

THE FENIAN RAIDS ON THE NEW YORK FRONTIER Hereward Senior # 0395 From a talk given at our spring 1988 conference

Border areas are usually scenes of warfare. Before the arrival of Europeans, what is now the New York frontier was a scene of conflict between Algonquins and Iroquois; then, between French and Dutch, French and English, and finally between British and Americans. Formal warfare came to an end in 1815. But informal warfare continued. There were the raids of the Hunter Lodges in 1838-1839 and, at the close of the American Civil War, the subject of my present paper—the Fenians raids.

These raids involved a series of clashes between Fenian veterans of the American Civil War, organized as a voluntary association, and the Canadian militia, backed by a number of British regular troops. Between these were the regular troops of the U.S. Army, doing their best to keep the Fenians from crossing the frontier. In this respect, there was an Alice in Wonderland situation. You could not punish the Fenians before they committed the crime. Once they had crossed the frontier, U.S. forces could put them under arrest.

The Fenian Brotherhood was founded in 1857 on the initiative of Irish Americans, the first new world organization designed to influence old world politics. Its conception was simple. Irish Americans would provide money and trained officers in support of an underground movement in Ireland, intent on securing the independence of Ireland from Great Britain.

Nothing much happened for nine years. Then, at the close of the American Civil War, the Fenian ranks were swelled by about 30,000 veterans. Money flowed into the Fenian treasury. A mansion was rented on Union Square in New York, and there was an abundance of war surplus available at reasonable prices. Canada was the obvious target for any force that the Fenians were able to organize. But the titular head of the American Fenians, John O'Mahony, rejected all Canadian projects. In the fall of 1865, the Fenian organization split, with one wing, under the Fenian Senate headed by William Roberts, preparing to invade Canada. The other wing clung to the Will o' the Wisp of an Irish uprising.

Meanwhile, what about public opinion in the U.S. and Canada? A few American Senators, inclined towards "Manifest Destiny," encouraged the Fenians. But there was much hostility, and a general inclination to dismiss the Fenians as mere sound and fury. One group which the Fenians looked to for sympathy were the Franco-Americans. Like the Irish, the Franco-Americans had created an organization based on French-Canadian veterans who had fought in the Civil War. They held a convention in New York City in the fall of 1865 and their connections reached as far as California. They were resolved on two things—one, that the proposed Confederation of the British North American provinces was a reactionary imperialist plot; and second, that annexation to the U.S. was the obvious solution to Canadian difficulties. 2

These Franco-Americans were on speaking terms with the Fenians, and discussed the question of Irish independence at a conference held at Corning, New York, on 27 March 1866. This conference was presided over by Dr. N. Cadieux of Elmira, New York, a former surgeon in the Union Army. Understandably, the projected Fenian invasion of Canada came up for consideration. As the discussion heated up, it became evident that the Franco-Americans were horrified by the idea. 3 Unlike the Irish, French Canadians had

no revolutionary tradition, apart from their brief flirtation with rebellion in 1837-38.

Dr. Cadieux denounced the scheme, asking why the Fenians should "make war on two million French Canadians who sympathized strongly with all oppressed nations, who would be happy to see Ireland free, but would be forced to take up arms against the invaders." Another speaker declared that the Fenians would be accused of launching a pillaging expedition if they attacked Canada, and that the only effect of the invasion would be to arouse Canadian sympathy for Confederation. 5

As things turned out, he was not far from wrong, and his sentiments were probably shared by most of the border peoples. Yet for all that, the Fenians were not taken too seriously. There had been a Fenian scare early in March 1866. 10,000 Canadian militiamen had been called out, but nothing happened. After this, O'Mahony changed his mind and decided to invade Canada after all. The result was a fiasco on the Maine-New Brunswick border where the Fenians landed on Campobello Island, the future summer home of the Roosevelts. There was no bloodshed and U.S. troops dispersed the Fenians as soon as they attempted to invade British territory.

The fault of the Fenians was that they talked too freely about their plans. Their advantage was that after the fiasco on the Maine frontier, neither Washington nor Ottawa took them seriously. By the end of May 1866 they had concentrated arms along the frontier at various points between Vermont and Detroit and Fenians were arriving in contingents of up to a hundred at a time.

On June 1st, 1866, they crossed the Niagara frontier and the next day defeated a brigade of Canadian militia at Ridgeway, near Fort Erie. As they were cut off from their reinforcements by U.S. authorities and faced a superior force, the Fenian commander, Lieut.-Col. John O'Neill, decided to withdraw. In the course of doing so, he was arrested with most of his men by U.S. forces. 8

As Canadian militia and British regulars mobilized along the frontier, it seemed that the raids were over. The Fenians were led by conventional officers who made plans for the invasion of Canada by conventional forces. Their plans were, of course, unworkable. They became formidable only when they were controlled by local commanders who acted spontaneously.

The three-day Niagara campaign had a two-fold effect. Most of those who crossed the frontier were sent home by rail at U.S. government expense. At the same time the news of Ridgeway stimulated recruiting and a new flood of Fenians headed towards the frontier. 9

Although U.S. authorities had arrested Fenians who crossed the frontier, there was still no neutrality proclamation by the U.S. President until six days after the invasion. This gave Fenians concentrated at St. Alban's, Vermont, and Malone, New York, reason to hope. On June 4th, the Fenian general, T.W. Sweeney, left New York City on a train bound for Malone, New York. With him were 200 Fenians. Travelling on the same train was General George Meade, the victor of Gettysburg, who left the train at Ogdensburg. There he recommended the proclamation of martial law. This was not granted but General U.S. Grant recommended the arrest of Sweeney. Carloads of Fenian munitions were seized at Waterstown and De Kalb Junction. On 6th June eleven Fenian officers

were arrested at Malone, leaving about 1,500 Fenians stranded in the vicinity. On the same day—June 6th—President Andrew Johnston issued a belated neutrality proclamation. Thus it was no longer legal to transport Fenians by rail or to send Fenian telegrams in code. 10

Sweeney had gone to St. Alban's, Vermont, where he was arrested along with his chief of staff, James Meehan, just as he was planning an excursion into Quebec. Yet the raid still came off because General S.P. Spears eluded arrest and crossed into Quebec on the 8th of June, establishing a camp near Frelighsburg. 11

The original idea of the raids was to establish a base on Canadian soil, and to declare it the seat of an Irish government in exile. Having done that, they would claim belligerent status, and issue letters of marque to Irish privateers. This romantic enterprise had no chance of success. What the Fenians had done was to establish their credibility as a military force. They had been accused of taking money under false pretenses with no intention of going beyond bar-room braggadocio. Now the two military fiascos at Campobello and Frelighsburg were redeemed by their victory at Ridgeway which was hailed as the first Irish victory since Fontenoy 120 years earlier when the Irish in the French service had broken the British Guards.

Ridgeway was re-enacted at Fenian picnics on various occasions during which green-jacketed Fenians would rout Redcoats. Fenianism survived and even flourished, but Fenians were divided and riddled with informers. As the Civil War receded into the background, younger men, who had missed the romance of the war, filled the thinning ranks of the Brotherhood. By 1870 the chances of renewed

raids seemed remote. But again there was a growing need to establish the credibility of the movement by some kind of military action.

General O'Neill was first among the Fenians in personal prestige, but in no sense an accepted leader of the warring Fenian factions. He was, nevertheless, able to make plans to gather a force for a second attempt. O'Neill had two faults: he was a heavy drinker and his best friend and chief lieutenant, Henri Le Caron, was a British agent. Le Caron's name was Thomas Miller Beach. For reasons best explained by a passion for mystery, Beach enlisted in the U.S. forces under the name Le Caron, declaring himself to be French. In the course of the war, he was given a commission and in the post-war period, he infiltrated the Fenian movement. The reports he sent to his father in England were handed over to a Member of Parliament who took them to the British Home Office. Le Caron was then employed as a British agent and was soon put in touch with the Canadian government.

Ottawa consequently had early warning of the second Fenian raid in 1870 and precise information on where warlike stores were being placed along the frontier, as Le Caron was in charge of Fenian munitions. As in 1866, O'Neill made plans for a series of attacks along the frontier. But the main attack would be in Quebec on both sides of the Richelieu River. The other raids were to be mere feints to distract attention. All this was known to Ottawa as soon as Le Caron was able to post a letter to Gilbert McMicken, in charge of the Canadian secret service. 13

By the fall of 1869 it was evident that there would be a second raid and that the main thrusts would be from St. Alban's, Vermont,

and Malone, New York. ¹⁴ Fenian recruits would be drawn from Boston, Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Troy and Albany, New York. They would board trains, wearing uniforms or parts of uniform, but without arms, apart from knives and revolvers. The axis of Fenian communication was on the line running from St. Alban's through Rouses Point to Malone, New York. O'Neill, himself, accompanied by Le Caron, would command at St. Alban's; General J.H. Gleason at Malone. ¹⁵

Early in May, 1870, O'Neill and Le Caron toured northern New York, seeing that all was in readiness. The objective of the campaign was to seize St. John's, Quebec. Five hundred Fenians from Rouses Point would seize a train and run into St. John's.

O'Neill would proceed from Franklyn, Vermont, with 1,200 men, cross the frontier at Eccles Hill and proceed to St. John's. At the same time, Fenians gathered at Malone, New York, would move along the west bank of the Richelieu. There were also vague plans for some gestures at Detroit and against Manitoba in the far west. 16

May 24th, the Queen's birthday, was selected as the day of the attack. This suited the Canadian government perfectly. They knew the day of the planned attack, but did not want the Fenians to know that they knew. The Montreal militia was duly assembled to celebrate the Queen's birthday, but once assembled, could be easily entrained for the frontier.

O'Neill arrived at St. Alban's, Vermont, on the 24th of May. Instead of the promised 3,000 Fenians, he found a bare hundred men. 17 It thus seemed prudent to wait as he was promised reinforcements. These arrived the next day. More were on the way, but O'Neill was warned by the U.S. Marshal, Thomas Forster, that

he was being watched. It was time to act. At 11 a.m. May 25th about 200 Fenians, marching in columns of four, crossed the frontier. No scouts, no skirmishing order, no precautions. 18

Meanwhile, a wave of enthusiasm swept through the Canadian volunteers. The French-Canadian journalist, L.O. David, in an article in L'Opinion Publique wrote, "The military movement demonstrates that the French Canadians have not lost the military spirit of their forefathers and that the flag under which they fight can count on their bravery and loyalty." 19

At the same time Anglo-Canadians, borrowing the American tune of "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp, the Boys are marching," improvised a song of their own:

Tramp, tramp, tramp, the boys are marching Cheer up, let the Fenians come,

And beneath the Union Jack, we will drive the rabble back. 20

The Canadian militia were delighted at the prospect of the raid. There was one exception to this general good spirit. The Missisquoi Volunteers were blasé because they had been called out so often. Only forty men turned out out of a possible 200. 21 This left the home guard at Eccles Hill to take the shock of the advance under O'Neill. The odds were 25 Canadian defenders to 200 Fenians, but the Fenians took cover after two initial casualties—one killed and one wounded, and they remained under cover. Nearby at Stanbridge, the Montreal Cavalry and Victoria Rifles were summoned and arrived at Eccles Hill at two in the afternoon. By that time the Fenians had been reinforced by 100 men of the 4th New York Irish. At about 6 p.m. the Missisquoi 60th Battalion advanced down the hill under

cover of the Victoria Rifles. This threat sent the last of the Fenians back over the American frontier. $^{\mbox{22}}$

Meanwhile, the U.S. Marshal had been watching the operation from the U.S. side. When O'Neill obliged by re-crossing the frontier, he was seized and taken past his assembled reinforcements. O'Neill's arrest was a spectacular achievement, but with only a handful of troops the U.S. authorities could not easily disarm the Fenians. The best they could do was get them out of the way, so they were left to board the train for Malone, New York, where the other wing of the Fenian forces was waiting to cross the frontier.

President U.S. Grant had issued a neutrality proclamation, but the Fenians' respect for U.S. authority had lapsed when there were no troops to back it up. By the time these Fenian reinforcements reached Malone, there was no doubt but that the Fenians were in earnest. As Canadian forces had yet to arrive in numbers on the western frontier of Quebec, there was some panic among the local border population. Many buried their valuables and fled from their homes. A few crossed the frontier to take refuge in New York. 23

Rumours and reports came from various sources. On the night of the 24th May, it was known that wagons containing arms, entrenching tools, barrels of pork, were moving on the New York side of the frontier. Reports on the 25th and 26th May had the Fenians coming in from all directions from St. Alban's, Ogdensburg and the south. Yet it was a two-way stream as it had been in 1866. After several days of inaction along the frontier and no apparent prospect of action, many Fenians returned home, to be greeted on the way by

enthusiastic recruits moving towards the frontier. 24 News of the action at Eccles Hill had evidently stimulated recruiting.

Three companies of U.S. troops were expected at Malone on the night of 26th May, but they did not appear until the following day. On the Canadian side of the border, the 50th Huntingdon Borderers, a militia unit, were slow to mobilize. 27 Very few came in on the 25th May and it would be some time before troops could arrive from Montreal. The men of Huntingdon Village, feeling that they were on their own, resolved to form a Home Guard. All work was stopped for 48 hours as Mayor Shanks became chief of the Home Guard and a Mr. Delaney was appointed his deputy. Railway tracks outside Hemmingford were torn up lest the Fenians seize a train. 25

I soon became apparent that the Fenians were most likely to cross the frontier at Trout River, a village just west of Huntingdon. J.C. Bruce, a local inhabitant, had crossed the frontier and observed about 250 Fenians encamped. After being detained several hours by Fenians, he escaped and made his way to Huntingdon where the 50th Battalion was gathering. By this time troops had arrived at Huntingdon, including the 69th Regiment of regulars, sent from Quebec City. They travelled a circuitous route through Montreal by train to Coteau-du-Lac where they embarked by steamer to Port Lewis on Lake St. Francis, just eight miles from Huntingdon. On their arrival they joined the 64th Battalion, a largely French-Canadian unit, and 275 men of the Montreal Garrison Artillery and some 80 men of the Montreal Engineers. 27

By the evening of May 26th there were about 1,000 regulars and volunteers in the Huntingdon area. On the morning of that day, a small party of Fenians had crossed the frontier and cut telegraph lines at Henderson Village.

However, the most dangerous concentration of Fenians was at Trout River. One of the regular officers, Lieut. William Butler of the 69th, accompanied by local scouts, rode out of Huntingdon at 4 a.m. in the direction of Trout River. Within three quarters of a mile of the river, he was able to advance under cover of hops planted on the side of the road. Suddenly, according to his own account, "A body of marching men in columns of fours began to wheel out, from a cross road about 500 yards ahead on the right side. They came right for the line, their arms at the slope, and the sun shining on their rifle barrels. I made them out about two or three hundred." ²⁸

Clearly, the Fenians had no guerrilla training or idea of guerrilla warfare. These were Bunker Hill tactics. Butler drew back, then wheeled about to see if the Fenians had really crossed the border. He walked his horse around the bend of the river to see the Fenians within 300 yards of him. "They shouted something and I saw the rifles of the lead four come down to the ready." As Butler wheeled about he heard shots overhead. At 300 yards there was, of course, no danger of being hit. Butler rode back to Holbrooke's Corners and here made a rough map which he presented to Colonel Bagot who arrived with a column of the 69th at 8.40 a.m.

The Fenians had marched along a road which ran parallel to the Trout River and, with the river on their right and woods on their left, they set up a barricade and threw out advanced guards. Wisely, they decided not to advance into more open country. It seems they were awaiting reinforcements with no idea as to what to do next. Apparently, they had no effective scouts or intelligence, as they were unaware that Canadian forces were only a mile away.

Colonel Bagot, in moving in on the Fenian position, decided to give the place of honour to the Huntingdon Borderers, deploying three companies on the left side of the road next to the river and four companies on the right. The British regulars remained in support along the road, and the Montreal Garrison Artillery was sent to cross a bridge and approach the Fenian position from the east. These were sensible arrangements, providing the Fenians did not stand and fight.

As the right flank of the Borderers approached the Fenians, they opened fire, driving in the Fenians' advanced guard which was occupying the hop yard, which had an hour or so before concealed the approach of Lieut. Butler. The Fenian advanced guard then, as they were supposed to, fell back on the barricade. The left flank of the Borderers held their fire until they reached the home of a Mr. Holbrooke, presumably of Holbrooke's Corners. As the battle developed, the Borderers were advancing in line, firing as they went without much chance of hitting Fenians if they took cover behind their barricade. 29

Yet, being outnumbered and in danger of being out-flanked, the Fenians abandoned the barricade and fled towards the frontier. It would seem that had they held their ground, they might have inflicted some casualties on the Borderers, forcing them to take cover and attempt a flanking movement. This would have had propaganda value at some future day. But they were not the same men who had fought in 1866. Many were boys getting their baptismal fire. The entire Fenian force fled over the frontier leaving their equipment behind. One Fenian was hit and later died of wounds. The Borderers suffered no casualties. 30

On the New York side of the frontier, Fenians were still arriving and the U.S. marshal did not have the means of forcing them to disperse. Yet the battle of Trout River which lasted about thirty minutes was decisive. On the evening of May 27th Fenian leaders held a meeting on the Malone fairgrounds and tried to inspire another attack. There were still over 1,200 Fenians in or around Malone, but they were not prepared to re-enforce defeat. 31

It was clear that any future crossing of the border would be in the face of superior Canadian forces which were likely to be reenforced. Moreover, U.S. troops were arriving under that consistent foe of the Fenians—General Meade. 32

The show was over. Yet a few thousand Fenians, by coming and going, had turned the border area into a war zone for over six weeks. They had thus established their importance. For those right on the frontier it was a time of anxiety. For the American authorities, it was a nuisance. For the Montreal militia and others who turned out, it was something of a holiday, a costly one in terms of budget, 33 but worth the price. Parades, marching, and victory, home after a week or two. Military glory without tears. What more could a militia volunteer ask?

ST.MICHAEL'S ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH CEMETERY # SA 3 STANDISH, CLINTON COUNTY, N.Y.

St. Michael's R.C. Church was incorporated 15 Oct 1887. The church was built cal890. From 1888-1892 it was a station of Lyon Mountain, and also from 1940 to the present. It had a resident pastor from 1903-1939. In 1922, St. Michael's had a mission at Loon Lake. In 1920 St. Michael's School had 69 pupils and 3 lay teachers.

The plot of land on which this cemetery lies is fairly large, and in 1987, had been well-maintained. I have been told that there were many burials there with wooden markers, which have disappeared. It is quite apparent that there was sufficient space for many more burials, based on the location of the stones that do exist.

The Life and Times of Etienne Desautels dit Lapointe 1740-1824

Etienne Desautels dit Lapointe was born on January 22,1740,in Lanoraie,Québec,the eight of 14 children,son of Michel and Louise Catherine Bergeron. He was a direct descendant of Pierre Desautels dit Lapointe who founded the French-Canadian lineages of the Desautels and Lapointe families.

From his early youth Etienne was exposed to daily chores of farm life. In his late teens the family moved to St-Ours, Québec, across the river, where together with his two older brothers, the young Desautels became more involved in land cultivation. The daily farm routine placed a heavier burden on him after the marriages of his two brothers.

Unlike his mild-mannered and reserved father, Michel, Etienne gradually developed traits of resourcefulness, aggressiveness shrewdness in agricultural affairs. Not content with the status quo as he found it on his father's farm, this abitious young man of 19 years managed to acquire a piece of land of his own in St-Ours by way of a promissary note issued my M.de St-Ours himself. Such notes were often the first step to a real concession contract before a notary. This legal instrument permitted Etienne to start working the land. industriousness application and in its development would eventually assure him and outright concession.

Not waiting for the official contract, this enterprising young farmer on February 8,1761, decided to exchange a portion of his land in the seigniory of St-Ours on the third range along the Richelieu River, 3 Arpents (acres) by 30 in depth, for the property of Pierre Monet dit Boismenu, also in St-Ours, 3 arpents by 28 in depth up to the lands near the Richelieu River, and neighboring the property of Etienne Desautels'brother, Joseph. It is noted that Etienne was somewhat lax in meeting the annual obligations due M.de St-Ours, the owner of this seigniory. Nonetheless, he promised to deliver to Monet within four months his contract of concession which he finally recieved from Rocque de St-Ours on February 23,1761. Thus, the deeds of sales were exchanged.

This initial transaction launched the entrepreneur on a new life of land speculation, shrewd business dealings, but not without serious risks, failures and debts. Yet the strategy for the future was

carefully planned, not by Etienne alone, but by Marie-Anne Lapierre also called Meunier who officially became his wife on April 13,1762, by contract and later by nuptial blessing of the Church. This union enhanced the real and personal possessions of the couple. Joseph Lapierre dit Meunier gave to his daughter, Marie-Anne, a piece of land $1\frac{1}{2}$ arpents by 60 in depth, located in the seigniory of St-Denis. This land together with that of Etienne was designated by the notary to be their estate.

Etienne and Marie-Anne resided at times in St-Denis, at other times in St-Ours, depending on whether this conscientious farmer was clearing and/or cultivating his land. He seemed to have concentrated most of his activities in the region of St-Denis, continuing to acquire more property, particularly the land of Jacques Emery dit Coderre, bought for 850 pounds (approx.\$2,550), made in three installments. Most of the Desautels children were baptised in St-Denis; a few in St-Ours. When St-Denis was unable to perform Catholic services, the family would go to the neighboring parish of St-Antoine.

It became obvious that Etienne and his wife preferred to make St-Denis their permanent residence, when their property in St-Ours was sold on March 7,1769, for 500 pounds and two years of unpaid seigniorial rents. In addition, there was a sale of $3\frac{1}{2}$ arpents 9 feet by 8 in depth of woodland which Etienne had acquired in 1764. These two sales were almost sufficient to satisfy the installments on the land purchased in 1768 from Jacques Emeri dit Coderre in St-Denis.

The future of this Desautels family looked bright. The competitiveness of land sales and other business practices schooled Etienne in such an extent that he was always ready to haggle with, cajole and eventually prevail over his competitors. Futhermore, two of his sons, Etienne and Pierre, were growing hale and hardy, ready for extra work in clearing and cultivating the newly purchased lands.

The death of Etienne's older brother, Michel, was the occasion of a family reunion in 1769 in St-Ours, mainly to settle a succession (inheritance) problem between Michel's widow and all the living heirs of the deceased. The social aspect of this get-together occasioned a filial tête-á-tête between a son and his aging parents, Michel, now 70 years of age, and Louise-Catherine, not yet showing her 61 years.

The Desautels family increased numerically as the years progressed. Etienne yearned for more sons, but Providence presented him with six daughters in a row, of whom only two reached adulthood. Nonethe-

less, both parents accepted each birth with happiness as though it were in the divine plan of things.

Joseph Meunier dit Lapierre, the father of Marie-Anne, was getting old and felt unable to continue the management of his landholdings. Now wanting to live a quiet peaceful life without the burden of domestic responsibilities, he presented officially on September 22,1777,to Etienne and Maie-Anne as a donation his entire real estate, consisting of 90 arpents with all the buildings erected thereon, including farm implements and the average livestock. The donor, however, did reserve for himself the house and its furnishings, a small piece of land between the barn and the Richelieu River, a cart and harness and his furnish him in return with ironworks. Etienne must sustenance, sufficient wood for his fireplace and stove, enough money for his annual care and for the salary of a young girl or wife to do the housework. The loyal son-in-law was also responsible for calling a doctor and priest when needed, and incase of death, for a proper burial. It was also so stipulated that after Joseph's demise, everything could be inherited by the Desautels family. This is evidence that Joseph Meunier had a very amicable relationship with Desautels, even from the time that the latter asked for the hand of the former's daughter in 1762.

It would appear now that the Desautels family was quite prosperous. But age-old laws and rules of succession still regulated the lives of the <a href="https://hats.com/hats.c

One of the legal obligations with which the Desaulels family now had to contend was the inventory of all goods owned by the family of the late Marie-Anne Meunier dite Lapierre and Etienne Desautels dit Lapointe. The introduction of the document consists of the date of the inventory, May 20,1784, and the appointment of Etienne as guardian of his living children: Etienne, Pierre, Ursule, Marie-Anne,

Antoinette and Joseph--all minors in the eyes of the law--each qualifying to recieve one sixth of the mother's possessions. An appraiser was assigned by the district of Montreal to estimate the value of all real and personal possessions of the family. The document then lists in detail the household wares, goods and furniture, farm equipment and animals -- each item valued separately, totalling the worth as 1,136.00 pounds. The family assets totalled a mere 62 pounds; but the liabilities were heavy, some 2,960 pounds. The Desautel's wealth lay principally in landholdings and buildings which unfortunately were not appraised. Lastly, there is the listing of title deeds, contracts of marriage and of concessions and the donation of Joseph Meunier, and a lifetime of notarial documents which regulated the Desautels'mode of living.

Landholdings did not give Etienne Desautels ready cash. The usual needs of the children and of the farm forced him to borrow 554 pounds just six months after the inventory. Co-incidentally, his daughter, Ursule, married in 1784 and requested part of the succession due her. Her father was in no position at that time to grant her request. She had to wait until 1786 for her inheritance which amount was not specified in the contract. When Etienne Jr.married in 1786, his dutiful father gave him a piece of land $1\frac{1}{2}$ arpents by 30 in depth. In exchange Etienne Sr.requested 10 bushels of wheat per year and a promise to give him full assistance when in need. His son had also inherited other household items including a cow from his mother's succession. What was the son's gain was the father's loss.

Such was Etienne Desautels' situation in 1786 when he married again, hoping that his future wife could give him a helping hand. He chose as his bride Marie-Françoise Pichet-Dupré and both received the nuptial blessing of the Church February 19,1787, in St-Ours. The groom was in his 47th year, the bride about 55 years old. Almost nothing is known about Marie-Françoise, since the contract of marriage has not been found. Therefore, it is impossible to know exactly what she brought to the marriage. Obviously this union produced no children.

Two other children reached their majority after Etienne's second marriage. Marie-Anne and Pierre seem to be the only ones in the family to have understood and had great concern over their father's present plight. After thoughtful consideration, they both decided in 1789 to relinquish their rights to their inheritances. In appreciation of this thoughtful action, a grateful father released them

from their obligations the family had incurred.

Etienne Desautels' dealing with the various notaries became more and more frequent from 1789 on. During that year he decided to sell part of that land which he received by donation from Joseph, his father-in-law in 1777. The house, buildings and land were sold with permission of the court, even that part duly inherited by his children, then minors. This permission was granted because of the heavy debts incurred according to the inventory. Etienne received 612 pounds for this portion of land 2 arpents by 30 in depth; 253 pounds were allowed for the children.

This once prosperous farmer continued to sell off his various landholdings until 1791, mainly because of his creditor's demanding their due. He suddenly realized that he was liquidating almost all of his real estate which he and his first wife had worked so hard to clear and cultivate and finally enjoy. Trying to reverse the trend, Etienne invested in another land in the region of St-Denis: 2 arpents of frontage by 40 in depth. With no house or other buildings on the premises, he bought it for 400 pounds cash on November 5,1791.

By permission of the Court, Etienne auctioned off several portions of his land which he received from Joseph Meunier--portions that were the inheritance of some of his children. This he did for the financial benefit of the children involved and because of family debts. The last auction sale took place in the front of the Church of St-Denis on April 3,1792, when a large portion of his land was sold to the highest bidder, Charles Lamotte, for 400 pounds, of which 200 pounds was owed to his underage children. Etienne lived on this land until the autumn of 1793.

Pierre Desautels, a loyal son, was 32 years when he married Marguerite Martin in 1797. He was already the owner of his own farm adjacent to that of his father. His late marriage is indicative of the concern he had for his father who needed support and assistance during these hard times. To be sure, Etienne felt deeply the loss of his most reliable son.

The years were beginning to take their toll on this man of the soil, usually burdened with debts perhaps because of the inflationary trends of the era. Now seeking a peaceful life for himself and his wife, Françoise, he sold as a type of donation a piece of property that included a life annuity. Since the obligations due the donor were much too burdensome for the purchaser, Augustin Richer, the land was sold two years later to Jean-Baptiste Chatel who, unfortunately,

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was already in debt and unable to meet his financial obligations to the Desautels. Arbitrators were appointed by the Court to settle the affair. Etienne was forced to make concessions and accepted a payment of 300 pounds. The land was sold again and the new owner honored the life annuity of the Desautels. This was the year 1804.

At the age of 67, Etienne (and his wife Françoise) left the area in order to live in the village of St-Denis, purchasing a small piece of land, April 6,1807, which he later sold for 120 pounds, but the couple remained there until the end of the year. In 1809, they finally settled in a small house in the village. Pierre Guérout was holding the mortgage.

Etienne never forgot the devotion and concern his son, Pierre, displayed for him. The greatest asset that the father had to compensate for this filial affection was a donation of 2 arpents of land by 10 in depth, granted on November 27,1809. All that the grateful father asked in return was 2 bushels of wheat and peas to be delivered annually to his house in the village of St-Denis.

Etienne Desautels and his wife, Marie-Françoise, spent their remaining years in St-Denis. On November 27,1815, the notary was called to Etienne's bedside to receive his last will and testament. The aging farmer was ill and did not want to leave this world without arranging his affairs. Little did he know that he was strong enough to journey nine more years on the road of life. In his will dated November 27, 1815, all his goods, real and personal, were bequeathed to his wife, Françoise Pichet. After her demise, ownership of all his goods would be inherited by Marie-Ester Desautels, his "little daughter" (as he used to call her), daughter of Pierre, his son.

Etienne's wife fell ill and decided to make her will on the 17th of December of the same year. Unfortunately, Providence gave her only months to live. She died February 21,1816. Her will is identical to that of her husband with the obvious name changes.

At the age of 80 years, Etienne Desautels by contract on November 11,1820, gave Pierre Guérout, merchant, permission to sell his house. Pierre held the mortgage and probably wanted his money back. Etienne asked for a profit of not less than 100 pounds.

Four years later, at the age of 84, Etienne Desautels dit Lapointe after receiving the last rites of the Church passed from this life on October 6,1824, and was buried in the cemetery of St-Denis on October 8,1824.

A GUIDE TO USING THE RESOURCES OF A BRANCH LIBRARY, CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST OF LATTER-DAY SAINTS

Despite the widespread publicity covering the vast amount of information available at the various Stake Libraries of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (the Mormons), across the country, many genealogical researchers fail to use this valuable resource. To draw attention to the tremendous amount of information available, I present an over-view of this under-used facility.

Here in northern New York State, the nearest Mormon Satellite Family History Center is located in Lake Placid. It is on the John Brown Road, near the horseshow grounds and the Olympic ski jump facility, and just off Route 86, which is the main highway heading south from the village of Lake Placid.

In an unbelieveably small space are housed thousands of microfiche, on which there is information waiting to be utilized. In addition, any information that is available from the Latter-Day Saints (Mormons) in Salt Lake City, can be ordered thru this, or any of the stake libraries across the country. There is no charge for the use of the facilities, but a donation is graciously accepted. The material must be viewed at the center, which has two microfiche readers and one microfilm reader.

The informational booklet, entitled A GUIDE TO RESEARCH, states that access can be had to thousands of records——the result of 1) <u>previous research</u>, and 2) <u>original documents</u>. The first source (previous research) is broken down into the following categories:

THE INTERNATIONAL GENEALOGICAL INDEX, referred to as the IGI. This consists of a computerized index of names extracted from various records. It contains the names of over 121 million deceased persons from around the world. This index is on mocrofiche. The IGI lists information such as names of parents, or spouse, date and place of birth, baptism, marriage, and other important events of vital interest to researchers. Reference is made on the fiche of the source of information given, leading to possible further research. The IGI is constantly up-dated.

THE FAMILY GROUP RECORDS COLLECTION. This contains completed Group Record forms of about 8 million families, with world-wide information. The collection is broken down into two sections, <u>Patron</u> and <u>Archive</u>. As the name "patron" suggests, this consists of data turned in by researchers like you and I. On the other hand, the archive section consists of forms submitted up to 1969. This information is available on microfilm which can be ordered for a nominal fee at Lake Placid (or <u>your</u> nearest Mormon Family History Center) from the main library in Salt Lake City. A word of caution——since the information has been submitted by patrons, it should be verified, as it could contain inaccuracies.

FAMILY HISTORIES. The main library in Salt Lake City has accumulated thousands of printed family histories from many sources, including the Library of Congress, in Washington, D.C. It is possible through a branch or satellite library to secure film/fiche of a published family history. Many of these family histories were published many years ago, some in limited quantity and distribution, and may be otherwise unavailable either from a library, in original or reprint form, or from a book store, or through inter-library loan (ILL). Many of us have found

that these family histories are extremely difficult to locate, and if found, often they do not circulate thru libraries. However, they are not out of reach thru the Family History Center near you. Once the film/fiche has been ordered from Salt Lake City, and viewed at the Center, it is possible to obtain copies of pages that are of particular interest. To find out if a family history on a name you are interested in is available, search the Genealogical Library Catalog (GLC-microfiche) and the microfilmed Card Catalog (MCC-microfilm). The MCC is gradually being replaced by the GLC---in other words, there is a trend toward microfiche instead of microfilm, undoubtedly because of space limitations.

Another service is called the <u>FAMILY REGISTRY</u>. This service enables you to find others who may be working on one or more of the same lines that you are researching. Here, you would look up your ancestor's name on the microfiche. If you find the name that relates to yours, you may contact the person who submitted the information, as the address of that person appears on the fiche. You may also list your name and the family you are researching.

ORIGINAL DOCUMENTS. For those of us who live here in northern New York State, as well as some of the out-of-the-area members of the NNYACGS, we are well aware of how difficult it is to find records from an early time frame. While northern New York State is considered one of the more difficult areas for searching, there are other geographical areas where difficulty in locating records is also a problem. Do not despair, as help can be obtained from the microfilmed records from court houses, churches, and other archives, not only on a local and national basis, but from throughout the world, the majority of which are records prior to 1900. When searching for original documents filmed by the Latter-Day Saints in a foreign country, the city or town where your ancestor lived <u>must be</u> a known factor. These filmed, original records are of the following types: civil, church, census, probate, land, military, immigration, and court records. An alternate source to the GLC (Genealogical Library Catalog) to find original documents, is the MCC (microfilmed card catalog).

Through my own research at the Satellite center in lake Placid, N.Y., I have found that you have to use a little imagination in using the material, geographically speaking. By broadening your horizons, literally speaking, you may find northern NYS material listed under Canada in the Locality Index. On the fiche of NYS, you will find many of the records of the counties of New York State. A "sampler" would be "Gravestones of Essex Co. by Henry Waterman George", "Methodist Church Circuit Records of Brasher, Bombay, Ft. Covington and Norfolk" (filmed in 1981) or "Dr. Harwood's Births 1881-1934 (Chasm Falls")etc.

If, after searching the fiche, you determine that there is a film or fiche that you would like to obtain, an order form is completed at the center and sent to Salt Lake City by the Librarian in charge. Delivery of the requested film/fiche can be expected in approximately one month. Photo-copies of pages from films can be ordered as well. Film ordered from the Salt Lake City facility can be either for a short period of time, or "indefinite loan". Microfiche can also be purchased.

To become better acquainted with the best method to approach researching at a Mormon facility, it is advisable to purchase (for a small fee) the booklet, A GUIDE TO RESEARCH. This will save a lot of frustration and time in using the facilities of the LDS Stake Library. Information regarding hours at the Lake Placid Satellite Center may be obtained by calling 518-523-2889 or Bernard Baker at 518-523-1505. At the present time an effort is being made to have the center staffed with volunteers during daytime and evening hours. For those living outside the northern NYS area, consult your phone book under the listing "Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints".

Laporte-St. Georges Family of Quebec, New York, and Wisconsin by Kathleen Doran Fenton

The evidence was all there, though only in hindsight do the pieces complete the puzzle. My great-great-grandfather, Abraham Bruley, and his brother-in-law, Paschal St. George, were the best of friends. Much the same age, they fished and hunted together and spent the cold winters logging the woods near the small northcentral Wisconsin community of Manawa, Waupaca county, where they'd both settled just before 1870. An item in the gossipy local newspaper, the Manawa Advocate, dated 29 March 1900 and headlined "A Rare Record," says "Paschal St. George, past 75 years of age, and 'Abe' Bruley, past 74, have cut during the winter over 200 cords of maple wood, besides doing many odd jobs of other work." Abraham and his wife Margaret St. George lie buried in the Little Wolf cemetery near Manawa, and a neighboring lot contains the remains of Paschal and at least three of his nine children. Nearby other children are buried — and on one of those plots, this stone was raised:

Josette, wife of P. St. George, born April 25, 1805; died April 22, 1890

Born too early to be Paschal's wife, perhaps she was his mother? The newspaper of a neighboring town (New London Times) provided the all-important clue: included in an 1884 "List of all those drawing pensions from the United States government" was Josette St. George of Manawa, who drew a mother's pension of \$8.00 per month. That pension record, which Josette received as mother of Levi St. George, killed as a Union volunteer in the Civil War, provides the only known proof that Josette's husband, Paschal St. George Sr., was ever in Wisconsin.

And now we backtrack -- not too surprisingly, to the parish of St. Cuthbert, Berthier county, Quebec, the same community where Abraham Bruley's father Henry was born, reared and married. Like the sons, the fathers had known each other in youth; as adults, they followed the same migration trails from Berthier county to the Clinton/Essex county area and on to Wisconsin. On 18 Sept. 1827, Paschal Laporte dit St-George, farmer and son of Joseph Laporte dit St-George and of Magdeleine Desrosier ditte Lafrénière of the parish of Ste-Gènevieve-de-Berthier, married Josephte Dénys, minor daughter of Cuthbert Dénys and Marie-Anastasie Miville de Chène of Cuthbert. Witnessing were one Laporte (first name illegible), brother of the groom; Pierre Goulet, uncle of the groom; Cuthbert Dénys, father of the bride; and Pierre Frappier, uncle of the bride. A search of the Ste-Geneviève parish records reveals that Paschal was born 11 Oct 1804 and baptised the next day, son of Joseph Laporte, a farmer of the parish, and of Magdaleine Derosiers; his sponsors were Paschal Goulet (a paternal uncle) and Magdaleine Martin-Pellant. If Josephte was a minor at marriage in 1827, she could not have been born in either 1803 or 1805 as her death record and tombstone indicate, and not surprisingly, a search of St-Cuthbert records revealed no baptism record for her, though many of her siblings were recorded there. While the Denis/Denys family had resided in the St-Cuthbert parish for many years, they too had ties to Ste-Geneviève, and there we finally found the baptism record of

Laporte-St. George Family (Fenton)

Marie-Joseph Denis, born 7 June 1810 and baptised the next day, daughter of Cuthbert Denis, a farmer of St-Cuthbert, and of Marie Miville-Dechenes; sponsors were Pierre Denis and Marie-Joseph Miville, uncle and aunt of the infant.

Paschal and Josepte remained in Berthier county for some time after their marriage, farming probably between St-Cuthbert and Ste-Geneviève, since some children were baptised at one parish, some at the other. Records have been located for the baptisms of the six oldest children:

- 1. Paschal, born 29 and bapt 30 July 1838 at St-Cuthbert; sponsors, Cuthbert Dénys (his maternal grandfather) and Madeleine Laporte-St. Georges (his paternal grandmother)
- 2. Marie-Angele (later called Angeline), born and bapt 17 Sept at Ste-Geneviève; sponsors, Joseph Laporte-St. George (uncle) and Marie Minville
- Marguerite, born and bapt 4 May 1831 at St-Cuthbert; sponsors Hyacinthe Laporte-St. George and Marguerite Généreux (her paternal uncle and his soon-to-be bride)
- 4. Joseph, born 24 and bapt 25 Jan 1833 at Ste-Geneviève; sponsors Pierre Beauchene and Emerence Denis (his maternal aunt)
- 5. Louis-George, born and bapt 6 Oct 1834 at Ste-Geneviève; sponsors François Turcotte and Eloise Denis (his maternal aunt)
- 6. Louis, born 10, bapt 11 Jan 1836 at St-Cuthbert; sponsors Louis Goulet and Geneviève Laporte-St. George (his paternal aunt)

Records are somewhat obscure about just when the young family moved to the United States, and just where they settled. When they crossed the border, they left behind half of the family name, which now became simply <u>St. George</u>. Though no baptism records have been located, probably two or three more children (Geneva/Geneviève, Eli/Levi, and perhaps Josette) were born in Canada. The only U.S. census in which Paschal Sr. is listed is that of Willsboro township, Essex county, NY, in 1860:

Pascal S. George, age 57, farm laborer, born Canada Rosetta ", age 49, born Canada Eli [?Levi] ", age 13, born Canada Josetta ", age 9, born Canada Alfred ", age 6, born New York

And the 1880 census of Little Wolf township, Waupaca county, WI, lists Josette St. George (age 73, born Canada) as mother-in-law of Theodore Hebert (age 32, born Canada); his wife was listed as Geneva Hebert (age 38, born Canada). This gives us at least four more children:

- ?Geneva (probably Geneviève), born about 1842 in Canada; no further records have been found on Geneva, except the 1880 census entry indicating she married one Theodore Hebert, though a Geneviève St. George was sponsor or witness at several Clinton co. NY, baptisms and marriages
- 8. Eli, born about 1847 in Canada; probably the Levi of the pension record; Levi died 10 July 1864, Duvalls Bluff, AK, private in Co. D,11th Reg't, Missouri Cavalry Volunteers; unmarried
- 9. Josette, born about 1850 in Canada; further information below
- 10. Alfred, born about 1854 in New York; records of St-John-Baptiste, Keeseville, NY, record his baptism: Alfred, born 12, bapt 13 April 1854, son of Paschal St. Georges and Josephte Denis; sponsors, Zavier St-Michel and Domitile Chêne. Nothing more is known of Alfred, except that his brother Paschal's 1921 obituary says he was residing in lowa. So far, a search of lowa records has not revealed any information.

Census records and church records show that at least one brother of Paschal, Ambroise St. George,

Laporte-St. George Family (Fenton)

and his wife Marie-Anne Durand, also moved to New York. They are listed somewhat ambiguously in the 1850 census; also in 1860 -- both in Willsboro township, Essex county. It has been necessary to carefully separate their records from those of the Paschal St. George family.

Microfilms of some Clinton county church records have recently become available at LDS Family History Libraries, and those of St-Jean-Baptiste, Keeseville 1853-1878 and of Immaculate Conception 1848-1869 were searched, revealing the following data on some of Paschal and Josephte's children:

- Paschal St. George married before the 1850 census, Caroline Lapointe, apparently daughter of Benoit/Joseph Audet-Lapointe of Grand Isle; her mother is reported by family as Pauline Dupré, but Benoit married 1) 17 July 1827 St-Luc, St-Jean co, Marie-Charlotte Lagace, and 2) 30 June 1830 Napierville, Emilie Monbleau. Caroline's known sister Emily and brother Charles are definitely members of this family, so Caroline <u>must</u> belong — somehow! Caroline died 6 Dec 1869 in Brooklyn township, Green Lake co, WI, at age 39. Pascal died 15 Sept 1921 Little Wolf township, Waupaca co, WI, reportedly age 97 (actually 93). Children (New York records only; names as given):
 - a. Almira St. George, born 6 Oct and bapt 14 Dec 1851 at Immaculate Conception (daughter of Paschale St. George and "Calona Laponte"; sponsors Paschal St. George, Josete Denie); WI obituaries indicate she was born in Grand Isle, VT
 - b. Edward St. George, born 21 Sept and bapt 8 Oct 1853 at Immaculate Conception (son of Pascal "St. Jule" and Caroline Lapoint; sponsors George St. George, Julie St. Louis)
 - c. Caroline St. George, bap 16 Sept 1855 St-Jean-Baptiste, age 6 months (daughter of Paschal St. Georges and Caroline "Hodet"; sponsors Théodule Latourelle, Geneviève St. Georges)
- 2. Angeline St. George married by 1848 in NY, John B. (probably Jean-Baptiste) Terrio. Some of their children were reportedly born in New York state, but so far no census, marriage or baptism records have been located. She died 20 Dec 1921 (claiming an age of 98!) and is buried at Little Wolf cemetery, probably, though there is no tombstone, on the same lot with her husband (who died 2 May 1890) and her mother. Wisconsin records indicate these children were born in NY (or VT):
 - a. John B. Terrio jr, b 21 June 1848 NY; he married Mary Bruley, sister of Abraham Bruley
 - Louis Terrio, bc 1850 NY (or VT); a WI local history entry indicates his birth as 30 June 1852, Rutland co, VT
 - c. George Terrio, b c1852 NY
 - d. Julia Terrio, b c 1854 NY
- 3. Margaret St. George married before 1850 Abraham Bruley. They may be listed (with the surname misspelled) in the 1850 Willsboro, Essex co, census, and certainly are in the 1860 census of that township, with children Joseph (actually Josette) age 10, George age 8, Josey (Joseph) age 6, and Julia age 2. Margaret died 4 April 1905 Little Wolf township, Waupaca co, WI, claiming an age of 78 (actually she was only 74); Abraham died 26 Sept 1914 Royalton township, Waupaca co. Both are buried at Little Wolf cemetery near Manawa. New York records of children:
 - a. Josette Bruley, b c1850; listed as "Joseph" in 1860 census; WI records give her a birthdate of 27 March 1850, Keeseville
 - b. George-Dieudonne Bruley, b 6 Jan, bapt 28 May 1852 at St-Joseph-Corbeau, Coopersville (son of Amable Brûlé and Marguerite St. George; sponsors Jean Bary, Marguerite Dugas)
 - c. Joseph Bruley, b (WI records) 13 Sept 1854, Clinton co
 - d. Julia Ann/Julienne Bruley, b 1858, bap 18 Jan 1859 at St-Jean-Baptiste, Keeseville, age 3 months (daughter of Amable Brûlé and Marguerite St. Georges; sponsors Pascal St. Georges, Marguerite Dugas). Julia married 30 Jan 1876 at Ogdensburg, Waupaca co, WI, to Caradon Orlando Schumann; she died about 1881 at Ogdensburg. Their only surviving child was my grandmother, Ida Anne Schumann Doran.
 - d. Armenia Bruley, bap 30 June 1861 at St-Jean-Baptiste, age 8 months (daughter of Amable Brûlé and Marguerite St. Georges; sponsors John Martin dit Pellan, Geneviève Morel); WI records give her a birthdate of 8 Dec 1861 (which should be 1860)
- Joseph St. George, married 19 June 1854 St-Jean-Baptiste, Elizabeth Suprenant, daughter of Alexander Suprenant and Rosalie Ledoux (witnesses: the bride's father, and Paschal St. Georges

- Jr.) Listed next to parents in 1860 Willsboro co census: age 26, born Canada; wife Eliza age 10, born NY; and daughter Rose Anne, age 3. Listed 1870 census, same township, age 37; wife Lysay, age 31; Rosalie, age 13; Louis, age 8; William, age 6; and Alexander, age 3 (the last two reportedly born in Wisconsin). Little else is known about Joseph. The only baptism record certainly for a child of this couple follows:
- a. Jean-Baptiste St. Georges, b 24 May, bapt 16 July 1871 St-Jean-Baptiste (son of Joseph St. Georges and Elizabeth Surprenant; sponsors Louis Brunelle, Philomene Charland)
- 5. Louis-George St. George. No marriage record has been located, but there are baptism record at St-Jean-Baptiste for children of George St. George and Julienne Suprenant. It's felt they are children of Louis-George and, possibly, a sister of Elizabeth Suprenant:
 - a. Alfred St. George, b about 1854, bapt 5 Oct 1856 St-Jean-Baptiste, age 2 years (son of George St. George and Julienne Suprenant; sponsors Jean Theraux, Aurelie St. George)
 - b. François St. George, b about 1858, bapt 26 June 1859 St-Jean-Baptiste, age 1 year (son of George St. George and Julienne Suprenant; sponsors Pascal St. George, Josephte Denis)
 - c. Elizabeth St. George, b 1860, bapt 12 Aug 1860 St-Jean-Baptiste, age 8 months (daughter of George St. Georges and Julienne Suprenant; sponsors Louis Brunal, Philomene Charland)
 - d. Elizabeth-Mathilde St. George, b about 1862, bapt 6 Jan 1864 St-Jean Baptiste, age 16 months (daughter of Georges St. Georges and Julienne Surprenant; sponsors Emory Gaillarneau, Geneviève St. Georges)
- 6. Louis St. George, probably married 7 Nov 1868 St-Jean-Baptiste, Marie Oreale (age 20, daughter of Michael Orealle and Louise Lemieux; witnesses François Gladu, Christina Guerin). The marriage record gives his age as 24 and calls him son of the deceased <u>François</u> St. Georges and Josephine Denis. If the record is for this Louis, the age should have been 32; perhaps the Louis born 1836 died and there was a later son, born about 1844. I find no further record of Louis and Marie.
- 9. Josette St. George married 3 July 1864 at Ripon, WI, to Adolph Glodgo/Gladu (date from her obituary). She died 23 June 1941 Marathon co, WI, age 93; her death record gives a birth date of 7 Nov 1847, but various census records indicate 1849 or 1850 is closer to the truth. Adolph, who was born 15 Dec 1844-48 NY and died 22 Oct 1925 Flieth township, Marathon co, WI, was probably the son of Pierre Gladu and Geneviève Stebenne, who settled early near Keeseville. As a point of interest. Adolph's brothers, Peter/Pierre (who married Abraham Bruley's sister Marie-Zoé) and Joseph used the surname Brazile/Bozille (and half a dozen other spellings!), which seems to have been used as a dit name by some of the Gladu clan in Clinton county possibly in tribute to the father of Pierre Gladu Sr., Bazile Gladu dit Sanschagrin, of Marieville, PQ. Most of Josette and Adolph's children were born in Wisconsin, but one baptism is registered at Keeseville:
 - Damase Gladu, born about 1870, bapt 10 Mar 1872 St-Jean-Baptiste (son of Adolphe Gladu and Josette St. George: sponsors Damase Gladu and Julie Leclerc)

By 1860, son Paschal St. George Jr. and daughter Angeline Terrio had already moved with their families to Ripon township, Fond du Lac county, WI; both are listed there in that census. Shortly, the parents and remaining minor children joined them. But Paschal Sr. was not to live there long.

Josette's pension record (#94580) states that "Paschal St. George, Husband of said Josette St. George and Father of said Levi St. George, died at the town of Brooklyn in the county of Green Lake and state of Wisconsin, previous to the decease of said Levi St. George, to wit on the 25th of November A.D. 1862." Green Lake records do not reflect his presence, and there is no tombstone.

His widow Josette moved with her children to Waupaca county, where she died in 1890. A death record (Waupaca county, Vol. 3, p. 156, #62) lists her as 86 years old, housekeeper, born Canada, widow of Pascle St. George, but gives her a birth date of 5 May 1803.

NORTH CEMETERY TOWN OF BARTON, ORLEANS COUNTY, VERMONT

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North Cemetery is located on the so-called Barton-Orleans road about half way between the two villages. The cemetery is in very good condition, however, many markers have been broken in the past and attempts have been made to repair them sometimes causing various other problems. The terrain is of a sloping nature from west to east, and it appears that there is about 25% of the remaining space available for future use when necessary. Limited burials have been made in the last 50 years.

This cemetery is bordered on the north, south & east boundaries by a white rail fence. The western boundary (in the rear) is a collection of scrub brush and an old wire fence in poor condition.

The dimensions of the cemetery are 350 feet north/south and 225 feet east/west diminishing to about 210 feet. The positions of each marker are accurate as nearly as possible to scale and this plan may be used as a guide to locate any given stone.

Some three years ago I started researching in the Lebeau families for a friend of mine in Plattsburgh, NY. For three years I searched for his great_grandfather's marriage. I never did find his marriage, but we did find his great_grandfather's birth allowing me to take the family all the way back to France.

After discovering there were three Lebeau families to enter Canada, I decided to do all three families; it's easier that way. Family One (F-1), Family Two (F-2), and Family Three (F-3). I have a Tandy 1000 TX with a 20 meg.hard drive and I store all three families in one large Lebeau data file. By lableing them (F-1), (F-2), and (F-3), I can store them all in one file. I can print one mass list of over 4300 Lebeau marriages, or I can print a list of each family my itself.

I have found in the past that most families can not go back past their grandfather and grandmother. I am compiling a marriage index of all three Lebeau families. I will probably have 80% of the grandfathers and grandmothers of all three families. One only needs to find his or her grandparents and they will be able to take their Lebeau family all the way back to France.

With this journal I'm printing the first six generations of Family Two (F-2). This family started as Lebeau, then to Lebeau dit Lajeunesse, then to Lebeau dit Beaufils, and then to Lebeau dit Caza, and finally to Caza alone. Jean-Bte. Amable Lebeau dit Caza s/o Pierre-Etienne dit Beaufils and Genevieve Brisset dit Beaupre appears to be the first of this family to use <u>CAZA</u> as his surname. We believe it's because his grandmother on his mother's side was named <u>CASAUBON</u>. This is only an assumption as no other reason has presented itself to us.

There is a single family history done by Father Wilbert Lebeau of Odgensburg, NY, done around the 1920's. This book was lost for many years and has just been recently found by Father Lebeau's decendants. Ιt is all in French and tells about pirates, marriages to Indians and massacres, perhaps it will also shed some light taking of the on the name CAZA.



CANADIAN SETTLERS FROM THE CARIGNAN REGIMENT

Early in 1664 the King of France, Louis XIV, appointed Alexander de Pronville, Marquis de Tracy, viceroy of the American possessions of France and Daniel de Remy, Sieur de Courcelles, governor of Canada. The new viceroy and governor left Rochelle, France, on 26 February 1664 sailing for Canada by way of Cayenne, Guadaloupe, Martinique, and San Domingo. They reached Québec 30 June 1664. With them came a regiment of about 1200 men, soldiers from the Carignan-Salieres Regiment well seasoned by service against the Turks under Count Cologny for the Emperor Leopold.*

A list of the men of this regiment who chose to stay and settle in New France was drawn up about 1929 by Léo Leymarie in Paris. It is a useful list because it includes the names, the surnames, and, in most cases, the military nicknames of the soldiers; for example: Pierre Barbarin, dit Grand Maison. In certain instances, the date of death is also given. Among the names on the list is that of de Chasy, "tué au lac Champlain, 19 Juillet 1666," for whom the rivers and the Town of Chazy, Clinton County, New York, are named.

Additional information concerning these men can be found in such sources as Réné Jetté's DICTIONNAIRE GÉNÉALOGIQUE DE FAMILLES DU QUÉBEC (1983). Leymarie's list, however, must not be considered complete. For example, Jetté writes of a Canadian settler, Pierre Montarras dit Marmande, "soldat au régiment de Carignan," who is not included by Leymarie. Leymarie's sources are unknown to us.

We wish to thank Michel Wyczynski, Archivist, French Archives, Manuscript Division, National Archives of Canada, who was instrumental in securing this list for us. Currently, he is preparing an article concerning the manuscript sources relating to the Carignan Regiment which are held at the National Archives of Canada which will be published in the July-August 1989 issue of their magazine, THE ARCHIVIST. A detailed guide describing the documents will be available sometime after February 1990.

Heraldry flourishes in Canada

In Ottawa on 4 June 1988, His Royal Highness The Prince Edward presented Royal Letters Patent from Her Majesty The Queen to Her Excellency Governor General Jeanne Sauvé, creating The Canadian Heraldic Authority. Canada is the first Commonwealth country outside the United Kingdom to acquire the privilege of granting coats of arms. The establishment of this important new institution will be of great interest to all family historians with Canadian ancestry. A full account of the presentation ceremony appears in the September 1988 issue of Heraldry in Canada, the journal of The Heraldry Society of Canada.

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
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
