

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FAMILY ASSOCIATIONS

J. Bradley Cooper*

At the November 1984 meeting of the Berkshire Family History Association considerable interest in family associations was expressed. Of these there are a great number in existence or in a state of suspended animation. Unfortunately, there is no master list of such associations and to whom interest in them should be expressed.

These societies generally have as their avowed purpose the perpetuation of the memory and exploits of an immigrant ancestor and the preservation of related memorabilia. them maintain scholarships awarded for some purpose appropriate Others maintain and operate old houses and to the ancestor. their furnishings bearing some relationship to the ancestor. Some of these societies do practically nothing observable by the general membership save for periodic collection of a few The only concrete activity may be the dollars as annual dues. notice of the annual meeting held in some location with which early life of the ancestor was connected. Others of the societies issue periodic newsletters, many of them excellent, containing much relevant genealogical information. these publications are outstanding. Those of the Parke Society and the Towne Family Association come to mind. Some of them have annual reunions lasting two or three days with programs of a genealogical nature, a business meeting, an opportunity to see the sights which are usually related in some way to the family activity in the past, and, of course, an annual banquet. Ample opportunity is provided to visit with family members, compare notes and fill in blank spaces in the family tree. The annual dues are usually quite nominal - ten dollars or less.

The benefits to be derived from participating in a wellrun family group are well worth any expense involved. Examples of well-run associations, known to the writer from personal experience, are the Parke Society, the Towne Family Association, and the Willard Association.

The Parke Society was organized in Stonington, Connecticut, in 1963, Mrs. Ruby Parke Anderson being the founder. Anyone able to trace ancestry to a progenitor born in the British Isles or North America before the American Revolution, whose name was Parke, Parkes, Parks, or Park is entitled to regular membership. Many of the members are descended from either Robert Park of New London, Connecticut, or Richard Parks of Newton, Massachusetts. What relationship, if any, existed

between these two men has not been discovered.

This Society has voluminous genealogical material available to members. It publishes a newsletter, running to twenty-five to thirty pages of family news and new genealogical data of interest to Parke descendants. An annual reunion of two or three days duration is held in some location connected with Parke activity - this year Williamsburg, Virginia, and last year in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Society membership is approaching seven hundred throughout the United States and some in Canada. In order to serve the members better and reduce travel involved, the country has been divided into nine regions, each with its own get-togethers. New England is Region One and the first meeting was held in South Deerfield in November, 1984.

An on-going activity is assigning various members the task of locating and reporting on all Parke graves in the local cemeteries from which a master list will be compiled. Society membership information may be obtained from:

The activities of the Towne Family Association are substantially the same as those of the Parke Society enumerated above. The quarterly About Towne is excellent, twenty to thirty pages of genealogical data and family pictures. This is a very friendly organization and its meetings are excellent, this year in West Lebanon, September 1985 in New Hampshire.

Membership is open to all persons by invitation or recommendation, having ties through blood relationship, marriage, collateral lines, friendship, or interest. It is to be noted that this family was probably one of the worst sufferers during the witchcraft delusion in 1692. Three daughters were accused of practicing witchcraft and two of them were executed.

An on-going activity is the collection of the Towne lineages of the various members for consolidation suitable for publication. Membership information may be obtained from:

The Willard Family Association has a long history, the 75th reunion having been held in 1983 in Sturbridge, Massachusetts. A rather modest newsletter of but three or four pages is published three times a year. A student loan fund is maintained by the society. Among the sponsored activities is a tour of England next May, visiting many of the places usually

included in a tour itinerary but concluding with a stay in Horsmonden, Kent, England, which was the original seat of the Willard family. Membership is open to all descendants of Simon Willard and his brother George as well as their sister Margery (Willard) Davis. Membership is also welcomed from other Willards and their spouses. GENEALOGICAL RESOURCES IN BERKSHIRE COUNTY LIBRARIES

BECKET ATHENAEUM

Main Street, Becket

Barbara C. Davis, Librarian Ethel Mecum, Genealogy Librarian

This library is in the center of North Becket in a fine building erected in 1850 for the first Congregational Church. The interior has been completely and very well renovated, making an attractive library. The genealogical and historical material is together in one area and well organized. (This is the first library I have visited where a professional staff all donate their services! Volunteerism at its very best!)

Separate genealogies cover these Becket families: Geer, Higley, Knowlton, William Lane, Kellog (3 volumes), Mack, Messenger, and Rice. In addition, there is a Lane and Hill Photograph Album. One large handwritten book by Miss Snow, Genealogical Records of Inhabitants of Becket, gives a brief genealogy of each of the following Becket families: Bowers (Ellis McElwain), Briggs, Conant (Morley), Earl, Hood, Little (Clark, Bell, Lester), Loveland (Taylor), Loveland (Streeter), Pitt (Taylor, Shaw, Viets), Prence, Putnam (Gallup, Fuller), Rarrows, Smith (Snow, Hopkins), Smith (McElwain), Snow (Conant), Snow (Chesseman), Spellman (Snow), Wadsworth (Stevens, Morgan), and Williams.

Many early families left Becket and moved to Windham County, Ohio. Books relating to this: Celebration of the Settlement of Windham, Ohio, 1861, and two diaries, one of their leaving Becket and one of pioneer life in Lorraine County, Ohio.

Church records: a copy of the Backet Congregational Church Records, 1765-1830 lists early members and more. Cemetery records: the Historical Commission members are now working on listing all buried in the three large cemeteries - West Becket, Becket Center, and North Becket.

Town histories - Bicentennial History of Becket, 1975, by Archer and Mulholland; Becket's First Fifty Years by Brewster, 1952; History of Basketmaking; Report of Buildings by Berkshire County Regional Planning Commission, 1979; and a history of the Grange. Letters on Becket history, handwritten in 1876. Scrap-

books on the 1927 flood, the P.T.A., and seven on Becket started in 1900 and continuing to the present day, indexed.

Becket Town Reports - 1900 to the present.

Standard reference books: Berkshire County histories by Beers and Pope; Berkshire County Atlas; History of Massachusetts; History of New England by Winthrop and Hubbard; Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolution; Massachusetts in the Army and Navy in the Civil War (2 vols.); Sons of the American Revolution (4 vols.); Mayflower Families (2 vols.); Bradford's History of Plymouth Plantation.

A few books not found in every library: Boundary Lines of Berkshire County, 1915; an 1803 Probate Directory; Goodwin's Town Officers and Massachusetts Laws; Picturesque Berkshire County, North Berkshire, 1 volume, South Berkshire, 1 volume, 1893; the Domestic Journal published in Springfield 1887-90, 1893-94.

Becket was included in the Massachusetts Vital Records to 1850 series. The library has the volume for its town and 212 others of that series.

The library has not only a microfilm reader but fine genealogical films: Society Neeting, Jan. 1799; Town School Report, 1860 -1930; Old Church Volume 3; History of Town of Becket Vols. 1-6 (from old vault); Home Mortgage books, Vols. 1-3; Vital Records Index A-Z (genealogical records of inhabitants).

Somewhere in almost every town today, one finds a copy machine; in Becket, it is in the library.

TAYLOR MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Main Street, Hancock

Hancock is a fine example of the renewed interest in every county town in the town's history and its early settlers and local history groups and library committees working together to preserve the town's records. Their library is such a pleasant small building one can understand why it is so well patronized.

A vertical file contains folders with records and genea-

logies for these Hancock families: Beal and Boardman, Belding, Corey, Hall and Briggs Vaughn, Hand, Labarron, Murphy, Perigo, Phillips, Robinson, Rodman and Hazard, Smith and Sweets. There are separate books for Gardner, Gorton, Eldridge, Hadsel (Hodsoll), and J. Gardner Smith. Also some Descendants of Four Pioneer Families about the Carpenter, Goodrich, Kittle, and Knapen families who came from Rhode Island and Connecticut to Stephentown, N.Y., and Hancock, Mass. The Gardner family history is also in the History of Onondaga County, New York, 1615-1878 by Clayton, 1878.

Some unusual books in this library - Marriage Notices 1785-1794, for the whole United States, by Bolton; Bailey's Early Massachusetts Marriages Prior to 1800; Names Changed in Massachusetts 1780-1892, 2 vols.; Manuals for the General Court (Mass.), 1925 to 1960; and 10 volumes of Plymouth Colony Records, which include the laws, meetings, and activities of Plymouth Colony from 1620 to 1694.

Standard genealogical reference books found here - Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolution; Massachusetts Soldiers, Sailors, and Marines in the Civil War; Pope's Pioneers of Massachusetts; General History of New England to 1690 by Hubbard, and Massachusetts Acts and Resolves from 1972.

The library has the one history written about the town, Hancock Through the Years by Nellie L. Cameron, 1976.

Hancock, unfortunately, was not included in the series Massachusetts Vital Records to 1850. The library has ten volumes of this set.

Hancock vital records - the Rollin H. Cooke extracts of births, marriages, and deaths from town records and copies from Amos Hammond's His Book. Other vital records, kept at the home of the Town Clerk at present, go back to the beginning of the town but have gaps due to fires.

The library has Town Reports from 1885 to 1982 and copies of the census of Hancock for 1800, 1810, and 1820,

There has been only one church in Hancock - The Hancock Baptist. Some of the early church's baptism, marriage, amd death records are in the library.

A copy machine is here for the convenience of townspeople.

WINDSOR, TOWN TAX LIST, 1814

A small booklet was made by hand sewing several sheets of paper together, then drawing vertical lines to make columns for the several categories of taxes recorded. There is no cover. The first outside page carries this inscription:

"State tax made in the year 1814 by Assessors of the town of Winsor is 11 Cents on the poll & three cents one Mill on the dollar.

Amount of tax with over layings is \$171.04


