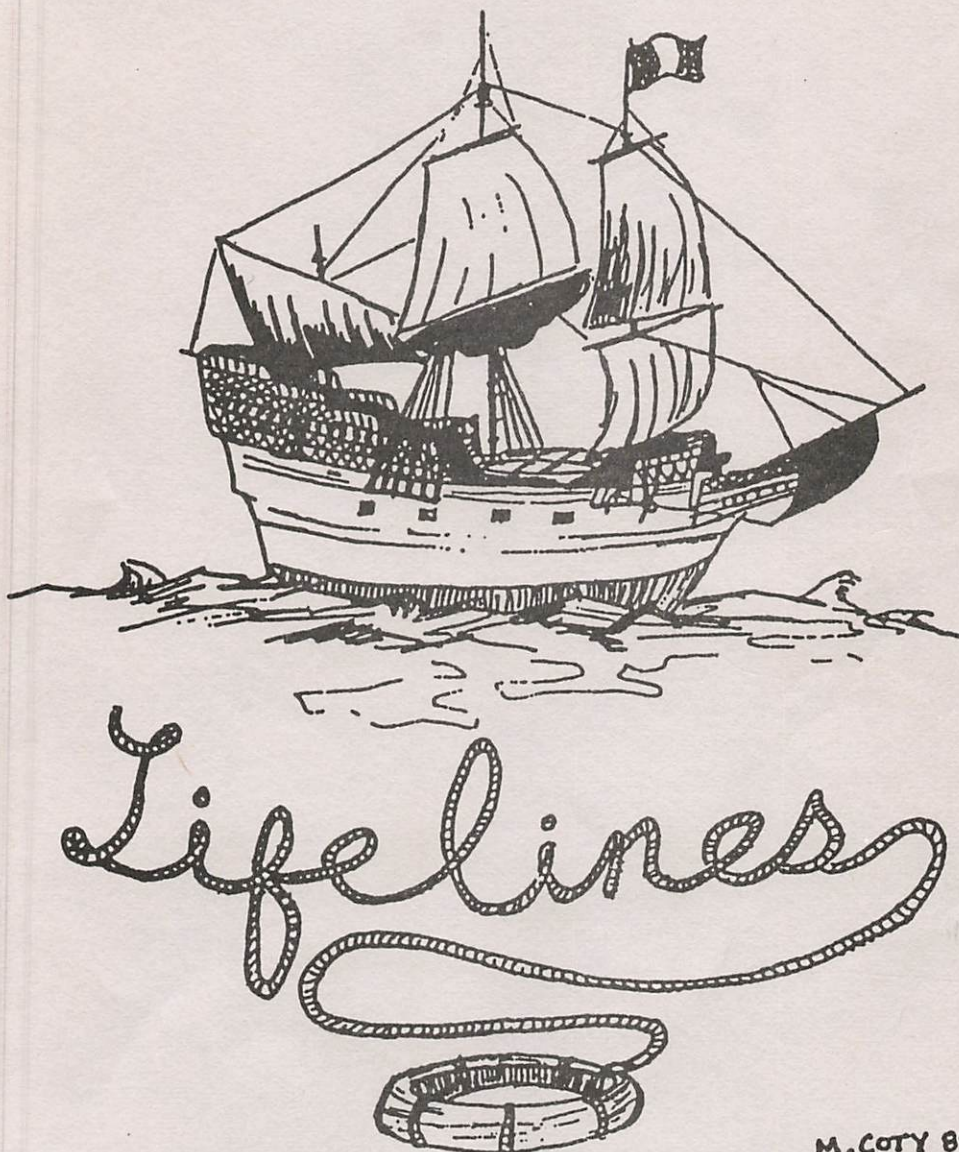

The Soucy/Bérubé/Lévesque tangle

"Don't just go to the library and copy everything in sight!" my first instructor said years ago. Errors do sometimes find their way into printed genealogical sources, because it's difficult to read and transcribe old handwriting and to proofread new printings. There the incorrect data is often picked up and carried forward by other researchers. If you don't read the original language or have access to those original sources, those readily available printed sources are all you have. If they're wrong, so is your carefully constructed family tree. What follows is the story of one such minor error, apparently compounded by a later researcher, and of my attempts to unravel the error and use it to explain a conundrum in my own family research.

I first became aware of the error in Abbe Adolphe Michaud's *Genealogie des Familles de la Rivière-Ouelle* (Quebec, 1908), where (p. 390) he claims that Marie-Madeleine Lévesque, widow of Pierre Bérubé and daughter of François-Robert Lévesque and Charlotte Aubert, took as her second husband in 1763 at Ste-Anne-de-la-Pocatière, one Pierre Soucy [Soucy]. However, the Soucy entry (p. 669) says Pierre Soucy (son of Joseph Soucy and Madeleine Migner) married 17 January 1763 at Rivière-Ouelle, Karmouraska county, to Charlotte Lévesque, widow of Pierre Bérubé.

This minor error didn't seem dangerous in itself, since both Drouin (p. 1244) and Tanguay (vol. 7, pp. 203-4) clearly say that Pierre Soucy married Charlotte Lévesque. However, Tanguay doesn't continue the Pierre Soucy/Charlotte Lévesque line, though 6 of their children were baptized at Rivière-Ouelle and several married there. Moreover, Tanguay does say (vol. 5, p. 396, and vol. 2, p. 263) that Madeleine Lévesque, wife of Pierre Bérubé, died at Rivière-Ouelle on 11 February 1764.

Published marriage repertoires, however, are more widely available, and in his more recent publication of *Repertoire des mariages de Rivière-Ouelle* in 1971, Abbe Armand Proulx seems to repeat Abbe Michaud's error and to further confuse the issue. At one point (p. 481), he says that Pierre Soucy married on 17 Jan 1763 at Rivière-Ouelle to Charlotte Lévesque (who, he claims, had first married Pierre Bérubé on 25 November 1733 at Rivière-Ouelle; actually, Charlotte married Pierre Bérubé, son of Mathurin Bérubé and Angélique Miville, on 11 Feb 1749 at Rivière-Ouelle). At another point (p. 319), he says that Madeleine Lévesque married at Rivière-Ouelle 1) on 25 Nov 1733, Pierre Bérubé, son of Pierre Bérubé and Genevieve Dancosse, and 2) on 17 Jan 1763, Pierre Soucy, son of Joseph Soucy and Madeleine Mignier. Charlotte and Madeleine seem to have become the same person! This is all the more confusing because both Michaud and Proulx list marriages (in the Soucy entries) for children of Pierre Soucy and his wife Charlotte Lévesque.

Confused? I was, too! Clearly, this is one case where only recourse to the original church registers (or microfilm of them) can clarify the situation. I checked microfilm of the Rivière-Ouelle 1751-1796 registers (LDS #1302263).

There, after sorting out the many Lévesque, Bérubé and Soucy entries, the story is easily resolved. There were two Pierre Bérubés, who married sisters Madeleine and Charlotte Lévesque:

- 1) Pierre Bérubé, son of Pierre & Genevieve Dancosse
married 25 Nov 1733 Rivière-Ouelle [Tanguay, Michaud, Drouin]
Madeleine Lévesque, daughter of François-Robert & Charlotte Aubert

This couple had at least eleven children born 1735 to 1756, whose baptisms (and sometimes marriages and burials) are recorded at Rivière-Ouelle.

Soucy/Bérubé/Lévesque (Fenton)

- 2) Pierre Bérubé, son of Mathurin & Marie-Angelique Miville
married 11 Feb 1749 Rivière-Ouelle [same sources]
Marie-Charlotte Lévesque, daughter of François-Robert & Charlotte Aubert

Baptisms of their children from 1749 to 1760 overlap those of the first couple, and marriages and the death of the youngest are all recorded at Rivière-Ouelle.

To complicate matters, the two Pierre Bérubés died within weeks of each other, both at Rivière-Ouelle, and neither burial entry gives sufficient identifying information:

- 1) On 24 February 1760. . . buried Pierre Bérubé, died the day before, age about 49 years.
- 2) On 21 March 1760. . . buried Pierre Bérubé, died the day before, age about 38 years.

Obviously, the first would seem to be the elder Pierre, born 22 June 1710 at Rivière-Ouelle and married to Madeleine Lévesque in 1733; and the second, the younger Pierre, born 4 Feb. 1722 at Rivière-Ouelle and married to Marie-Charlotte Lévesque in 1749.

It's easy to see how an error could be made, but which widow of which Pierre Bérubé married Pierre Soucy? The marriage record at Rivière-Ouelle, dated 17 January 1763, clearly says:

Pierre Soussy [Soucy], son of deceased Joseph Soucy and Madeleine Menie [Mignier], of the parish of Ste-Anne, [married] Marie-Charlotte Leveque, widow of Pierre Bérubé and daughter of François Leveque and Charlotte Aubé. . . in presence of Joseph Soucy, François and Jean Leveque, Mathurin Bérubé. Signed: Joseph Migné [and others]

It seems unlikely that Pierre Soucy, baptised 11 October 1737 at Ste-Anne-de-la-Pocatière (Tanguay, vol. 7, p. 203), would have married Madeleine Lévesque, born in 1710 (Jetté, p. 732) and 27 years older than he! Moreover, Madeleine died about a year later:

- 11 February 1764. . . buried Marie-Magdaleine Leveque, died the day before, age about 50 years, in presence of Joseph Deschenes, Pierre Soucy, Joseph Bérubé, Augustin Dubé

If she married a Pierre Soucy, it was not this one, for there are baptism, burial and marriage records at Rivière-Ouelle for six children of Pierre Soucy and Charlotte Lévesque, their births spanning the period 1763 to 1774 (extending past Madeleine's death date):

- 1) Marie-Josephte, b + bap 18 Nov 1763 Rivière-Ouelle; mar 22 Nov 1790 same, to Jean Bérubé
- 2) Marie-Genevieve, b 4, bap 5 Feb 1765 Rivière-Ouelle; mar 3 Oct 1791 same, to Joseph Laplante
- 3) Pierre, b + bap 5 Oct 1766 Rivière-Ouelle; d 3, bur 4 Nov 1767 same (age 14 mo)
- 4) Jean-Germain, b 3, bap 5 Feb 1768 Rivière-Ouelle; d 19, bur 20 June 1793 same (age 25 yrs)
- 5) Prosper, b + bap 6 Dec 1769 Rivière-Ouelle; 1m 27 Oct 1800 same, to Victoire Plourde; 2m 15 July 1822 same, to Marie-Anne Lavoie [Michaud, Proulx]
- 6) Theotiste, bap 13 Aug 1774 Rivière-Ouelle

Why have I become so interested in unraveling this? Because some confusion exists in the church records of St-Cuthbert, Berthier county, about this family. I claim descent, not from Pierre Soucy, but from Charlotte Leveque's first husband, Pierre Bérubé (son of Mathurin and Angelique

Miville). Their daughter, Marie-Anne Bérubé (born 19 January 1759 at Rivière-Ouelle) married 10 Jan 1780 there to Jean-François Miville-Deschênes (born and baptised 30 March 1780 at Rivière-Ouelle, son of Pierre-François Miville-Deschênes and his second wife Genevieve Lebel). Jean-François and Marie-Anne had eight children born and baptised at Rivière-Ouelle before they moved to the parish of St-Cuthbert:

- 1) Pierre-François Miville-Deschênes, b + bap 21 Oct 1780: the only one to remain at Rivière-Ouelle; 1m) 1803 Rivière-Ouelle, Charlotte Lavoie; 2m) 1821 Kamouraska, Celeste Lauzier [Michaud, Proulx]
- 2) Marie-Josephte Miville-Deschênes, b 22, bap 23 Apr 1784 Rivière-Ouelle
- 3) Marie-Anastasia Miville-Deschênes, b + bap 2 Apr 1786 Rivière-Ouelle
- 4) Charlotte Miville-Deschênes, b + bap 19 Mar 1788 Rivière-Ouelle
- 5) Marie-Julie Miville-Deschênes, b + bap 17 Oct 1790 Rivière-Ouelle
- 6) Jean-Hilaire Miville-Deschênes, b 21, bap 22 July 1792 Rivière-Ouelle; d 10, bur 11 Nov 1792 same (age 4 mo)
- 7) Joseph-Marie Miville-Deschênes, b + bap 19 Nov 1793 Rivière-Ouelle
- 8) Jean Miville-Deschênes, b + bap 29 Apr 1796 Rivière-Ouelle; d 3, bur 4 Sep 1796 same (age 4 mo)

It's always hardest to trace a family when it moves to a new area: events may not be recorded in the confusion of the move; and the record-keepers in the new residence may be unfamiliar with the family names. The Miville-Deschêne family were still new to the parish of St-Cuthbert in 1799, and it certainly must have been a difficult time for Marie-Anne. Did she call on her mother and step-father for help when disaster struck, or were the Soucy couple also residing in St-Cuthbert? At any rate, Pierre Soucy and Charlotte Lévesque might have been there in the winter of 1799-1800, for the first two identifiable family records at St-Cuthbert refer to Jean-François' wife as *Marie Soucy*. Obviously, whoever told him so, the good curé who made these records thought Pierre Soucy was the father, not merely the stepfather, of Marie-Anne:

- 1) 1 Nov 1799. . . buried François Miville *diz* Deschenes, farmer, spouse of Marie Soucy, died yesterday, age 46 years, in presence of Pierre Miville, his cousin
- 2) 14 Mar 1800. . . baptised Marie-Genevieve, born today, daughter of Jean-François Miville *diz* Deschenes and Marie Soucy; godfather Pierre Jacques Boulet, godmother Marie Bérare-Lepine, spouse of Ignace Piché; *posthumé*

Some time later, what seems to be a burial record for Marie-Anne Bérubé is almost illegible:

10 August 1833. . . buried Josephte or Marie [one name seems to be written on top of the other; the microfilm doesn't distinguish] Brube, widow of Joseph? [or François?] Minvil *diz* Deschêne of this parish, died day before yesterday, age about 73 years, in presence of Michel Lauzon, Jean-Baptiste Frappier [her son-in-law?]

Fortunately, St-Cuthbert marriage and burial records of the children are clearer in naming the parents and establishing this family group as the one from Rivière-Ouelle:

Soucy/Bérubé/Lévesque (Fenton)

- 1) Marie-Josephte (born by 1784, of age in 1805), married (daughter of dec François Miville-Déchènes and Marie-Anne Bérubé) on 19 Aug 1805 at St-Cuthbert, to Louis Jacques. . . present Noël Morel her uncle
- 2) Marie-Anastasia (born by 1786, of age in 1807), married (daughter of dec François Miville-Déchènes and Marie-Anne Bérubé) on 2 Feb 1807 at St-Cuthbert, to Cuthbert Denys [Cuthbert Jean-St. Onge]. . . present Louis Jacques, her brother-in-law
- 3) Charlotte (b c1786); died 26, buried 28 Nov 1824 St-Cuthbert (age 38, daughter of François Miville d/z Déchène and Marie-Anne Bérubé; present Cuthbert Denys, her brother-in-law)
- 4) Marie-Julie (born after 1786, minor in 1807), married (daughter of François Miville-Déchènes and Marie-Anne Bérubé) on 20 April 1807 at St-Cuthbert, to Denis Robillard-Lambert of Ste-Genevieve. . . present Cuthbert Denys, Louis Jacques, her brothers-in-law
- 5) Joseph-Michel (born before 1799, of age 1827), married (resident of St-Hyacinthe, son of dec François Miville-Déchène and Marie-Anne Bérubé of this parish) on 26 Feb 1827 at St-Cuthbert, to Marguerite Fafart. . . present Louis Jacques, Cuthbert Denys, his brothers-in-law
- 6) Marie-Genevieve, married (daughter of Jean-Baptiste [s/c] Miville d/z Déchène and Marie-Anne Bérubé) on 19 April 1825 at St-Cuthbert, to Jean-Baptiste Frappier. . . present Cuthbert Denys and Louis Jacques, brothers-in-law of the bride

Obviously, this data, like that in any genealogy, is incomplete. I've not checked Rivière-Ouelle registers before 1751 or after 1796. Later registers might reveal death/burial record for Charlotte Lévesque and her second husband, Pierre Soucy -- unless they too moved to St-Cuthbert. I checked the St-Cuthbert registers some time ago, before I had reason to search for Soucy and Lévesque surnames there. The 1800 marriage record of Prosper Soucy and the 1803 marriage record of Pierre-François Miville-Deschènes might yield clues to their respective parents' residence at those times. the border of la Petite Auvergne, a few miles from St-Bernard. Two years later, this same land was leased to Louis Bédard for a period of five years. The contract included the cultivation of the land and the use of lodgings found on the habitation. It was not until the late 1690's when the Auclair family permanently resided there.

According to the agreements of Jacques and Louis Bédard with André Auclair, signed on November 15, 1689, the said brothers gave André the power of attorney: the power to search for, manage, sell or lease any property and goods in France that belonged to their late parents, Isaac Bédard and Marie Girard, and claim them as inheritance. Jacques offered to André for his services the equivalent of 150 livres worth of goods that he (André) would ship back to Canada. Louis Bédard, on the other hand, promised his brother-in-law one quarter of all he would receive from his inheritance. The shipment of said goods by boat entailed port fees, etc., which the Bédard brothers honored.

André must have sailed for France early in the spring of 1690; for, a formal agreement was drawn up by the notary on April 4, 1690, between Marie and her brother, Louis: whereby, from the first of May until André's return, Louis Bédard will live with his sister in order to perform all the farm chores and whatever she needs to be done. Likewise, Marie promised to pay her brother twelve livres, plus meals, each month that he served.

As years passed, so did this lineage increase. Eight children were the product of this union. Highly respected in his community, André was elected in 1698 marguillier (parish administrator) of the parish of Charlesbourg. His brother, Pierre, had previously been so honored in 1691.

THE LIFE AND TIMES OF ANDRE AUCLERC

1662 - 1699

Born April 23, 1662, in St-Vivien (Charente-Maritime), France, André Auclair together with his older brother, Pierre, was brought to Québec in 1666 by his mother, the widow Suzanne Aubineau, who sincerely hoped to find a better life for herself and her two sons. The year following her arrival in New France, Suzanne married Mathias Campagna. André grew up in the household of his stepfather in St-François parish, Ile d'Orléans, and at an early age began to perform his duties as a farmhand.

Following the defeat of the Iroquois by the French forces in 1666, there were years of relative calm. Yet it still was customary to keep a musket close at hand while clearing land for cultivation or plowing the fields. Periodic raids were still not uncommon. Because of this uncertainty and for the protection of the habitants of Canada, King Louis XIV ordered the creation of parish militias in 1669, requiring some service of all males from the ages of sixteen to sixty years.

There is no record at what age André fulfilled his military commitment, if indeed he served at all; for, at an early age he left Ile d'Orléans and settled in the city of Québec. Because the metropolis was teeming with inhabitants, opportunities for concessions and sales of lands in the Charlesbourg area, a suburb northeast of the city, were quite favorable. Here, the young Auclair at the age of seventeen found a suitable land two arpents (acres) wide and thirty in depth. The sale was finalized with the owners,

Pierre Canard and his wife Marie Peltier on June 4, 1679.

André had a special reason for the acquisition of this particular property. He was keenly aware that two months earlier his brother, Pierre, had purchased 2 x 30 arpents of land from Michel Chrestien, located slightly east of his own. Both farm lands were situated in Village St-Bernard within the parish of Charlesbourg. These were the lands which Pierre and André cultivated and farmed; ancestral homes that gave rise to the progenies of both Auclair families. But they were not their sole acquisitions over the years. Land speculation was a common occurrence in 17th century Canada, which attracted buyers and sellers even beyond the confines of the area.

Like so many earlier settlers, Pierre and André Auclair were attracted to the region of Charlesbourg which derived its name from the patron saint of the parish, St-Charles Borromée. Nestled in the foothills of the Laurentides, it had already been renown for its lush vegetation and fertile land.

The parish of Charlesbourg was canonically erected on September 26, 1693, with a resident curé. Prior to that time Charlesbourg had been administered by missionary priests from the Society of Jesus and the Seminary of Québec. The confines of the parish itself were extensive, covering small villages of which the church was the center geographically. At first this house of worship was called a chapelle because of its small size, built in 1675 on the site of the present church, on land that was owned by the Jesuits and given to the parish by them in 1686 - land that is still owned by the Church. The chapelle was originally constructed of upright, roughly hewn piles, caulked with re-inforced clay and roofed with hardy straw.

By 1697, it was gradually reaching stages of dilapidation despite occasional efforts to preserve it. Under the first pastor, a structure of masonry replaced the chapelle. Upon its completion during the summer of 1697, the parishioners gathered to hear the first Mass offered in thanksgiving, among whom were the Auclair brothers and their families.

After a very short courtship, André Auclair asked for the hand of Marie Bédard, daughter of Isaac Bédard, one of the earliest inhabitants of Charlesbourg. A former student of the Ursuline Nuns of Québec, this young girl at the tender age of sixteen years had recently been widowed by the sudden death of her husband, Nicolas Huppé, who had left her with an infant son, Charles.

On February 16, 1681, the king's notary, Gilles Rageot, recorded the marriage contract of André Auclair and Marie Bédard. This joyous event took place in the mill of the Seigneurie de Notre-Dame-des-Anges, Petite Auvergne, where members of the family, friends and official witnesses gathered, among whom were André's mother, Suzanne, his stepbrother, Charles, and of course his own brother, Pierre.

The contract consisted of a declaration of both spouses that they take one another as his and her own; that they become co-owners of all real and personal property; that they be not bound by one another's debts incurred before marriage; that they stipulate the entitlements of the surviving spouse; that Marie's son, Charles Huppé, aged fifteen days, be reared as one of the family and have the right of succession to his father's patrimony. Other prescriptions were mentioned in the contract that required the two parties' consent to make them binding. André and Marie were married in Notre-Dame de Québec on February 17, 1681.

Not long thereafter did the young couple settle on their farm in Village St-Bernard. This land will have increased in size to five arpents in width and thirty in depth by 1695 from the purchase of the Charles Chartré adjoining property and a donation from Charles Pallantin.

Farming was the predominant occupation of the majority of habitants. The young couple struggled to make this agricultural endeavor a success. Such was the goal of every farmer.

Then too, the aim of the Ursulines was to instruct Marie in the various arts of homemaking such as they existed in 1681, notwithstanding the added burden of farm chores. She must have been familiar with the operation of the spinning wheel which created the yarn and thread from which she fashioned the type of homespun clothing for the appropriate seasons of the year for the entire family. What garments they did possess from France were often found wanting in warmth for the habitants in Canada.

On May 4, 1681, André acting for his wife, Marie, entered into an agreement with Michel Huppé, father of Nicolas, the late husband of Marie Bédard, whereby a specific term in the Huppé-Bédard wedding contract of March 4, 1680, was to be fully implemented: namely, Michel's promise to give 300 livres (approx. \$900) to his son and his bride, Marie Bédard. As of this date, there remained 153 livres owed by Michel. According to the notary, it was agreed that installments of 51 livres be paid annually by Michel within a three year period. On March 8, 1682, the amount of 51 livres was paid.

In 1687, Isaac Bédard sold to his son-in-law, André, a piece of land two arpents in width and twelve to fourteen in depth on

the border of la Petite Auvergne, a few miles from St-Bernard. Two years later, this same land was leased to Louis Bédard for a period of five years. The contract included the cultivation of the land and the use of lodgings found on the habitation. It was not until the late 1690's when the Auclair family permanently resided there.

As years passed, so did this lineage increase. Eight children were the product of this union. Highly respected in his community, André was elected in 1698 marguillier (parish administrator) of the parish of Charlesbourg. His brother, Pierre, had previously been so honored in 1691.

André did not possess the robustness of his brother, but managed the farm with the help of his wife and some of his sons for the rest of his wholesome life. He was a young man by present-day standards when he died at the age of thirty-six on May 14, 1699, probably a victim of an epidemic that was ravaging the area at the time. His wife, Marie, followed him three years later, succumbing to a similar scourge. Both honored ancestors were laid to rest in the parish cemetery of Charlesbourg.

Some light is shed upon the extent of André and Marie's personal and real estate at the time of their deaths from the inventory required by law and formally requested by the oldest relative of the deceased. This task fell to André's brother, Pierre, in his capacity as official guardian of the deceased parents' children, since they were all minors. (Before 1782, in Canada, the minority age extended to twenty-five years.) In addition, a surrogate guardian, Jacques Huppé, was selected as guardian of his nephew, Charles Huppé, Marie's son by a previous marriage. This formality was necessary to protect the rights of heirs.

The family gathered at the home of the deceased at la Petite Auvergne. Also present by law were the royal notary, Jean-Robert Duprac, an official appraiser of the Québec administration, Sieur Mavendeau, to estimate the value of each item found on the estate, assisted by Paul Chalifour, Thomas Payot, and Pierre Morin.

According to this inventory, André and Marie Auclair at their demise owned two pieces of real estate: the one originally bought in 1679 at Village St-Bernard, where there were stored $4\frac{1}{2}$ bushels of peas, 4 bushels of oats, $1\frac{1}{2}$ bushels of barley. There was also on the premises a 30' by 20' shed badly in need of repair. Noted also was an

old unused plow; the farm at la Petite Auvergne, on the other hand, covered an area of 78 arpents, 40 arpents of which was arable land containing a bushel of peas, $\frac{1}{2}$ bushel of barley and some hay. Listed on the property was a house, as well as a shed and stable. The kitchen wares appraised were like those found in any seventeenth century farmhouse, including farm related receptacles for making and storing food products.

According to the appraiser, the farm was well-stocked with the necessary animals and poultry to sustain family need. Notably listed were a horse and cart, as well as the ever-present musket.

The officials relied heavily on Etienne, André's oldest son, during the inventory process because of his familiarity with his parents' properties and possessions.

The inventory was concluded on July 23, 1703, with the signatures of those participating, most prominently that of notary Duprac. The settlement of the estate was left in the capable hands of Pierre Auclair, to whom fell the grave responsibility of rendering to each of André's heirs his or her share of the patrimony after all liabilities had been satisfied.

"Is genealogy for everyone?" she asked. "Of course it is. The family is the basic unit of society and the love of one's own nuclear family extends naturally backwards in time to embrace all those who have gone before you. We grow to love our ancestors because we are of them and through genealogy we extend this love to all mankind because we, as brothers and sisters, are all connected."

In 1704, a group of cultivators were digging at a place called St.Louis, near Montreal, when to their amazement they uncovered the remains of ten bodies which had been buried there. All that remained with the bones were some articles of clothing and some personal effects. The priest took control of the remains and through his investigation, with the help of other village officials, determined that the victims had been massacred at Lachine in 1687. Some of the bodies disclosed evidence that they died a violent death. They had been brutally hacked and mutilated. They were identified as :

- 1) **CLAUDE De La MOTHE**: S/O JACQUES and FRANCOISE BONNEVILLE b. in 1647 in France. Married on 12 NOV 1685 at Lachine to FRANCOISE SABOURIN (b. 3 JUL 1670 Quebec, re-married on 17 NOV 1687 at Lachine to PIERRE SERAT S/O FRANCOIS and FRANCOISE MARTIN of LaRoche). She was the D/O of JEAN and MATHURINE REGNAULT. He was killed on 23 FEB 1687 by the Iroquois.
- 2) **JEAN BAPTISTE LESUEUR**: b. in 1666 at Pont L'Evesque in Lisieux, Normandy. He was a soldier of the DuCruzet Company who was killed by the Iroquois on 18 OCT 1687.
- 3) **LOUIS JETS**: b. in 1663 at de Courson de Aunis, France. He was killed by the Iroquois on 17 NOV 1687.
- 4) **JEAN VINCENT**: b. in 1642 in France. He was killed by the Iroquois on 21 SEP 1687.
- 5) **JEAN DE LALONDE**: b. in 1640 at Havre de Grace, France. He married MARIE BARBARY (b. 1639, re-married on 26 JAN 1688 at Lachine to PIERRE de TABAUT) He was killed by the Iroquois on 30 SEP 1687.
- 6) **PIERRE BONNEAU**: S/O ISAIE and JEANNE SIMONEN. He was b. in 1650. He married on 6 NOV 1681 at Lachine to MADELEINE GIGNARD (b. 22 AUG 1662 at Chateau Richer She remarried 15 NOV 1687 at Lachine to ANTOINE RENAULT S/O PIERRE and MADELEINE FLEURENT. A third marriage on 28 JAN 1704 at Quebec to PIERRE GATIEN. He was killed by the Iroquois on 30 SEP 1687 at Lachine.
- 7) **PIERRE PERTHUIS**: S/O SYLVAIN and MATHURINE RACICOT. b. in 1644 in France. Married on 10 DEC 1668 at Montreal to CLAUDE DAMISE (b. 1650, buried 6 OCT 1705 at Montreal) D/O ETIENNE and GENEVIEVE PIOCHE of Paris. He was killed by the Iroquois in 1687.

- 8) HENRI FROMAGEAU: b. in 1660 in France. He was killed by the Iroquois on 30 SEP 1687 at Lachine.
- 9) PIERRE PETITEAU: b. in 1667 in France. He was killed by the Iroquois on 30 SEP 1687 at Lachine.
- 10) PIERRE CAMUS: b. 1666 in France. He was killed by the Iroquois on 10 SEP 1687 at Lachine.

On 2 June 1667, two unsavory soldiers were tried and convicted of desertion and theft. They were:

- 1) PIERRE NICOLAS dit LAVALLEE : For stealing goods from the hospital. He was sentenced to be branded with a hot iron of the "fleur de lys". Also four hours of hard labor, then he was to be hanged. Among some of the above punishments, he was to have an ear cut off for stealing a pair of Indian Raquettes (snow shoes). The hanging sentence was for desertion.
- 2) RENE JOUCHON: A soldier. A desertion and stealing as an accomplice to the above individual, he was to be whipped then branded with the "fleur de lys", then he was to be hung by his feet to witness the hanging of PIERRE NICOLAS dit LAVALLEE. He would be placed in prison with irons chained to his feet until such time that the courts decide he had enough punishment, then he would be released.

Captain & Seigneur Antoine Pécardy de Contrecoeur

His Military Service and Proof of Nobility

The descendants of Captain Pécardy, many of whom live in our area, have every right to be proud of their blood line. He was born in the French Dauphine in 1596. He lived to the exceedingly old age of ninety-two, dying in 1688. By family tradition he was killed by Iroquois while defending his seigneurie of Contrecoeur granted him in 1672. Those who stem from him may also descend from other notable families among whom are the Denys; La Cornes; Bouchers and St. Ours.

French authorities knew its colony on the St. Lawrence could not survive constant attacks by the Iroquois and other enemies unless aided by a strong military force. In 1664 the twenty companies of the Carignan Regiment with a company from each of the Chambelle, Orleans, Poiteau and l'Allier regiments landed in Quebec. This army of 1200 men was mostly armed with flintlocks and an early form of bayonette. Their fire power, often twice a minute, was double that of the matchlocks used on the Continent until 1693. The Carignan was the only complete regiment ever sent to New France. When it was disbanded a few over 400 of the army elected to stay in Canada. They were an important factor in the colony's security. Among the most prominent of them was Antoine Pécardy, who gave his strange nickname to his land holding - Contrecoeur. It can mean the back of a chimney, against the grain and reluctantly. One speculation is that he did not like being a mercenary but had to become one in order to exist in an area devastated by war.

Pécardy's regiment was named for Prince Thomas of Savoy-Carignan, whose family controlled the mountain passes from France to Italy. His military successes were in France, Spain and Italy. Wealth permitted him to hire mercenaries and sell his regiment's services. After his death in 1656 its next commander was Johann von Balthazar (a German who led it against the Turks.) He turned it over to his friend, the Marquis de Salières before it sailed for Canada.

Pécardy's first marriage was fruitless. When he was seventy and widowed he married young Barbe Denys de la Trinité. The marriage ceremony would not have been performed had not both been of the noblesse. In Old and New France nobility was of the utmost importance. It was the key to more than economic and military advancement. A minor example is non-nobles could never rise above the army rank of lieutenant. Barbe gave her husband a daughter, Marie, and his sons, François Antoine and Claude Pierre.

In the bitter winter of 1666/1667 the battle scarred ninety-year-old Antoine Pécardy travelled from his seigneurie to Quebec to register in Canada the nobility granted him in Paris on January 1661 by Louis XIV. He was remiss in not doing so years earlier; He did so now so that the rank in life of his children could not be adversely questioned. After due study the Conseil Souverain approved of his Lettres de Noblesse on the 25th of February 1687 as well as his own report from which excerpts with explanations follow. (Archives Province of Quebec. Letters de Noblesses, etc., Vol. 1, pp 103-110.) He had been a lieutenant for twenty years and a captain for fifteen.

During his fighting years Europe was agonized by big, little, civil, religious and private wars. Its military leaders changed sides so often that it is hard to tell who was combatting who and why. He

In his THE SHORES OF CHAMPLAIN (1892), Daniel Taylor mentions (p.31) that previous to 1800 some French refugees lived in huts on the south point of Point au Fer in the Town of Champlain, Clinton County, New York, among them Joseph Staves.

Barbara J. Blaylock-Marek of Eagan, Minnesota, writes us that her ancestor, a Joseph Staves, came from Chambley, Québec, between 1800 and 1803 to settle in the Town of Peru, Clinton County. Two of his sons served during the War of 1812 and later applied for bounty land and pensions from the federal government. 16 May 1878 John Stave (born c.1792 at Chambley) in Plattsburgh, Clinton County, stated he was "a Frenchman by birth & in the time of the war went by the name of Baptiste Lamarah & John Stave" (Pension #1086, National Archives).

Mitchell Stave of North Hartland, Niagara County, New York, declared he was of "French descent his father came with Lafayette and was one of his volunteers and fought through the revolution with him - the (our) French name was Marrow or Mareau or Marreaux - it is pronounced Marrow', as I am no scholar I cannot tell my lawyer how to spell it-" He also said, "In English I suppose the Mitchell is Michael so that my name may also be put on the roll Michael Marrow..." (Pension/Bounty Land #34.898, National Archives).

The obituary of another son, Anthony Staves of Capital Park, Des Moines, Iowa, in THE IOWA STATE REGISTER for 12 May 1891 mentions he was born in Peru, New York, 25 March 1803. The deceased had spoken "often of his father who left sunny France when a youth, and coming over with Lafayette to fight for American independence; of his being taken by the enemy and living on bread and water in a British prison; later on of three older brothers, John, Abram [born 1800, Lower Canada] and Mitchell, who served in the War of 1812."

destroyed. At each village large crosses bearing the arms of France were erected. Tracy's aim had been to exterminate the Iroquoian Tribe. Probably to save face on October 17th the army was placed in battle array at the "Fort of Andaraque". Muskets and cannon were fired. The shout of "vivre Le Roy" was repeated three times. The Mohawk Canton was claimed for France by right of conquest. Pierre Duquest, Kings Royal Attorney, drew up the official report. It names the important persons present at the ceremony. Pécardy, the third to sign, was stated as noble. His simple signature was "de Contrecoeur". The document was rushed back to Quebec before the St. Lawrence froze. The Captain of Tracy's guards carried it to Versailles where it was presented to the king. Had Pécardy's claims been false he could not have escaped exposure and punishment.

The pension records of Union Civil War Veterans are indexed at the National Archives, Washington, D.C. in microfilm series #T288, 544 rolls. The pension folders may be examined on site, or they can be requested by mail, and partially photocopied. The latter method does not insure that the most helpful documents will be included.

While searching for references to my ancestors, ADOLPH FONTAINE and ALEXANDER GIROUX I did extract any Genealogical data found among other FOUNTAIN/LA FONTAINE and GIROUX / GERO / JERREAU etc. folders. Because the surname spelling was so arbitrary, I have grouped them together, and arranged them by given name.

Copies of these records can be obtained by following the instructions on the form 80(7-84).

AMA LA FONTAINE, 1st Vt. Vol. from Newport, killed in action. Born Ame Alphonse Rodriguez ROBERT on 3.9.1844 to Benonie ROBERT dit LA FONTAINE, who was living in St. Edwige Compton P.Q. and Marie FARREL. Benonie was the brother of Octave, and son of Benoni ROBERT and Genevieve PETIT dit BEAUCHEMIN, married 17.10.1838 at St. Mathieu De Beloeil. Marie was daughter of Patrick FARREL and a Mackomac woman. Marie died 20.7.1852, age 38 at Beloeil. In 1865 the family consisted of: Milina 24, Helen 22, Vilbou 20, Aime 18 soldier, Matilda 14, Wm. 4, Adolph 6.

ANDREW LA FOUNTAIN, Pvt. Co. E 124th N.Y. Vol. wounded at Petersburg and Appomatox; claim filed 14.8.1884 at Mooers, age 50, died at Champlain 5.10.1889. Married to Margaret CARTO 15.3.1857 by Rev. Charbonneau at Champlain. Wd. lived with dau. Mrs William ROGERS.

DANIEL D. FOUNTAIN, Co. B. 26th U.S. Inf. Enl. 1863, Colored Vol. Died Binghamton N.Y. 10.8.1899. He married Mary A, DAVIS who was born 15.3.1856, Harrisburg, Pa. on June 16 ca 1886. She had been previously married to John SCHERMERHORN, son of James on 18.1.1868 in Binghamton and had 2 children, one of whom was Ms. Dora SMITH. Evidently a divorce was not obtained from her 1st husband, and he died 21.10.1899.

DAVID LA FONTAIN, Seaman, enl. Buffalo in 1865, and Plattsburgh in 1867; born 9.10.1844 at Plattsburgh to Joseph LA FOUNTAIN b. Canada, and Mary ROBERT b. N.Y. and he died at Peekskill 13.4.1915. He married Mary C. LENT 7.7.1867 at M.E. Ch. Peekskill. She was the daughter of Jonas LENT b. 10.12.1820 and Sarah Cath. BROADIE b. 22.9.1832. and married 20.2.1850. Issue of Jonas LENT; Mary Catherine 10.11.1852, Emma Amelia 30.8.1854, Alex. F. 13.6.1856, Wm. J. 10.4.1860, Alice Annie 15.5.1862, Adeline C, 16.12.1865; all born in Peekskill N.Y. Mary C. died 29.12.1936. Issue of David LAFONTAIN; Irving D. 14.8.1868, Genevieve 16.2.1871, Mary E. 1.8.1873, Perly M. 13.7.1876, Edw. G. 19.9.1878, Goldie 21.9.1880, Beatrice 4.2.1882, Grover 25.12.1884, James H. 10.2.1888, Harold 2.1.1892, Hazel 17.12.1894, also raised Helen LA FOUNTAIN, grandniece, b. ca. 1903.

FRANCIS X. FOUNTAIN, Co. K 98th N.Y. born 4.7.1821 in Canada. He married Victoria BROOKS (ROUSSEAU) 3.2.1844 St. Remie, Napierville P.Q. The family lived at Malone. In 1898 their issue: Frank 50, Cutrine 48, Joseph 40, Delia 38, Harriet 35. Francis died 3.3.1910, and his widow lived at Westville.

GABRIEL LA FOUNTAIN, Pvt, Co. C 91st N.Y. Vol. Killed in action

31.3.1865, Petersburg. Married to Martha GOYETTE 1.7.1841 (By Fr. Rooney of Plattsburgh, who made no record, and removed to Albany). Issue; Mary 8.1.1851, Laura 2.1.1853, Lewis Nap. 30.1.1855-bapt. 1.3.1855, Wm. 6.2.1851-bapt. 15.2.1857, Josephine 7.4.1861, Martha 23.11.1863. Pension application witnessed by Gabriel and Ellen LA FOUNTAIN in 1869.

Martha married, 2nd, age 47 to Cyprium BOUCHER age 28, 18.6.1869
GEORGE ALFRED FOUNTAIN Corp. 98th N.Y. Malone. Married to Mary BENWARE 8.3.1869 in Malone by Rev. Wells. George died 29.1.1889, Whippleville, Franklin Co. Issue: Willard W, 3.4.1874, Josephine C. 6.9.1882.

JOHN LA FONTAINE 10th Regt. Co. L N.Y.H.A. Enlisted Watertown. Had a brother Martin 26 in 1867, lived in Orleans. His father Joseph was married in Ottawa to Jane MC CORMICK, his mother; she died 15.2.1854 in Ogdensburg. John died, unmarried 20.1.1865. Joseph LA FONTAINE married 2nd Eda LINBACK 3.7.1869, Orleans.

JOHN B. LA FOUNTAIN Pvt. Co. H. 11th N.Y. Cav. Drowned on transport Northam 22.12.1864. He was bapt. 4.1.1843 Coopersville son of J.B. LA FOUNTAIN and Catherine ROBERT, who were married 1837, St. Joseph Cooperville. Siblings in 1864 were Wm. 27, Oliver 20, Joseph 18. The family moved from Champlain to Alburg Vt. in 1871. On 3.3.1877 they were in Grand Isle Vt. In 1888 Catherine was 53 and John was 65.

LEWIS LA FOUNTAIN Pvt. Co. C 91st N.Y. Vol. Born 30.5.1830 Lacolle P.Q. Died 31.3.1913. Married Mary STRACK 21 11 1854 in Plattsburgh by Rev. Sallaz. Issue: Mary Eliz. 9.7.1869, Orila Emma 11.2.1873. A neighbor, Alex. LA FOUNTAIN gave a deposition, age 37, in Redford in 1890.

LOUIS LA FOUNTAIN alias GIROUX 109th Co. C. N.Y. Naturalized in Rensselaer Co. 20.10.1860 as Louis LA FOUNTAIN. His step-father was a "LA FOUNTAIN" He married Julie VALLEE at Quebec Cathedral on 2.9.1844. Louis enlisted on 19.7.1865 in Raleigh N.C. He died on 25.2.1903 and is buried at N.D. Des Neiges, Montreal.

OLIVER LA FOUNTAIN Pvt. Co. H 60th N.Y. Inf. enl. Ogdensburg. He was the son of J.B. LA FOUNTAIN of Camplain, and Catherine LABERT of Canada, and born 17.6.1844 (no bapt. record) He was a boatman, and married Zoe CARDIN 10.7.1866 St. Marie, Champlain. She died 21.5.1919 and he died 5.7.1928 age 84. Issue: Oliver Jr. 13.11.1867, Agnes 27.4.1870, Albert 8.4.1873, J.B. 11.9.1875, August 12.9.1879, Adelaide 8.4.1882, Alice 10.6.1884, Catherine 14.2.1887. He appears in the 1850 census: John 23, Catherine 28, Wm. 11, Robert 7, Oliver 5, Joseph 2, Antoine 7/12.

PETER LAFONTAIN, Pvt. Co. F 10th Regt. Vt. Vol. enl. Enosburg Montgomery Vt. in 1865. P.O.W. He was born 24.7.1843, Fairfield, Vt. to John LA FONTAINE and Mary SHOVER, Canada. He married Elizabeth SHOVER on 1.4.1865 at Grovetown. In 1889 he lived in West Chazy. He died 3.12.1925 in Montgomery, Vt. and his wife died 8.6.1941. SORREAL LA FOUNTAIN, Pvt.Co.I 2nd N.Y.Cav. lost at sea on steamer North America,22.12.1864,en route from New Orleans.Cyrel enlisted 12.2.1864. He was born in 1847 son of Joseph LA FOUNTAIN and Zoe MARTIN who were married May 1835 at Lacadie.Issue: Ferron 2.1836, Joseph 6.1838, Nelson 7.1840, Marsalene 4.1856, Louis 5.1857.Joseph married Myra MARTIN 31.8.1862 St.J.B.K. Joseph died 16.10.1886 age 85. His widow, Myra lived on Sable St. Keeseville.

WILLIAM FOUNTAIN Pvt. Co. I 9th N.Y.Inf.from Malone;age 56 in 1884; worked at Huntingdon and Wyman.

ALBERT JEROW Co. C 96th N.Y. Enlisted Nov. 1861 at Mooers. Died 8.6.1862,unmarried.He was the son of Peter and Margaret ROY/KING who were married 6.2.1837 St. Eouard,Lower Canada.He was born 15.8.1842 ;bapt. "Hubert". Margaret died 20.10.1880 in Altoona.His family in 1862: Jon Albert 19, Celena 17, Delia 15, Margaret 12, Michael 8.

ALEXANDER GERO/JARREAU 11th N.Y. Cav.Co.K He was born 26.5.1847in Canada and died 1.9.1927. Married Lucy M. STACY dau. Antoine STACY and Catherine_____ in St.Mary's Potsdam N.Y. Lucy was born15.8.1849 and died 27.7.1938. Alex. had a brother Samuel H. GIRARD / GERO/JARREAU age 72 in 1928.

In his THE SHORES OF CHAMPLAIN (1892), Daniel Taylor mentions (p.31) that previous to 1800 some French refugees lived in huts on the south point of Point au Fer in the Town of Champlain, Clinton County, New York, among them Joseph Staves.

Barbara J. Blaylock-Marek of Eagan, Minnesota, writes us that her ancestor, a Joseph Staves, came from Chambley, Québec, between 1800 and 1803 to settle in the Town of Peru, Clinton County. Two of his sons served during the War of 1812 and later applied for bounty land and pensions from the federal government. 16 May 1878 John Stave (born c.1792 at Chambley) in Plattsburgh, Clinton County, stated he was "a Frenchman by birth & in the time of the war went by the name of Baptiste Lamarah & John Stave" (Pension #1086, National Archives).

Mitchell Stave of North Hartland, Niagara County, New York, declared he was of "French descent his father came with Lafayette and was one of his volunteers and fought through the revolution with him - the (our) French name was Marrow or Mareau or Marreaux - it is pronounced Marrow', as I am no scholar I cannot tell my lawyer how to spell it-" He also said, "In English I suppose the Mitchell is Michael so that my name may also be put on the roll Michael Marrow..." (Pension/Bounty Land #34.898, National Archives).

The obituary of another son, Anthony Staves of Capital Park, Des Moines, Iowa, in THE IOWA STATE REGISTER for 12 May 1891 mentions he was born in Peru, New York, 25 March 1803. The deceased had spoken "often of his father who left sunny France when a youth, and coming over with Lafayette to fight for American independence; of his being taken by the enemy and living on bread and water in a British prison; later on of three older brothers, John, Abram [born 1800, Lower Canada] and Mitchell, who served in the War of 1812."

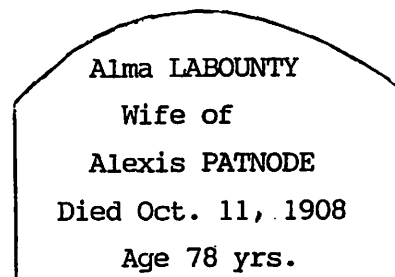
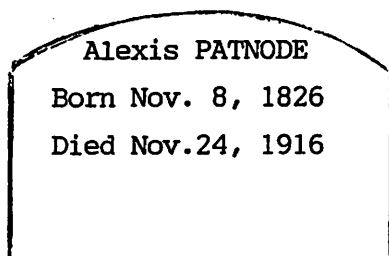
WHEN IS A FRENCH-CANADIAN ANCESTOR NOT A FRENCH-CANADIAN ?

When he was a British citizen from Wells, Maine, captured by the Indians in 1703 and taken to Canada where he remained. He became a French citizen and was baptized into the Catholic faith in 1704 in Boucherville, Québec and married there in 1717.

My great-grandmother's "Labounty" line gave me a great deal of trouble but when I finally found most of the pieces to the puzzle, I really had a story to tell. I feel that some of the other French-Canadian ancestor searchers might be interested in my tale.

I knew very little about my mother's grandparents. Actually, I didn't know that much about my own grandparents except that they were some of the French-Canadians from "south of Montréal" who came over to settle in the northeast corner of New York State in the 1840's. I did not even know where my great-grandparents were buried although I knew they had been living in Saranac Lake, New York in their later years. My first break-through came from my friend now, Edna Finn, of Saranac Lake who in 1981 answered a query that I'd put in "Lost in Canada". She had some information on Patenaudes (Patnodes) but these were not the right families. However, she did mention that there was a ? Alonis buried in Pine Ridge Cemetery at Saranac Lake. She sent a copy of the page which contained the Patnode surname from the records of the Pine Ridge Cemetery which had been "read". Sure enough, on a Patnode plot there was an "Ann Dahannty (?)", wife of Alonis Patnode". It did not mean much at the time but the next summer my husband and I were visiting Saranac Lake and we went up to Pine Ridge Cemetery. We had inquired about where the old section was located and whether there was a "French" area. However, we were not having much luck and decided to look around. Finally, we found the Patnode lot, located in Section 6, where David Patnode and his wives were buried. There on a raised foundation were two old stones side by side. They were almost illegible. This was before I knew much about reading cemeteries but even then I wished we'd had some chalk (unavailable on a Sunday). Still, using our fingers to feel the numbers and letters, we knew we'd found what we were looking for.



Meantime, through Edna Finn, I had begun corresponding with Joanne K. Hooley Fuehrer of Saranac Lake who had a Delisle line. My grandmother's sister, Philomen, had married Nelson Delisle and a Family Group Sheet which Joanne sent me gave Phil's parents' names: Alex Patnode and Alma LaBounty.

So now I knew their names but I still wasn't home free. I knew that LaBounty was the Anglicized version of LaBonté but I also knew that many families used this as a "dit" name. Which one was mine?

Once again I followed through on a suggestion of Edna's. I contacted Fortune's, one of the local undertaking businesses which had been in the family for 3 generations. The current owner promised to look through the family's old papers. He did and found records for both burials which he mailed to me. He had a different birth year for Alexis - 1827 but otherwise the dates were the same. His father was given as Alexis but there was no name for his mother. The record for Alma gave her father as Francis

Patnode which was obviously an error. However, it did state that her mother's name was Mary Duclo. Because of my familiarity with French-Canadian names, I recognized this as DUCLOS - DECELLES. And this time, knowing the "dit" name helped me later in my research into the French-Canadian repertoires.

The 1850 U.S. Census for Black Brook, Clinton County, New York gave a Francis LaBounty married to a Mary. The 1850 U.S. Census for Jay, Essex County, N.Y. gave Alex Patno (?Sr.) married to a Julia and in the next house Alex (? Jr.) married to a Mary. This Alex gave me and is still giving me a lot of trouble. He was the right age for my great-grandfather (b. ca 1826) but the Mary was puzzling. The name wasn't too difficult to reconcile as the French-Canadians often used Mary instead of the woman's other name here in the United States. However, she would have been born ca 1828 while my Alma was born in 1830-31. Also there were two children: Mary 3 years and Elizabeth 1 year who did not fit into the family picture. I have yet to find this marriage and I am now wondering if this Mary or the two children died. (On the 1900 U.S. Census for Saranac Lake, Franklin County, New York, Alex and Alma are reported as having been married for 51 years and Alma to have had 12 children of whom 10 were living). I can account for eight children after 1849 with the possibility of 2 others for whom I can not locate my source. For sometime I felt that this could just not be my "Alex" but I couldn't find another. Then I got a break-through in the LDS records for Napierville, Québec. I found Alex, son of Alex and Judith Chevalier, baptized 02 Nov. 1826. Although there is a slight discrepancy in the dates, I feel that this is my great-grandfather and he was the son of the other Alex found in Jay in 1850.

Now to find out more about Alma LaBounty. By 1860 Francis LaBounty is not on the census in Black Brook but Alex and Alma Patnode are. On the map for Black Brook in the 1869 Atlas of Clinton County there is a house for F. La Bonte in Sect. 31 on the road going toward Military Pond and on the opposite side of the road in Sect. 32 there is one for A. Patnode. Probably this F. LaBonte is the same Francis (Jr.) who is on the 1870 Black Brook Census with wife Amelia. Alma Patnode and Francis LaBounty, Jr. were brother and sister and apparently had located near each other.

I decided to find my LaBonté dit name by working back from Duclos. On a tour with the American-Canadian Genealogical Society (New Hampshire) to Québec I found in the card file of the Loisel registers in the Québec City Library, a François Baudriau married to a Marie Decelles-Duclos in Chambly, Québec. This I followed to the Chambly repertoires and sure enough I found Marie Decelles-Duclos married 10 Oct. 1814 to François Baudriau. But was this the same person as François LaBonté? Looking under Baudriau, now spelled Beaudriau, I found that there were two dits at Chambly: Graveline and LaBonté. The Québec people assured me that my François Baudriau was really a LaBonté so I had gotten my line. With the information I had now, I could trace back Alex's line and also Marie Decelles' and François Baudriau-LaBonté's.

I got another break-through again via Edna Finn. She referred a Kathy Baker from Flint, Michigan to me because we seemed to have the same Boudreau (Baudriau) line. We couldn't seem to connect our lines but we corresponded. Finally she broke down and hired a genealogist in St. Jean, Québec. She called to tell me she'd found her line together with mine. Needless to say I was happy to pay half of the genealogist's fee. Everything seemed to come together at once. I had been corresponding with Norma Meier of Virginia about the French-Canadians who settled in L'Érable, Illinois. She sent material from her files. Most of it was about the La Bonté - Vegiards who went to Illinois but she did have some Clinton County LaBonté - Boudriaults. I couldn't fit them in at the time but Pierre-Antoine LaBonté- Beaudriau later turned out to be my François' grandfather. Another source which came through about this time was from Virginia De Marce who was studying the families involved in the American Revolution. She sent me pages of information about the Beaudrias-dit-LaBonté line. By this time I could add to hers and she did a revision mentioning that she had incorporated material from me.

I now had the LaBounty line all the way back to Pierre who was a private in Livingston's Regiment in the Revolutionary War. From the Chambly marriage repertoire I got Marie Decelles-Duclos' parents: Basile Decelles and Charlotte Collette. Jetté and Tanguay did the rest.

Since I then had my maternal great-grandparents, I turned to the male, Patenaude line. Because of previous research, I had Alexander's ancestry. But what about this Judith Chevalier whom he'd married? The repertoires gave her father as Jean Baptiste Chevalier. Again there were many Chevaliers but through research in the Loisel registers and marriage repertoire of St. Mathias-sur-Richelieu, I was able to trace the family back to Pierre, who was a soldier in the Company of Jordy and had dits of L'Abbé and Duchesne.

Judith Chevalier's mother was another problem. She was given as Charlotte Litrefils, obviously not an usual French name. Frank Binet of the New Hampshire American-Canadian Genealogical Society gave me my first lead. He thought this could be the surname of one of the English settlers captured by the French and Indians in one of their wars against the English. He thought he had a book about this but could not find it. I couldn't find a book with any information either. My next bonanza came with an article, "New England Female Captives Carried to Canada" in The Genealogist, Vol.14, #3, Summer 1988, published by the American-Canadian Genealogical Society in New Hampshire. It was an abstract of a talk given by Babara (sic) Austin at their 1988 Spring Conference. It listed a ---- Littlefield, captured from Wells, ME, 1703; name in Canada was Josephine, residence not given. Also Ruth Littlefield, captured from Wells, ME, 1703, Canadian name Sister Angélique at Hôtel Dieu, Montréal. It did not take a genius to see that Littlefield was the original English surname which had become Littrefils in Canada. Later in my research, I found this name spelled many different ways. Among others there were: Lightfils, Littlefilde, Haclephil, and Hachphid. (It is a good thing I did not have to start with the latter two which were given in some records.)

Since I now had a location in which to look, I turned to the New England books in the Burton Library in Detroit, Michigan. There on the shelf was a volume entitled: History of Wells and Kennebunk, Maine, by Borne, 1875. Unfortunately, copying at Burton is restricted to having them do it and sending it to you at a later date. Most of us hand-copy the material. This I did. The Littlefields were important first settlers, who had come to America from England and settled first in Massachusetts. They fled from there again because of tyranny and spiritual prosecution. A small group received a license from the Province of Mayne on the 27th Sept. 1641 to locate between the Ogungquette and Kennebunk Rivers in Maine.

In the account of the War of 1702 between England and France, I came upon a lengthy report of the capture of Aaron Littlefield, son of Moses, when he was 7-8 years old. (Later materials state that he, together with his mother and two sisters, was captured 10 Aug. 1703. He was born 20 Oct. 1694 in Wells, Maine.)

Written in the style of the period, this account is colorful enough to be reported on at length:

" Aaron Littlefield, son of Moses, was captured. He was but a small boy, seven or eight years old. We are not informed of the circumstances of his capture, excepting that he was compelled to follow the indians to Canada. There, with the other captives, he was delivered to the French who gave the tribes an encouraging bounty for all prisoners. One (Aaron) was especially valuable and they (the Indians) supposed they would receive a large amount for his ransom. A boy was regarded, in most cases, as a more important prize than a soldier, as it was supposed that many parents would give all they had for the restoration of their child. There was a stronger reason operating in the minds of the French than the anticipated ransom. The Jesuits were then as anxious as at the present day to bring children under the influence of Catholicism, the fascinations of which would be so readily brought to bear on the young mind. They probably made this latter the leading object

of their action rather than a large bounty for the release of the boy. He was delivered to the French at Montréal and very soon the attractions of the papacy had taken strong hold of his affections. He was sent to Québec and the parents had no knowledge of him after his capture. In many, and perhaps most cases, small children were murdered, they being only an incumbrance on the travel of the savages. After the war was over, it was learned that Aaron was alive and living near Montréal. Every exertion was made by the government to ascertain what English prisoners were living in Canada and to induce their return home. Captain Christian Butler in 1714 discovered that Littlefield was at Québec and on representing the case to the governor (? French), an order was sent for him to come to Montréal where Baker succeeded in obtaining an agreement that he should return to Wells. The governor gave his assent and Baker provided for all the necessary clothing. Baker now went to Québec and during his absence there, one of the priests, having learned the young man's intentions, went to him, persuaded him to remain where he was and took from him the clothes prepared for his journey. Baker, on his return, made known the facts to the governor, who again sent for the boy but all arguments failed to induce him to come back home. ----- He was afterwards baptized and changed his name to Peter. (Actually, he had been baptized in 1704 and his name was Pierre Augustin.) He was married and had lived in Canada many years when his father died in 1726. His mother died some years afterwards and in 1737 he came home to Wells to secure his portion of the estate. The other heirs objected to his claim and were unwilling that he should have any share in it on the grounds that he had become a Catholic. Puritanism had no sympathy with Romanism. The statutes even denied liberty of conscience to Catholics. He then petitioned to the court to have his share in his father's estate set off. The heirs interposed this objection that he was a Papist and therefore had no rights which the court was bound to respect. Testimony was introduced to maintain the defense set up. Part of this appears in the following disposition of Christian Baker, in which the reader will be much interested in the literature of the magistrate as in the facts stated:

' The deposition of Christian Baker: All that I can say concerning Aaron Littlefield Who Whares taken by the Ingon from Calebunk in ye Province of Massitusetts to the Best of My Knowledge is as follows: That I very Well Knew him in Canada and that he was baptized Peter and that he was A papist by Profession and that his Living and his Mariage was in a place called Bashervill (Boucherville) in Canady, Nine Miles from Mount Royal, and that I see his Sister in the Nunnery in Canaday about fifteen or sixteen years ago, and this is ye Hull truth of What I know, as witness my hand, sworn to Before Paul Gerrish, J.P., Dover, April 1738'

The jury returned a verdict in his favor if a Papist could hold the estate, but if not, for the defendant."

Next Borne goes on to say:

"Tabitha Littlefield was one of the captives. She was supposed to have been killed as she was not heard from until many years after, She was but a small child, and we think, a sister of Aaron. When it was ascertained that she was living. every exertion was made by her friends to induce her to abandon Indian life but she would listen to no suggestions to that effect. She had become enamored of the wild and free state of the redmen. Once she came to Harding's with a company of Indians. While they were selling some of their articles, she suddenly enquired of Mrs. Harding if she did not remember Tabitha Littlefield, and without waiting for an answer, she escaped from the house."

Borne's book does not give much information about the father, Moses, nor of his ascendancy. Another source is: Franklin Emery Littlefield's The Littlefield Family of England, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Maine, Kennebunk, ME. (No publication date but author born in 1901) This gives a more factful summary:

Moses Littlefield (Thomas, Edmund, Francis (Eng.))

b. ca 1653; bp 1706-07 (as an adult with youngest son)

d. ca 1714 (Wife administered estate 24 Jan. 1714)

m. Martha Lord, dau. Nathan and Martha Everett

on or before 1687 (Note next source below.)

Children: 1. Aaron Littlefield, bp 12 Nov. 1694

Captured when 7-8 years by Indians; given to French in Montréal and sent to convent school. Baptized as Peter Augustus 27 Jan. 1704. Married Marie Brunel ca 1715 (Given as according to Hoyt but 03 Feb. 1717 elsewhere) In 1727 he came back to Wells to secure his share of his father's estate through the courts. This was granted 02 Sept. 1727. (There seems to be an error somewhere. Borne uses the date 1737 with Baker's disposition dated 1738 but above seems best.)

2. Ruth Littlefield, bpt 20 Oct. or 24 Nov. 1694 (Again see Aaron's baptism above.); also captured and became Sister Angélique; d. 09 Jan. 1732 aged 33 (according to Savage. This would give a birth date of around 1698-9 which is more likely.)

3. Tabitha Littlefield; ? bpt. Lived with Indians after her capture; Once came to Wells to inquire of Mrs. Harding if she was remembered but was frightened and ran away.

4. Moses Littlefield, Jr. bpt. 18 June 1708 with his father. (It would seem that he was born after his mother was able to return home and that perhaps he died young since he is not considered an heir later.)

As for Moses Littlefield's and Martha Lord's marriage, New England Marriages Prior to 1700, says that they married Dec. 1687, Wells, Maine. Martha remarried after Moses' death to : 2) John Abbott and 3) Alex Taylor

Another version comes from Noyes, et al, Genealogical Dictionary of New Hampshire, and Maine, (1928-39 reprint)

Littlefield, Moses, m. (ct. Dec. 1687) Martha Lord. His marriage portion from his father was 100 A lately purchased from Ezekiel Knight, Jr. and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the homestead where he had already built. He was a Grand Juror 1694-5, 1700, 1710; jury 1704-5, 1713; constable 1696. Last testament 18 Mar. 1713-14. Wife, Martha, and 3 children among captives of 10 Aug. 1703. She returned in time to take administration of his estate 24 Jan. 1714-15. She married 2) John Abbott; 3) Alexander Taylor. She was still administrator in May 1726 but died soon after. Son, Aaron, filed administrative bond on father's estate 02 Sept. 1727.

The book, New England Captives, names the captive children: Aaron (Peter), b. 20 Oct. 1694; bpt. as Pierre Augustin, 27 Jan. 1704, then living with the parish priest of Boucherville; naturalized 1710 and married under name of Lidfril at Boucherville, 03 Feb. 1717 Marie Brunell. Had 7-8 children. He visited Wells, ME before and after his mother's death. As Aaron Littlefield of Montréal, only son and heir, in 1738 successfully sued the three Lords for their portion. Still in Canada in 1751. Tabitha - supposed to have been killed but Bradbury (author) brings her back fleetingly as an Indian squaw. Ruth, b. 23 June 1698, still captive in 1710-11. Her birthdate suggests that she was Sister Angélique Lidrefil of the Hôtel Dieu, Montréal. She died 09 Jan. 1732 aged 33. Moses, Jr. bpt. with father 13 June 1708, was apparently not a captive and died supposedly before his mother.

According to Borne's, History of Wells and Kennebunk, Maine, Edmund, Sr. or Elder was Moses's grandfather and first New England ancestor, coming from England in the 1630's. On this continent, Littlefield and his sons were millmen and farmers. They were industrious, hardy, respectable agriculturists. Borne continues: "They had large families with many sets of twins. Edmund was not the first settler since others preceded him on the 'plantation'. However, he built a saw mill and a grist mill on the Webhannet River in 1641. These together with the large families prepared the way for civilization."

Finding all of the above made me anxious to learn more about the Littlefield family. Numerous books at the branch LDS Family History Library in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan; as well as the LDS (Mormon) Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah "fleshed out" the early family.

The Littlefields were from Titchfield, "Hants" (Hampshire County), England. The earliest Littlefields I have found are a Francis (b. ca 1530) and William (b. ca 1540) William appears to be the father of Francis, b. ca 1565 along with numerous other children. By his first marriage to Mary ----- ca 1590, Francis had Edmund together with other children by both wives. Edmund (called the great progenitor) was bpt. 27 June 1592 in Titchfield. This is in "Hants" (Hampshire County) between Portsmouth and South Hampton, England. He married there Anne (Annis, Agnes) Austin on 16 Oct. 1611; had ten children born there and then came to America about 1637 from South Hampton with a group of other religious dissidents from Hampshire. His oldest son, Francis, had separated from the family in England before this only to reappear in Massachusetts and later Wells, ME. The disappearance of the first Francis caused the family to name another son Francis years later. When the first one surfaced in America, there were two Francis's in the family, both of them living, so they called them Sr. and Jr. (This could be quite confusing.) When Edmund came to America, he brought the next oldest son, Anthony, with him. His wife, Annis, came with the remaining 6 children (2 had died in Eng.) & 2 male servants on the ship "Brevis" in 1638.

This is a very interesting family and there is a great deal written about them in the literature. However, this is not the chief focus of this paper. I now had to go back and find the connection between (Aaron) Pierre Augustus Littlefield and my ancestor, Charlotte.

To do this a great deal of searching had to be done in numerous French-Canadian repertoires. In the marriages of St. Mathias-sur-Richelieu, Rouville, Québec I did find the marriage of Francois, son of Pierre Littrefils and Marie Brunnelle, m. 29 Jan. 1753 to Marie Parent. This Francois also married 2) 08 Feb. 1768 in Chambly, Marie Lavoie and married 3) 09 Jan. 1791, Lacadie, Québec, Louise Dejadon. Next I had to turn to the Loisel Index. Here I found Antoine Littlefield, son of Francois and Marie Parent, married 03 Mar. 1783 at St. Mathias Marie Maillot. Also in the Loisel Registers I found that J.B. Chevalier married 04 July 1803 in St. Mathias, Charlotte Hachphil who was later given as Charlotte Littlefield in the above's repertoire. So this was an alternative spelling!

It was a long search but I now had the family together. Attached to this report are copies of the Brevis' Passenger List giving Annis Littlefield, children and servants' names; (Much of this material was written up in The Second Boat, Machias, ME.); a copy of a Littlefield Coat of Arms (Sent to me by a correspondent from Zimbabwe, Africa who got it from a genealogist friend.); and Ancestor charts of the various lines.

PASSENGERS ON THE SHIP BEVIS - 1638

The original document listing passengers on the ship *BEVIS*, which sailed from England in May of 1638, reads as follows:

"Southampton - The list of the names of Passeng^s Intended to shipe themselves, In the Beuis of Hampton of CL. Tounes, Robert Batten^{Mr} for Newengland, And thus by vertue of the Lord Treasurers warrant of the second of May wch was after the restraynt and they some Dayes gone to sea Before the Kinges Rates Proclamacon Came unto South'ton."

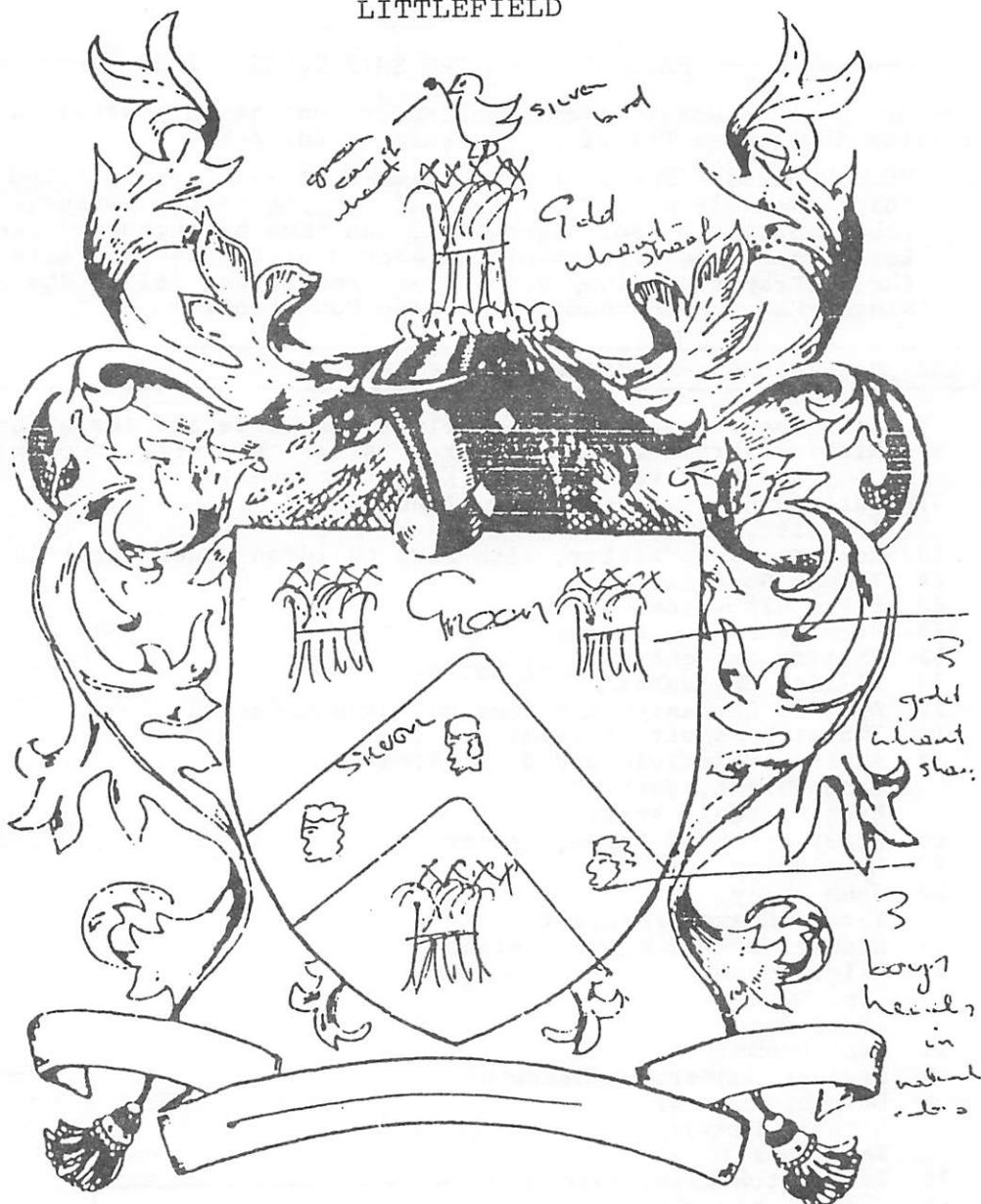

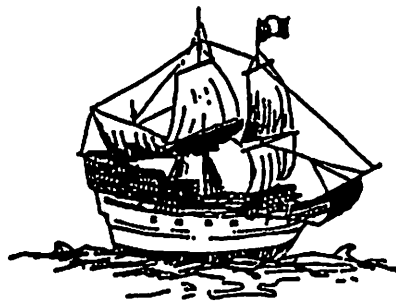

South Cemetery is located on U.S. route 5 about 4 miles south of downtown Barton village. This cemetery is in reasonably good condition and is still in use, although use is limited primarily to the ancestors using up remaining available space.

This cemetery is surrounded on 3 sides by wire mesh fencing between white posts; the east side is white rail fencing. Dimensions are 300 feet north/south and about 150 feet east/west. Nestling quietly in a very pastoral setting, one sees nearby farmhouses and hears the gentle murmur of a small brook just on the opposite side of the quiet side road entrance.

The map of stone locations at the end of this listing is NOT to scale but will allow the user a nearly approximate location for each grave.

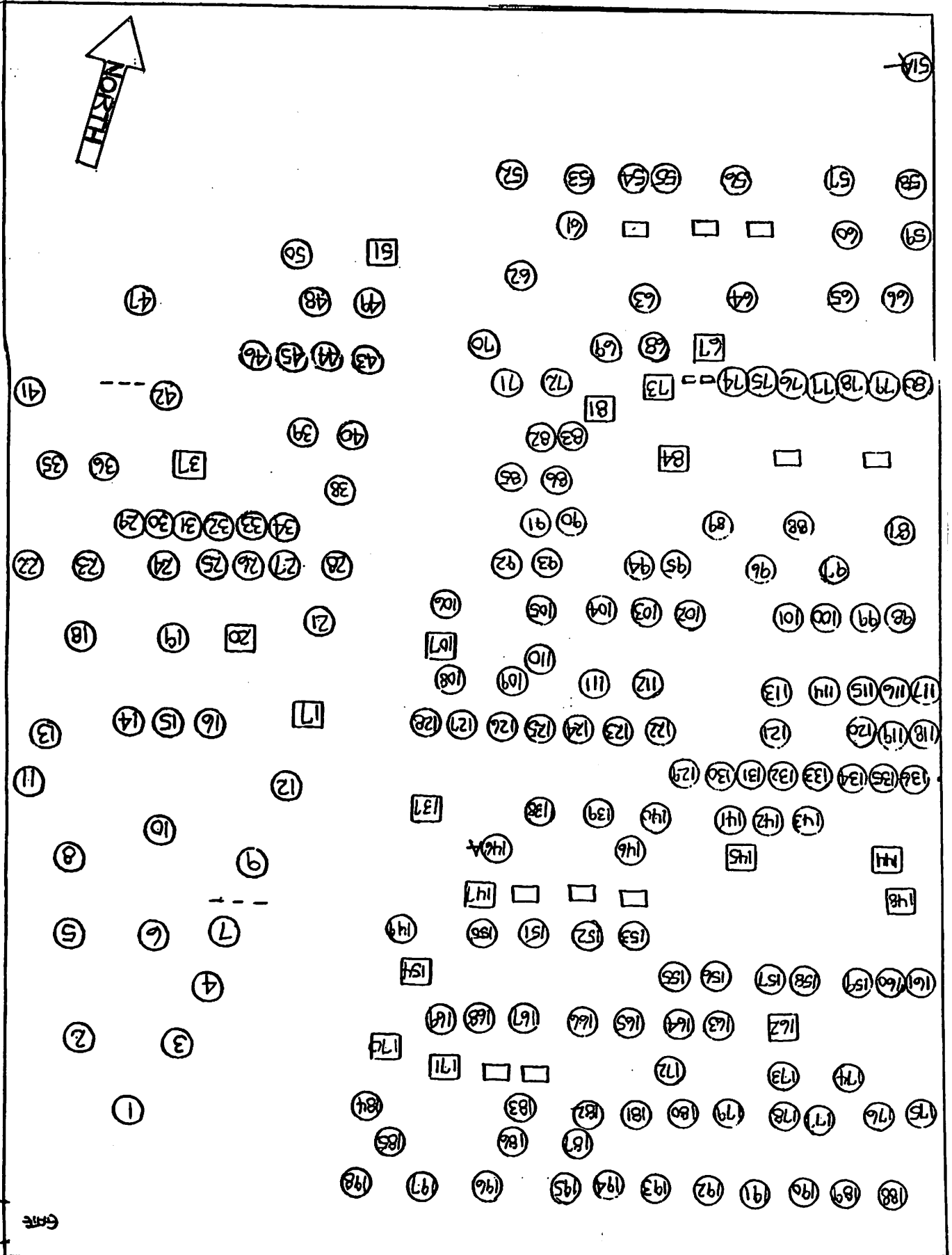

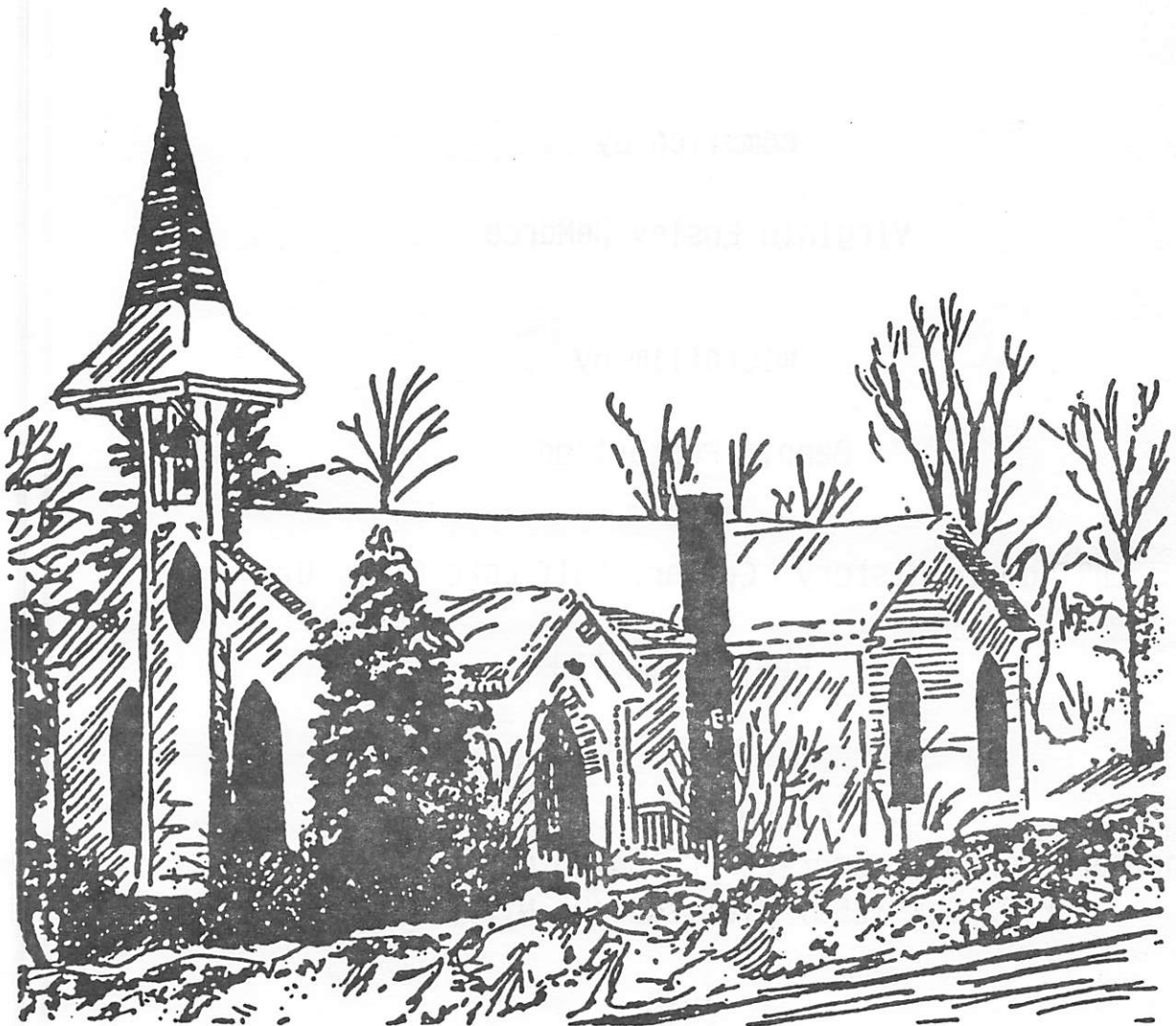

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH, ESSEX, NEW YORK

A BRIEF HISTORY

Only sketchy details survive about the early missionary activities of the Episcopal Church in the Essex area. In the year 1800, "Henry Boynham held the first Episcopal services" in Essex, but we know nothing of what took place from that date until 1844, when Edgar P. Wadhams records performing baptisms in Essex, as well as in Keeseville, Elizabethtown and Lewis. Around 1849, when the population of Essex was over 2000, The Rev. Fernando Putnam of St. Paul's Church, Keeseville, held services in Essex on "alternate Sundays," travelling over the mountain by stage-coach. As far as we know, Episcopalians in Essex were not meeting in an Episcopal Church structure during this period. As a matter of fact, it was at a meeting in the Baptist Church basement, on March 21st, 1853, that an organization which would be known as St. John's parish was formally incorporated. The incorporation was approved by the Rt. Rev. Jonathan M. Wainwright, provisional Bishop of New York, on April 23rd, 1853.

St. John' Church building has been in existence since 1835, when it was built by Judge Henry H. Ross as a "school-house with Gothic windows for the use of his children and their friends." It is not known precisely when the St. John's congregation began to hold services in the schoolhouse, but it seems probable that it was used for a number of years before the schoolhouse and lot were bought by the congregation under the rectorship of the Rev. Eugene L. Toy, 1878-1883. In 1880 the schoolhouse was moved a short distance to its present location and remodeled and on the old foundation of the school was built the rectory. The church's remodeling followed the design of a former rector, John Henry Hopkins, and the altar, made from the Rev. Hopkin's designs, was a gift from him to the St. John's parish. St. John's Church had 90 communicants in June of 1881: on the 29th of that month, the Rt. Rev. William Croswell Doane, Bishop of the Albany Diocese, consecrated the church and confirmed five persons.

A BRIEF HISTORY (cont.)

St. John's appears to have been the mother church from which the Church of the Good Shepherd in Elizabethtown was founded (1882), as well as the mission church, St. Mary's Chapel in Willsboro (1902). The Boquet Chapel was originally a mission of St. John's, Essex, and early missionary work in Whallonsburg and other surrounding areas was done by rectors of St. John's.

The Civil War, the growth of the railroads, and changing industrial technology caused a drastic shrinkage in Essex's population and economy in the latter part of the 19th century. With the support of the founding families of the parish the church weathered the difficult decade preceding the 20th century. A new chapter in St. John's ministry began with the development of the Lake Champlain-Adirondack area as the summer playground and home for the "Theodore Roosevelt generation." An influx of young families to the area, including John B. Burnham's purchase of the land which would become the Crater Club, brought to St. John's a new wave of enthusiasm, and some of the most distinguished rectors in the church's history.

In both the 19th and 20th centuries, St. John's has been exceptionally fortunate in the quality of its clergy. Five clergymen connected with St. John's have been or become bishops -- John H. Hopkins, George Taylor, George Ashton Oldham and Charles B. Persell, Jr. The summer rector for the years 1927 and 1929, Leonard Hodgson, later became Dean of Winchester Cathedral, England.

From the early days of the parish, rectors have, as a rule, served full time from May through September, with "supply" clergymen or lay readers holding services monthly or more often during the rest of the year. In 1952, however, the Rev. Albert Anderson began the year-round rectorship jointly with the Church of the Good Shepherd in Elizabethtown. This arrangement continues to the present day, most recently under the rectorship of the Rev. David S. Langdon.



DON'T QUIT

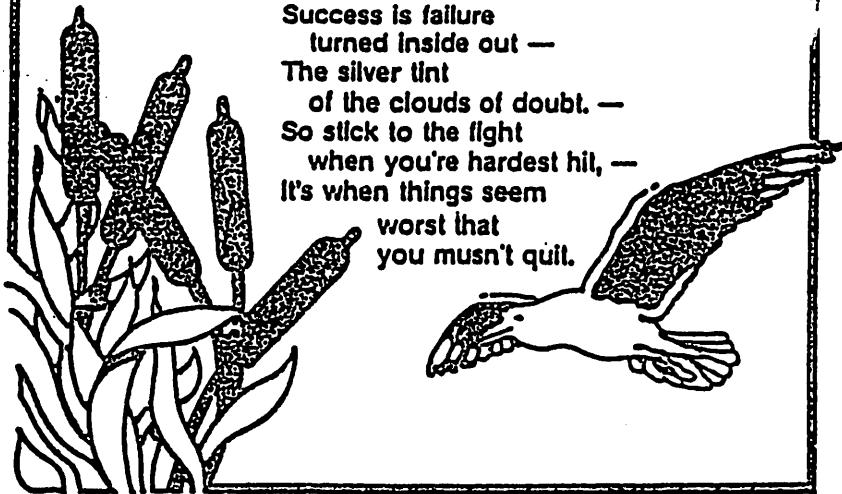


When things go wrong, as they sometimes will,
