

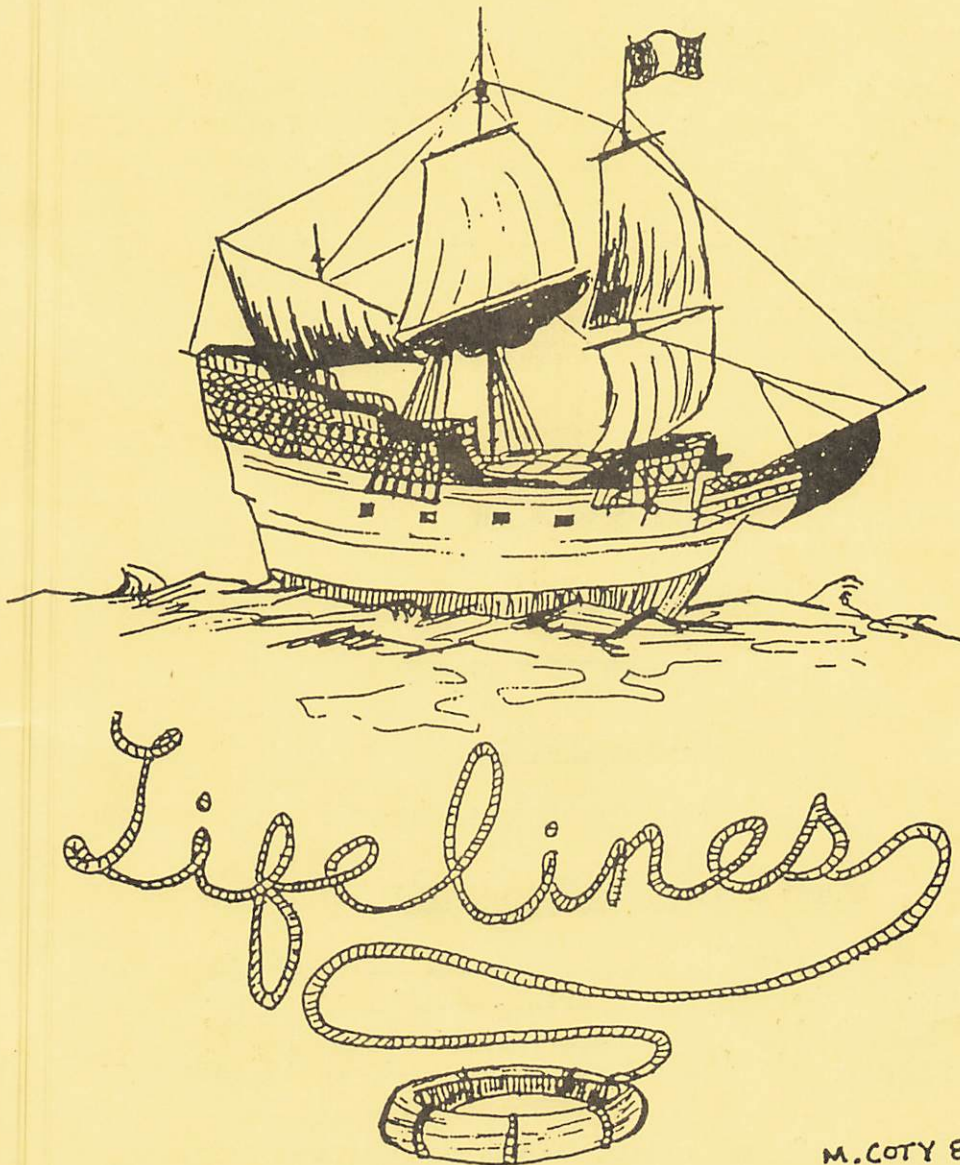

BOOK REVIEW I

THE FRENCH-CANADIAN HERITAGE IN NEW ENGLAND
(University Press of New England, 1986)

This book is a basic book which should be read by everyone researching French-Canadian history and genealogy. Brault is a professor of French at Pennsylvania State University. He was raised in a French-Canadian family in Chicopee, Mass., which he tracks back to Lacolle, Que., just north of the Clinton County, N.Y. border. He divides the book into five chapters. In the first he describes the French-Canadian culture in Quebec in the nineteenth century. He then describes the immigration of many from these families from Quebec into the cities of New England showing how their culture evolved in American mill towns, how they were received and the Church and other institutions they established there in the early period of immigration 1861 to 1920. He then devotes a third chapter to the continuing evaluation of this culture and its institutions from 1920-1960. He then directs his attention to the story of his own family starting from the original Brault emigrant to Acadia from France, the family's later exile in Massachusetts after the Great Expulsion from Acadia, its eventual emigration to the Lacolle-L'Acadie, Quebec, area and then its return to the mill town of New England in the late 1800's. Although written as a family history there is some genealogical information in this chapter. Finally he assesses the status of the French-Canadian descendants in society today in Southern New England. The book is well written, well researched, scholarly but readable. It is a basic book that all researchers need to know and read.

BOOK REVIEW II

THOMAS SEAVY AND ROBERT IRWIN, THEIR DESCENDANTS AND CONNECTING LINES
(Gateway Press, Inc. 1988) Distributed by the author - Crockett A. Harrison

For twenty years Crockett Harrison has been gathering information on his wife's family and ancestors and this is the product of his research. Mrs. Harrison is a native of Saranac, Clinton County, N.Y., and nearly one half of this 485 page book relates to families in Clinton County. Except for the Irwin family who came directly from northern Ireland to Peru in the 1820's most of the families discussed immigrated to Clinton County from the New England states especially Vermont, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts. As the family was related to Father James Rooney, one of the earliest priests to serve at St. John's Church in Plattsburgh, information is given on him. Other Clinton County surnames discussed besides the ones already mentioned are Washburn, Collins, Downey, Curtis, Robinson, Gordon and Cronin. This book is a well researched and excellent genealogy. But it is much more. Harrison also details the historical background of each area in which the family lived including Clinton County. He has tried to find out as much as he could about the occupation, lifestyle, and even personalities of each individual in each generation covered. It is also a fascinating mystery as he recounts the ways in which his research uncovered hard-to-find secrets that opened the way to the answers he needed about the Seavy and related families. I found it one of the most interesting and best books I have ever read focused on the history of one family and I recommend it highly.

THE CANADIAN AND NOVA SCOTIA REFUGEES

At the time of the American Revolution, hundreds of Canadians became refugees in the embattled United States. They showed their sympathies by enlisting in the American armed forces, even when it meant leaving their homeland.

The status of refugee originated with the creation by Congress of two Canadian regiments at the time of the American invasion of Lower Canada (Quebec) in 1775. The First was commanded by Colonel James Livingston, and the Second by Colonel Moses Hazen. Each was authorized to raise a regiment of 1,000 men, but neither came near that figure. Hazen's highest number while he was still in Canada was 486 men, and not all of them followed him back into the states. Potential officers were encouraged to raise their own companies, and an enlistment bounty of 40 livres (6 2/3 dollars) could be offered.

The victory of American arms would have spelled a different fate for the recruits, but in the spring of 1776 the British landed enough reinforcements to send the American army hurrying for the borders. Most of the Canadian enlistees followed their commanders, Livingston or Hazen, south into Lake Champlain. The families of many of them accompanied their men southward, first to Crown Point, then Ticonderoga and finally to Albany. Here the main refugee camp for the families was established, and it was occupied for ten long years. When the regiments were posted to Fishkill for winter quarters, some of the families followed, and a secondary refugee camp was opened at that place.

While the families were provided with minimal security and supplies, their men ranged widely in their fighting capacity. In 1777 Hazen's regiment, for example took part in a Staten Island raid and in the battles of Brandywine and Germantown. In the next year the regiment was ordered to Albany for a projected second invasion of Canada, much to the delight of the Canadians, but for many reasons the plans were dropped. In anticipation, Captain Clement Gosselin wrote his wife, who had not left Canada, to expect him in the near future.

In 1779 the regiment was employed in the backbreaking work of building a road for a future invasion route from the Coos country on the Connecticut River northwest to St. Johns on the Richelieu. This "Hazen's Road" was never finished because plans for an invasion were again shelved. In 1780 the regiment saw fighting in Westchester County. It was also the year the Livingston's First Regiment was merged with the Second under Hazen. Congress had previously sanctioned the recruitment by both commanders of American men to fill out their regiments, but

they faced too much competition from state recruiters to succeed.

In 1781 the regiment often dubbed "Congress' Own" because it was the creation of Congress, not that of any state, fought at Yorktown and was then ordered to Lancaster, Pennsylvania to guard the prisoners of war incarcerated there. The soldiers must have thought that their wartime activities consisted mostly of marching. During 1781, for example, in June they were in Albany and the Mohawk Valley; in July they marched to West Point; in August they were in northern New Jersey to appear to threaten Staten Island; in September they were at Yorktown, and in December at Lancaster.

Aside from the dangers of battle and the drudgery of roadbuilding and marching, the men faced many day-to-day irritations as well. Since their unit was created by Congress, no state was responsible for supplies except for those men who had been recruited in the States. And since Congress operated on the verge of bankruptcy, the foreign soldiers were often desperate for clothing, and their pay was always in arrears. As for promotions, unreasonably, it seems today, they had to fit into some state's allocation of positions, and anyway, the regiment was from the beginning overstaffed with officers. Thus no promotions came to the unit until 1783, when a few brevet (nominal or honoray, with no increase in pay or emoluments) promotions were authorized. Thus, Captains Olivier and Gosselin became brevet majors.

Mustering out was an agonizing time for all. Congress offered officers the choice between five full years' full pay or half pay for life. Hazen's officers were unanimous for the former, but they actually left the army with only certificates (promise to pay at some future date) to show for their mustering out; even this made no dent in their arrears of regular pay, which had to be later negotiated by a regimental agent and resulted in more certificates. Enlisted men left the army with three months' pay on account in their pockets. The final disbanding of the regiment took place at White Plains in November 1783. Needless to say, the departing men needed cash and were easy prey to the speculators who bought up the certificates at a fraction of their face value. To the refugees' further dismay, the peace treaty contained no provisions for their free return to their homeland--they saw themselves as permanent refugees.

Meanwhile, the families existed as best they could, but often close to destitution. Congress irregularly provided rations. In 1784 they were turned out of their camp at Fishkill in cold weather, and found refuge in the barracks at West Point. Hazen repeatedly and Lafayette occasionally but ardently interceded with Congress for clothing and necessities for the families. Yet a kind of social life (a sharing of adversity, perhaps) developed in the camps, punctuated by births and deaths.

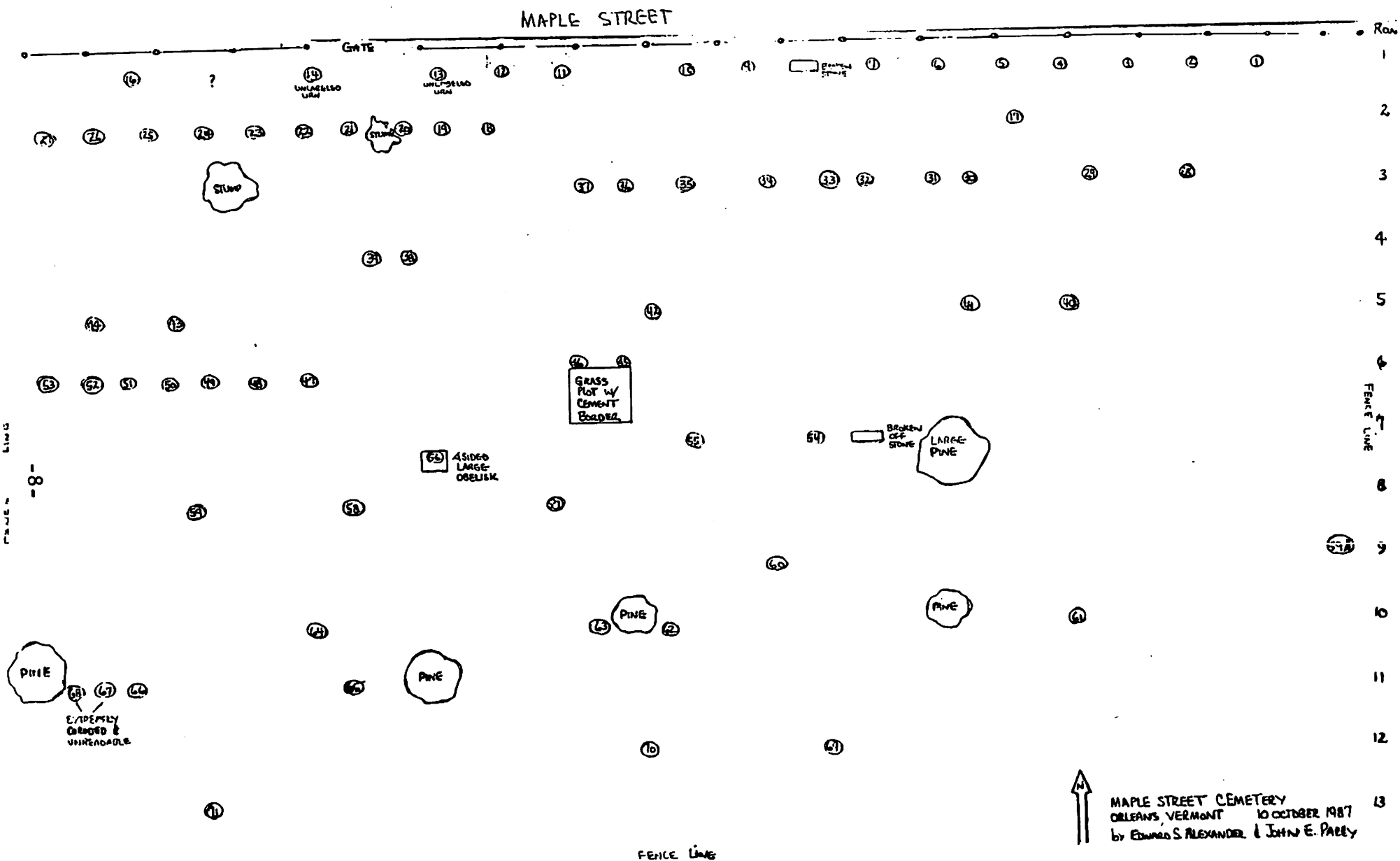
Hazen petitioned Congress for the Canadians to be compensated for their losses in their homeland, but Congress disallowed the claims, choosing to view recruitment in Canada as "invitations only". Those officers who had spent their own money to recruit a company fared no better. Their claims became confused with and included Hazen's accounts, which had not been settled at the time of his death in 1803. In desperation some of his former officers especially Olivier and Liebert, brought suits against Hazen and even had him in jail several times. The only light at the end of a long tunnel appeared when, after the war, New York State accepted the refugees as citizens.

At the end of the war many of the states earmarked land grants for their veterans. Hazen tried to persuade Congress to make grants in the Detroit area for his veterans, but other claimants, including the Indians, tied its hands. Finally, in 1784, New York State accepted the responsibility of providing lands to the Canadians.

There followed a prolonged study of where these grants should be located. They must be "unoccupied" and not previously included in grants already made or in the works. In 1785 a site was chosen on Lake Champlain in northern New York, and lists of the eligibles were prepared. Impatient with the long delays, 59 refugees went to the area as squatters, intent on exchanging lots later if necessary. They included Montys and La Framboises. Meanwhile, Congress periodically extended the provision of rations, until it reached in 1787, the winter after the refugees were on their own lands. In 1785, for example, at Albany 171 men and women and 57 children were receiving rations, while at Fishkill the numbers were 80 and 6, a total of 314.

The Refugee Tract, its ungainly shape resulting from earlier grants along the lake, contained 131,500 acres, and formed the northern third of the later Clinton County. It was divided into 80-acre lots along the lake and the Great Chazy River, and 420-acre lots in the interior. An enlisted man was entitled to one of each, while an officer could have two. Balloting for the lots took place on the Little Chazy on August 28, 1786. Recipients were supposed to pay 40 shillings (\$5) for each detailed survey. The state's Balloting Book contained 227 names, including 30 officers. While most of the men had come from Quebec, a relatively few Nova Scotians were rewarded for fleeing their homeland, even if they did not enlist in the American armed forces. Thus the patent has always been known as the Canadian and Nova Scotia Refugee Tract.

On the surface there appear puzzling disparities in numbers: in 1787 a



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total of 169 settlers were receiving rations in the Lake Champlain area. Yet two years earlier 314 were receiving rations at the refugee camps. Further, the Balloting Book listed 227 names of veterans eligible to receive lands. The difference lies in the fact that many of the refugees either sold their lands and settled elsewhere in the States, or returned to Canada.

Many refugees sold their 420-acre lots even if they kept the 80-acre plots. Large numbers of them gave power of attorney to Benjamin Mooers, their former adjutant and Hazen's nephew, or to Pliny Moore or others. In return, these men were supposed to help dispose of the lands, and to pursue their claims with the government. Mooers seized the opportunity to acquire about 37% of the Tract at an average of seven cents an acre, until 1817 he owned 49,400 acres. One area of concentrated holdings, when it later became a town, adopted "Mooers" as its name.

The settlers went through a period of name changes. Some resulted from spelling errors in recording their names on official documents, others from the families anglicizing their own names. Thus, Amlane became Amlong, Boileau became Buylo or Bilow, Paulint became Poling or Poland, and Ausline became Ashline, to the confusion of later genealogists. They received no patents for their lands until 1790 or later because the costs of the surveys had not been paid. Eventually the State assigned Mooers to supervise the final work and collect the costs as best he could. Many settlers found they had to sell a portion of their land in order to keep the rest.

For the first years the settlers, mostly Roman Catholic, suffered religious deprivations. They had been excommunicated by their church in Quebec. They had no priest, and had to go to Canada to be married, if they could find a priest who dared to perform the ceremony. Not until 1818 did a Chambly priest take the area under his wing. Meanwhile, the parish of St. Joseph, the first in northern New York, was established at Corbeau (now Cooperville). Other centers of settlement had also developed at Chazy Landing and Rouses Point. And so the refugees, either not daring or not caring to return to Canada, pioneered new homes and farms in the Champlain Valley.

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AREA YOUTHS WHO ENLISTED IN CIVIL WAR (Youths under age 21 only)

Hundreds of Boys, Some as Young as 15, Were Volunteers

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation conceived in liberty and dedicated to the cause that all men were created equal." November 19, 1863, Abraham Lincoln, then president of the United States, uttered those words as the beginning of the famous Gettysburg address, given on the portion of a battlefield which was dedicated as the final resting place for those who had died there during the Civil War, the war which threatened for a time to make this country a divided nation.

Back nearly a century ago, men of Plattsburgh and surrounding vicinity were shedding their life's blood that this country might live as one nation. It is hard to say just how many people there were residing in this section at that time, but it is reasonable to suppose that there were fewer than there are now, in 1942. It is interesting to note that during the Civil War, hundreds of teen-age boys from this vicinity enlisted their services into the Union Army. They were often as young as 15 and all were sincere in their hope of saving the United States from becoming a divided nation.

Following is a list of young men of this section who voluntarily enlisted into the Union Army from Plattsburgh and surrounding area.

The following notes refer to three priests who served at St. Josephs in Coopersville, N.Y.

Pierre-Marie Mignault was born 8 Sept. 1784 at St. Denis, Quebec. He was ordained 18 October 1812. Father Mignault served as vicaire at Cathedrale of Quebec 1812-1814; missionary at Halifax, Nova Scotia 1814-1817; cure of Chambly 1817-1866 and then retired in 1866 at Montreal. He died November 1868.

Charles Francois Morrison was born at Berthierville on 28 Sept. 1819. He was ordained 16 Oct. 1842. Father Morrison served as cure at Calumet 1842-1843; first cure of L acolle 1843-1846; cure of St. Valentin 1846-1848; cure of Napierville 1854-1877. He died 2 April 1877.

Pierre Jeremie Crevier was born 3 February 1814 at St. Laurent, Montreal. He was ordained 24 January 1841. Father Crevier served many parishes. In the years 1862-1863 he was a missionary at Malone, N.Y. Late in the year 1863 he was serving in Centreville, R.I. He then retired at St. Charles, Quebec, dying 11 May 1875.

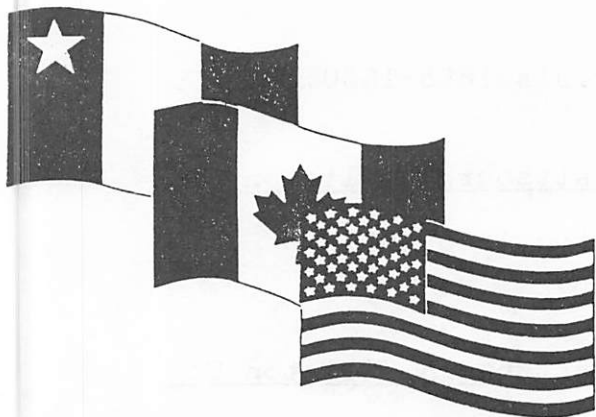

The Brûlé Odyssey

*They sleep beneath their native earth
Far from the spot that gave them birth.
Their gentle ways shall ever dwell
In hearts that knew and loved them well.*

This inscription on a tombstone in a small, rural Wisconsin cemetery; a census entry in Wisconsin and another in Essex county, NY (20 years apart); and brief mention in a county mug-book history of their son William — these were all the clues I had to lead me back to the Quebec ancestry of my great-great-great-grandparents, Henry and Margaret Bruley. And not a word in all that of specific place of origin or of their parents' names. And so, ten years of research dead-ended in the Essex county, NY, 1860 census. Desperately searching for clues, I began tracing other descendants of Henry and Margaret — fortunately so, for I was ready when about three years ago a combination of circumstances opened up over 200 years of fascinating family history in Quebec. These circumstances? The establishment of NNYA-CGS, the publication of various early Catholic church records from Clinton county, Virginia DeMarce's demographic studies that correlated northern New York and Vermont French-Canadian immigrants with their places of origin in Quebec, and contact with several cousins, all descendants of various children of Henry and Margaret Bruley/Brûlé. Fortunately so, because I have yet to discover the c1850 marriage record of their son, my own great-great-grandfather, Abraham Bruley, to Margaret St. George. The family relationship was established through Abraham's baptism record, the marriage records of his known siblings, and the baptisms of two of his (supposedly) 21 children, George and Armenia, in Clinton county churches.

And yet, my odyssey into the past has been far easier and shorter than Henry's and Margaret's journey from a small Quebec town to another small town in central Wisconsin. Their story begins in St-Cuthbert, Berthier county, where Henry was born 14 May 1805, the son of Joseph Brûlé and Marie-Geneviève Desrosiers dit Lafrenière, and baptised as Nérée-Amable the same day by L. Lamotte, priest of the parish. His godfather was Amable Desrosiers-Lafrenière, his maternal uncle; his godmother, Josephite Dutant-Grandpré. Amable (the name he apparently used until sometime before the 1860 census, as he appears as "Amab Brule" in the 1840 census of North Hero, Grand Isle co, VT, but as Henry Breuley in the 1860 census of Willsboro, Essex co, NY) was the eighth of 15 known children of Joseph and Geneviève, all of whom, fortunately, were christened at St-Cuthbert. Again luck was with us, for Amable's youngest brother Onesime/James settled — and remained! — in North Hero, Vt. Though the records James left behind are garbled and incomplete, they gave enough clues so that Virginia DeMarce was able to connect him (and thus his brother Amable) to the Joseph Brûlé/Marie-Geneviève Desrosiers-Lafrenière family in St. Cuthbert. Brother Alexis apparently also moved to the U.S., for his son Honore was baptised in 1855 at St-Joseph-du-Corbeau, Coopersville.

On 21 April 1828 at the parish church of St-Cuthbert, Amable Brulé, farmer and major (that is, of the age of majority — over 21) son of Joseph Brulé and Geneviève Desrosiers ditte Lafrenière, was married to Marguerite Dugat (Dugas), resident of St. Cuthbert, but major daughter of Pierre Dugat, now of the parish of Ste-Elizabeth, and of the late Marguerite Dupuis. Witnessing the marriage were his father Joseph Brulé and his brother-in-law Jean-Baptiste Baril, husband of his older sister Geneviève, and some friends of the couple.

There, for a time, our search paused — for the newly-married couple disappears from St. Cuthbert records — until we traced the Dugas family to Maskinongé, in the neighboring county of the same name. Margaret was born and baptised 4 March 1802 at Maskinongé, daughter of Pierre Dugas-Labréche, farmer of that parish, and of Marguerite Dupuit (Dupuis). Her mother died in 1810 and her father remarried two years later. Amable may have been working (or at least residing) at Maskinongé even before his marriage, for he shows up there first as a witness at the February 1827 marriage of Pierre Dugas-Labréche, his future brother-in-law. Pierre is listed as son of Pierre Labréche, now of the parish of Ste-Elizabeth, and of the late Marguerite Dupuis. Why Amable and Marguerite Dugas married at St-Cuthbert rather than at either Maskinongé or Ste-Elizabeth is not known; possibly Marguerite felt no strong ties to either parish. What is known is that they resided for some time at or near Maskinongé, for their oldest children were born and baptised there:

1. Amable-Nérée, b 2 and bap 3 Feb 1829, son of Amable Brûlé, day-laborer of Maskinongé, and of Marguerite Dugat; godfather, Joseph Dupuis; godmother, Julie Beaulieu
2. Marguerite, b and bap 10 Oct 1830, daughter of Amable Brûlé, farmer of Maskinongé parish, and Marguerite Dugas; godfather Médard Dugas (cousin of Marguerite); godmother, Genevieve Brûlé (Amable's sister)
3. Marie-Julie, b and bap 15 Nov 1832, daughter of Amable Brûlé, farmer of Maskinongé parish, and Marguerite Labréche; godfather, Pierre Labréche (Marguerite's father or brother); godmother, Marie-Anne Brûlé. Julie died 14 and was buried 16 Nov 1834 at Maskinongé, age 2 years, infant daughter of Amable Brûlé, farmer of Maskinongé, and Marguerite Labréche.
4. Dieudonné, b 11, bap 13 Dec 1834, son of Amable Brûlé, farmer of Maskinongé and Marguerite Dugas-Labréche; godfather, Alexis Brûlé (younger brother of Amable); godmother, Julie Desmarais.

There are no further records for the family at Maskinongé, but Virginia DeMarce recently located this entry of Julie's baptism at St-Jean-sur-Richelieu:

5. Julie (C.), b 18 and bap 19 Mar 1837, daughter of Amable Brulé, day laborer, and Marguerite Dugas, of the parish of Maskinongé; godfather, Godefroi Pichet; godmother, Esther Audet. They are listed as "just passing through" — presumably on their way to the U.S.

We do not know for certain where the next child, Maria, was born; most records indicate a New York birthplace, which doesn't seem likely, but some say Quebec. This birthdate is from Wisconsin records:

6. Maria, b 17 June 1839 (she claimed 1837), NY, VT or PQ

Sometime between 1837 and 1840, the young family removed to North Hero, Grand Isle county, Vermont. The 1840 North Hero census lists them with 1 male child age 10-15 (Amable-Nérée/Abraham), 1 male adult age 30-40, 2 females under age 5 (probably Julie and Marie), 1 female 10-15 (Margaret), and 1 female adult 30-40. Presumably Dieudonné, like the first Julie, died in

infancy. Thus far the family as a whole has not been located in 1850 census records, though daughter Margaret and possibly son Abraham do appear, both now married, in Essex county, New York. We presume that the youngest surviving children of Henry (as Nérée-Amable was now known) and Margaret were born in Essex county (birth dates and places from Wisconsin records):

7. Laura P., b 7 April 1841/2 NY
8. William, b 27 Mar 1844, Essex township, Essex co. NY
9. Mary E., b 7 April 1846, NY

Henry and Margaret are listed in the 1860 census of Willsboro township, Essex county. Also listed there are Abram/Abraham and his family; Julia (now married to Frank Paronto) and in the same house, Maria (now married to Peter Bazille); and with their parents, Laura, Nancy (that is, Mary — the census-taker apparently made an error), and William. Margaret, now married to Eli Wood (Charlebois), lived in Saranac township, Clinton county. These seven are the only known surviving children of Henry and Margaret. All were married, and all except Margaret Wood moved to Wisconsin sometime between 1860 and 1870. We don't know exactly when Henry and Margaret joined their children in Wisconsin. If they accompanied their children, they were missed by the census takers, for they do not appear in the 1870 census. They do appear in the 1875 state census and in the 1880 federal census, living alone in a small house on a lot belonging to their son William in Little Wolf township, Waupaca county, Wisconsin. In 1880, Henry is listed as age 82, Margaret, age 83 or 88, both born in Canada. Their actual ages were 75 and 78, but like almost all the Canadian-born who show up, directly or collaterally, on my family tree, they claimed to be older than they actually were!

No other records have been located in Wisconsin; apparently they did not purchase property there, and that's too early for public vital records. Someday perhaps church records will be located. Their only monument is the gray slate tombstone in that Wisconsin cemetery (Little Wolf township, Waupaca co); it now lies broken in two pieces, detached from its base, and reads:

Henry Bruley, died 30 Nov. 1883, age 83 yrs, 6 mo, 14 days
Margaret Bruley, died 5 Dec. 1883, age 85 years, 9 mo, 1 day

At the base, the inscription that began this story of their odyssey testifies to the love their children bore them. Note that both ages are again wrong: Henry, born 14 May 1805, was age 78 years, 6 months and 16 days; and Margaret Dugas Bruley, born 4 March 1802, was 81 years, 9 months, 1 day old. (At least they had the months and days correct!) Nearby in the same cemetery are buried their children Abraham and his wife Margaret (whose tombstone says they were the parents of 21 children, only 7 of whom we've located!); Julia and her husband Frank Paronto; Maria and her husband Peter Brazille/Bozille. Laura and her husband Sorell Garno/Cyrile Galarneau, and Mary and her husband John. B. Terrio are buried in cemeteries in neighboring Waupaca county cities, while William and his wife Sophia Matteson moved to Wood county, WI, and are buried at the Marshfield cemetery. Margaret Bruley Wood's place and date of death are still unknown. The next generations being not quite so cohesive, children and grandchildren scattered throughout Wisconsin and westward.

2. Learn as much as you can about your own ancestor(s) and about known brothers and sisters, cousins, etc. In my case, since I still lack the marriage record of Abraham/ Amable-Nérée Brûlé and Marguerite Laporte-St. George, both the clues that unfolded the above story and the proof of my relationship depend on marriage and baptism records of other family members. Keep an open mind about dates (especially about birth dates recalled in old age or furnished to record-keepers by children, grandchildren, or neighbors) and about names. Quebec records show variant forms of a name; imagine then what an English-speaking record-keeper did to French names!

4. Join one or more genealogical societies researching in your area of interest — especially those publishing a newsletter. Lifelines has been invaluable to me, as has Lost in Canada?, a publication by Joy Reisinger, a professional researcher specializing in Canadian research.

"A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE LIFE AND FAMILY OF CHARLES LeMARQUIS"

(4 Nov 1648---22 Dec 1700)

William H. Marquis # 0001

The North American origins of our Marquis family reaches back to France to Charles LeMarquis and Jeanne Bignon and their son Charles baptised 4 Nov 1648, feast of St-Charles day, in the tiny parish of St-Pierre located in the picturesque little village of Mortagne-sur-Sevre, old province of Poitou (now the department of Vendee) in the northeastern section of France close to the city of Nantes, France. The village of Mortagne-sur-Sevre overlooks the peaceful Sevre-Nantaise river. The information of the baptism of the son Charles was found in the inventory of his property after death. I have not been able to trace back any further in our family for lack of being able to find the marriage record of Charles LeMarquis and Jeanne Bignon. I do have, however, some information on a few Marquis families living in Mortagne-sur-Sevre in the years 1616-1626. (See enclosed letter from French genealogist Colonel P. LeGrand dated 27 November 1979 where he made a special trip to the departmental archives in La Roche-sur-Yon, France.) Enclosed is all he found as most of the records of that area and time were destroyed during the Vendee wars. It is not much but may help some time if I ever find the marriage record of Charles LeMarquis and Jeanne Bignon.

We do not know precisely when young Charles came to New France (Canada) but certainly given his age of twenty-five at the time of his first marriage 18 Sep 1673 to Marguerite Baugrand (Beaugrand) at Notre-dame-du-Quebec, we can safely assume that his immigration occurred shortly before. In 1681 we find that he was living in La Basse Ville as shown by the census of 1681 and according to a map 1685 he was then living in the Place-du-Quebec (now Place-Royal) in the old city of Quebec where he was a tavern keeper. He was the proprietor of "La Croix Blanc Tavern" (The White Cross Tavern). A white cross hung from outside the door which was in the lower level of his house in the Place-du-Quebec, Charles LeMarquis was a "Bourgeois" (middle-class). In 1682 Charles was appointed by the king of France to be a royal hussier (process server-court usher) for which he probably served with no pay.

The first marriage to Marguerite Baugrand (Beaugrand) was in all probability was not a happy one as shown by all the court cases of that time, for they both had very bad tempers. Together they had four children: Marie-Madeleine, Francois, Jean-Francois, and Charles-Michel. Only Marie-Madeleine lived to marry from this first marriage.

Shortly before his twentieth year of marriage to Marguerite our Charles became a widower and on 7 Jan 1698 in the little stone church of Ste-Anne-de-Beaupre, he remarried to Marie-Agnes Giguere the daughter of Robert Giguere and Aymee Miville. Ste-Anne-de-Beaupre is now the site of a famous shrine to which people make pilgrimages from all over the United States and Canada. Taking his young bride back to Quebec City they had two children: Jean-Charles born 16 Jun and died 28 Jun 1699, and Charles-Francois born 23 May 1700. Young Charles-Francois was barely seven months old when his father died. Charles LeMarquis died 22 Dec 1700 and was buried at his own request at the entrance to the Notre-dame-du-Quebec cemetery so as to be humble and be walked on.

His inventory of property after death was twenty-one pages in length which shows he was very well off in his standard of living. His house in the Place-du-Quebec was said to be the finest house there. One only needs to go to Quebec City and visit old Quebec to feel the magic of how life was in the times of Charles LeMarquis.

The names of the owners of the various properties have been copied to the best of my ability from a map of the Town of Ellenburgh contained in F.W.Beer's Atlas of Clinton County, New York, 1869, New York, New York.

In order to locate the sites for anyone's future reference, I used the school districts as the unit. Many of these boundaries were very difficult to establish with some locations being very questionable as to which district they belonged. These I have usually indicated with a question mark.

The names themselves were sometimes hard to read. The script often overlapped other lines or the tails of the letters didn't come through distinctly so a "P" could look like a "B" or an "l" like a "t", etc. The variant spellings found on the map were copied as printed. Some of the ? French names seem to have been phonetic spellings. If I could see a resemblance to a French name, I indicated my "guess" in parentheses.

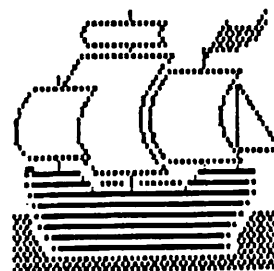

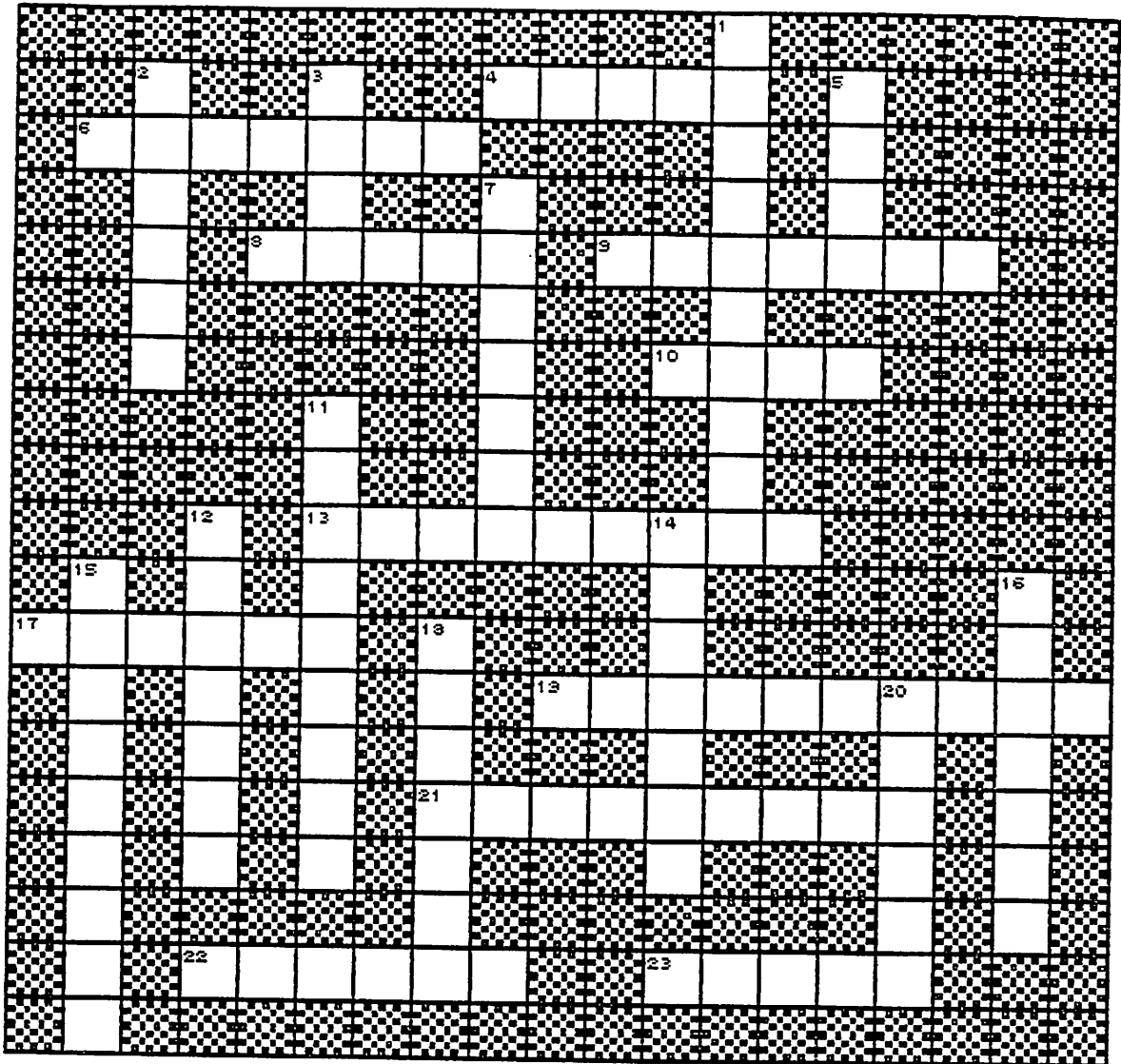

This is the only known record of the first catholic church in Clinton County, New York performed by the priest De la Valiniere the couple had the marriage recorded in their home parish in Champlain, PQ

THE SHIP "ALFRED"

The ship "ALFRED" of the Continental Navy, was originally a merchant ship christened as the "BLACK PRINCE" in early 1775 and sailed under Captain JOHN BARRY. In December 1775, she was re-named the "ALFRED" and its first Captain under that name was DUDLEY SALTONSTALL. Its First Lieutenant was JOHN PAUL JONES, who took over as Captain in August 1776. Earlier on 5 April 1776, in a sea battle, the "ALFRED" was damaged by the "GLASCOW" of the British Navy. The casualties listed as five killed and 7 wounded. On 10 October 1776, the "ALFRED" fell under the Command of Captain ELISHA HINMAN of Connecticut. Finally the "ALFRED" was captured by the British Navy on 10 March 1778. The following is a list of its first crew when she was commissioned as the "ALFRED" in December 1775.

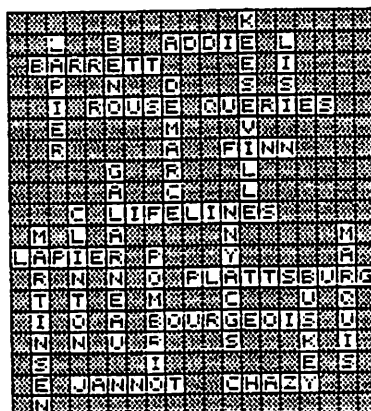

Mothers father, had twin sisters. One named Louise (Fontbriand), but she doesn't remember the other ones name. Louise was married to Fisson Jeanotte. When they were young they were very poor and this woman who was quite well to do and had lost a child recently, begged the mother (Felicite Pontbriand) of the twins to let her have one of the girls and promised to take good care of it (sic). They were Americans and the child was not brought up Catholic. When she became the age to make her first communion, her mother wanted her back but the lady refused to give her back to her mother. They (Eustache and Felicite Pontbriand) went to the law about it and the law told the parents that they either had to pay for the childs board and room all the time this lady had her or if they could steal her, they could keep her. They did get hold of her one day, but the woman saw them and got hold of the child and nearly pulled her arm off. So the parents gave up, rather than hurt her. Mother says she was a handsome woman. This was Louises sister that was given away.

Cousins: from kissing to fourth 4 times removed

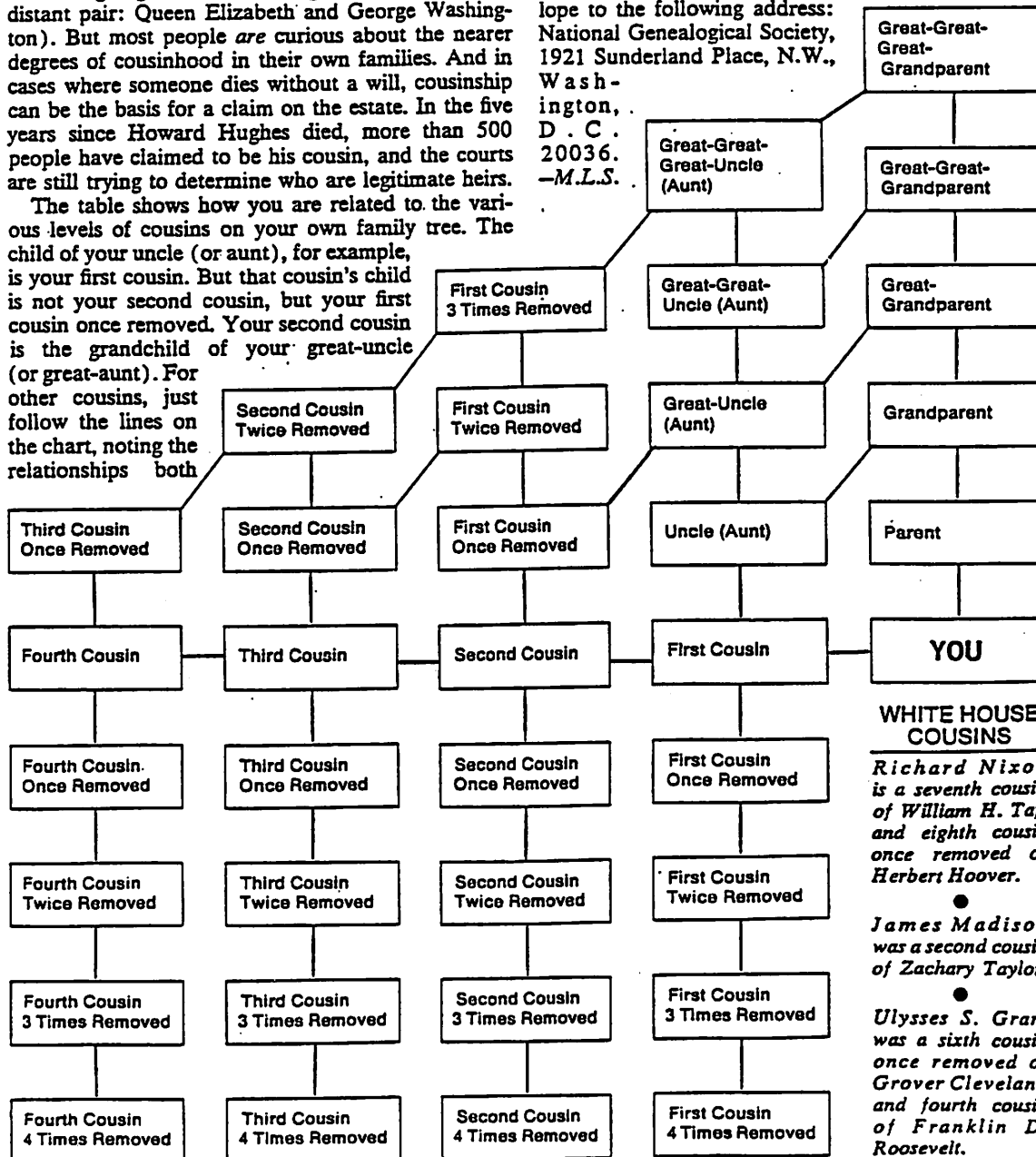
At the time of the royal wedding last July, commentators made much of the fact that Prince Charles' bride, Diana, was a seventh cousin of the late Humphrey Bogart—that is, they had the same great-great-great-great-great-grandparents.

That's going a bit far in tracing cousins (a still more distant pair: Queen Elizabeth and George Washington). But most people *are* curious about the nearer degrees of cousinhood in their own families. And in cases where someone dies without a will, cousinship can be the basis for a claim on the estate. In the five years since Howard Hughes died, more than 500 people have claimed to be his cousin, and the courts are still trying to determine who are legitimate heirs.

The table shows how you are related to the various levels of cousins on your own family tree. The child of your uncle (or aunt), for example, is your first cousin. But that cousin's child is not your second cousin, but your first cousin once removed. Your second cousin is the grandchild of your great-uncle (or great-aunt). For other cousins, just follow the lines on the chart, noting the relationships both

up and down from where you are on the family tree.

In August 1690, rumors began to circulate around Montreal and all the villages around, that the English were making plans to invade Montreal. The villages that laid south of that great city were in its path. The news came as a surprise, but yet it was an obvious retaliation for the French raids of the previous winter. New York raised such a pitch of fury that only direct action could give them some relief, and New England agreed. The assault plans were very basic, the invasion would fall in two parts. First, the fleet would advance by way of the St. Lawrence, to Quebec, and the other was overland against Montreal.

The Chevalier de CLERMONT, in command of the militia guards between Villemarie and Sorel, was sent to scout as far as Lake Champlain for signs of the enemy. Below the Richelieu River, the scouting party heard gun shots, and set out very carefully to investigate. They discovered camp fires and by approaching closer, during the night they saw eight boats of the English landing eighteen to twenty men each on the Isle de la Motte. With de CLERMONT, there were no more than thirty men and they feared detection, so late during the night de CLERMONT's scouts sailed south around the Island and took up a position deep into the enemy territory. For two days they watched the English activities. He sent two of his boats to Chambly to carry the news while he and the rest remained hidden and spied.

From the falls of Chambly, the Sieur de la BRUERE was sent to Villemarie with the news of the English advance. He arrived at about 11 o'clock in the evening on the 29th of August, but unfortunately too late. For in the meantime, LA PLAQUE, a renowned warrior of the Christian Iroquois of the Sault, a nephew of the Chief, related to FRONTENAC, the Governor of Canada, that the English had travelled up Lake Champlain and were making their way to Villemarie by the Richelieu.

FRONTENAC rushed across the St. Lawrence to Laprairie leading twelve hundred men to meet the enemy. They waited here for three days. Scouts were constantly on the prowl looking for signs of the invaders, but no traces were found. Then on the 22nd of August, the Governor left a small garrison in the village and departed with the rest of his troops to re-cross the St. Lawrence and distributed his troops in the nearby settlements.

He had just arrived in Villemarie on the 23rd of August when the roar of cannons at Laprairie announced that the English were attacking. Unknown to the French, but the English forces had diminished considerable. The small party of soldiers under Captain JOHN SCHUYLER, fell so suddenly on the village that the soldiers, villagers, women and children were all taken by surprise while harvesting in the fields. The English suffered only one loss, a Mohawk Indian who was killed. But the French were left with six killed and nineteen taken prisoners. Many of the buildings were set afire outside of the stockade, and over one hundred and fifty head of cattle were slaughtered.

Captain JOHN SCHUYLER, brother to Major PETER SCHUYLER, with twenty nine troops and one hundred Mohawks, had departed Petit Sault (Whitehall, N.Y.) on the 13th of August. They were joined at Ticonderoga by Captain GLEN and his band of thirteen whites and five Indians. By way of Lake Champlain and the Richelieu River, (it was at this juncture where they were seen by de CLERMONT on Ile La Motte) then on to Chambly. Here they left their boats behind, and marched by land to Laprairie.

After the attack, they began a leisurely retreat towards their hidden boats without being pursued. But, by accident, they ran into a party of two hundred and eighty Canadians and Indians. After a hit and run skirmish, they continued on their way and realized a loss of fifty three dead and twenty five wounded. A small loss though, as to compare with the French loss of two hundred and an undisclosed number wounded, not to mention the nineteen prisoners.

Captain JOHN SCHUYLER's party arrived at Fort Orange on the 30th of August and reported his accomplishments to General WINTHROP. The General was elated at the success of the mission, but was left ashamed for he had not the energy and confidence to lead that expedition in the first place.

In the meantime, Sir WILLIAM PHIPPS led his ships towards Quebec. What he thought would be an easy victory, found himself repulsed. Instead of a weakly manned garrison, he was forced with the whole strength of the French Colony, led by FRONTENAC, a soldier every way his superior in military knowledge and capacity. Immediately after the attack at Laprairie, FRONTENAC took his troops quickly to Quebec to greet the English. He had time to reach Quebec, while PHIPPS fleet encountered many delays on the way, and did not arrive until the 5th of October.

In the following year, another small English army got as far as Laprairie, but a stubborn fight ensued from which the Canadians emerged victorious. But not without the loss of precious lives. All of Canada was now suffering from the constant Iroquois attacks. One never knew when they would strike, nor where. They would swoop down upon unsuspecting citizens without any compunction. The long drawn out agony assumed many forms, and went beyond the actual fighters. Everyone felt the pinch of hunger, for most field laid idle and cattle unattended. No one dared work without guards. It was trying times for the French.

The following translation is provided in the event that it may be of general interest to your readers. The article appeared in the Quebec LE QUOTIDIEN and the Montreal LE DEVOIR, both on 26 February, under the byline of Bernard Racine.

Quebec (PC) - A series of books on the origin of French Canadian families, published in Quebec, is translated into English and more are sold in the US than in Canada.

Thomas J. Laforest, the American author who translates and adapts the books, is not surprised since, as he observes, 13 million Americans of French Canadian descent (Ed. note-US census figures) are eager to learn about their origins and heritage.

It was more than this fact alone which made Laforest, a resident of Oldsmar, Florida, take an interest in the genealogy of Quebec families.

His grandfather, Dosithee Laforest, was born at Baie Saint-Paul, lived at various places in Quebec, and finally emigrated to Michigan's UP where he was known as Dexter Laforest. His son Tom senior was born in Calumet and sent back to Quebec to study at the Seminary of Laval University. Eventually this son returned to the States, married and settled in Detroit.

It was through the influence of his father that Tom junior learned to appreciate the fact and folklore of his heritage going back to the early days of New France in America.

Eventually young Tom Laforest made a 30 year career in the US Navy and retired after many interesting tours of duty which included a two year stay in France. This was followed by a dozen years of teaching geography and history at the Saint Petersburg Junior College in Clearwater, Florida.

After retiring for a second time in 1983, Tom and his sister Jacqueline Parent of Detroit, visited Quebec to learn first hand about the land of their ancestors and, if possible, to trace their own heritage.

Their inquiries led them to Saint-Lin, the last known residence of Dosithee in Quebec, to Sorel, Montreal, Quebec City, Baie Saint-Paul, and finally to Saint Anne de Beaupre to meet a famous specialist in Quebec genealogy.

They met Father Gerard Lebel who, in collaboration with Jacques Saintonge of Quebec, publishes a series of Volumes entitled NOS ANCETRES. Each Volume recounts in some 175 pages, the story of about 25 of the original ancestors. There are now 14 Volumes with two more in preparation.

Quite effortlessly, Tom and Jacqueline learned from Volume IX of the series that their own roots grew from a certain Pierre Laforest who, seven generations ago, came from France to settle on the Beaupre coast of New France.

Before the Laforest interest in genealogy developed, Father Lebel was flooded with requests for information from Franco Americans across the border. Thus, after an exchange of a few letters, quite naturally he suggested that Tom Laforest translate the series NOS ANCETRES for the benefit of those no longer conversant in their original mother tongue.

Tom Laforest signed a contract with the two Quebecers and took on the task. He has, to date, published 6 of the 14 Volumes in English and manages to put out two a year. His most recent trip to Quebec for consultations with his collaborators resulted in this interview.

Tom is now translating Volume VII in the series which he calls OUR FRENCH CANADIAN ANCESTORS. Each of these Volumes, over 300 pages, contains in addition to the translation of the French text, a glossary to help the readers understanding, an index of names for tracing family roots, a bibliography for dedicated genealogists, maps for historians and two chapters devoted exclusively to the heritage and culture of New France.

"The people down there (USA) are very interested, not only in learning about their ancestors way of life but about the history of those times as well," he explained. Tom sells his books by direct mail from a customer list which includes Public Libraries, Schools and Colleges as well as Historical and Genealogical Societies, not to mention a loyal following of hundreds of individuals.

"His market is even better than in Quebec" says Jacques Saintonge, one of the French authors, who went on to explain that for the first time in his life he was receiving royalties as an author, from the American editions.

THE CHILDREN OF JACQUES ROUSE

Virginia DeMarce

I would like to thank Peg Barcomb, Historian of Rouses Point, N.Y., and Mrs. Carlton Peterson, a Rouse descendent, for sharing much of the information that made this analysis possible.

Legend says that Jacques Rouse and his wife had twenty-six children. This is highly unlikely and unconfirmed by the records. Most censuses indicate a reasonable number--about seven or eight. In 1787, he had a family of four. The 1790 census of Clinton Co., Town of Champlain, lists James Rous with one free white male under 16; one free white male over 16; and four free white females.

The 1800 census, the one census which shows him with a huge household, must be read in light of the fact that he kept an inn, which may have meant that on a given day the census taker included all the lodgers and employees [plus possible children of the employees if there were a married couple] in the census taken there. The 1800 census of the Town of Champlain, Clinton Co., N.Y., does show Jacques Rouse with 3 males under 10; no males 10-16, 5 males 16-26, 2 males 26-45, and one male 45 and up; 3 females under 10, one female 10-16, 2 females 16-26, 1 female 26-45, and 1 female 45 and up. It is manifest that between 1790 and 1800, he had not somehow managed to acquire four additional sons aged between 16 and 26!

The 1810 census of Clinton Co. shows Jacques Rouse with:
[I have to re-check this census data--incomplete here]

The 1820 census of Clinton Co., Town of Champlain, shows Jacques Rouse with two males 45 and up; 1 female 16-26, and 2 females 26-45. It is PROBABLE that the males over 45 are Jacques and his brother Michel, who is not listed separately on this census. The female 16-26 is probably his daughter Sophia, who did not marry and later seems to have kept house for her Uncle Michel. I have no suggestions for the identity of the older women.

In any case, the following children seem to be more or less confirmed:

- 1.1 Laurence/Laur/Lane Rouse, b. c. 1781/83, and oldest son. Said to have died in an accident (possibly by drowning in Lake Champlain), aged about 14 years. See the Rev. Daniel Taylor, The Shores of Lake Champlain.
- 1.2 Mary Rouse, b. c. 1783/1790--d. 1868. m. Charles White of Clinton County, New York, who apparently died before 1850. [Some Rouse family genealogists have suggested that this name was an

anglicization of Leblanc, but it does not appear as Leblanc in any of the records]. In 1830, Charles Whyte/Whity of Rouses Point, N.Y., was mentioned in correspondence between John W. Bailey and Col. D.B. McNeil, Collector of the Customs, Plattsburgh, N.Y. (NARS Microfilm Publications M 804, Roll 1057, Revolutionary War Pension File of John Gauley).

- 1.2.1 Sophie White. m. 5 January 1846, COOP, Pierre Luck/Lock, son of Pierre Luck and Noria Bouvette. Witnesses were Fabien Fissett, Adolphe Morin, and Francois Dubuc. The record was signed by Patrick O'Byrne, Exavier Picard, Francis Picard, X. Luck, Fabien Fesett.

Peter Luck Sr. and his wife Elnorie Esther are buried in the St. Patrick's cemetery at Rouse's Point, N.Y. The repertoire of Clinton Co. Catholic marriages read her name as Marie Bouvette rather than as Noria Bouvette.

Peter Locke (Sr.) was on the 1830 census of the Town of Champlain, Clinton Co., N.Y. Peter Lock/Luck Sr., was probably a brother of the Samuel Lock (Jr.) who m. (1) Sally Lussier and (2) Julia Monty, and thus most likely a son of Samuel Lock (Sr.) and Marie Cousineau of Montreal. Pierre Lock, spouse of Leonard Bubet, was buried 6 May 1866, St. Patrick's, Rouses Point, N.Y. Witnesses were Israel Marny and Pierre Lock.

The 1850 census, Town of Champlain, Clinton Co., N.Y., shows: Peter Luck, age 41, b. Canada; Eleanor Luck, age 48, b. Canada; Peter Luck, age 23, born N.Y.; Sophia Luck, age 24, b. N.Y.; Mary White, age 60, b. N.Y.

- 1.2.1.1 Marie Lock [dau. Pierre Lock and Sophie Withers] b. 15 October 1846, baptized 25 December 1846, COOP. Godparents: Pierre Lock and Eleonore Bouvette.

- 1.2.1.2 Adeline Lock, [dau. Pierre Lock and Sophie Sweet], b. 3 July 1850, baptized 21 July 1850, COOP. Godparents: Francois Perreault and Charlotte Demers.
(Same as "Miss Della Luck, an artist, died in 1905 at age 58?)

- 1.2.1.3 Charles Jacques Lock, [son of Pierre Georges Lock and Sophie], b. March 1854, baptized 8 October 1854, COOP. Godparents: David Vincelen and Mary Sara.

"Louis Rouse dies in Manitowoc.
Death of An Old Citizen: The Manitowoc Herald mentions the death in the village on the 19th of Judge Lewis Rouse, aged 63. Judge Rouse was a native of Rouse's Point, Lake Champlain, New York, but had been a resident of Wisconsin nearly 30 years, most of the time living in Green Bay. He received the appointment of Judge of the North West District while Wisconsin Territory was attached to the jurisdiction of Michigan. His death was very sudden and was supposed to have been caused by apoplexy.
The 1850 census, Brown Co., Wis., shows Lewis Rouse, age 60, farmer, b. Canada, with wife Alconsh, age 54, born Michigan. His apparent children were:

- 1.4.3 William J. Rouse, b. c. 1834, Canada or N.Y.

- 1.4.4 Mary V. Rouse, b. c. 1838, Canada.

REPORT OF THE HOME OF THE FRIENDLESS

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
OF CLINTON COUNTY

Dec. 5, 1877

17.3.1874 Male child, about 11 months old, was brought from the Co. House, April 1875. He was adopted by John Shelden, of Plattsburgh; since moved to Burlington, Vt.

15.7.1874 John Elsworth Ward was brought from the Co. House, an orphan and cripple, about 12 years of age at that time. Was born at Mooers. He is still at the Home, but failing rapidly.

21.7.1874 Jane Martin, a woman about 40 years old, came from Beekmantown without relatives. Is still in the Home.

6.11.1874 Louis, a French boy, 12 years of age, was brought to the Home to shield him from cruelty of his parents. Jan. 1875 was compelled to leave by his father.

9.11.1874 Mrs. Baker came to the Home, an aged and feeble woman. June 1877 she went to visit some friends. Has not returned.

16.1.1875 Joseph Henry Dragon, and orphan from town of Plattsburgh sent to the Home by Mr. Erno. About 8 years of age. 18.7.1877 was adopted by Mr. Ernest Lafontaine of Keeseville.

4.4.1875 Charles Henry Denton came to the Home. Mother a pauper now in County House. From town of Peru. Was about 6 months old. Is still in Home.

16.4.1875 Lottie Winnie Triffley was taken to the Home by Mrs. V.A. Wood of West Chazy. Sept. 12, 1876 was indentured to Mrs. Charles Moore of Champlain.

23.6.1875 Chloe Calia Dragon came from town of Peru; 13 years of age.

16.4.1876 she was sent to the N.Y. Eye Infirmary for treatment. After 6 months of skillful care, she was pronounced incurable, and was placed in the Blind Asylum in N.Y.C. where she is now. We hear from her occasionally that she is happy and learning as the blind are taught.

20.8.1875 Mrs. Betsy Simmons came from Peru. She is a widow over 80 years of age. Is still in the Home but very feeble indeed.

18.10.1875 Miss Ellen Scully came from Westport, Essex Co. aged 57 years. Is still in the Home.

20.8.1875 Sarah Ann Dixon was brought from the Co. House, aged 2½ years. From the town of Mooers. Ap. 8 1876 she was adopted by Mrs. E.G. Ferriss of Morrisonville.

22.1.1876 Alfred Jelly came upon Mr. Erno's order. About 3½ years old. Is still in the home.

25.3.1876 Mary Louise Deyette about 6 years old. Also Edward Deyette her brother about 8 years old. Came upon Mr. Erno's order. June 2, 1877 Mary was adopted by Mr. Richard of West Alburgh. Eddie is still in the Home.

7.4.1876 Edward Cuddy came upon Mr. Erno's order. Aged 12 years. Is still an inmate.

2.5.1876 Frederick Allen, aged 5 years, and his brother Franklin 3 years, came from Morrisonville, are orphans. Still inmates, Upon Mr. Ernos's order.

16.6.1876 Lucy (Daisy) Nims, aged 3 years, and her brother, Henry Nims, aged 5 years. Came from Port Kent. Brought by Mr. H.G. Stevens, poor master of Keeseville. August 22 Lucy was adopted by Mr. Christian of Saranac. April 4, 1877, Henry was adopted by the same Parties.

27.6.1876 Sarah Spooner over 40 years of age. Came from Plattsburgh. Remained but 2 months.

14.7.1876 Elizabeth Prindle of Chateauguay, was brought to the Home by her mother. Aged 7 years. Sept. 21 she was adopted by Mrs. Getteys of Beekmantown.

21.9.1876 James Patrie, Poor Master of Champlain, brought 3 children from that town, named Mayon. Mary aged 9 years, Louisa aged 3 years, George aged 6 years. They were removed by Poor Master Oct. 7th.

9.11.1876 Mrs. Cole came to the Home from Westport. She is a widow without relatives, and over 70 years of age. Is still inmate.

16.1.1877 G.W. Swartwout, Overseer of Poor, Rouses Pt. brought a child 2 years old to the Home, named Ida Leganard. She being under age, was removed by Mr. Erno to County House the same day.

30.1.1877 Matilda Brockaney was brought to the home by Mr. Erno, 8 years of age. Mother not living; father intemperate. Still an inmate.

22.3.1877 George Hayes was brought by Mr. Erno to the Home. An orphan 10 years of age. May 11. George was indentured to Mr. Thew of Saranac.

22.5.1877 Martha June Paterson, age 7 years, also Annie May Paterson age 5 years were brought to the Home by their mother from Ferrona, upon order of Robert Chatterton, Overseer of Poor, town of Ausable. They are now inmates.

26.4.1877 Laura Blavin age 8 years and her sister Nellie Blavin age 5 years came to the Home from Champlain. They are half Orphans.

25.6.1877 Mrs. Martha Barber came to the Home from Elizabethtown. She is an aged woman about 74 years. Widow and feeble; has no relatives and is without means of support.

25.6.1877 Three sisters -Lottie Shaw aged 7 years, Elsie Shaw aged 5 years, Cora aged 3 years were brought to the Home by their mother, who lives in Woods Falls. She retained her infant. Has been deserted by her husband. These three little girls are at this date in the Home, but an application for Lottie (the oldest) to be adopted, is now under consideration by the Board, will probably be considered favorable.

20.9.1877 Sophronai Delani, a woman over 60 years, came from Wilmington. Is without relatives or means of support.

This list of person was extracted from the Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of Clinton County, New York. The volumes published for the years 1876-1890 were examined. No further information could be found on these individuals.

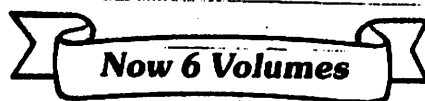


LEGAL AGE

GENEALOGICAL NOTE

SOME CLINTON CO., N.Y. LANDRY FAMILIES DESCENDED FROM A SISTER OF JACQUES ROUSE

Several years ago, while I was entertaining myself reading the church registers of St-Luc Parish along the Richelieu River in Canada, I came across the following entry:

Buried 28 February 1824, Louise Rousse, wife of the late Jean Baptiste Landry, died suddenly day before yesterday, at the age of sixty-six.

At the time, this pricked my interest, as Landry is an Acadian name--the possibility of a connection with Jacques Rouse of Clinton Co., N.Y., came to mind immediately. At the time, however, I checked in Arsenault's reference and found that he claimed that Louise Rousse, the daughter of Louis Rousse and Marie Comeau, who was born in 1758 had been buried in 1766 at Yamachiche. Therefore, I dismissed the possibility from my mind.

Subsequent research on the Rouse family in the original church registers of Yamachiche, however, indicated that Arsenault was incorrect.

The children of Louis Rouse dit Languedoc and Marie Comeau, as identified by Arsenault and by Fr. Adrien Bergeron following his lead, were:

Louis, b. c. 1752, at Chipoudy--buried 20 September 1755, Quebec.

Marie-Louise, b. 1755, Chipoudy--bap. 1756, Quebec; buried 1757, Quebec.

Marie-Louise, b. 1758, Quebec; buried 1766, Yamachiche.

Angelique, bap. 1759; buried 1760, St-Pierre-les-Becquets.

Rene, bap. 16 September 1764, Yamachiche.

Magdeleine, baptized 1765, Yamachiche; buried there 23 April 1766.

Marie-Anne, baptized 17 October 1765, Yamachiche.

Genevieve, baptized 1766, Yamachiche; buried there 7 January 1767.

Michel, baptized 26 September 1768, Yamachiche.

Through gathering a wide variety of information, it was possible to demonstrate a very strong likelihood that Jacques Rouse, b. c. 1753/54, was part of this family, and to show definitely from the written records at Yamachiche that there was one more daughter.

The Yamachiche entries are as follow [summary translation of LDS microfilm reel 1,288,924]. Church Registers, Ste-Anne-de-Yamachiche:

- p. 284. 16 September 1764, baptized Rene, son of Louis Rousse and Marie Comaut. Godfather Michel Grigner; godmother Agatt Blaze.
- p. 303. 17 October 1765, baptized Marie Anne and Marie Madeleine, legitimate daughters of Louis Rousse and Marie Comaud. Godparents: Jacques Bellemare and Marie Anne Gelina; Alexis Gelina and Marie Anne Herou.
- p. 315. 23 April 1766. Buried Marie-Madeleine Rousse.
- p. 315. 17 May 1766. Buried Louise Rousse, age 18 months.
[Note: this can NOT be the child Marie-Louise born in 1758 at Quebec because of the age: it is more likely a later-born child for whom no baptism has yet been located. By age alone, it would be a burial for the child baptized as Rene! If the priest wrote "eighteen" by mistake for "eight", it would be the other twin girl, Marie-Anne.]
- p. 324. 9 December 1766, baptized Genevieve, daughter of Louis Rousse and Marie Commeaux. Godfather Joseph Laserte; godmother Marie Anastasie Commeaux. [She was buried at Yamachiche, 7 January 1767: p. 325.]
- p. 359. 16 September 1768, baptized Michel, legitimate son of Louis Rousse and Marie Comau. Godfather Michel Gelina; godmother Francoise Bellemare.
- p. 381. 19 August 1770, baptized Marie Joseph, legitimate daughter of Louis Rousse and Marie Commeau. Godfather Jacques Rousse; godmother Marie Anne Gailloux. [She was buried at Yamachiche, 8 September 1770, p. 381.]

With the Yamachiche records indicating that in fact the Louise born in 1758 did not die prematurely, my interest in the deceased Louise of St-Luc, wife of Jean-Baptiste Landry, revived. Upon re-checking the repertoire of Yamachiche marriages at the Library of Congress, nothing of interest showed up. However, when I returned to Fr. Bergeron's Le Grand Arrangement des Acadiens au Quebec, Montreal, Editions Elysee, 1981, I looked not at Rousse dit Languedoc, but at Landry, in an attempt to approach the matter from the opposite direction. There, although Louise was counted as dead-as-a-child in the Rousse family entry, she got married in the Landry family entry:

Vol. 4, p. 291. Jean-Bte Landry, b. 1757 (son of Joseph-Rene Landry who married in 1754 to Madeleine Doiron) married 20 February 1778 at Yamachiche to Louise Rousse (dau. of Louis Rousse and Marie Comeau).

Bergeron does not trace their children. Records of Richelieu River area parishes, however, indicate that this couple had at least three children who survived to marry:

Louise Landry, dau. of J.B. Landry and Louise Rousse, m. 9 November 1812, St-Luc, to Christophe Stam, son of Martin Stam and Josette Mineur.

Charles Landry, son of J.B. Landry and Louise Rousse, m. 27 April 1829, St-Jean-d'Iberville, Catherine Mirhon/Miron, dau. of Joseph Miron and Charlotte Provost.

Laurent Landry, son of J.B. Landry and Louise Rousse, m. 1 June 1829, St-Jean-d'Iberville, Marie Anne Moquin, dau. of Louise Moquin and Charlotte Tremblay.

Of these couples, Charles Landry and his wife Catherine Miron settled in Clinton Co., N.Y. It is at least POSSIBLE that the 1829 marriage at St-Jean-d'Iberville will have been a rehabilitation, for their son Charles Landry marries 8 September 1846 at St. Joseph du Corbeau, Coopersville, to Louise Desroches. Others of their children to marry in the county are Marguerite 1847 at Corbeau to Francois Cote and Melie in 1848 at Corbeau to Charles Witelee. The Armand/Herman/Hermenegilde Landry we find at Corbeau married to Vitaline Desroches may also have been one of their sons, married about 1842 or somewhat earlier. There are some clues which indicate that the Lucie Landry who was married to Pierre Rouet/Rouette/Wheel and lived at Rouses Point and Keeseville also belonged to this family.

Sophie Caroline Stem, dau. of Christophe Stem and Marie Louise Landry, was married 25 November 1834 at St-Jean-d'Iberville to Basile Richard, son of Alexis Richard and Marie Anne Bissonnet. This is an interesting family, for Martin Stam was a German mercenary soldier who came to Quebec to serve in the British army during the American Revolution. He was a Hesse-Hanau Chasseur under Col. von Creutzbourg, Capt. von Wittgenstin's Company. Marie Joseph Mineur, wife of Martin Stam, butcher in this parish, was buried 24 May 1814, St-Luc, died at the same place the day before yesterday in the evening, aged about fifty years. The marriage record has not been found.

Only her death record and the marriage record of her son Christophe indicate her family name as Mineur. Baptisms of her other children refer to her as Marie-Josephte Laurent. The series of baptisms begins at Lacadie on 10 January 1790 with the baptism of Jacques Chretien, son of Martin Stam and Josephte

Laurent; 19 September 1791 Marie Louise, dau. of Martin Stam and Josephthe Laurent [the father signs]; 25 December 1792, Marie Susanne, dau of Martin Stam and Josephthe Laurent; 13 June 1794, Marie Josephthe, dau. of Martin Stam and Josephthe Laurent (buried 29 September same year).

On 5 April 1797 at Chambly, there is the baptism of Martin Stam, born yesterday of the legitimate marriage of Martin Stam and Josette Laurent his wife (buried 14 November 1801 as son of Martin Stam, blacksmith of this parish, and Josephthe Laurent; 27 May 1801 the baptism of Martin, son of Martin Stam and Josephthe Laurent (buried 5 March 1802); on 6 February 1804 the burial of Josephthe Stam, age 3 years [probably born early in 1800], dau. of Martin Stam butcher in this parish and Josephthe Laurent; 15 February 1804, burial of Susanne Stamme, dau. of Martin Stam, butcher in this said parish and Josephthe Laurent, died the twelfth age twelve years.

I was not collecting information systematically on this Stam family, so there may well be more entries in the parish registers of the area. Given how closely the baptisms follow one another, it is reasonable to presume that Christophe, married in 1812, was an oldest son, born circa 1788.

A Christophe Strom, widower of Marguerite Funel, married in 1880 at Corbeau to Celanie Bessette.

The material gathered here is only preliminary, containing a great many clues and suggestions about the direction in which further work on this family may be taken.

There is an error in the St-Anicet, PQ marriage repertoire it says Olivier Genier married Ellen-Elisabeth Higgins daughter of John Higgins and Honora O'Connor. He did not marry Ellen-Elisabeth Higgins he married Odina Quenneville daughter of Napoleon Quenneville and Elizabeth Quesnal and then moved his family to Genier, Ont. where most of the descendants reside today. Ellen-Elisabeth daughter of John Higgins and Honora O'Connor in fact married Jean Saumier son of Isaac Saumier and Mathilda Lebanc 09 Jan 1899 and is listed in the marriage repertoire. Living descendants today know this to be in error as they knew their grandmother very well. I have over 500 Genier marriages on file, will answer all Genier queries. 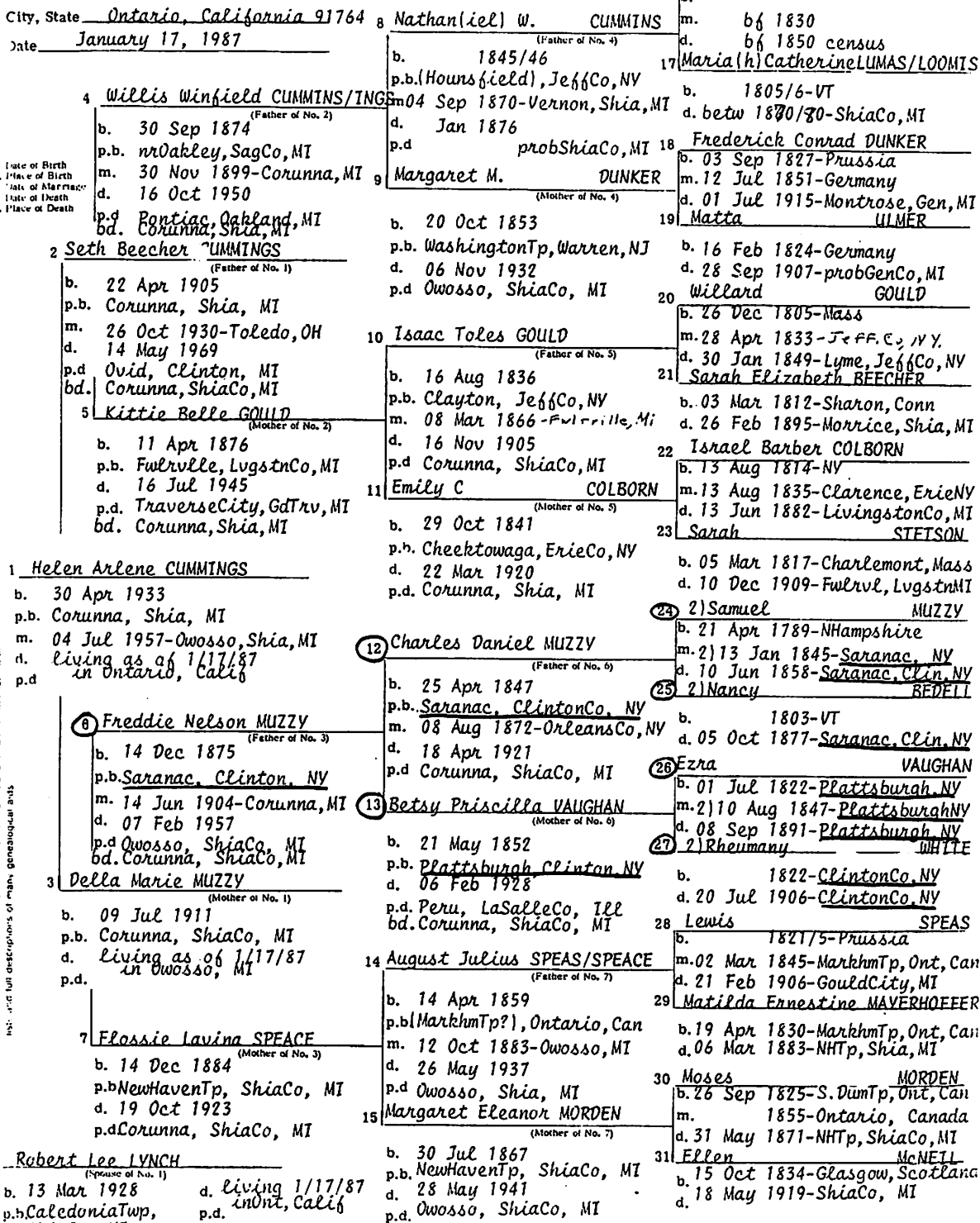

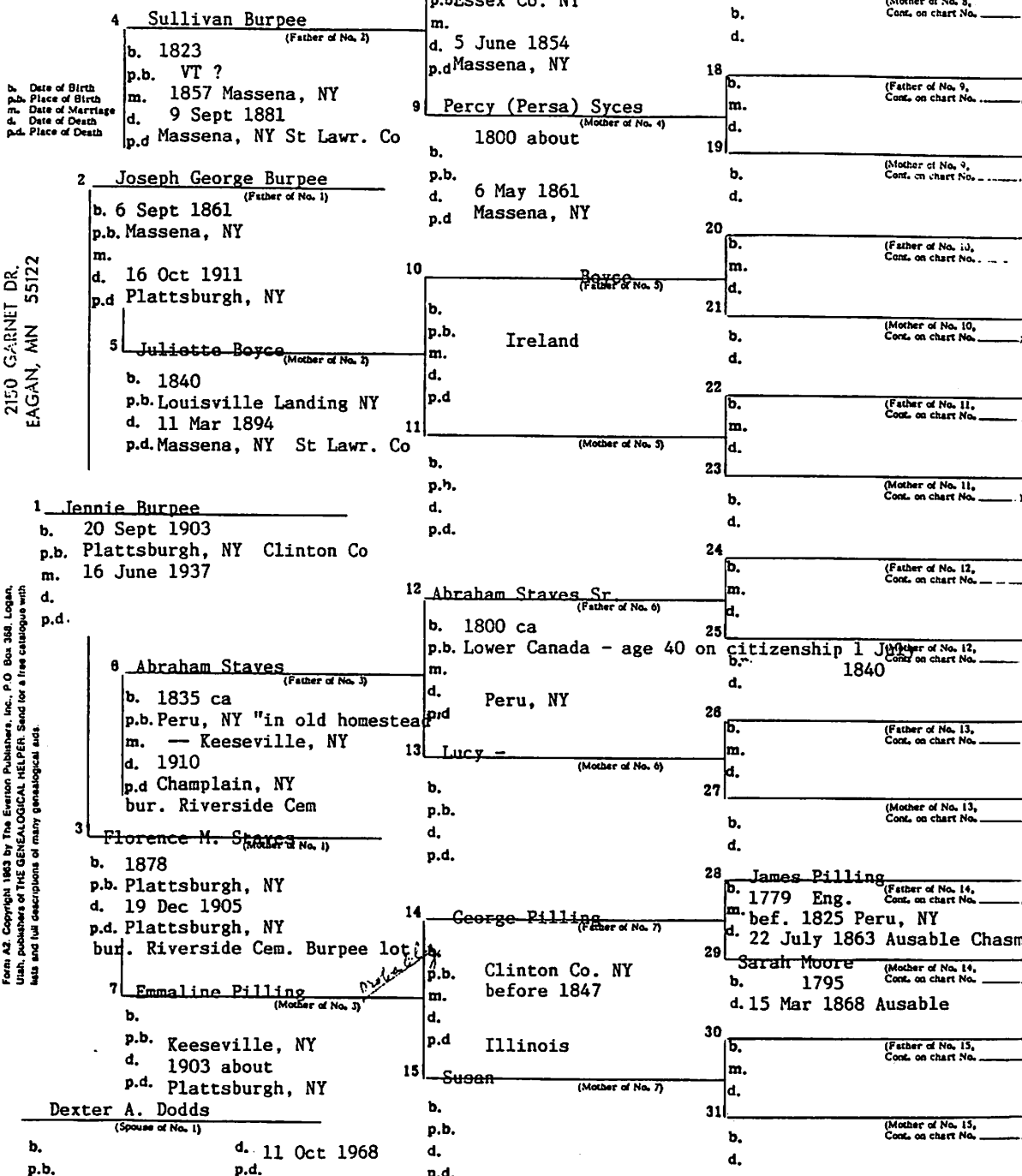


