- (1) to promote the study of genealogy and genealogical research within the Province of Saskatchewan;
- (2) to build up a library of genealogical guides and handbooks, reference sources, and family and local histories, which would be available to all members;
- (3) to publish the BULLETIN which would be the official publication of the Society and which would include articles on genealogical research etc., and which would serve as a vehicle for members' queries;
- (4) to establish ties with other genealogical societies for exchange of ideas and information, etc.;
- (5) to establish seminars and workshops on genealogical research and methodology.

The BULLETIN is published quarterly. Deadlines for material presented for publication will be 15 February, 15 May, 15 August, 15 November. Material should be sent to the Editor in a form for immediate use if possible. Manuscripts should be fully referenced and signed.

ARTICLES published in the S.G.S. BULLETIN may be reprinted freely, except for copyright material reproduced from other sources. A credit line will be appreciated. A copy of the publication containing the material is requested.

OPINIONS EXPRESSED in articles by contributing writers do not necessarily represent the point of view of the S.G.S.

MEMBERSHIP is for the 1986 calendar year at \$15.00 per family, \$12.00 for senior citizens. Subscription to the BULLETIN is concurrent with membership.

QUERIES of reasonable length are published gratis for members. Non members may submit queries of up to sixty (60) words in length for a fee of \$5.00.

MEMBERS' INTERESTS is published for members only.

Statistics for January to 9 May 1986: -1,250 people visited the library in person -3,000 library books have been mailed out.

- 1. Cost of prints for microfiche and microfilm are now \$.40 each due to increase in printing fees at the Public Library where we do the work.
- 2. Please note the new form and fees for mail-in searches for the IGI.
- 3. OVERDUE BOOKS: Unfortunately there have been too many overdue books this past while so many notices had to be sent out. Should this trend continue we may have to consider fines PLUS a fee for notices sent!
- 4. RESERVE LIST: Whenever requests come in from patrons for books not in the library we place your name on the reserve list for that book and write RES beside the request we return to you. While we have duplicate copies of some of the books others are no longer in print so there can be as many as 10 people ahead of you. Please help by returning your books promptly.
- 5. CENSUS, HUNGARIAN or LOISELLE SEARCHES by mail. FEE \$10.00. For this \$10.00 fee we will do up to 2 hours of searching. Should it take longer we will try to estimate the time required at \$6.00 per hour. There are no prints from the census because much of the film is too poor to copy but we do have forms which we will fill in for you.
- 6. Note we have 1891 Census Forms available for sale at 20 for \$1.00 plus \$1.50 for postage and handling. See the order form in this BULLETIN.
- 7. We ask that from now on members borrow books individually rather than through their branch as we need to have the books back promptly. Branches will continue to have blocks of books from the Floater Collection for months at a time.
- 8. We have the 1891 Manitoba Census on order. It should arrive before the end of June. Regina Branch has provided the funds for this purchase.
- 9. The Society now has a number of International Reply Coupons on hand. Should you wish to purchase some from us send \$.90 per Coupon plus a stamped self-addressed envelope. When using Coupons you need:
 - 1 International Reply Coupon for the United States
 - 2 International Reply Coupons for Australia and Europe
 - 3 International Reply Coupons for the United Kingdom and Ireland.

THE SASKATCHEWAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

CONSTITUTION

- I. NAME: The name of this Society is "The Saskatchewan Genealogical Society Inc."
- II. PURPOSE: This Society has been formed:
 - 1. To promote, encourage and foster the study of genealogy and original genealogical research in the Province of Saskatchewan, especially as related to Saskatchewan families.
 - 2. To collect and preserve in a library and archive information, as in books, manuscripts, typescripts, charts, maps, photographs, photostats, microfilms and related material, relevant to such genealogical, historical and biographical study; to index and catalogue the same and make such information readily available to members of the Society and to other persons, as may be provided in the By-Laws.
 - 3. To maintain an index of similar material which may be preserved in other libraries, archives, museums and similar institutions, for the guidance of members and others authorized to use the facilities of this Society.
 - 4. To encourage and instruct members in the ethical principles, scientific methods and effective techniques of genealogical research and to defend the standards of genealogy from incompetent and disreputable persons.
 - 5. To enter into friendly relations with other Societies having a similar or related purpose, in Saskatchewan, other parts of Canada or in other countries and to cooperate with them in promotion of our common interests.
 - 6. To publish and distribute books, bulletins, and other printed material as, from time to time, may be decided by the membership or the Executive Committee.

III. MEMBERSHIP:

- 1. Ordinary Membership may be extended to any person interested in promoting the purposes of the Society on payment of the annual fee.
- 2. The Board of Directors shall have the right to refuse to admit any person to membership because of unethical practice in genealogy.
- 3. Membership shall be deemed to have lapsed if a member's annual dues are not paid within thirty days of the due date, but may be immediately revived upon payment of such dues.
- 4. All members in good standing are entitled:
 - a) to attend and to vote on any issue raised at any general meeting of the Society.
 - b) to be eligible for election to any office on the Board of Directors of the Society.
 - c) to receive one copy of any bulletin or periodical of the Society, without charge, and to insert one brief notice or enquiry in such bulletin or periodical, without charge.
 - d) to have access to the Library and Archives of the Society and to use any of the printed works, manuscripts, typescripts, documents, maps, photos, microfilms or other related material therein, in accordance with regulations which may be made hereafter in the By-Laws.
- 5. Life Memberships may be granted to any person on payment of a fee of not less than \$200.00 (Two Hundred Dollars); such Life Membership being subject to the same conditions and privileges defined in paragraphs 2 and 4 of this Article, above.
- 6. Honourary Memberships and Honourary Officerships may be conferred upon non-members who have been of special service to the Society or who have been, in the opinion of the membership, worthy of recognition for their contribution to the cause of genealogy in general.

IV. OFFICERS AND ELECTION:

1. The Officers of the Society shall be:

President
One or more Vice Presidents
Secretary
Treasurer
Editor of Publications
Librarian and Archivist
Membership Secretary

- 2. There shall be from six to thirty six directors, six of which shall be elected for a three year term, with two retiring each year, and the remaining directors shall include the chairperson or elected representative of each Branch to be elected for a term of at least one year. Any director may be elected for a second term.
- 3. All Officers and Directors must be members in good standing at the time of election but will cease to be Officers or Directors if for any reason membership should lapse.
- 4. The Officers and Directors together shall constitute the Board of Directors of the Society.
- 5. The Officers and two Directors will be elected at each Annual General Meeting of the Society. Officers will be eligible for re-election without restriction and Directors are eligible for re-election for a further three year term when their terms expire.
- 6. Such Executive Officers and newly-elected Directors will assume office immediately at the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting and Executive Officers will continue in office until the conclusion of the next Annual General Meeting, at which time also retiring Directors will retire.
- 7. In the event of a vacancy occurring during the year, it will be filled by appointment of the Board of Directors and this person so appointed will serve for the remainder of that year, being subject to confirmation in office by election at the next Annual General Meeting.
- 8. The Board of Directors may appoint such other officers as may from time to time be required for the effective fulfillment of the Society's purposes, subject to the provisions of the By-Laws.

V. MEETINGS:

- 1. There will be an Annual General Meeting of the Society and there will be an Annual Seminar by the Society in each calendar year, at times and places to be determined by the Executive Committee.
- 2. A General meeting may be called by the President at any other time of the year to deal with matters of urgency, by decision of the Board of Director or by request in writing of any twenty members to the President; such request to include the emergent reason for such a General Meeting, which shall be quoted in the President's notice to all members.
- 3. The Board of Directors will meet at the call of the President at least twice a year; one of which meetings

will be to plan the Annual Seminar.

- 4. At any meeting of the Board of Directors a quorum will consist of at least seven Members, one of whom will be the President or a Vice President, and at least one other will be another Executive Officer.
- 5. At any General meeting of the Society a quorum shall consist of all members in good standing of the Society present at the meeting.

VI. BRANCHES:

- 1. Any five or more members of the Society may apply to the Board of Directors for recognition as a local Branch of the Society. Only members in good standing of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society are eligible for membership in a Branch.
- Each Branch will elect at least a Chairman and a Secretary-Treasurer.
- 3. The Chairman of all Branches will be invited by the President to attend meetings of the Board of Directors or to delegate a Branch Representative in his stead.
- 4. Branches may plan their own meetings and programmes of activities without reference to the Board of Directors but will at all times be subject to the principles, purposes and policies of this Society in all their activities, as these are defined in this Constitution.
- 5. Additional funds may be required by any Branch, which may be raised by fee or subscription provided that such does not interfere with the regular obligation of members to the central treasury of the Society.
- 6. In the event of any Branch becoming dormant or dissolving any residue of funds will be sent by the Secretary-Treasurer of that Branch to the Treasurer of the Society and all records, accounts and files of that Branch will be deposited with the Secretary of the Society. If that local Branch should revive the said residual funds, records, etc., may be restored by action of the Board of Directors.

VI. DUES:

- 1. Annual dues are payable on January 2nd in each and every year.
- 2. The amount of the annual dues will be determined at the Annual General Meeting of the Society, on recommendation of the Board of Directors.

- 3. New members accepted after the first of October in any year will be credited with membership for the next calendar year without additional payment.
- 4. Any member who resigns his/her membership during the year will not be entitled to any rebate of annual dues for the portion of the year remaining.
- 5. Any local Branch of the Society may assess its members an additional sum required to meet essential expenses of that Branch but failure to pay this additional assessment will not affect membership in the Society, nor will payment of such assessment alone admit anyone to membership either in the Society or in the Branch.
- 6. That all members of any Branch must first belong to the provincial organization and pay the prescribed fee.

VIII. BY-LAWS:

The Board of Directors may enact such by-laws as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the business of the Society, such by-laws to have immediate effect until the next General Meeting when they must be ratified or recinded by the membership. In like manner the Board of Directors may amend or suspend the effect of any by-law pending ratification of its action at the next General Meeting.

IX. DISSOLUTION:

In the event of the dissolution of this Society its assets, both financial and material, will be transferred to another non-profit association or society or public corporation as may be decided at the last general meeting or the last meeting of the Board of Directors, provided that items on loan to the Society will be returned to the owners or lenders; but such assets will not in any event be divided among the members of the Society at the time.

X. AMENDMENTS:

Any amendment to the Articles of this Constitution may be made by a two-thirds majority vote of the bona fide members of the Society at any regularly called General Meeting of the Society, provided that those present constitute a quorum as defined in these Articles: provided also that due notice of the proposed amendment shall have been submitted to the Board of Directors not less than sixty days before the General Meeting and mailed to all members not less than thirty days before the General Meeting at which time the amendment will be presented for decision.

THE FAMILY REGISTRY: A TOOL FOR CO-OPERATIVE RESEARCH

INTRODUCTION

In the pursuit of information about our elusive ancestors many of us wish there was someone else we could share some of our research findings, our research problems and our research expenses with; someone who cares about Great-great-grandfather HAMBROOK, for example, as much as we do. Although there have been a number of research clearinghouse projects established in the United States, and there have been publications of genealogists and their research interests in many places, there is a new project underway called the Family Registry that is particularly attractive because of its scope, and its cost to the users. The purpose of this article is to describe the Family Registry, explain how to use it and how to register your research interests with the registry. Five locations in Saskatchewan that are repositories for the Family Registry will be identified.

The Family Registry is a new service available to anyone interested in genealogical research. It is offered without charge by the Genealogical Department of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. The purpose of the Family Registry is to help genealogists find others who are doing research on the same family lines as they are. The genealogist can then contact the the other researcher to coordinate efforts and share results. The advantage is obvious: when one coordinates his research with others, the research is more thorough, and avoid costly duplication of research time, effort and expense.

For a family organization the Family Registry provides a way to tell others about the organization. Those interested may correspond with the group and support its research efforts.

For an individual wishing to coordinate research, the Family Registry is a way to inform others of his/her research activities and to find out what others are doing. The researcher can contact those working on the same family lines, and others can contact him.

For those seeking genealogical information, the Family Registry identifies individuals or family organizations researching common lineages.

The Family Registry service consists of two parts, registration and inquiry. We will discuss each part seperately.

REGISTRATION FOR THOSE ACTIVELY ENGAGED IN GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

If you are actively engaged in genealogical research you can

register the names of deceased individuals you are currently researching. If you want to share information you have previously researched, you may also register those names. Others may then contact you to coordinate future research and share results. Active genealogical researchers may register by completing the Research Coordination Registration Form (PFGS2501), (See Figure 1). These are available at no charge from any of the libraries mentioned at the end of this article.

There are a few things to keep in mind in selecting "candidates" from your family tree for submission to the Family Registry. The names one wants to enter are those with the most descendants, therefore the further back in one's ancestry the person, the better the chances are that you might find someone whose research interests intersect with This must be balanced against the fact that the more data you are able to supply on the registration form for a person, the more chances there are that someone else will recognize that person as one of his or her ancestors. Perhaps the best balance between these would be to identify your earliest ancestor on a family line, then prepare Research Coordination Registration forms for each of his/her children. Thus the entries would have at least three different names, perhaps four, for others to recognize, and several dates for events that you might not have found for the earliest ancestor. As there is no limit to the number of entries you can submit, if that 3rd great grandfather and mother had 13 children who suirvived to adulthood, you could register each, multiplying the potential points of intersection with other lineages considerably.

To maintain an individual ancestor's unique identity, the following information must be provided on the registration form:

- a) Surname
- b) At least one approximate year in one of the main data fields, such as birth, marriage, or death.
- c) At least one approximate locality in one of the main locality fields, such as birth, marriage or death.

Registration For Family Organizations

If you are involved in genealogical research as a family organization, no matter how small, you can register this organization so others who want to coordinate reseach, provide research or publication funding, or otherwise participate may contact you. If you are only just interested in forming a family organization, you may also register as a family organization. These registrations are entered on the Family Organization Registration Form (PFGS2512). A copy of this form appears as Figure 2. Family organizations may also register lines they are currently researching on the Research Coordination Registration Form.

There are basically two types of family organizations, and provision is made to register either kind (however only one organization should be entered per form).

a) Ancestral Family Organizations, which coordinate genealogical

research activity on common family lines. An example of this sort of organization is the Charles Ferdinand Conrad Family Organization which is made up of the descendant of this common ancestor and is involved in researching the descendants and ancestry of this man. Do not register grandparent or immediate family organizations centred around living individuals, because this information should already be known to the descendants.

b) Surname Organizations which search records for a particular surname in a specified locality and period of time. The Hambrook Family History Society, for example, is registered as this type of family organization.

Searching the Family Registry

The registrations previously discussed are entered into a computer program and sorted alphabetically according to the surnames being researched. The resulting index, now containing in excess of 110,000 entries, is published in the form of computer-output-microfiche in cumulative editions three or four times a year and sent to libraries in the LDS church's Branch Genealogical Library system, and to participating genealogical and historical societies and libraries where it may be consulted. The Family Registry index alphabetically lists the surnames being researched, the identifying names, dates and places and the names and addresses, and often, telephone numbers of those who have registered them. If more than one person registers the same ancestor, both registrations are included because the policy is to include all properly completed registrations. The data is arranged as in Figure 3, a reprentation of a frame from a Family Registry index microfiche.

Where to Find the Family Registry Index and Obtain Forms.

At present the author is familiar with five locations in Saskatchewan where the Family Registry index is available for searching, and where registration forms are available. Serving the Saskatoon area, the Saskatoon Branch Genealogical Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, 1429 10th Street, Saskatoon, has the Family Registry index and registration forms. In MooseJaw genealogists can consult the Family Registry and obtain forms from the Moose Jaw Auxillary Genealogy Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, 15 Park Drive West. In Regina there are three locations for the Family Registry:

- a) Regina Auxillary Genealogy Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, 550 Sangster Boulevard.
- b) Saskatchewan Genealogical Society Library 1870 Lorne Street (2nd Floor) or P.O. Box 1890, Regina
- c) The Prairie History Room, Regina Public Library,

For those who cannot get to one of these five locations, they may obtain registration forms (please specify by correct title) from any of the these locations. The Prairie History Room will accept mail queries to search the Family Registry for a specific surname and photocopy relevant pages for \$.10 per page if payment is included. The SGS Library might undertake the same sort of search upon request, but one would have to arrange for this with the Librarian first.

CONCLUSION

The Family Registry program is a particularly attractive one for the genealogist. The service is free, the registration is ongoing, with several updates a year at present, and index is very easy to use.

Some concerns have been expressed to this author as to whether information submitted to the Family Registry would be used to do temple ordinances of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. I have been assured by the Family Registry Unit of that Church that the data submitted would not be used for those purposes. That however does not mean that individual ancestors registered in the Family Register might not already be, or eventually appear in the International Genealogical Index through some other route.

Registration will not be used to generate a list of people who will be visited by two smiling young Mormon missionaries. Their appearance on your doorstep would be purely coincidental.

There are no strings attached, but there is an obligation or responsibilty on the part of those who register. Those who register their research interests are expected to respond to those who contact them. And those who contact researchers found in the registry should include a stamped, self addressed envelope, or similar reimbursement for a response, and be prepare to pay for photocopying material they request from registrants. The Family Registry is not to be used for commercial purposes. Those seem reasonable expectations of users of the system.

AN INDEX SHOULD BE USED WITH CAUTION

I don't think too much can ever be said regarding indexes. I would like to relate a few instances during my years as a researcher in using indexes.

The good old IGI is a tremendous tool in its own right but it has its errors due partially to human error. One needs to understand that most of the IGI is made up of entries taken from church and vital records that are typed into the computer by typists trained to read the handwriting. However, just as today there is sloppy handwriting, so it was when the records were made. It is possible to misread a name and then be entered into the IGI incorrectly. Hopefully this kind of instance is in the minority but I have found it. Once, not long ago, I was researching a JONES family. The Chippenham, Wiltshire Church of England records have been typed and are in the IGI. I had found John JONES in the 1861 census and also had his marriage certificate which stated his father as John. I found his brothers and sisters in the IGI and by all rights John should have been there too and since he was the ancestor it was imperative to find his birth. Looking at the original baptism entries I did find John the son of John but it was clear the typist had misread this name as JAMES and this is somewhat understandable because there were also JAMES families in this parish as well as JONES.

Another classic instance was when I was helping a friend in Swift Current. If I remember correctly according to family records Jane Gillespie was married to Archibald Tweedle in Cumberland County, England. The IGI has an Archibald married to Jane RASBY in 1809. When I checked the original parish records I discovered the typist had misread the GL of the abbreviated form of GLASBY (GILLESPIE) for an "R". These are only but two instances and I am sure they are two of many.

The other instance I want to tell the readers about are indexes of vital records, in this case marriage records from a Michigan County court house. A certain man had written me to help him find his grandparents' birth place in Finland. They had married and settled in Michigan but I felt it odd that he didn't have their marriage record since Michigan has wonderful vital records. This was a case where my client had previously paid a researcher \$250.00. researcher had used the time unwisely and painstakingly went through each parish in Vaasa County, Finland to find the birth of Leander Hanson - parentage unknown - and was unsuccessful. This is another lesson one should learn - first exhaust sources on this side of the Atlantic befor jumping into foreign records. Anyway, the marriage should have taken place in the 1880's and the index revealed no Leander Hanson so I then went to the original records and found not Hanson but Leander Slota - his Finnish name which is all one needs to find his residence befor he immigrated. His marriage record also gave his parents' names. In two hours I had the line open and found him with his parents in Finland. The reason the other researcher had not found a birth record for him was because there were no birth records on film for that particular parish, only a communion record which is like a census of a parish and the marriage record gave the clue.

I hope the readers will understand that indexes by themselves can be a big let down if used on their own. A little extra time in the original can sometimes help. Of course this is not always the case, in genealogy nothing is either black or white. Try not to be in such a hurry as to overlook the possibliity of human error or of a different spelling that an index won't reveal. It's worth it in the long run.



Reference is also made to many sources already contained in our library. Study the listings carefully as there are many books listed that you could obtain through inter-library loan at your local library.

The topics discussed in this book are arranged in alphabetical order making it easy to find items you may wish to re-check. The one negative aspect to the book is that the printing is very small making it a challenge to those of us who are still avoiding the use of glasses!!!

GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH DIRECTORY
JOHNSON, Keith A.; SAINTY, Malcom R. 1986, 784p.

The Saskatchewan Genealogical Society Library recently received the 1986 edition of the Genealogical Directory which contains 8,220 entries from 548 Canadians as well as many more from other countries around the world. Many of our members have placed queries in this directory or have answered queries found listed only to discover relatives they did not know existed in other parts of the world. A pleased member from Moose Jaw answered a query placed by a person from New Zealand who in turn put him in contact with a chap in England who had done work on the family dating back to the 1500's. Fortunately, this member had worked his own pedigree back to the early 1800's and could link up with two names on the old chart. The English contact also was able to supply local history about the village where their common ancestors had come from. Another member hoped he had hit the jackpot as well but a check in the contributor's page showed it was his brother seeking the information!!

WRITE IT RIGHT: A Manual For Writing Family Histories and Genealogies.

BARNES, Donald Ray and LACKEY, Richard S.. Published by Lyon Press,
Ocala, Florida, 1983. (Order from D.R. Barnes, Associates, Box 5755,
Rockville, Md., 20855-0755), 138pp indexed, \$6.00 plus \$1.50 mailing.

This is a pocket sized book in large print written as a companion to Cite Your Sources. You do not have to plow through great quantities of verbage to get the answers you need. The authors have given all the answers to one planning on writing a family history that requires the answering of a lot of fundamental questions.

The book contains 138 pages with chapters on Preparing To Write, Purpose In Writing, Numbering Systems for Genealogies, Outlines for Genealogical Writers, Writing the Text, Citations and Bibliographies, and Mechanics. At the end of the text there is an article on a Maryland settler, Philip LEWIN, showing how research notes can be converted into a clearly written and fully documented genealogical account.

The inclusion of a complete Table of Contents, a Glossary of Terms and an Index permits the user to locate easily the advice given regarding all aspects of genealogical writing. Write It Right has been written for all genealogists and historians to assist them in putting their family history or genealogy, article or book into proper written form.

John Frederick DORMAN, F.A.S.G., in his introduction, notes that the authors have recognized the necessity of encouraging proper genealogical writing. He suggests that persons use the advice in this book to produce accounts which will stand for years to come as authoritative presentations and goes on to say that Write It Right fills a gap in the ever increasing list of genealogical manuals and is a milestone in genealogical bibliography. Highly recommended.

BIGGAR

The Biggar Branch is now 1 year old and we had a very active year. We have a membership of 15 for 1986 which includes 1 family membership.

We have been meeting on a monthly basis. We held a couple workshops:
1. Maps, atlasses and gazetteers; 2. Canadian census. We had a special guest at our last meeting who also joined up as a member, Mr. Archie AFFLECK. Mr. AFFLECK told us about the numbering system he used for keeping track of all the descendents of his progenitor.

With the receipt of the Core Books we set up the position of Librarian. MaryAnn ASSAILLY offered her services to look after the collection. A list of the Core Books along with Biggar Branch books has been distributed to all our members. We have also acquired some of the books in the floater collection. Our members have been making good us of the Core Books and those in the floater collection.

We set up the position of custodian of obituaries which is filled by Cliff FISHER. Cliff is looking after the clipping of the obituaries from the BIGGAR INDEPENDENT for 1986. These will be indexed and sent to Regina at the end of 1986.

To celebrate Saskatchewan Heritage '85 last June we commenced the recording of the Biggar Cemetery. The recording was completed by the end of August. We then made arrangements with the town of Biggar to make use of the records they have for burials in the cemetery. After all the information was collected it was fed into a computer which generated an index along with a detailed listing containing 2,363 entries. Copies of the index and listing have been deposited with the S.G.S., town of Biggar, and the Biggar Museum and Gallery. Copies of the index were deposited with the Saskatchewan Archives Board, Regina and Saskatoon, the Public Archives of Canada in Ottawa and the Saskatoon and Regina Public Libraries, Prairie History Rooms.

We plan to continue the recording of the cemeteries in the rural area around Biggar, which covers the R.M. of Biggar and R.M. of Glenside. On 23rd April we made our first cemetery recording trip for 1986. We had nine enthusiastic members participating in the recording of Rosemount Cemetery, R.M. of Rosemount; Ev. Lutheran Emmanuels, Gemeinde, Eignefeld and the Church of God cemeteries, R.M. of Glenside.

A couple of our members took along their cameras and took photos of the cemeteries, churches and other buildings located at the various cemetery locations. Perhaps when we are done we can put together an album with the pictures taken at the various sites. Many of these structures are no longer used and over a period of time many will no doubt disappear.

We have been in contact with a group who are compiling a local history. They have promised us comies of the cemeteries they are including in their history: Monarch Cemetery, Lizard Lake Cemetery and Louvain Cemetery.

With the publication of the Biggar CEMETERY INDEX, we placed an announcement in the local paper and expressed our interest in hearing from those individuals who are in charge of or who have records of a rural cemetery or know of private burials in form yards or on farm land in the area around Biggar. It is hoped this will spark some interest with the public.

Shirley WILLIAMS represented our branch at the 1st March board meeting in Regina. Shirley came away impressed with the library collection and with the well qualified library staff. Shirley feels members should make a special effort to travel to Regina to make use of the excellent resources available in the S.G.S. Library.

Our local museum, the Biggar Museum and Gallery, has acquired a micro-film reader so our members are now going to be able to make use of the resources available on interlibrary loan from the various archives.

We have been receiving Newsletters from other branches for which we would like to express our appreciation. We had a discussion about our Branch publishing a newsletter but it was felt we should wait until our members are more experienced with genealogical research.

After you find the microfilm-reel number covering the date when your ancestor arrived at a port in Canada, you may borrow the appropriate reel from the Public Archives of Canada through the interlibrary-loan system of your local public library.

The Canada Employment and Immigration Department has comprehensive records of immigrants arriving at Canadian ports from 1908. Access to the post-1910 records is granted only with the permission of the immigrant or on proof of his/her death. Inquiries should be addressed to Records of Entry Unit, Canada Employment and Immigration Commission, Place du Portage, Phase IV, Hull, Quebec, K1A 0J9.

BARNARDO Homes, Tanners Lane, Barkingside, Ilford, Essex, England IG6 1QG. Protestant, non-conformist, took both boys and girls. This Home has records dating back to 1870 of Annie Macpherson Homes, one of which was in Knowlton, PQ which she turned over to the use of her sister Louise Birt c1878.

Quarrier Homes, Bridge of Weir, Renfrewshire, Scotland - director Dr. Minto. Tel. B or W 224. Baptist boys and girls.

National Children's Home, 85 Highbury Park, London N5, England. Tel. 01-226-2033. Methodist boys and girls.

Church of England Childrens Bureau, Old Kennington Town Hall, London, England (formerly known as Waifs & Strays Society) founded by Miss Maria Rye for girls but later accepted boys as well. Taken over by C of E about 1897.

Crusade of Rescue & Home for Destitute Children, 73 St. Charles Square, London W10. RC boys and girls. Also, Rev. Hudson's Home, Coleshill, Birmingham, England. RC records may not be available in England as England relied on priests in Canada - mainly Quebec - to place and supervise children. The protestant homes on the other hand, established their own receiving homes in Canada, and all their records went back to the parent Home when the Canadian Homes closed down, generally during the 1940's.

RC records are the most difficult to trace, - one could try Bishop's House in Montreal. Canadian Immigration records on juvenile immigration are available at the Public Archives of Canada, 395 Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario K1A ON3.

SASKATCHEWAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY RESEARCH POLICY

The Saskatchewan Genealogical Society will do basic searches of Saskatchewan sources for a \$10 fee plus a stamped self-addressed envelope or 1 International Reply Coupon if you live outside of Canada.

- Sources checked include: 1. Homestead index and file
 - 2. Obituary index and file
 - 3. Cemetery index
 - 4. Newspaper index

If a location is known or found as a result of the above check we will also check:

- 1. Local and school histories
- 2. Henderson and telephone directories if they exist for that location
- 3. The Archives card index

If a specific date of an event such as a birth, death or marriage is known we will check the local peper to see if there is a note made of it. Please note that not all editions of all newspapers are preserved.

You will receive a written report of the research that has been done noting all the sources checked. In addition a note will be made of all items which could be of interest to you to have copied along with the charges for such copying. NO COPYING would be done until the correct fee plus the postage costs had been paid. The current fees are: 25¢ per page for paper to paper copies and 50¢ per page for micro-film to paper copies. Remember it takes as long to do a successful search as an unsuccessful search. Your chances for a successful search may depend on how accurately you are able to describe the search you wish to have done.

These searches are done by knowledgeable volunteers. Should you require a more indepth search done the Society can supply you with the names of volunteers who could do this work for you. 9000000

IGI SEARCH POLICY:

- 1. ONLY MEMBERS of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society may search the IGI BUT only for their own genealogical purposes.
- 2. Those members who wish to use the IGI in person are charged a \$1.00 fee for each time they wish to search it. The Society will make prints of any of the material they wish at a cost of 25¢/page.
- 3. The Society offers a search service for those members who cannot do their own. For a fee of \$3.00 we will search up to five names provided a specific location is given. Included with this fee would be a print of five pages. Additional location searches are \$1.00 per name plus one print.

We will advise you on the numbers of pages available when they go beyond the limit and will attempt to estimate the postage costs. We require a surname, the given name AND a specific location. For example: we need a specific county for England and the Scandinavian countries; a state or province for the USA or Canada; a duchy for Germany unless it is after 1918. Ireland and Scotland do not require a county.

***There will be a \$1.00 search fee each time that we have to pull films. The reason for this is that the volunteer doing the work has to pay parking fees both at our library and the public library to do the printing and again when the films are returned to our library.

GRIFFITH VALUATION RESEARCH POLICY:

The Griffith Valuation Index and Valuations is the tax record or assessment of all households in Ireland during the years 1848-1864. These are valuable because the census records during this period were destroyed in a fire. The records list only the head of the household and describe the land being taxed with the amount of tax. The index lists surnames only so unless you know the county you will have a 20 county search. It is advisable to check in an Irish surname book to see which counties your surname is most commonly found. Surnames are listed by county, barony and parish which will need to be checked in turn. Spelling variations should be checked as well. The index also shows those who were there when the Tithe was taken in 1824-38. This could suggest whether people of that surname were still there after the famine when the valuations were done.

Searches for MEMBERS ONLY will be \$1.00 per time for in-person searches and \$1.00 per surname per county for mail-in searches. For this dollar we would tell you if your surname is listed and in which baronies. There is a \$10.00 fee to search the records for your surname and christian name. This \$10.00 fee would cover the first two hours of research only. Should it take longer we would estimate the time and cost to continue as well as the costs for any printing you may wish to have done at 25¢ per page.

***These records can be of great value to those who know only that their family came from Ireland because unless you know a precise location you will be unable to use records from Ireland. However, the records do take time to check and the person checking is volunteering her/his time, but the Society pays parking fees for this volunteer. It is simpler if members do their own searches but the fee for out-of-town members is still inexpensive when considering the cost of getting to Regina, parking and meals.

POLICY FOR USE OF THE INDIRECT PASSENGER SHIP INDEX AND LISTS:

There will be a \$1.00 per time charge for members to search these records in person, but the Society will also do searches for out-of-town members. The fee for this will be \$10.00 to check the Index and Lists. This will include up to 2 hours of searching. We will also advise on printing costs should we find your names on the List. Printing will cost 25¢ per copy. It takes two copies for each page of film.

The Lists generally give surname, christian name, all who travelled as one household with their ages, original home, state or country of origin, plus their destination in North America. All are written in German but are fairly easy to read.
