jonathan out of my van and helped with the hole.

Local news stations were notified and only the newspaper from Plattsburgh covered the story. The following is the account of the ceremony on August 23, 2004.

HEADSTONES MARK CHAPTER IN PERU HISTORY

Peru — "A gentle breeze coming from Lake Champlain passed though tall trees surrounding a small, quaint cemetery.

A small group of people stood among the gravestones, many broken or left unreadable following nearly two centuries of steady exposure to the elements.

One man spoke to the group, his words sometimes choked by the emotions of the day. "It was 20 years ago when I first met Clinton County Historian Addie Shields, that first had it in mind to do something for my ancestors," he said, standing near three recently erected headstones. "I wanted to put these markers here so people would know that someone still cares for them." That man, Jonathan Wickham, has spent 20 years identifying the connection to his ancestors buried at the Blockhouse Cemetery on Bear Swamp Road in Peru.

A lifetime resident of Centerburg, OH, Wickham celebrated a coming home, of sorts, this week when he helped dedicate the headstones and a significance they play in the history of the North Country.

"Each of us today is dedicated to someone from the past," Shields said as she shared in the emotional moment." "We should all thank Jonathan. As a result of his efforts, we have learned a great deal of history that we did not know before."

His ancestors buried at the historical site were Jonathan Wickham, Jr.; his wife, Susanne (Wilkerson) Wickham; and Hannah Wickham, their daughter and wife of Silas Cornell.

Of his nine children, two, David and John, fought in the Battle of Plattsburgh.

Jonathan Wickham, Jr., believed to be the first grain miller in Plattsburgh following the Revolutionary War, moved to Peru around 1808 and opened a grist mill on Dry Mill Brook near the Little Ausable River.

There is no clear date for when Wickham, Jr. died and no clear markings of his gravesite at the Blockhouse Cemetery. But historical evidence says Wickham, Jr. and Susanne were buried with their daughter and her husband. Silas Cornell's headstone is still clearly legible.

The living Wickham's grandfather Emmitt Melville Wickham, wrote an extensive genealogy of the family in the early 1900's. It was Jonathan Wickham's interest in that genealogy that led him to the historical grave site along the Little Ausable.

"It's a wonderful site, a very nice final resting place for my ancestors," he said following the short ceremony commemorating his gift of the three gravestones.

The Blockhouse, which no longer exists at the site, was built in 1974, two years after the Town of Peru was incorporated. It was one of five blockhouses erected in northern New York as protection against Indian attacks

"It was never used for defensive purposes," said Peru Town Historian Ron Allen. "It was used for church gatherings and eventually as a smallpox hospital. The beginning of the cemetery was probably the burial of smallpox victims."

Many of the graves at the site are unmarked, and the names of those buried there will never be known.

But the cemetery is the final resting place of Isaac Finch, who built the blockhouse, and Capt. David Cochran, founder and leader of the Peru militia.

Lynn Wilkie, a long-time history enthusiast from Peru who portrays Cochran in living reenactments, said he is promoting the placement of a historical plaque at the cemetery that identifies Cochran's significance to Peru and the Battle of Plattsburgh.


The markers were donated by The Hill Stone Co. of Galena, OH. Lettering was carved by Robert Cracker of Westerville, OH."







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After the ceremony, I was interviewed by the reporter for the above news article. Then I was invited to go to lunch at a local cafe. There we talked and I met more of the responsible people for the events of the day. After lunch everyone went about their business and life continued on as it has been doing for years.

It is now 2018 a week before my 69th birthday, being born on February 2, 1949, and I haven't been back since leaving there in August 2004. I have planned to go back several times since then but couldn't raise the funds or have the time set aside to go. But I intend to go back this year maybe for the last time and see how the markers are holding up to the harsh New York winters that part of New York gets.

I believe about last year or so, I called the office of the Clinton County Historian and I found out that Mrs. Addie Shields had passed away at the age, I believe, of 93. I was saddened to hear the news, but as we all must die someday. A valuable asset was lost when she died, but another has taken her place. As it should be.

So long old friend it has been nothing but a pleasure knowing and talking with you.

So ends my association with Mrs. Addie Shields, Clinton County Historian. But not my friendship with her and I will always have a high regard for her.

Now it is January,2019, and having done more investigating on the wife of Silas Anson Cornell. I have come upon some very interesting information. This new information states that Hannah was the wife of Silas Anson Cornell, of this I also concur. It is the parents of Hannah that I have an issue with. This information states that Hannah was the daughter of Jonathan and Esther (Coles) Carpenter, that Hannah's name is, "Hannah (Wickham) Carpenter Cornell." If she was their daughter, then why does she have the name of Wickham? This is what I have an issue with.

My grandfather has stated in his "Genealogy of the Oldest Wickham Family in America," which a copy of the genealogy is contained at the Clinton County Historian Office, the Clinton County Library, at Plattsburgh, and finally the Clinton County Historical Association, that the parents of Hannah Wickham were Jonathan and Susannah (Wilkinson) Wickham.

This is the information of Hannah Cornell. "When Hannah (Wickham) Carpenter was born on July 29, 1796, in Plattsburgh, her father, Jonathan, was 46, and her mother, Esther, was 37. She married Silas Anson Cornell in 1816 in Dutchess County, New York. They had eight children in 18 years. She died on December 15, 1872, in New York City, New York, having lived a long life of 76 years."

Their children were the following:

Rachel (Jun 1817-1855) Dutchess, New York Caleb (4 Jun 1818-1847) Willsboro, New York Henry Godfry (Aug1820-1905) Essex New York Rheuby (1823-1883) Dutchess New York Govitt G. (1827-1876) Peru, New York Gilford (Jul 1828-1903) Dutchess, New York Martha A. (7 Jun1834-1886) Clinton, New York Deila (1835-) In Dutchess, New York

Her husband Silas Anson passed away on February 28, 1849, in Au Sable, New York, at the age of 58. They had been married 33 years. He is buried in the Old Blockhouse Cemetery, Peru, New York. And his wife is buried beside her husband.

After going to my local library and checking on Anestry.com, I was unable at this time to add anything else about their children, who they married, where they lived, or where they were buried. One could hardly think that the children would not marry and have children and leave no trace of their existence. I am sure then that there are many offspring of Silas Anson and Hannah (Wickham) Cornell in the world, it is just the question of finding them and what ever happened to them.

I am, therefore, unable to add anything else about this part of my family tree. I don't hold much help that anything else will ever be discovered about these ancestors, so I will say goodbye and it was a great journey and a rewarding one at that.




SOLVING MYSTERIES ABOUT THE LIFE OF LEWIS AND ROSALIA BIERNACKI CIESNOLEVICZ

My husband Bill and I have been working for years to ferret out information about Bill's family. It is an interesting story and every time we find a piece of the puzzle it opens up something else. The search has been exciting and finding new information has been very rewarding.

We found a ship's manifest for the SS Statendam letting us know that Bill's maternal grandmother, Rosalia Biernacki (number 20 on the ship manifest), immigrated to America from Dombrowa, Poland arriving in New York on September 8, 1903. From New York Rosalia went to live in the mining town of Lyon Mountain, New York near her brother Josef.







Family legend told us that later that same year Rosalia married Lewis Ciesnolevicz at the St. Bernard's Church in Lyon Mountain.



Census records indicated that two of their nine children were born while Lewis worked as a miner in Lyon Mountain. This photo shows Lewis and Rosalia with their two oldest children.



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We have learned that Rosalia and Lewis later lived somewhere in New York and then New Jersey for a time before moving to Wiconisco, Pennsylvania where Lewis worked in the mines. Bill's mother Ann was one of two children born during their time in New Jersey. The five youngest children were born while the family lived in Wiconisco, Pennsylvania.

Both Rosalia and her husband Lewis died in the mid-1920s and are buried in the St. Mary's Catholic Church Cemetery in Lykens, PA.

One thing that complicated our research was the spelling of difficult names. Sometimes people wrote the last names phonetically. Also, after both Lewis and Rosalia died, there were nine surviving children – Anthony, Jennie, Michael, Ann, James, Elizabeth, Vyola, Lewis and Edythe. As some of the children were still quite young, they were scattered to orphanages and children's homes. As the children got older and were seeking work, they decided it would help them to "Americanize" their names. Several went by the name Chester, and at least one, Michael, used Chestnut. Only one, Anthony, kept the old name of Ciesnolevicz.

So, in early 2015 we were struggling in this search for Bill's family information! In March 2015 we reached out to St. Bernard Church in Lyon Mountain for confirming information about the marriage of Lewis Ciesnolevicz and Rosalia Biernacki in 1903. The church bookkeeper Jeannie graciously responded letting us know that she found a marriage record, written in Latin:

October 4, 1903



During our correspondence Jeannie mentioned that we could stop in if we were in the area. Finally, two years later we were able to make the trip to see Jeannie at the St. Bernard's Church in Lyon Mountain. We were hoping there might be baptism records for the two children born to Rosalia and Lewis while living in Lyon Mountain - son Anthony Ciesnolevicz born October 27, 1905 and daughter Jennie Helen Ciesnolevicz born July 15, 1909. Jeannie showed us the church register where the marriage was recorded as well as the baptism of the first son Anthony.


While in the Lyon Mountain-Dannemora area we took advantage of the other resources that were available there. Our visit to the Lyon Mountain Mining and Railroad Museum exhibited the friendliness of the people in the area as well as giving us a better understanding of life and times of the Ciesnolevicz family while Lewis worked as a miner of iron ore.

While we were in the area, we also made contact with Anastasia Pratt and the Clinton

County Historian's Office and discovered records indicating that Lewis and Rosalia had another child previously unknown to us who lived only a short time and is buried in the St. Bernard's cemetery. We were able to find the gravesite of baby Marianna.

The librarian at SUNY in Plattsburg was helpful in finding genealogy research books for the area. A visit to the Clinton County Genealogical Society in the Village of Dannemora and contacts with Dick Lynch led to our being able to purchase the Burial and Marriages Records of the Lyon Mountain and Standish churches. We have gleaned additional information.

Some questions are still unanswered:

- How and when did Lewis Ciesnolevicz immigrate from Lithuania to the United States? Did
 he come in through Canada? Is there a ship manifest or some other documentation? (Some
 documents indicate he may have also been called Leo or Ludwig or Levon).
- Where did the family go after leaving Lyon Mountain? We assume Lewis would still be
 working as a miner. We had a clue that they may have lived in Rochester, New York for a
 time, and records indicate that two of their children were born in New Jersey in 1911
 (Michael) and 1913 (Anastasia), though we have been unable to find baptismal or birth
 records for them.
- Was Jennie Helen (1909) born in Lyon Mountain or in another location in New York?

We are so grateful that the people of the Lyon Mountain/Dannemora/ Plattsburg area have been friendly, helpful, and forthcoming with information that filled in some gaps in our family story, and we look forward to uncovering even more information.

DANNEMORA THROUGH THE 1930s - BY ALLEN WALTON

This article, written by Allen Walton, was submitted by our president, Pat Buckley, whose family were friends of Allen for many years...



Allen Walton - January 14, 1910 to October 24, 1994

The big depression might have hit other parts of the world but in Clinton County, work was booming. The Normal School was rebuilding from a fire. Two paper mills were going strong, Pal's Razor Blade was in full blast. The P. W. A.-A. W. P,- N. R. A. and the CCC camps were all over building roads. Dannemora was a hilarious, exciting and sometimes, a dangerous place to live. And after traveling across the country I'll say the most liberal place that I ever was in.

I could go into any public place in town, except Hank Relation's barber shop. The State was building cell blocks and indoor toilets. Until now the inmates used night pails. The next morning, they would line up at a big well and pour their pails down there. The residue ran through a brook into the Saranac River and perfumed up the town. The bug house was expanding and putting in running water. Private families were putting in running water and getting rid of the outhouses. I was boarding at George Smart's. The cook, Napoleon Mitchell, had a stroke. I still remember him warming over potatoes frying, raised dough, salt port and eggs in our lunch was beef and onion and peanut butter sandwiches, home-made

pickles, tea or coffee.

A new highway was being built over the mountain. The prison brought 100 men from all over – stone masons from Ireland and England – a tinsmith from Germany, laborers from South America, Mexico, Canada and across the United States. One day, a black man known only as, "Uncle Abe", walked into the village and rented some land on the side of Dannemora Mountain. He built a tarpaper shanty, made a stove from an oil drum. He built sleeping bunks from discarded lumber and made chairs and tables from orange crates and kept boarders for \$5 a week. He sold hi wine and home brew, ran dice and poke games. On pay nights he imported women from Canada. Some of these men were mean and violent. The village seemed tranguil and peaceful.

On pay nights in Abe's Camp, pandemonium would break out. It would get real hectic sometimes a person would get hurt real bad. That's the only time the troopers would go into Abe's Camp. They never came up for anything else, even though they had horses to patrol the mountain.

A man named Jim. He was white and had a black woman. Jim would bring up a load of hi wine, leave his woman off in Plattsburgh go over the mountain on the Chazy Lake side where the State had a farm and leave his las hi wine on the farm. H would go on to Canada and bring back a load of real whiskey, leaving some at the farm and picking up a butchered lamb, and beef, leaving the meat and some whiskey with Abe, collect his pay and leave. I don't know how he got his instructions

on where to leave and pick up his wares on the farm. The farm was manned by the trustees under a guard, Zack Vinson. Uncle Abe would serve the meat to his boarders and sell his whiskey all over the village.

The boarders were of different places and colors. Everybody got along great until they got too much to drink and all hell would break out. One day, the men were sitting around drinking and playing cards for fun. Fred Sweeny from Dannemora and the King Fish from Port Henry were playing checkers. I was clowning around pretending that I was drunk with an unlighted cigarette in my mouth. I heard the King Fish say to Fred, "If you are so good with that gun, let's see you shoot that cigarette from that fool's mouth." - OK - Bang! - The cigarette flew from my mouth. Now this is one of the very few times that I ever got mad. Looking at Fred with a 30-30 Winchester. Fred was about half crazy anyway. I thought - maybe I had best let this go by.

One night, a stormy night, we hear a man's voice calling for help. Leo Smart from the village and I were at Abe's. Abe handed me a shotgun, and said, "That's McKenna's Camp. Go. It might be a bear looking for some salt." There was nothing there when we got there. Something had been there and knocked over the garbage cans. McKenna was in his woodshed. He seemed interested in my gun. "Let me see that," he said. I handed it to him and he said there was no hammer or trigger guard. Leo said, "Hand me that gun." Back at Abe's, Leo started beating Abe over his head with the gun. I stopped him, bandaged up Abe's head and calmed them both down. I left for Chazy Lake. I was to meet a man there that I'll call Elmore at 4:30am to go to a camp ten miles in the woods to cut wood for Harry Alpert.

I got to Elmore's house around 4am. The lamp in the kitchen was lit. No one seemed to lock their doors at night. I walked in. Ida's voice from the bedroom said, "Sit down. Elmore is in the barn. He'll be in soon." I poured a cup of coffee and made a pork sandwich from homemade bread. There was a hallway from the kitchen





He was behind me all the way. He could see me better now. I hit the highway in front of a Model T Ford. Shorty LaWare picked me up. Elmore hit the highway about 500 yards behind us. He shot at the car. In Dannemora, I went to Tom Askie and paid for a room. Next morning Elmore came to see me and offered to take me out for breakfast. I asked, "Are you through shouting at me?" We ate ham and eggs warm over potatoes. We decided to check out the camp and fix it. We stayed there for a while and cut Alpert's wood. We were in the camp for about 4 days, and one night at midnight, Elmore said, "I am going home. My grandpa is dead." "How do you know? I asked. "He was here and told me. You fix that leak. I'll be back as soon as I can." I said, "If Old Cigo is dead and was here, I am not staying here." We left together.

Old Cigo was dead. Back in Dannemora, I went across the street from Oshie to Harry Carter's and paid for a week's board. When everyone wanted a job, they would go and stand in front of the gate that opened up to Cook Street then. We would stand there until someone came out and picked who he wanted. There were two guards at the gate. On top of the wall, about 50 feet apart, was a one-man shanty, a machine gun in one and a shotgun in the other and so on. Whenever I stood at the gate if Mr. Lavarnway was on duty, he would call me in and send me over to where the work was. I got a job with the Live Wire Roofing Company out of Buffalo. Me, the boss and 5 inmates who all had killed someone. They seemed very polit and kind to us. Two troopers were transferring one of these men and his buddy near Albany. One of them somehow got the trooper's gun and killed the trooper. They got away not hurting the other trooper. There was a big write-up in the papers since both of these troopers were going with the same girl. The two fugitives were apprehended in Oklahoma. In the shootout, one of the buddied go one leg shot off. They were sent back to Albany, then to Dannemora.



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The State OK'd the building. No Money was appropriated for it. This was not unusual. I had worked on the water lines at the bug house. I never did get paid for that. When this iob finished, I had worked over 3 months without any pay. I went to Maine and picked potatoes, on my way back I got into several crap games and picked up \$215 along the way. I



stopped in Plattsburgh, got into a poker game and lost \$10. The game lasted all night. Next morning, Mrs. Hamilton's sister and her 18-year-old daughter, cam in. I thought, there is a dream girl.

I went to Dannemora and I learned that Harry Mitchell had a \$300 check for me. He was out but would come back later. I know that Homer and Abe would pull out all of their tricks to get this money from me. The whole town knew of the check. Homer and Pete Agony knew and knew when Mr. Mitchel would be back, so they were waiting for me. Both lived at the Chazy Lake House. Pete, me and the check headed for Homer's house. I planned to give Homer \$40, and \$20 to his wife, Lula. Lula made up a lunch, we ate, and Homer wanted to play checkers. He can beat me at checkers. I paid up to \$40 then quit, but Homer wanted to play more. He put up \$20 to my \$10. We made a rule that if one is caught cheating, he loses the game. Cheating was Homer's second nature even though he doesn't need to. The game progressed. I caught Homer cheating and an argument developed. He called on his wife for help, but she didn't want to get into it. He insisted. She said, "Homer, you know what you have done? Give him the money and play another game." He jumped up and slapped her. She fell into the fruit pantry. I grabbed him. She hit him with about five jars of fruit on his head. He was mad at me then and pulled out his knife with a five-inch blade. I jumped over the table and picked up his loaded 16-shot 22 rifle and pointed it at him. He said, "I will eat 3 or 4 bullets to get to you!" I said, "I can put 5 or 6 shots in you before you can get around here." I believed that he was going to try to get me. Question - Will I shoot?

I didn't find out because Pete hit Homer with a stove poker and knocked him to the floor. Pete picked up the knife and Homer said, "Why did you hit me?" Pete said, "I didn't want you to get yourself killed." I put \$30 with the money on the floor and walked out to go to Abe's. Two men, Leo Smart and the Dutchman were there. Abe wanted to shoot dice. We played through the night and I won \$100 – gave it back five times and rewon it. Finally, I quit and left. I just happened to look back and Abe was standing in the door pointing his automatic shotgun in my direction. I dropped to the ground as he shot. I got up running, Uncle Abe's shooting, and I ran over a cliff out into the air. When I landed, I was in wet sand. Joe Drop and Joe Tolosky were looking over a right-of-way and were going to blow up a tree stump. When they pulled me out of the sand, a stream of water shot up. This was made into a spring after the highway was finished. Both Joes were from Lyon Mountain. Tolosky's brother had a store in Dannemora.

I went back to Homer's. He told people that I ran so fast, that I left Dannemora at 5:15am and got to his house 5 miles away at 15 minutes to 5am. I went to work for Bob Fitzpatrick and boarded at Carter's. After lunch every night, I would help the girls clean up the kitchen and got \$20 off my board. Harvey Carter had a camp built in his back yard and 30 of us stayed there. Leo was not happy by my helping the girls in the kitchen. On this particular day, it started snowing around 6am and snowed all

day. 8pm and it was still snowing, wind a-blowing and there was about 3 feet of snow between the house and camp. I finished in the kitchen and waded through the snow to camp and Leo was ready for me. The camp was partitioned off by bed sheets, a sheet between Leo and me. I could hear Leo mumbling and swearing — "I am going to teach that black son of a B a lesson." Victor Laport, a friend, got out of bed and loaded his 45-automatic pistol. I asked, "What are you going to do with that?" Vic said, "You know that Leo's coming after you. I can handle him." He said, you are the only colored one here. I don't know what the others may do, but I am ready for them." Now Leo, Vic and I are great buddies, when Leo and I are not fighting with each other.

I could see Leo's shadow through the sheets – he was opening a razor. I picked up a 3-foot long piece of wood. When he came round the sheets, I hit him on the head. He stood there reeling back and forth. Finally, he said, "You don't fight fair," and he went back to bed.

When the weather let up, I rode freight trains down through Pennsylvania and Delaware. Spring came and I went back to Dannemora to dig water lines at the bug house. A man, who said he was from CNN and his name was Stanly Curinsky. He stayed at Uncle Abe's. There had been a big fight a couple of nights before. There was cutting and shooting, and everyone was in jail or in the hospital except Stanley and I and we went to work that day. On that day, I was at the bottom of a 15-foot deep ditch. It had rained most of that night and I was throwing mud up to a platform where Stanley would throw it to the top of the ditch. Someone hollered, "A cave in! Get out of there!" I ran father back in the ditch. Stanley jumped from the platform and got buried. He was dead when we got him out. That night, I could not get Stanley out of my mind. Abe's camp is in the woods all by itself and I was afraid of ghosts in the prison. They had miscounted a man that day and began to blow the siren. The sound, echoing thru the trees was too much for me. I left there running. They never located Stanley's family.

The next morning, I joined the CCCs at Camp Dix. I ran into a sort of a unique situation at Camp Dix.

The boys formed a gang of the group that they came with. I was the only black at Camp Dix and the separated the whites from colored. I had no one to gang up with. So when I got into trouble, I ran to the Plattsburgh gang. Leo was the leader, Leo's gang liked to fight, so they always would help me. When I went back to Dannemora, I worked on the hospital. The prisoners were building a church not far from the hospital. One Sunday, Joe Barrows and I were to put brick on one of the scaffolds and put up another scaffold. Joe sneaked a bottle of hi wine in with him. I would load bricks in a pail and pull them up to Joe. I saw Joe reach for and miss the rope a time or two. He was singing, "She was coming round the mountain when she comes," then I heard this ungodly scream. Joe was coming down headfirst. The wind in his clothes made him look like a balloon. The screaming stopped when he hit the ground. Joe was laid up for over a year. I left Dannemora and never went back except to visit.

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Senior activist Allen Walton dies

PORT HENRY - Allen Walton, 84, of 3 Rice St., Port Henry, died Monday, Oct. 24, 1994, at the Medical Center Hospital of Vermont in Burlington.

He was the son of the Rev. Squire and Rhoda (Henry) Walton of Chattanooga, Tenn.

He was employed by Republican Steel Corporation for 31 years. Mr. Walton was wellknown throughout the county for his community involvement, having founded the Town of Moriah Food Pantry. He was one of the founding members of the Essex County RSVP and served on the Town of Moriah Am-bulance Squad for 20 years as an EMT and driver.

Mr. Walton was a founding member and first president of the Town of Moriah Senior Citizens and had served as a Nutrition Site manager. He was a member of the Port Henry Methodist Church, having served for eight years as a charter member of the Troy Conference District Superintendent Committee, as president for many years of the Port Henry/Moriah United Methodist Men and chairman of the Port Henry United Methodist Church Administrative Council.

Mr. Walton was awarded the Liberty Bell Award in 1991 by the Essex County Bar Association as Outstanding Citizen and was the recipient of many other advocacy awards in the community and state. Mr. Walton was the author of a book, "My Hobo Days," and had written several articles for "Adirondack

Life" magazine.

Me was married for 54 years to the late Zymora Burrell Walton.

Survivors include a daughter, Olivia of Menands; two sons and daughters-in-law, Allen and Evelyn of Atlanta, Ga., and James and Nadine of Chesterfield, Mo.; a son, David of Burlington; five grandchildren and many nieces and nephews. A daughter, Carola, died earlier.

From the book, "Blacks in the Adirondacks" by Sally E. Svenson on Amazon - Kindle of paperback "Republic Steel closed down operations altogether in 1971. By then, most of the town's miners, black and white, had moved on to other job opportunities, usually outside of the region. Allen Walton was one of the few blacks who remained, becoming a local activist, particularly on behalf of Moriah's poor and senior citizens, and receiving an award from the Essex County Bar Association in 1991 as an "Outstanding Citizen" of the county. Walton neatly summarized the local black population as it existed in 1994, not long before his death, as "one Black lady, 2 growned children, myself."

Plattsburgh Press Republican May 2, 1981 From "The Chronicles of Oklahoma" – Ellen Down's thoughts on beginning missionary work. In December 1856, a new teacher arrived at Bloomfield Academy — Miss Ellen J. Downs who taught at the school until 1866 when she moved to Paris, Texas. She was totally dedicated to her work and her friends continually remarked on her devotion to teaching which she continued until her death on May 2, 1910. Leaving a vivid account of her early life and her adventures at Bloomfield Academy, her writings provide a unique insight into the early missionary efforts in Indian Territory.

My father, James Downs, was born in Albany County, NY. My mother, Freedom Rider, was born in Deerfield, MA. They were married in Champlain, NY, and moved immediately to Hemmingford, Quebec, where I was born Dec. 4, 1824. My parents moved back to Champlain, NY, during my infancy and settled on a farm where they spent the remainder of their days.

The Spirit of God moved upon my heart while I was quite young, though I had no religious instruction. In the fall of 1837, in a protracted meeting held in our neighborhood by the Rev. Mr. [John] Graves and Rev. Mr. [Oren] Greeg, I sought and obtained God's pardoning love. My father, mother and two brother s were made happy partakers of God's redeeming grace. I, with them, united with the church on probation on the 5th day of December, the day after I was 13 years old, and during all these 67 years God's mercy and grace have never failed me, though I have passed through many sorrows. In 1844, I had two sisters drowned in a duck pond which was a great sorrow to all our family.


I had felt, almost from the time of my conversion, a strong impression and desire to become a missionary to the Indians, for they were the only heathen that I knew anything about at that time. But I did not see any way for me to become a missionary. So, I thought I will do the best I can for the glory of God and the salvation of souls at home. I commenced teaching school and gave religious instruction daily and was glad of the opportunity to teach the young and tender minds the way of life.

Near the close of the eighth session of my school, I received a letter from Mr. John H. Carr, missionary at Bloomfield Academy, Chickasaw Nation, Indian Territory, saying that I had been recommended to him as suitable person to engage in the missionary work. And it was on this wise. A Presbyterian missi onary had gone on to New York in search of help for his school, and I was recommended to him, but I was a Methodist, and he wanted a Presbyterian, for a Presbyterian school, but he thought of Brother Carr's needing help and he wrote to him of me.

I showed Brother Carr's letter to my pastor and Presiding Elder, who advised me to send a copy of the letter to Bishop Edmund S. Janes which I did and received a prompt reply telling me to go. I then answered Brother Carr's letter telling him that I would go.

As soon as my school was out, I began to prepare for my departure, and on the 28th day of October 1856, I bade farewell to father, mother, brothers, and sisters, and took a steamer on Lake Champlain to Whitehall, NY, there changed for railroad cars which conveyed me into the city of New York where I spent several days with a cousin who lived there. There I took the Ocean Steamer Philadelphia bound for New Orleans, LA.

I engaged my passage on a Mississippi river boat which took me to Shreveport, LA, and there I changed for a smaller boat to Jefferson, TX. From Jefferson to Dangerfield, TX, I came by stage and from there to Bloomfield Academy, Indian Territory, by private conveyance. I was a month making the whole trip and was kindly received by the missionary family. I immediately began my mission work


