

The BULLETIN is published quarterly. Deadlines for material presented for publication will be 15 December, 15 April, 15 July, and 15 October. All material should be sent to the Editor. If possible, all manuscripts, queries and news items should be in a form for immediate use. Manuscripts should be fully referenced and signed.

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MEMBERSHIP is for the 1983 calendar year at \$15.00 per family, \$12.00 for senior citizens. Subscription to the BULLETIN is concurrent with membership.

QUERIES of reasonable length are published gratis for members. Non members may submit queries up to sixty (60) words in length for a fee of \$5.00.

A limited number of back copies of the Bulletin are available. Please write for quotations.

DONATIONS to the S.G.S. may be used as a charitable tax deduction.

## PAST PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

The Prince Albert Branch of the S.G.S. must be congratulated on the fine job they did of hosting the 1985 annual meeting and seminar. This was a first for them, and they did a fine job. The Will Inn was most certainly well suited to a conference such as ours. The friendly and gracious attitude of the Prince Albert Branch put everyone at ease in short time.

We were all sorry to see Elsie Browder give up her position as recording secretary. She was one of the very first to join the Society in 1969. At that time she was living in South Dakota, when a friend sent her a clipping from the Leader Post announcing the SGS. Her membership fee was in the next mail to Regina. She made the trip to Regina to speak to our group about librarians and genealogy about a year later. When Elsie decided to retire from her career as a librarian she chose Regina to relocate. We asked her to be our recording secretary very shortly after she arrived, and she happily agreed. She has always been very enthusiastic about our group and has been a pillar of strength to all the members of the Board. Elsie still intends to keep a finger on the activities of the SGS by being involved in the Cemetery Project. Thanks very much Elsie.

It was good to see people travel considerable distance to attend the seminar. I really appreciated the large attendance at our short Board meeting and the all important Annual Meeting. It came as good news that we will be able to fund mileage for people coming to Board meetings during 1986. The proposal was put forward by Laura Hanowski that she would open the Library on a Friday night and perhaps a Saturday morning for folk coming to a board meeting that would be held on Saturday afternoon. The idea will be tried and a policy developed.

Many exciting things have happened during the last year. Perhaps more than in the whole history of our Society. Our funding has increased beyond our wildest dreams, we have moved our library into a very suitable, spacious area on the second floor of 1870 Lorne Street in Regina. It is open during office hours and we have two half time staff members. We also have a telephone of our own. By the time this issue of the Bulletin arrives in your mail box, we will have had an official opening with lots of publicity and public exposure. Laura Honowski and Marg Thomas need a lot of credit for all the work they have done in putting this whole library project into place. We now have the best genealogical library in Canada and the most accessible of any, because we lend. We have almost eight hundred square feet of space which appears will soon become crowded.

We now have sixteen branches of the S.G.S. with a membership which increased from 523 to 681. This increase was beyond our predicted increase, likely due to the efforts of our two librarians in making the library accesible to everyone in Saskatchewan. Laura Hanowski and Ken Aitken have been doing some instructing too, which has helped promote our Society.

I have just finished my term as president. I have enjoyed it very much, and I extend my sincere thanks to all who were such a help in promoting the ends of the Society. Laura Coates with her keen insight in financial matters was very important to all of us. I especially thank all the members of the Board for their cooperation, enthusiasm, dedication and sense of humour. I am not going to disappear from the scene as I intend to be involved in family history for some time yet. The people you meet in a genealogical society are really great.



## THE IGI AND YOU

by Laura Hanowski

1. What is the International Genealogical Index?

It is an index of deceased individuals.

2. Who and when may we find in the IGI?

Names extracted from parish registers of individuals born or christened 110 years ago or married 95 years ago.

Names of people for whom temple ordinances have been performed.

3. Where do you find the IGI?

Genealogical Society Library in Salt Lake City, stake libraries or in family history society libraries who have received permission to purchase it provided they insure that ONLY members of that family history society be allowed to use it and then ONLY to do their own research.

4. Why does it exist?

It was set up to help members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints carry out their own genealogical responsibilities.

### Sample Page From IGI

What do we find?

1. Region: North America, Kentucky.

2. Date and page: Feb. 1975, page 2757.

3. Name of individual, sex or relationship.

4. Name of parents or spouse.

5. Type of event: generally birth/christening or marriage.

: however, for this sheet we see wills (W) and census (N).

These would be people who submitted records being used to establish family relationships and ages in lieu of other certificates.

6. Locality where event is recorded.

7. Date of baptism, endowment or sealing ordinance along with the temple where it was performed.

8. Source where this information was recorded from. First the batch number then the page in the record. The batch number is then checked in the batch number file to find the film/book number where this information is found.

### Before We Use the IGI We Need to Know:

1. All names are for deceased persons.

2. If the names are submitted they are likely for direct ancestor lines.

3. For extractions they were born 110 years ago (1981 edition born before 1871) or married 95 years ago (married before 1886 in 1981 edition).

That means we have to know our ancestors back to that point before we can link up to parish extractions or submissions.

Evaluation mark. Means that some part of the entry has been evaluated and may have been altered.

## How Can We Use What We Find?

Names: other spellings of the surname and under what spelling we may find the name. Indicated by a \*.

ie. \*Rayner - see Raynor  
\*Raynes - see Rains  
\*Raynor

Note for the 11 Reneer names there are 6 different spellings all in alphabetical order by Christian name.

Go down to Razar and note the different possible spellings and where to look for them. However, there are only 2 spellings recorded.

Within this listing though you will find 4 George's which are placed in chronological order (1811-1850).

In order then to find which one could be ours we need to check to see what event is being recorded, when and where.

First let's check out George & Mary to see if any of their children are listed. To do this we would look for George & Mary Ward under the Father/Mother column. ....NO.

Then do the same for the George & Ellinder Lemasters and George & Eleanor Lemaster. ....NO.

However, we do see an Adam Razor m Martha Lemaster: 18 Sept 1811 in Henry and another listing of 18 Sept 1811 in Shelby.

Then check on George W, whose father William was recorded in the Bath 1850 census. We then look for a listing for William and find a William m Permelia Barnes, 03 Nov 1877 in Bath. While there could be a possibility that this is his father it definitely isn't his mother.

Now let's check for other children of William as recorded from the 1850 census of Bath County.

We now have what looks like the marriage of two sisters to two brothers as well as a family group for William and 6 children without a mother.

But, where did this information come from?

These batch numbers now confirm some family groupings because they are from the same in-put source. Of course, you also remember that they would generally be direct-line ancestors.

Next step is to check the Ordinance Records.

Here we find that the dates are fairly recent.

#### Rules to Know for IGI Purposes:

1. For baptism: Need to live beyond the age of 8 or it says "Infant".
2. Endowment: Need to live beyond the age of 8 and be dead at least one year before the Endowment can be performed. (This can give you a clue about a death date.
3. Sealing to Parents or Spouse: takes place after death UNLESS, as a living person, you are present at the Temple. THEN you would be in the Living Temple Records file but not the IGI.
4. You are sealed to your parents as the child part of any entry or family group form.
5. If the child is dead but the parents are still living the words "Parents living" will appear in the Sealing column (living because no death date is known).
6. Sealing to Spouse: Need to have been dead for at least one year before the ordinance is performed.

What to do with all this Information Before Charting it as Yours.

Check the Batch-Number Index for the INPUT Source and to see if there is a computer print-out available.

1. In the case of the extraction batch numbers: you could then check the batch in-put source fiche for a film number. Remember you already know the page number. Then you can either have a print made of that entry in Salt Lake or order in the reel and check it yourself.

2. In the case of the all digit batch numbers: again check the fiche for a film number then either order a copy of that page, which would give you the name and address of the person submitting the information or order in the reel at the nearest stake library and see what information was on all the sheets of that batch.

\*\*\* All digit batch numbers indicate that this information was submitted by an individual who probably submitted his family for Ordinance purposes. Let's take #7112525 as an example. The first 2 numbers indicate the year the information was submitted: in this case 1971. The next 3 numbers indicate the day of the year: in this case the 125th day. The final number indicates the number of the individual who submitted information that day. Under serial sheet we will find the page/sheet number where we would find that particular person.

\*\*\* If, after the year, the numbers are beyond 352 you know that the information submitted contains information about people who are still living. In which case you would need to search the records yourself in Salt Lake or have a search made for you by a person with access to this information in Salt Lake. You need to show a direct ancestor connection first and then pay a small search fee (\$1.00).

\*\*\* Submissions are the facts as presented by that individual for ordinance work. It's a good idea to double check the sources. There are errors in the IGI. Once all the information is on computer there will be a way to correct these errors if they can be proven.

You have now checked the IGI carefully and have not found any information about your ancestors. Before you give up totally be sure to check the Parish and Vital Record Fiche to see just what information they MAY have for your area of interest.

1. These are listed alphabetically by country and location and then chronologically by record source.
2. By checking these you may discover that they have films from the area you are interested in but have, as yet, not extracted the records OR they have only extracted some of the records.
3. In any event you may wish to examine the records yourself either in person at the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City or by ordering them to your nearest stake library. In Saskatchewan these are located in Saskatoon, Moose Jaw and Regina. There is a fee to have them brought to a stake library. It is under \$5 for a 6 month borrowing period. You would need to view the film at the stake library. Any prints you would require would be made in Salt Lake. It is also possible for you to donate funds so the branch library can purchase the film and have it on permanent loan for you.

## ONE SEARCH FOR A JUVENILE EMIGRANT (PART 2)

The article which was published in the previous article of the Bulletin regarding my father-in-law, John CONDON, was a summary of my research during the five years ending in the fall of 1984. I had not made any further progress at the time the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society sponsored a research trip to Salt Lake City in May 1985. I went with a long list of specific searches in mind, and once again started with the Civil Registration Indexes for England and Wales.

### Marriage of Thomas CONDON and Mary MILLER (nee RODGERS)

The marriage record of John's parents still eluded me, so I searched the indexes again (for the fourth time!). In addition to again checking possible misspellings of CONDON (such as London, Landon, Lardon, Lordon, Gendon, Gerdon, Gordon, Gondon, Gandon, Gardon, Conlin, etc.), I also searched every name which began with the letter 'C' for any possibility. But I could not find any matching entries of bride and groom, or even a possibility for Thomas. Since Mary's name is more common, several references were found that occurred in the specific time period (1871-1874) that were possibilities, so I decided to order these marriage certificates even though I did not have a corresponding entry for a groom, and could only list a bride's name on the requisition. Certificates which are ordered from England through Salt Lake City are mailed directly to your home several weeks later, so it is a matter of waiting and hoping!

### 1861 Census

From the marriage certificate for Mary's first marriage (to Charles MILLER on 3 March 1861), I now had a specific address to search on the 1861 Census records. The 1861 Census was taken on April 7th, so I hoped to find the couple at that address or nearby. When searching census records in an urban area such as Liverpool, it is helpful and time-saving to consult the street index. The street index for this census of Liverpool is on microfilm and when I tried to find the listing for Jordan Street, I was disappointed to find that the entire 'J' section had been omitted. The staff in Salt Lake City were equally surprised! All was not lost, though, since I had a detailed map of the area and could easily look up adjacent streets to find the enumeration district and hence the correct microfilm number.

A word about maps. In my experience, it is absolutely essential to have detailed maps of the areas you are researching. The larger the scale -- the better; the closer to the time period -- the better. Until you fully understand the geographical area involved, you are at a disadvantage when it comes to the actual research. Finding the names of godparents, marriage witnesses, or other family members in the immediate neighborhood often contributes to the proof of a certain event.

The 1861 Census of Liverpool listed two households living at 26 Jordan Street. The first was comprised of a married woman, her three children, two boarders (sailor brothers from Norway), and a 17-year-old servant girl. The second household (in the cellar) were Hugh and Margaret ROGERS (both born in Ireland) and their young son. The name caught my attention and could be a relative, although I would expect to find any of Mary's siblings to be born in Liverpool,

as she apparently was. However, the name of the servant girl was Ann JONES -- and one of the witnesses at Charles and Mary's marriage had been an Ann JONES. The same person! Probably. Why was her address given by both parties as their place of residence? Where did they live after the marriage? I later learned that their first child was born at a Jordan Street address, so it is likely that they were in the area somewhere. When time permits, I will have to do a street-by-street search of the entire area and beyond, in an effort to find them.

The search of the immediate neighborhood proved interesting. Living next door at 28 Jordan Street were five families, mostly of Irish origin. A lodger with the fourth family was 60-year-old Catherine RODGERS, married, born in County Down, Ireland. I think this is probably John's grandmother. The age, birthplace, marital status, neighborhood, etc. match the 1871 Census data. Living in the cellar at 24 Jordan Street was a young couple: Hugh RODGERS (25 years old, born in Liverpool, a cooper), his 23-year-old wife Catharine (born in Dublin, Ireland), and a 60-year-old widowed aunt born in Ireland. Is it possible that there is a connection here? Could Hugh be an older brother to 21-year-old Mary RODGERS? They were both born in Liverpool; however, it will be necessary to find the marriage record of Mary's parents (Owen RODGERS and Catherine ???), before siblings can be determined.

In order to better interpret the census records, it is necessary to understand as fully as possible what this area of Liverpool and its people were like at this period in history. Thousands of Irish immigrants poured into England at the time of the famine in Ireland.

"In 1841 it was estimated that over 400,000 inhabitants of Great Britain had been born in Ireland; many more tens of thousands were born in Britain of Irish parentage. The great majority of these were Catholics, and among the poorest-paid labourers; most of them lived in London and in the industrial towns. In Liverpool and Manchester anything between one-fifth and one-third of the working population was Irish." (1)

In Liverpool these lower working -class people were crowded into tenements and courts in an area near the dockyards where many of them worked. Many of the men were sailors or had other sea-related occupations. The women were fruit vendors, factory workers, charwomen, servants, etc. It must be remembered when relying on listed occupations on census records, that a respectable-sounding occupation did not always reflect the actual situation. This holds true for any census, any country and any time period. An understanding of living conditions in the area of interest will help to evaluate and interpret the census. It is sometimes necessary to read between the lines!

So my area of interest was at that time a crowded, impoverished, working-class neighborhood close the harbor and docks. There were many Irish and other immigrants and it was a difficult life. Infant mortality was extremely high. Adult mortality was high as well, and in the late 1870's in this area, the life expectancy for a male was 38 years. The head of the household in many instances was a widow. You will also find many households with a married woman listed as head of the household. This was partially due to the fact that so many of the

men, being sailors, were often away from home. Also, sometimes the husband lodged nearer his place of work, while the wife and children lived elsewhere. Life was especially difficult for the children. One child in four did not reach its first birthday. One out of every two babies born in Liverpool at this time died before reaching the age of eleven.

Another difficulty in tracing these families is that they were very mobile. They moved from place to place easily if conditions were a bit better somewhere else. Their possessions were few and probably could be carried relatively simply. They moved, sometimes only a few doors away, to evade debt-collectors, or were evicted. Life was extremely harsh and they struggled to survive. They were not always able to register births, be officially married, etc. It is surprising that any record of their lives exists at all!

#### Birth of Thomas MILLER

The birth of John's half-brother was another source of information, so I again searched the Civil Registration Indexes. Working backwards from his age on the 1871 Census (8 years), the date of his parents' marriage (1861), and the census indication that he was born in Liverpool, I searched the years 1861-1864. The name is fairly common, but I found three possibilities and again ordered certificates for all three.

#### Marriage of Owen RODGERS and Catherine ???

I searched the indexes from 1837-1842 (calculating their daughter Mary to be born c1839). For events occurring prior to 1837, it is necessary to use other sources. I checked Boyd's Marriage Indexes, 1st and 2nd series, which have separate indexes for brides and grooms. I did not find the marriage. However, since Boyd's Indexes do not include most of the Liverpool parishes (according to The Phillimore Atlas and Index of Parish Registers, which is in the SGS Library), I was not too surprised at my findings. If Mary was born in Liverpool, it is possible that their marriage occurred there also. Parish records will have to be searched for this marriage; the civil registration indexes should be re-checked; Scotland and Ireland records must be considered; and any other existing sources must be investigated. Catherine's maiden name would be a big help!

#### Death of Catherine RODGERS

Since Catherine was listed on the 1871 Census (taken April 2nd), I began my search in that year, concentrating on Liverpool entries. Finding nothing by 1877, and remembering that English death certificates do not usually provide much genealogical information, I abandoned this search for the time being. Our Salt Lake City trip was coming to an end.

#### 1881 Census

I started a street-by-street search for any mention of these people. I also checked carefully all hospitals, institutions, schools, orphanages, the Liverpool Workhouse, etc. Knowing that John emigrated to Canada in 1884 at the age of 11, it was likely that in 1881 he could have already been under the guardianship of the authorities, possibly the Liverpool Catholic Children's Protective Society, which had been listed on the passenger list as the sponsor of the group of one hundred children with which he had sailed. After many

hours of searching, it was with great excitement that I found the following household listed among the five families at 19 Simpson Street:

Catherine RODGERS	Head	Wid	80	--	Ireland
Thomas MILLER	Grandson	Unm	20	Dock Labourer	Lancs. Liverpool
John CONDON	Grandson	Unm	8	Scholar	Lancs. Liverpool

Simpson Street is in the immediate vicinity and intersects with Jordan Street! This entry, if I accept it to be the correct one, leads to many questions. Where was Mary, the boys' mother? Where was Thomas CONDON, John's father? Were they both dead? Had one or both of them abandoned the family? Were they living elsewhere? And what was life like for this hardy old Irish grandmother raising an 8-year-old in difficult circumstances, with Thomas' wages probably the only means of support for the family? But, despite the questions, the entry also provided answers, and I had another specific date to work with. The fact that Thomas was working, and that John was apparently attending school, provided more insight into their way of life.

I found this entry approximately one hour before we had to leave the Library in Salt Lake City for our return bus trip to Regina! Time was running out, so I once again turned to the Death Indexes to see if Catherine had died soon after the census taken that year on April 3rd.

#### Death of Catherine RODGERS

I began searching the indexes beginning in 1881 and onwards. An entry in the fourth quarter of 1885 sounded promising:

Catherine ROGERS      86      8b (Liverpool)    Vol: Dec 1885    Page: 101

I quickly ordered this certificate and left Salt Lake City satisfied with my searches and results, but frustrated that this final discovery had come so late in the week that I did not have time to pursue it!

#### Birth of Mary RODGERS

Many of those reading this article have probably already noticed a very significant oversight in my research. I realized this oversight myself on the return bus trip, and although it had been on my list of searches to be made, somehow I had neglected to undertake the one search that should have been done before some of the others. I had neglected to search the Civil Registration Indexes for the birth of Mary RODGERS! I knew her father's name, her mother's first name, that she was born in Liverpool, and a probable year of birth (1839). Since this is after the commencement of civil registration in 1837, had I found the birth, I would have obtained Catherine's maiden name, as well as an address that could be used to check the 1841 and 1851 census. It would also provide more information about her father, Owen RODGERS, and his occupation at that time. Indeed, a very significant omission -- which will be first on the list for any future trip to Salt Lake City!

#### Certificates

I had ordered six certificates while in Salt Lake City. Needless to say this is an expensive and somewhat inefficient method of searching, but often necessary if other methods fail. When the certificates arrived several weeks later, I received some good news and some bad news! The two marriages listing

Mary MILLER as the bride were not the correct ones. Of the three birth certificates ordered for Thomas MILLER, one was correct:


Thomas MILLER - born 22 December, 1861 at 2 Court, Jordan Street  
 Parents: Charles MILLER, Seaman, Merchant service  
 Mary MILLER, formerly RODGERS  
 Reg'd: by Mary on 8 Jan, 1862, signed with an 'X',  
 her residence stated as 2 Court, Jordan Street.

So there was Jordan Street again! Further evidence that I should be able to find Charles and Mary somewhere in the neighborhood on the 1861 census!

The death certificate for Catherine had also been the correct one, despite the spelling variation:

Catherine ROGERS - died 3 November 1885 in the Liverpool Workhouse,  
 of senile decay. Occupation listed as wife of  
 Owen RODGERS, general labourer, 28 Simpson Street.

Simpson Street again -- although not the same house number as on the 1881 census. I had not expected to find a reference to a husband, this being the first death certificate I had ever ordered from England for a female. If this is typical, it would seem to justify the expense of obtaining a death certificate for a female ancestor -- either as a first source of that information, or as proof that you have found the correct death.



One of my first goals when I began this research several years ago was to locate the marriage record of John's parents. I have still not found it, and it is possible that I may never find it. There may not have been a marriage. And when my other findings are summarized on a pedigree chart, it may seem as if I have not made much progress over the years. But, I feel that, in some ways, the disappointments and deadends along the way have been valuable experience that I can apply to other searches. I learned a great deal about research methods and sources, gained a better understanding of 19th century Liverpool, and developed a deep interest in the entire subject of juvenile emigration and its ramifications -- on both sides of the Atlantic.

Many searches have yet to be done -- or repeated. As many researchers have discovered, sometimes a search done once is worse than one not having been done at all. If nothing is found, there can be a tendency to rule out that source in the future. It is all too easy to miss something the first time. When more details are known and one has become more experienced, it is well worth rechecking any source. All it takes is a little time and patience!

The final article in this series will deal with some other sources which I have used, correspondences that have been established, the results of my recent visit to Liverpool, and my efforts to learn more about John's childhood as a "home child" in Canada.

## MEMBERSHIP REPORT

## LIBRARY GRANT FOR SASKATCHEWAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

In the 1890's the Aberdeen Association started a library collection to provide books for settlers scattered throughout the prairies. Books from England as well as local donations of materials in French, German, Gaelic and the Scandinavian languages were included in the collection. The string and paper required to ship these books was donated. In 1898 a branch was established in Regina to supply books for the Saskatchewan region. After some difficulty with finding quarters a "good room in the new Land Titles office" was put at their disposal.

It is fitting that in 1985 the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society has been able to locate their library in the Administration Centre For Sport, Culture and Recreation Annex which has its headquarters in the now "OLD" Land Titles Building. Our membership are scattered mainly throughout Saskatchewan but also across Canada, the United States and England. During the last year we have mailed just over 1600 books, up over 200 from last year, to those members in Canada unable to visit our library in person. Over the past year 255 books and 33 microfilm were donated to our library by our members and the Saskatchewan Legislative Library as they culled their collections. Also all mailing bags used to send the library books were donated by members.

The major purchase of the year with the last grant was the International Genealogical Index with a listing of 81 million names while the major project of the year will be the compiling and publishing of a new library holdings list. This will be completed before the end of the year.

Next year the grant will be used to add to the European collection. Many new books and translations of older ones are becoming available to help those searching their Galacian, Polish, Hungarian and Ukrainian roots. In addition we would like to add the Monumental Inscription collection from Scotland in order to compliment the Old Parish Register collections on microfiche that a number of members of our Society are donating to the library. Over the year we would also like to have a number of books that are falling apart rebound. As well, a further effort will be made to add more books to the floater collection which circulates exclusively between 14 branches. Over the past year the collection increased by a third bringing the total number of books in that collection to just under 300.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those who have given so generously of their time and talents to the library over the past year. Special thanks go to Marge Thomas who is in charge of searching and doing the printing for the IGI, to Marie Svedahl who looks after the Griffiths Valuation research, to Lee Sherlock who keeps the periodical index up to date, Enid Mitchell who clips and sorts the obits so others can help glue them and to Evelyn Eberhardt who has done the typing of the file and surname cards. I would also like to acknowledge the donation of labor by Queen City Glass for the much needed file boxes for the IGI and the large donation of mailing bags and boxes from Shirley Gerlock, of Provincial Distributing. Our special thanks as well to all the members who have saved mailing bags for us and also contributed towards the postage costs.

The library of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society is now located in Room 201 at 1870 Lorne Street, which is across the street from the Regina Public Library at 12th and Lorne. The entrance is on Lorne Street during the day. The library is open from Monday to Friday from 9-4:30. The phone number is 522-3651, Local 707. It is a large bright room BUT is at the top of four short flights of stairs. We now have 3 microfiche readers and hope to have 3 more as well as two microfilm readers. As of 10 October 1985 the new edition of the IGI had not arrived.

Please continue to use the library either in person or by mail BUT remember to return you library materials promptly as others are waiting to use them.

ANNUAL REPORT (10 October 1985)

A year has come and gone once more and the Bulletin has undergone a couple of changes. Perhaps the most important change is due to the application to Canada Post for Second Class mailing rates for the Bulletin. The result of this is that the Bulletin is saving on mailing expenses and guidelines are now not as strict as to the number of pages which can be included in each Bulletin.

Another change is that we now produce 800 Bulletins per printing compared to the 700 Bulletins of last year at this time. This increase is once again due to the increase in membership in the S.G.S.

A new addition to the Bulletin is the Members' Interests section. You will find a registration form in the July - September, 1985 issue of the Bulletin. Members' Interests will be a regular part of the Bulletin beginning with Volume 17, No. 1, 1986. It is my hope that this will be a useful research aid.

CEMETERY PROJECT REPORT

The Cemetery Project has had a reasonably good year with the addition of 29 more cemeteries to our ever-growing list. The current card file contains approximately 7,250 individual entries. This file is now housed in the S.G.S. office on Lorne St. but the R.M. files are in my home.

A word of explanation for those of you who may wonder about the process of adding new cemeteries to the list. When a recording is received, individual cards are typed for each name on the list; from the cards an alphabetical index is made and placed in the R.M. file along with the original list of names and the cemetery location sheet. The recording is noted on the R.M. file case and on the R.M. card file. THEN, and only then, the cemetery is added to the cemetery list.

SASKATOON Woodlawn R.C. cemetery is on cards but is not yet available for use as it is being checked against Saskatoon burial records so that unmarked graves will be added to it. The same will be done with the other Saskatoon cemeteries when the cards for them are completed. No indexes will be made for these as they are much too large. Moose Jaw Branch has recorded one cemetery but does not have it on cards yet. They are presently working on the other cemetery.

We appreciate the work that members are putting into this project. To you goes the credit for making our cemetery file an excellent reference tool.


Many of the death notices provide married names and addresses of children and other relatives of the deceased person.


The 70-member Historic Trails Society promotes active involvement in history on a province-wide basis.



## PRINCE ALBERT BUS TOUR

We boarded our leased bus at 12:30 in the afternoon of October 19, 1985 for a guided tour of Prince Albert proper, with Verna REDHEAD as our able hostess and guide.

We learned that on 3 June 1862 James ISBISTER started a small settlement in the area of what is now known as Prince Albert. Then in 1866 a Reverend James NISBET, a Presbyterian minister, settled and formed a Presbyterian Mission which he named after Queen Victoria's consort, Prince Albert. Another settlement to the east, named Goschen, was mainly one of logging interest. ISBISTER and SANDERSON had no interest in saw mills in that area. All three settlements vied to be the main settlement and when the telegraph was put through it came to the settlement of James NISBET which was then known as Prince Albert.

Prince Albert was incorporated in 1904, and was the most settled in the western area. Business flourished from the five brick factories which plied their trade in the area to breweries, pulp and logging mills, riverboats, and later, float planes and the meat packing plant.

When one drives down the tree-lined streets of Prince Albert you can view the fine old brick homes still standing proudly, some three stories high with covered verandahs, screened to protect those within from the hordes of black flies and mosquitos. Many of the century old businesses have their walls made from the local brick and they still stand proud amid the high-rise buildings of modern day.

Two of the oldest buildings, now preserved and declared Heritage buildings, are the Block House and the First Mission House, built by the Reverend NISBET. They are located in the former Bryant Park, renamed the Kinsmen Park because of the money and work this organization has invested into the property for the enjoyment of families. The Mission House began as a mission and later became a church and then a school. Both buildings were built in the 1880's.

The Broadway Hotel still welcomes guests in its century old rooms, its furniture could likely tell many stories of its famous and infamous guests who travelled to the area in oxen-pulled red river carts, then later by riverboat, float planes, rail lines and today by cars and bus. The riverboats that plied the river in 1892 carried goods equivalent to 300 loads that the red river carts could carry. They docked along the riverbank which the Carlton Trail paralleled. So, present day traffic rolls smoothly over the same ground as red river carts and wagons rumbled along over 100 years ago. Present day travelers use the parks scattered along the riverbank and enjoy quiet times as did those travelers so many years ago when they ventured west to settle this land of ours.

The two parks along the river front are long and narrow, one side is the river and the other side is River Street (Carlton Trail). One park is dedicated to the poet Charles MAIR, who came from Ontario in the 1880's and lived in Prince Albert. Then there is the Dave Stewart Park situated in the eastern part of the city and located near the site where the float planes landed. It is directly across the river where the TB Sanitarium used to be located. This sanitarium was opened one very cold evening in the early 1930's when the temperature dipped to 30 degrees below zero. Many of the automobiles of the time froze and many people reached home very late because of the severity of the weather. People visiting relatives and friends in the sanitarium could easily walk over the frozen river in the winter, but they had miles to go in the summer because the only bridge (railroad and vehicle) was located on the western end of the city.

It meant a long walk for those who did not have transportation, and these were mainly the native people of the east end. The Sanitarium is now a workshop for mentally and physically handicapped persons. A second bridge was constructed around fifteen years ago and named the John DIEFENBAKER Bridge.

It is nice to see a band shell standing on the riverbank, (recently moved from the green area or former park in front of the new city hall), reminiscent of those days when Sunday picnics and outings were a social affair, where lovers could stroll under the watchful eye of a chaperone and listen to the strains of a band, very likely that of the local Royal Canadian Mounted Police or local men from the growing community.

At the turn of the century the city embarked on a scheme to harness nearby LaColle Falls in the confident expectation that cheap electric power would attract industry. These dreams were never realized, however, and the project brought Prince Albert to the verge of bankruptcy. For four decades the city marked time but resource development and the growth of tourism at nearby Prince Albert National Park since 1945 have revived its economy. The debt was paid in full twenty years ago and since the city put off improvements and city works, it is only now realizing cement sidewalks and other capital projects for its citizens.

When you drive down some of the older streets in the city you pass the house known as the Key Hole Castle which was built by Sam MCLEOD, who was mayor in 1896, 1911 and 1920. The name comes from the ornate carvings on the gables of the roof which look like that of an old fashioned key hole. A battleship grey painted house was once lived in by Lucy Maude MONTGOMERY. Of course, one of the most famous residences is that of former John DIEFENBAKER which is now a museum.


One can not leave out the churches which were the results of the early settlements of religious leaders. When you drive west of the Saskatchewan Penitentiary a small Anglican Church, St. Mary's, surrounded by a cemetery and trees, rests quietly for the memorial service held each summer on its grounds. The Presbyterian Church, built in 1906, is still standing and in use. This church has the most beautiful stained glass windows in Prince Albert. In a severe wind storm some years ago its wooden steeple was blown off and destroyed. When a new one was rebuilt the craftsmen had not built it to exact replica. It seems something is missing when viewed by the old-timers. This church is built of the Prince Albert brick from the area. Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church nestles amid the residential district, its steeple rising high. This church has been replaced three times since its beginnings.

To complete the shopping mall in the city centre, some four blocks of residential homes were expropriated and razed to make the mall on the 14½ acres it occupies. Included in those buildings destroyed was a school built in 1910. This development is still a controversy today.

Prince Albert has the unique distinction of being the only city in Saskatchewan to have an Indian Reservation within its boundaries. This reservation is next to the site of the original North West Mounted Police Depot and now the Royal Canadian Police headquarters. Next to the police station is the Indian School. Across the street is the Victoria Union Hospital and the Psychiatric Centre. The Berb Bassett Nursing Home is part of the complex and is a residence for seniors. The only other hospital is the Holy Family Hospital, which was started by Sisters. Nearby is a residence for the immediate families of native children who are in the hospital.

There was a bit of trouble with one of the wheels on the bus but it was soon repaired and the bus was off again.

As one travels downtown you see two city halls side by side, the old city hall is now an Art/Craft Centre and the high-rising new city hall is back from the street with wide lawns and walkways. Further on you see a corner which once housed four banks: the Royal, Montreal, Commerce and Nova Scotia. It is commonly called the corner of Bank, Bank, Bank and Bank. We pass by the War Memorial erected in 1927, a commissioned work done by Margueritte TAYLOR of Ontario. The present day Court House, completed in 1928 is on the site of the courthouse and old jail of which the last hanging in Prince Albert was done in 1934. And speaking of jails, Prince Albert has more than its share of these facilities. The Pine Grove Correctional Centre is a minimum security prison for women run by the Provincial Government, the Prince Albert Correctional Centre is also a minimum security prison for women operated by the Provincial Government. The Saskatchewan Penitentiary is a Federally run maximum security facility for men with the farm annex on the same grounds.

During the years there have been three large employers within the city: the Burns meat packing plant, which has since been closed, the Prince Albert Pulp Mill, still in operation on the north shore and, the largest employer, the Saskatchewan Penitentiary.

It should be noted that a former alderman by the name of DENT, started the idea of medicare. Therefore, Prince Albert takes the honour of being the first city to start the ball rolling.

A new museum to note is one that was opened this year and is sponsored by the RCMP Police, Local Police Department, Justice Departments and the Federal Penitentiary Systems. The museum is free during the summer months and is closed during the winter.

Saskatchewan Molson Brewery is the only operational brewery in the city. The old Golden Lyon Brewery was burnt down shortly after prohibition was enacted. A public school has been erected on the site.

The Sherman Towers, a senior citizen high-rise residence, was named after Alderwoman SHERMAN in dedication to her contribution to the city. Its neighbor, The North Cote, was named after a famous riverboat that plied the river. A new technical school is situated in the east end, dedicated to upgrading and retraining programs for the Prince Albert area residents.

A Winter Festival each year is held during the third week in February. It is a time for letting all the winter blaas go and to welcome the forthcoming spring.

Our bus tour took us through the streets and avenues of Prince Albert with an unexpected stop on River Street when a brake seized on the right rear wheel. As we stood in groups on the riverbank a very prompt service person from the City Transit Company fixed our problem and we were off again.

A vote of thanks again to our tour guide, Verna REDHEAD, for her informative narration during our tour.

## SASKATCHEWAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY RESEARCH POLICY

The Saskatchewan Genealogical Society will do basic searches of Saskatchewan sources for a \$10 fee plus a stamped self-addressed envelope or 1 International Reply Coupon if you live outside of Canada.

Sources checked include:

1. Homestead index and file
2. Obituary index and file
3. Cemetery index
4. Newspaper index

If a location is known or found as a result of the above check we will also check:

1. Local and school histories
2. Henderson and telephone directories if they exist for that location
3. The Archives card index

If a specific date of an event such as a birth, death or marriage is known we will check the local paper to see if there is a note made of it. Please note that not all editions of all newspapers are preserved.

You will receive a written report of the research that has been done noting all the sources checked. In addition a note will be made of all items which could be of interest to you to have copied along with the charges for such copying. NO COPYING would be done until the correct fee plus the postage costs had been paid. The current fees are: 25¢ per page for paper to paper copies and 50¢ per page for micro-film to paper copies. Remember it takes as long to do a successful search as an unsuccessful search. Your chances for a successful search may depend on how accurately you are able to describe the search you wish to have done.

These searches are done by knowledgeable volunteers. Should you require a more indepth search done the Society can supply you with the names of volunteers who could do this work for you.

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### IGI SEARCH POLICY:

1. ONLY MEMBERS of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society may search the IGI BUT only for their own genealogical purposes.
2. Those members who wish to use the IGI in person are charged a \$1.00 fee for each time they wish to search it. The Society will make prints of any of the material they wish at a cost of 25¢/page.
3. The Society offers a search service for those members who cannot do their own. For a fee of \$3.00 we will search up to five names provided a specific location is given. Included with this fee would be a print of five pages. Additional location searches are \$1.00 per name plus one print.

We will advise you on the numbers of pages available when they go beyond the limit and will attempt to estimate the postage costs. We require a surname, the given name AND a specific location. For example: we need a specific county for England and the Scandinavian countries; a state or province for the USA or Canada; a duchy for Germany unless it is after 1918. Ireland and Scotland do not require a county.

\*\*\*There will be a \$1.00 search fee each time that we have to pull films. The reason for this is that the volunteer doing the work has to pay parking fees both at our library and the public library to do the printing and again when the films are returned to our library.

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### GRIFFITH VALUATION RESEARCH POLICY:

The Griffith Valuation Index and Valuations is the tax record or assessment of all households in Ireland during the years 1848-1864. These are valuable because the census records during this period were destroyed in a fire. The records list only the head of the household and describe the land being taxed with the amount of tax. The index lists surnames only so unless you know the county you will have a 20 county search. It is advisable to check in an Irish surname book to see which counties your surname is most commonly found. Surnames are listed by county, barony and parish which will need to be checked in turn. Spelling variations should be checked as well. The index also shows those who were there when the 11th was taken in 1824-38. This could suggest whether people of that surname were still there after the famine when the valuations were done.

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Searches for MEMBERS ONLY will be \$1.00 per time for in-person searches and \$1.00 per surname per county for mail-in searches. For this dollar we would tell you if your surname is listed and in which baronies. There is a \$10.00 fee to search the records for your surname and christian name. This \$10.00 fee would cover the first two hours of research only. Should it take longer we would estimate the time and cost to continue as well as the costs for any printing you may wish to have done at 25¢ per page.

\*\*\*These records can be of great value to those who know only that their family came from Ireland because unless you know a precise location you will be unable to use records from Ireland. However, the records do take time to check and the person checking is volunteering her/his time, but the Society pays parking fees for this volunteer. It is simpler if members do their own searches but the fee for out-of-town members is still inexpensive when considering the cost of getting to Regina, parking and meals.

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#### POLICY FOR USE OF THE INDIRECT PASSENGER SHIP INDEX AND LISTS:

There will be a \$1.00 per time charge for members to search these records in person, but the Society will also do searches for out-of-town members. The fee for this will be \$10.00 to check the Index and Lists. This will include up to 2 hours of searching. We will also advise on printing costs should we find your names on the List. Printing will cost 25¢ per copy. It takes two copies for each page of film.

The Lists generally give surname, christian name, all who travelled as one household with their ages, original home, state or country of origin, plus their destination in North America. All are written in German but are fairly easy to read.

#### SURNAME FILE

1. Submit as many names as you have with as much information as you have about each name, preferably with all the information as shown below.
2. Use first and middle names.
3. Put children's names on back of card. If they have families submit cards for them also.
4. If you type, please type your cards as shown on 3"X5" file cards.
5. If you are unable to type your cards PRINT the information in the same format & we will type the cards for you.
6. Be sure to include your own name and address and notify us of changes in the future.
7. If you wish us to check the file for names, send a stamped, self-addressed envelope if you expect a reply.
