If possible, all manuscripts, queries and news items should be in a form for immediate use. Manuscripts should be fully referenced and signed.

ARTICLES published in the S.G.S Bulletin may be reprinted freely, except for copyright material reproduced from other sources. A credit line will be appreciated. A copy of the publication containing the material is requested.

OPINIONS EXPRESSED in articles by contributing writers do not necessarily represent the point of view of the S.G.S. Authors will be responsible for their statements and errors.

MEMBERSHIP is for the 1983 calendar year at \$15.00 per family, \$12.00 for senior citizens. Subscription to the BULLETIN is concurrent with membership.

PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

Christmas is history for another year. It is a great time for us to reach out and keep in touch with our family members. The amateur family historian looks forward to receiving Christmas cards complete with a note giving details on changes that have occurred during the past year in each family. Leaving out details on the weather. Even if the letter or note is a photo-copy of an original, it is still more welcome than a signed card with no message.

Christmas is also a time to attempt any scheme that may pry information out of reluctant family members. Perhaps you have a name that is a little different or unusual and you have been involved in an half hearted try at a "one name study". We get involved with these studies almost without trying by taking notes on the name every time we find it, whether in a telephone directory or some more elegant repository. Inevitably someone will produce a list of names and addresses of people who live in some far off part of the world and ask "are they ours?" or "who are they?". I have found that letters sent off simply asking who they are, are almost 100% ineffective.

Several years ago Dirk Hoogeveen suggested that a Christmas card sent off in plenty of time, with my name and address clearly indicated and the words "We would love to hear from you", would likely be a bit more successful. It worked. Christmas cards sent off to New South Wales brought somewhere around a 25% rate of reply. One was from the granddaughter of one of the recipients who had married a farmer and lived in a rather isolated area. She was a delightful letter writer and was most curious about farming in Canada. That fall a relative of hers appeared at our door with her new Canadian husband to stay a weekend. They now live in Calgary. I was less successful with cards sent to Western Australia a year ago in 1983, but we did receive a cheery note this year to make the stamp investment well worth while.

This type of investigation is fine where you have a dozen or so families of your name interest to write to in a city or a country. My maternal side consists of names like Lewis, Thomas, David, Davis, and Hughes. I would need a fortune to pursue that line of discovery.

One of our members, Roger Wooff was able to send a Swedish relative off with a several meter long print out from his computer of just names, dates and indicated generations. His relatives reply to this "gold mine" was an equally long list of corrections and additions. I understand her visit was unexpected. No doubt Roger had a great deal of satisfaction out of being able to provide this print-out at a few moments notice. Those many interesting hours spent carefully entering all his family data was made just a little bit more worth while.

Sometimes we have to be quite resourceful in obtaining and sharing information. I am sure some of our members have some ingenious ideas of their own that have been effective. I would like to hear about them.

ANNUAL REPORT

1984

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SASKATCHEWAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, HELD IN THE CHURCH OF CHRIST, WEYBURN, ON OCTOBER 22, 1983.

The meeting was called to order by President Robert Pittendrigh who presented his annual report.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were approved as circulated, following motion by Dirk Hoogeveen, seconded by Evelyn Ballard.

The Nominating Committee presented the following slate of officers:

President	Robert Pittendrigh
Vice-President	Roger Wooff
Membership Secretary	Eileen Condon
Recording Secretary	Elsie Browder
Treasurer	Beth White
Directors (retiring 1985)	Laura Coates Leith Shearer

Moved by Beth White, seconded by Linda Stewart, and approved, that the membership fees remain at \$15.00 for regular members and \$12.00 for Senior Citizens.

The rest of the meeting was spent on the Constitution revision with the following results:

The Non-profit Corporations Act 1981, now maintains Articles of Continuance as their only legal document concerning the affairs of non-profit organizations such as the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society. Any additions or deletions must be adopted at our annual meeting. The Constitution and By-laws are now considered by the Non-profit Corporations Branch as a guideline for our own use.

The following amendments have been requested by that department:

- Membership:
 - Ordinary membership may be extended to any person interested in promoting the purposes of the Society on payment of the annual fee.
 - Senior citizen membership fee may be set by the annual meeting at a rate lower than the ordinary membership.
 - Life memberships may be granted to any person on payment of a fee of not less than two hundred dollars (\$200). Such Life Membership being subject to the same conditions and privileges as defined for the Ordinary Membership.
 - Honorary Memberships and Honorary Officerships may be conferred upon members who have been of special service to the Society or who have been, in the opinion of the membership, worthy of recognition for their contribution to the cause of genealogy in general.
- There shall be from six to thirty Directors, six of which shall be elected for a three year term, with two retiring each year, and the remaining directors shall include the chairperson or representative of each Branch to be elected for a term of at least one year. Any Director may be elected for a second term.
- The Officers of the Society shall be: President, one or more Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Editor of Publications, Librarian, and Archivist and Membership Secretary. The Officers and Directors together shall constitute the Board of Directors of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society.

Moved by Roger Wooff, seconded by Ethel Arnot, and approved, that these sections be maintained.

We have been requested to make certain changes in our Constitution and By-laws to meet the needs of changing times. The following changes have been recommended by the Constitution Committee and notice is hereby given that the proposed changes will be presented at, and voted on, at the Annual Meeting:

- Where the words "Executive Committee" appear, the words "Board of Directors" shall be substituted.

Moved by Dirk Hooegeveen, seconded by Laura Hanowski, and approved, that this change be accepted.

2. Section III, Membership: sub. 5: "Corporate Membership may be granted by the Executive Committee to any other Organization or Society which is interested in promoting the purposes of this Society and where appropriate this will be on the basis of mutual affiliation, with exchange of publications and notices of activities; the matter of fee payable being determined on the merits of the case by the executive.

(a) In the event of any Society admitted to Corporate Membership sending a representative to any general meeting or seminar of this Society, such representative will be accorded all the privileges normally granted to members, except that of voting or standing for election of officers."

It is recommended that Section III, sub.5, be deleted.

Moved by Laura Coates, seconded by Marjorie Thomas, and approved, that this section be deleted.

3. Section III, Membership: sub.6: "Fellowships may be conferred by the Society, by election at any general meeting, upon any member of the Society who has been a member in good standing for at least three years and has rendered exceptional service to the cause of genealogy in Saskatchewan or in the promotion of the Society in particular."

It is recommended that Section III, sub.6 be deleted.

Moved by Laura Coates, seconded by Ken Aitken, and approved that this section be deleted.

4. Section III, Membership: sub.7: "Life Memberships may be granted to any person on payment of a fee of not less than One Hundred Dollars; such Life Membership being subject to the same conditions and privileges defined in paragraphs 2 and 4 of this article."

It is recommended that the fee be changed to Two Hundred Dollars.

Moved by Dirk Hooegeveen, seconded by Ken Aitken, and approved, that this change be made.

5. Officers and Election: sub.1: It is recommended that a Membership Secretary be added to the list of officers.

Moved by Laura Coated, seconded by Marjorie Thomas, and approved that this change be made.

6. Section IV, Officers and Election: sub.2: "There shall be six directors, each elected to a three year term, with two retiring each year."

It is recommended that this subsection be changed to read: "There shall be from six to thirty directors, six of which shall be elected for a three year term, with two retiring each year, and the remaining directors shall include the chairperson or representative of each Branch, to be elected for a term of at least one year. Any director may be elected for a second term."

Moved by Jack Arnot, seconded by Eileen Zamulinski, and approved that the latter part of this section read: "chairman or representative elected by each Branch."

Moved by Roger Wooff, seconded by Marie Svedahl, and approved, that the subsection be accepted after this change in wording has been made.

7. Section V, Meetings: sub.5: "At any General Meeting of the Society a quorum shall consist of not less than two percent of the total paid membership resident in Saskatchewan at the time of the meeting."

It is recommended that this subsection be deleted and the following substituted: "At any General Meeting of the Society a quorum shall consist of all members in good standing of the Society present at the meeting."

Moved by Barbara Dreher, seconded by Dirk Hooegeveen, and approved, that this change be made.

8. Section VI, Branches: sub.1: "Any five or more members of the Society may apply to the Board of Directors for recognition as a local Branch of the Society."

It is recommended that the following be added to this subsection: "Only members in good standing of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society are eligible for membership in a Branch."

Moved by Ethel Arnot, seconded by Beth White, and approved, that this addition be made to the subsection.

9. Section IX, Dissolution: It is recommended that the following under a new subsection 2 be added: "Each Branch shall have the option to continue as a separate entity with the permission of the last meeting of the Board of Directors of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society."

Moved by Ethel Arnot, seconded by Dirk Hoogeveen, and approved, that this new subsection be tabled for further consideration.

RECOMMENDED CHANGES TO THE BY-LAWS OF THE SASKATCHEWAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY:

Article II, Membership Fees sub. 1: "The membership fees shall be set by the annual meeting of the S.G.S. and may be collected by each Branch with fees forwarded along with the membership list to the Society. Individuals may send their membership fee directly to the S.G.S.. The membership fees of \$12.50 or \$10.00 for Senior Citizens were set by the 1978 annual meeting. Any Branch may levy additional fees upon its members as may be prescribed by the Branch."

It is recommended that the sentence concerning fees set in 1978 be deleted and the following substituted: "A Senior Citizen's membership fee may be set by the annual meeting at a rate lower than the ordinary membership."

Moved by Ken Aitken, seconded by Marjorie Thomas, and approved, that this change be made in the subsection.

Article III, Directors sub. 1(a): "A president, one or more vice presidents, secretary, treasurer, corresponding secretary and membership secretary elected at the annual meeting."

It is recommended that sub. 1(a) read as above to concur with the Constitution.

Moved by Roger Wooff, seconded by Valerie Lewis, and approved, that this be done.

Article III, Directors sub. 1(b): "At least four other Directors elected to a two year term, with two retiring each year."

It is recommended that the above read: "at least six other Directors elected to a three year term with two retiring each year."

Moved by Roger Wooff, seconded by Valerie Lewis, and approved, that this change be made.

Article III, Directors sub. 6: "A majority of Directors personally present shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of a meeting of the Board of Directors."

It is recommended that this subsection be deleted and the following substituted: "A minimum of seven members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of a meeting of the Board of Directors."

Moved by Dirk Hoogeveen, seconded by Laura Hanowski, and approved, that this change be made.

Article V Duties of Officers sub. 3: "The Recording Secretary shall record the minutes of the Society and conduct all correspondence."

It is recommended that the word "all" be deleted and the words "as necessary" be inserted after the word correspondence.

Moved by Dirk Hoogeveen, seconded by Laura Hanowski, and approved, that this change be made.

Article V Duties of Officers sub. 4: "The Membership Secretary shall keep a list of all members and send a copy of the list to all directors and branches. The Membership Secretary shall be responsible for distribution of the Bulletin."

It is recommended that the word "send" be deleted and the word "supply" substituted. Also, the last sentence be deleted.

Moved by Roger Wooff, seconded by Marjorie Thomas, and approved, that these changes be made.

Article VII sub. 1: "The seal of the Society shall be in the custody of the Recording Secretary or other person as may be designated by the Board of Directors, and all papers or documents required to be sealed on behalf of the Society shall be sealed in the presence of the President and the Secretary or other such persons as may be designate by resolution of the Board of Directors.

It is recommended that this whole subsection be deleted.

Moved by Ken Aitken, seconded by Marion Ghiglione, and approved that this Article be tabled for future consideration.

Article IX Branches sub. 1: "Any group of five or more interested in genealogy may become an affiliate as a Branch of the Society upon application for membership, payment of the prescribed membership fees and approval of its application by the Directors."

It is recommended that this be deleted and the following be substituted: "Any five or more members of the Society may apply to the Board of Directors for recognition as a local Branch of the Society. Only members in good standing of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society are eligible for membership in a Branch."

Moved by Ethel Arnot, seconded by Barbara Dreher, and approved, that this change be made.

The meeting then adjourned.

1984 ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP REPORT

LIBRARY REPORT

Extensive use was made of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society Library both in person and by mail over the last year. Eight branches made arrangements to spend time at the library as a group while many members visited on their own. One thousand three hundred books were mailed to out-of-town members and three hundred and ninety-one inquiries were answered. In addition five branches made arrangements to pick up the microfiche collection and have it for the use of their members over a weekend. I also took the microfiche collection to the Grasslands Branch for a day in Hazenmore and a day at Mankota. We look forward to being able to do more of this in the next year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Marge Thomas for taking charge of the IGI and the Ontario Land Record Index. Marge has done 87 mail-in requests, helped with 151 in-person requests and most importantly of all printed 3115 pages of these records for members. Special thanks also go to Marie Svedahl for volunteering to look after the Griffiths Valuation collection. Marie had now had a chance to do six extensive searches.

We would like to thank the Saskatchewan Council of Cultural Organizations for the grant of \$3000 which enabled us to purchase the IGI, the Indirect Hamburg Passenger Index and Lists for 1889-1910 and the Griffiths Valuations. We have just been informed that we will be receiving \$4000 for this coming year. Part of this will be used to purchase the update of the IGI which will increase that collection from 5431 to 7618 fiche. Once the update becomes available early in 1985 we will place the original collection in the floater collection. The other major project for this year will be an update of the Library Holdings List. The remainder of the grant will be used to add books to the floater collection and add new materials to our general collection.

Once again I would like to thank those of you who have donated copies of your own genealogies or local histories to our library. Special thanks must go to Lilly Corson and Lee Sherlock. Lilly has indexed a number of books which she has borrowed from our library and has kept us well stocked with book bags which she has collected from various businesses in Plenty. Lee keeps up the periodical index. Have you checked it lately to see if anyone has written an article about your family or about the areas you are searching? Last but not least I would like to thank all members who use the library, return books promptly and make donations to help with the postal costs. The annual inventory check showed only six books missing and hopefully they will find their way back shortly!!

The above address was given to me in July 1984 by a member of Intourist, the tourism agency of the U.S.S.R. It is the address of the International Red Cross organization in Moscow, whose task is to provide assistance in finding lost family members or relatives in the Soviet Union. Anyone from all over the world is welcome to write in any language, giving as much information as possible so that assistance can be provided.

Once contact with relatives has been established, there is the language barrier. Many of the people of German origin are still acquainted with their mother tongue, and correspondence can be carried on freely. However, as in North America, the use of German is rapidly disappearing and the younger generation is familiar only with the Russian language.

If you are a participant in a group tour of the Soviet Union, the opportunities for family history research are very limited. Usually the length of stay at any one location is one or two days, barely enough time to see some of the main places of interest. This will include many museums of every description, but never archives nor historical libraries. The majority of fellow tour members are not concerned about searching for ancestors; which is also true for most family members all over the world.

Certainly, you are most welcome to forego some sight seeing and visit any of the local archives in the Soviet Union, but it would be a waste of your time, unless you are familiar with the Russian language. About the only way to visit the archives is to travel alone, hire an interpreter, and stay for an extended period of time. This can be done through Intourist, providing you can afford the very high cost.

THE INDIRECT HAMBURG PASSENGER SHIP INDEX AND LISTS

The Saskatchewan Genealogical Society has recently purchased the Indirect Hamburg Passenger Ship Index and Lists on microfilm. These lists can be an excellent genealogical tool as the German authorities kept records of the departure of each person from a German port. These lists provide the passenger's name, hometown, age, and occupation.

European emigrants who left from Hamburg could go directly from Hamburg to their new home, which usually meant New York City. These people can be found on the "direct" Hamburg passenger lists. Those found on the "indirect" lists chose the less expensive route which meant they travelled from Hamburg to Hull, England, where they switched to overland travel, crossing west to Liverpool to book passage to North America. Other indirect routes used by immigrants were Glasgow, London and Antwerp.

Indirect passenger lists and indexes were kept for the years 1854-1910. The indexes are complete but their use can be time consuming unless a date of departure is known. This is because the indexes are arranged chronologically by date of departure and alphabetically according to the first letter of the surname of the head of the household.

For example: Box 1, Indirect Index 1855-1865

It would be arranged first alphabetically by first letter of the surname and then chronologically for that letter.

Once you find a name look for the number after it as that will help you find the name on the list film. It would also be a good idea to make note of the month as the lists are found in chronological order on the list film starting with January or whatever month each film starts with. If you do not find the name you are looking for consider the following factors. First, many emigrants changed their names or the spelling of their names when they reached their new home or agents were unable to spell the names of the passengers so spelled them according to the way they sounded. Wives and children are not indexed so you need to check for spouses, parents or guardians.

NOTE that each letter was only allotted a certain number of pages. When these pages were used up, the overflow names were continued under a letter of the alphabet that was not used much that year. When this practice occurs it may or may not be indicated in the index. Therefore, search at the end of other letters of the alphabet if you do not find your ancestor's name where it should be. If your ancestor is not on the Indirect list check the direct list as they may have departed directly.

The Saskatchewan Genealogical Society has the complete run of the Index to the Indirect Hamburg Passenger Lists from 1855-1910. However, we only have the copies of the Lists from 1910 back to January 1882. We will be adding to this collection as funds become available.

POLICY FOR USE OF THE INDIRECT PASSENGER SHIP INDEX AND LISTS:

There will be a \$1.00 per time charge for members to search these records in person, but the Society will also do searches for out-of-town members. The fee for this will be \$10.00 to check the Index and the Lists. This will include up to 2 hours of searching. We will also advise on printing costs should we find your names on the list. Printing will cost 25 cents per copy. It takes 2 copies for each page of film.

The lists generally give surname, christian name, all who travelled as one household with their ages, original home, state or country of origin, plus their destination in North America. All are written in German but are fairly easy to read.

HUGUENOT HERITAGE 1685-1985

THE NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY
Fourth Annual Conference
Report by Dirk HOOGEVEEN and Robert PITTENDRIGH

In May of 1984 Dirk HOOGEVEEN and Robert PITTENDRIGH travelled to San Francisco to attend the fourth annual conference of the National Genealogical Society. This conference was hosted by the Napa Valley Genealogical and Biographical Society and was held from 24 to 26 May. The conference was held in the Sheraton Palace Hotel which was over 110 years old. This hotel was completely renovated and restored to the style of the turn of the century. It was an appropriate setting for a conference of this nature.

The conference covered many topics that are related to genealogy, from the use of computers, reference libraries, orientation of volunteers to Federal (U.S.A.) Archive records. There were many rooms set aside for the many exhibits. These exhibits could only be examined in detail with the utmost of determination because of their great variety. Many well known authors in the genealogical field were present at the conference.

Because so many sessions were taking place simultaneously, it was impossible to attend them all. We decided to attend the sessions that were of most interest to members of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society. The sessions were attended by either Hoogeveen or Pittendrigh. We felt the sessions were all well presented with excellent planning. All events ran very close to a pre-planned schedule.

One of the first and most interesting sessions we attended was the comparison of major genealogical programs for personal computers. Six programs on the market were compared and all the characteristics of each program were discussed. It was evident that each computer program for genealogy has its own character and programming, for genealogy is an art. The programs require a very good knowledge of genealogical research and record keeping needs, and from the comparison of the programs we found that there is a great diversity in the way records are kept and stored. All these programs from various companies have several items in common. The companies also have things in common in that they have newsletters, customer nurturing, updating of versions, and printing features. It was suggested by one of the speakers that you buy the program first and choose the computer last.

We also attended the first annual dinner meeting of the N.G.S. computer interest group. Jimmy PARKER of the Genealogical Society of Utah was the speaker. He covered a whole field of genealogy and how computers have tied them together. There was a lively, interesting discussion at our table on the various computers and word process programs being used. The general consensus was to buy a good quality printer.

Jimmy PARKER expressed the importance of cooperation between academia and the genealogist because many fields are of interest to both, such as genetic research, medical research, etc..

Another lecture attended was on how to make genealogical meetings sparkle. Marion BEASLEY humorously told us about family trees that produce lumber and less that produce nuts. Many suggestions were good: make a meeting enjoyable to come to, use humour, poke fun at yourself, recognize people for their achievements, have surprises, acknowledge donations at meetings, give handouts, have a surname roster and allow time for people to share their successes.

Motivating The Next Generation was another lecture attended. It was pointed out by Wendy C. ELLIOTT that youth should be effectively involved to generate interest, involvement and commitment. This program should be aimed at librarians, schools, historical societies and genealogical societies so their original purposes and aims can be merged. Sponsoring youth to a conference with an adult was a suggestion to further a youth's interest. Genealogy can be taught from many approaches such as English, social studies and math since they are all related to genealogy.

There seems to be a great interest in passenger ship lists. Ship lists and manifests are being published in many volumes for just about all national origins. W. FILBY, in an article in July 1983 issue of The Genealogical Helper, gave a synopsis of work being done in that field. These published passenger lists were covered in a special session by William FILBY and Carl BOYER 3rd.

There was a most interesting session by Ann BUDD and Bette ROOT on the pros and cons of certifying teachers of genealogy. Recognized qualifications will enhance the stature of the teacher whether in credentials, improvement of self image or credibility. It would seem to be advantageous to be able to produce a proof of proper credentials for a teacher of genealogy, when he or she is approached to give a class. Some cons were also pointed out. If one is licensed, there is not a guarantee that he will continue to produce at a high standard. The next question was, who would keep the certification program going? The foregoing assumes that a central body would be crediting these teachers. The question arises, what body? A community college, a genealogical society or a university?

It was found from past experience that a person with enthusiasm and a deep involvement in genealogy is very often better able to teach a genealogy class than a highly qualified professional teacher not particularly interested in genealogy. It is desirable that a genealogical society be involved in establishing classes so the material will relate to the particular area.

Mr. Roger LARRIEUX gave a presentation on genealogical research in depositories in France (1551-1880). This was an extremely informative lecture on the history, content and organization of the Archives in France. Mr. LARRIEUX's permission is being sought to print his presentation in one of the future issues of the SGS Bulletin.

In the session on motivating genealogical society volunteers by Edwinna BIEMAN, it was pointed out that most of the members like to be part of an organization that not only aids you in finding your ancestors - but works to preserve all records for the future making volunteer work most satisfactory.

A point that was driven home was that new members must be given a new members packet, even if they are rather expensive. The advantages far out weigh the disadvantages. People like to be part of an organization and like to contribute. Work has to be delegated.

A number of sessions were held on the evaluation of evidence by John Frederick DORMAN and Milton RUBINCAM. All genealogical research is based on evidence and, according to Noel STEVENSON (author of Genealogical Evidence, see library holdings), is simply information. The information may be correct or false, but it is that which one may accept or reject partially or in full. Evidence is further divided into direct or indirect evidence, hearsay, legal and proof. This was a very interesting session. The book by Noel STEVENSON,

which is in the SGS library, is highly recommended on this subject.

We enjoyed the wind up banquet in the huge Garden Court dining room of the hotel. Louis L'AMOUR, the famous writer of western fiction, was the guest speaker. This rapid fire presentation was a great collection of fascinating historical facts on the old west in the U.S.A.. He tied in many of these events of the wild west to the family and genealogy. He indicated that at the times of the wagon trains people had to have money before they made the trek westward. Money was needed to purchase draft animals, a specially built wagon, about a year's supply of food, as well as incidentals.

For most people living in the west the wild west stories and events which really did happen were rather remote. The complexity of the west changed with the coming of the railway.

There were many more sessions which could not be attended because of time limitation. These sessions in general dealt with areas of research in the U.S.A. which are of limited interest to most of the SGS. The taped records for each session are available from Triad, 700 S. 5th, Pekin, Illinois 61554, U.S.A. at about \$5.00 each U.S. funds.

It was an excellent opportunity to see San Francisco, which we tried to do. Fisherman's Warf and China Town, the Golden Gate Bridge on Sunday, where we visited the SS Jeremiah O'Brien, the last unaltered Liberty Ship built in 1944. It was an enjoyable trip. We are glad to have had the opportunity to attend this conference.

"RESEARCH AID"

The newly established Historic Emigration office at the Museum of Hamburg History in Hamburg, Germany has put on microfilm passenger lists containing the names of five million emigrants to the United States who left through the port city of Hamburg between the years 1850 and 1914. The lists contain the names of each person aboard..husband, wife, children, and other family members traveling with them, ages, occupations where applicable, and the last place of residence. With the name of the locality where the emigrant lived, searchers can often obtain further information through church registries. The lists also contain the names of many from Poland, Romania, Hungary and Austria.

There is a fee of \$30 for processing an inquiry, plus \$10 for each additional year the researchers must check if the exact year of emigration is not known.

PASSENGER LIST RESOURCES AT THE PUBLIC ARCHIVES OF CANADA

(Colonial Office (C.O.) Records, Groups 384 & 385)

There is such an enormous quantity of documentation contained within the C.O. collection that the present Inventory (MG 11) is inadequate in directory detail. Consequently, it is difficult to find specific references of interest, and the searcher usually has to exercise intuition and imagination in determining which subject groupings might yield relevant information. The value of two such Groups, C.O. 384 and 385, is discussed for passenger information.

C.O. 384 - This grouping pertains to correspondence of the Secretary of State on immigration for the period 1817-1857. It is available on microfilm (60 reels) covering Volumes 1-99. It consists of lists of immigrants (mainly Irish) and entry books relating to emigration, letters from persons requesting grants of land and assisted emigration to British North America. Finding Aid 418 covers C.O. 384, but here are some samples of the content:

Vol. 1, pp. 129-133 (Reel B-876): Hugh Cochran, Hull, 2nd June 1817 to the Right Hon. Earl Bathurst - includes a page listing of passengers' names.

Vol. 1, pp. 178-187: A return of Protestant families preparing to emigrate from the Counties Carlow and Wexford (Ireland) in the spring (29 Nov. 1817) - names of 710 families, 4070 individuals with 1100 able bodied men.

Vol. 1, pp. 188-192: List of R.C. families preparing to emigrate from Counties Carlow and Wexford in the spring (Nov 1817).

Vol. 3, pp. 60-63 (Reel B-877): List of Settlers with wives and children embarked on board the Brig "Carlow" of 200 tons at Greenoch the 21st July 1818 destined for Montreal.

Vol. 3, pp. 66-67: A list of Settlers with their wives and children embarked on board the Sophia of 230 tons at Greenoch the 26th July 1818 destined for Montreal.

The quality of microfilming is exceptionally poor such that most frames can be read only with the greatest difficulty. It is particularly fortunate, therefore, that a complete extraction of all passenger names to be found in the C.O. 384 Passenger Lists has been made with referencing and compiled alphabetically as Finding Aid 647 (bound). This is truly a monumental work, and one, it would seem is not widely appreciated. Finding Aid 647, therefore, should be consulted first at the P.A.C., and if a name of interest is found, then the microfilm could be examined for verification and possible additional detail.

C.O. 385 - This grouping consists of Entry Book records pertaining to Emigration. Volume 2 is most pertinent in providing a general list of settlers enrolled for Canada under the Government Regulations published at Edinburgh by authority and dated 22 Feb. and 24th March 1815. Only this listing from Vol. 2 has been made available at P.A.C. in the form of photostats (24pp); other portions of Vol. 2 as well as other volumes of C.O. 385 are available on microfilm.

MG 11, C.O. 385, Vol. 2 (Selections, 24pp): A list of 757 persons, 699 of which embarked for Quebec in 1815 on board the transports ATLAS, DOROTHY, BALTIC, MERCHANT and ELIZA from Scotland. The return is very detailed providing Date of Certificate, Name of Applicant, Names of Relations of Applicant, Trade, Profession or Occupation, Former Trade If Changed, Present Place of Residence, Applicant's Age and Where Born (Scot., Eng., Ire.), Whether Married, Single or Widow, Wives Ages, Number Brothers and Sisters (above or/and under 16), Number of Children, Grand-Children, etc. including Remarks.

RUSSIAN EMBASSY RECORDS:

(This notice written by Wyn WELTON appeared in BRANCH NOTES, Vol. 12, No. 4, Waterloo-Wellington Branch, O.G.S.)

"In the spring of 1980 the Archives of Canada acquired 100 boxes of Canadian Immigration records which had been sent to New York when the Russian Embassy closed its consulate in 1922.

"For thousands of Canadians of Armenian, Doukhobor, Estonian, Finnish, Georgian, Jewish, Latvian, Lithuanian, Mennonite, Polish, Russian and Ukrainian origin a rich new source of genealogical material is available.

"Information available includes: places of origin, dates of arrival in Canada, education, names of next of kin, ownership of property, and value of estates left behind.

"I have been keeping in touch with Myron MOMRYK of the Ethnic Archives Section of the PAC. He is responsible for indexing this collection and developing a finding aid. Because of the personal and confidential nature of the material in this collection, the PAC has not yet developed a policy in respect of researchers. However, Mr MOMRYK indicates that they are now in a position to reply to written inquiries whether or not particular names appear in the preliminary nominal lists created to date. Strong evidence of family relationship is required.

"I suggest a copy of your pedigree or a photostat of a certificate should be sent along with your letter of inquiry.

GERMANS FROM RUSSIA WHO CAME FROM GALICIA, BUKOWINA AND NORTHERN BESSARABIA

(This presentation was prepared and given by Henry G. MEYER at the 15th International Convention of A.H.S.G.R. which was held in Regina, Sask. on the 29 June 1984. It is published here with the kind permission of Mr. MEYER.)

Until recently very little attention has been given by North American genealogical societies to the thousands of Germans who established settlements in and around the Austro-Hungarian crownlands of Galicia and Bukowina. These people had the same roots and with few exceptions, their story parallels that of the more familiar so-called "Germans from Russia".

Geography and History of the Area

Map #1 shows the Austro-Hungarian Empire at its greatest height in the year 1914. The top right-hand area of the map shows the geographic position of Galicia and Bukowina within the Empire. Bessarabia was never a part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

Research in the areas of Galicia and Bukowina prior to 1806 comes under the Holy Roman Empire ruled by the House of Hapsburg. From 1806 to 1866 these two areas were under the Austrian Empire and from 1867 to 1918 they were part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

Map #2 shows how the crownlands of Galicia and Bukowina were connected to northern Bessarabia. Also identified on this map are the territories that lie outside the borders of these three regions.

Galicia

In the first partition of Poland in 1772, Galicia went to Austria who at that time was the ruler of the Holy Roman Empire. In 1918 it was returned to Poland and in 1939 the eastern half went to Russia, while Germany occupied the western half. The chief city of Galicia was Lemberg (now called Lvov).

Bukowina

Prior to 1775 Bukowina was part of the principality of Moldavia which was controlled by the Turks. Turkey ceded the territory of Bukowina to Austria in 1775. In 1918 it became a part of Roumania. Following World War II, northern Bukowina went to Russia while the southern part remained Roumanian. The chief city of the crownland of Bukowina was Czernowitz.

Bessarabia

From 1503 to 1812 Bessarabia was governed by Turkey. From 1812 to World War I it was controlled by Russia. In 1918 it was given to Roumania and then back to Russia in 1940. The chief city of Bessarabia was Kischinew.

Why did so many Germans Migrate to Eastern Europe?

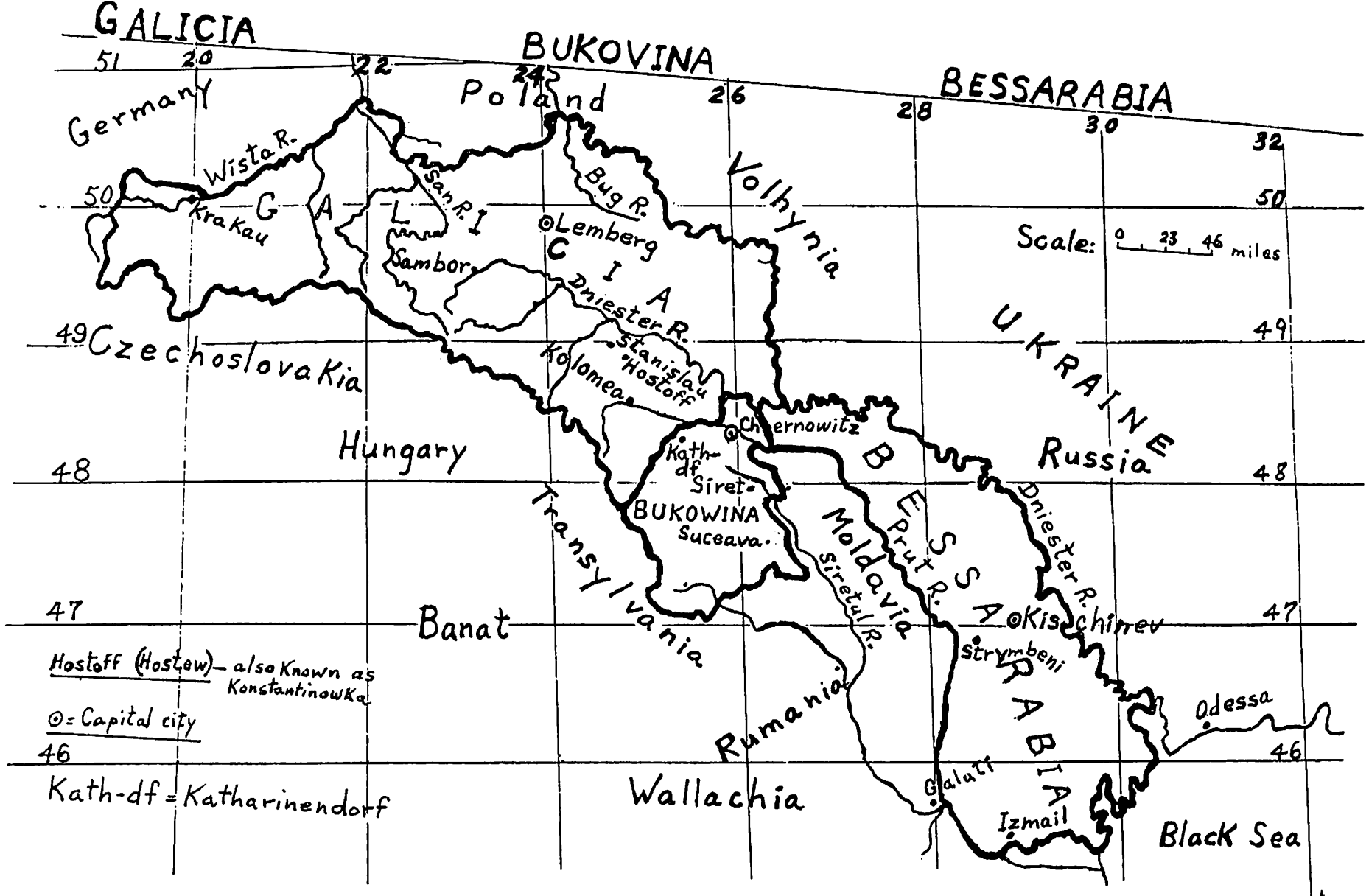
Basically, two things bring about a great wave of migration: (1) dissatisfaction with conditions in your homeland and (2) a better place (or at least the promise of a better place) to go to.

In the middle and later 1700's Germany was overcrowded. Economic conditions were bad. Many people were living in abject poverty. There was not enough land to go around. If you add to that the constant political and religious strife, there was good reason for the people to be dissatisfied.

With the acquisition by Austria of Galicia in 1772 and Bukowina in 1775, Joseph II of Austria began to look to Germany for colonists to settle these two areas. They were to provide an object lesson in farming to these native people. As inducement for the people to come, Joseph issued a proclamation which promised free land, a farm house and equipment, freedom of religion, military exemption for the oldest son of the family, free transportation from Vienna to the place of settlement and a ten year exemption from taxes in the new land.

Those Germans who heeded the Emperor's call came almost exclusively from south-west Germany - the provinces of Rhenish Palatinate, Wurtemberg and Hesse. They settled in various parts of Galicia with the greatest density of settlements around Lemberg, then south to the Ugartsthal-Landestreu area and finally southeastward to Kolomea. The book Heimat Galizien by Kraemer lists over 350 German settlements in Galicia. Not all of these were begun by German colonists. Some were established Polish and Ukrainian villages in which significant numbers of Germans found homes after acquiring land nearby.

Map #3 of Galicia shows very clearly where in Galicia that most of the German colonists settled.

By about 1850 good land in Galicia became scarce and so the descendents of the original German settlers in Galicia looked to the south and east for new frontiers. Some went from their Galician villages directly to northern Bessarabia and founded settlements there. A much larger number found new homes in Bukowina and from here in the later 1800's many of them joined their counterparts from Galicia in northern Bessarabia.

Map #4 shows the German settlements that were established in Bukowina.

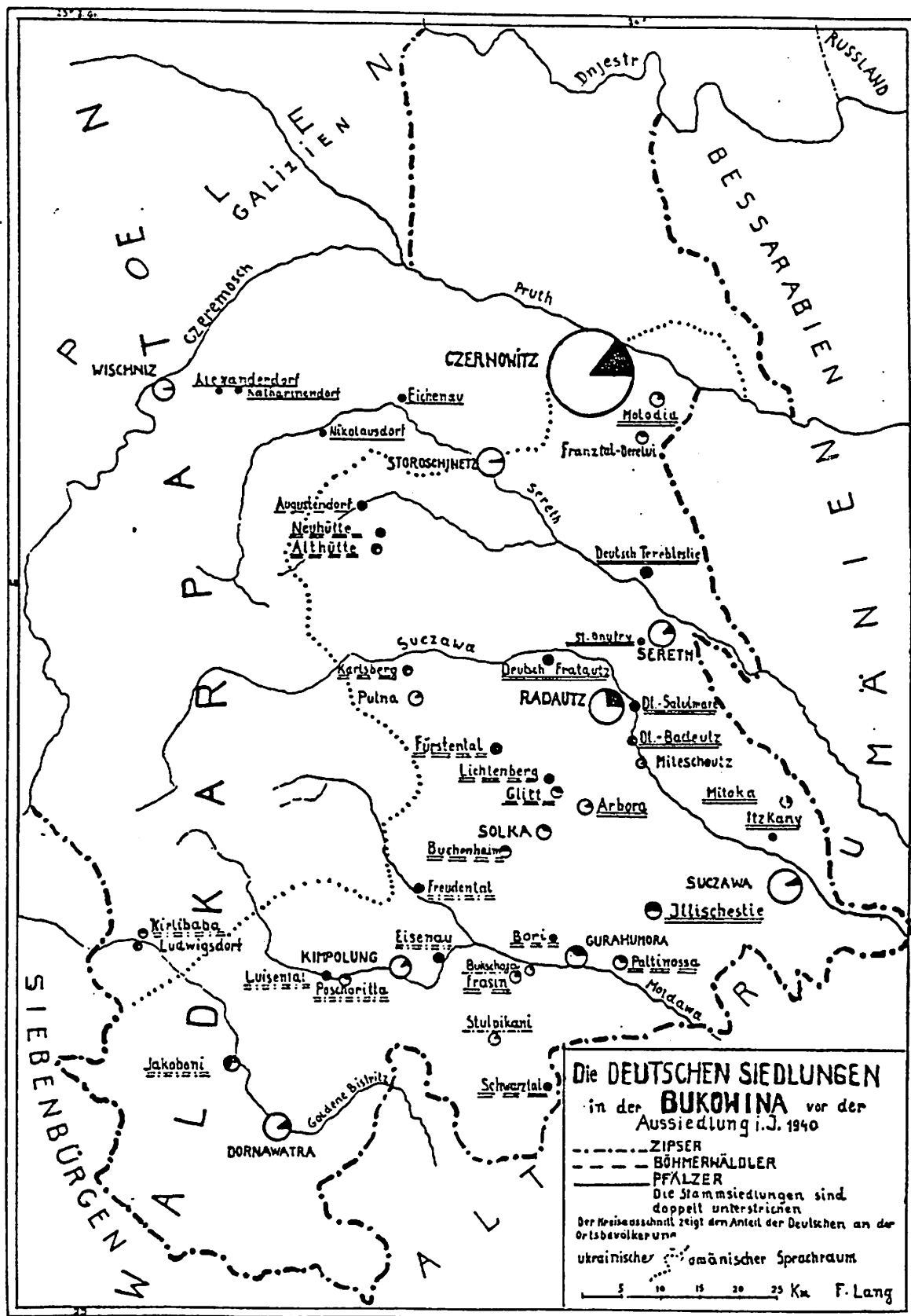
Map #5 shows the German villages that were established in northern Bessarabia. By 'northern Bessarabia' I mean that region between the Prut (Pruth) and Dniester Rivers, and north of 46°45'.

An article in the Volkskalender für Bessarabia 1927 claims these Germans in northern Bessarabia at first were not aware of the Germans who lived south of them near the Black Sea. Not until some years later when several of them set out looking for better breeding stock to improve their horse herds, did they come back from the markets of Tarutino and Arzis with stories of these people. They told of the mighty brick buildings they saw and of the stout, giant-like people in this 'Schlaraffenland', who lived on nothing but speck, wurst and schinken. This of course was not a true description of the Black Sea Germans. It was merely an exaggerated impression these poorer people to the north were left with. A fairly close translation of Schlaraffenland would be - land of plenty. Speck is bacon, wurst is sausage and schinken are hams.

The remainder of the story of these people is the same as that of all other Germans who had migrated to various other parts of eastern Europe and Russia. In the late 1800's and early 1900's many came to the Americas. Those who remained behind suffered great hardships and loss of life in the two World Wars. In the re-settlement during World War II, they were resettled first of all in German-occupied Poland and then finally in Germany, the country from which their ancestors had sought refuge many years before.

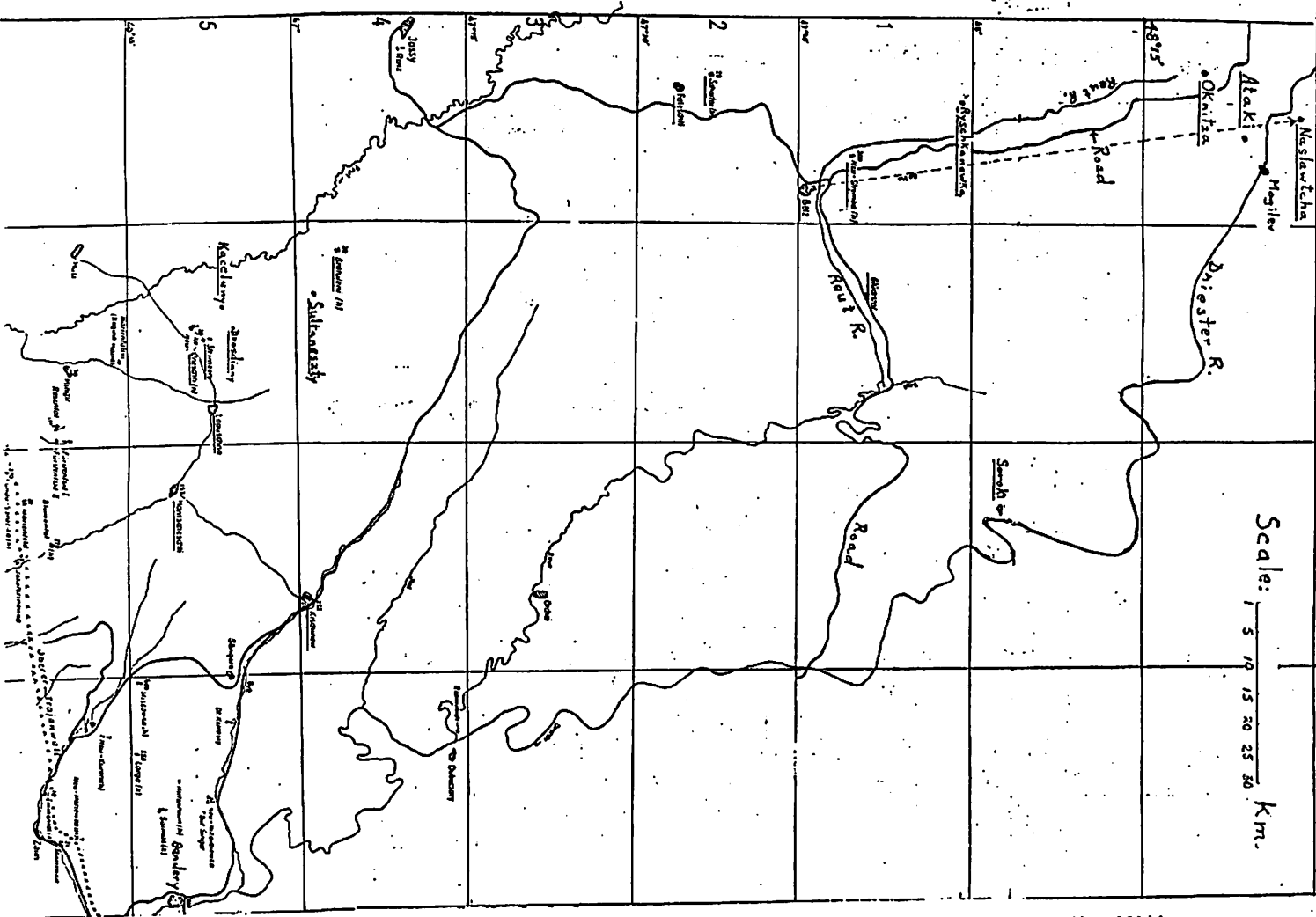

BOOK REVIEW

James B. Casey, editor. LIBBY PRISON AUTOGRAPH BOOK, JANUARY-FEBRUARY 1864. Salt Lake City, Utah: Utah Genealogical Association, 1984. 57 pages. (Available from UGA, P.O. Box 1144, Salt Lake City, Utah 84110, price \$10.00)

Thousands of prisoners were held in Confederate and Union prisons during the Civil War. From one of these, the Confederate's Libby Prison at Richmond, Virginia, comes this rare and valuable document which provides data on Union officers, from 21 states, imprisoned there early in 1864. They were captured at Gettysburg, Chickamauga, and smaller battles.

One prisoner, Lieutenant Alexander Addison Taylor, turned his small notebook into an autograph book. During January and February 1864, 282 Union officers imprisoned with him signed the book by writing their names, ranks, units and home addresses. Their ink was barely dry when, on February 8-9, more than 100 of them escaped by tunneling out (about 50 were recaptured).

Lt. Taylor escaped in 1864 and rejoined his regiment. He put a binding on the fragile book. After his death in 1908, this book was purchased and donated to the Western Reserve Historical Society, where it currently is housed.

The editor, James B. Casey, is Head Librarian at the Ohio State Historical Society. He presents the autograph book's information in alphabetical order, and then adds to it data he culled from other sources that tells when the officers enlisted or were mustered in, promoted, wounded, captured, transferred, paroled, escaped, recaptured, discharged, mustered out, or died.

Also valuable is Casey's 5 page bibliography listing sources he consulted that deal with individual military units, veteran records, and prison life.

Mr. Casey intends this reference booklet of 57 pages to give researchers the new Libby data to help them locate more definitive information in the Military Service Records division of the National Archives and other Civil War sources.

This autograph book is a valuable reference tool that deserves to be in libraries and archives which have Civil War collections. It is a credit to Mr. Casey's editing and research skills and to its publisher, the Utah Genealogical Association.

3. The correspondent will be informed of and required to pay for xeroxing costs and additional postal and mailing fees before any material is sent.
4. Non-member requests will be handled if the information desired is readily available by consulting our card files or if the writer asks for advice only.
5. Members are entitled to a more in-depth search than non-members.
6. More complex requests that involve checking of archival, public or Legislative Library records will be undertaken for a \$10 fee, paid in advance. Remember, an unsuccessful search takes as long as a successful one.

I.G.I. SEARCH POLICY, January 1984

1. ONLY MEMBERS of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society may search the I.G.I. BUT only for their own genealogical purposes.
2. Those members who wish to use the I.G.I. in person are charged a \$1 fee for each time they wish to search it. The Society will make prints of any of the material they wish at a cost of 25 cents per page.
3. The Society offers a search service for those members who cannot do their own. For a fee of \$3 we will search up to five names provided a specific location is given. Included with this fee would be a print of five pages. Additional location searches are \$1 per name plus one print.

We will advise you on the numbers of pages available when they go beyond the limit and will attempt to estimate the postage costs. We require a surname, the given name AND a specific location. For example: We need a specific county for England and the Scandinavian countries; a state or province for Canada and the U.S.A.; a duchy for Germany unless it is after 1918. Ireland and Scotland do not require a county.

4. This policy will change as time goes, should costs increase.

SURNAME FILE -- PRE-1900

1. Submit as many names as you have with as much information as you have about each name, preferably with all the information as shown below.
2. Use first and middle names.
3. Put children's names on back of card. If they have families submit cards for them also.
4. If you type, please type your cards as shown on 3X5 file cards.
5. If you are unable to type your own cards PRINT the information in the same format and we will type the cards for you.
6. Be sure to include your own name and address and notify us of changes in the future.
7. If you wish us to check the file for names, send a stamped, self-addressed envelope if you expect a reply.
