

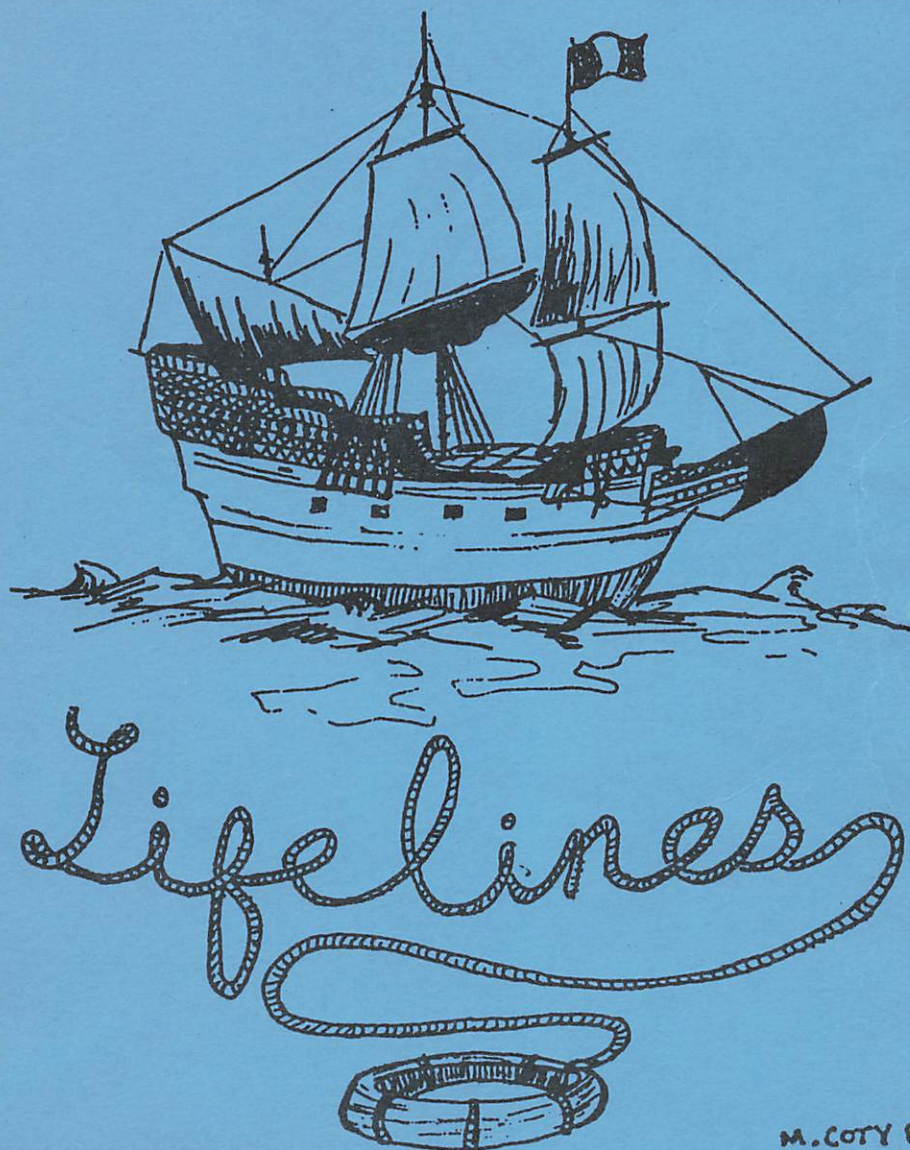
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## PRESIDENT'S LETTER

## DOUGLAS/LACORNE

*Compilation of data on the ancestors and descendants of Chevalier Francois-Prosper Douglas (1725-1781) with asides on the Lacorns.*



ARMS OF DE LA CORNE

For centuries Scotland furnished more than its share of mercenaries. Their knights, squires, and archers were often found in opposition to each other. No family was more peripatetic than that of the Douglasses.

"The great, turbulent, daring and too often treacherous house of Douglas"<sup>(1)</sup> can only be traced to William de Douglas, who signed a number of charters between 1175 and 1211.<sup>(2)</sup> No one now places any credence in their descent from a knight alive in 770, nor in their relationship to Theobaldus the Fleming.<sup>(3)</sup>

The full name was *Sioltaich Dhu Glas* meaning 'the sower by the dark waters.' *Sioltaich* was shortened to *Sholto* and became a given name used exclusively by the family.<sup>(4)</sup> Archibald, and Archambaud in France, was also favored by the Douglasses.

The second known Douglas was Archibald, a son of William de Douglas. A descendant, Archibald, fourth Earl of Douglas, engaged himself, with 200 horsemen and 200 foot soldiers, in French service. He led the French in the battle of Beauge, in which the

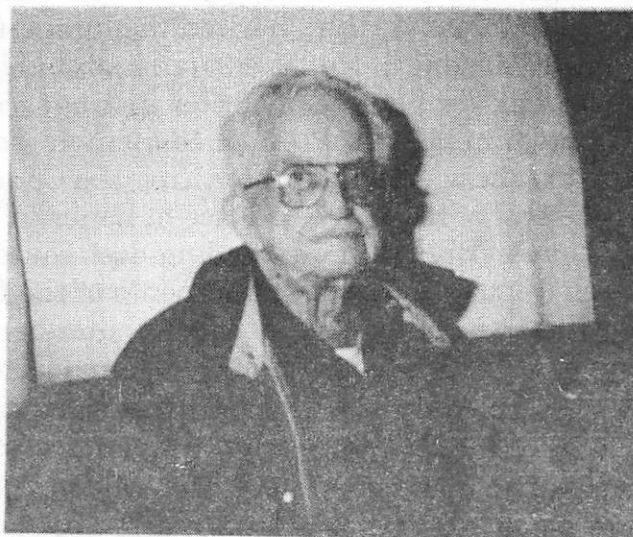
Duke of Clarence and the Marquis of Sommerset, brother and uncle of the King of England, perished.<sup>(5)</sup> He was given the Duchy of Touraine but was killed on August 17, 1424, in the sanguinary battle of Verneuil. Descendants or Douglas relatives were associated with Touraine at least until the end of the 18th century.

Some of these Douglasses settled in Brittany and others in Picardy. Usually they lived by the sword and perished by it, in Scotland, England, France and elsewhere. The Brittany line, it is believed, became extinct in the 17th century.

The first of the name found in New France was Jean-Louis, Chevalier du Glas, Lieutenant of the Carignan-Salieres Regiment. On

October 16, 1666 he was a signatory to the French claim to the Mohawk River Valley.<sup>(5A)</sup> No relationship to the line that follows has been found.

Chevalier Antoine Douglas (1595-1643), of the line under consideration, was seigneur of Ployart in Haute-Picardie and,





by his marriage in 1619 to Francoise de Rubat, seigneur of Richagnard in Bugey. He had been sent by the Prince of Conde as commander of the French forces in the Bugey area, ceded by Savoy in 1601. It is near Lake Geneva and the boundaries of Switzerland and Italy. His son, Pierre Douglas, was also a distinguished officer.

On June 3, 1648, Pierre married Francoise, daughter of Charles Charbonnier, Esquire, King's Counselor of the near-by district of Bourg. One son, Charles-Joseph Douglas, became a seigneur of l'Isle and of Nerciaz. Another son, Charles-Joseph-Marie-Sholto, was like his ancestors, a knight. It is believed that his fourth given name was used in each preceding generation. On July 2, 1721, he obtained letters-patent from Louis XV certifying the title of *Comte*. His wife was Guillermine-Josephine Jallier du Mollard.

The Douglas arms always bore the bloody heart of King Robert the Bruce, that the good Sir James Douglas attempted to take to Jerusalem, the three stars and the coronet. Their motto was "*Jamais Arriere*." Their battle cry was "A Douglas, A Douglas."<sup>(6)</sup>

A son of Charles-Joseph-Marie-Sholto was Charles, Comte de Douglas, who by his wife, Marie-Anne de Lillia (died 1731), had four sons and two daughters:

1. Charles-Joseph de Douglas, Chevalier, Captain of the Royal Scotch Regiment, Comte de Montréal in Bugey, First Counselor of the Body of the Nobless of the Provinces of Bugey and Valromey. He married Marguerite Decreux de Sainte-Croix. She died in the Chateau of Montréal on February 27, 1755, when she was about 30. She was the sole inheritor of her family. It was an important one in Bresse. He married a second time on June 2, 1757, to Jeanne Francoise Montillet, a niece of the Archbishop of Auch in Touraine.<sup>(7)</sup> He and his next younger brother were early supporters of Bonnie Prince Charlie, the Young Pretender, who was defeated at Culloden

Moor in 1746 and lost his quest for the Crown of England. He escaped but the brothers became prisoners. Some time before, the elder Douglas had captured a small English armed vessel called the Hazard-Sloop.<sup>(8)</sup>

2. Joseph-Marie de Douglas, Chevalier, Captain of the Royal Scotch Regiment, Governor of the City of Sainte Claude. He married Marie-Louise de Bordes du Chatelet on February 12, 1763, a sister of the Baron du Chatelet in Besse.<sup>(9)</sup>

3. Francois-Prosper de Douglas, Chevalier de St. Louis, Captain of the Languedoc Regiment. He married Francoise-Charlotte de la Corne in 1737 (sic 1757), a sept-daughter of the governor of Montréal in Canada. Their children were Louis-Archambaud and Charles Luc.<sup>(10)</sup>

4. Pierre-Valentin de Douglas, Deputé a l'Assemblée Generale du Clergy de France in 1762, Abbé Commendataire de Sablanceaux, Archidiacre and Grand-Vicaire of the Archbishop of Auch in Touraine.<sup>(11)</sup>

5. Marie-Ennemonde de Douglas, Superior of the *Dames de la Congregation de Notre-Dame* of Nantua in Bugey.<sup>(12)</sup>

6. Francoise-Marie de Douglas, married N. de Seybill in 1763. Seigneur of Sotonod in Valromey, Chevalier of St. Louis and Captain of the Aunis Regiment.<sup>(13)</sup>

Apparently Francois-Prosper Douglas inherited the hungers of his elder brothers. In 1949, and probably now, his descendants flourish in Bugey district. Pierre Gauttier, M.D., editor in chief of the *Visage de l'Ain*, found on visiting the Countess of Douglas, there in a place of honor in the chateau, was a giant standing-desk containing the carefully bound monuments of the family. He was permitted to copy a number of letters, many from Montréal, Canada, to Montréal, France. These were printed in the *Revue d'Histoire de l'Amerique francaise*, Vol. 3, pages 30-43. Data from this publication will be used here unless



otherwise indicated.

By 1746, Douglas was the Captain of the Second Battalion of the Regiment of Languedoc, serving under his cousin, Colonel Douglas of Arancy. When not on campaign his rank permitted long leaves. In 1754, d'Argensen gave him, Conge to go to London to find and care for his sister (Mme. de Seyfell). The next year regular troops were sent to New France. Before sailing on the *Actif*, under Dubois de la Motte, while waiting for the fleet of 22 ships to sail, he had managed to spend 60 louis, not counting anything for food, drink or play (gambling?). Fifteen days after debarking, Baron Dieshauled the regulars, the colony troops and Indians to Lake Champlain and a defeat at the south end of Lake George. The Baron was severely wounded and was replaced by Montcalm. Douglas spent months, with other officers, helping to supervise the construction of Carillon (Fort Ticonderoga). His winter quarters were close to Montréal. Back on Lake Champlain in the spring, he met the warlike Sulpician, Abbé Francois Picquet, whose birthplace was near his own. After the short siege of Oswego in 1756, Douglas made a worthwhile investment in purchasing, from his Indian captors, a young Scot, MacLean, a nephew of Sir William Gordon of the Royal Scotch Regiment. The youth's father had fought with two of the Douglasses brothers for Bonnie Prince Charlie.

England dominated the sea lanes. Few supplies reached Canada. Only one of the Douglas letters got through to Bugey in 1757. In it he proudly announced his marriage to an amiable child of 15, Charlotte de la Corne de Chapt. Her father, Louis, a noble and a native of Canada, had once served as an officer of regulars in France and now held a Captaincy in the Languedoc. Her wealthy parents land holdings were without parallel in New France. He was certain that his fortune was made. From the marriage settlement he offered an elder brother the 10,000 *écus* (silver crown piece) needed to purchase the Countship of

Montréal *des Buds de Geneve*. (This might appear a generous offer, but to the writer of these pages all the Douglasses were acquisitive). Did Douglas then know his brothers would not have children and that he or his son would be Comte de Douglas? By the long marriage contract he was to have eventually received 24,000 *livres* and a share of the valuable seigneurie of Terrebonne. Among the

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witnesses and signers were the Governor of New France, his wife, his brother, General Montcalm, his second and third in command. It was executed in Chevalier Louis Lacorne's house in Montréal, on St. Paul Street, in the afternoon of April 12, 1757. The cream of society and of the military were in attendance.<sup>(14)</sup> The husband, more than twice the age of the bride, were married the next day.

Their first son, Louis Archambaud, was born on March 15, 1758. The baptism service was conducted by Abbé Picquet. His antipathy for Britain was so great that just before the capitulation of Montréal he, with twenty-five others of his thinking, fled by land and water to Louisiana. He died near his place of birth in the Department of the Ain. The other surviving child of the Douglas-Lacorne marriage, Charles-Luc-Sholto, was born about a year after his eldest brother. The power of their grandparents and uncles was astonishing. The infants were granted prebendaries. The stipend came presumable from the Chapter of the Cathedral of Québec. It was then represented in France by one of their great-uncles, Joseph-Marie Lacorne, abbot of



Maubec and of l'Etoile.

Captain Douglas had sought two things in Canada, a marriage that would relieve him of financial cares and the Cross of the Royal and Military Order of Saint-Louis. Having the first he wrote of his joy in being awarded the second after the battle of Carillon, where he received a slight wound. There, on July 8, 1758, General James Abercromby, at the head of 6,000 British regulars and 9,000 provincials, foolishly attacked the 3,500 French, under Montcalm, before his artillery was landed at the foot of Lake George. The British were unable to penetrate the felled trees forming an *abatis* directly in front of the semi-entrenched French. In the heroic effort there were 1,944 British casualties. It was Montcalm's last victory. French losses were slight. According to Douglas's letter his father-in-law, one of the very few Canadians listed by the French General and his officers, was a participant.

After the fall of Québec, Douglas became friendly with a ship's officer of the same surname, and also, with a MacDonald, who commanded a Scots Highland regiment. They took care of his possessions and made sure his letters were sent to Europe. His regiment took part in the battle of Sainte-Foye, before the gates of Québec, in 1760, it was the last French victory. Fortunately, neither he nor his family were sent back to Europe on the *Auguste*. In its wreck a number of his wife's relatives perished. The Douglasses spent some time in Touraine with his brother, Pierre-Valentin, who was vicar-general of Auch. There a third child was born who soon succumbed.

The date of the death of his wife has not been found. It must have been several months before October 19, 1768, when the marriage contract was re-attested and placed in the Depository at Montréal. The long document had been carefully drawn. The upheaval in Canada together with the turmoil and bankruptcy of France largely negated the money terms of the contract. On the death of his

father-in-law in 1762, he had become a proprietor of Terrebonne. It should have been of considerable value. Douglas desired to return to Canada, a move never made, wrote that five generations of his family in northeast France was enough. Some years later, after several lawsuits, Terrebonne was broken up. In the meanwhile his mother-in-law had money troubles hard for those in France to comprehend. Her last years were spent with the Gray Sisters of Montréal. Her father, Chevalier Claude de Ramezay, had been governor of Trois-Rivieres and of Montréal. For two years he had been acting governor of the entire province. By his marriage to a woman of a prominent family at least nine of their sixteen children reached maturity. He led the life of a grand-seigneur, but died poor.

The Lacorne family was represented in France by two prelate uncles of the deceased Mme. Douglas, a sister who became a nursing nun at Loches, an aunt, also a nun at Loches, a brother in the Navy and occasionally by an uncle, Luc Lacorne, known as St. Luc, who was quite often there to supervise his commercial interests. He owned a house in Paris.<sup>(15)</sup> The uncles first mentioned were twins, born in 1714. One, Father Maurice, a one-time *Recollet*, had been freed of his vows and was called *Abbé de Chapt*, at least by relatives. The other, who held the Abbey of Maubec and that of l'Etoile, was highly regarded in England, France, and Canada. As representative of his chapter in Québec he eventually became its Vicar General of Canada, as well as of Louisiana and the mid-Mississippi.<sup>(16)</sup> He was active in managing the finances and careers of several relatives. Like Francois-Prosper Douglas, he had little luck with the widow, Mme. Ramezay Lacorne. Douglas fought for the dowry. *Abbé de l'Etoile* tried equally hard to get her to pay for the necessities for her younger son. The elder son, loyal to England as were most of the noblesse, was killed in 1775, when the democratic American invaders nearly overcame Canada. L'Etoile sold

timber from his benefices and even sold his matched horses and carriage to purchase a Marine Guard commission for his younger son. St. Luc, too, helped. He sent a black fox skin. From it was made a muff to give the influential Duc de Biron. The talented youth became a captain of war ships, winning the Cross of St. Louis by his heroism in Admiral de Suffren's victory over the English in India.<sup>(17)</sup> A suitable marriage was arranged for the girl. No funds were sent over for the dowry.

There could be no rapport between those surnamed Douglas and those who bore the Lacorne name. On March 30, 1767, l'Etoile wrote from Paris that he was fitting the niece and nephew for European society. In the past four or five months spending over 7,000 *livres* for their clothes, jewelry, dancing and general lessons. At first he called the niece Babé, but later Babet. The list of the clothes is explicit and long.<sup>(18)</sup> The ship Babé arrived on carried his letter back to their mother. He had traveled to Calais to meet Babé. He had paid M. Douglas 3,020 *livres*, 10 sols in cash. She would get 5,020 *livres*, 10 sols and St. Luc 2,000 *livres*. More money would come if the infamous Cadet would honor his bills of exchange, even at a 38% reduction. These funds were evidently from the estate of her husband.<sup>(19)</sup>

On December 10, 1767, Douglas wrote his mother-in-law from Paris, a sugarcoated letter begging for at least 100 louis from the dowry. Earlier in the year l'Etoile had given him 3,020 *livres* and his poor wife had, before her death, received 1,100 *livres*. Over 5,000 *livres* was past due. He warned the widow against all her brothers-in-law. Never follow St. Luc's advice, never send me money to pass through the hands of l'Etoile. He spoiled his case against the Lacornes by urging her to have St. Luc pay off the dowry and interest. It would not bother him as he kept much money in France. Douglas seldom wintered with his regiment in Corsica, but went to Bugey on family business and to Paris to seek ad-

vancement, until the unpleasant Mediterranean rains ceased.<sup>(20)</sup>

There were many letters from l'Etoile showing his great love for Douglas's sister-in-law, Elizabeth-Louise Lacorne (1744-died after 1793, as a nun, St. Pierre), and for Douglas's brother-in-law, Francois-Josue Lacorne, who, as the younger son, was called the Chevalier, before he became a knight. The first marriage the prelate had arranged for Babet fell through because her mother would not sign the required documents. The second did too, because the once gay, frivolous Babet had decided to become a nun. She entered the Community of St. Joseph in Paris in 1772.<sup>(21)</sup> During the tumult of the Revolution she joined an aunt, Mere de la Croix, at Loches. In spite of administrative and diplomatic pressures the *Abbé de l'Etoile* was both sagacious and meticulous in handling the affairs of the family.

On March 12, 1769, the *Abbé de l'Etoile*, laid up with an inflammation, dictated a letter for Mme. Ramezay Lacorne, to her daughter Elizabeth-Louise, called Babet. He urged his sister-in-law to sell Terrebonne and move to France. He was upset that she had not sent the power of attorney required to permit Babet's marriage. He begged her not to fall into arrears on the Douglas dowry. He said he knew the man "would treat you severely if he can get his clutches on you." A post script was added. The Abbe had just received a letter from Abbé Douglas that his brother planned to go to Canada to force the full payment. The brother, his wife and children wanted the money. For six years he had warned his sister-in-law. He claimed the hardheartedness and stupidity of Douglas was incomprehensible. Douglas had already lost one suit. "But this does not cure a blockhead."<sup>(22)</sup>

On November 15, 1770, Douglas received from the Abbe 1,200 *livres* Tournois on account of interest due on the dowry. "I, the undersigned, part heir of the late Mme. Charlotte de la Corne, my wife, and having the garde noble of Louis-Archambaud and



Charles-Luc-Sholto, my children."<sup>(23)</sup>

How much Mme. Ramezay Lacorne paid the Douglasses has not been ascertained. She died, living with the Gray Sisters in Montréal, before February 14, 1784, when the Douglas grand-children started litigation to acquire and break up the great seignury of Terrebonne. It was instigated by Louis-Archambaud, by then Vicomte de Douglas, with full power of attorney from his brother, Charles-Luc-Sholto de Douglas, Caono of the Metropolitan see of Auch, prior of Loubejon and Naubian, and coseigneur of Terrebonne. Legal approval was ratified by their uncle, Messire Pierre-Valentin de Douglas, seigneur, abbot of the Royal Abbey of Sablonneau.<sup>(24)</sup>

Babet, now Mere St. Pierre, was at the general hospital at Loches, where, among those she cared for, was her aged aunt, Mere de la Croix. On February 27, 1793, she wrote a long letter to her royalist brother. He was in England, chosen as one of four, to return to Canada to help other emigres who wished to reestablish themselves there. He had won the Cross of St. Louis in 1785.<sup>(25)</sup> Now, as so many of the noblesse natives of New France, he felt the need to serve the government of Great Britain. The letter mentions many persons. One paragraph is quoted:

"Poor Abbe Douglas was massacred the 2nd of last September in Paris. He had been imprisoned the 10th of August. The tribunes had recognized his innocence and had let him go. Nevertheless, he fell victim to the popular frenzy. His family has had the death verified: his 50 louis were withdrawn two days after."<sup>(26)</sup>

This almost certainly gives the date of the death of Charles-Luc-Sholto Douglas. A year earlier he had been reported to have ample funds. His brother's wife was again with

child.<sup>(27)</sup>

Louis-Archambaud chose a military life as an officer in Belzunce-Dragons. On the death of his uncle he inherited the Countship of Montréal in Bugey. He married twice. As noted earlier his descendants flourish with élan at or near his ancestral home. He held many civil offices during his 84 years.<sup>(28)</sup> □

This letter is to correct some mis-information and answer a few queries. First: the article "Some Genealogy Information" p. 46 has an incorrect statement; The National Archives of Canada are at 395 Wellington St. Ottawa Ont. The National Archives of Québec are at Ste Foy, Québec. It is to noted also, that they do not have records of the last 100 years, only the period before that. Also on p. 46 this article states that the Montréal City Library has Censuses of all the Provinces. Unless they recently acquired them in the last two years, they only have those for Québec, as I have always borrowed reels from Ottawa. Second: The article on Samuel WILLETT on p. 23 states that he lived in 1794 at Odelltown, yet on next page quotes document

from archives saying he lived in Caldwell's Manor until May 1794, then to Montréal. Caldwell's Manor is on the east side of the Richelieu River whereas Odelltown is on the west, not the same locality. Caldwell's Manor is now Noyan, Que. Odelltown is now in the parish of Notre Dame du Mont-Carmel (Lacolle), and was never part of St. Jean, Que as stated in article. I like this article and believe this WILLETT family to be the same one that established a textile industry in Chambly later in the 19th century, as I have some mention of this family and will look into this further after my vacation. The author is right in his assumption of a Douglas being the wife of Samuel WILLETT. I have listed a notarial document before Pierre Gamelin, notary dated 23 Feb. 1822, listing children of Nathaniel & first wife mentioning the late Polly, wife of Saml. Willett, for the purpose of an inventory after death of N Douglas (reference CN601-020 at archives Mtl.). (Ed. For Mr. Smith's answer to queries look to the Answer to Queries Column on p. 85)

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## Henry & Phoebe Bourdon

— Muskegon Pioneers

*[Ed. Note: Dr. Bourdo was a speaker at our Spring 1990 Conference, where he spoke about his great grand-father, Alexis BOURDON. This paper is about Henry, a younger brother of Alexis, who preceded him to Muskegon and became an important personage there.]*

Henry BOURDON, one of my great-grand-uncles, was born May, 1823, in Longueuil, a suburb of Montréal, in the Canadian province of Québec. He died in Muskegon on October 16, 1871, of stomach cancer. During his relatively short life he became one of the influential people of early Muskegon. As his obit in the Muskegon Weekly Chronicle of Wednesday, October 18, 1871, put it, "among those of Canadian birth, he was regarded as almost an oracle."

Henry's parents were Joseph BOURDON and Josephte PATENAUDE. They married on October 17, 1803, when Joseph was 39 and Josephte was at least 21. Thus Joseph was 62 when Henry, the last of his eight children of record, was born. New York's 1810 census establishes, however, that there was at least one other (unnamed) son who must have died when young, while gaps in the birth years of the other children suggest that there may have been other births as well.

The same 1810 census indicates that Joseph lived in Clinton County, New York, before or shortly after his marriage, but must have moved to Longueuil, Québec, in 1810, or soon thereafter.

PATENAUDE's are numerous in Longueuil even today. Ancestral and historical information on the PATENAUDE family have been amassed by Mrs. Marie PIERCE, 639 Pontiac Road, Oxford, Michigan, 48051.

All the rest of Joseph's children were born in Longueuil, which is adjacent to his own birthplace in Boucherville. However, Henry's obit also indicates that in 1830, when he was 7, his parents moved to Clinton County. I have found no further record of them, however. Nor is there any further record of Henry's childhood and youth in New York.

For Henry's ancestry back to Jean BOURDON and Magloire LEGRIS of Rouen, Normandie, France, in the early 1600's, see my article, "Canada to Michigan by Way of New York," in *Lifelines*, Volume 7 Number 1, published in Spring, 1990, by the Northern New York-Canadian Genealogical Society. For additional details on Bourdon genealogy, including Henry's ancestors, see "BOURDON," an easy to use 193-page genealogical tabulation of about 3500 Bourdons, compiled by Frederick Francis Bourdon, and published in 1990 by Les Editions, J. Henry married Phoebe SENEAL in Chazy, Clinton County, New York, either in March, 1842, or (per her obit in the October 19, 1905, Muskegon Daily Chronical) in 1844. Since the obit says that Phoebe became 77 years old on March 19, she must have been no more than 16 when she married, and her birth year in Chazy would have been 1828. It is likely, however, that either her given age or year of marriage were wrong in her obit, or that she married when only 14, since her eldest child, Mary Louise, was born in New York in 1843. Mary Louise married Savins E. BROWN of Chicago, and died in that city when she was at least 88 years old.

Phoebe's father must have died, probably in Chazy, when she was young; and her mother, Theresa, then married Charles GRAVES in that town. Phoebe's obit lists as a brother, a George GRAVES, of Chicago, although she herself retained the SENEAL surname. The obit, also, lists four GRAVES, sisters—Mrs. Alexander (Caroline) MARCOUX, Mrs. Joseph (Adeline) LeTART, Mrs. Learrie (Clarissa) LEVEQUE, and Mrs. Elizabeth DAVID, all born in New York, but all married in (and lifetime residents of) Muskegon. The four are buried in Muskegon's St. Mary's Cemetery.

The 1860 Muskegon Census (page 61, Dwelling 513, Family 480) lists the GRAVES family. They lived next door to Henry and Phoebe in Lakeside. Phoebe and her son, Henry Lewis, sponsored my father's christening in 1892 at St. Jean's Catholic Church in Muskegon.

Other SENEAL's (also spelled SYNECAL) were early residents of Muskegon; and some live there today. At least six are buried in St. Mary's Cemetery. They may be related as well, but I have not investigated possible ties.

On April 8, 1875, three years after Henry's death, Phoebe married Joseph CHAMPAGNE, another Muskegon lumberman. He had come to Muskegon from Montréal in 1869 as steward

on a ship, and found initial employment here as a sawmill tallyman. In 1878 he bought the Beaudry, Vallicott, & Haines sawmill in North Muskegon. After that mill burned, he became partner in the sawmill of Montgomery, Champagne, & Co., which was located on Ruddiman Creek in Lakeside. According to the Abstract of Title, the home of my sister-in-law, Mrs. Wm. Kool, occupies a portion of the lake frontage off Lake Avenue in North Muskegon on which the first mill once stood. Phoebe and Joseph had no children.

In 1895, the family moved to Des Moines, Iowa, where Joseph established a laundry business with three of his stepsons, George, James, and Andrew. Joseph died in Des Moines in April, 1905. Six months later on October 18, Phoebe also died there of pneumonia. Only 5 of her children survived her. Her will was "admitted to Probate in District Court, State of Iowa, in and for Polk County" on November 23, 1905; and it was recorded in Muskegon County on February 3, 1927. Her son, Andrew, was confirmed as executor.

Both Joseph and Phoebe were returned to Muskegon for burial in St. Mary's Cemetery beside Henry BOURDON. A large obelisk in the northeast portion of the cemetery, adjacent to Laketon Avenue, marks their plot.

Henry sired 15 children; and family members then living are listed on page 61 of the Muskegon 1860 census under "Dwelling 512-Family 479." The census also names four boarders. I have found record of at least 10 of the children, the others presumably having died when young either in New York or in Wisconsin.

The name Phebe appears on a small stone on the Bourdon cemetery plot. There were no other data. It may refer to the Pheby above; but it was also common to name a second child for one who died earlier.

Data and obits on spouses and descendants of Mary Louise, Matilda, Henry Lewis, and James Edward can be found in Muskegon

St. Mary's Church in that year. Presumably he then moved to the Milwaukee area (Pewaukee) sometime before 1852. There he was employed as a lumber inspector. He moved back to Muskegon about 1854, but Phoebe (at least) must have returned to Pewaukee, Wisconsin, in 1861, 1863, and 1867, because children were born there in those years. Perhaps she chose to be near relatives, or a favored doctor, when these children were born, since she seems earlier to have lost other children at birth or shortly after.

In Muskegon, Henry was employed as a sawyer, according to the 1860 census. Other records document

records and newspaper accounts, but are not presented here. Matilda's will appears in the Muskegon County Probate Court records under Calendar 2, File 1105, page 116. The will attests to the poignant concern of a young widowed mother, about to die, for the catholic education (in Kankakee, 11.) and future well-being of her four minor children. Joseph CHAMPAGNE was executor.

Information on related families—BABIN's, GRAVES', LEVEQUE's, LeTART's, LOBDELL's, MARCOUX's, SENEAL's, PATENAUDE's, etc.—appear in Muskegon County and newspaper records. I have not with certainty identified data on Elizabeth DAVID. There may have been two different women with the same name.

Henry may first have emigrated with his family to Muskegon in 1849, since the birth of Pheby Elizabeth is recorded at Muskegon's

employment as tallyman, lumber inspector, and book-keeper, which (successively) are more responsible positions in a sawmill business. Apparently he was a self-taught lawyer, as well. According to the March, 1988, issue of "The Muser," a publication of the Muskegon County Museum, Henry eventually became partner in 1868 with Muskegon banker, Alexander V. MANN, and John W. MOON in the sawmill firm of Mann, Moon, and Bourdon.

This sawmill was located on Muskegon Lake at the foot of Estes Street in Lakeside (which then was a separate community). Henry owned a large house nearby on Bourdon Street, which was named after him. The mill burned in 1871 after Henry's death, but Mr. MANN then bought the sawmill of Shape, Haines, and Weymouth, also located in Lakeside, and re-organized it as A. V. Mann & Co.



Deed records of Muskegon County list dozens of land transactions involving Henry and/or his wife, Phoebe, with third parties. He is said to have logged the "Pinchtown" area between Lakeside and Muskegon. Muskegon Justice Court Records (Vol. 1, July 9, 1873) substantiate that Phoebe, as Henry's executor, sued lumberman, Ara B. BRITTON, to collect on a promissory note for \$75.00. She also sued lumberman, John TORRENT and Lewis B. AMES, on behalf of Henry's estate.

Although a catholic, Henry became a charter member of the Muskegon Masonic Lodge. Muskegon banker, A. V. MANN, who earlier was a member of the Grand Rapids Masons, was prime organizer of the local lodge. Old records preserved at the lodge indicate Henry petitioned for membership on November 3, 1862, and passed initiation on December 24, 1862. He paid dues of \$2.00 per year through 1870.

When on his death-bed, however, Henry recanted his membership in order to receive the Catholic Church's sacrament of Extreme Unction. An explanation, entitled "Masonry vs. Catholicism," by Reverend H. Rievers, pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church, was

published. It explained that the Catholic Church "does not permit Free Masonry or membership of any secret society among its members;" and required that he "denounce, before proper witnesses, the order of Free Masonry." My great-grandfather, Alexis BOURDON, who was Henry's older brother, vouched for him while he lay dying.

Henry's will was dated October 12, 1871 (see Will Book #1, pp. 127-131). For a summary, see page 21 of the September, 1986, issue of the Muskegon Genealogical Society's, "Family Tree Talk." Pertinent Probate Record of Accords, dated 1871, appeared in Calendar 1, File 184, page 104. The Probate Court Accounting for Minors appeared in Calendar 1, File 186, page 105. When Henry died, he was a relatively wealthy man for his time. The value of his estate exceeded \$30,000. Phoebe was executor. She too, appears to have been a remarkable woman for her time.

The March, 1983, issue of "Family Tree Talk" contains a tax list which says that "Henry Berdo had a dog." How minor are some lasting records of the life of a man, while unimagined greater things are never recorded, and are lost forever! □

**[Editor's Note:** Ft. St. Frederic was built by the French in 1731, just north of the present bridge that crosses Lake Champlain at Crown Point, New York. The French had made inroads in the territory since 1723 when they built a stockade on this site.

Boundary lines were rather vague between the French of Canada and the English of the Colonies. It can be assumed that the French knew they were in English territory, although the French claimed the land as theirs because of Samuel de Champlain's discoveries in 1609. The English claimed the territory because of their alliance with the Indians of the area. The French wished to prevent the English and Dutch from trading with the Indians. The Crown Point site was a gathering place for trade. It was also an ideal military site, as it controlled the north-south water-way of Lake Champlain. The English felt the French were a threat to New York and Massachusetts.

The French encouraged settlement of the area, and some settlers had settled the around the three small forts that were eventually built there.

When the French and Indian Wars broke out the French were understaffed, and were, also, hampered by outdated weaponry (cannon excavated from the site were 1500 century relics). In 1759 when the British General Jeffery Amhurst captured Ft Carillon (Ft Ticonderoga), fifteen miles to the south, the French blew up Ft St Frederic and retreated north.

The abrupt retreat of the French has afforded present day archaeologist and historians a wealth of material in revealing how the eighteenth century French lived. General Amhurst was delighted with the acquisition of this strategic piece of real estate, and promptly put all available help to work to build Ft Crown Point, a fort and area much larger than Ft. Ticonderoga. They used the destroyed French forts for redoubts near the main fort.

Because of a fire to the main fort and the lax upkeep of the fort when the American Revolution broke out Fort Crown Point was not useful for military protection of the area. The Americans deemed it useless when they captured it in 1775.

The NYS Conservation Dept. acquired 360 acres in the areas of these ruined forts. Some restorations have been Done, and the area is used for recreation with camp sites and picnic areas installed. I am not sure of the extent of the restorations, but I believe some of the fort area has been repaired and a museum is also at the site.]

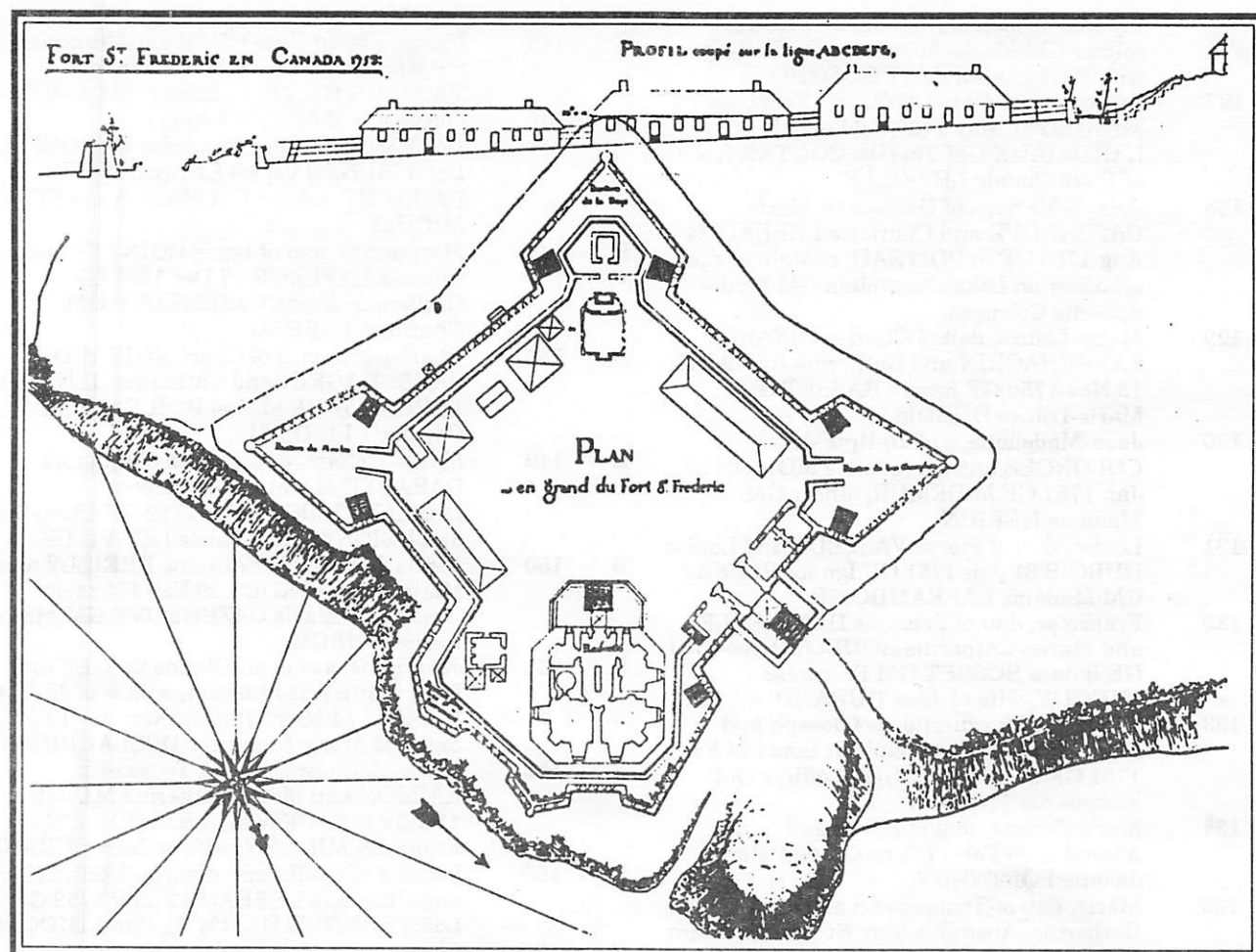

It is important to note that the same name may  
be spelled in several different ways. Family rela-  
tionships may readily be envisioned by a careful  
study of these records.

Quite often a child was named for its sponsor.  
All French infants were named for saints. Most  
girls names were preceded by the name "Marie." It  
is common to find a boy named Louis-Marie or a  
girl named Marie-Joseph.

The matter of the extra name, such as Francois  
Varlet called Lavertu or Joseph Lafoy called Pret-  
a-boire (Ready-to-Drink) is very intriguing. These  
extra names were legal.

Tragic times are reflected by the death records  
in such years as 1747 and 1756. The records come  
to an abrupt halt on July 31, 1759 when Ft St  
Frederic was blown up and the garrison retreated  
to Ile-aux-Noix. □

## My Family History

by Bobby Philip Patrie

(Note from Bernadette PATRIE, #033C: This article was written by my grandson, Bobby PATRIE when he was about 13 years old. It was a school project while he was a student at Beekmantown Central School (New York State). Bobby took a summer course on Genealogy where he learned to use many of the references at the County Historian's office, the office of the County Clerk, and the college library at SUNY of Plattsburgh, New York Bobby is now 16 and lives with his family in Champlain, New York and attends Northeastern Clinton School. Bobby is presently researching the dwelling where he and his family are now living. It was originally a log cabin. As you can see from this report, one is never too young to start working in genealogy.)

Tracing your family "roots" can be fun. It is not only a study on names and dates, but you learn about the places where they came from, and as you research deeper you learn about the historical background and the economies of the country.

Why did the PATRY's come from France to Canada? What was their occupation, their background, what did they contribute to the new country? I have not discovered these facts as yet.

The first record of the PATRY name in Canada was found in the marriage records of Québec, Québec, P.O. On July 23, 1675, Andre PATRY, son of Rene PATRY and Reine COUISINET of Airvault (Three Rivers) Diocese of LaRochelle to Henriette CARTOIS, a Daughter of the King (fille-du-Roi), widow of Michel HAUTEBOU, and daughter of Lambert CARTOIS and Marie LAMBERT of Saint Barthelie, Paris France.

The Daughters of the King were nearly 1000 young women who volunteered to come to Canada from their native land of France to help settle the new colony. They were called the "Daughters of the King" because they came to Canada under the care and protection of the King. Louis XIV acted as their stand-in-father. He provided the dowry, trousseau, and transportation across the ocean.

Once in Québec all were scheduled for appointments to meet and interview prospective husbands—single men who had come to Canada in previous years, either as soldiers of the King of France or as colonists, to clear and cultivate the land. All of the girls married within a few months of their arrival in Canada.

Rene PATRY, son of Andre PARTY and Henriette CARTOIS was married to Charlotte DUBOIS on February 2, 1713. She died and he married a second wife, Catherine GIRARD on November 26, 1721 at Beaumont, P.O.

Louis PATRY, son of Rene PATRY and Catherine GIRARD, was married to Genevieve TURGEON on November 15, 1754 at Lauzon (Lewis), Québec.

Joseph PATRIE, son of Louis PATRY and Genevieve TURGEON was married to Angelique FAUCHER, October 24, 1780, at St Marie de Beauce, P.O. They moved to Moskinange, Québec where baptisms and marriage records were found of their children. Among them was the record of Fabian PATRIE, son of Joseph PATRIE and Angelique FAUCHER. He married Agnes GAGNE on September 28, 1819 at St. Joseph's Church, Moskinange, Québec. They moved to Champlain, New York with their two sons, James and Pierre. Fabian was a stone mason.

Pierre PATRIE, son of Fabian PATRIE and Agnes GAGNE was born in Muskinange, Québec, Canada in 1824. He married Juliana PICARD at St. Bernard, Québec. They lived at Champlain, New York, USA. He followed in his father's trade as a stone mason.

Philip PATRIE, son of Pierre PATRIE and Juliana PICARD was born in Champlain, New York on April 22, 1843. He married Harriet MARTIN. They lived on Moore St. Champlain, New York. Philip worked at a saw mill and lumber yard that was located near the head-gates of the old dam. They had three (? four) children.



Louis PATRIE, son of Philip PATRIE and Harriet MARTIN, was born in Champlain, New York on September 24, 1978. He married Emma Louise PHANEUF on January 20, 1903. He worked at Sheridan Iron Works in Champlain as a machinist. He had many hobbies. He did photography and made pictures for many people, he put together and operated one of the first radios in Champlain. He used to tinker and repair clocks. We have one of the grandfather clocks with the chimes that he had. It still works. They had several children, Louis, Laurence, Walton, Clarence, Stanley, Leonard, and Sylvia. He died at the early age of 48 years.

Leonard Arthur PATRIE, my grandfather, was born in Champlain, New York on September 27, 1921 along with his twin sister Sylvia. He attended Champlain Elementary and graduated from Champlain High School. He went to work at Sheridan Iron Works and worked for three years before entering the U.S. Navy during World War II. He served in the Pacific on an L.S.M. and was in Heroshima a few months after the atom bomb was dropped. He married Bernadette May BORDEAU on August 2, 1947 at St. Peter's Church, Plattsburgh, NY. He worked at Sheridan Iron Works, later called Harris Bending, in the weld-

ing and heat treating department for 45 years until his retirement in 1984. He also did T.V. repair. He is now enjoying his retirement and has many hobbies, such as, gardening and making things out of wood, especially wooden toys. They had three sons, Leonard, Philip, and Joseph.

My father, Philip J. PATRIE was born September 18, 1953 at Plattsburgh, NY. He attended school at St. Mary's Academy and graduated from Northeast Clinton Central High School and took 2 years of college at Clinton Community College. He served in the U.S. Army for 10 years. He married Barbara Jean WILKENS in Champlain, NY on January 5, 1974. They have four sons Bobby, Nathan, Anthony, and Nicholas.

My name is Bobby Philip PATRIE and I was born December 15, 1974 at Fort Campbell, Kentucky. I took a short trip to Itay at the age of three months. We lived in Plattsburgh, Danamora, Chazy Lake (all in New York State), and I am presently at the Robinson Road, Town of Plattsburgh.

It has been fun to look into the family history, and I hope to do more research to find just where in France my ancestors came from, what their occupations were and why they came to Canada. □

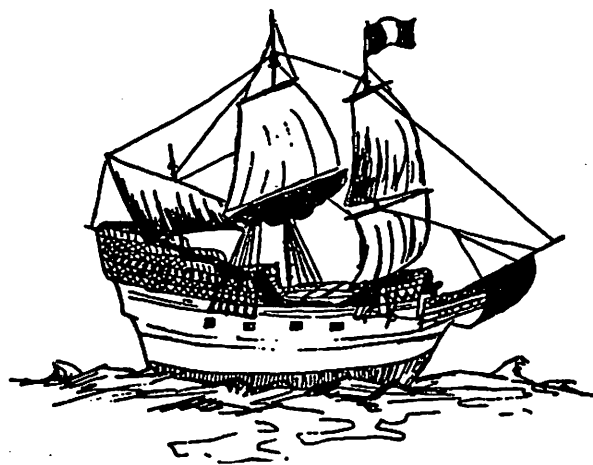

## The Montréal Branch of the Québec National Archives

The Montréal Branch of the Québec National Archives is located at 1945 Mullins Street in the district of Pointe St. Charles. It is one of nine regional branches of the Québec National Archives. This archive contains a wealth of genealogical and historical materials that pertain not just to the City of Montréal but to all geographical areas of the province. The following is just a brief summary of some of the most important genealogical resources stored in this archives.

1. Catalogues available in printed form and on microfiche that list the holdings of all nine branches of the Québec National Archives.
2. Microfilm copies of 99% of all existing pre 1876 parish registers of the Roman Catholic Church in the Province of Québec.
3. Microfilm copies of 90% of all existing pre 1876 parish registers of the non-catholic denominations in the Province of Québec.
4. The Roman Catholic parish registers for the Judicial District of Montréal from the 17th century until 1899.
5. The non-catholic parish registers for the Judicial District of Montréal from the 1760's until 1899.
6. A Card Index to all Catholic baptisms, marriages, and burials in the Greater Montréal area from the 1760's until 1899.
7. A Printed Index to all non-catholic baptisms, marriages, and burials in the Greater Montréal area from the 1760's until 1899.
8. The Catholic and non-catholic parish registers of the Judicial District of Beauharnois until 1899. This district includes the counties of Vaudreuil, Soulanges, Chateauguay, and Huntingdon.
9. A Card Index to all non-catholic baptisms, marriages, and burials in the Judicial District of Beauharnois from the 1840's until 1899.
10. The Catholic and non-catholic parish registers of the Judicial District of Terrebonne until 1899. This district includes the counties of Argenteuil, Terrebonne, and Two Mountains.
11. An Index on microfiche to all baptisms, marriages, and burials in the Québec City area from the 1760's until 1875 for the non-catholic churches.
12. The Loiselle and Fabian Indexes to Catholic Marriages in Québec and selected areas of Ontario.

There are over one million marriages indexed in this collection.

13. Microfilm copies of all existing 19th Century censuses for the Province of Québec. The pre-1800 Québec Censuses are available in printed form.

14. A Reference Library containing all the standard guides and books pertaining to genealogy in Québec.

15. A Map Collection containing over 500,000 maps and plans of various locations in Québec.

16. A Photographic Collection containing over 3,500,000 pictures of people and places in Québec.

17. A Sound and Television Collection containing over 5,000 items.

18. Printed Guides to all Notaries who have ever practiced in Québec, including the years in which they followed their profession and the archival centers in which their records have been deposited.

19. Numerous Indexes on microfiche and in printed form to the specific records of various Québec Notaries. 20. A Collection of over 3,500,000 notarial documents.

21. A Card Index to Probated Wills in the Judicial District of Montréal from 1760 until 1911.

22. Large Collections of Judicial Records both Criminal and Civil for various areas of Québec.

23. Guides to Land Surveyors in Québec including the archival center in which their records have been deposited. 24. There are various collections of Seigneurial documents.

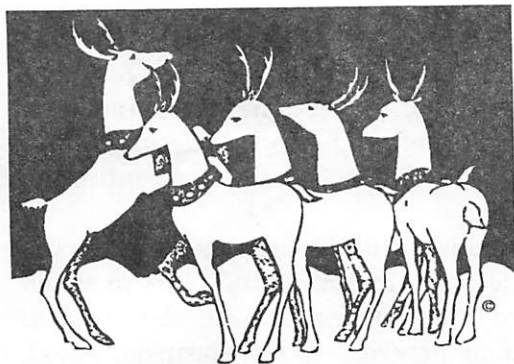
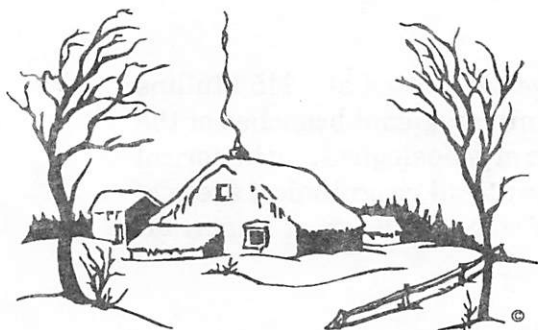

John Cox's article in the NYG&B Records, Vol. 45, pp. 263-269 and pp. 366-373. Good for pre-1914 history and records of the New York Yearly Meeting. Gives parentages of all Monthly Meetings, years formed, and lists most of the local meetings included in the Monthly Meeting. Cox, also did a chapter on Quaker history in his Cock- Cocks-Cox Genealogy. He, also did the chapter on Quakers for the *HISTORY OF DUTCHESS COUNTY* compiled by Hasbrouck in 1909.

Works Progress Administration (WPA) did inventories of Friends' records for New York (City), Pennsylvania and Rhode Island in the 1930-40's. Many records may not have been collected before this time, so these are helpful, but limitations must be realized.

## FLASHBACKS INTO MY FRANCO-AMERICAN HERITAGE

Absolutely new to genealogy, I was thrilled to find several listings of my mother's maiden name, Boisjoli, in Tanguay's *Dictionnaire Genealogique des Familles Canadiennes*.

Not knowing if or to which one our lineage might be connected, I wrote to ACGS Manchester NH for help (this was before NNYACGS at Keeseville).

I was delighted when I learned that our line led back to one Jean-Baptiste Primeau dit Boisjoli, "Sergeant de M Macari de La Rochelle."

It was a great surprise to learn that our name, Boisjoli, was a *dit* name, but no surprise that our first Canadian ancestor was a soldier. How else, and why, did many of our ancestors make that long dangerous Atlantic crossing.

On November 18, 1686, Jean-Baptiste married Marie-Marguerite Bouchard *dit* Janot at Pointe aux Trembles, Montréal.

From reading, I know that in the 1680s LaSalle was exploring the Mississippi and that Champlain had died only fifty years before on Christmas day in 1635. What did Jean-Baptiste hear about them? Was Jean-

Baptiste one of the regulars who tried to overtake the Iroquois that had attacked and killed hundreds of French men, women, and children at Lachine on August 5, 1689? Was he, by chance, one of the 114 Frenchmen and 96 Sault and Algonquins who started out on snowshoes the next winter for the revenge attack on Albany, but an event which ended instead with the massacre at Schenectady, near where I live.

Closer to home, however, is a small incident that I feel is proof of our self-sufficient ancestor's ability to survive hardship and want. I had heard my mother say that her mother was a good gardener and raised the nicest calves. Having only one or two cows, and needing all the milk possible for her large family, my grandmother would boil hay, strain the liquid, and mix it with some milk for the calves. I thought, how clever! But, in reading, I learned that this was a common practice in France. Now, I like to think that she was carrying-on a tradition.

The more I learn, the more admiration and respect I feel for the wit, courage and stamina of our French forbearers. □



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# The Willett Families of North America

by Samuel Willett

*(Ed. note: This is a continuation of the Willett article that appeared in the Spring 1991 issue of Lifelines. This WILLETT family began in Berks County, Pennsylvania; moved on to Chazy, Clinton County, New York; then to Odell-town, Lower Canada (Province of Québec). As we shall see in continuance of this family's journey, they migrated by stages across the United States).*

**F.31.1** Nathaniel WILLETT (son of Samuel Willett) and Sarah R. SHATTUCK of Bakersfield, Franklin County, Vermont

Nathaniel WILLETT was born on March 8, 1803, at Chazy, New York. Family tradition states that he was an orphan, brought up away from his family, which had been large.

Another tradition, supported by a letter by Pansy Torry, states that "Nathaniel WILLETT sat in a tree and watched a battle on Lake Champlain in 1812."

Another family tradition states that George Rice WILLETT (see "Willett House Quarterly," page 54) was a cousin of Nathaniel WILLETT.

Nathaniel WILLETT married at Bakerfield, Franklin County, Vermont, on January 8, 1835, Sarah R. SHATTUCK (born February 19, 1814, at Bakersfield, Franklin County, Vermont; died October 16, 1898, at Woodbine, Harrison County, Iowa), the daughter of Oliver SHATTUCK and Sally START of Bakersfield, Vermont. Oliver SHATTUCK was "a crusty old guard abolitionist and fervent supporter of the Anti-Slavery Wesleyan Church in Bakerfield" (Worthen, page 274).

Nathaniel WILLETT was "a hops raising Congregationalist from the Green Mountain village of Bakerfield" (Worthen, page 273).

Nathaniel WILLETT died at Bakersfield, Vermont, on December 6, 1873, age 70 years, 7 months, of consumption (Death Certificate and Tombstone, Bakersfield, Franklin County, Vermont).

The children of Nathaniel WILLETT and Sarah SHATTUCK were:

1. Harris Thomas GIDDINGS (adopted): born September 8, 1837, Vermont; removed to Wisconsin; married January 30, 1860 to Mary Eudora CHENEY; removed to Omaha, Nebraska, in the 1870's and was a railroad inspector on the C and O. W. R. R.; he died March

- 31, 1897, and was buried at Forest Lawn Cemetery, Omaha, Nebraska. (This line will continue on page 2-F.31.1.1).
2. Fernando Cortez: born in 1842; unmarried; Civil War veteran; Secretary of Legation, Mexico City (1874); he died at Corboda in 1875 of a hemorrhage and is buried at Mexico City, Mexico, at the United States National Cemetery, 31 Melchor Ocampo. (1860 Franklin County census). (This person is continued on page 5-F.31.1.2).
  3. Lucius Darwin: born May 23, 1845 at Bakerfield, Franklin County, Vermont; he married March 14, 1871 to Francis (Frank) Emma HILLIS (born January 6, 1846 at Anamosa, Jones County, Iowa; she died March 14, 1941 at Woodbine, Harrison County, Iowa), the daughter of Samuel Ewing HILLIS and Margaret HESTER. (1860 Franklin County census) (This person is continued on page 6-F.31.1.3).
  4. Edgar E.: born August 31, 1854, Bakersfield, Franklin County, Vermont; a very precocious child and very musical; he went to Evensville to be with his brother, Fernando WILLETT, and attended school preparatory to attending college; he died March 8, 1868, suddenly from pneumonia, and is buried at Bakersfield, Vermont. (1860 Franklin County census)

**F.31.1.1**Harris Thomas GIDDINGS/WILLETT and Mary Eudora CHENEY of Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin, and Detroit, Wayne County, Michigan and Douglas County, Nebraska

Harris Thomas GIDDINGS (adopted name WILLETT) was born on September 8, 1837, in

Vermont (according to the Douglas County, Nebraska census). He may have been born a GIDDINGS. Harris was adopted by Nathaniel WILLETT of Bakersfield, Franklin County, Vermont. It is unknown with absolute certainty what his real surname was. He continued to use his adopted name throughout his life. However, in the 1850 Bakerfield, Franklin County, Vermont census he is listed as Harris GIDDINGS.

Between 1850 and 1860, Harris WILLETT removed to Benoit, Rock County, Wisconsin. He took up residence with the Mary A. CHENEY family. It is possible that he had a sister Ann Elizabeth, and a brother John.

Harris WILLETT married on January 30, 1860, Mary Eudora CHENEY (born March 4, 1840, at Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin; she died November 15, 1913, at St. Paul, Howard County, Nebraska, and was buried at Forest Lawn, Omaha, Nebraska. She was the daughter of Isreal and Mary Althea CHENEY.

Initially, Harris and Endora lived with her mother (1860 Rock County, Wisconsin census).

Harris Thomas WILLETT moved to Detroit, where he worked for Carrigan Motors. In the spring of 1874, they moved to Omaha, Nebraska, where he built wheels and under carriages for the Union Pacific Railroad.

In 1880, they were residing at Gese's Addition, Omaha, Douglas County, Nebraska. He is not listed in the 1885 Douglas County, Nebraska, Special Census, but his family is listed. Harris Thomas WILLETT died on March 31, 1897, and is buried in the Forest Lawn Cemetery, Omaha, Nebraska.

(The Willett Families, page 922; 1860 Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin census; 1880 Gese's Addition, Douglas County, Nebraska census; 1885 Douglas County, Nebraska, Special Census; 1900 Omaha City, Douglas County, Nebraska census; Jeanne Smith Ryan file; Cheryl Copeland file).

The children of Harris Thomas GIIDINGS/WILLETT and Mary Eudora CHENEY were:

1. John Harris: born August, 1865, Wisconsin; married; he died December 14, 1920, in Omaha, Nebraska, and is buried at Forest Lawn. (1880 Douglas County census). This person is continued on page 3

**F.31.1.1.1** John Harris WILLETT of Douglas County, Nebraska (continued from above).

John Harris WILLETT was born in August of 1865. He was married about 1888 (wife's name is unknown). He was foreman of the Union Pacific Railroad paint shop.

John WILLETT died on December 14, 1920,

in Omaha, Nebraska, and he is buried at Forest Lawn in that city. (The Willett Families, page 922).

1. Harris John: born July 1889, Nebraska; in 1900 enumerated with his grandmother, Mary E. WILLETT, age 59.

**F.31.1.1.3** Nellie Gordon WILLETT and Edward E. WESTCOTT of Douglas County, Nebraska

Nellie Gordon WILLETT was born on December 12, 1869, at Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin. She married in Omaha, Nebraska, on July 2, 1889 to Edward Everett WESTCOTT (born September 2, 1860, in Otsego County, New York; he died July 10, 1934, at St. Paul, Howard County, Nebraska, and is buried in the Elmwood Cemetery in St. Paul), he was the son of Charles and Mary WESTCOTT.

Nellie (WILLETT) WESTCOTT died on July 9, 1965, in St. Paul, Howard County, Nebraska, and is buried in the Elmwood Cemetery, St. Paul, Nebraska. (The Willett Families, page 922; Cheryl Copeland file).

The children of Nellie G. WILLETT and Edward E. WESTCOTT were:

1. Carlisle Foote WESTCOTT: born June 6, 1890 at Hillside, Iowa; married 1st, July 11, 1910, ; Kittie JOHNS; married 2nd, December 23, 1917, Agnes BONDER; married 3rd, April 14, 1947, Fern POTTASCH.

Dora Maude WESTCOTT was born on December 3, 1892, Omaha, Douglas County, Nebraska. She married on June 8, 1913, to Clifford Lincoln SMITH (born February 7, 1892, at Cushing, Howard County, Nebraska; he died April 3, 1970 at Barstow, California).

Dora (WESTCOTT) SMITH died May 7, 1929. Both are buried in the Elmwood Cemetery, St. Paul, Nebraska.

**F.31.1.1.4 James R. WILLETT of Nebraska**

James R. WILLETT was born on August 13, 1873, in Wisconsin (at Detroit, Michigan?). He married 1st about 1895 to Emma (last name unknown—she died June 27, 1897, in childbirth). In 1900 he was widowed and the driver of a grocery wagon.

James WILLETT married 2nd about 1900 to Mary C. FITZGERALD.

James WILLETT died in July, 1926 (probably in Omaha, Douglas County, Nebraska). (1900 Omaha City, Nebraska, census, listed with his mother; The Willett Families, page 923).

**F.31.1.2 Fernando Cortez WILLETT of Bakersfield, Franklin County, Vermont**

Fernando Cortez WILLETT was born in 1842. In the 1850 and 1860 censuses, he is living at home with his parents in Bakersfield, Vermont. He was educated at Bakersfield and Barre, and was in his sophomore year at Williams College; however, these studies were interrupted by the growing conflict which became the Civil War. Fernando WILLETT served in the Civil War in the Union Army as a private and was in the Battle of Gettysburg, where it is said, he



acquitted himself bravely in the two major engagements of that battle.

He returned home to his studies and graduated from Williams College in 1865 where, on July 7, 1865, at Williamstown, he delivered the class day speech.

He was principal at the local academy at Bakersfield, Franklin County, Vermont, and at the high school of Evansville, Indiana. A pulmonary hemorrhage forced him to seek a better climate in Colorado.

He traveled with a Mr. Blake over Colorado, taking pictures. During this time, he wrote a handbook on Colorado. He went to Cincinnati to prepare for the ministry at Lane Theological Seminary, but due to illness was forced to return to Bakersfield.

The American Minister to Mexico, an Evansville friend, offered him the Secretary of Legation, Mexico City (1874). However, his hemorrhage recurred in the high altitude of Mexico City; he left for Corboda. Fernando Cortez WILLETT died at Corboda in 1875 of a hemorrhage. It was his wish to be buried in Mexico City, Mexico, at the United States National Cemetery, 31 Melchor Ocampo.

**F.31.1.3** Lucius Darwin WILLETT and Frances Emma HILLIS of Woodbine, Harrison County, Iowa

Lucius ("Lute") Darwin WILLETT was born on May 23, 1845, in Bakersfield, Vermont.

Lucius WILLETT enlisted in the Union

Army on April 5, 1865, Company A, 3rd Vermont Infantry; this proved to be towards the end of the Civil War; a fact which was not clear then as it is now. He was discharged at Hull Hill, Virginia, on July 11, 1865.

With the war over, he started out west, worked for the Studebaker Wagon Company in South Bend, Indiana, then went to Illinois and worked for an elevator company till the elevator factory burned down. From there, in 1868, he removed to Beloit, Wisconsin, where he bought a three year old colt, broke it to sulky, and with a bull pup for his pet and only company, drove overland to Magnolia, Iowa, where he worked in a store for a time.

He married on March 14, 1871, Frances (Frank) Emma HILLIS (born January 6, 1846, Anamosa, Jones County, Territory of Iowa; she died March 14, 1941, at Woodbine, Harrison County, Iowa, at the age of 95 years, two months, and 12 days), the daughter of Samuel Ewing HILLIS and Margaret HESTER. They lived first at Magnolia.

"In August of 1877, Mr. and Mrs. WILLETT moved from Magnolia to a farm southwest of Woodbine where they resided, with the exception of a year in Colorado, and ten years in Woodbine, until their passing" ("Life Story of Mrs. L.D. WILLETT," undated newspaper article).

Lucius Darwin WILLETT owned and operated Springdale Farm, Section 33, Boyer Township, Harrison County, Iowa. That farm still remains in the family and is presently owned (1986) by Dwight and Della WILLETT.

"Mr. WILLETT was a farmer by occupation. He enjoyed people, living and was full of fun, but along with this went an earnest Christian life. Before leaving Vermont, he had joined the Congregational Church, and upon coming to Woodbine became a charter member of the First Presbyterian Church...Mr. Willett was no respecter of persons, and for years he found great enjoyment in an opportunity for services near his own home, when on each Sunday afternoon, he carried his Bible and hymn book to the county poor farm and held a service for the inmates there" ("Last Rites for L.D. WILLETT Held Saturday," undated

newspaper article).

Lucius Darwin WILLETT died on January 9, 1930, at Woodbine, Iowa. ("WILLETT House Quarterly," Vol. II, No. 2, June, 1986, pp. 248-250; 1880 Bayer Township, Harrison County, Iowa, census; Joy Jones file).

The children of Lucius D. WILLETT and Frances E. HILLIS were:

1. Abbie Louise: born April 10, 1872, Magnolia, Iowa; married October 11, 1898, Rev. J. Eugene SNOOK; he died in childbirth on June 15, 1900, in Silver Cliff, Colorado, with her baby son, Brainard Hills SNOOK; she was suffering also from a weak heart and Tuberculosis; she is buried at Woodbine, Iowa. (1880 Harrison County census).
2. John WILLETT may have been the father of Akin WILLETT (born 1814; died 1887), also of Plattsburgh who had children Mary, Calista, and John.

An advertisement in the *Plattsburg Republican* newspaper of May 22, 1819, "Ran away on the 9th instant, Sidney WILLET, an indentured boy. Champlain, May 10, 1819."

On September 14, 1826, a Jacob WILLETT of Washington, Dutchess County, New York, mentioned in a deed concerning the purchase of 5 acres of land at Peru, Clinton County, New York; in 1828, he purchased 17 1/2 acres from Samuel Roberts for \$350.00, in Peru.) □

# Keene Corners Cemetery

## Village of Glover, Town of Glover

### Orleans County, Vermont

Located east of the village just short of one mile up a steep and winding gravel-based road, (known as the "Dexter Mountain Road" by the local inhabitants), this tiny cemetery can be found on the right hand side just after passing a broad field blessed by mother nature with a fresh-water spring that is available and used by any and all who pass by. An existing wood rail fence with cedar post steps built into the earth is the only entrance, and the fence is in a severe state of decay causing the writer to believe it will be repaired at any time by local officials.

History records that a family named FRENCH settled in the surrounding area of this cemetery about 1855, the second such family settlement in the Glover area.

Silas French moved to Glover coming from Keene, New Hampshire with his family of 7 sons and 3 daughters, purchasing lot #111 (160 acres) at Keene Corner.

This cemetery is no longer used—indeed the last burial took place there in 1899, and some records indicate just 29 graves. I have located and marked only 26, however, and I cannot help but wonder how many more are really buried there and how many stones will remain in the years yet to come.

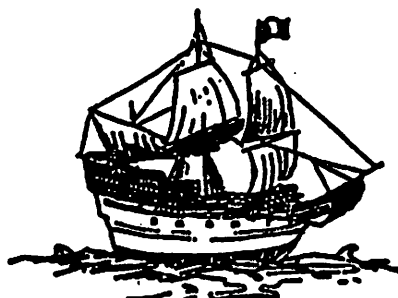

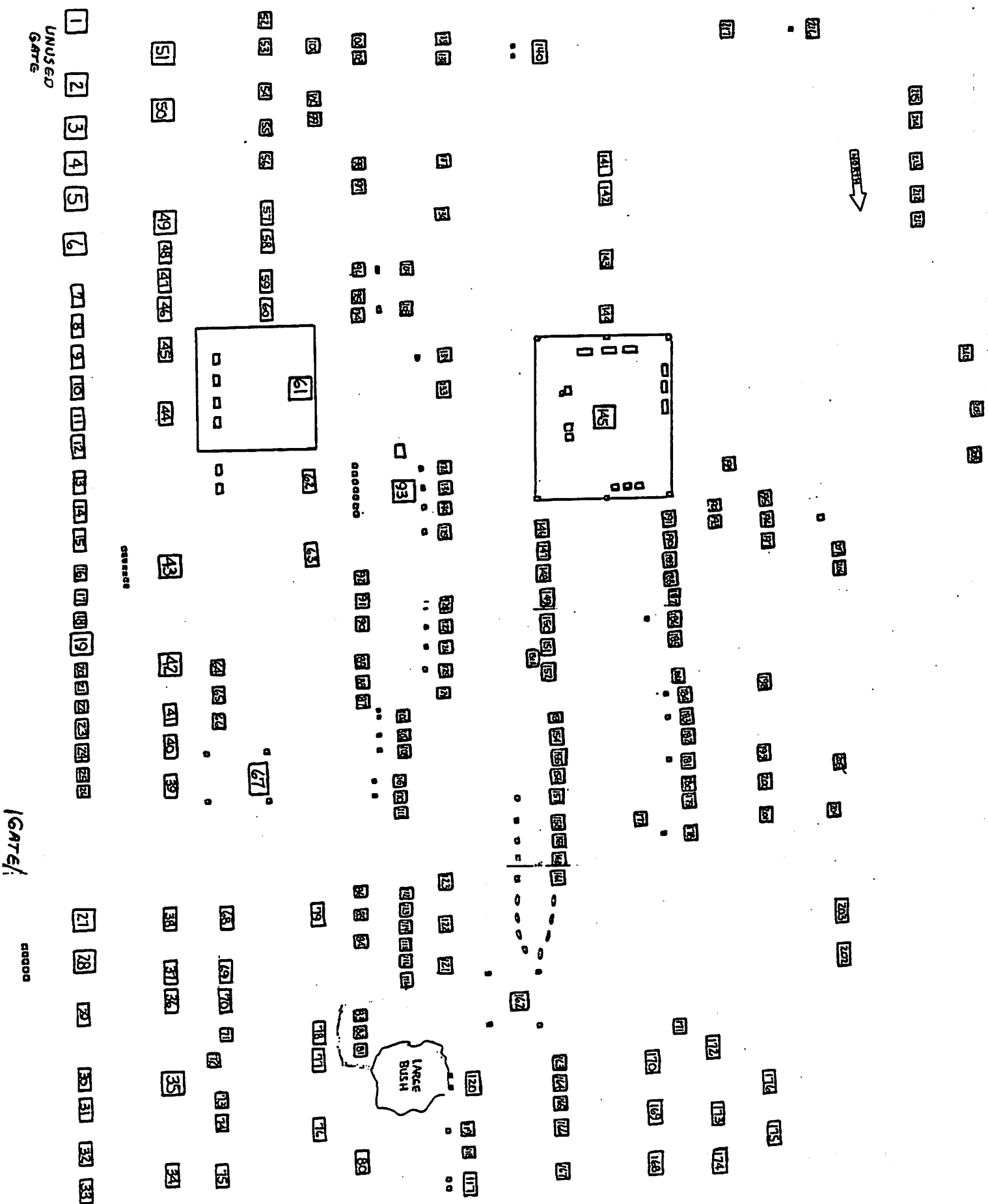

## West Glover Cemetery

Town of Glover,  
Orleans County, Vermont

To reach this cemetery from Vermont Route 16, turn right entering Glover village and drive past the Town Clerk's office, a small white house on the left. This winding, paved road is the main route to West Glover. 2.5 miles later, approaching the village of West Glover, turn left onto a dirt road which follows alongside the east boundary of Lake Parker. Drive exactly 1.1 miles and locate a left turn onto a smaller dirt road known locally as "the old Hinman Road." Keeping to the left, go exactly 3 tenths of a mile up and find the cemetery on the right hand side of the road at a dead end.

A peaceful place in the woods to visit, one is taken with the 2 wooden bird houses perched on the front fence near the gate which are usually tenanted by swallows. A mixture of the old, the new, the common and the unusual, this cemetery is marred only by the down and broken stones that dot its confines—more than a handful.

The north/south boundaries are a line of huge old maples with the remains of a very old wire fence faintly in existence, while the front has a rusty pair of gates large enough for a vehicle to drive through [see map]. It seems highly unlikely any four wheel vehicle will ever enter this cemetery again, and the vestigages of a similar wire fence as dots the sides, can be seen here. The back of this cemetery borders a woodlot, and here, too, one can see some strands of what was once a wire fence.

The rough measurements of this cemetery are 225' wide [north/south] by 150' deep [east/west]

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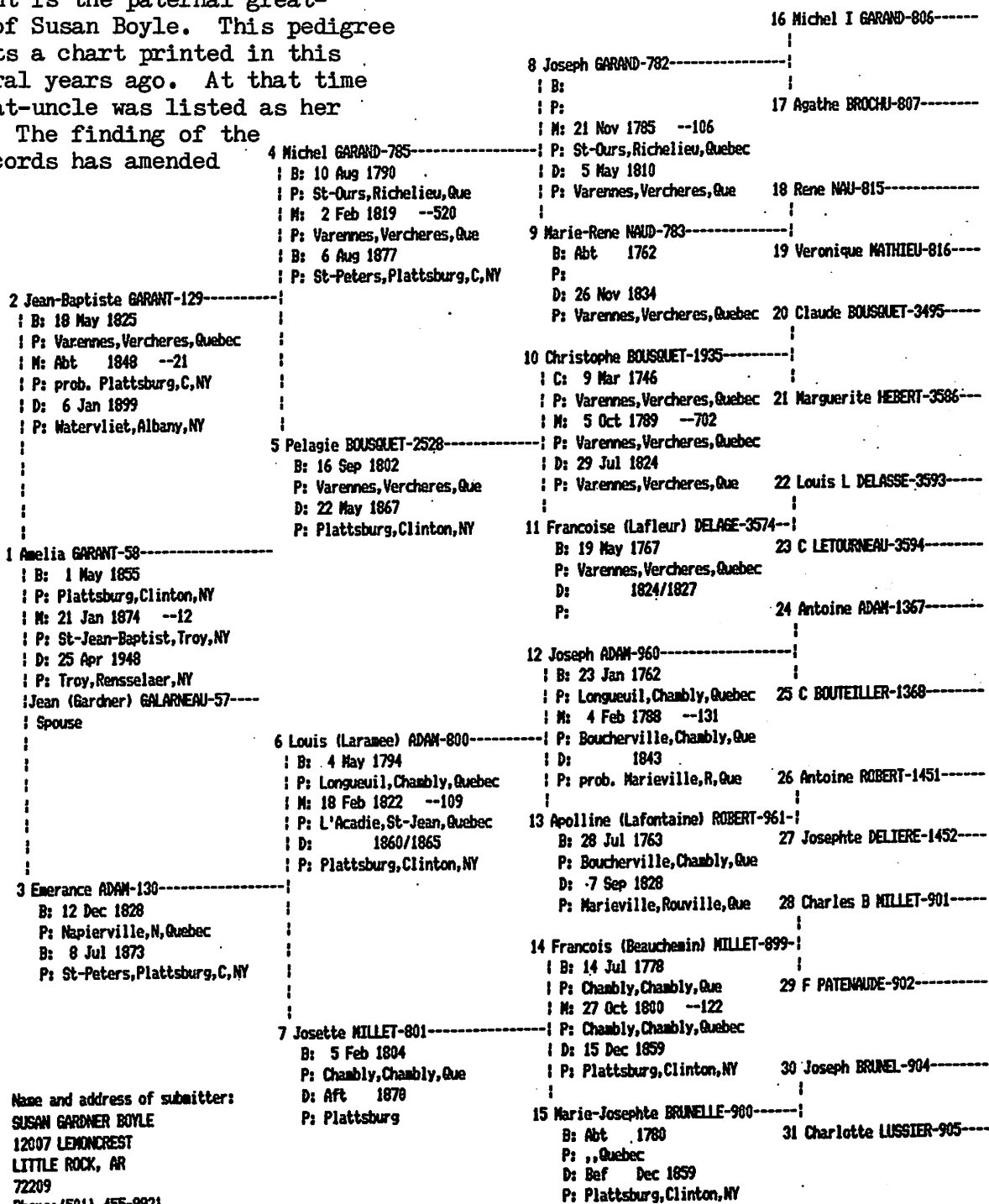

## PARTIAL ANSWER

I have been searching for years for Peter Strack's port of entry into the US. I have not been able to find it. I have however found his name on the Alsace emigration index LDS film #1125006. It says is as follows:

Peter Strack occupation-charpentier residence-Soufflenheim destination-America passport date-between 1828 and 1837 with wife and 2 ? children BAS RHIN

I suspect his port of entry was somewhere in Québec province or less likely in New England. You refer to his son Philip who according to the census was born in Vermont. Family tradition has it that a son was born on the boat coming over. I am inclined to think that this son was Philip. I can only guess why he was listed as born in Vermont. Perhaps it was the idea of the census enumerator since I don't believe that he could have written that someone was born on a boat and Vermont may have been the closest place to where he was actually born. Or maybe they told the census taker this to ensure that he would be considered a citizen of the US

In any case I think Peter first settled his family somewhere in Québec Province. The history of the church in Redford states that Peter Strack along with George and J.B.Pepin were the first French Canadian settlers in Redford and that they cut their through the woods to get there about the end of the 1820's An Answer to Q#509 spring 1991 journal. 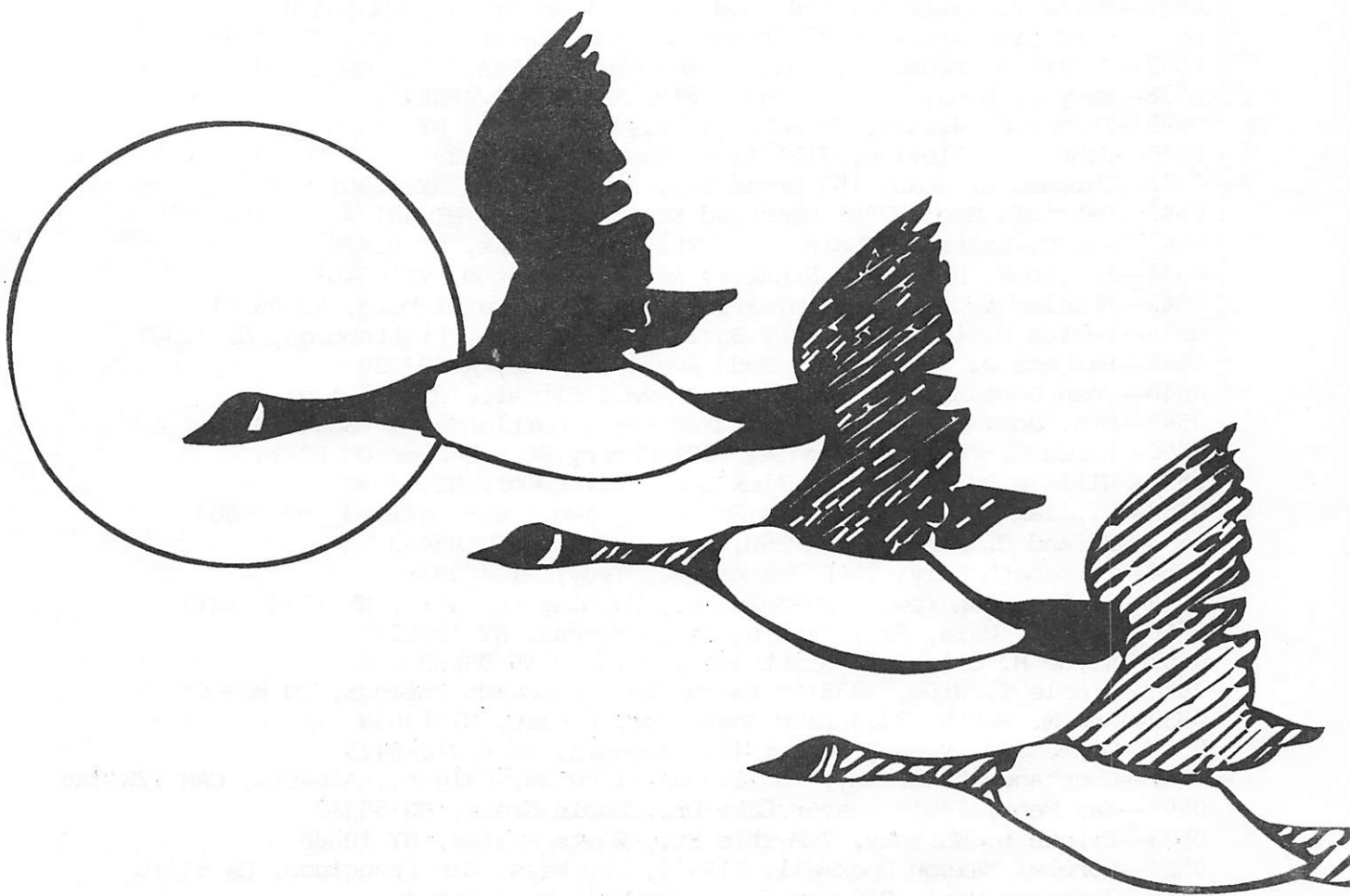
