

RESEARCH ON THE ORIGIN OF THE NAME PATENAUDE

The following report on the research into the surname PATENAUDE is, in no way, meant to be the final word. Still, there are times when, for the benefit of others, it is worth while to give a status report on what is known at the present time. Perhaps, others may feel like adding what they have found or start or continue to do some looking on their own.

I have published a newsletter entitled, "Our Fathers-Paternoster-Patenôtre-Patenaude-Patnode" for four years now. However, I have stopped as of Summer '86 in order to spend more time on research and correspondence. I selected these four spellings of the name as being most representative of the variations and changes in this surname although there are almost countless others, i.e. Patenostre, Paternaude, Patanode, Patinod, Patnote, Patnoau, Patnoad, Patnotte, Patnaude, Patnoude, Pat

The name seems to come from the Latin, PATERNOSTER which means "Our Father". The original surname which was brought to Canada was PATENOSTRE. This was the old French form which later became PATENOTRE when the circumflex accent(^) began to be used to represent a vowel plus "s". This has happened with many words: chasteau--château, estre--être, mesme--même.

In the middle of the 18th century, the name began to be spelled PATENAUDE. This is the form used by most Canadians today. The many variations are chiefly attempts to spell the name as it sounded in English or to try to make it fit better with other names when the Canadians came to the United States. The most common form used here today is PATNODE. (No trouble spelling that.)

How the family acquired the surname which meant "Our Father"is not known as far as I have been able to discover. The term became used not only for the prayer by that name, but also for the recitation of the rosary or even for the rosary beads themselves. (1) The Jesuits used to wear the rosary at their waists or around The Indians, whom they were converting, referred to these as "Patenostres". They attributed special powers to these and even made of their up some own out of beads or shells.

My feeling is that the surname came from the fact that the first bearers of the name, sang or chanted prayers such as the "Our Father" or sold or made rosary beads. I am initiating further study into this name in Europe. I have found (from the 16th century on) the name PATERNOSTER in England. I have also found the name PATERNOSTRO in Italy. In France itself, I know of no one who has traced the name further back than the father, Nicolas, of the original Canadian ancestor, who was also a Nicolas and who came from Berville, Diocesse of Caux, Seine Inferior, Normandy, France.

There are other interpretations of the source of the name PATENAUDE. One says it is from the Pautaines, Wassy, southeast of Paris. This source says the surname is derived from the Celtic: pastonnadez, patenaille or panais. (2)

Another says it comes from around Tours of the old French Province of Berry (3)

One interesting report was given in the Bicentennial country history of Red Lake, Minnesota (4). This apparently relied on family hearsay. It felt that the forefathers came from France's Royal Family or "La Maison de Pater Noster". This does not seem too likely and since "maison" can also mean a family line or even a business establishment, I favor the idea of a family making or selling rosary beads. Again, as stated before, they could be persons who sang or recited this prayer or others. (5) You can see why I said my work is far from finished. What

Pierre Desautels dit Lapointe

The circumstances that brought Pierre Desautels dit Lapointe to the shores of New France are worthy of being told. He has left behind a great progeny under both family names that are now located throughout Canada and the United States.

Pierre Desauteles dit Lapointe was born in 1631, son of Thomas Desautels, a tailor by trade, and Marie Busson, in Malicorne, a district of La Flèche (Sarthe). He may have spent his youth as an apprentice in his father's shop.

At the age of 22,he became intensely interested in the feverish recruiting around La Flèche for strong and courageous young men, adept in the use of arms, while also successful in various trades and professions. He was hearing tragic accounts of the colonists' plight in that little settlement called <u>Ville-marie de Montreal</u>, so often savagely attacked by the Iroquois. These <u>colons</u> were steadfastly holding their ground, but not without serious casualties. They desperately needed to bolster their dwindling numbers. Pierre took to heart the pleas of both Paul de Chomeday de Maisonneauve and Jérôme le Royer de la Dauversière on behalf of the <u>Compagnie de Montréal</u>. The settlement must become a strong outpost if indeed la Nouvelle France were to survive at all.

Fired with a sense of adventure and aware of the financial benefits, Pierre decided to take this important step in his life. It was with the greatest reluctance that his father consented to this bold undertaking. His committeent became binding in the presence of M.de la Dauversière, May 4,1653, when the Notary Lafousse required the signing of the Acte. Such enlistments were for three to five years. Transportation, food and lodging, as well as arms and ammunition were defrayed by Compagnie de Montreal. The yearly salary was proportionate to the trade of the enlistee. In Pierre's case, he agreed to the annual salary of 65 livres as a défricheur (literally, one who clears the land for agricultural use; generally, an employe, laborer).

Now as a 'hired-hand' under contract (engagé), Pierre promised to report at the port of Saint-Nazaire, on the last day of April to Charles Lecoq, owner of the ship Saint-Nicolas-de-Nantes which was to make the crossing under Captain Pierre le Besson. The ship did

not leave port until June 20,1653. But before boarding Pierre as well as all other engagés had to sign the enlistment Act of Notary Belliotte as well, acknowledging that he had received in advance of his wages 101 livres from the Compagnie de Montréal.

While underway some three hundred leagues at sea, it was noticed that the ship was leaking badly. All able-bodied men besides the crew were pressed into service to bail out the ship. Since water was now beginning to damage the provisions, the captain gave orders to return to Saint-Nazaire.

It was now necessary to find and equip another vessel with the result that it was not until July 20, when they set sail again. The sea voyage was not without its hazards. The customary sicknesses that accompany these trips on a rolling ocean took their usual toll despite all precautionary methods. Few were buried at sea.

M.de Maisonneuve arrived in Quebec with his 'recruits' on September 22,1653, and it took all of the month of October to procure enough smaller boats to proceed up-river in order to reach their destination, Villemarie (Montreal). What joy there was to see over one hundred new colonists approaching the shores of a beleaguered settlement on November 16,1653!

Pierre Desautels fulfilled his duties as a défricheur during the years that followed. He enrolled as a soldier of the 7th squad in the milice de la Sainte-Famille in 1663. Two years later, on May 3,1665, he obtained a concession of 30 arpents - Côte-Saint-Martin - from Maisonneuve. On January 11,1666, Marie Rémy, one of the famous Filles du Roi, became his bride in Montreal. Four children were born from this union, one of whom reached maturity, Joseph (1668). A few weeks after the death of Marie in 1676, Pierre married a second time on November 23,1676. Catherine Lorion, widowed three times, became the mother of his two sons: Pierre (1677) and Gilbert (1679). According to the Census of 1681, Pierre Desautels owned a gun, five heads of cattle and 18 arpents on the island of Montreal.

Pierre's transactions throughout the following years were many and varied. His exchange of property with Elie Beaujean caused him some concern, for it resulted in an appeal against the judgment of Elie's wife. As a habitant of Montreal he was subject to a tax of one livre.

On October 22,1691, this great progenitor was affluent enough to obtain a concession from Dollier de Casson. He released his son, Joseph, from all financial obligations on June 19,1693, and the following July, made a concession to Antoine Corbette. On July 2, 1693, Joseph sold and renounced his rights of succession in favor of his two stepbrothers, Pierre and Gilbert, both of whom in turn shared equally the estate acquired by their father, on July 14,1708.

Pierre Desautels dit Lapointe died four months after the 1708 document was signed by the Notary Senet and was buried in Montreal on November 19. His widow, Catherine Lorion, followed him twelve years later and was buried in Montreal on April 20,1720.

The "DIT" Name

This short explanation is not intended to answer the specific reason for your ancestor's name change, but rather to explain what a "dit" or "second name" is.

"Dit" is translated into English as "say" or "also known as". There is no negative connotation implied which sometimes is the case with the English "alias". And since last names (surnames) came into being for the purpose of identification, we can say that the "dit" name came into being for the purpose of further identification of a person or family.

The reasons or explanations for the name changes are infinite, at least as infinite as there are actual individual changes. However, there are some general sources for these changes or identifications. Some of them are:

a- Occupation / Guild

b- Place of origin

c- Physical description

d- Character description

e- Maternal identification

f- Heroic deed / accomplishments

g- Description of some object

h- Easily pronounced names

i- Seignorial identification

1- Military

The two surnames used can be interchanged at any time. E.G. CLEMENT dit LABONTE may appear as Labonte-dit-Clement. And since one form of the name, or both forms together, may appear at birth, baptism, marriage, in a census record, or at death, each individual document must be checked to determine its use. And individual man might have been born as Jean Labonte dit Clement, baptized as Jean Clement, married as Jean Clement dit Labonte, found in a census as Jean Labonte, and died as Jean Labonte dit Clement. The marriage repertoires that we primarily use as guides for the marriage data should therefore be read with care for they usually give us some clue as to a possible name change or double identification.

At the end of Tanguay's Dictionnaire (Vol.VII) you will find a listing for most "dit" names that appeared in Canada from the earliest settlement until around 1750. Changes after that time period must be checked in county, parish, or town records. Repertoires often indicate for you when a change is possible for the individual family.

Enjoy your search but do not expect to find an explanation for the change in your name. Many simply are not explained, while others are guesswork. Only a few surnames are explained.

It is wise for the researcher to record all "dit" names in his personal records. Even misspellings should be kept since they stand in the records as a certain family flavor. All such variations add spice to genealogical research and assist us in the knowledge of our origins.

It has always disappointed me that so many of us, in reality so few of us in proportion to our numbers, show a positive interest in our background. Not only are we not caring of the past, but we appear to be also ignorant of the present. Yet it is from the eons of experience that the future grows. Our past has literally "presented" us with a future and one would think that the man of achievement would care to locate the source of his achievements.

Merely a decade ago the spirits of Americans were affected by the combination of the bi-centennial of the country and the revelation of Alex Haley's book "Roots" on the motion picture screen. All of a sudden, the past, once dormant, became an indication of the future; and many, who perhaps had merely awaited the spur to action, began to seek more information about their traditions.

Hence the science of Genealogy, which to many had merely been a miasma of mud, now became a matter of mind. "Who am I?" "Where did I come from?" "What is my ancestry?"; these and many more questions developed from the negativity of yore. Associations of genealogical societies began to literally "sprout up" all over the place, and Northern New York was no exception. In fact, along the Canadian-American borders we have the tracings of another world, time, and place in the background of its peoples.

One of the most predominant races to be found, not only in Northern New York, but in the entire USA and Canada, is that of a people originating on an island that would fit into the State of New York alone nearly twice. The Island of Eire, called Ireland in the English language, on the westernmost shores of the Continent

of Europe, has graced the New World with myriads of its peoples who helped to build new nations.

From a country once known as Hibernia; a country which housed some ten million souls more than a century and a half ago, and now has less than half that in a divided nation; came hordes of nomadic Celts seeking to better themselves from British autocracy. And how well they succeeded is evident from the more than forty million who now claim Irish ancestry in the USA alone. Did you know that of the forty presidents of the USA, some twenty-six of them have at least some Irish ancestry? The people of the Macs. and the Fitz, and the big "0"'s have dramatically influenced this nation's ways. Incidentally, did you know that the prefix "Mac" and "Mc" mean the same thing (son of) and the prefix "Fitz" (son of) mixed with that of the ancient "0" (meaning descendant of), also co-relate to the "Van", "Ten", "Ski", and "Ver", etc. of other languages to reveal a direct family succession. The Irish "Mac" and the Scottish "Mc" are in reality the same, being so since the "Nova Scotia" (The New Ireland) was colonized by the Irish in the 600's. Later on the Nova Scotia was to be called Scotland.

If you believe you are of Irish background, then one of the first things you will have to find out is whether your family names date from the times of the Norman Invaders in the 1100's or from the earlier Celts (pronounced hard, as Kelts). All Irish families derive, in a vast majority of cases, from these two. In later years, the 1600's and on, some French and Spanish settlers made homes in Ireland, (not willingly, but because of losses in war), and there are many genuine Irish names with foreign sounding spellings.

When Ellis Island was the gateway to a new way of life, many of the new immigrants found their names mis-spelt by the immigration officials, so tracings must be made there too. When this writer addressed the membership of the Northern New York American-Canadian Genealogical Society on Saturday, October 26th, 1985, he mentioned the difficulty of change of name in English spelling since many of the Irish immigrants in the 1800's could only pronounce their names in an Irish manner.

Oh, as an aside, this article is a well overdue result of a promise made to the Society in 1985 and only being fulfilled now!

Mea culpa!

Of course, no one can teach another much about genealogy in the lines of a book, and even less may one explain to a multitude of peoples the manner of their origins; but references may be made as to what information is to be found. That's why we have genealogical societies; to get a footing into the heights of our family backgrounds. Not that we always want to know everything! Remember the couple who paid \$500.00 for a "search of the family tree" and were billed \$2,000.00. They asked the researcher why the higher costs. He told them, "Yes, five hundred for looking up the family tree, the rest for keeping quiet about it!!"

If you look at a map of Ireland you will notice that the country is presently divided into two main sections, the Republic of Ireland, mostly in the south of the island, and Northern Ireland, a province of the British Isles. The entire island has thirty-two counties, as the USA has fifty states. Twenty-six of these counties are in the Republic, the remainder make up part of the Northern Province of Ulster. The sadness of this situation is no different

than that of the division of East and West Germany and the sooner the media of the USA acknowledge this bare fact the better. The so called fighting in Ireland is restricted to the Northern six counties and really does not affect the Republic a great deal.

Most Irish names can be pin-pointed to certain counties and consequently this is where you begin to look for your family origins. Nearly every year papers like the New York News and the Washington Post print a map of Eire around St. Patrick's Day and that map contains a listing of the most common names of all counties in the country. Find the county of your name origin and you are off to a good beginning; especially if your family has been over here for more than one-hundred years. Those who lived in the earlier days rarely moved about and therefore their stability was an assurance of family continuity in a given location on the Isle.

Likewise, each Irish name has a definitive meaning, and once you know how the name itself was formed, you will begin to know the background of your family of long ago. Knowing also that there is a definite line of "naming" in family tradition is important. That is, the first boy was named after his father's father. The first girl was named after her mother's mother. The second boy was named after his mother's father, etc. In this way you can close gaps, or open them, in the nomenclature of all families with traditional biblical names. The Jews and the Irish are akin in this. Perhaps that is why Robert Briscoe became the Jewish mayor of a Catholic capitol (Dublin) in 1956. We have no prejudice.

When you have found your county then you need the village, townsland, or barony of your ancestor. Usually maps will not help

with this. You often need Ordinance Survey cartological charts. These break down the localities and help greatly in locating areas not only by their cartological titles, but by the nomenclature of the peoples who once dwelled there (and very often still do hundreds of years later). Any good genealogist will have these. (At least this one does!)

Once you have located sites, as heretofore mentioned, your chances of locating family ties, not only of the past, but also of the present are excellent. One of the biggest problems with locating families of some century and a quarter ago, is that the National Archives Records of Census for all of Ireland were completely destroyed in 1864. Hence you may easily find anyone born, married, or buried after 1864. But before this time, the only records to be found will come from the Parish churches, be they Catholic, Protestant or whatever, in each county. There are books available which list the complete filings on every church in Ireland, when the inscripted records began and to when. Many of the parish listings go back over 300 years and are an excellent source of ancestral images. In fact, if you have already been fortunate enough to glean some definitive information about your clan, the chances are good that you may have a parish listing, since in Ireland, both in the past and in the present, many people (the vast majority) do not indicate their place of origin as a village, or town etc., but as a Parish.

For those living in the northern regions of New York State strong consideration has to be given to the possibility, if not that, the actuality, of one's ancestors coming into the States through the passageway of the Saint Lawrence River. When it was

difficult for even a few to reach the USA, it was facile to come through Canada. So, many a family in Upper New York will be able to trace themselves back to Eire through Canada - but not directly to Eire. That simply because there were not too many boats from Ireland to the New World. Many Irish went to England or Scotland for a number of years, and after collecting funds enough, then headed for the other side of the ocean from the English ports. Some of the best material available concerning the trading of Irish emigration from the Old to the New World is to be obtained from the Genealogical Publishing Co. of Baltimore, Maryland, 21202. The seven recent voluminous tomes issued by the company are excellent, especially for locating those who came to this country around the time of the Great Famine. The one thing you have to be careful about is that since Irish names are multitudinous, you may come across a name similar to yours but that could be of another clan entirely. Just make sure to cross check all.

Exact numbers are hard to come by, but at an absolute minimum, more than two million had left Ireland for the USA by 1860. And by the year 1890, that number had doubled to some four million, effectively reducing by half the population of the country from which they fled. There are no records, before or since, of such a migration from any nation on the face of the earth. Even now, in 1987, the population of Eire, North and South combined, barely reaches the five million mark. This is a country where, as we mentioned in the beginning of this brief article, there were twice that in 1845. And, in 1987, things are getting worse again. After a period of relative stability in the 1970's, another exodus has begun from the Emerald Isle. In January of 1987 alone Travel Visa

fever hit Ireland as thousands of would be emigrants filled mail-boxes, stuffing in over over 80,000 special US visa applications as they try to flee record unemployment in a country with the worst record in Europe. In 1987 Ireland's unemployment rate is 19 per cent, one of the highest in the world.

One advantage of being Irish is that Ireland was one of the earliest countries to evolve a system of hereditary surnames, some formed before the year 1000. This was a spontaneous development of a people descended from the Isle's eighth and ninth century saints and scholars who were responsible for the spread of a good educational system all across Europe in the early ages of learning. A gentleman by the name of Edward MacLysagh did a brilliant job of co-relating many of those names in his three books on the surnames of Ireland. Although not very useful in tracing a clan, they are invaluable in tracing the origins of a family name.

Another good source of information is published by Heraldic Artists Ltd. of Dublin, Ireland; vis. "A Genealogical History of the Milesian Families of Ireland." Said book is available in good bookstores in the USA and Canada. This book helps to pin-point family names to certain counties and thereby saves a lot of peripatetic search. It also helps to distinguish between Anglo-Irish and Old Irish names, a necessity in easy family tracings.

Most genealogical associations probably have a pretty good 'file on what books are available and where they are likely to be found. Do not forget, of course, that one of the best ways to trace a family is from the old Family Bible which a great number of peoples were disposed to keep in the past.

As you probably have discovered by now, the biggest thing about looking up your family tree, is having a great deal of patience and persistance. It's amazing from basic evidence, that many people neglect to talk to the elders of their families, did not do so in the past, and do not do so now. Hence, what they could glean from grandparents and others is completely lost. In conversing with our elders, we not only learn about family origins, but also about family traditions and practices. Much is lost when we have just factual and numerical information to the exclusion of anecdotes of family action, both humorous and otherwise, that would make great reading for future generations.

So do talk to everyone remotely connected with your family and find out what they might know. Strangely enough, in family life, we are not inclined to speak about ourselves to ourselves, but we do so with others. So, for instance, a friend of Grandma's, especially now if Grandma is deceased, may have heard stories from Grandma that will be fascinating and factual.

This writer is presently instructing a class in Irish Language at Watertown, N.Y. and mentions this here for one reason alone. The culture of a country and its people is in its language above all else. If you have the opportunity, you should learn at least a little of the spoken language of your ancestors; its surprising how those of Irish ancestry so easily adapt to the language and feel it a part of themselves. Knowing the language will also help your research, as a basic knowledge of Irish assists in the interpretation of town and country places associated with family names, as in fact, many villages in Eire were named after certain old families.

Tracing your ethnic roots may also lead to a better understanding of yourself!! People of different races, nations, and tongues develop characteristics cohesive with their backgrounds and seldom see this until confronted with the evidence. And the evidence is often in and on our family tree.

And may God guide you in your journey to the past.

In answer to your letter of october 5, this is what I could find on the subject. First the wedding certificate between Pierre Charles dit Cousin Boucher and Catherine Maurais; January 30, 1792 in Rivière-Cuelle. That's ok, but for the baptisms there is a big error, in fact this couple acted like every normal couple; they got married then got children.

B-A-l Wedding certificate of Pierre Charles dit Cousin/Boucher and Catherine Morai(Maurais) Jan 30, 1792 in Rivière-Ouelle.

The priest wrote: Pierre Charles said Cousin. There is also an X who tells us that his name was also Boucher, this correction seems to be done april 13, 1878, I saw the same date on the baptism of their son Frédérick, born in 1806. Also, with these two pages, we can see that there are no baptisms of children from this couple.

Now for the children:

B-A-2 Birth certificate of Pierre Cousin (son of Pierre Cousin and Catherine Morai (Maurais)

Born and baptised: Jan 21, 1793 in R.Ouelle. Godfather: Louis Gagnon (uncle of Catherine Morai) Godmother: Brigitte Plourde (widow of Pierre Boucher)

Just remember Pierre Boucher and Brigitte Plourde, I will come back later on them.

Now, to summarize the baptisms of the children, here is the family sheet of Pierre Charles Cousin/Boucher and Catherine Morai.

B-A-3 Family sheet of P.C. Cousin/Boucher and Catherine Morai.

I wrote in this family sheet every details that could help this research; like surname used by the priest, important dates, godparents with relation to the couple or the child if written. Notice that Frédérick has the same date written on his baptism(april 13, 1878) that his parents had on their wedding certificate.

You also asked about the wedding of their son Charles with Adélaide Boucher; there was no dispensation given, they published 3 banns without opposition; that's all.

After that I took a look at the death certificate of Pierre Charles Cousin/boucher

B-A-4 Death certificate of Pierre Boucher, husband of Catherine Moret (Maurais)

Died: August 26,1836 - aged 67 years. Burial: August 27, 1836 in Rivière-Ouelle

So he was born around 1769. So I searched for his baptism, between 1763 and 1775: there is no Pierre Charles Cousin or Boucher born between those dates, in Rivière-Ouelle. I specially checked the children of Ignace Boucher and Genevieve Michaud. (Ignace Boucher is the one who signed in the wedding certificate of Pierre Charles dit Cousin/Boucher, he was a lieutenant of militia and must have acted as his father for the wedding) But the couple did not have a Pierre Charles.

B-A-4a Wedding certificate of Angélique Boucher (d/o Ignace Boucher and Geneviève Michaud

This certificate prooves that both Ignace Boucher, the one on this certificate and the one on Pierre Charles's wedding certificate are the same, because of their signature.

Pierre Charles dit Cousin/Boucher or Cousin dit Boucher Jacques Laurent Lessard

I also verified the children of Pierre Boucher and Brigitte Plourde. They got married Jan 18, 1751 had a child who died shortly after. The couple lived in Rivière-Ouelle, and between 1753 and 1789, I did not found any other children, Pierre Boucher died july 1, 1789 and was burried in the church of Rivière-Ouelle.

B-A-5 Boucher family of Rivière-Ouelle

Pierre Boucher and Brigitte Plourde
Married Jan 18, 1751 in R.Ouelle - no children

Ignace Boucher and Geneviève Michaud Married 1757 in Kamouraska - with family

I took the time to see if there was any illegitimate child born between these dates, and in 1769 there was a Pierre; he is the only one in 10 years.

Pierre Charles could have been an illegitimate child, he was

Pierre Charles dit Cousin/Boucher or Cousin dit Boucher Jacques Laurent Lessard

perhaps adopted by a Boucher family; maybe Pierre Boucher and Brigitte Plourde since they did not have children. Remember #B-A-2(the birth certificate of Pierre Cousin jr), the godparents were Louis Gagnon, uncle of the mother or grand uncle of the child, and to represente the side of the husband: Brigitte Plourde(widow of Pierre Boucher) maybe the adoptive mother of Pierre Charles.

Why did Pierre Charles was so called Cousin? Maybe because Pierre Boucher, husband of Brigitte Plourde, and Ignace Boucher were brothers, both sons of Pierre Boucher and Catherine Lizotte (see #B-A-5), this adopted child (Pierre Charles) could have become a cousin for Ignace's children!

HAUDECOEUR / DENIAU

Like a great many amateur genealogists, I have been infected by the need to know "Who am I and from where did I come?" I was guided by expert advice through the Mormon Genealogical Library in Mesa, Arizona. They advised that, once you get into French-Canada, it will be easy. It was easy and I paid no attention at all to some old advice that goes, "Don't dig too deep or you may find information you didn't want to know!"

I was raised in Detroit and had never met a DeNio who was not my acknowledged relative before I went away to college. Then and there, I learned of a book, "The DeNio Genealogy", and a few years later an enterprising book dealer sold me "a rare copy." The book implies that all Denios are related to one Aaron Denio, of Deerfield, Massachusettes. When I began my search, I thought all I had to do was find one missing generation that would tie me to the book and to early American history. That was the first of several assumptions, all wrong.

I could trace my family back to Ephraim Denio, who immigrated 1857, through and married to Ogdensburg, New York in information. I knew he was buried in Notre-Dame Cemetery in Ogdensburg. In the fall of 1985, I visited Notre-Dame Church intent on discovering a marriage record, but I was dismayed by the fact that the church was not even built until 1862. Then why did I accept an invitation to thumb through the first book of records? What, other than sheer luck, caught my eye on top of page 93? Was Ephrem Denio & Domithilde Goin the great grandparents I knew as Ephraim Denio & Matilda Gwinn? You better believe it was, and now I had the names of their parents and the diocese of Lachine in Quebec. It was too easy to write Father Loiselle and promptly recieve five more generations in and around Montreal back to the marriage of Jean Haudecoeur and Marie-Madeleine Matou in 1686.

I was advised, without an explanation, that "Haudecoeur was my real name." The switch to Deniau, Daigneau, Daigneault and Denio bugged me. In the Dictonnaire Généalogique des Familles Canadiennes, by Abbé C. Tanguay it states that Marie-Madeleine Matou remarried René Deniau in 1692. Presumably, Jean Haudecoeur died leaving her with four children and she had four more by René. So, who was

Haudecoeur / Deniau Submitted by Arthur E.DeNio

Pierre-Noel Deniau-Haudecoeur , the grandson of Jean or René? I had to know for sure, so I engaged Mr. Jacques Laurent Lessard, a professional genealogist in Montreal, who ad appears in our journal "Lifelines" to search each generation backwards.

One success followed another. Noel Deniau was indeed the son of Pierre Deniau who was the son of Jean Haudecoeur. Obviously, René Deniau adopted Pierre at age six and gave him his name. Thats's odd. Was he trying to hide something? Yes, and it was "Murder, She Wrote." Jean Haudecoeur murdered François Poignet, a Montreal merchant, his home on January 26,1690. He was convicted and condemned "to having his right fist cut off before the door of the victim, and after six beating to the legs, put on a wheel facing the sky waiting his death." Actually, he was tried three times and than hung in lower Quebec City on May 27,1690. His body was buried in an unknown place between Quebec City and Montreal. His farm and all his worldly goods were confiscated (leaving the family with nothing).

Obviously, René Deniau gave his adopted children his good name to erase their disgrace. It's a good name too and I wish Ephrem had not anglicized it.

One Problem Solved -- More Raised!

Most French-Canadian researchers, when they link their family to an 18th century French-Canadian family, turn immediately to Tanguay's seven-volume collection for further connections. I did the same -- and received my first surprise. The marriage entry in the Ste-Genevieve-de-Berthier *repertoire* says that:

Antoine Brûlé, son of Antoine Brûlé and Angélique Meslin of lle Dupas married 27 April 1752, Ste-Genevieve-de-Berthier Josette Ethier, daughter of Joseph Ethier and Josephte Mabriant-Coulon

But Tanguay (Vol. 3, p 597), says that "Marie Joseph, b 20 mars 1735, à Lachenaye; m 1753, à Antoine Brulé" was the daughter of Etienne Ethier and his first wife, Madeleine Roy. Furthermore, there was no Joseph Ethier who married a Josephte Mabriant-Coulon, either in Tanguay's volumes or in René Jette's <u>Dictionnaire genealogique des familles du Quebec, des origines à 1730</u>. Dead-end — based on the sources I have available to me. Fortunately, I'd established contact with several others, both professional researchers and distant cousins of my own; the combined efforts of all have cleared up some of the questions — and raised others!

Joy Reisinger. (of <u>Lost in Canada?</u>) responded with her belief that the Joseph Ethier who married Marie-Josephte COULON-MABRIANT and the Joseph who married Marie-Josephte VANIER *dit* TOUSSAINT at Lanoraie on 20 Feb 1730 were actually the same couple (with Marie-Josephte sometimes using the surname of her step-father, René Coulon *dit* Mabriant). To establish this,

she searched area baptism, burial and marriage records (in area marriage repertaires and the University of Montreal's Le Repertoire des actes de bapteme, mariage, sepulture et des recensements du Quebec ancien). This proved necessary because 1) Tanguay confused the Ethier families, and further mixed them with descendants of George Etu, and 2) the Joseph Ethier family apparently moved frequently, with events recorded in registers at Berthier, St-Ours, Lavaltrie, St-Sulpice, Sorel, Lanoraie, and Maskinonge. Since not all baptism records have yet been discovered, they may have resided in other places as well, and there may have been other, so far unknown, children. Fortunately, this couple's marriage (though not their children) and thus their ancestral lines are shown in Jette's volume (p. 407).

Based on the evidence Joy found, and on my own research, I would tentatively give the Joseph Ethier/Marie-Josephte Vanier family as follows (with names spelled as given in the pertinent entries):

Joseph Ethier, son of René & Madeleine Regeas-Leprade; b Lachenaie and bap 2 Dec 1708 St-François, lle Jesus; possibly buried 8 Feb 1872 St-Pierre-de-Sorel (the church index shows the burial of a Joseph Ethier, age 88 -- not an impossible age exaggeration)

Married 20 Feb 1730 Lanoraie, registered at Berthier-en-haut (contract 6 Feb, Senet)

Marie-Josephte Vanier & Toussaint (illegitimate daughter of Genevieve Vanier, who later married René Coulon-Mabriant; or possibly daughter of Pierre Toussaint & Genevieve Vanier by an earlier marriage not yet established; Jette says she was illegitimate, and that her mother had another, acknowledged, illegitimate daughter; he gives her name as "Vanier & Toussaint"); birth date unknown, but before her mother's marriage 7 Dec 1711 at Contrecoeur, to René Coulon & Mabriant; death date and place unknown

- Joseph Estier, b 14, bap 15 July 1731 Berthier (son of Joseph Estier & Marie-Josephte Toursaint; sponsers, René Estier and Genevieve Yanier, his paternal grandfather and maternal grandmother); bur 26 Sept 1731 St-Ours, age 2 months

My own line somewhat sorted, I still have some major questions unanswered.

1) Who was the Joseph Ethier that Tanguay erroneously said was the son of René Ethier and Madeleine Regeas? According to the Drouin marriage index (page 477), he was the Joseph born posthumously and bap 7 Feb 1709 at St-François, Ile-Jesus, son of André Ethier and Anne Perron, and married first, 9 February 1733 at Rivière- des-Prairies to Catherine Lauzon, and second, 30 June 1756 at Sault-au- Récollet to Marie-Josephte Corbeil. Only two months younger than my Joseph, he was also his first cousin: their fathers, André and René, were brothers, sons of Léonard Ethier and Elisabeth Godillon.

This was not the only error that Tanguay made in the Ethier line. An article, "Descendance D'Antoine Roy-Desjardins," in <u>Mémoires de la Société</u>
<u>Généalogique</u> (Vol. VII, pp 161-163), discusses in detail the marriage contract

of Etienne Ethier (son of François Ethier and Marguerite Milot) and Madeleine Rou-Designdins: Tanguay had wrongly placed Etienne among the children of René Ethier and Madeleine Regeas. Actually, Etienne was a nephew of René (François being another son of Léonard Ethier and Elisabeth Godillon), and thus also first cousin of the Joseph who married Marie-Josephte Vanier dit Toussaint. François' second wife was Marie-Thérèse Regeas, sister of his brother René's wife Marie-Madeleine Regeas, so close family ties are indicated. Both Etienne and Joseph had daughters named Marie-Josephte, Joseph's daughter born 1732 and Etienne's born 1735. No wonder Tanguay confused the lines! However, the <u>Mémoires</u> (p. 163) indicates that Etienne's daughter Marie-Josephte married 1 May 1758 at Repentigny, to Jean-Baptiste Ménard dit Vive-Lamour, soldier in the Lassarre Regiment. This could not have been my Marie-Josephte, since she and Antoine Brûlé had a son Antoine, bap 5 Feb 1759 at 11e-Dupas, and further children born thereafter and probably baptised at Ste-Geneviève-de-Berthier. Furthermore, an entry in the St-Cuthbert church records translates roughly as:

13 Feb 1806 . . . buried Antoine Brûlé, ancient former of this parish, died 2 days ago, age about 83 years, widower of Josephte Etier. . . . Present: Joseph Brûlé, his son, and Alexis Neveu, his son-in-law.

As Josephte died at St-Cuthbert in 1777 as spouse of Antoine Brûlé, and her husband Antoine Brûlé as her widower in 1806, there is no possibility that she remarried in 1758 to Jean-Baptiste Ménard; therefore, she cannot be the daughter of Etienne, who did marry then.

Has anyone else sorted out the Ethier lines?

2) Who was the father of Marie-Josephte Vanier *dit* Toussaint (according to Jette) or Coulon-Mabriant (according to her daughter's marriage record)?

Jette says she was the illegitimate daughter of Genevieve Vanier, but cites no

baptism record or other evidence and gives no father's name. The <u>Inventaire</u> <u>des Greffes</u>, vol. 17, p. 218, notary Senet 6 Feb 1730, calls her Marie-Josephe Vanier of Lanoraie, daughter of the late Pierre-Toussaint Vanier, but does not give her mother's name. The Ste-Genevieve-de-Berthier marriage record (extract in the University of Montreal set, vol 26) calls her daughter of Genevieve Vanier, and says "no mention is made about the father of the bride." Her children's baptism and marriage records (as given above) offer as many variants of her surname as they do of her husband's name.

Thanks to 1) Bill Marquis for the initial Clinton county records that began my search, and mostly for pointing me to 2) Virginia DeMarce, who connected my lines to St-Cuthbert, Berthier county, and for all her encouragement. Also to 3) cousin Pat Hanrahan for all his supplementary help (especially for sending photocopies from Jette and the <u>Mémoires</u>, both unavailable to me here), and to 4) Joy Reisinger for her in-depth research on the Ethier and Vanier problems.


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



Even though few members of the Rondo family came to Pepin Co., Wis., there were so many intermarriages with the LaPean family that an attempt was made to get an outline of it. Very sketchily, it looks like this:

Julienne's genuine name was Schaeffer, and her father remained in Canada after coming in the Regiment von Barner, a ranger regiment, one of the German mercenary regiments that served the British during the American Revolution. This particular regiment was sent to America by the Duchy of Brunswick.

Beginning with the paternal side of our family, I will write down all that I know of the members of the PERSON family so that those to whom this "Family" bible descends may have this much of a record. Realizing that-even this will not be known to the next, and other generations to come, unless so recorded.

- Dennis PERSON: by occupation farmer: Formerly of Wilmington in Northern New York State and later of Westport, New York, and his wife (in Westport Cemetery) Evaline PALMER: of the same towns: No record of birth. Lived their married life mostly in Westport and were buried in the Westport Cemetery. Of this marriage were born, as far as I know ten children as follows:
- 1.1 Hiram PERSON: went west Colorado & California nothing known.
- 1.2 Horace PERSON: west west Colorado & California nothing known.
- 1.3 Jane PERSON: who married one Milo REID of Chicago, Illnois and spent her life there until about 1910 or 1911 when she died. There were two sons Harry and Frank Reid born of this marriage.
- 1.4 Herbert PERSON: went west Colorado & California nothing known.
- 1.5 Eliza Anne PERSON: was courted by Jerimiah(Jerry)FLYNN but was drowned in Lake Champlain when the boat they were rowing capsized and she was never seen after. Her body never was recovered. Eliza Anne was in her twenties.
- 1.6 Helen PERSON: was next in line, was later courted by Jerimiah (Jerry) FLYNN and married and lived all their lives in Milton, Vermont, as farmers. There being one child, Minnie, who married Ed BRUSH. They had one son Silas BRUSH of Milton, VT.
- 1.7 Lucy PERSON: married Hiram JOHNSON of Moriah, NY but lived most of their married life on a farm in the town of Lewis, NY where their children Nellie, Louise, Dennis, and Amy (who died in young girlhood). Dennis their son lived on their farm after their death and later his son was the occupant as late or later than 1928.

- 1.8 married Melvin CARPENTER of Moriah, N.Y. Maria PERSON: also living their life there. Their children were: Sarah, who married George WITHERBEE has one son Raymond. Lulu, married Thomas CLYDESDALE, no children. Harry married Hattie two sons Ralph and Roswell. Frank married Flora PIERCE children: Mable, Percival, Clarence. Dallas Jennie HARRIS who had one child Charlotte called "Lottie". Harry, Frank and Dallas Carpenter were all carpenters by who married one HANNA of Iowa who died after two sons were born there: Howard and Vernon later in Moriah, NY again) she (at home married Fred McKENZIE. Mamie who married one CARR and died when one child was born "Valeda" later adopted by Mamie's sister Lulu CLYDESDALE and married to Leon WHEELOCK of Port Henry, NY. Walter a baker by trade married and lived in Ohio, divorced and married again still in Ohio 1928. Maria above lived to be 86 years old and Melvin CARPENTER her husband died a few years after her at 94 years (in 1924-25). So ends the record of Maria's family.
- 1.9 Harry PERSON: married a handsome girl, Anna who proved to be unworthy and they separated and his life was spent managing various hotels in the west and east and died in Moriah, NY in old age and buried in Westport near his parents Dennis and Evoline PERSON. Evoline (Palmer) PERSON died about 1862.(Ed.note:1875 managed Lake House, now Westport Hotel)
- 1.10 David PERSON: the youngest of 10 was born July 7,1846 and was married 22 January 1867 to Mary Elisabeth Tart who was born 27 February 1850,of this marriage there were four children (when the youngest was $2\frac{1}{2}$ years Mary Elizabeth TART died at age 37.
- 1.10.1 Sarah Evoline PERSON: (Evalyn later) who married one Fred SPRING and had six children: Arthur, David, Albert, Leroy, Marion Elizabeth, Grace May, Franklyn Frederick, Stotere Smith. And at the age of 32 years died. Her children all lived until fully grown with families of their own too numerous to record here.
- 1.10.2 Laura Pearl PERSON: (Pearl) born 29 Jul 1872, married William FOUNTAIN of Moriah, NY and of this marriage there were born eight children: Hazel, Beatrice, Edwin, Hobart, Paul, Edna,

- Evalyn and Grace. Evalyn died in infancy all the rest grew to adulthood.
- 1.10.3 Edna Marie PERSON: (author of this article) born 13 November 1876 was married on 26 September 1900 to John Coroden THOMPSON of Moriah,NY who in 1901 went west to Utah and remained there until 1918 returning to live at Moriah again, they had no children.
- 1.10.4 Ethel Alma PERSON: the youngest of the 4 children of David born 26 March 1885 was married to Clayton LOCKWOOD of Schroon Lake, NY where they reside. There being one child a son Vincent Person LOCKWOOD born 7 March 1916 the year in which David PERSON died on 27 March at the age of 68 yrs. In the year of 1894 on July 18 David PERSON (1.10) was united in marriage with Lillian Beatrice Smith of Moriah (his second wife, the first having been dead 8 there were no children of this second marriage, which until 27 Mar 1916 when David died. The PERSON family of Dennis and Evoline all lived into old age, (from 65 to 86 years approximately) with the exception of Eliza Anne who was drowned. Now a word to my successors after me Edna THOMPSON if you, whoever you are, will (PERSON) continue this record from where I leave off and pass it on to next in "Kinship" to keep also, you will have done your duty to posterity as I have done. Of this record the writer Edna (PERSON) THOMPSON.

The maternal side of our family as far back as I know "John TART and his wife Sarah McLYMAN (the correct spelling was MACLINMON) John(Jean)LeTART came from France to Canada (Montreal) in his early life [Ed.note: date of arrival is family tradition, most likely a descendant of one of the 1st generation LeTartre families to Canada]little is known. The name was changed very early to plain TART and beyond Edson TART a brother whose family consisted of Helen CLARK his wife and four children:Pearl, Walter, Roy and Annie all of whom in later years left Moriah, NY and lived in Vermont State, and one sister Mrs Betsy (TART) SHADRICK of Vermont (who was known by the family for her pecularities of which exaggeration was no least part. In young manhood John came to Moriah, NY to

reside. His brother Ambroise Tart lived in Bristol, VT. John Tart met and married Sarah McClimon (who people came to Canada when Sarah was but 7 years old). Alexander McClimon and his wife (Sarah's parents) with their children came to Camada from the northern part of Ireland, north of Dublin, and were stanch Presbyterians. There was smallpox on board ship and daughter Martha 2 or 3 years died of it when close to land, this child is buried in Montreal.

The McLyman(McClimon)family were as follows: Isaac and his wife Lydia and 2 sons, Dolly, who lived to be 21, and Thomas who died young. Isaac kept a general store (where DEYO latter held) at Moriah Center, NY, latter living in Mineville, NY. Isaac was a deacon in the church, he ran off West with another women leaving his 1st wife "Lydia". Mary Anne McLyman(McClimon) married John Benson of Bridport, VT, there were 5 children: John, James, Martha, Tom, and Jennie Benson (this latter one died young womanhood of Consumption (Tuberculois). The father John Benson was killed and found on the railroad track, by some people it was thought he was murdered but it was never investigated. Later Mary Anne married John Melvin (her 2nd husband was also killed by a run-away horse returning from church), he had 3 children by a former marriage: Will, Rob, and Maggie Melvin.

John Benson their son married (unhappily) had several children, divorced his wife and remarried to Laura Pearce of near Westport, NY and lived in Mineville, NY, there was 4 children of this union, Laura and 2 small children died about 1884 of diptheria) the other 2 Roy and Frand grew to manhood. Tom Benson married Lulu Nelson and had 4 or 5 children. Tom died in Leaville, CO and Martha Benson married Michael Hughes (Blacksmith) and had 10 children: John, Fred, Eliza, Ed, Oscar, Irrie, Lee, Bertha (who died in childhood) Jennie, and Sheary. All except Bertha lived past the date 1928.

Thomas McLyman (McClimon) and Olive Wiswell his wife had 2 children: Minnie and Maud. Minnie married Harry Bowen and had 2 children: sons Harry and Tommie and parted. Minnie in latter years secured a divorce in South Dakota and lived and remarried in Colorado (unknown) to whom remarried. Maude married James McLelland and had 4 or 5 children, lived in Mineville, NY all their days. I had always supposed the early name was McLyman but it proved to have been McClimon or MacClimon.

OBITUARY

Mrs Elizabeth, wife of David Persons, was born in Moriah, N.Y. Feb. 27th, 1850. She was a daughter of John and Sarah Tart.. At the age of 16 she was married to David Persons. Although her health has been very poor for some time, her death was quite sudden and unexpected. She was confined to the bed Sunday morning, July 31st, and died Tuesday night, August 2nd. Only two or three days before she was taken to the bed, she told her husband that she had not felt better in two years. She died of paralysis of the heart.

She leaves a husband and four daughters, also a father, mother, brother, and two sisters to mourn for her. She was kind-hearted and cheerful, a dutiful child, an affectionate wife, a loving mother, and a kind neighbor. Her cheerful voice and kind words will be missed, not only by the members of her own family and relatives, but by all who knew her; but our loss is her gain.

When the Death Angel comes and breaks all the golden cords that bind the family circle in one band of love and happiness it is almost unbearable, and we cannot understand why it should be so, but the Holy Comforter whispers: "not lost, but gone before"

Death, our home circle has broken, And claimed one for his own; He took our mother to heaven, Where sorrow is not known.

He took the dearest one from us, Up to his home on high, To dwell above with Jesus, Through all eternity.

The silver cord He has broken, And saddened all our hearts, But gives us a home in heaven, Where all sorrow departs.

"Petition to Sir John Colborne, 7 January 1839"

The following document was located by Albert Smith in the Rapport de l'Archiviste de la Province de Quebec for 1925-26, which has a listing of documents relating to the Rebellion of 1837. On p. 257 of this volume, under the number 2875, is a "Requete a Sir John Colborn de plusieurs refugies a Corbeau N.Y. Ils lui demandent la permission de rentrer dans leur pays."

Mr. Smith copied the original of this document from the microfilm at Montreal, and gave permission to me, Virginia DeMarce, to make the following translation. I originally intended to translate the entire petition, but discovered that part of the central section was omitted from the photocopy. Therefore, I have translated enough to give a sense of the flowery original and have added in full the names of the signers.

To His Excellency Sir John Colburne, Lieutenant General, Knight of the Grand Cross of the Very Honorable Military Order of Bath . . ., Commander of the Forces of Her Majesty in the Province of Lower Canada and of Upper Canada, and Administrator of the Government of Lower Canada M.M.M.

If it Pleases Your Excellency,

. . . .

We the very humble petitioners afterwards undersigned pray Your Excellency, all of us undeserving, that you, by your good will, permit us to reach you with this present petition by the mediation of our charitable pastor.

Banned for nearly two months from our native birthplace, exiled from our dear fatherland, separated from our dear relatives and wives, at a distance from our esteemed families and from our very dear friends; our souls not without remorse, justly alarmed in conscience by the most sad recollection of our unworthy conduct, we the undersigned of the place of our exile, we address our requests: we the undersigned pray again, we supplicate you, we implore you that your good will render you favorable to our very humble supplication, in permitting us to return to our homes and to go to rejoin our tender families.

If the unhappy excesses to which we have given ourselves merit rigorous punishment, we implore you, O brave and generous administrator, to cast your eyes on the sadness and the desolation of our unfortunate families and to judge in favor of the innocents who do not merit it—not on the guilty.

Finally, instructed by our own misfortunes, we undersigned hope to redeem ourselves by a more faithful and more loyal life. Several days of wild conduct, days that we desire to recall, from time to time, to our memory, for the purpose of deploring them and of putting ourselves on guard by the dread.

Your Excellency, in turning to yourself to our desires, will restore calm, pleasure and joy, there where sadness, worries, and alarms reign today; And your humble supplicants pray, and do not cease to pray for the conservation and prolongation of the days of Your Excellence among us.

(Mss. State Papers of Vermont-Court of Confiscation, p. 2)

In Council Windsor March 26th 1778

Voted that his Exellency the Governor and Council that live in Bennington County be a Court to Confiscate the Estates of those persons that are Enemies in the same form as those in the County of Cumberland are (that is to say) they are impowerd to Confiscate and order sale to be made of all such Lands and Estates as shall by Sufficient Evidence Appear to be forfeited within said County and order the produce of the same into the Treasury of this State, they are also Impowerd to appoint Commissioners to adjust and Settle the Accounts of the Creditors to said Estates and order Payment for the same

APPENDIX

LOYALISTS WHO PRESENTED CLAIMS TO THE BRITISH COMMISSIONERS FOR LOSSES OF ESTATES IN VERMONT

There is conclusive evidence appearing in the two sources cited below, the matter in this volume and in the Records of the Council of Safety and Governor and Council, that certain of these loyalists had their estates confiscated by Vermont authority. These are marked with an asterisk (*). Other loyalists who held their titles under New York either had their estates confiscated by action of that state, or, their titles being ignored by Vermont, their lands were re-granted by the latter state. In some cases, however, it is impossible to determine absolutely by what authority their loss occurred, or even whether a loss was sustained at all.

Items relating to Abner Woolcott (Loyalist)

Abner Woolcott was a loyalist from New Haven, Vermont. His father-in-law Charles Griffin was also a loyalist and no doubt played a big part in his decision to remain loyal. Perhaps as shown by the following reports Abner Wilcot was put to the test. They wanted to see where his loyality really was. He was given a pass and a load of wheat and grain to transport to Skeensborough (now Whitehall, N.Y. and he promptly delivered it to the British forces and escaped. The same day his father-in-law not under suspicion up to this point, as no reports no reports on him. Takes both families and escapes.



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

"Farm Families That Lived on Cumberland Head" Early 1900's by Albert Hager

Ephraim Allen used to live on the Allen Road. It was all one farm. It bordered on the Strack farm. About a mile further up the road was Colligan's Point.

The old schoolhouse on the right was near the Bristol place. My mother used to go to Quaker meetings in that schoolhouse years ago.

Frank McMaster had the farm next to the Bristol place. He was also next to Pat Lavigne. Then he built the square house on the hill, just south of Gravelly Point Road. My father bought it and sold it to the Lutz brothers, Clarence, Bill, and John. They bought that place to start a ferry. They built a ferry boat and dock, but the ferry was too small. Afterwards, they got in with Harry Johnson and had a good ferry. The Speare brothers also had a ferry. Both companies used to have men at the corner near the present firehouse to try to divert traffic to their company's ferry.

The next farm south was owned by Mrs.Tabergh. She took care of the lighthouse for years after her husband died. I bought the Tabergh farm from Mrs.Tabergh's estate. Three of the Tabergh girls, Maude, Anna, and Rose taught at the little yellow school-house next to the Wright house on the Head. Anna married Will Lombard from Beekmantown. After Anna died, he married Maude. Rose married Dr.Hillegas, a professor at Columbia University. Ruth the youngest, married McCollough, an army officer. She lived on the Head until 1975. ...

"Founding of Peru" 1772-1812 by Eleanor Arthur Spalding

I was born in 1892. I'm one of the last suriving members of the Arthur family, one of the families that founded Peru. We didn't get a town named after us like the Keese family did, but our deed for the land here goes back before the Keese's.

I'm a great great granddaughter of Augustin Arthur who, with three of his brothers, was one of the first non-Quaker founders of Peru. This whole area was called Peru and afterwards other towns were taken from it. Peru extended from the township of Plattsburgh to the Ausable River until Ausable and Black Brook were formed in 1839.

My ancestors came here from Long Island after the Revolutionary War. There wasn't enough farmland on Long Island. They purchased land from Zephaniah Platt who was from Poughkeepsie. A Scotsman named William Hay was the first white man who attempted to settle within the present town, in 1772. He and the other settlers were frightened by threats of the coming war and moved to Canada.

Platt came in 1784 and the Arthurs followed in 1788. They had to spend two years on their plot of land before they got a deed. I found the deed which was dated 1790 in the Peru town clerk's office.

The Arthur's were called Quakers, but they really weren't. Thomas and Joshua went off to fight in the Battle of Plattsburgh and the War of 1812. They didn't have regiments they had to stay with. They could go fight for a while and then come home. Quakers would not have gone off to war. Only Platt Arthur was an orthodox Quaker.

Through the work of the Arthurs and others, the town of Peru began to take shape with more houses, blacksmith shops, farms, taverns, and stores. I haven't lived here all the time, but this has always been home to me.

"Life Story" by Julia B.West

I was born March 5,1877 at Mooers. I was the first one in the family born in the United States. My parents came from St-Edouard Quebec with a family of seven children... When my father lived in Canada, he was working in the grist mill. He worked there for many years. My oldest brother was working with my father at the time he died. It was such a shock to my mother when her oldest son died. He was fourteen years old. They sold their home, came to the states. I never knew that brother. The children that came from Canada were Josephine, Pamela, Philip, Casper, Georianna, Sinthia, Angelic. Jessie was born on June 2,1879 at Mooers.

My sister Georgianna born in St-Edouard, Que.in 1872, died Jan. 23, 1883. She was eleven years old. She fell in a well and drowned.

When I was two months old, Josephine left for Cohoes. While there, she and Louis Denault started their romance. They got married in 1881.

When my sister Georgianna died, my father went to Canada and got one of his cousins to work for us. Her name was Melvina Boulerice. How nice and what a good worker she was. She could do all kinds of work. She married Eugene Tetrault for his second wife. She stayed the rest of the winter with us.

In 1882, my brother Philip married Ruth Ann Raymond on April 24. She was eighteen years old. My sister Pamela was young when she got married in July 1882 to Zephia Lucia.

In 1879 on June 2 my brother Jesse was born. He and I were great pals.

William West was born on March 14,1876 in Woods Falls, Town of Mooers, not a mile from where I was born... It stopped snowing the day I was married. It was very cloudy all day. The sun wouldn't shine for me. There were about four inches of snow on the ground... We were married November 26,1896 at Ste.Anne's church, Mooers Forks.

Bon Appétit

BARLEY is a delicious chewy grain often associated with warming, filling wintertime soups. The Co-op in Plattsburgh, N.Y. has hulled barley, not the more common and far less nutritious pearled barley. Hulled barley is the whole grain with only the inedible outer layer removed. Like all the whole grains, barley is a good source of fiber and protein, and it is also high in the B vitamins niacin and thiamine, and most minerals, especially calcium, prosphorus and Potassium.

Barley fluffs up to over three times its volume during cooking and absorbs quite a bit of water. Use three cups water for every cup of barley and count on a cooking time of over an hour.

Try this basic hearty soup with some cornbread on a cold winter night, like the French Canadian settlers used to do: Bring 5 cups of water with one cup green split peas and ½ cup hulled barley to a boil, cover, then turn down heat and cook an hour. Add diced carrots and onions, some caraway seeds and fresh ground pepper. Continue cooking until barley, peas, and vegetables are all ready to eat. You may have to add more water.

AN AFTERNOON AT HEMMINGFORD, QUEBEC

Dear Members:

On a recent "rapid" trip to Plattsburgh, I made a "more rapid" trip to Hemmingford, Quebec, to see if I could determine what resources might be there for research. My decision to go to Hemmingford was made spontaneously at about 3:30pm, on Friday afternoon, as I approached the entrance to 22 North, on Boyton, Ave. I just said to myself, "oh, why not!", and ventured up Route 22.

I arrived at Hemmingford at 4:00pm. The sun, while still shining, was shedding little warmth, an I thought of the cold Friday afternoon, I was not sure what I would find open. It was the library that I was primarily looking for and I thought I had heard, from our summer trip, that it was in the Municipal Building. I entered the building, determined I should not turn left, as that appeared to be the Post Office, however going forward seemed to lead to a small lobby with a listing of the Mayors of Hemmingford, and several unlabeled doors. Then I realized, in my interest of investigating the names of past mayors, I had missed a window on the right. There, behind the glass window was a very pleasant young lady, who immediately addressed me in English, asking if she could help. I explained that I was looking for the library, when some other lady walked in behind me. An exchange between the two of them indicated that the library would not be open until 7:30 that evening, but what was it I was looking for, they both wanted to know. When I explained I was looking for information on my family history, they both indicated that the initial person I needed to see was this lady in the room behind the glass window, who then most graciously invited me to come in her office.

She explained that her office had REGISTRATIONS for BIRTHS back as far as 1822. For anyone interested in MARRIAGE RECORDS, they would have to check the LOCAL CHURCHES and LAND DEEDS go to the COURT HOUSE in VALLEYFIELD.

Unfortunately my preparation for this opportunity to check birth dates was wasted, as my Spearman information was sitting at Hazel's house, the foolishness of spontaneous action, but all was not lost. This very kind lady, whose name I never did learn, then offered to take out of storage in the basement, old "Valuation Records" for the 1880's and a "Small Causes" court case book for

1844-1848. She then set me up to work (it had to be about 4:30 by then!) in what was probably the village council office, in the Mayor's chair! I worked there until 5:30pm when she closed. found listings of the Range, Lot and value of properties back in 1880's, of two Spearmans who appear to be my Great Grand Uncles, as well as the fact that another possible Great Grand Uncle was a blacksmith, as was my Great Grandfather.

I was also presented with a copy of the Chateauguay Valley Historical Society's annual <u>JOURNAL</u>, entitled, <u>1877 HEMMINGFORD 1977</u>. From the varied articles in the Journal, particularly:

Rogers, G.A., "Hemmingford's First Settlers" and McNaughton, Arnold, "Search For An Ancestral Background"

I learned some information which I throught might be helpful to you.

Hemmingford was settled primarily between 1795 and 1830 and was originally known as SCRIVER'S CORNERS. The land was surveyed in 1792 and at least one early family was there in 1795, however the bulk of the township began first around 1800 with about 150 families in the township by 1830. There were some different groups responsible:

- FIRST, Loyalists, from the Hudson and Mohawk Valley, who had initially come to the Richelieu River Valley. It appears that Odelltown was settled in this fashion while others moved on to Hemmingford. There appears to be several German Palatine families involved.
- SECOND, Families from the Vermont and New Hampshire. Many were not Loyalist but wanted to better themselves, in the Potash industry. (Ten to twelve of these families returned to the United States at the time of the War of 1812).
- THIRD, An influx of people entering through Montreal who settled initially in Sherrington, then to the northern part of Hemmingford, who appear to have come primarily from Scotland, and Northern Ireland. The clearance in Scotland and the Post Napoleanic War Depression appear to be the main cause of their emigration.

There was a Militia Garrison at Scrivers Corner's (Hemmingford) from 1838 to some time in the 1850's. This Militia saw action during the 1838 uprising at Odelltown.

This journal of the Chateaguay Valley Historical Society is nicely done, and at the time of its publication in 1977 appears to have been the tenth such volume published. This particular volume, in addition to articles on the early families, (including Benjamin Spearman) Its schools, churches and customs port, has an article on the Apple Industry, written by Charles and Robert Patch. There are also several articles written in French. I plan to spend some time brushing up on my French by translating them.

CHARLEBOIS (WOOD) dit DUBOIS

Extracted from the repertoies of Mr. Benoit Pontbriand

The following case is of a Frenchman who spoke English and this sort of thing happened often. Pierre-Elie Charlebois (son of Pierre and Josephte Brien) revaladated marriage to Marguerite Brule (dau.of Nérée and Marguerite Dugas) 6 Dec.1853 Keeseville, New York at St-John's church. They could had been married two or three years before. For a couple or years I looked for the children of this couple in the marriage repertoire of Clinton County and the Births and Deaths of Redford, Dannemora, Rouses Point and Champlain, New York by Mr. Benoit Pontbriand. This couple moved from Pokeamoonshine, Essex County sometime in the 1850's. And probable lived in Essex Co. NY many years and spoke English very well. See story on The Ancestry and Background of Elie Charlebois (Wood) our Journal Volume 3 Number 1, Whole No.4 Spring 1986 starting page 53 thru.page 59.

Being able to speak English he changed his name to Elie Charles Wood making Charles his middle name. But the old French priest was very stubborn, and when his children that were born in Redford, New York were baptized and he heard WOOD he assumed the real family name was DUBOIS. Now not all the DUBOIS's in our records are from the CHARLEBOIS line but by checking the god-parents we can tell who are. Two children were baptized under Charlebois there must have been a change of priest.
