

If the contributor wishes return of material not used, they must provide a SASE with sufficient postage. We solicit articles with family connections to this area.

BOOK REVIEWS are printed upon receipt of the published book when received according to the above deadlines. If after the current deadline, the review will appear in the next issue of Life Lines. Pre-publication announcements are circulated of Society books only, or upon approval of the Executive Board within guidelines set by the Society. Books submitted of review are place in the Terrebonne Parish Public Library's Genealogy collection. We do not accept paid advertising. Neither the Editor nor the Society assumes responsibility or liability for information published in Life Lines or for any errors contained therein.

Succession of NELSON A. LAWLESS, No. 900 Probates

Whereas Richard BURTON, administrator of the above succession, has rendered a Final Account of his administration and prays the homologation of the same.

Now, therefore, all parties interested are hereby warned and notified to produce in this office within ten days following the present notice, any objection which they may have to the said Account, otherwise it will be homologated according to law.

In contract to a tax on goods and services (sales tax) in which some third party collects a set tax from individuals and then remits those funds to the taxing authority, a "Direct Tax" is a tax which is paid by a person or organization directly to the taxing authority and includes a tax levied on things such as real property, personal property, income or assets. In 1862, in the midst of the Civil War, the United States Congress realized they needed more money than was being brought in by the tariffs and excise taxes currently in vogue. They passed a direct tax limited to people whose income was over \$600 per year. This direct tax was eventually abolished in 1872 in favor of placing higher excise taxes on tobacco and alcohol.

In a book entitled "List of Names of Citizens of Louisiana From Whom The United States Direct Tax Was Collected in 1865, Together With The Amounts Paid By Each," printed by the Advocate Printing Office in Baton Rouge in 1892 contains at Pages 103-108 the names of individuals from Lafourche Parish who paid these taxes. This table has been created here to read left to right, in contrast to the original which appears to read top to bottom. It appears the names possibly pertain to property beginning in the northern part of the parish and following down the bayou. Evidently multiple entries for the same individual(s) denote their ownership of more than

one item of taxable property/income. The citizens named are:

A 1936 CAJUN WEDDING STORY

An article from along Bayou Lafourche appeared in the *Times Picayune* of May 8, 1928 (an incorrect date, probably an error in the WPA transcription). The article was then put into a scrapbook at the New Orleans Public Library. As a WPA project, this article was typed up and placed at the State Library of Louisiana. Because of this chronology, we now have access to an interesting tidbit of life along Bayou Lafourche in the early 20th Century. As with all of these old newspaper items, it can be said that you can learn something new (well, actually old) every day. In the article below, I have underlined those items of interest to the study of the culture of early 20th Century bayou life.

It should be noted that the actual wedding date for Eugenie Jeanne BRUNET and Calis Joseph THIBODAUX was May 9, 1936, as per Diocesan records. 1936 is an obviously better fit for a date based on information gained from the 1940 Census, where Calis' birth year is noted as being around 1917.

Genealogy. Calis Joseph THIBODAUX, born August 16, 1916 in Larose, was the son of August Joseph THIBODAUX and Selesia Valerie PITRE. His bride, Eugenie Jeanne BRUNET was born April 14, 1914 in Lafourche Parish. She was the daughter of Louis Joseph BRUNET and Eugenie Victorine CHOUEST. Calis died in November 1969 at age 63, and Jeanne died February 4, 1993 in Larose at the age of 78.

FIFTY MAIDS, FIFTY GROOMSMEN RIGHT FOR CAJUN WEDDING

Size of the Party One of Many Unusual Features of Bayou Nuptials. Lockport, La., May 7.

Fifty bridesmaids, accompanied by their swains, would seem like a large wedding party in most sections of the United States, but not in the Cajun country of Louisiana. That is just about the right number of attendants for the bride and bridegroom at a church wedding according to standards of the descendants of the Acadians. Of course the bride doesn't select her maids. She names the male attendants and they choose their 'best girls.'

The number of wedding party members is not the only unusual feature of Cajun nuptials. <u>The type of wedding usually is selected according to the time of the year</u>. There are grinding season nuptials and trapping nuptials.

Cook, Eat Outdoors. When Jeanne BRUNET married Calis THIBODAUX, their wedding came in the potato season, in the spring. It was in the tradition of the old days, when <u>weddings lasted</u> three days, in a stretch, and were events to be remembered a whole life time.

Dawn sees preparations in full sway. No kitchen stove could cook the food necessary, so <u>huge pots boil over outdoor fires</u>. Sacks of rice, dozens of chickens, and whole boxes of macaroni are transformed by <u>volunteer cooks</u> into the delectable bayou dishes. White cloths cover tables in the shade of the trees, and relays of waitresses fill the plates. Dinner begins early, and continues indefinitely as new guests arrive.

A 1936 CAJUN WEDDING STORY

Four o'clock in the afternoon it is the favored hour of a wedding, and at 2 the bride vanishes with the village dressmaker to don her finery. The bridesmaids, having dined, flock to their homes to remove their <u>curl papers</u> (scarcer these days, though, since Cajun maids take as enthusiastically to the permanent wave as their city sisters), the bridegroom leaves with his best man for his ceremonial bath and black suit. Water boiled in the kettles, and the dinner dishes can finally be washed by the older women.

Exchange Gossip. More celebrants appear. There is impromptu dancing and singing as old accordions and violins are removed from dusty cases. Old friends meet again for the first time in years. The FONSECAs, the LEDETs, the CANTRELLEs, the CHERAMIEs, exchange the accumulated gossip of months. And soon Calis THIBODAUX reappears, black suit, black gloves, black hat (the groom wears his had continuously save when actually inside the church) white tie and white shirt. And the gaily bedecked bridesmaids return in their long, trailing gowns.

Yards of white and blue ribbon are cut into streamers for the lapels of the boys and bodices of the maids. The groom's ribbons are extra-long. The party piles into gaily decorated automobiles and are off to the church. After the ceremony, they ride with screaming horns along the bayou road. "Adieu les Marie!" scream the watching youngsters clinging to the fence posts.

Jeanne BRUNET lived near the Larose Holy Rosary Church, so there were no cars. Instead, the bridal group marched up the <u>banquette (sidewalk)</u> in procession. Preceded by flower girls, they entered the church, and the pews were crowded with relatives and friends as the Rev. Charles TESSIER intoned the wedding ritual. Outside the church a band waited to serenade them, and to a gay March from the <u>TRICHE Brothers</u> they paraded homeward.

Enough for Town. Meanwhile, tables had been set in the yard for the collation. Scores of cakes were sliced, and glasses filled with <u>soft drinks and wine</u>. The bride and groom stood at the head of a long table, and the bride's cake was cut and shared. The wedding party toasted them, and left the table to the guests. There was enough for the whole town to feast.

And now followed the songs. The guests, replete with cake and wine, were in a sentimental mood, and the old favorites of the Cajun country drew many a tear. There was sad heart breaking "Le Lendemain des Noces," melancholy "Au Long De La Mer Jolie," the farewell song "O Ma Felle Cherie," as a chaser, say, rollicking "Prend ton Verre" followed, and the guests spirits take a lift.

The day's festivities were not yet over. The wedding dance was to come. The managers of the dance halls, well knowing the attraction they are, will pay hard cash to be the hosts to a wedding party; \$10, \$15, or some useful piece of furniture for the young couple. A sound truck announces the event to bayou inhabitants. Handbills are printed at Thibodaux and scattered to advertise it. Young and old, the Cajun folks flock to the Hall to see the bride. At eight o'clock the enclosed dance floor at TRICHE Brothers Pavillion was cleared and the band played "Here Comes The Bride." Necks craned as Jeanne entered on Calis's arm. The hundred partners followed. They

marched slowly around the floor, and the crowd watched as they separated, circled and met again in the center.

Then came the wedding waltz, with only the bride, groom and attendants taking part.

And so, with gay dancing ends the Cajun wedding on the Bayou Lafourche.

SAINTE VALERIE RELIC AT ST. JOSEPH CATHOLIC CHURCH IN THIBODAUX

The flowery prose of old newspaper articles may sound overblown to modern readers, but to someone researching history those articles can recreate a vision of an event from the days before visual media became dominant. Here is one event that must have impacted a large percentage of the population of Thibodaux in 1868.

From the Morning Star and Catholic Messenger newspapers in New Orleans on 26 April 1868. "Thibodaux. On Tuesday next, 29th [sic, 28th] April, a ceremony will take place at the Church of St. Joseph, Thibodaux, which is new in this country. The Abbe MENARD, cure of Thibodaux, having obtained during his visit to Rome last year, a relic of St. Valerie, Virgin and Martyr, will, on the day above named, have it placed in a richly ornamented case and deposited under an altar specially dedicated to that purpose. Great preparations have been made to make this ceremony as imposing as possible. The Most Rev. Archbishop will preside, attended by numbers of the Rev. Clergy; and if the weather be favorable, there will no doubt be a large concourse of people, as well from the town itself as the adjoining parishes.

Faith teaches us to respect the inanimate remains of all the dead---but with far greater reason are we called upon to render homage to the sacred relics of those heroes and heroines who have submitted to the most cruel torments for the name of Christ, and to make to Him the sacrifice of their lives."

From the New Orleans Crescent newspaper dated 05 May 1868.

"RELIC OF ST. VALERIA DEPOSITED NEAR THE ALTAR OF ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH--THE ARCHBISHOP AND THE BISHOP OF TEXAS PRESENT---LARGE ATTENDANCE.

We take the following from the Thibodaux Sentinel of the 2nd:

Tuesday, the 28th day of April, 1868, having been set apart for the religious ceremony, at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Thibodaux, over the relics of St. Valeria, and ample preparations having been in progress for several weeks to render it the most imposing demonstration of the kind ever witnessed in Louisiana, the day was awaited with anxiety and pleasure by all our people.

The merchant closed his store, the mechanic his shop, the business man his office, so that everyone could participate in and enjoy the ceremonies of the occasion. The morning was ushered in with a heavy shower of rain, accompanied by thunder, which continued until 7 o'clock, when the clouds began to disperse, and in a couple of hours the sun shone out bright and clear.

At an early hour those who were to take a part in the ceremonies began to proceed toward the church, some on foot, others in buggies, ambulances and such conveyances as could be procured for the moment.

At eight o'clock the yard in front of the church commenced filling, and the committees of arrangement and reception were kept busy in seating the ladies from a distance, who were without pews. At half past eight the favorite steamer *Nina Simmes* landed in front of the church with nearly five hundred passengers whom she had brought from New Orleans, the coast parishes, Donaldsonville, and the landings on the upper Lafourche. On her roof was a splendid band of music from New Orleans, which had come to enhance the enjoyment of the passengers, and to assist in the ceremony at the church. Flat boats from above and below Thibodaux, came in loaded with ladies and gentlemen eager to witness the proceedings of the day.

The 1500 seats in the ample edifice were soon occupied by ladies, whilst the large aisles and vacant places were filled with gentlemen standing, in one compact mass, the wings of the church being reserved for the different societies participating in the services.

On each side of the church, extending right and left, were six columns enveloped with magnolia leaves, and connected by wreaths of *arbor vitae*. Between the central ones on either side were the words 'Sancta Valerie,' tastefully decorated, whilst from the top of the cupola floated an elegant flag bearing the name of the church---'St. Joseph.' The interior of the church----lately altered and improved----was one royal scene of beauty and splendor, combining all the inventive talent of the indefatigable pastor and the exquisite taste and ingenuity of the fair devotees of his flock. The splendid paintings illustrating the 'Road of the Cross,' the numerous chandeliers, the various emblems and decorations, presented at a glance a scene of oriental magnificence, the description of which is far beyond our abilities.

At 9 o'clock the sound of the bell and the music of the choir announced that the religious ceremony appropriate to the occasion was begun, and the various societies commenced filing in by the central door, and taking the different positions assigned them, followed by the shrine containing the relic of Saint Valeria, which was deposited in the center of the church, on a stand handsomely decorated with floral wreaths, followed by a train of priests, the bishop of Texas, and the venerable and adored Archbishop Odin. The religious services then began, during which time the audience was favored with a sermon in French by the venerable and eloquent Abbe PERCHE, and in English by the impressive and earnest Father CHALON.

The procession was then formed in the following order, and passing out through the central aisle, proceeded to the grove in the rear of the church.

- 1. The banner of St. Valeria followed by fifty young persons---clothed in white, with garlands---who had recently received their first communion; twenty of whom carried *oriflammes* or small banners of silk of various colors and diverse emblems and inscriptions.
- 2. The banner of the Immaculate Conception accompanied by more than forty small girls from five to eight years of age, clothed in white, with blue ribbons and garlands, a number carrying small banners and wreaths.
- 3. The banner of the 'Children of Mary,' of Paincourtville, followed by the delegations from Paincourtville and Labadieville.

- 4. The banner of the 'Children of Mary' of the parish of Assumption, accompanied by a large delegation.
- 5. The banner of the 'Children of Mary' of Thibodaux, attended by a large delegation. In their ranks was a magnificent throne supporting a statue of the virgin, whilst many carried rich and elegant *oriflammes*. A deputation of a dozen orphan girls from Donaldsonville followed this banner.
- 6. The banner of Mount Carmel Convent, followed by the nuns and their pupils, bearing the lily and other flowers emblematical of the virtue of the saints.
- 7. The banner of the ladies of the Benevolent Society of Paincourtville, with a numerous delegation from that place and Labadieville.
- 8. The banner of the ladies of the Benevolent Society of Thibodaux, with a large delegation, followed by the ladies of this and the adjoining parishes.
- 9. The banner of the Society of St. Joseph, from....

Sadly the final section of the article was not available, but it was sure to obtain more detailed descriptions of this noteworthy event in Thibodaux's history.

The archaic meaning of the word "Plantation" is the planting of seeds, young trees, etc. It historically also was used in describing the establishment of a colony or new settlement. The most common understanding of the word is as a noun describing a usually large farm or estate in a tropical or sub-tropical environment on which a cash crop is grown, usually crops such as cotton, tobacco, coffee, or sugarcane. The word can also be used as an adjective, defining an object as being typical of the plantation estates, such as "plantation shutters."

Plantations usually changed their names as often as they changed ownership, so it can be confusing to a researcher who doesn't always find the lineage of ownership of a particular plantation. Here are some references I found related to plantations in Lafourche, some of which are not often heard of today, along with some news tidbits of interest to the sugar industry:

FROM THE THIBODAUX SENTINEL DATED 30 DECEMBER 1893

SUGAR HOUSE NOTES. The sugar rolling season is about terminated in this parish. The only planters who have some more grinding to do are: Messrs. BARKER and LEPINE on their Laurel Valley and Melodia plantations, expecting to get through on the former not before the 15th prox., and on the latter some time during the beginning of this coming week; Judge E. D. WHITE on the White plantation, who will get through now very hurriedly, as he is now rolling not only at his home place, but also at the WEBRE sugar house which he is utilizing since Messrs. MORVANT and LEVERT have completed their sugar-making operations; and Messrs NICHOLLS and HENDERSON on the Ridgefield plantation just above Thibodaux; these gentlemen would have been through a good while ago, had it not been for the number of mishaps that they have had to undergo.

We here below give the names of the planters who have successfully completed the sugar-cane grinding in Lafourche:

Mr. Ernest ROGER on "Greenwood" got through sugar rolling on Sunday evening the 17th inst., and together with his own crop and sugar cane he bought from his neighbors, granulated over three million pounds of sugar.

Hon. Andrew PRICE on "Acadia" just below Thibodaux terminated on the 17th inst., with an output of about 1650000 lbs. His crop fell short to what was expected at the beginning of the season, due to the tornado and to the ADAM and BOURGEOIS crevasses which overflowed and destroyed a part of his crop, and caused a neglect of field work while all hands were at work day and night fighting the continuous threatening waters during the overflow. Taking everything, pro and con, into consideration, we are told by his brother, Col. W. H. PRICE, his charge de'affaires, that Mr. PRICE is well satisfied with the result of his crop, and under the circumstances has no reason to complain, and is very thankful that he did not share worse.

Messrs TROSCLAIR and ROBICHAUX on their "Laurel Grove" completed grinding on Saturday the 16th inst., and together with cane purchased from their adjoining neighbors, made some three and a half million lbs of sugar. *En passant* we can state without

contradiction that this sugar farm for its size is the crack plantation of the Parish of Lafourche.

Mr. Silvere BOURG on "_avenwood" finished making syrups on Tuesday, the 12th inst. These syrups were conveyed to "Georgia" refinery and there transformed into sugar, yielding about 450,000 lbs.

Messrs BARKER and LEBLANC on "Clotilda" finished their grinding season on Sunday the 17th inst., making only syrups which they shipped to **Bush Grove refinery** for granulation, making about 450,000 lbs of sugar.

Major C. LAGARDE completed his sugar grinding on "McLeod" on the 15th inst., with an output of one million lobs of sugar, and on "Leighton" on last Thursday with an output of over one and a half million lbs. Although it might have been better on McLeod, the major expresses himself well satisfied with the result of the crop on his two places.

Messrs M. DELAUNE on "Delaune," Ellis FORET on "Felicia," and A. CLAUDET on "Bouverans" finished grinding on Tuesday the 12th inst. We have not been able to ascertain the output on these three places; we understand, however, that the result has been satisfactory.

- Mr. Leon GODCHAUX on his mammoth "Raceland" plantation successfully completed operations on the 13th inst., the output, which is the largest in the parish, has not yet been made known to us.
- Mr. J. T. BADEAUX on "Valentine" and "Edna" got through sometime this week, the result not having reached this office so far.
- Mr. J. R. GHEENS on "Golden Ranch," was one of the first to finish grinding, which occurred on Sunday the 10th inst. No definite news of the result.

Messrs MORVANT and LEVERT on "Webre" and "Trial" plantations made a successful termination of Tuesday the 18th inst. The result of output not known to us.

Messrs KENT & WEIL on "Abbey" completed their sugar grinding season on Friday the 15th inst., resulting in a good round 1200000 of granulated sugar.

Mr. Richard FORET on "Mary" finished sugar cane grinding on Thursday the 14th inst., with an output of about 820000 lbs of granulated sugars.

The FORET Bros. on "Home Place" completed sugar grinding on last Thursday, making with the cane crop bought from neighbors about 750000 lbs of sugar. They made syrups which they granulated at "Georgia" refinery.

Mr. David SCALLY made 2700 tons of cane which he sold at the rate of \$4.25 a ton to the "Bush Grove" Refinery.

Messrs LIBBY and BLOUIN on their "Bush Grove" completed grinding on Wednesday, the 20th inst., making with outside cane purchased two and a quarter million lbs of sugar. They are still working seconds, and granulating the syrups from "Melodia," the above neighboring plantation.

Mr. George DIONNE on "Enterprise" completed the sugar making season on Thursday the 14th inst., with an output of about 240 hogsheads of open kettle sugar, and 410 barrels of molasses.

Col. R.H. ALLEN on "Rienzi," after a few mishaps not serious, finished up on Saturday Dec 16th, with satisfactory results.

Mrs. Taylor BEATTIE on "Dixie" completed grinding on Sunday evening the 17th inst., with an output of 800000 lbs of first class open kettle sugar. This is the largest output on Dixie since the war.

Messrs VERGNOLE and CLAUDET on "St. Bernard" terminated their cane harvest on Tuesday the 12th inst, making about 282 hogsheads of open kettle sugar.

- Mr. A. G. COIGNET on "Octavie" with some difficulty completed his labors some time about the 11th inst., making about 175 hogsheads. The machinery gave out, and Mr. Myrtile GAUDÉ who was grinding there also, had to haul the balance of his crop to Bush Grove, about 210 tons, having previously made about 55 hogsheads of open kettle sugar.
- Mr. Chas. S. MATHEWS, after considerable reverses on his "Georgia" plantation, came to a close on yesterday, with an output of cane ground on the place of three million pounds of sugar, besides granulating one million and a quarter pounds of sugar from syrups conveyed to his refinery by means of pipes. The milling capacity of this refinery is a very good one, averaging from 450 to 500 tons per day of 24 hours.
- Mr. Trasimond FORET on "Ludivine" got through grinding on Sunday the 17th inst., output about 800,000 pounds of sugar from syrups made and granulated at Valentine.
- ADDLER & Co., on "Choctaw" terminated some time during last week, with satisfactory results.
- Mrs. J. FORET and Sons, on "Coulon" wound up on last Tuesday evening with an output of about one and a half million pounds of sugar. This place only made syrups which were shipped to Laurel Valley refinery for granulation.

This, as far as we know, together with those we have already mentioned who have finished, completes the list of sugar planters who have made a successful and early termination of their sugar operations in this parish, and should we inadvertently have forgotten someone, we will be pleased to make mention of it, should the lapsus come to our knowledge.

In conclusion, we will state that all things considered, our sugar farmers have every reason to be thankful to Almighty God for the good weather He sent them during their grinding season, and for the successful termination of their arduous labors during the same period.

May they not be less successful for this coming crop is the sincere wish and New Year's cordial greeting of the THIBODAUX SENTINEL.

We met on our streets on last Thursday, Mr. MURRAY, the efficient manager of WAVERLY. He informed us that the output on that place this year reached over 2,200,000 pounds of sugar.

FROM THE THIBODAUX SENTINEL DATED 24 FEBRUARY 1894

- "ABBEY" is now stocked with 225 acres of plant cane, and 300 acres of stubbles.

ELECTION NOTICE FOR NOVEMBER 5, 1855

The *Thibodaux Minerva* newspaper, as the official journal for Lafourche Parish, Louisiana, ran an Election Notice in their October 20, 1855 edition. For those interested in Lafourche Parish history, the notice provides interesting details of the communities of that time. The paper reads:

ELECTION NOTICE.

PURSUANT to law and a proclamation of his excellency P. O. HEBERT, Governor of the State of Louisiana, dated 26th day of July, 1855, elections will be held in the parish of Lafourche on MONDAY, NOVEMBER 5, 1855, from 9 o'clock A.M. to 4 o'clock P.M. for a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Treasurer, Auditor of Public Accounts, Superintendent of Public Education of the State of Louisiana; a District Attorney for the Fifth Judicial District; a Representative to Congress for the Second Congressional District; a Senator for the parishes of Assumption, Lafourche, and Terrebonne, to fill the unexpired term of the Hon. P. B. KEY, deceased; two Representatives to the General Assembly of the State, a Sheriff, Clerk of the Court, Coroner, and Assessor, for the parish of Lafourche; a justice of the Peace for each of the respective Police Jury Wards, of the parish of Lafourche, but in those wards in which there is an incorporated town or a town containing three hundred inhabitants there shall be elected two Justices of the Peace, a Constable for each Police Jury ward of the parish of Lafourche; and a vote will be taken on the question of removing the seat of Government from Baton Rouge, to New Orleans---each and every qualified voter voting for or against the removal shall have written or printed on his ballot the words "For Removal," if he be in favor of such removal, and the words "Against Removal," if he be opposed to such removal.

THE LIFE OF CAROLINE S. POOL

Caroline Sydney LOCKWOOD POOL was born on November 18, 1824 in Elizabeth City, North Carolina. She was the daughter of Hezekiah LOCKWOOD (from Westchester, New York) and Mary KING (from Elizabeth City, North Carolina). According to her obituary, which appeared in the December 30, 1903 edition of the Times-Democrat, her family was amongst some of the earliest settlers of Virginia and North Carolina.

She was educated in Virginia and Washington DC, and was classmates with several notable women of the first half of the 1800's including Jessie BENTON FREMONT, the daughter of the US Senator of Missouri, Thomas Hart BENTON, and the future wife of John C. FREMONT, famous explorer and first senator of California. At the age of 17, Caroline graduated from Miss English's Academy in Washington DC. She was considered a highly educated woman for her time, and years later utilized this education to assist in the education of young women.

The following year, on July 4, 1842, she married Stephen Decatur POOL (son of Joshua & Ann LOWRY POOL) in their native town of Elizabeth City, North Carolina. They were married just short of 60 years and had fourteen children, eleven of which grew into adulthood. During the course of their marriage, he was an educator, newspaper and magazine editor, politician, Confederate colonel, and finally a farmer. They would live in Beaufort and Raleigh, North Carolina, New Orleans, Tangipahoa Parish, and Osyka, Mississippi.

While residing in Elizabeth City, he was the newspaper editor of "The Old North State", and served as the clerk of the House of Commons in Pasquotank County. In September 1849, he became the principal of the Elizabeth City Academy and shortly thereafter Caroline became the head of the Female Department.

In 1855, they moved to Beaufort, North Carolina in order for Stephen to teach at a school in Malachi ROBERSON's home. The school grew into the Beaufort Female Seminary for the instruction of young ladies and by 1858; both Stephen & Caroline are listed in a school directory (printed by the Beaufort Journal) as principals.

Caroline was a devout member of the Episcopal Church, but when they moved to Beaufort the town was without an Episcopal parish. On September 1, 1855, she became one of the founding members of a new parish. Lacking a place of worship, her husband offered the school for services. Later a Baptist church would be utilized until St. Paul's Church was built. After the church building was erected in 1857, the rector started a school in a small building behind the church. Lacking enough space, Stephen Decatur POOL's school would once again be offered until an adequate school building could be built on the grounds of St. Paul's Church.

During the Civil War, her husband was initially commissioned captain of Company H of the 10th Regiment of North Carolina with three of their sons (James, John, & Henry), serving under him. He was captured in 1862, but then paroled and exchanged. By September 1863 he would rise to the rank of colonel. After the war, he became editor of the New Bern "Daily Journal of Commerce."

In 1875, her husband was elected to the position of Superintendent of Public Instruction. They moved to Raleigh where he served from January 1, 1875 to the end of June 1876. Unfortunately, he was forced to resign due to charges of financial irregularities in regard to the management of funds provided by the Peabody Education Board.

The following year, in 1877, Caroline and Stephen moved to New Orleans, where their son, Stephen Decatur POOL Jr. was the night editor of the Times-Democrat paper. Nine of their children (John, Henry, Dora, Mary, Caroline, Carlton, Charles, Henrietta, & William) accompanied them. The eldest son, James Harrell POOL, died that year in Beaufort, leaving behind a wife and seven children, including twin boys born that year. They lost another son, William, to yellow fever within two or three years of moving to New Orleans.

Their son, Stephen Decatur POOL Jr., married Jeanne GUIRAUD the following year on September 10, 1878, and had six children. Two other children married and resided in New Orleans. Carlton married Susan HINTON, and had seven children. And Mary married Charles RITCHIE on June 10, 1885, and had one child.

Two of their daughters, Caroline and Henrietta, married residents of Gibson. Caroline married James Alexander KNIGHT (son of James McClelland KNIGHT and Annie Eliza JARVIS) on April 26, 1888 in New Orleans. They took up residence in his native town of Tigerville (Gibson). They had no children but raised one of James Harrell POOL's sons, James Many POOL.

Henrietta married Charles WALTHER (son of Philip WALTHER and Margaret Louise SCHAFFLER) on June 25, 1890 in New Orleans, Louisiana. They resided in Tigerville and had six children.

Prior to moving to New Orleans, two sons had married in North Carolina. John married Laura KNIGHT on December 19, 1865 in Wayne, North Carolina, and had four children. Henry married Cecilia MOORE, and had two children.

The other three children, William (who died between 1879 and 1880), Dora, and Charles, never married.

Caroline and Stephen lived in New Orleans from 1877 to 1887. Afterwards, they are reported to have lived in Tangipahoa Parish possibly farming. They also had a home in Osyka, Mississippi and one source theorized that this may have been for the purpose of avoiding a yellow fever epidemic. Stephen died on December 21, 1901 in Osyka, Mississippi. Two years later, on December 29, 1903, Caroline contracted the flu and pneumonia and died in New Orleans at the home of her son, John Lockwood POOL.

At 9 o'clock last night, Mrs. C. S. Pool died at the residence of her son, 1423 Soniat street, in the eightieth year of

her age.

Apart from her hobie qualities as a herent to the cause of the Confederacy, Mrs. Pool was noteworthy as one of Mrs. Pool was noteworthy as one of the last links to be broken in the clasin which binds the present to ante bellum times. She was born in Elizabeth (City, N. C., Nov. 18, 1824. She was educated at Claiborne School, in Virginia, and at Miss English's Academy, in Washington city, from which institution she was graduated when seventeen years of age. A year later she married Stephen D. Pool, of her native town.

Upon the breaking out of the war her husband and her three elder sons entered the Confederate army and fought through the war, while Mrs. Pool was left to the war, while Mrs. Pool was left to care for her younger children, of whom the sons were too young to bear arms. Her experience was similar to that of hundreds of other heroic women of the times, a struggle to keep the family and the home upon the sienderest resources, but like many of her brave sisters of the South, she bore the privations and hardships incident to the situation bravely and uncomplainingly, buoyed up by a patriotism as noble as any which ever won unfading laurels on the tented field.

the tented field.
In 1877 the family moved to New Orleans, but during the greater part of her residence in the Far South she has lived in Tangipahea parish and in Mississippi. in Tangipahea parish and in Mississippi. Col. Pool died in Osyka, Miss, two years ago, after he and Mrs. Pool had lived together more than sixty years. They had fourteen children, eight of whom survive. Four living sons are all residents of this city: John L., Henry C. Carleton F. and Charles E. The four daughters are Mrs. Mary Ritchie and Miss Dora Pool, who lived with their mother, and Mrs. James Knight and Mrs. Charles Walther of Terrebonne parish. La All the children were at the bedside of the mother during her last hours.

ish. La. All the children were at the bedside of the mother during her last hours.

Mrs. Poed was a highly educated and cultured woman, and all her life was a consistent and devout member of the Eplacopal Church. She was a daughter of H. Lockwood of Westhester county of W. Y., and Mary King of Elizabeth City, her ancestors being among the earliest English, settlers in Virginia and North Carolina. She was a schoolmate of Jessie Benton (Mrs. Frenont) and other noted women of the first half of the k t century, and up to her last moments she retained a clear remembrance of political and social affairs in Washington during the thirtles.

Although familiar with the gay life of the national capital, and in touch with some of the most famous women of her ime. Mrs. Pool's love and ambitious were concentrated in her husband, hee sellidren and her home. She was demestic in the best sense of the word, not because of a marrow and circumseribed mental horizon, but because knewing of the great world, she turned unheaf tatingly to her home and her lowed ones. The first DUPRE to arrive in North America from France was Louis LeCompte DUPRE. He was born about 1654 in the region of Poitou, France, son of Charles LeCompte DUPRE and Anne DEFOSE.

Louis LeCompte DUPRE was a musket soldier when he arrived in North America, first found at Becancourt on the St. Lawrence River, across from Trios Rivers in 1672. By 1679 Louis resided in the tiny settlement of Champlain and was no longer a soldier.

In 1681 Louis purchased the Seigneury of Terrebonne. Terrebonne is a large area of land on the north shore across from the island of Montreal. Seigneury in French Canada is the owner of an estate granted by Royal decree, awarded to wealthy Frenchman from whose estate Louis was able to purchase.

On 4 Aug 1683, Louis married Marie Catherine ROLLAND de St. George at Ville Marie, Montreal. Marie Catherine was born 21 Oct 1662 in Montebury, Cherburg, Diocese of Countances, Normandy France. Her parents were Adrien ROLLAND, Sier de St. George and Jeanne GUESNON.

Louis LeCompte DUPRE died on 13 Jul 1715 at Montreal, Canada. For three years following his death, Marie Catherine actively continued the development of Terrebonne. On 1 Oct 1718 she sold the Serigneury for a large profit.

Marie Catherine ROLLAND died in Montreal on 3 Apr 1733. Her descendants continue to be prominent in Quebec for the next two centuries.

Louis LeCompte DUPRE and Marie Catherine ROLLAND had 15 or 16 children. The actual number of children is being disputed by Canadian Genealogist TANGUAY, JETTE', and ROY. According to Roy, all were born in Montreal and several died young.

LaFamille LeCompte Dupre, written by Pierre-George ROY, is a Genealogical history of the families in Canada. Mr. ROY is a noted Canadian family historian. Roy states at the time of his death; Louis LeCompte DUPRE was probably the most important businessman in the whole region of Montreal. Gradually the family became known as DUPRE .Roy traces the male descendants of the DUPRES in Canada, ending with the death in the mid-20th Century of the last three male descendants bearing the name DUPRE. One was Mauarice DUPRE, solicitor General for Canada from 1930-1935. In Canada, the direct line of the family name DUPRE appears to have died out.

Genealogical information on the children of Louis LeCompte DUPRE and Catherine ROLLAND is taken from the book by Roy. It seems that the information on births, marriages and deaths are more complete than other biographers.

However, one son is not mentioned in Canadian records, Jacque LeCompte DUPRE. Tanguay, Roy and Jette' give a date of birth, but there are no Canadian records concerning his marriage, children or death- for good reason. Jacque had left Canada by the early 1720's to establish himself, his new name and his line in the Louisiana Province.

Jacque LeCompte DUPRE TERREBONNE son of Louis LeCompte DUPRE and Marie Catherine ROLLAND was born 27 Apr 1696 at Ville Marie on the island of Montreal, Quebec. Jacque grew up in Montreal where the French continued their explorations for new settlements.

Some early Canadians who resided on the edge of civilization saw the opportunities of the new lands and the freedom of the Indians. When the newcomers and Indians were not fighting, they were traveling and trading together. A new kind of Canadian quickly appeared: individuals who sought the wilderness and its freedom and avoided the rules and regulations of the settlements.

The French became masters of the inland waterways of North America. The boatman knew and sang many songs as they worked. They wore deerskin leggings or linen culottes and linen blouses, as well as bright sash, usually red, around the waist, a scarf or tasseled hat and moccasins. In winter they wore great blue hooded coats called capotes. In other seasons, the capotes became pillows or blankets. They loved their pipes. Most voyageurs were short and strong and very sure of themselves. As they escape authority, they became carefree and self-reliant, always ready for a drink or fight. As they became settlers, they became quite litigious. This probably fit young Jacque LeCompte DUPRE well.

By 1699, a French mission was established at Cahokia, on the east side of the Mississippi in the Illinois Country. It was the first of three important missions that became French forts and settlements in that area. In 1703 Kaskaskia was established, followed by Fort de Chartres in 1720.

In 1698, the king commissioned the Montreal-born Canadian Pierre LEMOYNE Sieur D'IBERVILLE, to found a colony in the Louisiana Province. In January 1699, Iberville arrived at Mobile Bay with his brother Jean Baptiste LEMOYNE Sieur de BIENVILLE, some soldiers and a few settlers of whom many were Canadians. He established colonies at Mobile and then Biloxi.

By 1712, the population of Louisiana reached 400 persons, including 20 Negroes. In that same year, the King of France granted to Antoine CROZAT the exclusive right for 15 years of trading to develop the Louisiana Province. He appointed La Mothe CADILLAC to be governor in place of BIENVILLE, who had wanted to become governor after the death of his brother, IBERVILLE.

In 1714, Governor CADILLAC in Mobile sent JUCHEREAU de ST. DENIS and 24 men up the Red River to establish a trade with New Spain. They were stopped at a Natchitoches Indian settlement by a great log jam that stretched over 100 miles upriver. A permanent settlement was established. St.

Denis and some men then continued by land across Texas and into Mexico to purchase horses and try unsuccessfully to establish a trade.

In 1717, CROZAT conveyed his rights to Louisiana back to the crown. Also in that same year, Fort Toulose was established in Alabama and the Illinois Country was separated from Canadian jurisdiction and incorporated into the Louisiana Province. The company believed that it would be more of an advantage to Indian trade and mining in the Louisiana Province was administered through Louisiana.

On 28 May 1718, Jacque LeCompte DUPRE, age 22 and a partner in Montreal hired Jean ROBITAILLOE to make a trip to the pays d'en haut. Records of Montreal notaries show that his brothers, Jean Baptiste and George LeCompte DUPRE were also actively employing other men at the same time for trips to the pays d'en haut. Jacque was not content to stay in Montreal and work for others.

In 1718, Governor BIENVILLE decided to move the capitol to New Orleans. Land grants called a concession were made along the Mississippi, with the condition that the lands be colonized. Land along the Mississippi was much more fertile than the land along the Gulf Coast and somewhat less susceptible to hurricanes.

Between 1717 and 1721, the company of the Indies sent over 7,000 Europeans to the Louisiana Province. Many died on the way and more died shortly after reaching the Gulf Coast. In 1720, Governor PERRIER was asked to send French traders to the land of the Attakapas and the Opelousas. Louisiana was opening up fast.

By 1722, at the age of 26, Jacque LeCompte DUPRE TERREBONNE was in the Illinois Country. Unlike his brothers, he had dropped the "LECOMPTE" and was now DUPRE TERREBONNE or just TERREBONNE. Jacque was the explorer in the family. Whatever the reason, while in Illinois, Jacque chose to add TERREBONNE to his name.

It is estimated that in 1722, there were more than 700 Frenchmen in the Illinois Country. They were made up of small farmers, laborers, women, and children. This included the settlement of Kaskaskia, Charters and Cahokia.

The settlement of Kaskaskia is where Jacque DUPRE TERREBONNE contracted to marry Anne Marie BIENVENU. Their marriage contract is indexed in the old Kaskaskia records of the Randolph County Clerk, Chester, Illinois, although the original contract is missing. The marriage record is also missing from the archives of the church of the Immaculate Conception of Kaskaskia. These records are in the diocese archives in Belleville, Illinois, starting in 1727. The marriage record of Antoine BIENVENU are still in the Archives.

Anne Marie BIENVENU was a daughter of Philippe BIENVENU and Francoise ALLAIRE, the ancestors of BIENVENU families in both Illinois and Louisiana. Information on the descendants of Philippe BIENVENU can be found in three good works: Natalia BELDING'S Kaskaskia under the French Regime, The BIENVENU Family of St. Martinville, a family history; and a French Connection, another family history that gives information on the Louisiana and Illinois BIENVENU families.

The BIENVENU Family of St. Martinville cites archival information from France. According to this information, Philip BIENVENU was the son of Philippe BIENVENU & Esperance PETIT of Orleans, France. Philippe was baptized at Orleans, France in the church of Saint Paul on 23 March 1671. At the age of 25, Philippe moved to Lorient and married Francoise ALLAIRE on 5 Jul 1699. She was from Ploemeur, France the daughter of Jeanne RAUDAS.

Jacque DUPRE TERREBONNE must have settled temporarily in the Illinois Country. Inventories of the estate of Jacque BOURDON, Captain of the Militia dated 1 Jul 1723 and 8 Nov 1723, refer to a promissory note from DUPRE TERREBONNE for 150 Livres of rice from the warehouse An inventory dated 10 Sep 1724 of the estate of Louis TURPIN of Kaskaskia, included a promissory note for 70 Livres from Jacque DUPRE TERREBONNE.

A tract of land owned by Jacque DUPRE TERREBONNE was sold for him in 1725. It appears that Jacque was not there at the time of the sale.

Philippe BIENVENU'S division of property of June 1723 stated that two daughters were on the coast, one of them being Anne Marie. If Anne Marie was on the coast by that date, so was her husband Jacque. They had probably joined the convoy of great log pirogues that left in the spring of 1723 for New Orleans. Jacque DUPRE TERREBONNE and Anne Marie BIENVENU were in Louisiana by 1724.

On 5 Feb 1724, Jacque DUPRE TERREBONNE filed a suit in New Orleans against Francoise GRACE to dissolve a hunting and fishing partnership. The case is still in the archives of the Superior Council of Louisiana in the Louisiana State Museum. With this suit we know that Jacque was in Louisiana.

Laurent DUPRE TERREBONNE was baptized at St. Louis Church in New Orleans. His baptismal record describes his parents as being Jacque, surnamed D'ARBONNE and Anne BIENVENU, residents of the parish of Les Allemand.

About the time of their mother's death in 1771, Laurent and Jacque left the German Coast for the Opelousas Country. They were later joined briefly by their brother Antoine.

When Laurent DUPRE TERREBONNE married Marie Josephe Belaire FONTENOT on 26 May 1772, the marriage was recorded at Pointe Coupee. The marriage may have taken place at Opelousas area by a visiting Priest. Laurent was described as a resident of the Opelousas District., indicating that he had acquired land prior to his marriage. Laurent and Marie Josephe settled in the southwest section of present day St. Landry Parish, in the area that had been heavily settled by Alabama immigrants. The tract of land that Laurent DUPRE had was in sec. 99A 1068. It consists of 677 acres of land. The northern section of this tract was the old Opelousas-Ville Plate Road (Hwy. 167).

How did the name of Terrebonne come to the Lafourche Interior? Guillaume DUPRE TERREBONNE was bpt. 8 Dec 1748 in St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church on the German Coast. The year 1748 was a difficult one for the settlers on the German Coast. In November, there was an Indian attack, Governor VAUDREUIL ordered evacuation of the area. Jacque, Anne Marie and their children were force to leave and reside on the East side of the Mississippi River. Guillaume DUPRE TERREBONNE traveled all over South Louisiana exploring.

On May 30 1782, Guillaume DUPRE TERREBONNE married Francesca MARGOTA at St. Louis Catholic Ch., in New Orleans. Her parents were Jacque MARGOTA & Catherine LANCHEVINS.

Guillaume DUPRE TERREBONNE & Francesca MARGOTA settled along Bayou Grand Caillou at some unknown date. Their settlement was located on both sides of the bayou, right below where Bayou Guillaume enters Bayou Grand Caillou. The place became known as the old Darbonne Settlement. Although there is no longer a trace of the settlement, it can be located from old maps.

Guillaume and Francesca did not remain long at the Darbonne Settlement, possible about three years, cause in the late 1780 or early 1790s they moved to Cheniere Caminada. According to an affidavit made by their son Jacque, Guillaume & Francisca were there when Jacque was born.

There are no claims papers existing in the Louisiana State Land Office for any of the land settlements in Cheniere Caminda prior to the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. Information concerning these claims was published in the American State Papers. From these, one can learn some facts of the Terrebonne Family in the 18th century.

The TERREBONNE sons and daughters had many children. Their children all kept the name TERREBONNE as surname. In later generations, many sons were given the first name of DUPRE and the DUPRES' of the St. Landry Parish area gave their sons the name of TERREBONNE.

As one can see the Families of TERREBONNE of the Lafourche Interior and some of the DUPRES of the St. Landry area are all from the same family that came out of Canada.

The ELISKA PLANTATION, was established by Adolph LEBLANC and was originally named RIETABAS PLANTATION. RIETABAS PLANTATION was purchased by Adolph LEBLANC in 1857. This plantation was situated on the left bank of Bayou Lafourche, about 27 miles below the town of Thibodaux, LA. For the times, this was a good size plantation, measuring some 17 Arpents front by a depth of forty arpents. The ELISKA PLANTATION produced about seventy two hogsheads of sugar.



[Now will you tell us your name and where you were born?]

Mrs. I am Bernice HENRY TROSCLAIR, I was born on Grand Caillou on 4 Oct. 1917. We moved two months later to Little Caillou.

[Now will you tell us your name, when and where you were born?]

Mr. I am Allie TROSCLAIR, I was born in Bourg on 27 Nov. 1913.

Mrs. Talk in French.

[Would you like to talk in French?]

Mr. We worked in the fields, we didn't have it too bad, then coal oil was only five cents a gallon, we ate sweet potatoes a lot.

[How about you?]

Mrs. Oh yeah, it began after I was working {Indian Ridge Packing Company} when I was about eight years old. In my case, I went to see a doctor. I had to because I wanted to take care of my back, because my daddy sees everybody and adjusts everybody. It is a good thing they had a good doctor on the floor the same time I had it. He had to been ever since and he had a big bucket for that, but it was at Boudreaux Canal the factory. {Dr. H. P. ST. MARTIN?}. Then it got a little bit better. I started peeling crabs. I think it was worth a nickel a pound, to peel crabs. I had to fight to get to line up close, because everybody was lined up at one of the tables, for a nickel. People today think they have it rough, but we had it rough. They have it easy compared to what we went through. When I come home, I had to go see the doctor about my back, because I wanted to get better so I could earn more money. We were not very close. From Boudreaux Canal to where the church is now in Chauvin, walking to go and walking to come back. We couldn't take the bus, because it cost high. That was my living when I was young. When we got married, {July?, 1939} we moved. Because we never owned a home when I was single; we had to move to different places. When the work was too slow in one place, we would go to another place. Finally I got married. We were real poor for about three or four years. My oldest son was about a year and a half; my husband went to work for Texaco. It wasn't like it is now. In those days you would stay there at Texaco, not like it is now. He would stay there for nine days. I worked and after I moved here. I worked in the school houses, cooking and those hamburger joints. I also worked at Terrebonne General. One time I worked on the floor as an aide. Also I worked at a department store at the register. I had to quit there too, because I was sickly person since I was born. I got spinal meningitis, at one time and my eyes didn't see nothing. I thought I was gone. I had all of that altogether, all at once. And I got reason to be still alive. My sister in law, I went to see her boyfriend, the doctors were there and nobody could leave, they stayed all the while and I am still alive. My husband worked almost thirty-four years for Texaco and then he got a sickness too. When he retired with his pension; we live better now than we ever did in our lives. We feel comfortable, we feel at ease, we got everything we could need and I thank the good Lord. We don't have to worry about tomorrow like in those days. Sometimes I had to go work at four, when we worked on the plantation on Little Caillou.

It was a plantation, but they don't have it anymore. They closed all that. In those days, the olden days –

[You worked there?]

Mrs. Yeah, my father worked there. When we would go to church we had to walk, from there to the church.

[What church?]

Mrs. I don't recall, we had to walk. If we wanted to go to a dance, we had to walk, sometimes four or five miles. We had to walk, if we wanted to go there. A lot of times, I stayed home. We had a real tough time.

[Can you tell us where the church was?]

Mrs. You see, when you go to Montegut, you take the bridge and go across and it was just opposite there.

[Who owned it?]

Mrs. The South Coast Company, at that time. It was terrible at that time.

[Talk about life on the plantation a little bit.]

Mrs. Well, when I worked there I would cut cane.

[You had a house furnished by the plantation?]

Mrs. The house was furnished until the week my uncle died. They would pay ninety cents a day to work in the field. That was before I got married and after I got married. That was forty-five years ago.

[In your particular family, how many people were there, living in the same house?]

Mrs. When I got married, there was, it is harder now to remember things, you know. A half-sister and two half-brothers. They were married and they was old. My mama was married twice, when my daddy died. I had Don, then Harry, Mark, they had a sister and a brother-in-law. My sister was married, she was the oldest, an older brother, mama and daddy and myself. We never did go hungry, of course. That is one thing I can say, we never did go hungry. There was food, we had to eat.

[Tell us what it was like on the plantation.]

Mrs. We would leave before sunrise and come back after sundown. Some time it was dark at sundown. We would work all day long. Mama went to the store to buy the things, so we could eat.

[So what would you do, cut cane?]

Mrs. Cut cane and lay it down in the rows.

[What was your mother's day like?]

Mrs. She was a woman that had more courage than I have ever seen in my life. She was a good person and anybody that knew her, thought she was as sweet as a person could be. If she could help somebody she would. She was also a sickly woman also, as she gets old, you know. I never have seen a person that had a better mother than I had. My daddy, he was good too, but he had his moods, but that would pass over and he was good. {laughing} He said "I believe in the future", When I hurt, I am going to tell you how I feel. There is only three left in the family. A half brother and sister and I have a sister that is younger than me and I have a half-brother. He suffered in his last days and he died. I have another brother that lives in Cocodrie. We lost baby after baby, I thank the good Lord we did. I don't know how often we did. I am feeling good and I thank the

good Lord for that, because I can still go around.

[How did your father get paid, money, tokens or what? How would he get his pay?]

Mrs. When my husband got paid, he had to go the store to get our groceries.

Mr. Four dollars a week.

Mrs. After you had worked, you would go to the store and you could buy four dollars groceries. They would not pay out money. My daddy had a garden, we had plenty to eat.

[You could go buy at another store?]

Mrs. You couldn't.

[What kind of garden plot did you have?]

Mrs. It was just outside the house. I would say about 50 feet -

Mr. Fifty feet long and thirty feet wide.

[That was when you were married?]

Mrs. That was when we were married. When we got married, he was living in Bourg.

Mr. I went to work at Chris CENAC

Mrs. Yeah.

Mr. I was making fifty dollars.

Mrs. A month.

Mr. Fifty dollars a month. I was working for Texaco on Cenac's boat.

[That was before World War II?]

Mr. Yeah.

[To run the boat?]

Mr. Yeah to run the boat.

Mrs. He worked for Texaco for almost thirty-four years, he retired in 1975. I said thirty-four, maybe I am wrong. He started in sixty-three and retired in 1975.

[What were you doing for Texaco?]

Mr. Worked a boat.

Mrs. In the yard here in Houma.

Mr. I was down there first, below Montegut.

Mrs. He worked that for a few years. We moved to Montegut and bought a home in Montegut. He was working in Houma, I said if you are going to be in Houma we might as well live in Houma, so I sell the place and we will buy one in Houma. He worked here between New Orleans and Houma. I had two children, one with two good eyes and one with a bad eye. They had to open the cornea five times. I was by myself in Houma and sometimes he was gone a week. His eye would pop open and he had to come home so we could take the boy to New Orleans.

[Did you move to New Orleans?]

Mrs. I stayed in New Orleans for ten years.

Mr. They didn't have no doctor for that over here.

Mrs. My boy could ride the bus. He had it when he was seven years and he got over it when he was nine. As he got older, he still had it at times.

[The boy got this when he was born?]

Mrs. It was five years later. I thought it would get better because my dad had a sleepy eye when he was a little boy.

[How was life different after you were married?]

About five years later it came better. After about five years it came better because when you are making fifty dollars a month, it is better than ninety cents an hour.

[What about the little boy?]

Mrs. I keep him at the house because we didn't have any money. My side hurt, but all night I wait on all the people. Everybody was working to make money. Now, it is got better. After the fever passed, I went to work down there peeling shrimp. I had to peel sitting down. We were to get some peelings. I would go behind the people and pick up the peelings behind them. That was when we were living on Little Caillou. Everybody worked hard. That was on shrimp, crabs, oysters, I did it all.

[So most of the time when you were younger, how old were you when you went to work?]

Mrs. You had to be four feet tall to work. They had nothing to protect your clothes or anything. You had to work with your hands.

[Who did you work for?]

Mrs. It was a CADIERE, in the first days it was him.

[How about school, where did you go to school?]

Mrs. I went to school at Boudreaux Canal, below the bridge, they had a big house built all in one. My first teacher was Anna PORCHE, she taught me primer, first, second and third. [All together?]

Mrs. All together. When she was teaching the second, the third grade was teaching the primer. That is how it was. In fourth grade, I went to upper Little Caillou.

[You walked there?]

Mrs. We had moved, they had dirt roads. I remember walking in water to get to the school. They had busses but none that came to that school. I quit school in January in the fifth grade because my mother was sick. When I would come home, I didn't have time to study or do homework. I had to do the work for the older people. They wanted to be the boss, them. Once when I was four I caught the flu. My brother wouldn't do nothing, so I had to do the work. Afterward I had to do my homework with a coal oil lamp. I tell my mama, I was in school all day long, I come here and have to do my work at night, I can't do that anymore. I would stay, sometimes in school to do my work. The principal was good enough to let me stay. So I had to quit on that account. I educated myself after. Later on, we moved to town and went to school there, but I had to quit too. My older sister got married; she used to teach at Honduras out there. I told my mama that I couldn't go any longer and that I had to quit. I got a job at Terrebonne General as a Nurse's aide.

[You worked there long?]

Mrs. I would have loved to stay, but I got sick so I had to quit.

[You had a doctor around here?]

No, I had a doctor from Houma when I was a child. It was all Dr. Hugh St. MARTIN in those days. He would come by horse and wagon. He would come once in a while.

[Was it really a horse and wagon?]

Mrs. No, I call it ramblers, because he came by horse and wagon. If you wanted a doctor, you had to come to Houma.

[Dr. St. MARTIN would come visit people?]

MR. & MRS. ALLIE TROSCLAIR ORAL HISTORY {French Interpretation by Godfrey BUQUET} Transcribed by Philip J. Chauvin, Jr.

Only if you would call, then you had to come to Houma. If you were sick enough, he would come. I had my sister Theresa and my brother Arthur. We were five that would call him. My daddy caught a flu, but it wasn't severe. My sister and my mother had to go to him. He went to go to the cistern and she found my daddy sleeping down there. It happened in the middle part of winter. My sister Theresa used to call him because he was used to doing business with mom and dad. That is what I remember. I thought that I had a headache when I was going back home, I was staying with my other sister and my God Mother.

[You were the first one to get it?

Mrs. I was the first one to get it. He had a son that died there in Houma. We all got a time to go and so I guess it was her time.

[Did it pass on Bayou Blue?]

Mrs. No they did not nor did my little brother, he was only eight or the others that was in the class. I was pronounced that I had typhoid. A boy in the back of the class caught it but not as bad as me. I was like I was on a roller coaster. I don't remember. The last thing I can remember was that father – How did I call him honey, when I told you about him. Oh, I can't remember the name. They called him to come because I had made my first communion already.

Mr. It wasn't CAILLOUET?]

Mrs. No he died. Well he come, they told me that afterwards, that I had the last sacrament, because the doctor said I wasn't going to come back.

[Did you go to the hospital?]

Mrs. I had to stay at home, they didn't have no hospital. You had to go to New Orleans in those days; well he came and give me the last sacraments. I told them I remember. They say you can't remember. Well I saw it, cause I remember I was in and out of conscious all the time. My heart had stopped and my pulse was light. I say oh yes I saw him. They say no, you didn't see him. I did, he put a cross over my stomach, a black cross. I saw COLOMB, Father COLOMB. In those days a priest had to wear long dresses all the time and he put that thing on him. I remember the long dress and everything. I saw the little Jesus, I was dead. They say you didn't see that.

[You were that far under?]

Yes. They say you didn't even see that. I say well I seen him. It was like I could see him, but all I could see was him. I remember that. I was not standing in any line. They even didn't have time to cook. Mr. BELL in the class, he is dead now, he was with the people in line. He didn't have no cabinets, he had a wooden window that he would close when he had some dishes. He would wash the dishes and put them in the window that was closed with wood. Well, he would put the food there. When the others had something to eat. Now when I see the brothers at mass, he reminds me so much of his daddy, it reminds me of him. He reminds me so much of his daddy. Nobody on earth was better than that man.

[Do any of you suffer from the Typhoid fever?]

Mrs. Yes. It wasn't so much of epidemic from house to house. They had three or four that died.

MR. & MRS. ALLIE TROSCLAIR

[How old were you?]

Mrs. It was in the middle of May when I got sick. I thought it was heartburn at first. In July, they put me on a feather mattress folded in four, on the front porch, so I could get lots of sun shine. I stayed there because I could not stay on anything else, because I was only skin and bones. One day a Mr. DUPLANTIS and his daughter, she wanted to come close, close. She wanted to come see me. "No daddy, that is not her" and she started crying, it was just skin and bones. I remember they had come. That is one thing I will never forget, because it was just terrible, you know. She got so terrified; she didn't want to come in. [How old were you?]

Mrs. When I was in second grade, or first grade, because I was going to school, Miss MYERS, my teacher had sent me a doll. It was such a beautiful little thing. I was in school, I don't know if they went to sixth or seventh in those days. I know I was in school and I was in second grade, because I went to third with the same teacher when I went back. I am telling you, they didn't want me to look in a mirror. That is how awful I was.

[What did you do to get better?]

Mrs. The doctor said there was only one thing he could do, but he couldn't give it to me in the mouth, because it was poison. He had to give it to me by injection. He didn't want to leave me. He said watch to see a swelling with in twenty-four hours. If I don't swell, I won't come back. Somebody was with me day and night. Before the twenty-four hours, my fingers started to swell, my fingers, my arms and that is when I started to come back. I missed a whole year of school. My hair fell out. I was back in school and I didn't have a hair on my head. One boy that was in front of me. I told my mom that they had this boy that was making fun of me and I didn't want to go to school. My mom told Miss MYERS, that this boy was making fun of me and that I didn't want to school any more. Miss MYERS said do you think it would be okay if my sister would sew a hat that she can wear to school? It was a beautiful cap, made out of material, like a little cap. If I could keep it in school, I would stay. Mama told the boy's mama what her son had done. You talk about a beating, for laughing because I didn't have any hair. I don't know how long I stayed without any hair. I was treating my head with coconut oil. Then my hair started to grow. It was curly, curly, like Shirley TEMPLE. I had the most beautiful hair, but I didn't want it to be combed. My brother brought me to the barber to have my hair cut. He said "I don't believe that I can cut this hair. My brother said I am tired of seeing her cry whenever we comb her hair. I stayed like that until the big hurricane.

[What hurricane, when was that?]

Mrs. I was eight years old when it came, and I am sixty-seven. That was fifty-nine years ago. It wiped out all of Boudreaux Canal and all.

[Do you want to talk about it?]

Mrs. We had to move from the house. Everybody had to move. They put us up in the Ice factory.

[It was in 1926, that storm.]

Mrs. Yeah, 1926. The ice factory was on the ground. It would come up, real high from the ground. The people were along the walls and the water was coming in. The water came like a big wave. My mama was holding me by the hand in her arms. My daddy was holding my

younger brother, to go upstairs in the factory. They put boards so we could get up, so we could go to the ceiling up there. Mama had a friend; I believe they called her Monica EVANS. Her and my mother was alone. She caught my mother around the waist to get up the steps, because it was high. The water came high, but it only lasted a day. She said "Hold on, Honey You go where I go."

[You wanted to go up?]

Mrs. Yeah, we wanted to go up. Then we was walking in the water, they put boards up on the ceiling, to put the people up. Somehow, it stopped. The water stopped rising and the storm had passed. It was three in the afternoon. They loaded a bunch of us on the conveyor. They put all the shrimp on the lower part, so the youngest could lay down on the higher part. I was one, J. D., "Caiyeski" (sic) there and a few others

[Was J. D. THERIOT there?]

Mrs. Yeah, do you know him? He was there, because he was about my age. I don't know what kind of difference in ages. At that time I was only a little girl. He must have been a year older than me, because when I was in fifth, he was in sixth {grade}. That is the one that was kicked out with Ronnie DUPLANTIS. They had two other DUPLANTIS, besides that one on Little Caillou. They were so bad in school that – they was some mean people. [Did anybody drown?]

Mrs. As far as I know, I don't believe. Nobody drowned. They brought everybody to Houma in boats. At Boudreaux Canal, there was nothing at all. [What did you do after the storm?]

Mrs. We went into another house after that. I think it was on the opposite side of the bayou. Only with the clothes we had on. We had lost clothes at home that were in boxes. We could not bring all that, because the factory was full with people. None of the boxes of clothes could be saved, you know. All the people in there, it was the same thing, on Little Caillou at Boudreaux Canal. Then we had to start from scratch. When they came back, they had left because of the hurricane, in a boat, my mother slipped, she fell into the boat and broke her leg. That is how tough we had it. I'm telling you. It was all the same. The rich people were not better off. In those days the people were all alike. If you had money, you were something and if you had no money, you was something too. It didn't make any difference. At Boudreax Canal and all the people from down the bayou, they loved everybody. It didn't matter if you had a silk dress on or had a cotton dress on, you were still a person to them.

[How many people were there?]

Mrs. I wouldn't know exactly, it was the people from Boudraux Canal and way down too. They had people at what they call Cocodrie and all the people who work at the store. I call all of that Boudreaux Canal, me.

[What did they have at Cocodrie?]

Mrs. Then we didn't have no transportation to go visit anybody, but I would see and I didn't know anything about Cocodrie in those days. Before I was married and I was young. After I was married I learned about Cocodrie. When I was much older, you know. Everybody was telling us, everything was wiped out. They have very few houses left. [How about Sea Breeze?]

MR. & MRS. ALLIE TROSCLAIR ORAL HISTORY
{French Interpretation by Godfrey BUQUET} Transcribed by Philip J. Chauvin, Jr.

I went to Sea Breeze once in my life. Milka PELLEGRIN, his son was making a new tug boat; you know a big boat to work for oil companies. He took a group of people there to have a picnic. I went with him. I was friends with his daughters, that is the only time I went to Sea Breeze. In one boat we were ten and the late Junius FANGUY, he was my age, he came with us. I didn't know how to swim. We almost both drowned. I just know from passing by, you know. I see the platform at Sea Breeze. As for the platform there, I went one time, with Mr. Milka PELLEGRIN and his family. We never did own a boat except since we are married.

[What were you saying about the platform?]

Mr. They had four or five men working to dry the shrimp. They had a big tank outside to boil the shrimp. After it was dry on the platform they had to go in theater. They put them in there to beat the shrimp to get the peelings off.

Mrs. We never had a car until we got married; nor a boat. We were too poor.

[You never was a shrimper? You never had a boat to shrimp in?]

Mr. No.

[Did you ever go shrimping?]

Mr. I go with my daddy.

[Your daddy was a fisherman?]

Mr. yeah.

[When you were young you didn't work on a plantation?]

Mr. Then I would go do a day's work. Besides that, I would work with my daddy. We would catch fish and bring it to the market in New Orleans.

[You don't remember your daddy telling stories about what they did to navigate in the days before engines. It must have been in the time of the sail boat?]

Mr. Yes, before the engines they pulled that with a horse on the bayou bank. In 1910, they had a man was pulling the boat in.

[If one man was lucky enough to have an engine, he would pull others in.]

Mr. The "filaqua" (sic) they called that high motor.

[Yeah.]

Mr. It make plenty of noise. The man that would pull the boats with mules, they haul their boat to the town.

[Would that be what they called a Cordell?]

Mr. Cordell, yeah and they used to pull it with mules on the bank. That man had a boat with a motor on it. It made plenty of noise, the motor. They would get behind that boat to tow it. They had that man to tow them with the boat, beside the mule. It makes all the oysters open with the noise.

[In the boat?]

Mr. Yeah. The people on the bayou banks where the horse was, he had chickens to have eggs, you know. The hens didn't like that boat because it would pop, with plenty noise and it would break those eggs, you know, it would crack them. That is the time my daddy was when they was working.

[Then finally everybody got himself a little engine.]

Mr. They got a little engine after that to put in the boat. After that they start back to have their engine and their oysters in the same boat. {Laughing} They gave up the mule and all the

towing. The oysters were opened with the engines. Now they got their engine in the boat and they got their oysters in the boat.

[Do you know where your family came from?]

Mr. Down Terrebonne down there, where my grandpa had his – where I got my camp now on my grandpa's place.

[Down Terrebonne?]

Mr. Down Terrebonne.

[Let us talk about the land for a minute. Where you got this land?]

Mr. I got that land through my mama.

[A land grant?]

Mr. Yeah. They all died, my mama too, died. That was my share of my mama; on mama's side.

[How did your mother get this land?]

Mr. From her daddy.]

[You don't remember how he got it?]

Mr. No.

[The government?]

Mr. No, no.

[He bought it?]

Mr. He bought it.

[Do you know where? They still have it?]

Mr. We still have it. Now uncle Belise RHODES and Nonc Caliste they call him, was my grandpa's brothers, you know. He had plenty land, when he got married. He sold. He didn't have no land them. He leased a piece from his two brothers below that.

[He was a RHODES?]

Mr. RHODES, yeah. They had big houses there. They stay there. The storm came and swept the whole thing out. Cleaned the whole thing.

[The storm of 1926?]

Mr. 1909. They tell me they had a boat tied up to the bank on a big tree, Oak tree. They had plenty of Oak trees then, the salty water came in and killed them off. They tied that boat to the big tree and put a taupoleon on top of the hull and a boat full of people come in the boat. [That protect them?]

Mr. Yeah. People was in the house talking about that storm there. In the house and all over. It was high ground there, then. Now it is low, because the water washed all of that out. They was planting peas in there. Papa had to go tie a rope to the tree and on to the boat and walk through the trees holding the rope. Mama was in the back and the water was high. They get in that boat there and they pass that storm in that boat. The boat would rise up with the water.

[Your father willed it over to you?]

Mr. My daddy told me that, how it was.

[Do you remember how your daddy told a story, was he vindictive about it or he would just accept it as something that would happen?]

Mr. Um -

[Some people talk about the past and seem to be bitter about it. We have done some interviews with some people who didn't think about it that way; they took it as something would happen. Things were really tough, but they didn't consider it tough, it was just part of their lives. Some people considered it a big deal and some did not.]

Mrs. About the hurricane, my mother's mother, that is my grandma. I never knew her; she died in that hurricane in 1909. It was the same hurricane and it was on the same day. She was married to a RHODES too. My half-brother's are first cousin to him. He say my mama and daddy was holding on to, my mother was a DOMANGUE, was holding onto a big log. It was all the waves and a big wind, it was so hard. She say "I am going to let go, he say oh no, I am going to hold you. She says we are both old, so hold on and let me go. Try to save yourself. My mother saw her drown right in front of her eyes. He said he would hold on as long as possible. She says you hold on and I am going to let go. She drowned that way. Mama tells me there were so many people that drowned in that hurricane. I can't remember to tell you how many that drowned. Her husband was living with five kids. She had all her children, because they went into the attic. A boat came and picked them up from the attic to save them from their death in the hurricane that was in 1909. That is how bad it was. The one we had 1926 compared to that one, it was nothing compared to the other one.

[Do you remember where your parents, great grandparents came from.? How did they settle here? Where did they come from?]

Mr. No, the only thing is from Houma, somewhere.

[You do not know their origin?]

Mr. No. Now, TROSCLAIR comes from GERMANY.

Mrs. The TROSCLAIRS are from Germany and the HENRYS are from France. There was a {Ed} HENRY fellow from Bourg dug up that. He was working on the Family Tree. We met him about a year ago at a store. He said there was only two brothers that came from France. He said all the HENRYS are related. No matter how far, they all came from the same two brothers.

Mr. All I know is that the TROSCLAIRS came from Germany.

[They probably came from Flanders. That is close to the border to France. Okay, now when you bring oysters with your father, where would you bring them?]

Mr. We didn't sell it to the factory, we had two oyster beds and we had a small boat. It was about twelve feet wide.

[You had a Lugger.]

Mr. Yeah. We pass in the bayou and sell it to the people, fifty cents a basket. At that time there, when it was getting dark, we was selling for fifty cents a basket, we had plenty of oysters left in the boat, we went sell them at the office for two bushels for a quarter, to get rid of it.

[They were starting to open up?]

Mr. You had to leave them in the boat or go back and plant them again.

[About what year was this? Was that before the oil company?]

[Do you know what happened to your oyster beds?]

Oh no, Papa let go and where the oyster beds were, they used to have a little island. Now it is gone and they have nothing like that now. They don't have no more stakes or nothing. It is all gone out there. They are trawling there now.

[The oil fields started in 1932 – 1933. Did some of you go work for the oil companies?]

Mr. Yes, I went to work for the oil companies. I worked on a ship outside there Port Texaco. They had three ships, I believe, two would go and they stored their oil in there. They would put it back in barges. They unloaded that from the rigs and put it in the ships. After that they had to reload that oil in barges to bring it outside in the gulf to the other ship in the gulf.

[They would bring that to Texas?]

Mr. Yes they would bring it back to Texas.

[How long did you work on the ships?]

Mr. In the neighborhood of ???- I quit from that out there, there was too much going on, we had to paint that ship with er ???

{End of Tape # 212 Begin Tape # 213.

[The land that you said you still owned a portion of, is it still the same size it always has been or its -?]

Mr. No, It's lost a good bit. We own fourth of Madison Bay, all the land washed out. Now it is just water. We got where I got my camp, we got the property there. It is a little higher, it don't wash out like the back, in the marsh. We got some on both sides of the Bayou Terrebonne. We got some going to Little Caillou and we got some going to Madison Bay. [Madison Bay, you said?]

Mr. Madison Bay.

[Did you ever hear of a place called "Wonder Lake"?]

Mr. Yes, Wonder Lake is more at by Montegut. I don't know much about the lake, but I remember being a lake in there. I go trawl in there, small boat, you know. I never did too much in Wonder Lake. Wonder Lake is by the Club House, you remember the Club House back there.

[I have never been there.]

Mr. You have never been there. Behind Montegut, that is where Wonder Lake is, you know in the back of Montegut. The Club House is way down there, for the storm there, it wash all of that out, I say about eight miles from Montegut, maybe a little more or a little less from Montegut to where I got my camp. That storm {1925} there take all that.

[This Madison Bay, that is on the east side of your property?]

Mr. Yes. It is on the east side.

[Okay, you said you used to have forty arpents there. That bay erode into it?] Mr. Yes.

[Did they do any oil drilling there?]

Mr. The company er -.

[The company was Chevron?]

Mr. Tenneco Company.

[Tenneco is in the bay?]

Mr. They are in the bay. We got the property going a fourth in that bay.

[Do you have marsh?]

Mr. Oh no, we had it before. We don't got no more marsh now, it is just water.

[You have the land up to the bay?]

Mr. Yes.

[About this land that washed away, do you have leased to Tenneco?]

Mr. No.

[The land in front of the bay, Tenneco leases that?]

Mr. No.

[Nobody leases?]

Mr. No.

[How far is this oil lease from the property that is in the water?]

Mr. They dug about two or three hundred feet.]

[On your property?]

Mr. Yes.

[This bay, how big is it, it goes to the Gulf?]

Mr. No.

[It is just a inland bow?]

Mr. Yes.

[How big is it?]

Mr. It is about a half mile one way and maybe a mile or a little more.

[No big tug boats can go in there?]

Mr. Yes, it is soft mud. Big boats can go in there. Tenneco had some big boats in there with their rigs and all.

[To put the rigs, they have to dredge?]

Mr. They don't dredge. They just pull it.

[When you were a little boy, do you remember that bay?]

Mr. Oh yeah. When I was a boy there, I remember that bay. We had plenty land when I was a boy. Now it is all out in a big bay, you know.

[None of your family ever inquired about this land that washed away?]

Mr. No.

[If you had land that measured forty arpents, not marsh, let's say four hundred feet eroded into the bay, who owns it?]

Mr. The state owns that.

[They never touch it?]

Mr. No they never touched it. You got to buy it back, the government or the state, I don't know. You got to buy it back. Let's say you got a hundred feet and it washed twenty feet to you like that, they say I got a lot of time to change my mind, for the bank.

[Let's go back to the early oil business. You remember the oil company that came here, who they were?]

Mr. I don't know that.

[You were not probably in the oil business then. What do you remember about the economics around here? You can remember when the oil business came into your life?]

MR. & MRS. ALLIE TROSCLAIR ORAL HISTORY

{French Interpretation by Godfrey BUQUET} Transcribed by Philip J. Chauvin, Jr.

Mr. When I got married, I went in the oil business. When I got married, I was twenty-five and I got married, I was twenty-five years old. About two or three years after that, I went in the oil business.

[You were about twenty-eight when you went to work for Texaco?]

Mr. Just about.

[You got married in what year, 1925?]

Mr. Yeah, I was twenty-five when I got married.

[What year was that?]

Mrs. 1939, July 1939.

[By that time, the oil business was going strong.]

Mrs. Yes. He was working on a boat for the oil people.

[He was not working for Texaco?]

Mrs. No. When he started working for company Texaco that was in 1963.

[What I am trying to establish here was how long were the oil companies here before you benefited economically. Maybe other people got jobs paying more than fifty cents a day. You don't remember that?]

Mr. No.

[When the oil company say you were working for a dollar a day on a boat or farm and the oil companies were paying four and five dollars, you don't remember that?]

Mr. No.

[Why you didn't go?]

Mr. I was working for CENAC on the "Tommy", a little tug boat. Texaco paid me fifty dollars a month there.

[For a month, not seven and seven?]

Mr. No. The Brown and Root bought the tug. They bought the little tug from CENAC. He told Brown and Root was running the boat with me. He was the captain and I was the deck hand. There was just two on that boat. He told Brown and Root when he bought the boat, I want to buy the man too. The captain said if the price is right, then we would go work for you. He gave me two hundred fifty dollars a month and I didn't think to ask him anything. When Brown and Root bought that tug to go work on that big dredge boat at Krotz Springs.

[Near Baton Rouge over there.]

Mr. Donald was getting about three hundred dollars and I was getting two fifty.

[That must have been a big change?]

Mr. I said yeah we are going. We went with the boat. We was running the boat for that price there.

[What did you do at Krotz Springs?]

Mr. We had a little barge we would go get the oil for the dredge.

[The dredge was on the river?]

Mr. Blind Lake, they call that.

[The location or just for the dredge?]

Mr. just for the dredge.

[They were doing some work for the government?]

Mr. Yeah. They had a suction dredge and we had to get some oil to run the dredge. The barge didn't have no -, it was just a plain barge, square and no dividers or nothing. We went to Krotz Springs down by the railroad track, to fill up the barge with that oil, in there, to bring it to the dredge. When we start, we had that barge tied up like that, we tried to collect that barge and all at once, I look at that barge and it looked like this. {tilted}

Mr. Yeah. The barge was trying to stand up in the river. I told Ben, look, the barge is going down. We had to tow that barge in the river and the barge was dragging like that. It couldn't fill up with more water. We tied up the barge with rope to tow it, when we got in Glen Bayou, they call it, the end was dragging on the bottom and we towed it to the dredge. They didn't have any rig left and that was the only barge left.

[The barge settle down there?]

Mr. You know what they had done, you know they had the little barge, they put at the end of the barge, a rope and tied it down, that is why they didn't put no rig there. We had to go get some oil for that barge. When it was safe, we went to Baton Rouge for the oil.

[You went to Murphy Oil at Plaquemine?]

Mr. Yeah. When we got to Baton Rouge, they had men, with rifles and all on the dock there. When we drew to the wharf and landing where we tied up the barge to the wharf and I took off, on that ladder going up. We climb on top. Pretty soon, there was a guy who said you get back on that barge. It was during the war.

[World War II?]

[Standing up?]

Mr. Yeah. He says you get back on that barge. We got down on the barge. After that they told us to go back up, to get on the dock, we had to get each a pass. We could go all over after that and come back anytime.

[Let's go back to your land. Your land was never leased to the oil companies?]

Mr. Yeah, we leased it.

[You leased it, two years later they dropped the lease. Did somebody else come along?]

Mr. Somebody else came along, the last to lease it, I believe it was Texaco. They renewed the lease three times.

[Three times?]

Mr. Tenneco was the last one.

[When was the last time?]

Mr. Three years ago.

[While Tenneco had it leased, did they come drill nearby?]

Mr. No.

[By the bay?]

Mr. By the bay, yeah.

[They had it leased?]

Mr. Yeah, but not on our side. We went to the court house to see how much land we got and all like that, but that don't show nothing. We ain't got a survey.

[You never got royalties?]

Mr. No, I never have.

[While it was leased, where did they drill or anything like that?]

Mr. They drop it after that.

Mrs. You see my mother lived on that side with her first husband, she never did mention anything about logging, but they had big trees that her mother and father was holding on to, during the hurricane. They must have big trees; they were hanging on a big log tree, to try to save their lives in the water, because they had been thrown out. Otherwise -

[You don't remember, that was an important part of history. Those trees were 18 to 20 feet in diameter, you don't know who took them, not stole them, but harvested them. You say your land butted into Madison Bay, what part of it?]

Mr. About right in the middle, more to left, I believe.

[A little to the left on the west side of the bay?]

Mr. Yeah. We are supposed to have the Madison Canal, they call that, we are supposed to go through and through that.

[The Madison Canal hits the bay after that?]

Mr. Yeah.

[You don't remember the government giving that to your father?]

Mr. No. I got my share there; I don't know which company passed there. They passed two or three times. Marsh buggies pass right through our property.

[They passed through, you let them?]

Mr. We wasn't there.

[Let's talk about the Second World War, what did you do, work on boats?]

Mr. I worked on boats during the Second World War, and then I stopped. I worked for Brown and Root. I was working at the place near Baton Rouge.

[Did you work there during all of the Second World War on the same boat or did you change boats?]

Mr. In those days my salary was the same. I had to go to Lafayette to meet the boat. The barges were there. That was a long way to go to take the boat. I worked there several months, but I quit the job. When I was off, Manny ran the boat and when Manny was off, I ran the boat.

[How did you work, the days on and off?]

Mr. We worked four of five days. When one didn't want to work, the other would take his place. The company with the dredge had plenty people working for them. One of the people from the dredge company would work as the deck hand.

[Do you know of a company that buys and sell honey bees?]

Mr. Father {Joseph} COULOMB at Montegut would sell the honey bees, they called that the "Gulf Coast Bee Company". He raised the bees in Bourg; it wasn't far from our house. Father COULOMB had bought that land. He had two guys working for him. Warner ELLENDER raised sugar cane next to him. That was before they had gravel roads. ELLENDER would use the road to work his cane. One time, the honey bees took off after the mules. They used to just drag the cane it was usually a slow process, but when the honey bees attacked the mules, they took off and must have passed at fifty miles per hour. {Laughing} Mr. ELLENDER must have talked to Father COULOMB. Father COULOMB used to sell the honey bees, but he used to sell the honey, too.

[How many bee hives he had?]

Mr. I don't really know. He had a big piece of property. He must have had four hundred or maybe more. He had two men working there.

[Do you remember the boat "Polly"?]

Mr. Oh yeah. When I was a little boy, when we knew the Polly was in the bayou, we would run to the bayou. They would throw big bars of candy. One time a fellow threw him a ball. I missed it.

[You got the ball or somebody else got it?]

Mr. Oh no, I got it.

[When you were a little boy, what were the burials like?]

Mr. They had the wake in your house. They had a wooden coffin. They would put the coffin in a wooden box. What they would do, they would make a box, probably from cypress and they would drop the coffin in the box. On top, they would nail the board across.

[In those days were many people buried in their yards?]

Mr. Not many, but before I was a young boy, a few.

Mrs. I remember one of my cousins' daughter-in-law died. Whatever material they could find, they made the coffin out it.

[The reason for that was, before people started giving land for cemeteries, they was buried in the yard. If people did not own land, they would ask someone if they could bury them there. That is how the cemeteries started.]

Mr. Down Grand Caillou, there is a place, I don't remember the name of the plantation.

Mrs. Alice Plantation.

Mr. I remember that there was a big tomb made out of brick.

[Could it be the Indians, they lived there at the time?]

Mr. I don't think so.

[How about Negros?]

Mrs. Oh, when we lived at Sarah {Plantation}
