



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#### LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

There are many reasons why this issue is so late and I will not bore you with details, although some will be apparent by the end of this letter.

The program for the National Genealogical Society Conference in '89 at St. Paul is finalized and will be printed and distributed by NGS. An abbreviated flyer, describing some of the conference, is collated with this issue. I hope that every reader within 500 miles (and further) will attend — make your plans now for May 17-20, 1989. We have worked very hard to plan the best program possible, with a variety of lectures that will give everyone the most help possible. There will be more for Canadian researchers than has ever been offered before or will likely be offered in the future. Some of the topics will be on Loyalists, land records in Ontario, the National Archives of Canada (formerly, Public Archives of Canada), the fur trade, sources for Quebec research beyond the published sources, and research in the Atlantic Provinces of Canada. Most of these topics have never been covered before in large conferences in the United States.

The Federation of Genealogical Societies Conference in Boston was great. The lectures were outstanding and the evening cruise of historic Boston Harbor was a welcome relief from the usual banquet. The speakers relaxed and everyone else chatted about their research problems, "great-greats" were heard all over the boat, hair-dos were ruined and nobody cared, and we all appreciated the fine job of planning by the committee at New England Historic Genealogical Society.

Boston and Biloxi set some high standards for us to follow in St. Paul. The Host Committee for "Journey Into Your Past" is hard at work and I am sure those standards will be met. Let's have a huge turnout and show them what Midwesterners can do.

The most exciting aspect is that much of it is of Protestant parish registers, as well as notarial documents.

# PARISH REGISTER EXTRACTS St-Jean-Chrysostôme, Chateauguay County, Quebec 1838-1853 Virginia Easley DeMarce

The following records are abstracted from the parish registers of St-Jean-Chrysostôme, LDS microfilm 1,031,559, and are for acts performed in the United States or acts performed in Canada for United States families. The "Parish Registers" open in 1838, but for the first few years they are actually missionary records kept for the entire border region by the missionary fathers John Moore, John Falvey, and Joseph Dallaire. A few acts were signed by Father Etienne Blythe from Ste-Martine. These were apparently deposited at St-Jean-Chrysostome when Father Dallaire became curé there.

During the years 1838 through 1840 the missionaries were covering the entire circuit of territory from Ormstown, Quebec, south to Malone, New York, east to Derby in Orleans County, Vermont, north to the St-Armand area of Quebec, and back to Ormstown. In addition to the U.S. locations noted in the records extracted, the Quebec locations found in these records for these three years are: Rivière-Noire, Williamstown, Ormstown, Norton Creek, Russeltown (now known as St-Jean-Chrysostôme), Hemmingford, Godmanchester, Huntington, Hinchinbrooke, Sherrington, Farnham, St-Armand, Dunham, Sutton, Granby, Milton, Shefford, Potton, Stanstead, Brome, West Hatley, Redford, Frelighsburg, and Bolton.

During the years 1841 through 1844 the missionary circuit was apparently cut in half. Father Joseph Dallaire, now stationed at St-Jean-Chrysostôme, was travelling in Canada only to those mission stations west of the Richelieu River - the "Western Townships." He was no longer doing missionary work in the "Eastern Townships." Similarly, in the U.S., Father Dallaire was no longer visiting the state of Vermont. Most of his missionary work was in Franklin County, New York, and western Clinton County, New York, with a few records pertaining to St. Lawrence County. The baptismal records for these years contain only the description "in the United States," but associated marriage records for these trips make reference to Malone, Chateauguay, and Ellenburg. It appears from the grouping of records that he did make visits to the U.S., and that these records are not, for the most part, the product of U.S.-resident families making visits to Canada.

Some of the original records are in French and others are in English. The language of the record is not necessarily connected to the ethnic origin of either the priest or the family.

#### Ministers of the Church of Scotland in Canada

The following are abstracts of genealogical information contained in the biographical sketches in this work of ministers who served in Canada (there is more information about their education and appointments in other countries). References are made to further information published in earlier volumes, where there often is much more biographical detail. I have a copy of Vol. VI, and have extracted from that book as well as from Vol. VII. Page numbers at the end of the entry refer to the page in Vol. VII.

#### Maritime or Eastern Provinces: Cape Breton

(Abstract of the historical paragraph) -- Robert MACPHERSON, chaplain to the Fraser Highlanders, is believed to have been the first Scottish minister to conduct services in Cape Breton in June 1758. In 1798, and again in 1818, James M'GREGOR, D.D., Secession minister at Pictou, made laborious missionary journeys throughout the Island. The first resident Presbyterian minister was Norman M'LEOD, native of Stoer, Sutherland who settled at St Ann's Harbour 20 May 1820 where he remained for upwards of 30 years. At the age of 70 he left for New Zealand with a ship-load of followers. Donald MACDONALD arrived in 1824 and itinerated for two years, afterwards removing to Prince Edward Island (q.v.). Dugald M'KICHAN (infra), first regular minister of the Church of Scotland was settled at River Inhabitants for eight years. In 1828 Donald A. FRASER of Pictou, and John M'LENNAN of Prince Edward Island (q.v.) proceeded on a missionary tour to Cape Breton. Alexander FARQUHARSON (infra) arrived in 1833. They built six churches before his arrival and in the following year ten more were erected and divided into parishes over which he and John STEWART, James FRASER, Peter M'LEAN (infra) were settled. In 1844 all the Cape Breton ministers joined the Free Church, yet at the census of 1851 it was found that over 5000 persons still adhered to the Church of Scotland. A Presbytery of Cape Breton in connection with the Church of Scotland was instituted in 1836. In 1844 it became a Presbytery of the Free Church of Nova Scotia. None of its early records have been preserved. p. 606

FARQUHARSON, Alexander b 29 May 1793 Strathardale, Perthshire, son of John F., farmer; arrived Plaster Cove, Cape Breton 11 Sep 1833; admitted minister at Middle River and Lake Ainslie 30 Nov 1834; died 25 Jan 1858. He married Ann MACKENZIE and had issue – Alexander, minister of Free Church, Sydney, Cape Breton b 16 Jun 1835, died 21 Oct 1892, and others. p. 606-7

FRASER, James born Fodderty, Ross-shire 1800; ordained for missionary work in Cape Breton; admitted to Boulardarie 1837; died there 8 Apr 1874.

FRASER, James William, M.A. appointed by Colonial Committee to River Inhabitants, Cape Breton 1866; went to Nova Scotia 1870 (q.v.). p. 607. Page 614: born 1841, native of St. Paul's, East River of Pictou, Nova Scotia; missionary to Cape Breton 1866-70; admitted to Roger's Hill and Cape John, Nova Scotia Dec 1870; declined to join the Union of 1875; his congregation joined the Presbyterian Church of Canada 1907 when he resigned and retired to Pictou; died 2 Dec 1913.

GUNN, John born Farr, Sutherlandshire 1806; appointed a missionary in Cape Breton 1838; admitted to Broad Cove 24 Sep 1840. Joined the Free Church in 1844 (when every member of the Presbytery of Cape Breton withdrew from the Church of Scotland). 1860 he declined to enter the Union between the Free and the Presbyterian Churches of Nova Scotia, and shortly after attached himself to the Presbytery of Pictou in connection with the Church of Scotland. Died Broad Cove 2 Nov 1870. p. 607

M'KICHAN, Dugald (cf. Vol. VI, 449) removed from Barney's River, Nova Scotia to Conso (River Inhabitants), Cape Breton 1832 where he ministered until his return to Barney's River 1840 (q.v.). p. 607. Vol. VI, p. 449: born Ardchattan 1801, 3rd son of Finlay M., merchant; became minister at Barney's River, Pictou, Nova Scotia; admitted here (Daviot and Dunlichity, Scotland) 27 Mar 1845; died 5 Dec 1858. Married Isabella (died 24 Mar 1867), daughter of Hugh M'PHIE, yeoman, and Mary M'PHIE, and had issue: Finlay Hugh born 6 Sep 1832, student at St Andrews 1851-52; Catherine Isabella born 30 Apr 1834; Alexander John, minister of Kinlochluichart, born 31 Dec 1835; Peter Neil minister of Inveraray born 7 Nov 1837; James Archibald born 23 Jul 1839; Mary Dugalda born 4 Apr 1841; Isabella Christina born 21 Mar 1843, married James DONALD, D.D., minister of Keithhall.

M'LEAN, Peter born Uig, Lewis, 1800; in business in Stornoway till age 27; ordained as missionary to St Patrick's Channel and Whycocomagh Bay, Cape Breton, arrived 26 Aug 1837; returned to Scotland in ill-health 1841; revisited Cape Breton 1853; visited again 1866; died 20 Mar 1868. He married 1843 Flora CAMPBELL. p. 607

MACLEOD, Hugh, D.D. (cf. Vol. VII, 64); formerly minister of Logie-Easter; admitted minister of Free Church, Mira Ferry (now Albert Bridge), Cape Breton 2 Oct 1850; died 23 Jan 1894. p. 607. Page 64: born Tongue 23 Apr 1803; visited Canada 1845 and 1848 as deputy of the Free Church, chiefly to the highland settlers in the Eastern Province; Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Canada 1877. Married 6 Apr 1841 Catherine, daughter of Hugh ROSS, minister of Fearn, and had issue: Hugh b 18 Nov 1842; Barbara b 19 Oct 1844, died 30 Jun 1847; George b 5 Oct 1846; Anne b 10 Nov 1849; Barbara born 21 Oct 1851 Sydney, Cape Breton; William Mackenzie b 4 Jul 1854; Anne b 10 May 1857; Catherine b 6 Jan 1860.

M'LEOD, Roderick, B.D., native of Harris; ordained to Strathlorne, Cape Breton 26 Jul 1886; afterwards ministered at Kenyon and Ripley, Canada; returned to Scotland. p. 607

RANKIN, Edward Blackmore (cf. Vol. I, 424), ordained to St. John's Church, Stellarton, Nova Scotia 12 Sep 1889; admitted minister of Falmouth Street Church, Sydney, Cape Breton 26 Aug 1891; demitted 15 Aug 1903; returned to Scotland. p. 607-08, 617

STEWART, John admitted at West Bay, Cape Breton 19 Oct 1835; removed to Nova Scotia 1838 (q.v.). p. 608. Page 618: born Little Dunkeld, Perthshire, April 1800; arrived at Plaster Cove, Cape Breton 23 Aug 1834; removed to St Andrew's Church, Fraser's Mountain (now New Glasgow), Pictou County, Nova Scotia, June 1838. Joined the Free Church in 1844; minister of Knox Free Church, New Glasgow 1844-80; died 4 May 1880. He married 1836 Alicia Murray, daughter of William DRYSDALE, jeweller, Edinburgh.

STEWART, Murdoch born Contin, Ross-shire 1809; ordained to West Bay, Cape Breton Sep 1843; admitted to Whycocomagh 1868; died Pictou 30 Jul 1884. p. 608 WILSON, Matthew born Cadder, Lanarkshire 1 Jan 1806; 7th son of Alexander

W., farmer; ordained 17 May 1842 for service at Sydney Mines, Cape Breton; resigned 1883; died 13 Dec 1884 as the result of a carriage accident while on his way to make a sick visit. p. 608

New Brunswick (See page 608 for brief history.)

ANDERSON, James (cf. Vol. VI, 357) ordained June 1865; ministered at Wallace and Pugwash, Nova Scotia 1866-72; admitted to St James's, Newcastle, New Brunswick 1873; returned to Scotland. p. 608. Vol. VI, p. 357: born Kenmore 5 Jul 1834, son of Duncan A., farmer, and Janet M'EWEN; ordained to the Presbyterian Church, Newcastle, New Brunswick June 1865; admitted to this charge (Alvie, Scotland) 22 Apr 1880; died 14 Jul 1913. He married (1) Jan 1865 Barbara GRANT (born 13 Jan 1832, died 27 Nov 1883); (2) 28 Mar 1888 Jessie, daughter of Daniel MUNRO, minister of Insh.

New Brunswick Jan 1872; returned to Scotland. p. 608

BERRY, James Garrow, M.A., B.D., formerly minister of Leslie, Aberdeenshire (cf. Vol. VI, 172); transferred to Colvend 2 Aug 1917; demitted to Frederickton, New Brunswick 1926. p. 608. Vol. VI, p. 172: born Boroughbridge, Yorkshire 25 May 1880, son of William B. and Charlotte Glas GRINDLAY. Married 9 Jun 1914 Agnes Mitchell, eldest daughter of William HENDERSON of Auchinblae, and has issue: Edmund Graindlay born 12 Mar 1915; Elise Malcolm born 30 Jan 1917.

BIRKMYRE, John, D.D. (cf. Vol. I, 30) ordained to St Paul's Church, Fredericton, New Brunswick 1832; returned to Scotland 1841. p. 608

BROOKE, John M. born Slamannan, Stirlingshire 1801; ordained to New Richmond, New Brunswick 1839; admitted to St Paul's Fredericton, Feb 1843; was the oldest minister of the Church of Scotland in the Maritime Provinces at the Union of 1875; died 1882. p. 608-09

BURGESS, James (cf. Vol. V, 312) ordained to Andover, New Brunswick 17 Nov 1891; admitted to Beach Mission, Broughty Ferry 18 May 1905. p. 609

BURNS, George, D.D. (cf. Vol. I, 296) arrived on Sunday morning 25 May 1817 opening St Andrew's Church, St John, New Brunswick; returned to Scotland and admitted to Tweedsmuir 3 Nov 1831. p. 609

CAIE, George Johnston, B.A. (cf. Vol. V, 287) ordained to St Stephen's, St John, New Brunswick 6 Jun 1866; returned to Scotland. p. 609

CAMERON, Robert James (cf. Vol. V, 84) appointed ordained assistant at St Andrew's, St John, New Brunswick 14 Apr 1870; resigned 12 Jun 1876; returned to Scotland. p. 609

DAVIDSON, John admitted to New Richmond, New Brunswick 1 Nov 1851; transferred to North Williamsburgh, Ontario April 1858 (q.v.). p. 609. Page 631: born Paisley 1814, 2nd son of James D.; minister at LaPrairie 1844-49; declined to join the Union of 1875; died 2 Feb 1890.

DONALD, William born Edingight, Grange, Banffshire 6 Jun 1807, son of John D., farmer, and Janet M'HATTIE; admitted 10 Jun 1849 St Andrew's, St John, New Brunswick; resigned 22 Jan and died 20 Feb 1871. He married (1) a lady who died 3 Mar 1850 aged 51 and had issue; (2) 29 Jun 1852 Louisa Agnes (died 1892, aged 64), daughter of Hugh WILSON of Edinburgh, and had issue. p. 609

FERRIE, William formerly minister of Anstruther Easter (cf. Vol. V., 181); 'minister of St David's, St John, New Brunswick 1851. p. 609

FOGO, William appointed by Colonial Committee as a missionary to Nova Scotia and ordained by Presbytery of Perth to Halifax 29 Jul 1868; admitted to Nashwark and Stanley, New Brunswick 6 Jun 1871. p. 609

FORBES, Alexander appointed by Colonial Committee as a missionary to New Brunswick 1854; admitted to St John's Church, Dalhousie, New Brunswick 1855(-58); transferred to Inverness, (Presbytery Quebec) 1859 (q.v.). p. 609. Page 633-34: born Old Machar about 1821, son of Alexander F.; minister at Inverness, Ontario (sic) 1859; retired and was resident in Ontario 1875.

FRASER, Simon (cf. Vol. VII, 9) ordained missionary to Black River, Bay du Vin (Alnwick and Glenelg) and the scattered Scottish settlements in New Brunswick 16 Jan 1835; returned to Scotland 1840. p. 609. Page 9: born Boleskine 1806, son of Simon F., shepherd, and Bessie FRASER; sent by the Glasgow Colonial Society as missionary to Scottish settlers in New Brunswick and ordained by Presbytery there 16 Jan 1835 to Alnwick and Glenelg, where he was a most zealous and successful pastor, his knowledge of Gaelic proving of the greatest advantage, many of the settlers having come from the Highlands. He returned to Scotland 1840. He married 1846 Eliza ROSS and had issue.

GALBRAITH, Peter admitted to St Luke's, Bathurst, New Brunswick 10 Jan 1874; minister at West Branch of East River, Pictou, New Brunswick 1875 (q.v.). p. 609

HALKET/HALKETT, Andrew appointed by Colonial Committee and ordained to St Andrew's, St John, New Brunswick 7 Sep 1843; returned to Scotland 1847. p. 609 HANNAY, James (cf. Vol. III, 361) minister at Richibucto, New Brunswick 1833-45; returned to Scotland. p. 609

HENDERSON, William born 18 Aug 1800; appointed by Colonial Committee to the mission stations of Salisbury, Moncton, and Shediac, New Brunswick Aug 1841; admitted to St James's Church, Newcastle, New Brunswick 21 Feb 1844; died 6 Jun 1868. Married 23 Sep 1857 a daughter of the Rev. Joseph PURDIE of Clydevale, Lanarkshire. p. 610

HOME, Frederick minister at St Luke's, Bathurst, New Brunswick 1867-73; went to Ontario 1874 (q.v.). p. 610. Page 637: native of Kincardineshire; appointed by Colonial Committee and served as ordained missionary at Black River and Red Bank, Miramichi; minister at Buckingham and Cumberland, Ontario 12 May 1874.

HUNTER, John minister at Woodstock and Richmond, New Brunswick 1848-53; at Richmond 1853-59 when he ceased to exercise the functions of the ministry. p. 610

JARDINE, Robert, M.A., B.D., D.Sc., Professor of Logic, University of New Brunswick, afterwards missionary of the Church of Scotland in India (q.v.). p. 610. Page 696: born Augusta, Grenville, Ontario, Canada, 19 June 1840, 2nd son of John J., farmer and contractor, and Jean M'CREATH (both natives of Girvan, Ayrshire); educated at Brockville Grammar School, Queen's Univ., Kingston, B.A. 1863, M.A. 1866, B.D. 1866; licensed by Presbytery of Perth, Canada, 18 June 1866; studied philosophy Univ. of Edinburgh; D.Sc. 1867; appointed Professor of English Literature and Philosophy, Univ. of New Brunswick 1867; arrived at Bombay, India 12 Feb 1870; returned to Canada; minister of St Andrew's Church, Chatham, New Brunswick Feb 1879-81; minister of St John's, Brockville 5 May 1881; minister St Paul's Church, Prince Albert, Saskatchewan; resigned 1893 and withdrew from the Presbyterian denomination on account of altered views on orthodox doctrines; became pastor of the Church of Our Father, Chicago, USA; later in St. Louis; returned to Brockville 1921; died in New York 10 Jan 1924. KIDD, James, M.A. (cf. Vol. VII, 281) ordained to Richmond, New Brunswick 10 Dec 1861; admitted to a charge in Ontario 1869; returned to Scotland. p. 610. Page 281: born 8 Feb 1826, only son of James K., beadle, New Deer, and Joan HENDERSON; died 17 May 1894. Page 567: demitted on account of illness (in Ceylon) and returned to Australia 1862. Page 593: born Nairn 1 Apr 1811, son of John M.; from New Brunswick he returned to Scotland (from ill-health) and sent by Colonial Committee to South Australia; Inverbrackie 1850; to Ceylon, Scotland, and again to Australia 1862; demitted 27 Mar 1884; died North Adelaide 13 Aug 1897. Married Elizabeth HILDER, Hornsey, London, who died 1892, and had issue: Edward, rubber manufacturer, Glasgow; Margaret married COVENTRY; Anna married HUGHES, Malvern, South Australia; Edith.

MACDONALD, Finlay Robert (cf. Vol. V., 259) Ordained to St James's, Newcastle, New Brunswick 1869; resigned 28 Mar 1873 on account of ill-health and returned to Scotland. p. 610

MACDONELL, George ordained to St Luke's, Bathurst, New Brunswick 1840; afterwards of Fergus, Ontario (q.v.). p. 610. Page 641: born Kirkcaldy 1811, son of Daniel M. and father of Daniel James (see under Ontario); at Nelson and Waterdown, Ontario 1852-55; transferred to Fergus May 1855; at Milton 1869; died 25 Apr 1871.

M'INTYRE, Peter born 1810, 3rd son of Donald M., farmer, Kilchrenan, Argyll; admitted at St James's, Charlotte County, New Brunswick 1833; died soon afterwards. p. 610

M'LARDY, J.H., native of New Brunswick; appointed by Colonial Committee as missionary at Woodstock, New Brunswick 1858; minister there 1862-66; resigned and became assistant at Ottawa; resigned his ministerial status and engaged in teaching; drowned while bathing in the River Ottawa 1873. p. 610

MACLEAN, Alexander, D.D. (cf. Vol. VII, 44) ordained first minister of Greenock Church, St Andrews, New Brunswick 1 May 1824; returned to Scotland. 610. Page 44: born Rothesay 31 Aug 1793, son of Alexander M. and brother of Duncan M., minister of Kilmodan; died 16 Sep 1874. MACRAE, Donald born 26 Nov 1833 son of John M., minister at East River of Pictou, Nova Scotia (afterwards minister of Stornoway); ordained to East River of Pictou in 1856; transferred to St Andrew's Church, St John's, Newfoundland Aug 1858; re-transferred to East River 1870; transferred to St Stephen's, St John, New Brunswick 1874; died 1909. p. 611, 616

M'ROBIE, William born Muthill, Perthshire, 1820, eldest son of John M.; minister at Gartmore in 1856 (cf. Vol. IV, 346); minister at Tabusintac and Burnt Church, New Brunswick 18 Jun 1857 to Sep 1860. p. 611

MOFFAT, John (cf. Vol. VII, 228) minister at Woodstock, New Brunswick Oct 1871-72 (see Ontario). p. 611. Page 228: born 8 Feb 1831 son of Robert M., U.P. minister, Newcastle, and Margaret SCOTT; admitted to LaPrairie and Longueuil (Quebec) 18 Nov 1858; demitted 1869; returned to Britain and officiated at Hexham; returned to Canada and was minister at Woodstock, New Brunswick 187-72 and at Bayfield 1877-78; returned to Scotland and died 27 Dec 1885 North Ronaldsay. Page 646: appointed by Colonial Committee and admitted to LaPrairie and Longueuil 18 Nov 1858; resigned 1869; minister at Bayfield 1877-78;

MURRAY, James minister of St Luke's, Bathurst, New Brunswick Nov 1852-61; minister at Tabusintac 1861-65; minister of St John's Church, Dalhousie, New Brunswick Nov 1865-74; admitted to Wallace, Nova Scotia 18 Aug 1874 (q.v.). p. 611. Page 617: at Stellarton and Westville, Nova Scotia 1888.

MURRAY, James Allister minister at St Luke's, Bathurst, New Brunswick 1861-67; went to Mount Forest, Ontario 1867 (q.v.). p. 611. Page 647: born Roger's Hill, Pictou, Nova Scotia 1834; educated at Nova Scotia; transferred to Lindsay 13 Sep 1870; died 21 Oct 1894.

MURRAY, William appointed by Colonial Committee to Moncton 1855; minister Dalhousie 1859-65; became assistant at Fredericton; admitted to St Andrew's Church, Campbelltown 1869; returned to Scotland after 1875; died at Edinburgh 14 Feb 1904. p. 611

OGG, Charles Simmers, M.A. admitted to St Andrew's Church, Chatham, New Brunswick 14 Feb 1861; emigrated to New Zealand and became minister at St Andrew's, Wellington 15 Dec 1872 (q.v.). p. 611. Page 604: born Banchory-Ternan 10 Apr 1832, son of Charles O., minister of Inversallochy; resigned 1903; died unmarried 21 Aug 1905.

ROBERTSON, John educated at Univ. of Edinburgh and Aberdeen; appointed by Colonial Committee to Tabusintac and Burnt Church, New Brunswick 1868; inducted there 1871; still in the charge 1875. p. 611

ROSS, John born Cromarty about 1807, son of Simon R., shoemaker; ordained 1831; appointed to Yarmouth and Shelburne, Nova Scotia 1836; minister of Greenock Church, St Andrews, New Brunswick 1845-67; died 9 Apr 1871. p. 611, 617

RUSSELL, Samuel native of New Brunswick; educated at Queen's College, Kingston; ordained missionary at Red Bank and Black Bank in Presbytery of Miramichi, New Brunswick 1871. p. 611

SOUTER, James, M.A. (cf. Vol. I, 304) ordained to St James's, Newcastle, New Brunswick 11 Jun and admitted 19 Sep 1830; returned to Scotland 1843; admitted to Borthwick 10 May 1844. p. 611

STEVEN/STEVENS, James born Galston, Ayrshire 1801, 2nd son of James S.; ordained for missionary service in New Brunswick 1831; arrived at Campbelltown, at the head of the Bay of Chaleurs 24 Oct that year. He laboured there for 33

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years with Campbelltown and Dalhousie for centres, his ministrations being extended to vast distances where roads were unknown, and hardship and fatigue his constant experience; died 22 Jan 1864. p. 611

STEWART, William appointed by Colonial Committee as missionary to New Brunswick and ordained 22 Mar 1848; admitted to St Andrew's Church, Chatham, New Brunswick 1 Mar 1849; transferred to Hornby, Ontario 26 Dec 1860. p. 611. Page 652: born Glasgow, son of John S., merchant; educated at Univ. of Glasgow; admitted to Hornby and Trafalgar 26 Dec 1860; demitted 1887; died in Toronto 20 Jun 1892.

STOTT, David (cf. Vol. VII, 214) appointed by Colonial Committee to Woodstock, New Brunswick 1856; removed to Ontario and was sometime missionary and minister at Brantford; returned to Scotland and was admitted to Deerness, Orkney 18 Oct 1866. p. 611. Page 214: born 1826 son of John S., leather merchant, and Christina FIFE; died at Hill of Fearn, Ross-shire 8 Dec 1898. Married (1) 24 Dec 1857 Elizabeth Jane DIBBLE, New Brunswick, who died 30 Aug 1886, and had issue: Ellen born 6 Dec 1859, married 9 Aug 1893 Thomas KYLE, Stranraer, died 7 May 1898; John born 23 Jun 1862; Henry born 13 May 1866: (2) 6 Jun 1889 Christina (died 4 Apr 1919) eldest daughter of George GORDON, merchant, Fearn.

THOMSON, John minister of St David's Church, St John, New Brunswick 1848-53, afterwards of Inverallan (cf. Vol. VI, 363); his son A.S.D., died 9 Sep 1927. p. 612. Vol. VI, p. 363: born St Andrews, 7 Jan 1819, son of John T., builder, and Margaret NICOLL; minister of 4th Presbyterian Church, New York 1853-61 and 1864-75; minister Knox Church, Galt, Ontario 1861-64; admitted to Inverallan, Scotland 10 Jul 1878, demitted 20 Oct 1887; died 1 Mar 1893 Forres. Married Georgina (died at Forres 4 May 1901), daughter of Thomas ROSS, LL.D., minister of Lochbroom, and had issue: John Ross, M.D., Plockton; Thomas Ross; Jean Mackenzie; Bradbury; Alexander Stuart Duff, B.A. (New York), advocate, sheriff-substitute of Lanarkshire, born 1 May 1854.

WELLS, John born about 1832 Dumfriesshire, 3rd son of Robert W.; assistant at Campbeltown; appointed by Colonial Committee and admitted to New Richmond, New Brunswick July 1861; still in the charge 1875. p. 612

WILKINS, William T., B.A. ordained to Woodstock, New Brunswick Nov 1866; transferred to St Paul's Church, Truro, New Brunswick 2 Sep 1869 as first minister; transferred to St Andrew's Church, Stratford, Ontario 11 Apr 1873 (q.v.). p. 612, 619. Page 655: native of New Brunswick.

WILSON, Robert born 13 Mar 1805 Glasgow, 4th son of Thomas W., architect; ordained to St. Andrew's Church, St John, New Brunswick 4 Feb 1832; resigned in 1842 and returned to Scotland; died at 28 Buccleuch Place, Edinburgh 5 Apr 1894. Married 21 Oct 1833 Margaret Elizabeth, eldest daughter of John WILMOT, Mayor of St John, and sister of Robert Duncan W., Lieut-Governor of New Brunswick. p. 612

WILSON, William Macknight appointed to Colonial Committee to St Andrew's Church, Campbelltown, New Brunswick and ordained 16 Nov 1865; transferred to Chatham, New Brunswick 1868; returned to Scotland and admitted to North Parish, Aberdeen (cf. Vol. VI, 16). p. 612. Vol. VI, p. 16: born Ayr 1831 son of Henry W., shoemaker, and Elizabeth MACKNIGHT; minister of St Andrew's Church, Campbelton, Restigouche, New Brunswick but resigned on account of his wife's health; died 6 Jan 1914. Married 31 Dec 1860 Mary Ann Russell ROBERTSON who died 2 Feb 1923.

WISHART, William T., minister of St Stephen's Church, St John, New Brunswick 1842; adopted views on Baptism contrary to the standards of the Church, and was deposed. p. 612

Nova Scotia

(See page 612-13 for a more complete history.) James LYON, from the Presbytery of New Brunswick, in New Jersey, laboured for a time in Halifax and elsewhere from 1764. Samuel KINLOCH, a licentiate of the Burgher Synod of Scotland, arrived in 1766 but returned home in 1769. The first permanent minister, who may be considered the pioneer of Presbyterianism in New Brunswick, was James MURDOCH, a native of County Donegal, who fixed on Horton as a centre for his missionary labours. He met his death by drowning in the Musquodoboit River in 1799. The first Church of Scotland minister in the Province was James FRASER, formerly chaplain to the 71st Regiment during the American War. became pastor of a Scots congregation at Shelburne. In 1783, Thomas RUSSELL became minister of the Protestant Dissenters' Church (afterwards St Matthew's) organised at Halifax in 1749. The first meeting of a Presbytery and the first ordination of a Presbyterian minister in the Dominion of Canada, took place at Halifax 3 Jul 1770 when Messrs LYON and MURDOCH, with two Congregational ministers (SECCOMBE and PHELPS) set apart an earnest and pious-minded Dutch fisherman, Bruin Romcas COMINGOE, to the office of the ministry. He laboured at Lunenburg for 50 years and died in 1820 at the age of 96. In 1875 both the Secession and Free Synods entered the larger union of the Canadian Churches. The entire Presbytery of Pictou, however, declined to unite: A.W. HERDMAN, Pictou; George COULL, New Glasgow; William STEWART, Maclennan's Mountain; A.J. M'KICHAN, Barney's River; Charles DUNN, Stellarton and Westville; William MAC MILLAN, Salt Springs; J.W. FRASER, Roger's Hill and Cape John; Robert M'CUNN, River John; James M'COLL, Earltown.

AITKEN, Thomas born Bo'ness 1799, son of James A., merchant; appointed by Glasgow Colonial Society as rector of Halifax Academy, Nova Scotia 1828, and to engage in missionary work. p. 613

ARMIT, Andrew (cf. Vol. V, 366), ordained to Pictou, Nova Scotia 11 Apr 1893; admitted to Monikie 18 May 1896. p. 613

BOWMAN, Archibald formerly minister of Forglen (cf. Vol. VI, 253); minister of St Andrew's Church, New Glasgow, Nova Scotia 1888; transferred to St Therese de Blainville, Quebec 1901; died 22 Mar 1919. p. 613. Vol. VI, p. 253: born Cadder 24 Apr 1841, eldest son of James B., farmer; married 10 Mar 1874 to Helen MACLEAN, and had issue: Archibald Abercromby born 8 Mar 1875, Isabella Gemmell born 7 Jan 1877, Alexander John Maclean born 17 May 1885.

BOYD, George, M.A. (cf. Vol. I, 87) minister of St Andrew's, Halifax 1856; returned to Scotland 1865.

BRODIE, Neil (cf. Vol. VII, 181) formerly a missionary in Cape Breton; admitted to Gairloch, Nova Scotia Sept 1868; transferred to Lochiel, Ontario Oct 1874 (q.v.). p. 613. Page 181: born 1832 son of Peter B., merchant, Lochgilphead; ordained missionary in Cape Breton 1863. Page 627: declined to enter the Union of 1875; returned to Scotland.

BROWN, Andrew, D.D. (cf. Vol. I, 72) ordained to Halifax, Nova Scotia 1787; returned to Scotland. While minister at Halifax he gave much time and labour to the preparation of a History of Nova Scotia. Several of his manuscripts were afterwards found in a small shop in Scotland where they were used as wrapping-paper. Those remaining were purchased and deposited in the British Museum. Transcripts were obtained at the instance of the Nova Scotia Royal Commission. p. 613-14

BURGESS, Edwin H., minister at Stellarton, Nova Scotia 1892-1906; afterwards at Zion Church, Kingston, Ontario. p. 614

CALLAN, John Mann, M.A., minister at Balwearie, Pictou, Nova Scotia 1886-88; returned to Scotland and admitted to Annbank (cf. Vol. III, 2). p. 614

CAMPBELL, James Fraser born 1845, son of the Hon. Charles C., Baddeck, Cape Breton; assistant at St Matthew's, Halifax; minister at Richmond, North-West Arm, and Goodwood (in suburbs of Halifax) 1872-75; offered for foreign missionary service and went to Madras, India; later at Mhow and Rutlan; resigned 1920; married 22 Feb 1879 Mary, daughter of Alexander FORRESTER, minister of Sorbie (cf. Vol. II, 377). p. 614

CAMPBELL, John, native of Pictou County; ordained (in Scotland) 2 Jul 1868; admitted minister of St Andrew's, Halifax 1869. p. 614

CHRISTIE, James, M.A., minister at Wallace Nova Scotia 1859-64; afterwards in British Columbia (q.v.). p. 614. Page 657: born 4 Oct 1828 Kildrummy, 4th son of William C., M.A., schoolmaster, and brother of John C., D.D., Professor Church History; appointed by Colonial Committee and was minister at Wallace and Pugwash, Nova Scotia 1859-64; went to British Columbia and became missionary at Comox 1887, and Denman Island; was afterwards at Wellington, British Columbia; demitted 1889 when his congregation joined the Canadian Presbyterian Church; died at Victoria, British Columbia 12 Feb 1902.

'COULL, George born 1831 Rathven, son of John C.; ordained 1857; appointed missionary to the Jews at Smyrna; resigned through ill-health 1870; appointed by Colonial Committee; admitted to St Andrew's Church, New Glasgow, Nova Scotia 11 Dec 1873-78; sometime minister at Valleyfield; appointed Professor of Hebrew and Church History, Morrin College, Quebec 1881; died Jan 1882. His death was greatly deplored. p. 614

DONALD, Andrew born 1813, 2nd son of Andrew D., farmer, Lanarkshire; minister Shelburne, Nova Scotia 1842; retired 1886; died 1891. p. 614 DUFF, James, appointed by Colonial Committee; admitted to Wallace, Nova

Scotia 1856; returned in ill-health to Scotland 1857. p. 614

DUNN, Charles (cf. Vol. VII, 128), ordained to Albion Mines (now Stellarton) and Westville, Nova Scotia 21 Dec 1870; declined to join the Union of 1875; returned to Scotland. p. 614. Page 128: born Wester Leochel 30 Jun 1843, son of Alexander D. and Barbara RITCHIE; died at Aberdeen 10 Jan 1925. Married (1) 2 Jan 1871 Mary, daughter of Samuel STEWART, and had issue: Alexandrina Barbara born 10 Sep 1871, died 10 Jun 1881; Mary Stewart born 20 Jan 1874, married 26 Jul 1900 Donald Robert MORRISON, bookseller, Lerwick; Samuel born 1882; Peter Alexander born 24 Nov 1884, minister of Greenside, Edinburgh; James John born 3 Jan 1887, corporal 106 Nova Scotia Rifles. Married (2) 19 Sep 1922 Tina Ann DUNCAN.

FITZPATRICK, James, B.A., minister at Salt Springs, Nova Scotia 1886; retired 1921. p. 614

FOWLIE, John, formerly in Australia (q.v.); minister at Gairloch, Nova Scotia 1888-98. p. 614. Page 588: born 1855 New Deer; arrived in New South Wales 18 Aug 1882; returned to Scotland 1885. Married 6 Jun 1882 Agnes Mary Catherine, daughter of Robert Thomas Charles SCOTT of Melby, Shetland, and Agnes Catherine WATSON, and has issue.

FRASER, Donald Allan, minister at M'Lennan's Mountain, Nova Scotia 1816-37; minister at Lunenburgh 1837-42; afterwards minister of St John's, Newfoundland (q.v.). p. 614. Page 659: born Torosay, Mull 24 Nov 1793, son of Alexander F., minister of Torosay; arrived at Halifax, Nova Scotia 16 Sep 1817; admitted to St Andrew's Church, St John's, 1842; died 7 Feb 1845. Married 3 Oct 1814 Catherine Isabella (died 8 Mar 1877), daughter of Allan M'LEAN of Crosspool, Coll, and had issue: Alexander born 20 Jul 1819, died at Geelong, Australia 9 Oct 1864; Hector

M'Lean born 17 Jun 1821, died 1904; Allan born 7 Jan 1823, died 1859 Australia; Isabella M'Lean born 25 Nov 1824, married Thomas M'CONNON, died 12 Mar 1862; James Oliphant born 2 Oct 1826, died 14 Feb 1904; James Nutting born 19 Jul 1828, died at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island 16 Oct 1871; Charles Leonard born 30 Mar 1830, died at East Boston 4 Nov 1872; John M'Lean born 4 Nov 1831, died 1908; William born 6 Aug 1833, died 22 Apr 1889; Archibald born 22 May 1835, died 10 Jul 1869; Henry M'Lean born 27 Apr 1837, died at Pittsburg 5 Jul 1896.

GOODWILL, John, minister at Scotsburn and Hardwood Hill, Nova Scotia 1864-68; afterwards of Orwell, Prince Edward Island (q.v.). p. 614. Page 619-20: born Ashdale, Antigonish County, Nova Scotia 11 Dec 1831, son of Thomas G., retired naval officer, and Elizabeth GRAHAM (a native of Paisley); educated at St Francis Xavier College, Antigonish, and Queen's University, Ontario; ordained to Scotsburn and Hardwood Hill 1864; resigned and studied medicine at Jefferson College, Philadelphia, U.S.A.; became a missionary at Aneitium, New Hebrides, 1870-74, when he was obliged to return to Nova Scotia from ill-health; admitted to the charges in Prince Edward Island formerly held by Donald MAC DONALD, where he laboured with great zeal and success til 1895, when his extensive field was divided into 3 parishes; continued to minister to the parishes known as Coleman, Cape Traverse, and DeSable until 1903 when he retired; died 22 Jan 1905. Married 7 Sep 1869 Euphemia COOPER and had issue: Thomas, minister in Coburg, Ontario; Dr. Victor L., Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island; and others died young.

GRANT, Charles Martin M.A., B.D. (cf. Vol. V, 339); ordained 8 Aug and admitted to St Andrew's, Halifax Oct 1866; resigned 1868 and was sometime a missionary in India; minister of St Mark's, Dundee 1877. p. 615

GRANT, George Monro, M.A., minister at St Matthew's, Halifax, Nova Scotia 1863-77; afterwards Principal of Queen's College, Kingston. p. 615. Page 620: admitted to Georgetown, Prince Edward Island 28 Jun 1861. Page 636: born Albion Mines, Pictou, Nova Scotia 22 Dec 1835, son of James G., schoolmaster from Banffshire, and Mary, daughter of George Ross MONRO, Inverness, and brother of Charles Martin G., D.D., minister of St Mark's, Dundee; accidentally lost his right hand at the age of 7; educated at Pictou Academy, West River Seminary, and Univ. of Glasgow; ordained 28 Nov 1860; 3 months at River John, Nova Scotia, where he organised the first Scots congregation; admitted at Georgetown and St Peter's Road, Prince Edward Island 28 Jan 1861; minister St Matthew's, Halifax 1863-77; appointed Principal and Primarius Professor of Divinity, Queen's Univ., Kingston, Ontario 1877; (many accomplishments); President of the Royal Society of Canada 1891; died at Kingston 10 May 1902 and was buried in Cataragui "One of the most outstanding figures in Canadian ecclesiastical and educational life." Married 7 May 1867 Jessie, eldest daughter of William LAWSON, Halifax, Nova Scotia, and had issue: William Lawson, LL.D., Professor of History, Queen's Univ., Kingston; and others deceased.

GRAY, Archibald, D.D. (cf. Vol. VII, 300), admitted to Unst 7 Aug 1794 but demitted 18 Dec 1795, his presentation having been found incompetent; called to St Matthew's, Halifax, Nova Scotia 3 Oct 1796; died 16 Sep 1826. p. 615. Page 300: born Forres 1764; (details of being demitted—ship was late); died after a long illness (paralysis). Married 14 Dec 1802 Ann, daughter of Dr Michael HEAD, physician, and had issue: Archibald, who took orders in the Episcopal Church; 4 other sons and 2 daughters.

HENRY, David, M.A., appointed missionary in Nova Scotia and ordained by Presbytery of Aberdeen 1 May 1833; presented to Marnoch in 1837 (cf. Vol. VI, 324). p. 615. Vol. VI, 324: born Fordoun 1806, son of John H., farmer, Corsbald, Fordoun; appointed by the Glasgow Colonial Society to labour as a missionary in the southern and western districts of Nova Scotia; returned to Scotland 1834 on account of failing health; assistant at Marnoch 1835-37; died 7 Oct 1870. Married Miss CORBET, Beildside (died May 1869), and had 1 daughter.

HERDMAN, Andrew Walker, M.A. (cf. Vol. IV, 172), went to Nova Scotia 1849; several years employed in supplying vacant congregations; admitted to St Andrew's Church, Pictou 1853; declined to join the Union of 1875; returned to Scotland and admitted to his native parish of Rattray 28 Jul 1879. His son James Chalmers H., D.D., minister at Calgary (q.v.), died 2 Jun 1910. p. 615

IRVING, Thomas, native of Nova Scotia, minister at Gairloch, Nova Scotia

1898-1906; died at Shubenacadie, Nova Scotia. p. 615

JARDINE, Thomas (cf. Vol. II, 330), minister at Halifax, Nova Scotia 1856-62 (colleague with John SCOTT); returned to Scotland and applied to Arnsheen 15 Jul 1863. p. 615

KERR, Colin Mackay, M.A., B.D., B.Sc., Ph.D., formerly minister of Kettins and St George's-in-the-Fields, Glasgow (cf. Vol. V, 265); minister of St Matthew's, Halifax, Nova Scotia 1926. p. 615

KING, Andrew, M.A., D.D., formerly minister of St Stephen's, Glasgow (cf. Vol. III, 466); Professor of Theology, Halifax, Nova Scotia; died 24 Feb 1874. p. 615

KNOX, Robert, M.A. (cf. Vol. VI, 292), ordained assistant at St Matthew's, Halifax, Nova Scotia 6 Jul 1820; returned to Scotland and admitted to Ordiquhill 26 Sep 1823. p. 615

LANG, Gavin (cf. Vol. III, 255), ordained to Shelburne, Nova Scotia 5 May 1829; returned to Scotland and admitted to Glasford 23 Aug 1832. p. 615

MACCOLL, James (cf. Vol. IV, 74), formerly minister of Coll; transferred from DeSable, Prince Edward Island and admitted to Earltown, Nova Scotia 14 Nov 1872; declined to join the Union of 1875; returned to Scotland and admitted to Cumlodden 8 Jul 1879. p. 615

M'CONNACHIE, Donald (cf. Vol. VI, 483), sometime minister at Rogers Hill and Cape John, Nova Scotia; returned to Scotland and admitted to Third Charge, Inverness 19 Sep 1844. p. 615. Vol. VI, 483: born Campbeltown 1801, 3rd son of Malcolm M., turner, and Margaret NICOLSON; died 7 May 1864. Married 1833 Anne M'LAUCHLAN, who died 15 Mar 1873, and had issue: Flora Margaret born 10 Mar 1834; Alexander Edward Murray born 31 May 1835, minister of Croick; Malcolm Samuel born 6 Aug 1837; Mary Jane born 3 Oct 1838; Charlotte Lacon born 19 Aug 1841; Robert Williamson born 10 Jan 1843; Ewan born 10 Mar 1844; Susan Nicolson born 31 Aug 1848; Henrietta Grant born 15 Dec 1849; Carolina Grant born 5 Mar 1851; Joanna Charlotte Ogilvy Grant born 11 Oct 1852: Donalda born 8 Mar 1859.

M'CUNN, Robert born 1837, 2nd son of James M., merchant, Greenock; admitted to St George's Church, River John, Nova Scotia Sep 1863; declined to join the Union of 1875; died 28 Feb 1895. p. 615

M'GILLIVRAY, Alexander born 1867 Croy, Inverness-shire, son of Alexander M.; minister Barney's River 1833-38; admitted to M'Lennan's Mountain, Nova Scotia Jan 1838; D.D. at Queen's College, Kingston 1858; died 16 Feb 1862. He was the only minister in the eastern part of Nova Scotia who remained in connection with the Church of Scotland in 1844. p. 615

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### REFERENCE SHELF

The Bristol Registers of Servants Sent to Foreign Plantations 1654-1686, Peter Wilson Coldham. (Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1988). Hard cover, 6" x 9", 491 pp., \$30.00 plus \$2.50 postage and handling. Order from Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1001 North Calvert Street, Baltimore, MD 21202. The port of Bristol (England) enjoyed a monopoly of the trade with Virginia and the West Indies during the years covered by this volume. There was so much fraud in the indentured servants trade that the Bristol City Council passed an ordinance requiring a register of servants destined for the colonies. These registers lay in storage for over 200 years until they were discovered in 1925. A few years later R. Hargreaves-Mawdsley published Bristol and America, a severely summarized, and not totally accurate, transcription. Peter Wilson Coldham, who has long been known for his excellent work in the field of English emigration records, compiled a transcript of the complete registers. Typical of the entries are those a friend found when she picked up my copy of the book and said she knew her ancestor had indentured servants in Virginia. (Page 317) "Ursula Thomas to Thomas Nelson, 4 years, Virginia 17 September 1675, and Phillip Watts to Thomas Nelson, 5 years, Virginia 18 September 1675"; (page 330) "Elizabeth Sampson to Thomas Nelson, 5 years, Virginia by George, 7 November 1676, Isaac Bishopp to Thomas Nelson, 4 years, Virginia by George and Thomas Richards to same, 5 years, Virginia by George 24 November 1676"; (page 331) "William Davis to Thomas Nelson, 4 years, Virginia by Charles, 21 December 1676." This is a reference source that belongs in all genealogical libraries.

American Passenger Arrival Records: A Guide to the Records of Immigrants Arriving at American Ports by Sail and Steam, Michael Tepper. (Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1988). Hard cover, 6 1/2" x 9 1/2", 134 pp., \$18.95 plus \$2.50 (only \$1.00 per additional book with the same order). Order from GPC as above. This is an excellent and much needed guide to locating passenger arrival lists. The citations to related articles and books are very valuable, but I wonder why he omitted reference to Henry Z Jones' excellent compilation, The Palatine Families of New York. A Study of the German Immigrants Who Arrived in New York in 1710 (Universal City, CA: Henry Z Jones, 1985, 2 vols.). On pp. 85-86 re: the National Archives and Field Branches, there is no reference to The Archives: A Guide to the National Archives Field Branches, Loretto Dennis Szucs & Sandra Hargreaves Luebking (Salt Lake City: Ancestry Publishing, 1988) although this book may not have been known to the author at the time of writing. He does, however, cite many GPC 1988 titles. On page 100 he mentions the 1847 scourge at Grosse Ile, but did not cite Grosse Ile Gateway to Canada 1832-1937, Marianna O'Gallagher, S.C.H. (Québec: Carraig Books, 1984) which contains a list of orphans in the Catholic Orphanage of Quebec in 1847 and a list of persons who died in the Grosse-Isle Hospital. There is a very good description of the Canadian Border Entries or so-called "St. Albans lists," a source that is often misunderstood. Each chapter deals completely and thoroughly with its subject and records, both published and un-published, indexed and un-indexed. There are chapters on the Colonial Period, Federal passenger arrival records, and Customs Passenger Lists and Immigration Passenger Lists (both chapters also deal with specific ports). Appendix A is an explanation of the Hamburg Emigration Lists and Appendix B is "Checklist of Passenger List Publications." In the often confusing field of passenger lists, this book untangles much of the confusion and leads the researcher down the proper path. It is a must-have item for every reference library.

German Immigrants: Lists of Passengers Bound from Bremen to New York, 1863-1867 With Places of Origin, Gary J. Zimmerman & Marion Wolfert, compilers. (Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1988). Hard cover, 6" x 9", 221 pp., \$21.50 plus postage and handling as above. This is the third volume in a series. Vol. 1 covered 1847-1854 and Vol. 2 covered 1855-1862. The Bremen embarkation lists have not survived through the years; indeed, they were routinely destroyed after a specified number of years passed. Zimmerman and Wolfert are filling this research gap by extracting names from the passenger arrival lists at the port of New York. There is an introduction which explains how to read the entries, and also points special attention to possible errors. However, the sample entry (the same one used in Vols. 1 & 2) is incompletely For example: "BEIERLEIB, Johann 60 Lustberg 61-1640" is described as. "This entry states that the 60-year-old Johann Beierleib arrived in New York in 1861 (61=1861) and appears on list 1640 for that year. The table of references under 61-1640 give Norma 10 Nov 1861 107. This indicates that Johann Beierleib was on the ship Norma which arrived in New York on November 10, 1861. The original list can be found on microfilm roll (NARA) 107. They fail to mention that Lustberg is the stated place of origin. This is a minor defect that most people can figure out for themselves, but it should be corrected in future volumes of this valuable series.

Pitfalls in Genealogical Research, Milton Rubincam, FASG. (Salt Lake City: Ancestry Publishing, 1987). Soft cover, 5 1/2" x 8 1/2", 74 pp., \$5.95 from Ancestry, Box 476, Salt Lake City, UT 84110. Although not submitted for review (translated, that means I had to buy my own copy), this book is worth mentioning for the education of readers. Pitfalls is authored by one of the most eminent genealogists of all time, and should be mandatory reading for every family historian, whether beginner or experienced, amateur or professional. If everyone would read, and practice what they read, the material in this book and the one mentioned below, we would no longer see the undocumented, unsubstantiated genealogies, full of romantic tales, that are being churned out by the hundreds. We all should publish the results of our research in one form or another, but we should also let the readers know where we got the information so that future researchers can easily prove or dis-prove our statements and conclusions. French-Canadian genealogies especially seem to fail to document or cite sources.

The companion book that I mentioned is <u>Genealogy as Pastime and Profession</u>, Donald Lines Jacobus. (Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1968), soft cover, 5 1/2" x 8 1/2", 120 pp., \$7.95 from GPC, address given in the review of <u>Bristol Registers</u>. Both authors stress the need to consult original documents or microfilms of the originals. Please find a copy of these books and read them!



Don't wait for the review - order your copy now.

The St. Paul Conference program can be found on pages 209-212. We believe there is a well-balanced variety of lectures. There is something for researchers at all levels of experience and expertise, as well as diverse ethnic and regional backgrounds. The biggest difficulty you will have when studying the program is in choosing which session to attend each hour. Something new for this conference is the Saturday track for educators who are not genealogists, although the lectures will interest genealogists as well. Continuing education credits may be available. Genealogists with ancestors from the Atlantic Provinces will be delighted to read that Terrence Punch will lecture on that topic, as well as make a presentation to the educators. He will also be the speaker for the International Society for British Genealogy and Family History luncheon. Patricia Kennedy, pre-confederation archivist at the National Archives of Canada will speak about Loyalists and also about the National Archives of Canada. Bruce Elliott, author of Irish Migrants in the Canadas: A New Approach (review to appear in the next issue) will speak about Irish research and about land records in Ontario. John Magerus (see his review of the sections on Luxembourg and France in The Library on page 204) will talk about in-depth Quebec research. James L. Hansen will give us new insights and sources for researching a fur-trader. Can you tell I'm excited about this? Make your plans to attend the NGS Conference '89 in St. Paul, Minnesota May 17-20, 1989.

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## Ministers of the Church of Scotland in Canada Part 2

Extracts of ministers who served in Canada taken from Fasti Ecclesiae Scoticanae: The Succession of Ministers in the Church of Scotland from the Reformation, Hew Scott, D.D. Vol. VII, Synods of Ross, Sutherland and Caithness, Glenelg, Orkney and of Shetland, The Church in England, Ireland, and Overseas. (Edinburgh: Tweeddale Court, 1928).

"Continent of America: Dominion of Canada (Ministers of the Church of Scotland from 1765 to the Union of the Churches in 1875, with some of later date)", pp. 606-660. The following are abstracts of genealogical information contained in the biographical sketches in this work of ministers who served in Canada (there is more information about their education and appointments in other countries). References are made to further information published in earlier volumes, where there often is much more biographical detail. I have a copy of Vol. VI, and have extracted from that book as well as from Vol. VII. Page numbers at the end of the entry refer to the page in Vol. VII.

#### Prince Edward Island

This Presbytery consists of three congregations on Prince Edward Island and one in Massachusetts, U.S.A. the congregations on Prince Edward Island were the large mission field of Donald MacDonald. They formed part of the Presbytery of Egerton, Nova Scotia, and later, of the Presbytery of Pictou. When the congregations upon the mainland joined the Presbyterian Church of Canada, those on the Island, remaining in the Presbytery of Pictou, changed its name to the "Presbytery of Prince Edward Island in connection with the Church of Scotland." The congregation of Cambridge, Mass., composed chiefly of emigrants from Prince Edward Island, was admitted to the bounds in 1908. In 1920 the Presbytery was incorporated by Act of Parliament.

CAMPBELL, Donald MacDonald born Uig, Queen's Co, Prince Edward Island 22 Nov 1864 son of Malcolm and Janet MURCHISON; ordained first minister of Birchhill, Kinross, and Murray River, Prince Edward Island 1898; demitted 13 Jul 1904 when he went to the western provinces under the Presbyterian Church of Canada. p. 619

CAMPBELL, William James son of Donald of Summerside, Prince Edward Island; educated in USA; licenses by Presbytery of Pictou 14 Sep 1905; ordained to Birchhill, Kinross, and Murray River 26 Sep following; demitted 18 Sep 1906; became minister of the Church of Scotland at Cambridge, Mass. (afterwards minister in the service of the Congregational Church). p. 619

CULLEN, William born 1839, third son of John, merchant of Lanarkshire; educated at Univ. of Glasgow; ordained for service in Prince Edward Island 20 Apr 1863; admitted to St Peter's Road Church, Georgetown, 2 Sep following; retired in three months from ill-health and went to Australia (q.v.). p. 619. Vol. VII, p. 587; admitted to Bright and Buckland, Victoria 1865; resigned 1866.

DUNCAN, Thomas (cf. Vol. III, 132) appointed by Colonial Committee; ordained to St James' Church, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island 23 Oct 1856; transferred to St. Andrew's, Halifax, Nova Scotia 1 Nov 1876; returned to Scotland and became minister of Bridge of Weir. p. 619.

GILLIES, John minister of St Peter's Road Church, Georgetown, Prince Edward Island 1874-5 (afterwards at Eldon, Ontario (q.v.). p. 619. returned to Scotland and admitted to Knock 28 Sep 1875; transferred to Appin 21 Aug 1877 (cf. Vol. IV, 80); resigned 3 Oct 1883 and became minister at Eldon. p. 635

HARPER, George appointed by Colonial Committee and officiated at Georgetown, Prince Edward Island 1855; went to St. Clement's, British Guiana 1857 (q.v.). p. 620. appointed 1857, resigned 1861. p. 676

HUTCHISON, John minister at Montreal, East End 1877; at Perth, Ontario 1881-5; at DeSable, Prince Edward Island 1885-91. p. 620.

M'DONALD, Donald born Drumcastle, Rannoch, Perthshire 1 Jan 1783, son of Donald (originally MACKAY who changed his name to M'DONALD or MAC DONELL after settling on the estate of Glengarry, following the Battle of Culloden in which he fought for Prince Charles) and Christian STEWART; ordained 2 Aug 1816; missionary at Glengarry 1816-24; emigrated to Canada after 24 Jun 1824; was for two years missionary in Cape Breton (see lengthy story about his hardships there); 1826 went to Prince Edward Island and labored there for more than forty years; died unmarried 21 Feb 1867 and was buried in the graveyard at Orwell Head. pp. 620-621

MACDOUGALL, Ewen born 21 Feb 1873 Nine Mile Creek, Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, son of George and Emma Jane GORVETT; licensed by Presbytery of Prince Edward Island 21 May 1908; ordained to Birchhill, Kinross, and Murray River, Prince Edward Island; married 1917 Edna Augusta, daughter of Edward Augustus LUCAS and Isabella MAC DONALD; has issue: Doris Isabell born 7 May 1918 and Esther Lucas born 28 Oct 1920. p. 621

MACDOUGALL, James born 8 Mar 1866 Nine Mile Creek, Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, son of George and Emma Jane GORVETT; ordained by Presbytery of Egerton 22 Sep 1903; admitted to Cape Traverse, DeSable, and Canoe Cove that year; died 25 Mar 1922; married 1905 Margaret (died 1915), daughter of John COMPTON, Bangor, Prince Edward Island, and Annabella MAC QUARRIE; had issue: George Artemas born 1906, Emma May born 1908, James Lorn born 1910, Ada Margaret born 1912. p. 621

M'INTOSH, James (cf. Vol. V, 84) born Ross-shire; educated at King's College Aberdeen; M.A. 1818; appointed by Glasgow Colonial Committee and ordained first minister of St James' Church, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island (congregation organised 1825) 10 Aug 1830; resigned in 1836; returned to Scotland and admitted to Burntisland 2 May 1844. p. 621

M'INTYRE, Angus or Aeneas (cf. Vol. IV, 115) appointed by Colonial Committee; minister of St James' Church, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island 1840-5; returned to Scotland and admitted to Kinlochspelvie 16 Jan 1845. p. 621

MACKENZIE, Malcolm born 1835 Brodick, Arran, son of William; went to Canada in 1862 and was minister at Lochiel, Ontario, Cote St George, Quebec, and Earltown Nova Scotia; afterwards at Rat Portage (now Kenora), Manitoba; admitted to Morden and Mountain City 6 May 1885; minister at Tyne Valley, Prince Edward Island 1892-6; died 1896. p. 621

M'LAREN, William licentiate of Church of Scotland; minister of St Peter's and Brackley Road Churches, Georgetown, Prince Edward Island Dec 1857-1861, p. 621

MACLEAN, Daniel born 21 Sep 1848 Mount Herbert, Lot 48, Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, son of Donald and Sarah CURRIE; educated at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown; ordained minister of the Church of Scotland 11 Oct 1894; admitted to the newly-erected charge of Lot 48 and Churchill 1910; died at Charlottetown 13 Oct 1919; married (1) 19 Mar 1879 Emma, daughter of John BOVYER, Bunbury, Prince Edward Island and had issue: Archibald born 1882, now at Raymore, Saskatchewan; Henry born 1884, now in Victoria, British Columbia; Minnie born 1886, married James MAC FADYEN, Bonshaw, Prince Edward Island; married (2) 6 Jun 1900 Mary Jane, daughter of Neil MAC FADYEN, Augustine Cove, Prince Edward Island and has issue: Neil born 1901, now in Charlottetown; Ruth born 1903, now in Toronto; Muriel born 1905; Jean born 1908. pp. 621-622

Vol. IV, 93; VII, 7) born about 1800 Ross-shire; minister of St. John's Church, Belfast, Prince Edward Island 1823-49; returned to Scotland and admitted to Gaelic Church, Cromarty (afterwards at Kilchrenan and Dalavich); a daughter married John JENKINS, D.D., minister of St Paul's, Montreal, and Eliza married Daniel Miner GORDON, D.D., LL.D., Principal of Queen's University, Kingston, Canada. p. 622. Born 1799 Ross-shire. p. 7

MACNAIR, Robert (cf. Vol. III, 196) minister of St James' Church, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island 1851-2; returned to Scotland and admitted to Gourock 1854. p. 622

M'WILLIAM, Alexander (cf. Vol. VI, 273) minister at Georgetown, Prince Edward Island 29 Jul 1863; demitted 24 May 1871; returned to Scotland and admitted to Ythan Wells 14 Sep following. p. 622. Born 1827 son of Alexander, farmer of Mortlach; died at Huntly 8 Mar 1889; married 13 Oct 1864 Barbara ANDERSON (died 4 Sep 1910), had issue: Elizabeth born 9 Nov 1865, married Alexander WILSON, minister of Ythan Wells. Vol. VI, pp. 273-274

MELVILLE, Peter (cf. Vol. VII, 228) admitted to Georgetown and Cardigan, Prince Edward Island 4 Oct 1871; organised a congregation at Montague Bridge; resigned 17 Nov 1875; readmitted to New Kincardine, New Brunswick 1876-9; at Stanley and Nashwaak 1879-81; Hopewell, Nova Scotia 1881-91; returned to Scotland and was settled at Rendall, Orkney. p. 622. Born 1839 son of Charles, farmer and landed proprietor, and Anne FALCONER; educated at Univ. of Glasgow; ordained 1870 at Rothesay; went to Canada and was assistant minister at Frederickton, New Brunswick 1870-1; admitted 1 Jul 1892 Rendall; demitted 5 Oct 1909; died at Leith 5 Mar 1912; married (1) 12 Nov 1878 Jessie MELVINA, Frederickton, New Brunswick, and had issue: Charles Young born 27 Mar 1880, died 13 Feb 1881; married (2) 15 Dec 1911 Jane A. MUIR, William Bruce (cf. Vol. VI, 33) formerly minister of Trinity Parish, Aberdeen and at Sherbrooke, Nova Scotia; admitted to St James' Church, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island 30 Oct 1925. p. 622. Born 21 Mar 1866 Ninewells, Chirnside, Berwickshire, son of Thomas M., schoolmaster, Mordington, and Mary Ann BRUCE; ordained missionary at Robertson Memorial, Grassmarket, Edinburgh 14 Dec 1904; admitted to Trinity 19 Apr 1907; resigned 25 Oct 1909; went to Canada; married 24 Dec 1909 Elsie, eldest daughter of William BARRAT, Aberdeen. Vol. VI. 33

ROSS, Hugh born 1797 Inverness-shire; emigrated with his parents to Nova Scotia 1813; ordained for missionary work in Cape Breton; admitted to Tatamagouche and New Annan, Nova Scotia 1827; resigned 1840; joined the Church of Scotland; minister at Georgetown, Prince Edward Island 1842-4; joined the Free Church in 1844; died 1 Dec 1858. p. 622

ROULSTON, Alexander a minister of the Reformed Presbyterian Church; admitted to Murray Harbour, Prince Edward Island 5 Feb 1885; admitted to Salt Springs, Nova Scotia 30 Jun 1891.

SNODGRASS, William (cf. Vol. II, 230) minister of St James' Church, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island 1852-6; transferred to St Paul's, Montreal 4 Nov 1856; admitted to Canonbie 23 Nov 1877. p. 622. Resigned Oct 1864 on appointment as Principal of Queen's University and Primarius Professor of Divinity; returned to Scotland and admitted to Canonbie 23 Nov 1877. p. 651

STEWART, George William minister at St Peter's Road Church, Georgetown, Prince Edward Island 1864 to 1871. p. 622

#### Manitoba

In 1810 Thomas DOUGLAS, fifth Earl of Selkirk, secured from the Hudson's Bay Company an immense tract of land, nearly the size of Great Britain, including the valleys of the Red River and the Assiniboine. He undertook to establish a Colony and assumed all the costs. His company of settlers, consisting of seventy Highlanders mostly from Kildonan, Sutherland, reached the Red River in 1812. For nearly forty years the people had no minister. Services were conducted by an elder, James SUTHERLAND, who was given authority to solemnize marriages and dispense the sacraments. When he was forcibly removed by the North-West Company the people had no alternative but to accept the ministrations of the Church of England. In 1851, John BLACK, born 8 Jan 1818 Garwaldshiels, Eskdalemuir, son of William, farmer, and Margaret HALLIDAY; educated in USA and Canada; ordained 31 Jul 1851; died 11 Feb 1882; proceeded to Manitoba and was thus the first Presbyterian minister in any part of the great North-West Territories. A church was soon erected - the replica of that at Kildonan - with a graveyard, spoken of as the "Westminster of Western Canada," where are buried many of the missionary pioneers - Dr. BLACK himself; James NISBET, first Presbyterian missionary to the Red Indians and founder of the city of Prince Albert; James ROBERTSON; Principal John Mark KING, and others. In 1870 the Presbytery of Manitoba was organised. It became a Synod in 1884. In 1871 a log building was opened as a college at Kildonan by George BRYCE. In 1874 a building was erected on Ellice Avenue, Winnipeg, and was much enlarged in 1892.

BORTHWICK, Hugh John born about 1825, son of John, schoolmaster; educated at Univ. of Edinburgh and Queen's College, Kingston; ordained Aug 1853; minister of Chelsea, Quebec Feb 1862-4; many years missionary in Southern Manitoba, residing at Calf Mountain; admitted to Mountain City, Manitoba Nov 1881; married Apr 1848 Maria, daughter of John TAYLOR, Edinburgh. p. 656

BRYCE, George born 22 Apr 1844 Mount Pleasant, Ontario, son of George and Katherine Margaret HENDERSON, native of Perthshire and early settlers in Brant County, Ontario; assistant at Quebec 1871; ordained for service in Manitoba Sep that year; (see lengthy description of his work); married 17 Sep 1871 Marion, daughter of James SAMUEL, Broom House, Kirkliston, Scotland; resident at Ottawa 1928. p. 656

BUCHANAN, James missionary at Rawyards, Airdrie; sent by Colonial Committee for missionary service in Canada 1888; studied theology at Manitoba College; ordained by Presbytery of Calgary 1 Jun 1891; appointed to the district between Calgary and Edmonton; minister at Innisfail, Alberta; afterwards at Richmond, British Columbia and North Pelham, Dundalk and Elmvale, Ontario; clerk of Presbytery of Orangeville; moderator of Synod of Toronto and Kingston 1915; married Catherine POLLOCK, Paisley, Scotland. p. 656

FERRIES, John formerly minister of Edinkillie (cf. Vol. VI, 420); minister at Brandon, Manitoba; died 13 Jun 1903. p. 656. Born 23 Oct 1836 son of Peter, minister at Edinkillie, and Mary Ann Grace, daughter of James SMITH, minister of Avoch; minister of the Presbyterian congregation at Brandon, Manitoba, Canada; died at Presbyterian parsonage, Midland, Michigan, USA 13 Jun 1903; married 24 Jul 1866 Anna, daughter of Walter BROADFOOT, Kingarth, and had issue: Mary Anne Jemima born 22 Apr 1867, married James S.B. MUNRO, Liverpool, died 26 Jun 1917; Walter Broadfoot born 23 May 1868; John born 15 Jun 1869; Jessie Dickie born 7 Dec 1871; James Arthur Fleming born 20 Sep 1875. Vol. VI, 420

HART, Thomas born 6 Sep 1835 Paisley, Scotland, son of John and Jean Mason SEMPLE; emigrated with his parents to Perth, Canada 1842; appointed by Colonial Committee and ordained for service in Manitoba 30 Jul 1872; died 17 Aug 1912; married 16 Aug 1872 Isabella Margaret, daughter of Judge John Glass MALLOCH, and Isabella Margaret BELL, and had issue: Ethel Hamilton born 12 Aug 1874, died 20 Apr 1903; Beatrice Isabel born 29 Apr 1877, died 1 Sep 1888; Lieut.-Col. William Malloch born 27 Apr 1881, died 17 Apr 1923. p. 657

KING, Robert Alexander admitted from Presbytery of Winnipeg by General Assembly as licentiate of Church of Scotland 1900; afterwards Principal of Christian College and School, Indore, Central India, in connection with Presbyterian Church of Canada. p. 657

MILLAR/MILLARD, David Bruce formerly minister of St James', Kirkcaldy (cf. Vol. V, 168); minister at Pense, Regina 1923. p. 657

PRYDE, James Johnstone (cf. Vol. II, 324) ordained for service in Canada 12 May 1901; minister at Hamiota and Deloraine, Manitoba 1901-8; returned to Scotland and admitted to Penpont 9 Dec 1909; served as chaplain in France and Flanders 5 Nov 1914 to Nov 1918; his first wife died 9 Nov 1920 without issue; married (2) 4 Jul 1922 Janet Baillie, daughter of Alexander DICKSON and Christina Ann JOHNSTON, and has issue: Robert Johnstone born 20 May 1923; James Christian born 12 Jun 1926. p. 657

SMITH, William Stables (cf. Vol. VII, 311) ordained for missionary service in Manitoba 1891; returned to Scotland 1897; afterwards at Lunna Chapel, Shetland 1900. p. 657. Born 26 Mar 1852 Redcliff, Whittingehame, Scotland, son of Charles, factor, and Christian CANT; served for one year in Vancouver Island and for four years in all Provinces of Canada; returned to Scotland and was missionary at Aithsting 1897; retired 1922. p. 311

#### British Columbia

'Vancouver Island and British Columbia were separate Provinces until 1866. In January 1861, John HALL, the first Presbyterian minister in that part of British North America, commissioned by the Colonial Committee of the Irish Presbyterian Church, arrived at Victoria, where he organised the First Presbyterian Church, still so called. He left for New Zealand in 1865. A church was erected in 1863, crowned with the Scottish thistle. It was destroyed by fire in 1883, and immediately replaced by the existing edifice. The second missionary was Robert JAMIESON, appointed by the Church in Canada in 1862. Daniel DUFF laboured from 1864 to 1867, when he returned to Ontario. In 1863 the Church of Scotland sent out its first missionary, James NIMMO. After him were Thomas SOMERVILLE and William CLYDE.

ANDERSON, Andrew H. minister of St Andrew's Church, Nanaimo, British Columbia 1882; afterwards in British Guiana (q.v.). p. 657. Born Earnbank, Kinkell; appointed to St Saviour's, British Guiana 1887; married 23 Sep 1925 Elizabeth Kay Brown, only daughter of John LOCKIE, Pulachan, Belnachantery. During his incumbency the parish church, a large and substantial modern structure, caught fire at a communion service and was completely destroyed. No lives were lost, but his exertions in raising money for a new building erected within two years, shortened his life. p. 679

CLYDE, William born 1830 Glasgow; minister of St Andrew's Church, Nanaimo, British Columbia 1873; went to USA and held charges at First Presbyterian Church, Ashland, Oregon 1876-85; Anaconda, Montana 1885-96; Logan, Utah 1896-1902; Phoenix, Oregon 1902; died 1916; married Jemima MERCER born 1842, died 1922, had issue: a son who died aged 5. p. 658

DUNN, Alexander born 30 Mar 1843 Leochel-Cushnie, Aberdeenshire, son of Peter and Jean RITCHIE; appointed by Colonial Committee to British Columbia and ordained at their first meeting 1 Sep 1875; missionary at Langley, his work extending from the mouth of the Fraser River to Upper Sumas, a distance of 100 miles, and including eight preaching stations; resigned 1905; died 10 Apr 1925; married 24 Nov 1880 Annie, daughter of Levi KERN, Norfolk County, Ontario. p. 658

HERDMAN, James Chalmers born 19 Feb 1855 Pictou, Nova Scotia, son of Andrew Walker, minister there; educated at Dalhousie College and Univ. of Edinburgh; ordained to St Andrew's, Campbelltown, New Brunswick 1878; minister of Knox Church, Calgary 1 Jul 1885 to Jun 1902; died 2 Jun 1910; married Miss LOUDON, Chatham, New Brunswick. p. 658

JAMIESON, Robert born 1830 Ireland; ordained to Belturbet, Ireland 28 Jun 1854; resigned an appointment as missionary to Canada 8 Jan 1856; minister at Dunville, Ontario; removed to British Columbia 1861; minister of St Andrew's Church, New Westminster 1862-5; minister at Nanaimo 1865-9; returned to New Westminster 1869; retired from ill-health 1884 and became chaplain to the Penitentiary there; died 1893; married and left issue: two sons and five daughters. p. 658

M'ELMON, B.K. native of Nova Scotia; appointed by Colonial Committee as missionary at Comox, British Columbia 1877; went to Washington Territory, USA 1882. p. 658

MILLAR, James last minister of the Church of Scotland at Nanaimo, British Columbia 1887-9; went to USA. p. 658

NICHOLSON, Alexander B. ordained by Presbytery of British Columbia 1 Sep 1875 as missionary in the rural districts around Victoria, British Columbia; became Principal of the High School, Victoria, and afterwards returned to the Eastern Provinces. p. 659

NIMMO, James minister at Newcastle, New South Wales 1853-61; appointed by Colonial Committee first missionary of the Church of Scotland to British Columbia 1863-5; afterwards in British Guiana (q.v.). p. 659. Appointed by Colonial Committee as missionary at Cobourg in 1866; resigned 1 May 1867; afterwards in British Columbia and British Guiana. p. 648. Appointed to St Luke's, British Guiana 1868. p. 677

SOMERVILLE, Thomas (cf. Vol. III, 400) ordained to First Presbyterian Church, Victoria, British Columbia 24 Feb 1865; founded St Andrew's Church, Victoria 1867; returned to Scotland and admitted to St David's, Kirkintilloch 4 Apr 1871; afterward minister of Blackfriars, Glasgow; his widow died 28 Jan 1926; his son Munro, minister of Newhaven, was transferred to Ballantrae 5 Apr 1923. p. 659

STEPHEN, Robert assistant at Saline; ordained by Presbytery of Glasgow; minister of St Andrew's Church, Victoria, British Columbia 1881-5; returned to Scotland. p. 659

#### <u>Newfoundland</u>

St Andrew's congregation at St John's was founded in 1842. In 1848 a second congregation was formed by those who sympathised with the Free Church, and a church was built in 1852. In 1876 both churches were destroyed by fire, when their congregations reunited in a new building in 1878. That also fell prey to fire in 1892, but was replaced by the existing fine structures.

GRAHAM, William ordained to St Andrew's Church 1886; appointed to Kingston, Jamaica 1896 (q.v.). p. 659. Born 14 May 1859 Lochmaben, son of John and Mary WHITE; ordained to St John's, Newfoundland 1887; admitted to Kingston in 1896; died at Edinburgh 1 Jul 1922; during his ministry occurred the great earthquake of 1907 when the church at Kingston was considerably shattered; married 1 Jul 1891 Alison, daughter of Sir Robert THORBURN, Premier of Newfoundland, and Susannah MILROY, and had issue: Robert, banker, born 10 Oct 1893; Janetta Marie born 3 May 1895, married Jan 1921 Lieut. G.T.W. HORNE; William Allison (sic), planter, born 7 Nov 1897; Melville, accountant born 22 Oct 1899; Guy Morrison, planter, born 12 Nov 1900, died 11 Mar 1927; Ian Thorburn, solicitor, Jamaica, born 4 Mar 1904; Cyril Milroy, solicitor, Jamaica (twin) born 4 Mar 1904. p. 669

KING, Thomas born 1815, eldest son of Alexander, ordained by Presbytery of Dunfermline 31 Aug 1849; demitted 1850 and subsequent history untraced. p. 659
MACDOUGALL, Daniel (cf. Vols. IV, 339, VII, 113) formerly missionary at Buchlyvie; appointed by Colonial Committee and admitted to St Andrew's Church 1871; returned to Scotland 1874; admitted to Berriedale 28 Dec 1876. p. 660. Born 1831, son of Alexander, teacher, and Margaret MACDONALD; ordained 1864 for service in Canada; died 22 Apr 1909 Stirling; married Margaret Isabella (born 22 Jul 1846, died 21 Oct 1918 Stirling), daughter of Andrew MILROY and Susannah Sawers NIXON. p. 113

NICOL, Francis minister 1851-8; afterwards minister at London, Ontario (q.v.). p. 660. Born 1823 Ayrshire, second son of Adam, merchant; joined the Church of Scotland when a student of theology at Glasgow 1845-8; appointed by Colonial Committee as third minister for Halifax, Nova Scotia; minister of \$t Andrew's Church, St John's, Newfoundland 1851-8; minister at London, Ontario 1859; died 30 Oct 1873 Toronto. pp. 647-648

PATTERSON, James Dykes assistant at Dalmellington; appointed by Colonial Committee and admitted Dec 1874; demitted 1882 and went to New South Wales (q.v.). 660. Arrived in New South Wales 16 Apr 1882 and admitted to Cootamundra; died suddenly that year. p. 596

SINCLAIR, Archibald (cf. Vol. VII, 318) formerly minister of Walls, Shetland, officiated at St Andrew's Church 1847-8; returned to Scotland. p. 660. Born 30 Jan 1803 Edinburgh, son of Malcolm, cabinetmaker; joined the Free Church in 1843; went to Canada; died 20 Jan 1867 Edinburgh; married 21 May 1833 Jessie (died 4 Dec 1881), daughter of Arthur GIFFORD of Busta, and had issue: Jane Nicolson born 19 Sep 1838, died at Corstorphine 1921. p. 318

Mary Ann CLIFFORD, a witness at the trial; a servant to Abigail WHITE and the object of the fight between PANQUET & PIERCE.

Doctor James DOUGLASS, examined and carried out an autopsy, after the disinternment of PIERCE's body 7 July.

Peter GLASGOW, a witness at the trial.

Thomas HOLDSWORTH, a witness at the trial; a neighbour of Abigail WHITE. Charles LAFOND. a witness at the trial; of St-Ambroise.

Pierre LAVOYER, a witness at the trial; a neighbour who lived opposite Abigail WHITE.

Maria LEE, a witness at the trial.

Jean PAGEAU, a witness at the trial; a mason of St-Ambroise; worked in a mill at Valcartier last May.

Charles PANQUET, indicted for the murder of Joseph PIERCE at St-Rocks 1 July 1830. Accused of giving him several mortal blows and bruises of which PIERCE died 7:00 a.m. the morning of 5 July 1830. PANQUET was a young man who had worked for Mr. SULLIVAN of Valcartier, and who resided with Abigail WHITE at St-Rocks and Valcartier. He claimed not guilty due to self defense and was aquitted of the charges.

Joseph PIERCE, "The Captain of the Mountain", a short, square-built older man of eccentric and immoral habits, remarkable for the large shallow crowned hat that he wore. He resided at St-Rocks with Abigail White. He got into a fight with Charles PANQUET over the attentions of Mary Ann CLIFFORD. PIERCE attacked PANQUET, who in the ensuing struggle struck and pushed PIERCE over, causing him to fall and strike the corner of a stove.

Hon. F.W. PRIMROSE, the counsel for the prisoner, Charles PANQUET.

Charles SAVARD, a witness at the trial, owns a farm and lives at Valcartier; knew Joseph PIERCE for 32-33 years and Charles PANQUET for 4 years.

Ann STEVENS, a witness at the trial.

Mr. SULLIVAN, of Valcartier, employed Charles PANQUET.

Abigail WHITE, "The Maid of the Mountain", a tall, gaunt, fantastically dressed woman of eccentric and immoral habits. She was born in Oxford, England and had lived in America for 58 years, coming from Lake Magog 32-33 years ago. She had never lived in Boston, but had lived in Bury Township, Massachusetts. She appeared at the trial in deep mourning and in a very infirm state of health. She resided at St-Rocks with Charles PANQUET and Joseph PIERCE. She had known PIERCE for 32-33 years and they partly lived together off and on at Valcartier and or Quebec. She had lived at St-Rocks for 2 months and at Valcartier for 10 years. On the evening of 1 July, between 9:00 and 10:00 p.m. Abigail WHITE, Charles PANQUET, Joseph PIERCE and Mary Ann CLIFFORD were all intoxicated in the garret of Abigail's house where they usually slept, carrying on, partying and dancing.

The Library: A Guide to the LDS Family History Library, Johni Cerny and Wendy Elliott. (Salt Lake City: Ancestry Publishing, 1988). Hardbound, 8 1/2" x 11", 763 pp. + xi, \$32.95 plus \$4.00 postage and handling from Ancestry, Box 476, Salt Lake City, UT 84110. The library of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints holds the largest collection of genealogical sources in the world. This book first describes the layout of the library, the card catalogue (FHLC), unique collections such as the IGI and the Family Group Records Collection, the branch libraries (Family History Centers), and various services. The balance of this large volume is the guide to area research holdings. The United States is broken into regions - New England, Mid-Atlantic states, Old South, New South, Midwest, Northern Plains, Mountain States, Southwest, and the Pacific Northwest and Hawaii. Foreign locations are: Dominion of Canada, England and Wales, Ireland, Scotland, Scandinavia, Germany and Central Europe, Eastern Europe, Southern Europe, Western Europe, South America, Central America and Mexico, South Pacific, Caribbean Islands, and Africa. Each area begins with a general overview of its history, followed by information about archives and libraries, and kinds of records created. The final portion of each chapter is a dot-chart by county (or other designation) showing each type of record available at the FHL (Family History Library).

This is a guide that I, and many genealogical researchers, were eager to A trip to Salt Lake City is expensive and we want to make the best use of the time there. Thus, good preparation is essential, and knowledge of the vast holdings of the Family History Library is essential for good preparation. When I turned to the section about Canada, and specifically the section about Quebec, I was disappointed with the errors I saw. I consulted people who are expert researchers in various geographic areas, and are also familiar with the FHL holdings, to help me with this review. The result is a review broken into sections, with constructive criticism which can be used as a learning tool. there is a reprint edition of this work, I hope the authors will do a reedition, and send the sections to knowledgeable persons for critique and proofreading. This review only covers a few geographic areas. Haste is apparent, and one wonders if an all-too-early deadline was set in order to have the book published for a specific occasion. It is possible that by co-incidence these areas are the weak chapters and that the rest of the work is of excellent quality.

#### Wisconsin

in Chapter 9, "United States: The Midwest," Marlene M. Marino, pp. 230-235.

Compiling and producing a reference book, especially a genealogical one, is often a thankless task. Like any genealogical work it is time-consuming, often tedious, and relentlessly detailed. Careful attention must be paid to even the smallest detail because once published, such a work becomes immediately an authority on the family or area it covers. The more comprehensive the work, the more critical accuracy becomes. Certainly no work is perfect; there are simply too many possibilities for error. However, if the Wisconsin chapter in The Library is any indication, this most desirable and substantial work will have to be used with considerable caution. The Wisconsin section has too many errors, of both fact and emphasis, to be considered a trustworthy guide for the

researcher interested in doing Wisconsin-related research in the Family History Library or the Family History Centers.

Errors of fact and detail are most immediately noticeable. Statewide registration of vital records was not established in 1907. The law passed that year did establish the State Bureau of Vital Statistics but statewide registration had been the law (although often not observed) as early as 1852 and several subsequent laws strengthened the 1852 legislation. In the "Census records" section Wisconsin is described as having once been part of Iowa Present-day Iowa was from July 1836-July 1838 part of Wisconsin Territory; the reverse never occurred. Omitted is the fact that present-day Wisconsin was from 1800-1809 part of Indiana Territory, during which time the earliest U.S. officials having jurisdiction in the area were appointed. was no territorial census taken in 1830 while Wisconsin was part of Michigan Territory, although the U.S. census of that year did cover the settled area west of Lake Michigan. Also the list of territorial and state censuses omits territorial censuses taken in 1838 and 1846. That omission is particularly surprising because references to both are made in the bibliography immediately following.

It is not possible to be certain whether the omission of an item from mention or from a bibliography is caused by that item not being held by the Family History Library or because it was not considered worthy of inclusion. For example, under the heading "Genealogical Collections," <u>Wisconsin Families</u>, the pre-WW II publication of the Wisconsin Genealogical Society, is listed but its successor and current publication, the <u>Wisconsin State Genealogical Society</u> Newsletter, arguably the most significant genealogical periodical published for Wisconsin, is not listed.

Perhaps of more overall concern than particular errors is the sense that the descriptions and more particularly the bibliographies are not always comprehensive and that criteria for inclusion were not always uniformly applied. The paragraphs on "Settlement and Migration" provide an interesting collection of details on specific immigrant groups but do not provide any kind of overall sense of the general flow of the migration. The sources cited are of varying degrees of importance while the single source most useful for a general immigration summary, the first three volumes of the <u>History of Wisconsin</u> (State Historical Society of Wisconsin, 1973-1985), are not cited and therefore are presumably not held by the Family History Library. These volumes are an important resource not only for the overall view of immigration into the state but also as a background source for all aspects of Wisconsin history through the nineteenth century. They also provide substantial detailed bibliographies to additional resources.

One other tendency that can sometimes be misleading is the listing of items, apparently by filming date rather than date of original publication. An example in the "Biography" section, Notable Men of Wisconsin, was originally published in 1902, not the 1974 that is listed. Since this has considerable importance when the researcher is looking for possible resource material, it seems that the original publication date should be given. Whether this is the practice of the Family History Library or the compilers of The Library, it still holds true.

Lest the reader begin to suspect that there is nothing worthwhile to be found in <u>The Library</u>, certainly the descriptions of the materials held by the Family History Library and the listings of subject headings used for specific topics will be helpful as will the county by county list of records appearing on pages 255-256. It would be helpful to have had in addition an overall statement on the extent of coverage and/or progress of filming in the individual areas. Also, because different sections of the book were done by different compilers

there may very well be considerable variation from section to section, so the comments about this section may not necessarily apply to all the others. Overall one has the sense of an opportunity missed, a reference work that, while of obvious use, will have to be used with care and one which is likely to be misunderstood or to mislead many a researcher. We would hope that The Library will, however, be of sufficient value that a second edition will be necessary in which its shortcomings will be able to be corrected.

#### Canada and Ontario

in Chapter 14, "Dominion of Canada," William L. Arbuckle, pp. 359-384. Reviewed by Brenda Dougall Merriman CGRS, CGL, author of <u>Genealogy in Ontario: Searching the Records</u>, revised ed. (Canada: Ontario Genealogical Society, 1988).

A guidebook is only as good as the knowledge and expression of the author. In reviewing the Ontario, Canada section of <u>The Library</u> it became evident that other factors were as important as the author's knowledge of microfilmed and published sources for Ontario in the LDS Family History Library (FHL). There is no question that the author in this case knows and uses these sources for Ontario genealogical research. But some misunderstanding of historical development, records-keeping and sources has caused misleading errors.

It could be that the LDS microfilming crew has labelled some films incorrectly, causing misconception. This has happened with the Ontario town and township "deeds" series. These microfilmed records are not "deeds" per se: they are copybooks of deeds (memorials) which are not the same thing as original deeds. The dates that appear in cataloguing these items have been found to be incorrect in several cases. There are no "deeds" arranged by District names and many volumes of the copybooks do not have separate indexes, as suggested on page 378.

The point is that it's difficult to know whether these errors were created by the author or by the cataloguers in the FHL. And it's difficult to realize that some important sources and publications are apparently not available at the FHL. But it does behoove the publishers to make this very valuable reference work as error-free as possible.

Let's consider some of the background first. Because Ontario was one of the earliest Canadian provinces, it was necessary to refer as well to the section on Canada, when early Ontario records were also considered "Canada." Some obvious typographical or spelling errors are "Cape Briton" for Cape Breton (p. 359); "Storemont" for Stormont County (p. 360); "Catarague" for Cataraqui (p. 375); "1763 Ontario became a British Territory..." should read Quebec becomes a British Territory...(p. 375); "Montreal, Ontario" for Montreal, Quebec (p. 368 & 365); "FR - Peter Robinson Settler" is really PR (p. 377).

As for dates and numbers, the Eastern District Marriage Registers (p. 360) begin in 1831, not 1838. The implication is that the marriage of any ancestor resident in that area can be found in the registers. Not so; they are far from comprehensive and did not include Catholic or Anglican marriages. Ships' passenger lists to six major Canadian ports of entry are now available on microfilm to 1919 (p. 362) although possibly the FHL has not acquired the latest films. The reference to Jonasson's book, Canadian Veterans of the War of 1812 does not mention the revealing fact that the lists were only of men alive in 1875-77. Likewise, the list of officers and men killed during the 1837 Rebellion published in the "Public Archives" Report of 1904 includes only militiamen in a small area of eight towns and townships in Quebec. The province itself and its census records do not date from "the latter half of the 1700s"

(p. 376). The earliest extant census is the one quoted for 1796, which hardly places it mid-century.

The number of Loyalists who left the US is variously given as 40,000 to Canada (p. 365), 20,000 to Canada (p. 359), 30,000 to Nova Scotia (p. 365), 6,000 to Ontario (p. 365). The old Districts were abolished in 1849/50, not in 1844 (p. 375).

In the United Empire Loyalist section, no mention is made of Allen's Loyalist Literature: An Annotated Bibliographic Guide to the Writings on the Loyalists of the American Revolution and Antliff's Loyalist Settlements 1783-1789. New Evidence of Canadian Claims with its surname index to Audit Office 12 claims plus newly published claims from that source. If the FHL has copies of these, it may be that the author had to select only a few titles. (The FHLC Author/Title section does not show either of these books - ed.)

Now let's consider sources. Please, call it the Canada Company (p. 360) as per its charter, not the Canada Land Company. And we call that fracas in 1837 the 1837 Rebellion, not the "McKenzie Rebellion" (which is really Mackenzie) (p. 363). The Canadian contingent that served overseas in World War I was known as the Canadian Expeditionary Force, and their records were arranged with CEF call numbers at the National Archives. The Naturalization section (p. 364) does not include published indexes to Naturalization Registers 1828-1850 (Ontario Genealogical Society's (OGS) Families, Vol. 18, No. 3; Vol. 19, Nos. 1-3). These quarterlies should be available at the FHL since one is quoted for another reference on p. 377.

The publication of Ontario cemeteries (p. 361) appears to have been collected and/or catalogued by the FHL. If these are indeed transcriptions of cemeteries, then they were undoubtedly published by the various branches of the OGS as part of an ongoing programme to record more than 5,000 local cemeteries. The Ontario Archives has now microfilmed five series of these - thousands of cemeteries - and this reviewer does not know if the microfilm referred to here should be credited to the Genealogical Society of Utah or the Ontario Genealogical Society.

Strangely, no reference is made to the Loyalists or Tories as fighting men in Loyalist military units. Sources such as muster rolls and refugee lists are important to anyone tracing Loyalist ancestry, as proof of an ancestor serving with the King's forces is almost essential. Petitions for free land grants by Loyalists (p. 377) often provide this evidence, but petitions seldom mention an identifying property description (p. 378). Lists such as the Crown Lands ("Old") UE List and the Executive UE List are also omitted, and we doubt that these are unknown at the FHL.

From Township Papers (p. 378) one cannot "obtain" an identifying property description since this information is first needed to access the source. It is not necessary to know a "second proprietor's" name to access the second set of Heir and Devisee Commission records (p. 378). The first set of records has greatly varying material - very little for some Districts - and can not be considered comprehensive. In fact this series does not contain, for the most part, the actual files that the Commission created for individual cases. The most successful results with the second set of records is when the (alphabetically arranged by surname) applicant had the same surname as the sought ancestor, e.g. a son. These are files and records of the actual hearings. If a non-related party applied for title to the particular property, then it is useful to know a second or later claimant's name. The first series will not always provide this, and Township Papers again can be useful then. However it would be just as useful and quicker to consult the Ontario Land

Records Index to see what name eventually received the patent, and check this name for a possible Heir and Devisee Commission file.

If credit is given to Bill Britnell for the series of published <u>County Marriage Registers</u> (mainly indexes; few contain abstracts) then acknowledgment should also be given to the equal or greater share done by Elizabeth Hancocks, UE, CG, co-owner of Generation Press. And although Upper Canada Marriage Bonds are available on microfilm 1803-1845, Thomas Wilson's <u>Marriage Bonds of Ontario</u> clearly states in the title that his abstracts end at 1834.

The Library has been greeted as one of the major reference works of this decade, and no one can quarrel with the concept and the intent. Might we suggest in the interests of all genealogists who respect the FHL and the book's editors, that not only hard proof-reading was absent, but that local consulting "readers" might have been used to catch errors and misconceptions?

#### Canada and the Maritime Provinces in Chapter 14, pp. 359-372

Canadians accept as a fact of life and with as good grace as they can muster the deficiency in United States education which leaves the typical American confused, misinformed or oblivious to Canada and things Canadian. Thus, one was not totally unprepared to find his country called the "Dominion" of Canada, even if the parenthesized word has not been in current use for over a decade.

The list of dates inspires no greater confidence, as Port Royal was founded in 1605. The given date, 1608, marks the more significant founding of Québec City. Using 1623 to represent the Scots presence in Nova Scotia is ill-chosen. The charter and naming of the province occurred in 1621, the arms and flag in 1625, a short-lived Scots colony 1629-32. The French loss of Canada took place between 1755 and 1760 when Montréal surrendered; until then, the French might well have recovered what they had lost the year before on the Plains of Abraham. It would be more accurate to speak of the expulsion of the Acadians, rather than of French settlers. By 1755, those families had been in Acadia for from forty-five to one hundred and twenty years. The arrival of the Loyalists began during the Revolution, with the 1776 evacuation of Boston, and continued into the 1790s if one takes into account the "late Loyalists" of Upper Canada. The island which forms part of Nova Scotia is Cape Breton.

Numbers seem to have played ducks and drakes throughout the section. The number of Loyalists to the Maritimes is 20,000 on page 359, but reaches a more nearly accurate 30,000 elsewhere. Why 1901 and 1951 population figures are used for Canada or its various provinces is misleading. One should have selected a more recent date (e.g., 1981 or 1986) and used it throughout, so that readers can form some common impression of the relative size of the several areas in terms of population. Without knowing when the text was actually written, it is possible that our Public Archives of Canada had not yet become the National Archives of Canada at the time. On page 363 we read that the British army left Canada in 1871. That was the date when withdrawal began, but it was in the first decade of this century that the last regiment left Halifax Citadel.

Bibliographies are not alphabetized, and the city in New Brunswick is pretty consistently spelled St. John and not Saint John, as is correct practice. This cannot be explained as a typographical error after the fashion of Katherine

Mennie de Varennes (p. 362), Riel (p. 379), or Cataraqui (p. 375), or again Bell (p. 368), to cite a few that matter.

Canada has three Maritime Provinces. When Newfoundland is added these are collectively known as the Atlantic Provinces which is what the heading on page 366 should say. Equally shocking is the inclusion of British Columbia as a prairie province. If that is a prairie, I'd hate to see what we have for mountains and coastline in western Canada. Again in the Maritime section dates are tagged oddly. Is 1686 or 1636 meant for the arrival of those colonists from France? Were the Acadians expelled to Louisiana and France, or is that not where many of them wound up when some of the thirteen colonies to which they were consigned refused to accept them? The great New England migration to Nova Scotia ran from 1759 to the 1770s, and brought our population to about 20,000 (not 17,000 as on p. 367). The Scots reached Pictou in 1773 (not 1779).

Nova Scotia's counties were sometimes divided into townships, but not always. Moreover, the failure of the New England township system of local government to transplant into Nova Scotia is one of the important points in our political development. Nova Scotia has no Provincial Archives, just a Public Archives. The catalogue of Dr. Marble and my own newspaper vital statistics books were published, not by the Royal N.S. Historical Society, but by the Genealogical Association of that society. Moreover, my newspaper work has now been carried forward by Jean Holder to 1851 (p. 369). The holdings may not include the later volumes, but Miss Holder deserves credit as author of the work from 1823 onward, in any case.

New Brunswick's newspaper compilation was begun by the provincial genealogical society, but after volume five the compiler and publisher has been Danny F. Johnson, who should be given credit in the guide as such. On the Québec list of events, I wonder if the editors could not have found something important happening there between 1642 and 1759. There were les filles du roi, and there was the establishment of royal government, and there was Frontenac, to name a few notions at random. I thought the printer had no accents for French words until I looked at the charts on page 383 and spotted some accents there. It is too bad these weren't used throughout.

In Ontario, the Hudson's Bay Company (wrongly spelled on p. 379) cannot have founded a post in 1668, two years before it existed as a company. For the prairies, the Northwest Territory was sub-divided into four parts in 1882, but Alberta and Saskatchewan remained just territories until 1905 when they were united with Athabaska and Assiniboia, respectively, to form new provinces. Hence these provincial areas are in the census held in the library, but would form part of the appropriate territorial film.

All in all, the concept and presentation of the material is not the difficulty. The problem would seem to have been a failure of anyone to proofread the text carefully, or for anyone to look over the several parts of the Canadian section to detect the self-contradicting passages. It might have been useful to let a Canadian look at the Canadian part before printing it, or by having an American who knows Canada look at it. Despite these many criticisms I believe that the book will still be helpful for many who won't care about the dates of our historical events or whether we are a dominion any more. If one simply wants to know what resources are available in the LDS library for research in a certain geographical area, this book has something to offer. These flaws can be corrected in a later edition, as I hope such a publication will appear in due course. I sign myself as on page 368 and not as on page 369.

Canada and Québec in Chapter 14, pp. 372-375

In addition to the errors noted by the above two reviewers, the chronology of history (p. 359) shows "1755-58 French defeated by the British; many French settlers are deported to France, Louisiana, and the American colonies." Has the author confused (or merged) the dispersion of the Acadians with the conquest of Québec? In which case, the range of dates should be 1752-1759. The French Canadian and Acadian Genealogical Review is shown as published from 1968-to date (p. 365). Publication ceased with the death of the editor, Roland Auger, in 1982. (This same lack of attention to detail appears on page 378 with the statement that T.B. Wilson's periodical, The Ontario Register is currently being published). The correct name of the river is the St. Lawrence (in English) or St-Laurent (in French), not St. Laurence (p. 365). The bibliography for Loyalist research (p. 366) should be arranged in alphabetical order by author.

I, too, wondered if Ancestry's printing equipment didn't allow for the French accents. However, they are used in the section on Western Europe. Just a few corrections to typos on these four pages are: Laching Canal; Etat general des archives...; The Rivest index; Mont-Laurier; Comtes de Montmagny; College du Sacre-Coeur; mariage; Commission de Toponymie Conseil executif Quebec; Vieilles familles. Such frequent occurrences of typos and spelling errors is disturbing and makes one question the accuracy of statements as well.

The author recommended C.M. Day's <u>Pioneers of the Eastern Townships</u> as a "helpful source concerning the settlers of the eastern townships." This is probably one of the least helpful books published on the subject.

A number of indexes were mentioned without credits to their creators. The Loiselle Index was created by Father Antonin Loiselle and the Rivest Index was created by Father Lucien Rivest. A third index (p. 373) is described as "records from the counties of Drummond, Sherbrooke, Stanstead, Richmond, Wolfe, Compton, Nicolet, Arthabaska, Megantic, and Frontenac. It includes marriages from the beginning of the parish registers up to 1970." A fourth index (p. 374) is described as "Protestant marriages, baptisms, and burials in the St. Francois Judicial District including the counties of Compton, Richmond, Stanstead, Wolfe, Sherbrooke and parts of Frontenac and Arthabaska can be found in the FHLC under Quebec/Church Records." Both descriptions intrigued me and sent me to the FHLC to learn where these are deposited. Both were created by the Société de généalogie des cantons de L'est and are housed in Sherbrooke. I think this should have been mentioned. It occurs to me that if this reference book (which it is) confuses someone who is quite familiar with Québec records and resources, it certainly will confuse other readers.

Québec land grants (p. 374) as published by Chrysostome Langelier in 1891 under the title List of Land Grants Made by the Crown 1763 to 1890 is credited as "Salt Lake City: Family History Library, 1964." However, I would not have known it was the same item if I didn't have a copy of the FHLC to consult. (Incidentally, the item in the FHLC incorrectly identifies the author as Chrysostome Langiois). Similarly, the Nominal Card Index for the Lower Canada Marriage Bonds is credited to the Genealogical Society of Utah, 1981. A statement should have been made that this index was created by the Public Archives of Canada.

Catholic priests have been required to deposit duplicate copies of the parish registers in the local archives ever since the disastrous fire in 1640, not since 1679 as stated on page 375.

The dot-charts on pages 383-384 list 73 Québec jurisdictions with no fewer than nine of them misspelled. This is an error rate of over nine percent. The correct spellings are: Abitibi, Bellechasse, Chateauguay, Deux-Montagnes, Matane, Mégantic, Portneuf, Rivière du Loup, and Timiscamingue. The French accents, which are absent in the text, are used in this list.

There were a few items mentioned that I had not known of and am eager to investigate, such as the Biographical File of the Canadian Baptist Historical Society (p. 375). Genealogists will find many sources and records mentioned in this book that were previously unknown to them, and will need to also use the FHLC in order to get a better description of the item. Unfortunately, some items, such as the 1904 "Public Archives" Report mentioned in Brenda's review, are very difficult to find. In fact, after over thirty minutes of looking, I gave up and called a reference librarian. The correct citation to the 1904 Report containing the list of dead officers and soldiers in the Rebellion, is Report Concerning the Canadian Archives for the Year 1904 (being an Appendix to the Report of the Minister of Agriculture), Sessional Paper #18, Canadian Archives Report (Ottawa: S.E. Dawson Printer to the King's Most Excellent Majesty, 1905). This is different than the 1904 Report concerning settlement in Ontario from 1763 to 1791. That book's citation is Second Report of the Bureau of Archives for the Province of Ontario by Alexander Fraser, Provincial Archivist, 1904, Printed by order of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario (Toronto: L.K. Cameron, Printer to the King's Most Excellent Majesty, 1905). Even armed with this correct information, I was unable to find either work in the FHLC. Anyone who has used the FHLC knows it can be difficult to understand the cataloguing system in some instances. Obviously, the author saw this card and it would have been quite simple to add the information about where it can be found.

Overall, the book is a disappointment. It is hoped that a new edition is planned for early publication. It could be a very valuable reference source, in addition to assisting the researcher to use the FHL and Branches efficiently. Genealogists are taught to evaluate their sources. This becomes very difficult when the source isn't identified, or is incorrectly identified.

#### France and Luxembourg

in Chapter 22, "Western Europe," by Kory L. Meyerink, pp. 620-623, 629-630. The comments in this review were made by John Magerus, Ph.D., Professor of French and also of French Civilization at the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse. Dr. Magerus has researched on-site in both France and Luxembourg (and also in Québec) and several times at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. He will speak on the topics of both Luxembourg and Québec genealogy at the NGS Conference in St. Paul. His critique should prove informative and instructive.

In the year 800, Charlemagne was crowned Holy Roman Emperor (not King of France). Also on page 620, the statement is made that the ancestors of today's French people are the Franks and other Germanic tribes. The Gauls (Gallo-Romans) are not mentioned although they are the ancestors, not the Franks. It is stated that there was a "steady flow of emigrants to America, and elsewhere, from the 1600s to 1900" (p. 620 and again on p. 622). In fact, there was very little emigration from France to North America when the percentage of the total population is considered. On the other hand, the statement is made (p. 630) that "emigration from Luxembourg has been minor, chiefly to the larger cities of Europe and to America." Is 1/4-1/3 of the population considered minor? And, these emigrants settled chiefly in rural areas.

It is not true that virtually every town in France had a Catholic parish (p. 621). Researchers will often have to locate their small town on a map and then look for the nearest one that had a church.

It is unfortunate that the only book cited under the topic of history is one of the worst published. The author, André Lévêque, managed to write a 600-page history of France with scarcely a date mentioned. Citations to books under Biography and Genealogy and also under Nobility are incorrectly written.

The author has good knowledge of the records of France, how they were created and how to use them. This aspect of the guide should serve the researcher well.

Our French Canadian Ancestors Vol. VII, Thomas J. Laforest, translator. (Palm Harbor, FL: The LISI Press, 1988). Soft cover, 6" x 9", xi-293 pp., indexed, \$14.00 postpaid. Order from LISI Press, Box 1063, Palm Harbor, FL 34682. This volume, as with Vol. VI, is authored by Jacques Saintonge and contains maps of France under the old regime and under the Republic. The explanation of the Quebec judicial system under the French Regime is continued with a story about the Sovereign Council. Biographical sketches are of René Baudouin, Vincent Boissonneau dit Saintonge, Christophe Crevier, Pierre Deshayes, Francois Dessureaux dit LeBourguignon et Laplante, Jean Doyon, Charles Dutard, Bertrand and Francois Fafard, Pierre Guillet dit Lajeunesse, Louis and Francois Hamelin, Louis Houde, Jean Joubin dit Boisvert, Gabriel-Nicolas Lefebvre dit Lataille, Jean Lepelé dit Desmarets, Hilaire Limousin dit Beaufort, Nicolas Millet dit Marandais, Antoine Pépin dit Lachance, Alexandre Raoul, Pierre Tousignant dit Lapointe, and Gilles Trottier. The series of name variations continues with surnames beginning with D. Any serious Quebec researcher will want to own all of the volumes, not just the one containing a story about the direct-line ancestor. We receive an equal heritage from our female ancestors, and by the time we get each line back to the immigrant from France, we are likely to have one ancestor in each volume.

Corrections & Additions to Arsenault's Histoire et Genealogie des Acadiens, Janet B. Jehn. (Covington, KY: Janet B. Jehn, 1988). Soft cover, 8 1/2" x 11", staple binding, 138 pp., \$19.95 postpaid from the author at 863 Wayman Branch Road, Covington, KY 41015. Ever since Bona Arsenault's Histoire et Généalogie des Acadiens, 6 vols. (Ottawa: Editions Leméac Inc., 1978) was published, readers of Acadian Genealogy Exchange have sent the results of their research to its editor, Janet Jehn. Throughout the ten-year interval she has published this information in her quarterly. Now, she has gathered it all together, with additional material, in one book for the convenience of Acadian genealogical researchers. In many instances, the source of the information is cited. This work should be a great aid in untangling the often gnarled roots of Acadian family trees.

The following books are all available from Genealogical Publishing Co. Inc., (GPC) 1001 North Calvert Street, Baltimore, MD 21202-3897. Shipping is \$2.50 for the first book, \$1.00 each additional book. Orders totalling \$10.00 or less, allow \$1.25 for one book. Maryland residents add 5% sales tax; Michigan residents add 4% sales tax.

<u>Irish and Scotch-Irish Ancestral Research</u> A Guide to the Genealogical Records, <u>Methods and Sources in Ireland</u>, Margaret Dickson Falley, B.S., F.A.S.G. 2 vols. (Strasburg, VA, 1962; reprint GPC, 1988). Hardbound, 5 1/2" x 8 1/2", 813 + 354

pp., indexed, \$60.00 the set. My only brush with Irish genealogical research, other than hearing researchers moan, was in working to finish Steve Gilmour's Campbell family genealogy. He considered Margaret Falley the absolute authority on the subject. Milton Rubincam reviewed the first edition in the NGSQ (National Genealogical Society Quarterly) and said "it will be the standard authority on the subject of genealogical research in Ireland for many years to come." That's good enough for me! Indeed, the list of people credited with assisting her is impressive. She obviously learned from the best. Volume one is a guide which covers preliminary research in the United States, the record repositories in Ireland, and the types of records created. Holdings of repositories are described with the dates of coverage and existence of indexes. Included are genealogical collections, published indexes, and printed sources available in Ireland and the United States. The majority of both volumes would apply to the Irish in Canada as well. Volume two is a bibliography of family histories, pedigrees, and source materials published in book and periodicals. Obviously, more has been published since 1962. I can't imagine anyone seriously wanting to trace their Irish ancestors without using Falley's guide.

Catholic Trails West: The Founding Catholic Families of Pennsylvania Volume 1 St. Joseph's Church, Philadelphia (1733), Edmund Adams and Barbara Brady O'Keefe. (Baltimore: GPC, 1988). Hardbound, 6" x 9", vii-341 pp, \$30.00. This is the first of a two-volume set covering the years 1715-1815, and it deals with the largest parish. Voluma 2 will cover parishes at Conewago, Goshenhoppen, Lancaster, Loretto, and St. Vincent's in Westmoreland County. Families are arranged alphabetically by surname and there is no index to maiden names or other people mentioned. Thus, one is not able to construct family groups, which is essential to research. Ethnic groups represented are very diverse and run the gamut from French-Canadians to Irish to Germans, and comments in the registers often identify a specific origin. John Charles Boutin who was married to a woman named Pelagia and had a child named John Baptist baptised August 1776 is almost certainly a French-Canadian. There also are non-Catholic families in the registers, including Quakers. The introduction and a chapter on the parish of St. Joseph are well done, but the reduced dot-matrix appearing print is very hard to read. I hope a better typeface is chosen for Volume 2. The Appendices are a list of Acadians found in the registers as well as lists of parishioners from missions in New Jersey, Chester County and Delaware County. There is a two-page bibliography, but it is not necessarily a bibliography of sources used to compile this work, nor are there specific citations to the sources. The advertising flyer states that material was taken "from original and printed parish registers in the possession of the American Catholic Historical Society." However, I cannot find this statement in the book. Rather, on page vi of the introduction, there is the following statement. "The children listed may not necessarily be the children of the indicated parents and the date shown may not be the actual date of birth, but rather the baptismal date. Some entries were confusing, so please use the compilations with caution. For verifying information on your ancestor, you are referred to the original parish records found in the volumes of the American Catholic Historical Society, which are available in many libraries." The bibliography states those registers were published in vols. 1-20 (1884-1909) but does not give the range of years covered. Unfortunately, the authors did not include important information that appears in the published registers (which are not the originals, but a transcript of them) such as baptismal sponsors and witnesses at a marriage. Such information was at hand - why didn't they include it? An example is found on page 182 with the LeBlanc families. "Alexis, son of Charles, married Anna

Dendon 10 Feb 1763. p. Claude and ... Dendon." (The p. abbreviation is not defined anywhere. Abbreviations m. and c. are obviously married and child but are not defined.) "Marin married Isabella Vincent, both Acadians, 27 Jan 1763. (Their child) Mary Genevieve baptised 22 Feb 1764." This baptismal record, as published by the ACHS, shows one Charles LeBlanc as her godfather. This is strong evidence that Alexis and Marin may be brothers. Another LeBlanc family is also listed, with a child born in the same time era. However, the list of 10 Acadian families on page 336 only has "Marin LeBlanc m Isabella Vincent." There are many more - these were apparently the only ones identified as such in the records. If you find your family in Catholic Trails West, do consult the original records or at least, those published by ACHS for more information. They are arranged chronologically which can often help identify family groups. An index to vols. 1-31 (1886-1920) was published in 1942, and for vols. 32-41 (1921-1930) in 1956. I hope that when the authors prepare vol. 2 of this Pennsylvania reference series, they will be more precise about sources and abbreviations, more complete with their abstracts, and use a better typeface. The idea of such a publication is a good one, but this volume falls a bit short of the mark.

Do's and Don'ts for Ancestor-Hunters, Angus Baxter. (Baltimore: GPC, 1988). Soft cover, perfect binding, 5 1/2" x 8 1/2", 115 pp., \$10.95. This is basically another how-to-do-genealogical-research book. Even experienced researchers may find something they have overlooked or forgotten. The strongest feature is the encouragement he gives to the researcher who is ready to give up with their "brick-wall" line. There are chapters about the LDS sources, civil registration, church registers, censuses, wills and other sources broken down into regions such as the United States, Canada, England and Wales, Scotland, Ireland, France, and Germany. Reference is frequently made to his other books and books published by GPC that will have more detail on a particular subject. The final chapter is an example of a family history and is the story of his Baxter family. There are no citations nor sources given, and I wouldn't consider this the best example to follow. Mr. Baxter is an entertaining writer and has some sound advice. The book won't mislead you and has its value; it is better than some of the small guides that have been ground out. However, if you only have one research guide, I would recommend Val D. Greenwood's The Researcher's Guide to American Genealogy, also published by GPC in 1975, or the very readable Shaking Your Family Tree by Ralph Crandall, available from the New England Historic Genealogical Society and in many bookstores.

Genealogical Periodical Annual Index: Key to the Genealogical Literature, Karen T. Ackermann, compiler and Laird C. Towle, Ph.D, editor. Vol. 26, 1987. (Bowie, MD: Heritage Books, Inc., 1988). Hardbound, 5 1/2" x 8 1/2", 266 + xviii pp., \$17.50 plus \$2.50 shipping. Heritage Books, 1540E Pointer Ridge Place, Bowie, MD 20716. 272 periodicals published in 1987 are indexed in this volume. Queries are not indexed but articles and book reviews are. Source articles are indexed by topic, i.e. the names appearing in Lost in Canada?, vol. 13, #IV (Nov 1987) in that installment of "St. Andrew's Presbyterian, Ottawa, Ontario Register 1829-1881" are not indexed, but the article is. It appears as "CANADA, Ontario, Ottawa, Saint Andrew's Pres Ch marr 1829-1881 & bapt 1829-1873." It is followed with each volume number, issue, and beginning page of the article in that issue. This is a work that I haven't used to the fullest extent, but I will in the future. For example, I found reference to a book review in the NGSQ that I had missed. It is a book I would like to buy. Articles on methodology are indexed under that topic. Names in the index are of persons who were the

subject of a family history, a genealogy, a book, or an article. I am puzzled by one entry: "Sacramental records of the Roman Catholic Church of the Archdiocese of New Orleans 1718-1750, vol. 1, book review in <u>Kinfolks</u>, Southwest Louisiana Genealogical Society." This is indexed under CATHOLIC rather than LOUISIANA, New Orleans. However, these valuable volumes should be in every reference library - and used.

The History of Stanstead County Province of Quebec With Sketches of More Than Five Hundred Families, B.F. Hubbard, compiler. (Montreal: Lovell Printing & Publishing Company, 1874; reprint ed., Bowie, MD: Heritage Books, Inc., 1988). Soft cover, 5 1/2" x 8 1/2", 390 pp., \$20.00 plus \$2.50 shipping per order. Order from Heritage Books, Inc. as above. The original title begins with Forests and Clearings and continues with the above. The original edition had a very incomplete index which has been improved in the reprint. However, the reader needs to carefully read the introduction to the index in order to use it most fully. As with any county "mug books," the genealogical information must be used as clues, not as fact. The majority of the pioneers of Stanstead County arrived from New England early in the 1800s to the towns of Stanstead, Hatley, Magog, Barnston, Coatickook (sic) and Barford. Mr. Hubbard was one of the last surviving pioneers and he provides birth, marriage and death information about the families. The information is from his memory and memories of family members, and should be used with appropriate caution. With a dearth of vital records from this area, histories are often the only source for beginning genealogical research.

The Loyalists of Massachusetts and the other side of the American Revolution, James H. Stark. (Boston: W.B. Clarke Co., 1910; reprint Heritage Books, 1988). Soft cover, 5 1/2" x 8 1/2", vii-509 pp., indexed, \$35.00 plus \$2.50 shipping from Heritage Books as above. The first portion of the book is a history of the events prior to and during the Revolutionary War, especially as it affected people in Massachusetts (which included present-day Maine). Included is the "Banishment Act of the State of Massachusetts" listing those who were forbidden to return to the state as of the Fall of 1778. This section mentions sources and has occasional footnotes. There are chapters about the expulsion of the Loyalists and the settlement of Canada, and the later War of 1812 and the attempted conquest of Canada, and even continues with the Civil War and the part taken by Great Britain. The balance of the book is biographies of about one hundred Loyalists. Some sources are cited, but not all, and each biography will need close scrutiny. A footnote that states "Dealings with the Dead, p. 510" may mean something to someone (or even a lot of people) but it means nothing to me. However, the biographies are certainly better than the average county "mug book." There is a one-page list in the back of the book of Loyalists of Massachusetts whose names or biographies are not included in this book. I do believe the book is a worth-while reference source on the subject and one that researchers should consult. Although your direct ancestor in Massachusetts may not be a Loyalist, a close relative may have been.

#### Accommodations and Attractions
