

## LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

As mentioned in the last LETTER I traveled to Canada for two weeks in May, and spent a great deal of the time doing research. Varying amounts of time was spent at the Public Archives of Canada in Ottawa, the National Archives of Quebec in Quebec and Montreal and the courthouses in St-Jerome and Joliette. Some of you will benefit from material found, and again, the answers are published in this issue (with assistance from Paul Lareau). In order to conserve time, Tanguay and the Drouin books were not consulted at the Archives since there is access to these books in many libraries.

This brings up another suggestion--that if you receive an answer to your query from another reader, please inform me so that I may retire it and if of possible general interest, publish the answer. Some of the information found was in response to earlier queries and possibly you may have already had the query answered and I was unaware of it.

Thank you to Mrs. Phyllis Owen who read that I planned to visit Canada. That very day she took time to write me in case I was unaware of a requirement to visit Courthouses to examine records. I did not know of this requirement, and the trip would have been very disappointing! You must write the Minister of Justice, M. Pierre Dorion, at 225 est, Grande-Allee, Quebec, Quebec, and request permission for each of the Courthouses you wish to visit. Please allow at least a month, as he will send you a letter that you must present when you arrive at each place. Copies of his letter are forwarded to the Prothonotaries involved. (See LOST IN CANADA? Volume 1, Number 1, page 1 for locations). Another suggestion that may make the journey easier for Americans--be sure to take your passport (an expired one is acceptable) or a copy of your birth certificate or voter registration to prove citizenship. The travel brochures all state "no passport needed to travel to Canada" however, the event of the Olympics in Montreal this summer has necessitated a tightening of border inspection especially where citizenship is concerned. A border guard (nicely) reminded me that, after all, this was a foreign country. Needless to say, my sister and I had forgotten ours since it was not needed three years ago; fortunately, my German-born daughter had put hers in her purse.

The assistance and advice given at each Archive or Courthouse was courteous and very helpful. I have added to my shelves (and am willing to share the information): List of Publications of The Public Archives of Canada (PAC); General Inventory of Manuscripts at the PAC; a descriptive catalogue of County Atlases of Canada available from the National Map Collection of PAC; a list of county maps showing land ownership in Canada in the 19th century and which ones are available through photocopy; the Preliminary Inventory of the Collections of the Norfolk (Ont) Historical Society and the same for Lennox and Addington Co.; Rapport Des Archives Nationales du Quebec 1972; Guide to the Reports of the Public Archives of Canada 1872-1972; current gazetteers of Newfoundland, Labrador, New Brunswick, and Ontario (Quebec is on order and I didn't locate one from Nova Scotia); a list of parish registers held at the PAC; topographical maps of the sections labeled Ottawa, Kemptville, Russell, Thurso, Hawkesbury, Lachute, Vaudreuil, Laval, Lachine, Laurentides, and Beloeil.

The back issues of LOST IN CANADA? have finally been reprinted and are being mailed, with this bulk mailing to those who requested them, in separate envelopes--please watch for them, as they may arrive at different times.

An interesting article, certain to be agreed with by the genealogist, appeared in the July Family Circle magazine, by Charles Kuralt. It was titled "The Melting Pot Doesn't Work, Thank God!". GOOD HUNTING!

and permit her to be her Agent to locate the same, and to receive the  
Patent when completed. And as in duty bound will ever pray.

"Midland District, July Sessions, To wit 1836: Catherine Sharp maketh

"Midland District, July Sessions, To Wit 1836: We, the honorable J.  
Macauley Chairman and James Winballs Jr. Clerk of Peace, certify that  
Catherine Sharp personally appeared before the General Quarter Sessions  
of the Peace of the said District this day and is recognized by the  
Magistrates to be the daughter of George Finkle deceased and who re-  
tained his loyalty during the late war without suspicion of aiding or  
assisting the enemy: and he has done his duty in defence of the Province  
during the late war. Dated at the Courthouse in Adolphustown in the  
said District, this 13th day of July in the year of our Lord 1836.

"I do not find that the petitioner has received any land - 15 Nov 1836.  
(signed) J. Radenhurst, In Council 17 Nov 1836 recommended. The petition  
of Catherine Sharp D.U.E. 14 Nov 1836."

## THE KING'S DAUGHTERS (Second of a series)

The romantic possibilities of the French-Canadian filles du roi among their ancestors has not escaped the historians of New France, but now and again it has led them a bit astray.

One of the reasons was their eagerness to rebut the charge made by Louis-Armand de Lom d'Arce, baron de La Hontan, in his 1703 work, "Nouveaux Voyages de Mr. le Baron de Lahontan dans l'Amerique Septentrionale," that the filles du roi were the scourgings from the streets of France's cities.

We don't plan to get into that argument. Not all of the women who arrived in New France would have been welcomed in a convent, but for the most part the group was an excellent cross section of the women of France with one major thing in common. They were extremely poor. Only a few dozen of the women could be considered propertied and of an estate which probably would have made them considered good marriageable prospects in France. Even these women probably would have had to marry below their station in life in France and thought their prospects far brighter in the New World.

Those who would like to pursue the defense of our ancestors should find plenty of ammunition in Lanctot's "Filles de joie ou Filles du roi," (Montreal, 1952) and Dumas' "Les Filles du Roi en Nouvelle-France," (Quebec, 1972). Research by Lanctot and Dumas has been done in depth and just about every scrap of information about every woman that is available has been obtained by these two historians. Their work shows that except for a very few women, and some of these apparently led astray in the New World, the filles du roi were courageous, adventurous, daring spirits who saw New France as a means of escaping a depressing future that poverty would doom them to in France.

Romantically, some of the portrayals of the king's daughters picture them in regal splendor. Two water colors by G.W. Jefferys in the Archives Publiques du Canada show them leaving France and arriving at Quebec.

The first shows some of the women at a reception held by Louis XIV. They are dressed splendidly and Louis and his courtiers are greeting them regally. The second is almost as far-fetched. The women are leaving their ships in the harbor at Quebec, not quite as regally attired, but they are passing among a large group of men nearly as splendidly dressed as Louis XIV. All look like courtiers, not the rough habitants who actually must have been the not too attractive sight that greeted the view of the women after their long journey across the Atlantic.

And what of the women! They must have made frantic efforts just before their arrival to appear in their very best, but the size of the ships, the scarcity of water, and the knowledge of their humble dowries that we have must have made their efforts desperate.

One of these poor women died in Quebec just after her arrival and before she was married. Her hopes had ended quickly. But the inventory of her humble belongings tells us more about these ancestors of ours than many words could tell.

We can only guess that the young lady, Madeleine FABRECQUE, 23, was buried in at least one other outfit, and probably in the only stockings and shoes she possessed. Here is the other little items she had carried from France to the New World: Two outer dresses, one of Holland fabric in satin weave style and made of wool; the other of hard-finished wool. A 'sorry' petticoat made of silk and wool. A 'really miserable' green petticoat. A morning dress or wrapper made of rough woolen cloth. A morning jacket of serge. Some linen handkerchiefs. Six head dresses of linen. Four black head coverings, two of taffeta and two of crepe. A muff made of dog's skin. Two pairs of sheepskin gloves.

That is everything. That is all this poor girl possessed to bring to her marriage.

That and the king's dowry which would be handed over by the colonial ministry once she had found a husband in the New World and the marriage ceremony was complete.

Most genealogists have a tendency to think of French-Canadian records as being very complete, and they are, compared to most other countries. But very many vital records have been lost.

For that reason, not much is known of the dowries most of the women brought with them. Still, for most, it could have been little more than that brought with her by Mlle. FABRECQUE. For most, the money would have been the 50 pounds they received from the king if they married a soldier and the 100 pounds they received if they married an officer. In some cases they also received a supply of goods: a cow, a cask of pork, some tools.

But the average dowry had to be under 200 pounds in money and for that reason, when it is mentioned, we have listed the women who brought more than that sum into the marriage as a dowry. For many, records of dowries simply do not exist because the records of the notaries have been lost. The women first appear in census records and their marriages have to be estimated from the age of their first offspring. Sometimes a few drabs of other information comes to light from other legal documents, property transfers; confirmation records, etc., etc.

Jeanne BILODEAU, born at Lajarige, Angoumois, the widow of Jacques BAUBICHE and daughter of the deceased Jean BILODEAU and Francoise POUPARD, married Pierre COUILLARD Feb 8, 1666 at Trois Rivières.

Marie BILODEAU (PESCHIER), born in 1649, place and parentage unknown, married Jean HAREL around 1671, near Nicolet. Corrects Tanguay.

Marguerite BINAUDIERE, born at Chartres, Beauce, the daughter of the deceased Robert BINAUDIERE and Renee GODESSAINT (GODERAUT) 1/m Sumphorien ROUSSEAU Aug 31, 1670 at Ste-Famille and 2/m Claude GUION Dec 1, 1688 at Ste-Famille. She had a dowry of 250 pounds in her first marriage.

Renee BIRETTE, born at LaRochele, Aunis, the daughter of Jean BIRETTE and Simone PERINNE, 1/m Pierre BALAN dit LACOMBE June 9, 1672 at Quebec; 2/m Jean BRIAS dit LATREILLE around 1690 probably at St-Michel; 3/m Francois LAVERGNE April 15, 1709 at Quebec.

Francoise BIZELON (BAISLA) born at St-Sauveur, Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Benjamin BIZELON and Claude PROU, 1/m Laurent CAMBIN dit LARIVIERE 16 Aug 1668 at Quebec; 2/m Pierre MERCAN dit LAPIERRE 22 Sep 1670 at Quebec; 3/m Andre GOURBEIL dit TRANCHEMONTAGNE 4 Jan 1693 at Pte-aux-Trembles. She had a dowry of 300 pounds at her first marriage.

Marie-Anne BLAIN, born at St-Germain-l'Auxerrois, Paris, Ile-de-France, married Pierre GERVAIS 19 Oct 1665 at Quebec.

Anne BLAINVILLAIN, born at Maligny, Burgundy, the daughter of Guillaume BLAINVILLAIN and Jeanne LEGERAUT, married Louis CHARBONNIER (ST-LAURENT) in January 1672 at St-Ours.

Marguerite BLAISE, born at Nantes, Brittany, daughter of the deceased Jean BLAISE and Mathurine MALESCOT, 1/m Jean PASQUIER in October 1669 around Quebec; 2/m Isaac HARNOIS in January 1670. She had a dowry of 300 pounds at her first marriage.

Marie BLANCHARD, born at Rouen, Normandy, daughter of Jean VIANCHARD and Martine LE BAS, 1/m Michel-Mathieu BRUNET dit LESTANG Nov 10, 1667 at Quebec and 2/m Yves LUCAS March 17, 1703 at Lachine.

Isabelle BLAY (LE BLEU) born at St-Eustache, Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Claude BLAY and Marguerite VERRIER, 1/m Pierre ROCHE 7 Oct 1669 at Ste-Famille; 2/m Vincent GUILLOT 28 Apr 1677 at Ste-Famille. She had a dowry of 250 pounds at her first marriage.

Marguerite BLOIS (PELOIS), born at La Ferte-Bernard, Maine, daughter of Jacques BLOIS and Francoise MASSON, married Jacques BOIVIN 17 Nov 1665 at Montreal.

Jeanne BLONDEAU, born at Pontoise, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Jean BLONDEAU and the deceased Jacqueline MORIN, married Rene ABRAHAM dit DESMARETS in November 1671 around Trois Rivières. She had a dowry of 350 pounds.

# PETERBOROUGH COUNTY

(Peterborough County included what is now Victoria County until 1861. Still earlier the entire district was the north riding of Northumberland County which along with Durham made up the old Newcastle District.)

Earliest settlement in present day Peterborough was in Smith Township surveyed in 1818. This township received as its first settlers a group of English immigrants from Cumberland who located near the site of the city of Peterborough. These first residents were William Dixon and his five sons; Joseph Lee and his two sons; Robert Millburn, Robert Walton, John Walton, John Smith and son, Thomas W. Milbourn and Walton Wilson. Other pioneers from other settlements along Lake Ontario moved into Smith and North and South Monaghan Townships later that year.

In May 1819 Adam Scott, John Farrelly (a surveyor), John Ward, Charles Fothergill, Barabas Bletcher and John Edminson entered the district. Most of them were from Pt. Hope and were to become men of importance in the area in later years.

The first pioneers to Douro Township were Thomas Stewart and his brother-in-law Robert Reid who obtained their grants in 1822 before the township was even surveyed.

The county of Peterborough was named after Peter Robinson who did so much to assist in the colonization of the area. In 1823 he had supervised a migration of Irish to lands near the Mississippi River in Lanark County. In 1825 he attempted to relieve the suffering of many by encouraging the immigration of 2,024 inhabitants of County Cork, mainly Roman Catholic. Of the group about 1/3 were children. The expedition travelled in sections with the first division landing at Cobourg on August 12, 1825, then proceeding inland about 13 miles to Rice Lake. The first group finally reached Scotts Mill (the present site of Peterboro). Almost all the members of the immigration were located as follows: 36 families in Asphodel Township; 60 in Douro; 142 in Emily (now part of Victoria county); 67 in Ennismore; 51 in Otonabee and 34 in Smith Township.

Although the Township of Dummer was surveyed in 1823 no attempt was made to settle it until 1831. At that time 1,950 English emigrants, many from Wiltshire came to the area. These were later added to in numbers by settlers from a Scottish emigration society in 1832. One of the most important settlements in the county was Dummer Mills (now Warsaw) situated on the shores of Squaknegosippi Creek (Indian River). Prominent among earliest inhabitants were the Burnhams and Choates, who were of "Late Loyalist" stock of New Hampshire.

In 1839 an Irish emigration of 183 settlers came to the area mainly from Colonel Wyndham's estates in Clare and Limerick. They settled in the back concessions of the township. The northern and eastern townships were settled much later and chiefly by the descendants of the pioneers.

# VICTORIA COUNTY

In March 1821 when the township of Emily was finally for sale, it was a part of Durham County. During this year 400 Protestant Irish came from County Fermanagh settling in South Emily and Cavan Townships (Watson Kirkconnell notes the names of the modern representatives of the group in his "County of Victoria Centennial History," as he does for areas in the township). The year 1825 brought the Robinson migration with about 700 persons coming into Emily, making the northern half of the township solidly Catholic with the southern half Protestant.

Mariposa Township, too, was once part of Durham County. Surveyed in 1820 it was originally a rectangle, however, later a piece on Lake Simcoe, now known as concessions A, B, and C was added. Settlement in the early days was prevented as the

Canada Company had bought large portions of the fertile land for speculation. The main settlement developed just before and during 1831 when a number of Scots from Argyleshire came in along the Eldon Boundary on the north. Later, second generation Canadians moved in from Northumberland County and White church and Markham Townships in Ontario County. These latter settlers stayed in the centre of the township.

The earliest immigrants to Ops Township were brothers Patrick and John Connel. They opened up the south west section of the township in 1825. Most of the settlers in this area were Irish, many having come with the Robinson Migration.

In 1828 a group of families came from a single neighbourhood in South Ulster. These included Michael Brady, Terence Brady, Edward Murphy, Patrick Hoey, and Bryan Hoey. In the eastern part of the township another settlement was growing. They included the Connollys, Walkers and McDonoughs who came from Fermanagh and lived west of Reaboro. Others included descendants of Palatine refugees who had been granted asylum in Limerick County, Ireland during the reign of Queen Anne.

Immigrants from Argyleshire, Scotland came to Eldon Township in 1828. They were followed by Fergusons, Finns, McEacherns, Rosses, Smiths in 1829 and 1830. In the early thirties came several families from the island of Islay, Scotland via North Carolina. Later immigrations of English and Irish made the population more racially balanced.

While Fenelon was surveyed in 1822 settlement did not begin until ten years later. Most came via Peterborough. The majority of the first settlers were Protestant Irish. The centre of the township drew the Scots as did the west concessions. The clearing and settling of the Cameron Lake locality was due to men like John Bellsford, John McIntyre, Hamilton and Samuel Boyce, James Humphrey and Robert Dennistoun.

The pioneers to Verulam came via the east. Fermanagh Irishmen settled in the Harvey area of Peterborough County in 1833, then moved across to Verulam north of Bobcaygeon. Some of these settled in the north centre of the township.

Kirkconnell points out that "most of the land immediately adjacent to Sturgeon Lake was taken up by retired army and navy officers and English gentry.. 'the Scotch line' between concessions V and VI from Sturgeon Lake south to Emily Lake, was first settled in 1833... The road between Concessions VI and VII was settled by pensioners, the Lithgows, Murdochs, Grays, Hamiltons and others and was therefore called 'The Military Line...' The next line to the east was taken up by Irish Protestants, such as the Longs, Steeles and Middletons." (3)

The northern townships of Victoria were opened much later than the southern ones. This was chiefly due to the non-agricultural character of this area. Northern Irish settlers located in the southwest portion of Bexley while Highland Scots speaking only Gaelic settled along the west shore of Northwest Bay. A number of Irish Canadian Protestants moved into north and northwestern Bexley coming from Cavan Township in Durham. Carden has had its main settlements in the northwest and southeast of the township with Irish Roman Catholics being the dominant element of the population. Many parts of the northern townships are non-agricultural lands while other portions were settled in early 1900s.

Watson Kirkconnell has made a great contribution by researching out the names of the early settlers and tracing the survival of their genealogical lines in the county.

In his chapter "Research into Pioneer Survival," he lists the names of families still present in the county who descended from original pioneer families. Most of this information, however, is from the 1921 edition of his book.

## PERTH COUNTY

Downie Township had its beginnings in 1832 with settlement completed in 1850. The Irish, Germans and Scots were the main nationalities.

"Thus in the southeast corner we find a group from the North of Ireland; Monteith, Rankin, Dempsey, Wilson, Nelson, Thistle, Dunsmore, Robb and Hesson. Southwest from the south of Ireland, are Clyne, McNamara, Hourigan, Killoran, Payton, Walsh, O'Connor and McCann. North, along the Goderich road, are Germans and we have such names as Seebach, Kastner, Sebring, Pfrimmer, Arbogast, Sheilleberger, Klein, Goettler, Goetz and Schweitzer. Northwest is a Scottish settlement and here, particularly along the Avon, we find the Ballantynes, Murrays, Dunlops, Strathdees, Thompsons, Grahams, McIntyres, Stephensons, Armstrongs, Muirs, Aitchesons and many others whose names indicate Scotland as their birthplace." (4)

The greatest influx of settlers came between 1840-1845. The northeast corner from the fifth concession was settled by Germans. English from Devonshire and Cornwall came to the area west of the Thames, from the Huron road to concession IX. On the Mitchell road, from Fullerton village to the south boundary, including concessions 17 and 18 were Scots from Dalhousie. A group of Alsatian families also settled in the township accounting for such names as Rohfreitsch, Kramer, Schelleberger and Bartle.

Blanshard township was rapidly settled between 1841 to 1848 with many acres taken up by squatters. Land west of the Thames was settled mainly by immigrants from the north of Ireland as was most of the township. East of the river, however, surrounding St. Marys, the Scots predominated.

Although surveying of Hibbert township was accomplished between 1829 and 1835, settlement did not take place until later. Pioneers were nearly all British by origin; Irish in the northwest, Scots and English in the southwest, Scots in the southeast with the northeast a mixture of British and German. In 1857 settlement was completed.

South Easthope was settled on an east to west basis which was characteristic for South Perth. The early pioneers were mainly Germans with some Scots. Sebastian Fryfogle, originally from Berne, Switzerland was the first settler in the county of Perth, locating on lot 14, concession 1 on Christmas day, 1829. He was followed by Andrew Riddell, a Scot from Berwickshire. A short time later a number of his countrymen from Perthshire settled along the Huron Road in both Easthopes. Settlement developed slowly toward Woodstock, more rapidly west to Stratford and south along the boundary line of Downie Township towards Zorra Township. In 1832, quite a number of German families settled near the Fryfogle residence and toward Sebastopol. It is understandable to find the first Church was a Lutheran one in that year. The township was generally settled by 1850.

A Bavarian, Andrew Seebach was the first settler at Ellice Township (1830). The earliest pioneers located along the Huron Road. The trend of settlement was from the Huron Road northward. With the exception of a portion around Kinkora and a section near Stratford composed of Northern Irish, all were German.

To North Easthope came a large number of pioneers from Perthshire, Scotland. However some Germans settled on the eastern part of the township. David Bell, who settled on lot 20, concession 1 in 1832, was the first. He was followed by others from Perthshire in the same year. They had suffered terribly during their voyage from Scotland due to Asiatic cholera, with thousands dying. In 1833 another group came from that same Scottish county. Settlement was generally completed in 1850.

The township of Logan has a mixed population. The Germans predominate the district surrounding Brodhagen while north and west of the Logan road are the Scots. Irish settled the west centre. To the south and near Mitchell the population is mixed.

Only a few settlers along the Huron road had located themselves between 1830 to 1840. In 1844 there were only 134 inhabitants and they were all in Mitchell.

Settlement in Elma, the largest township began in 1848. This area has mixed nationalities though Scots predominate in some sections.

Mornington was settled from the eastern side beginning in about 1843. John Chalmers and his sons John and Adam were among the first.

The last township to be settled was Wallace, not being opened to settlers until 1855 (although a number were there earlier). John Binning was the earliest, settling in 1851 at the present site of Listowel. Scots and Northern Irish settled the south west area of the township with Scots and English in the southeast. Immigrants from Northern Ireland and settlers from Simcoe settled the north.

#### BRUCE COUNTY

The first permanent residents of Bruce County settled in 1848. However, this constituted less than a dozen locations that year. To Southampton came Captain John Spence originally from the Orkney Islands who had been employed by the Hudson Bay Company. William Withers, an Englishman and his brother-in-law Allan Cameron were the first to locate at Kincardine Township. A small settlement developed there in 1848 and 1849. Others came during that time to Huron Township with the earliest pioneers arriving at Brant Township in 1849. Most of these early arrivals appear to be Scots by name, with some English and a few French Canadians.

Settlement really did not begin until 1850 as prior to this time there was not a township which had been surveyed into farm lots. Kinloss (which became a township in 1855) received its first settlers at this time.

Bruce County was settled generally with nationalities and occupations quite mixed. One exception was the "Lewis Settlement." In the centre of Huron Township 109 families, all from the Isle of Lewis, Scotland settled in September, 1852. To the township of Carrick in 1853 came a large number of pioneers of German origin, the majority coming from the county of Waterloo. A number of these settled around Demerton.

In 1861 the census showed 59% Canadian birth, Scots 19%, Irish 11%, English 5%, German 4%, with 44% Presbyterian.

#### HURON COUNTY

Settlers who came previous to 1830 stayed in the town of Goderich as it was the terminal point of the Huron road. In 1832 a small group of families founded the "Irish Settlement" at the eastern boundary of the county. Similarly a "Scotch Settlement" was begun in 1833 on the banks of a tributary of the Maitland River a mile north of the Huron road. Later this settlement grew to become the village of Roxborough. Both settlements were in McKillop Township. John and Samuel Holmes located at a place now known as Holmesville in 1832. Others settled in small groups along the London and Huron roads where communities still exist.

In Goderich Township were located two of the earliest important settlements. Goderich and Bayfield, which did not become a thriving settlement until the 1840s and 1850s. It was to decline when the railway bypassed it.

Tuckersmith Township had a population, half of which were Presbyterian, hence one would think they would be Scottish by origin. Early settlements were Egmondville and Harpurhey (later known as Seaforth). Stanley Township was strongly Protestant, the majority being English while the Scots were the second largest group.

The earliest settlers to Usborne Township were English. This township was one where a religious group, the "Bible Christians," were most active. Settlement did not take place until after 1845. Hullett Township, too, had English immigrants as

the major racial group. Scots and Irish were the pre-1845 settlers of Hay Township with a significant German settlement developing later.

The northern townships are a mixture of English, Scottish and Irish. One village, Belgrave in Morris Township, grew from an immigration of Irish peioneers who had come from Simcoe County.

#### SIMCOE COUNTY

In 1819 nineteen families from Lord Selkirk's Red River were among the first to settle in Simcoe County; these included the families of Sutherland, McKay, Mathewson, McBeth, Ross and Campbell who made up what was known as the "Scotch Settlement," a little southwest of Bradford.

Three Irish families, Wallace, Algeo and Armstrong settled near the Holland River during the same year.

This was the pattern of settlement which was similar to other areas. The settlers gathered in groups according to nationality. Hence it was in West Gwillimbury that the afore-mentioned Scots took root. A large number of Protestant Orangemen from Northern Ireland settled the northern part of this township, in Tecumseth, in the eastern portion of Essa and in the southwest of Innisfil. They began to move in during the early 1830s.

To southeast Innisfil and West Essa came lowland Scots via Dalhousie Township, Ontario in 1832. These included many Glasgow and Paisley weavers.

Highland Scots, especially from Islay, Argyleshire developed large settlements in Oro and in Nottawasaga beginning in 1832.

Irish Catholics came to Adjala, Vespra, Flos, Medonte and Nottawasaga in 1828 and particularly after 1837. About ten families of Irish Palatines settled in West Gwillimbury in 1831.

Most of these tiny "islands" of settlements developed pre-1837.

## LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

After two years of publication, I find that I enjoy it more than ever! This is due in large part to the communication with subscribers. Your letters and contributions of material are very important to the continuing growth.

The Index to Volume 2 is in this issue. Slight spelling variations (obvious ones that would appear near each other in the index) are ignored. Remember that a name may appear more than once on a page.

Many subscriptions expire with this issue, and again I tried to place the expiration notice in only those envelopes, but may have made a mistake or two. Look at your address label; if the number 24 is on the lower right corner, your subscription expires. The key to the label is quite simple: the first number is the volume and the second digit is the number of the issue that expires. New subscribers--all back issues are currently available.

A new query deadline is being imposed in order to mail the magazines the first week of the month of issue. Please mail your queries to reach me by the 1st of the month prior to publication, i.e. December 1 for the January issue. Late queries this time, appear following the ads.

I am still receiving requests for information without SASE, so if you did not receive a reply, that could be the reason. The other reason is that I am holding it until I find some information for you. Many times in my reading and research I run across an item of possible interest to an individual, or a suggestion for where to look next, and can't resist sending it on. I do appreciate it very much when my postage is returned--the post office still won't allow me to print my stamps!

A subscriber sent me his printed card (such as a business card) with the message at the top of "Researcher of the \_\_\_\_\_ family history. Do you know any, or are there any in your phone book? Can I assist you in early Minnesota or French Canadian research? (no charge)." His name, address, and phone number follow in larger print. This is a rather clever and unique idea that I thought worth passing on.

The personnel at the National Archives of Quebec, Genealogy Section, 1180 rue Berthelot, Quebec, Quebec G1A 1A3 have requested that you send them a list of pioneers, or immigrant French-Canadians to the USA. They would like such pertinent data as dates and places of birth, marriage, and death. These will be added to their expanding card file. Hopefully, they will soon again be able to answer correspondence.

My library is growing, and the most recent addition is a complete set of Tanguay. (It was awfully difficult to quit playing with it long enough to get this issue ready.) Jean-Bte PERREAULT (the fur trader) b 1761 Trois-Rivieres, PQ entered fur trade ca 1783, lived as trader in IL til 1793 when he entered as a clerk for the North West Co. Was at the Fond du Lac department for the company, in WI, til 1799; in charge of the Pic, on Lake Superior til 1805; on the St-Maurice and Ottawa Rivers in Quebec til 1806 the year he left the employ of the Northwest Co. He later was employed by the Pacific Fur Co, by an independant trader, and by the Hudson Bay Co until 1821, year of his retreat. Then he settled in Sault-Ste-Marie, where he d 1844. He 1/m a metis woman, Marie HARRIS, dau of William, also clerk in the Upper lands, and of Eugen KAY, in Batiscan, PQ 23 Aug 1805.

HARRIS Baptisms in Louiseville, PQ: Jean-Bte 27 Sep 1798 age 5; Marie-Anne 12 Oct 1803 age 5; Michel-Guillaume 12 Oct 1803 age not given; Judith 12 Oct 1803 age 6 mos. In the act of marriage, Marie-Anne, Guillaume and Judith were legitimatized.

His dau Marie-Anne m Jean-Bte DEGUIRE who was a first cousin to Dr. William MC KAY, son of Tom. MC KAY--is it also KAY, the surname of the mcr of Marie HARRIS who m Jean-Bte PERREAULT, fur trader of MI? ### THE KING'S DAUGHTERS (Third of a series)

It is extremely difficult to ferret out much information about any individual among our early French-Canadian ancestors, but considered as a group, there is a wealth of material. The same is true of the filles du roi, the daughters of the king.

Most of the history books devoted only a few short paragraphs to the king's daughters, mentioning the need for wives and mothers in New France, and the plan of obtaining them by having the king offer a dowry.

One of the major truisms mentioned in all these accounts is the speed with which the women arriving from France found husbands among the colonists and were married.

Typical is the account in Eccles's "The Canadian Frontier 1534-1760" (Holt, Rinehart and Winston, New York, 1969). "Each year," writes Eccles, "the ships carried hundreds of the filles du Roi to Quebec, where they were cared for by the Ursulines and Hospital sisters until they found husbands. This rarely took more than a fortnight." Eccles, in turn, is citing Lanctot's "Filles de joie ou Filles du Roi" (Montreal, 1952).

It is true that our ancestresses among the filles du Roi were speedily wed once they arrived in New France. But just how fast is more difficult to ascertain. There are very few ancestors among the French-Canadians whose arrival can be pinpointed. And this is true for the filles du Roi.

What is known is that the bachelors in New France wanted wives and the women arriving had agreed in advance to marry. Love, in that day and age, was always something our ancestors expected would come after marriage, if it was to be.

Still, our ancestors weren't about to leave everything to chance. It is amazing to note the large number who apparently sought and obtained wedding partners from their own native sections of France. What is more amazing is the large number of formal agreements to marry made before a notary that were annulled. There were even a number of civil marriages contracted, annulled, new partners obtained, another annulment, and the earlier partner back again, this time for the all-important church ceremony. These civil agreements on the terms of the marriage were not lightly arrived at. The decision to seek an annulment had to be studied and couldn't have been made quickly. The annulments were always possible, of course, because it was the church ceremony that made the marriage official, and it was a real rarity when the civil agreement was drawn up following the church ceremony although it was not unknown.

Typical of these annulments is one recorded in J. and V. Durand's "Jean Durand et Sa Posterite" (Saint-Viateur, Outremont, 1954). Jean DURAND signed a contract as a recruit for New France 3 March 1657. By 1660, Durand had completed his three years of service and obtained a land concession at Cap Rouge. On 3 Oct. 1661 before witnesses that included Pierre BOUCHER, squire, sieur de Grosbois and governor of Trois Rivières, he contracted to marry Marie FAYETTE, a fille du Roi who had arrived the same year. Durand returned to Cap Rouge and Mlle. Fayette remained in Trois Rivières with the nuns until Durand returned for the church ceremony. We don't know what happened exactly, but on 12 Jan. 1662, Mlle. Fayette appeared before a civil notary and had the first agreement annulled. She then contracted to marry Charles POULIOT, had that civil agreement annulled, too, but finally 26 July 1662 married Nicolas HUOT.

And Jean Durand? On 23 Sept. 1662 in Quebec he contracted to wed an orphan Huron girl, Catherine ANTEENNONTAK dit CREATURE DE DIEU, the daughter of Nicolas ARENDANKI and Jeanne OTRINO-ANDET, who had been raised in the convent of the Ursulines at Quebec since 1654. She was probably 14 when she married Jean Durand. Their descendants in Canada and the United States now number in the tens of thousands.

All of this provides an interesting sidelight to the filles du Roi and proves that

the marriages were not quite as hasty as thought. There were second thoughts on both sides, and if one or the other thought there was the possibility of a better match, they were not slow to change their earlier decisions.

Among the filles du Roi in our first two articles who had marriage agreements annulled were: Marie BOISIEAU who had contracted to wed Isaac De L'AVANT 11 July 1667; Marguerite AUBE (HELOY, LOY) who contracted and annulled a marriage with Andre POUTRAY 25 Nov 1667; Jeanne AUBERT who contracted and annulled a marriage with Denys BROSSEAU 6 Nov 1669; Francoise AUBRY who contracted and annulled a marriage with Martin BOUDAULT 8 Sept 1673; Catherine AUGER who contracted and annulled a marriage contract with Philippe GOUYAU 14 Oct 1671; Madeleine BAILLY who contracted and annulled a contract with Jean BRIERE 6 Apr 1672; Francoise BARBERY who contracted and annulled an agreement with Etienne PASQUIER 9 Oct 1668; Jeanne BARBIER who contracted and annulled an agreement with Bernard CHAPELAIN 30 Aug 1670; Catherine BARRE (of St. Martin-de-Re) who contracted and annulled an agreement with Maurice RIVET 17 Nov 1664; Marguerite BERGIER who contracted and annulled an agreement with Jacques BUISSIER 7 Sept 1670; Marguerite BLAISE who contracted and annulled an agreement with Laurent POIRE 30 Sep 1669; and Jeanne BLONDEAU who contracted and annulled an agreement with Jean BELLEVILLE 30 Oct 1671.

Others among the filles du Roi who had second thoughts:

Marie BONVILLE (BONHEUR), born at Briechasteau, Ile-de-France, the daughter of the deceased Toussaint BONVILLE and Louise BELLEHEURE, who agreed and then annulled a contract with Pierre NEPVEU 5 Oct 1669, and later married Paul INARD dit PROVENCAL 27 Oct 1669 at St. Famille. She had a dowry of 200 pounds, including the king's gift of 50 pounds.

Marguerite BOURBIER, born in Brie-Comte-Robert, Brie, daughter of the deceased Pierre BOURBIER and Isabelle NOBLAIR, who agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Jean FLEURICOURT 2 Nov 1671. There is no further trace of this woman.

Jeanne BRACONNIER, born at Paris, the daughter of Nicolas BRACONNIER and Claude BRUNET, who agreed to and annulled a wedding agreement with Louis CHAPACOU 10 Sept 1673 and 1/m Crespin THUILLIER dit LA TOUR 18 Sept 1673 at Quebec; 2/m Charles EDELINE 16 Oct 1675 at Boucherville. She had a dowry of 200 pounds at her first marriage.

Anne BRUNET, born at St-Leu de Paris, Ile-de-France, the daughter of Francois BRUNET and Claudine MICHAUD, who agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Rene DUVERGER 14 Oct 1665. She married Pierre CORRIER (COIRIER) 23 Nov 1665 at Quebec. She had a dowry estimated at 300 pounds.

Jeanne BUREL, born at St. Denis-du-Claire, Normandy, daughter of the deceased Daniel BUREL and Anne LE SUISSE, agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Pierre DE LAVOYE 21 Oct 1667, later marrying Andre POUTRE dit LAVIGNE 3 Nov 1667 at Quebec.

Henriette CARTOIS, born at Paris, daughter of the deceased Lambert CARTOIS and Marie LAMBERT, who agreed to and annulled her wedding contract with Michel AUTEBOU (GODEBOUT) 8 Oct 1671, then 1/m the same man when the contract was revalidated 26 Oct 1671 at Quebec, and 2/m Andre PATRY 23 July 1675 at Quebec. Mlle. CARTOIS brought a dowry of 350 pounds, including the king's 50 pounds, to her first marriage.

Marie CHAMBOY (CHAMOIS), born at St. Jean en Greve of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Honore CHAMBOY, a king's secretary, and Jacqueline GIRARD, who agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Pierre FORCIER 26 Oct 1670, later married Francois FRIGON around 1672, probably at Batiscan.

Francoise CHARON, born at Moyse, near Brouage, Saintonge, widow of Michel BAURON who agreed to and annulled a wedding pact with Zacharie MAHEUST 19 April 1665; agreed to and annulled a marriage pact with Robert DE LA MARE 16 Nov 1667. She was 44 years old in 1665 indicating 'daughters of the king' were of all ages. She had a dowry of 800 pounds mentioned in her first contract and may have set her sights somewhat too high for the rude men of New France. She was listed as a

servant in Quebec in the census of 1667, then vanishes.

Marguerite CHARPENTIER, born at Meaux, Brie, daughter of the deceased Francois CHARPENTIER and Francoise GERMAIN, who agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Elie VOISIN 1 Oct 1668, then wed Rene MEUSNIER (LE MEUSNIER) dit LARAMEE 16 Oct 1668 at Quebec. Her dowry was 300 pounds.

Marie COIPEL, born at Paris, daughter of the deceased Jean COIPEL and Denise VALOIS, who agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Jean PHILIPPE 23 Sept 1669, then 1/m Guillaume FAGOT 21 Oct 1669 at Quebec; 2/m Claude RENARD dit DESLAURIERS 22 Nov 1677 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 500 pounds, including 50 pounds from the king.

Rose-Marie COLIN, born at Despinay, Burgundy, daughter of the deceased Pierre COLIN and Jeanne DUPOSTEAU, agreed to and annulled a marriage pact with Charles MILLOIN 3 Sep 1670. She then married Francois DE GUIRE in 1670 near Richelieu. She apparently had a dowry of 350 pounds, including 50 pounds from the king.

Jeanne COLLET, born at Orleans, daughter of the deceased Michel COLLET and Marie HENAULT, who signed, then annulled a wedding agreement with Mathieu BINET 5 Nov 1668, then married Gregoire SIMON 31 Dec 1668 at Montreal.

Catherine DE LAHOGUE (LALORE, LAWLOT), born at London, England, daughter of the deceased Philippe DE LAHOGUE and Catherine DESPRES, agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Louis LAVALLEE 17 Oct 1671. She married Louis BADAILLAC around 1671 near Sorel and had a dowry estimated at 350 pounds including 50 pounds from the king.

Charlotte DE LA RUE (LARUE), born at Beszee, Picardy, daughter of Georges DE LA RUE and Francoise NICOLARDEAU, who agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Pierre MASSE 11 Sept 1673, then 1/m Jean LAVANOIS (DUMANOY, SAVANOIS) 19 Sep 1673 at Quebec; 2/m Andre MORIN 26 Nov 1696 at Charlesbourg. She had a dowry of 200 pounds at her first marriage. Corrects errors in Tanguay.

Jeanne DE MARINNE, born at St. Germain l'Auxerrois of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of Jean DE MARINNE and Marie DE LA HAYE, who agreed and then annulled her wedding contract with Francois BIBAULT 29 Oct 1665. No further trace of her noted.

Francoise DE PITIE (PILLE), born at St. Nicolas of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of Francois DE PITIE and Claudine POULET, who agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Marin GERVAIS 5 Oct 1665, then married Antoine CASSE 14 Oct 1665.

Marie-Madeleine DESCHAMPS, born at Brouage, Saintonge, daughter of Etienne DESCHAMPS and the deceased Martine BUIERY, agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Jean BAROLLEAU 28 Sept 1670. No further trace of this woman.

Catherine (Marguerite) DE SEINE, born at Orleans, daughter of Pierre DE SEINE and the deceased Marguerite LEGER, who agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Julien HAULTBOYS 22 Sep 1672, then married Jean SENEAL 15 Oct 1672 at Montreal.

Louise DES GRANCES, born at Paris, the daughter of the deceased Denis DES GRANCES and Marguerite JOUANNE, agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Pierre SENAT 29 Sept 1669, then wed Louis DE L'ISLE 15 Oct 1669 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 100 pounds, including 50 from the king.

Francoise DESPORTES, born at Paris, daughter of the deceased Jean DESPORTES and Isabelle GIBNEUZE, who agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Francois DANIAU 24 Oct 1669, then married Pierre-Andre RENAULT-LOCAT Nov. 1669, around Quebec. She had a dowry of 250 pounds, including 50 from the king.

Jeanne DU BICOURT, born at Harle, Picardy, daughter of the deceased doctor, Albin DU BICOURT, and deceased Adrienne FANNIELLE (FAUVIELLE), who agreed to, then annulled a wedding pact with Pierre LE LAT 14 Nov 1669. No further trace of this woman.

Marie-Francoise DUBIE, born at Angers, Anjou, daughter of Francois DUBIE and Francoise LERNIEL, who agreed to and annulled a marriage contract with Jean

CHABAUDY (THIBAUDY) 11 Oct 1671. No further trace of this woman.

Marie DUBOIS (DUBOCT), born at Lisieux, Normandy, the daughter of the deceased Guillaume DUBOIS and Isabelle LASSEUR, who agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Etienne REVELLOS (ROUELLOS) 26 Aug 1670, later married Michel BROUILHET (BROUILLE) dit LAVIOLETTE in Nov. 1670 at Fort Chambly. She had a dowry of 350 pounds, including 50 from the king. Corrects error in Tanguay.

Marie DU COUDRAY, born at St. Sulpice of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Nicolas DU COUDRAY and Marie LARGNEE, who agreed to and annulled a wedding contract with Robert GALLIEN 28 Aug 1670, then married Francois GRENET 15 Sept 1670 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 450 pounds, including 50 from the king.

Marie DE MONMAINIER (DU MONT-MESMY, DE MONT-MESNIL, MONMENIER), born at Rouen, daughter of the deceased Michel DE MONMAINIER and Isabelle DE LA RIVIERE, who signed, then annulled a marriage agreement with Thomas GRANDERIE (GRANDRYE) 12 Oct 1665. She had an illegitimate daughter, Julienne, the daughter of Guillaume MORIN, born 19 Dec 1665. She 1/m Noel ROSE (LAROSE, ROYER) 7 Jan 1666 at Quebec; 2/m Francois DUMAS 25 Nov 1687 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 200 pounds at her first marriage. Corrects errors in Tanguay.

Francoise DUPRE, born at St. Vincent, Maine, daughter of Simon DUPRE and Desiree PINTIER, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Etienne BRILLIET 24 Sept 1669. She married Jean LOUBAT Oct. 1669. Her dowry of 150 pounds included 50 pounds from the king.

Francoise DUVAL, born at St. Severin of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Jean DUVAL and Jacqueline DION (DEVAU) who signed, then annulled a marriage agreement with Manuel TAVARI dit MINAULT 8 Sept 1670, then 1/m Pierre COURAULT (COULON) 16 Nov 1671 at Quebec; 2/m Antoine RENAUD dit LE TAMBOUR 12 Aug 1681 at Quebec; 3/m Francois RENAUD 10 Dec 1695. Her dowry of 450 pounds at her first marriage included 50 pounds from the king.

Marguerite DUVAL, born at St. Nicolas de Champs of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Jean DUVAL and Jacqueline DROT (DIOT), probably the sister of Francoise DUVAL and Madeleine DUVAL who married Jacques JOUBERT around 1672 near Montreal. Marguerite agreed to, then annulled a wedding pact with Jean OLLIVIER 25 Oct 1671. No further trace of this woman.

Lady Marie-Anne FIRMAN, daughter of Francois FIRMAN, lawyer, and Marie COYRIERT, who agreed to and annulled a marriage pact with Jean-Baptiste MORIN de ROCHEBELLE 18 Oct 1667. She had a dowry estimated at 600 pounds. An addition on the annulled contract indicates she returned to France. There was no further trace of this woman.

Jeanne FOSSE (DU FAUSSAY) born at St. Leger, Normandy, the daughter of Vincent FOSSE and Noelle DESNOYERS, agreed to, then annulled a marriage contract with Andre GARITEAU 7 Oct 1669; then a second with Pierre BUTAULT 15 April 1670; then married Louis DORE 1 Sept 1670 at Quebec. Her dowry of 200 pounds included 50 from the king.

Jeanne FRESSET, born at St. Nicolas des Champs of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Andre FRESSET and Marie AVISSE, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Etienne JACOB 31 Aug 1670; revalidated the contract 10 Oct 1670 and married Jacob 14 Oct 1670 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 850 pounds, including 50 from the king.

Catherine GATEAU (GASTEAU), born at St. Medard of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Odart GATEAU and deceased Genevieve DOUCET, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Abraham ALBERT 11 Oct 1671; signed, then annulled another wedding pact with Vivien JEAN 2 Nov 1671; then revalidated the contract with JEAN 19 Nov 1671 and married him 29 Nov 1671 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 350 pounds, including 50 from the king. Dumas says JEAN was the son of Vivien JEAN and Suzanne

daughter of the deceased Pierre GUBERT and Madeleine TURET, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Charles DAVENNE (DAVAISNE) 23 Aug 1670, then married Pierre GROSLEAU (GROLEAU) 8 Sept 1670 at Quebec.

Francoise GUILLIN, born at Aumaie, Normandy, daughter of Pierre GUILLIN, farm worker, and Antoinette LACROIX, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Gilles MASSON 14 Oct 1668; then married Andre TRAJOT 12 Dec 1668 at Montreal. She had a dowry estimated at 300 pounds.

Marie HALLAY, born at Chartres, Beauce, daughter of the deceased Pierre (Raoul) HALLAY and Marie VILLAY, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Aufray COULLON 28 Aug 1670; then married Bertrand COURTOIS 24 Aug 1671 at Quebec. Her dowry of 350 pounds included 50 pounds from the king.

Marie HARIOT (ARIOT), born at St. Martin, Beauce, daughter of the deceased Bernardin HARIOT and Marguerite DESLYS, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Claude REGNARD dit DESLAURIERS 16 Oct 1670; then married Rene VANDE 11 April 1671 at Quebec. Her dowry of 250 pounds included 50 from the king.

Francoise HERMEL (HERBERT, HUBERT, HERRUBEL, HERUBERT), born at Havre de Grace, Normandy, the daughter of Pierre HERMEL and the deceased Marie COQUEMER, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Martin GUERARD 18 Oct 1667; signed, then annulled another contract with Jean DE LALANDE 4 Nov 1667; then 1/m Jean Baptiste dit SAINT AMOUR 3 May 1668 at Quebec; 2/m Felix (Philippe) GUSELIER (GAZALIER) 23 Nov 1671 at Quebec. She had a dowry estimated at 300 pounds. Corrects Tanguay.

Marie HUE, born at Rouen, Normandy, daughter of Marc HUE and Marie CRESPIEN, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Adrien LACROIX 20 Oct 1667, then married Jean BOESME 7 Jan 1668 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 300 pounds.

Marguerite JASSELIN (CHASSELIN) born at St. Eustache of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of Jean JASSELIN and Catherine GILLET, signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Robert GAUMOND 8 Nov 1670. Only 14 then, she was 18 in 23 March 1674 when she had an illegitimate son, Jean, born 23 March 1674. She accused Francois CHAVIGNY de la CHEVROTIERE of fathering the child and the Provost court at Quebec ordered him to pay 200 pounds for the boy's upbringing. Mlle. JASSELIN 1/m Mathurin LELIEVRE 31 Oct 1676 at Lachine; 2/m Nicolas LEMOYNE 8 Jan 1684 at Lachine.

Renee LA BASTILLE, born at St. Severin of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Martin LA BASTILLE and Anne RUBUFEZ, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Pierre ROLANDEAU 20 July 1668. She married Rene GAULTIER dit LAROSE 11 April 1669 at St. Famille, giving birth three months later to a son, Jacques, whose father was named as Rene REAUME in his baptism certificat 26 July 1669 at Quebec.

Jeanne LABBE, born at St. Gilles of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Charles LABBE and Marie FRANCOIS, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Pierre MERCIER 22 Oct 1669. She married Jean HELIE 28 Nov 1669 (contract Becquet). Her dowry of 300 pounds included 50 from the king.

Suzanne LACROIX (DE LACROIX), born at St. Laurent of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Jacques LACROIX and the deceased Francoise PEROT, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Guillaume BERTREN 7 Nov 1669, then married Jacques SAVARIAUX 17 Oct 1672 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 250 pounds, including 50 from the king.

Catherine LAISNE, born at St. Croix, Normandy, the daughter of Jean LAISNE and Marie RENAULT, signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Jacques BLUTEAU 21 Oct 1671; then 1/m Etienne MESNY 23 Nov 1671 at St. Famille; 2/m Jean PARE 23 May 1709 at St. Famille. She had a dowry of 350 pounds, including 50 from the king, at her first marriage.

Marguerite LA PLACE (DE LA PLACE), born at Paris, daughter of the deceased Jean LA PLACE and Genevieve TROUVE, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Marin GERVAIS 19 Nov 1671; then 1/m Pierre LE SIEGE (LE CHARLE) around 1672 near Sorel; 2/m Pierre BREBANT dit LECOMTE 15 Sept 1687 at Montreal. Her first marriage dowry of 350 pounds included 50 from the king.

Elizabeth-Agnes LEFEBVRE, born at St. Gervais of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Guillaume LEFEBVRE and Barbe VIOT, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Nicolas NAUTEAU 31 Aug 1670, then married Francois-Louis THIBAUT 14 Oct 1670 at St. Anne du Petit-Cap. Her dowry of 250 pounds included 50 from the king.

Marie LE MOYNE, born at Poissy, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Louis LE MOYNE and Antoinette HEBERT, signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Pierre GUILBAULT 8 Nov 1665, then married Jacques DUHAULT dit PARIS 16 Nov 1665 at Quebec.

Antoinette LENOIR, born at St. Eustache of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Jean LENOIR and Antoinette SIROIS, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Julien MEUSNIER 29 Sept 1669, then married Jacques LE BEUF 29 Oct 1669 at Quebec. Her dowry of 350 pounds included 50 from the king.

Catherine LE ROUX, born at St. Sulpice of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Henri LE ROUX and Isabelle CHARDON, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Nicolas GOULET 3 Sept 1670; then married Rene GOULET 29 Oct 1670 at Chateau-Richer. She had a dowry of 850 pounds including 50 from the king.

Marguerite LE VAIGNEUR (LEVIGNEUX), born at Rouen, the daughter of Jean LE VAIGNEUR and the deceased Perette CAILLETOT, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Bernard DELPESCHES 25 Oct 1667; then married Leonard MONTREAU dit FRANCOEUR 1 March 1668 at Montreal.

Elizabeth MARCHAND (LE MARCHAND), born at St. Paul of Paris, Ile-de-France, the daughter of the deceased Jacques MARCHAND and Claude BIETTRY, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Pierre COEUR 8 Sept 1670; then signed and annulled a marriage contract with Sylvain LEVEAU 28 Sept 1670 before revalidating the contract with COEUR 5 Oct 1670 and marrying him 6 Oct 1670 at Quebec. Jeanne OLIVIER, born at Nantes, daughter of the deceased Claude OLIVIER and Catherine

MARSOLET, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jean FLEURICOURT 8 Oct 1671. She married Andre LEROUX 26 Oct 1671 at Quebec. Her dowry of 350 pounds included 50 from the king.

Marie-Marthe PAYEN, born at St. Benoit of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of Hilaire PAYEN and Marie GOSSELIN, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Paul TACONNET 30 Aug 1670. She married Mathurin CORNUE 6 Oct 1670 at Quebec. She had a dowry estimated at 350 pounds, including 50 from the king.

Marie PECHINA, born at St. Gervais of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased merchant Mathieu PECHINA and Antoinette GEROIS, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Pierre COUILLE 20 Sept 1671, then 1/m Guillaume GOUROT (BOURO) 11 Aug 1672 at Quebec; 2/m Adrien HAYOT 18 Feb 1686 at Quebec. Her dowry of 350 pounds at her first marriage included 50 pounds from the king. Corrects error in Tanguay.

Marie PETIT, born at St. Etienne des Gres of Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of the deceased Pierre PETIT and of Marguerite BLONDEAU, who signed, then annulled a contract of marriage with Louis DE L'ISLE 29 Sept 1669 before 1/m Christophe LAURENT dit CHAMPAGNE 29 Oct 1669 at Quebec; 2/m Jean COITEAU dit SAINT-JEAN around 1677 near Richelieu. Her first marriage dowry of 200 pounds included 50 from the king.

Anne PHILIPPE, born at Nogent-sur-Seine, Champagne, daughter of Jacques PHILIPPE and Anne AUDIGER, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Francois DESBAUPINS before 1/m Francois BACQUET dit LANONTAGNE 24 Nov 1671 at Quebec; 2/m Francois MARQUET 20 Sept 1709 at Quebec. Her dowry of 350 pounds at her first marriage included 50 from the king.

Marie-Madeleine PLOUART, born at Polet de St. Pierre, Normandy, daughter of the deceased Michel PLOUART and Jeanne FOUQUET, who signed a marriage contract with Jean COSSET 23 Nov 1667 which was annulled after COSSET apparently backed down. Mlle PLOUART took him to court which ordered COSSET to marry her but the two then annulled the pact and she married Jacques VIAU dit L'ESPERANCE 21 Jan 1670 at Montreal.

Her dowry, estimated at 1,000 pounds, included a gift of 50 pounds from the king.

Marie POUILLOT (LAISNE, PAVIOT), born at Neufville-Ferriere, Normandy, daughter of the deceased Jean POUILLOT and Anne BERTREN, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Jacques LE PREVOST 17 Oct 1667, before marrying Antoine Mondain MAY 1668 near Quebec.

Marguerite PROVOST, born at Rouen, daughter of Adrien PROVOST and Marguerite LE BLOND, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Thomas GASSE 2 Oct 1669 before marrying Martin POISSON in the Fall of 1669 near Quebec. Her dowry was estimated at 300 pounds including 50 from the king.

Jeanne RAMBAU, born at Poitiers, daughter of the deceased Jean RAMBAU and Nicole GROSSTIER, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Andre MORIN 28 July 1669 before marrying Etienne RAINBAULT around 1670 near Richelieu.

Jeanne RENARD (LECOINTE), born at St. Maclou de Rouen, Normandy, daughter of the deceased Jacob (Etienne) RENARD and of Marie LOUVET, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Barthelemy LE THELLIER 10 Dec 1671 before marrying Jacques DION (GUYON) 26 April 1672 at Quebec. Her dowry of 350 pounds included 50 from the king.

Anne RENAULT, born at Saumur, Anjou, daughter of the deceased Jean RENAULT and Catherine SAINT-AMOUR, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jean MERIENNE 23 Sept 1669 before marrying Jean LASPRON dit LACHARITE 7 Oct 1669 at

Quebec. Her dowry of 450 pounds included 50 from the king. Corrects Tanguay.

Jeanne RIGAU, born at Paris, the daughter of the deceased Andre RIGAU and of Francoise PERREN, she signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jean REAL 14 Oct 1671 before marrying Michel POIRIER (POTTIER, LAFRANCHISE) dit LANGEVIL around 1672 near Richelieu. Her dowry, estimated at 350 pounds, included 50 pounds from the king.

Catherine RIVET, born at Etampes, Beauce, daughter of the deceased Pierre RIVET and Marie SERGENT, who signed, then annulled a wedding contract with Jean HARDY 21 Dec 1665 before marrying Pierre DUCHESNE dit LAPIERRE January 1666 near Quebec. Her dowry was estimated at 200 pounds.

Therese SONNOIS, born at St. Germain, Burgundy, daughter of the deceased Nicolas SONNOIS and Robertte CHITTIE, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jean REAL 7 Oct 1671 before marrying Pierre VACHER 26 Oct 1671 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 350 pounds including 50 from the king. Widowed after having a daughter, Therese had a second daughter, this one the illegitimate offspring of her and Aimee LE COMPTE. She returned to France in 1674. Corrects Tanguay.

Anne TALBOT, born at St. Maclou of Rouen, Normandy, daughter of the deceased Eustache TALBOT and Marie DE LALONDE, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jean BAROLLEAU 13 Sept 1670 before marrying Jean GAREAU dit ST. ONGE 2 Nov 1670 at Boucherville. Her dowry of 350 pounds included 50 from the king.

Martine TAUREY, born at Orleans, daughter of the deceased Nicolas TAUREY and Marie MARGOT, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Pierre SASSEVILLE 23 Aug 1670 before marrying Nicolas MARGOTTE (MARQUOTTE) 14 Sept 1670 at Quebec. Her dowry of 300 pounds included 50 from the king.

Genevieve TESSIER, born at Troyes, Champagne, daughter of Nicolas TESSIER and Barbe GAUVRE, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Francois LEFOY 4 Oct 1672 before marrying Pierre DELBEC dit JOLY 4 July 1673 at Quebec. Her dowry of 250 pounds included 50 from the king.

Madeleine TISSERAN, born at St. Etienne de Liancourt, Picardy, the daughter of Louis TISSERAN and the deceased Louise d'ESTREE, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jean MORY 9 Sept 1673 before 1/m Pierre PARENTIEU 12 Sept 1673 at Quebec; 2/m Jean CHARPENTIER 27 July 1695 at Quebec. Her dowry at her first marriage was estimated at 200 pounds.

Perette VAILLANT, born at St. Germain l'Auxernois de Paris, Ile-de-France, daughter of Louis VAILLANT and Marie SAMSON, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jean DE LALANDE 13 Oct 1669. No further trace of this woman.

Cecile VALET (VALLEE), born at St. Remy, Normandy, the daughter of Thomas VALET and Cecile FALLANGE, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Pierre LEHOT 29 Sept 1669. The widow of Etienne d'ORANGE, Cecile VALET then married Michel DURAND 27 Oct 1669 at Quebec. Her dowry of 450 pounds included a gift of 50 pounds from the king.

Marie VAUQUET, born at St. Martin, Brie, daughter of the deceased Francois VAUQUET and Marie POTONNIER, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Aubain MAUDON 28 Sept 1670 before marrying Guillaume D'ORILLARD 7 Oct 1670 at Quebec. She had a dowry of 350 pounds, including 50 from the king.

Marie VERGER, born at Angers, the daughter of the deceased Francois VERGER and Michelle CUREL, who signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Pierre LEHAT 24 Aug 1670 before marrying Jean HUS (JUCQ, JUE) 15 Sept 1670 at Quebec. Her dowry of 250 pounds included 50 from the king.

Catherine VERRIER, born at Crestieul, Normandy, the daughter of Jean VERRIER and the deceased Agnes BRIQUET, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Julien TALLENA 20 Sept 1669 before marrying Pierre RONDEAU 30 Sept 1669 at St. Famille. She had a dowry of 250 pounds including 50 from the king.

Marguerite VIART, born at Brie-Comte-Robert, Brie, the daughter of the deceased Pierre VIART and Marie NOBLAIR, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Simon DAVAULT 15 Oct 1671. No further trace of this woman.

Anne VUIDEAU, born at St. Sorbin of Marennes, Saintonge, daughter of Jacques VUIDEAU and Marie CHAUVELLETTE, signed, then annulled a marriage contract with Jacques LOYSEAU 3 Nov 1663, before 1/m Jean JOUINEAU 26 Feb 1664 at Quebec; 2/m Etienne BLANCHON dit LA ROSE 30 June 1676 at Quebec. Corrects Tanguay.

She has mentioned a few items that answered questions I had been harboring about research in the Maritimes. Although I question some points regarding research in Ontario and Quebec, they are minor. Each issue contains records pertaining to a particular state and the index to which state is featured in which volume appears inside the cover. Membership, including the quarterly, is \$5.00 per year. Write the Society at P.O. Box 335, Paradise, CA 95969.

**DIRECTORY OF GENEALOGICAL SOCIETIES IN THE USA AND CANADA 1976.** The primary purpose is to list all of the genealogical societies, and include a listing of the many independent genealogical periodicals. There are separate sections showing each category. 73 pages include index. A 1978 revised Directory is planned. This is a very good reference source if you wish to know whether or not a society exists in your area of interest. Available for \$5.00 from Mary K. **REDWOOD RESEARCHER** - published by The Redwood Genealogical Society, Inc., Box 645 Fortuna, CA 95540. Vol. IX, No. 1 contains 1880 census of Bald Hills & Orleans Bar, biographical sketches from the History of Humboldt County, 1915, lineages, Bible records, queries, and is indexed. Price does not appear on title page, but you may write them at the above address.

**MELANGES GENEALOGIQUES, CAHIER II** is another excellent work by Raymond Gingras, 39 ouest, St-Cyrille, Apt-5, Quebec 6, Quebec. This blend of research information is in French and contains a genealogical code of ethics, a dictionary of terminology, and models of various methods of showing your "Family Tree". I have learned the definitions of some confusing terms, such as the degree of consanguinity. This knowledgeable and thorough genealogist always has much to offer, and if you read French, or do well with the dictionary, you should have his works in your library.

**L'ANCETRE** is the bulletin of the Société de Généalogie de Quebec. In their second year of publication, Volume 2 contained a series of the baptisms of N-D, Quebec 1621-1700. The table of contents of issues is very diverse and too lengthy to be printed here. There were 492 pages in Vol. 2, and they publish 10 times a year (in French) information for the French-Canadian researcher. \$10.00 per year for membership from the Société at c.p. 2234, Quebec 2e, Quebec G1K 7N8.

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# NEWS FROM THE PARISH REGISTER FRONT

The members of the French-Canadian subsection of the Minnesota Genealogical Society have been busy. Perhaps some time in the near future, some of the marriages and other vital church records will be available to forge that all-important link back to Québec. Two projects are currently in the mill.

Members of the group living in Somerset, WI, have been hard at work on the registers of St. Anne's Church. This old French community is one of the most important for Minnesota and Wisconsin French families, many of whom started here after the ancestors immigrated from Québec. More on this project later.

The other project going on seems to be mushrooming into quite a large one. It all started when a little bit of luck and unusual circumstances made it possible for us to get our hands on a Xerox copy of the complete registers (baptisms, marriages, burials, confirmations, and first communions) of the church of St. John the Baptist, Hugo, MN. These are now in the process of being compiled into usable, alphabetical form. In addition, about 40 years of registers from St. Genevieve church, Centerville, MN, have also been obtained with the blessing of the Priest. These include the period of the late 1800s up to 1900. They are also being compiled, and will be included with the Hugo registers, since they are neighboring parishes, and the same families populate both.

Some time ago, copies of some of the registers from St. John the Baptist church in Little Canada, MN, another neighboring parish, were donated to the Minnesota Historical Society, and we hope to include this information as well. In addition, several persons in the group who have done genealogical work on families in this area, have generously let us copy what they have done. This has served to bring together many of the families in the registers and add information on ancestors and descendants not from the parishes. What is emerging from this might very well be a book of genealogies and miscellaneous information about the French and related families of Hugo-Centerville-Little Canada-White Bear-Vadnais Heights area.

Now we need some help from any readers who would be willing to give us added data. Do you do research on families from the Northern St. Paul, MN suburbs? This would include families from: Hugo, Centerville, Little Canada, White Bear Lake, Vadnais Heights, North St. Paul, Mahtomedi, Forest Lake, Maplewood, Stillwater.

If you have information on families from this area, mainly French ones, although many non-French families have French forebears on the maternal side, please send it along to us so it can be included.
