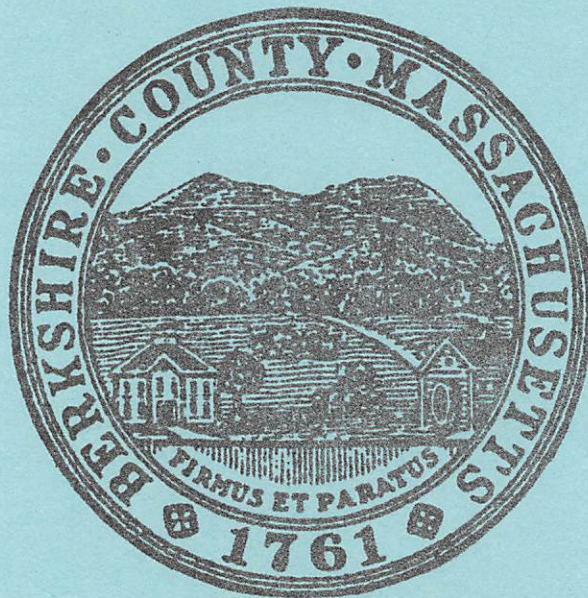

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## GLIMPSES OF THE PAST

Transcribed by J. Bradley Cooper

Member Kathleen Knowlton Sedoff, 1013 Meadow Lane, Alberton, MT 59820 has shared with us a number of letters [see also volumes 10:1:3, 11:2:35 and 12:1:3] written around Civil War time. Not only are they very interesting for their general contents, but there is frequent mention of Berkshire County people. These references may well furnish genealogical clues to someone having roots in this area.

While we have done our best to provide accurate transcriptions, time, faded ink and unfamiliar handwriting may on occasion lead us astray, for which we crave indulgence.

Numbers have been assigned to the letters as an aid to reference. This is their only significance.

9. Cheshire August the 6 1855 Dear friend I have took my seat in the middle room to answer your kind letter which I ought to have done long ago but have been negligent I have just been taking my knap in the Chamber where you and Lucinda so often used to meet it put me in mind of days gone bye that we cant recall it seems lonesome to think many of our friends are gone some are dead and some have gone west Francis Card has gone to Illinois he was married last fall to Maria Cain Deacon Cains daughter from Savoy he and Maria lived with Asa last winter in April they moved to Illinois which makes us feel lonesome especially Ann Eloiza and Marcus

last winter my Father died aged ninety four he left a hope behind may we all be so happy as to meet him in Heaven my Mother has been dead fifty five years last June which was I was in my sixth year when my Mother was dying she sang the Hymn Jesus can make a dying bed feel soft as downy pillows are I think they are gone to rest my Father died in Michigan I have three half sisters there I have been writing to one of them to day but never have seen her we write to each other same as though we were acquainted by this time you will want to know how we are getting along we are comfortably well Pardon thought best to manage his farm himself so we moved in to the kitchen and we are trying to manage Mary White works for me she is one of the best of girls we keep twenty three cows I help make the Cheese Mary does the kitchen lifting helps me when I want her William Card has gone on to the farm that Shubael lived on Shubael has bought Samuel Smiths farm gives five thousand five hundred [top line on next page cut off in copying] was in the winter Ann makes the Cheese mostly they live on Mr Millers farm Leland lives wher he did when you was here the weather has been very warm and wet most of the summer People have got half done haying the grass is tall and the weather so bad for haying Pardon Shubael Alden Leland & William all send their Cheese to Boston they get from nine to eleven cents a pound and butter is twenty cents flour has been thirteen and a quarter a barrel but I think it fell wages are high Pardon gives Wiley

Hathaway sixteen dollars a month for the summer folks can not much help at any price but the Irish we dont have any meetings at the Schoolhouse this summer they have spent as much money trying to keep the lot that they hant much for preaching

it has got to be something late so I must bid you good bye  
to Mr Edward & Abigail Knowlton Mary Lincoln

good afternoon Abigail, I now sit me down to Answer your letter which we received tuesday after it was mailed friday which was a week ago yesterday, was not a little rejoiced to hear that you were still alive, it had been so long since you had wrote that I had give up looking for a leter from you ever again, and I dont believe now that you hardly have a realising since how long it has been had you then told me it would be five months and 13 days before you should write again I dont know what I should have thought guess should have thought you insane I told you I had given up looking for a leter, but still I did not give up all hopes of hearing from you neither did I think you had forgot poor unworthy me, nor do I ever, believe me, when I find a constantly faithful friend, as you have been. they will never forget, nor forsake how many nights I have fancied I was spending with you I know not dreamt the night before I got your leter that we had both put up at the same Tavern but when I woke we were apart in body, it is not so satisfying to me to day to write as it would be to converse with you by the word of mouth, but that is impossible, can it be that I can not shall not never behold your face again in the flesh, with God all things are possible in him above I feel to trust, but of myself I feel to grieve at our separation, you say you do not know how you feel some of the time about seeing me, think not Abigail that I dont know but if can give me a discription of it I wish you would, but I think it is easier felt than told. This world is full of changin scenes what a change there has been since we used to go to the village together. in the church, another has gone Sister Sally Madcalf is Dead so one after another has gone it seems that most all that used to be there was gone, what a change, and Lorenzo Madcalf has lately buried his wife, she has left a child & should think it was some months old she died before Sally she was buried I believe a week ago to day, it is now thursday, have not saw her nor have not been to meeting since new years day which I told you of, that was the Watch meeting I see no prospect of our enjoying this privilege again but Abigail I can think that we have once enjoyed this favor tis all for the best but it causes me many sorryful hours, I went to village last monday it was a kind of an old fashond starting [illegible] thought when I set down should finish this leter but some how or other it dont go off, to tell you the truth Abigail there is so much I want to say to you and want to see you so bad it dont seem some how or other to satisfy to sit down and try to write, if it could get to you as soon as it used to it would seem betere, but your last got here sooner than the first so I hope then they will not tary long on the way. this is a

great disadvantage in having friends so far off, but then it might be worse, how often we think if we had such and such things we should be happy but perfect happiness we shall not find in this world. there is always something lacking to complete happiness and why do we stop for one moment to complain, so we will not so let us try to make the best of it it is now growing dark it has been rather rainy to day Mother Ann Eliza and Ann were here Tuesday there was considerable taulk about naming the boy Mother said tell you you had beter name it Abram so to have it corispond with Lucinda's for hern is named Sarah after the old prophet's wife Ann Eliza said if you named it so tell you she never would come to Iowa, so it is undecided, I myself am so perfectly astonished at its being a boy that I cannot say much about it. Ann is at work at Asa's, Ann Eliza said she should write you next sunday so she will tell you where where she is and all about so I will not write, Abigail I feel somewhat refreshed since I begun, for I am this moment seeing something that I never saw before you will wonder what it can be well I am going to tell you, well Alden sits on one side of the table just begining to write to E it is something I never saw him attempt to do before and he says he never wrote a leter in his life, O if you could clap your wings and fly and see this sight with me but if you were here as you know you would not have the privilege of knowing any thing more about it which perhaps you now will, Mary sits between us as we write she is very lonesome to have Ann gone but she has much to tend to, such as the kiten and the hens and Turkeys tell Ella her white kitty is full of play his name is Selick and it is hers wish I could do it up in this leter I would send it along to her, dont know as we could hardly spare him as he is a great deal company for us as Mary and I am here alone most of the time, I wish I could send a little plant that we have here in the house as the girls have some that look very thrifty, it geting bed time so I dont know but I shall have to stop, write if but litle. Nov ? 1853

Dear Brother Sister and Ella

(kiss Ella for me) I now seat myself to pen a few lines to you I came home from Nathans yesterday left them well found the folks at home well I was sorry to hear you had gone out of the woodlot but hope you will be contented now not to go father I hope you will have good neighbors and enjoy your selves well in your log cabin and dont let Ella get lost prarie grass nor drown in the Indian creek take good care of her let have every thing she wants and dont let her die and not let her forget Granny. I dont know wether I shall go to the button factory as that old Aby has been after me me so they say if I do I shal start next monday you will hear if I am there and you must write to me for it seems lik 10.000 years since I saw you and it dont seam as I should ever see you a gain tho if I should have that blesing bestoed on me I should be as thankful as others do come down as soon as you can or we shall all feel to mourn. I have got a new Sister but she dont seam verry like Abby yet I have got a neice but it dont

seame like my little Ella she looks just like Nathan when you write to me direct your letters to florida and they will send it to me if I ant at home and you must WRITE I suppose you know this from from Lyanda.

Saturday Nov 19th 1853

Distant tho most kind and affectionate daughter  
Tis with a heart filled with anxious soliscitude that I seat myself for the first time since you left us to to write to you I should not delayed writing so long had I known where to address you we received your kind letter to day Nov 9th was glad to hear you was yet alive and able to set up after taking so long and tedious a journey I about begin to think you are composed of uncommon materials if you can endure so much and still live on I am very sorry to hear little Ellas health is poor dont spare any pains to restore her Tis useless to caution you for I know you will not kiss the little darling forty times for mama I feel very lonely this evening pa has gone to school meeting tis very dark and dreary not a star is to be seen and my thoughts in spite of myself wander far off to the west and into your neat cabbin Oh that I could take one peep but no no, I did not think when I parted with you that you would go any further than Ohio and vainly flattered myself that you would find a place short of there where you would be wiling to settle did not know that you had the most distant idea of going to Iowa till I learnt from George B that you was alreddy there I leave you to judge of my surprise I am very sorry I must be parted so far from you I hope tis for the best and will try to submit but think I shant with a very good grace pa has git home and gone to bed and I must do likewise to dream of friends that are far away so I must wish you a good night

Dear daughter tis the sabath day and pa has gone to meeting as usual and I will try to write you a few more lines you wish to know all about our and so on pa enjoys good health says tell Ed I am almost worn out he works very hard tis true and has a great deal of care on his mind as for me my health is best it has been for years my lameness troubles me not at all except for the inconvenience of the heel chord being rather short tis all healed and does not pain me more than the other but is weaker my appetite is good and I gain in flesh very fast you would hardly know me Lyanda is not at home she is with Sally has been there most two weeks you have undoubtly before this heard that S has a daughter born the 10th of Sept Almon you know is just twenty years the latest we heard she was very smart at first pa was there when the child was about a week old she said she should come up as soon as Nathan had got over his hurry and we look and look in vain I have not seen her yet but about a fortnight ago pa saw N to the vill he told him she had been sick had a broken breast and a real time of it pa called Lyanda the next day she had got better then but not able to do much, tis most time to get supper I meant to write a long mess to day but have been hinderd as I always am me thinks I hear you say I wonder what ma will get for supper I will tell you some boild potatoes fried fresh pork,



boild onions bread fried donutts, mince pie butter, no cheese and tea of course I wish little Ella could eat in mamas room to night and sit with Bubby It has got to be monday after washing pa has gone again not to meeting but is helping uncle Lum kill his hogs, I meant to scribled some last evening but A B Fairfield came in and hinderd me he came to see if Lyanda would go to work in the Button factory with his daughter he says they offer a fair compensation and tis very nice clean work I know not whether she will go or not tell Edward By is in his glory he says the Whigs have gained the victory and got all tunnel men, and now a few words about Almon he was married the 25th of Sept but did not go to keeping house till about two weeks ago I suppose you know who he married I have not got very well. acquainted with her yet she appears to be pretty smart and that is about all I can tell you I have given up the kitchen to them but have not gone back home as you conjectured but have moved into the parlour she haves the kitchen buttery and bedroom below and the east chamber I occupy whatever other part of the house I please we sleep in the middle room and have converted the parlour bedroom into a buttery you know tis rather unhandy to be so far from wood and water and taters but we get along very well considering all things our family is small and Sarah takes care of the milk we calculate to go home next spring if nothing happens to prevent, the people in this vicinity all enjoy very good health I believe at present I think there has been one in town since you left Mr. Alonzo Capen died about the 20th of oct after a short illness of the lung fever, there has been some births occasionally Mrs E Tower had a daughter born I think twas after you went away Mrs E Thatcher has a son little over a week old a strapper weighing some five pounds, I think I will not write you any more to day but will address a few words to my little granddaughter, My dear Ella you do not know how we all want to see you pampa says I wish I could see little Ella Lyanda or yet rather says how I do want to see Ella Ed is to bad to carry of so far when Bubby gets camp on the floor sisie Ella was here and wags his tail and says so too as plain as he can your little tree grows finely I think when you come here to see Mama it will have great ripe oranges on it tossy lays under the bassy yet waiting for you I hope you have got well before now you must grow as fast as you can and be a great girl and help Ma and learn to write and then write a long letter to mama I could say lots more but it will not be no more interesting than what I have wrote you must take good care of your health and not work to hard Lyanda has got home and I will let her write a few lines I must now bid you adieu wishing you peace and prosperity your mother Abigail Thatcher

give my love to Ella tell her I wish she could come in to the yard here and get some pinks we have got a bunch a lot of them Savoy pinks I got to Lucindas Abigail how I wish you could come Matildas woodbine has run up Matildas Chamber window covered one window most all over Matilda is married to Charles Jenks Mrs Bowen sent Ann E and myself six seeds she calls bugle vine two of mine came up have not got very large write as often as you can and I will try to do the same I will send you some pieces of my dresses

## THE BOOKSTALL

*The History of the Indian Wars in New England*, by Rev. William Hubbard (1621-1704) revised and supplemented by Samuel G. Drake facsimile reprint of 1864 edition, 2 Vols in 1, 5½ x 8½, soft bound, pp 595, index, map. Published by Heritage Books, Inc., 1540-E Pointer Ridge Place, Suite 300, Bowie, MD 20716. Price \$32.50 plus \$3.00 S/H.

The author, Rev. William Hubbard was born in Tendering, Essex, England in 1621/1622 and came to New England in 1635, settling in Ipswich, becoming a freeman in 1638 and graduating from Harvard College in 1642 where he prepared himself for the ministry. He died 14 Sept 1704.

This work was first published in 1677, undergoing several editions, culminating in this 1864 revision and supplement by Samuel G. Drake, a bookseller, antiquarian and historian of the New England Indians who was a founder of the New England Historic Genealogical Society and editor of the first fifteen volumes of the "Register". This edition retains the punctuation, spelling, typography, and use of capital letters of the second edition for the text, notes and supplemental material. This is an interesting feature of the facsimile reprint. Interesting too, is the writing style of a 17th century clergyman.

Volume I treats of the Indian Wars in New England from the first settlement to the termination of the war with King Philip in 1677. The area of concern is referred to as "the westward" which included Massachusetts around Plymouth and vicinity, Connecticut and Rhode Island. Volume II deals for the most part with "the eastward" which is the area around Casco Bay and Pascataqua. There is also coverage of the Pequod War (1637) which was apparently written after Volume I had been completed.

Drake has added copious notes and sources. For many persons, family details or places of residence have been added. Much of supplemental material is itself of historical interest.

It is interesting to note that gun control was a very serious problem then as now. How to provide guns, powder and shot to friendly Indians who would assist the settlers in fighting mutual Indian enemies and at the same time prevent those enemies from acquiring the same weapons?

The town of Tisbury, formerly known as Middletown was established 8 July 1671, from common land and the name was then changed. This volume, of a series, was first published by the New England Historic Genealogical Society with funds provided by Robert Henry Eddy for the sole purpose of publishing the vital records of Massachusetts.



The vital records list births, deaths and marriages from 1666 to 1850. While many volumes in this series give only the bare statistics this one is replete with additional data regarding occupation of father in the birth record, occupation of both parties in a marriage and often the names of their parents as well. The cause of death is often stated. The source, grave-stone record usually, is stated in many of the listings.

*The River Towns of Connecticut*, by Charles M. Adams, 1889. Facsimile reprint 1990. 5½ x 8½ soft bound pp 128, index of persons. Published by Heritage Press, 1540-E Pointer Ridge Place, Suite 300, Bowie, MD 20716. Price \$12.50 plus \$3.00 S/H.

This three part study covers the period from roughly 1630 to 1695. The first section deals with the land area between Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay colonies and the New Amsterdam and Fort Orange settlements of the Dutch. When the potential value of this undisputed area was noticed, groups from both countries began moving into the area. The English were more persistent and the Dutch eventually withdrew. By 1635 the towns of Hartford, Windsor and Wethersfield were in the process of settlement.

The second section deals with land management, settlement of the towns, dealings with the Indians, grants by the General Court, early allotments of town land, individual grants, use and disposition of common land, the common meadow and the development of the new towns.

The third section discusses the development of the political system as changes were incorporated in it to respond to changing needs and conditions. Beginning with "Freemen, Inhabitants, Householdholders, Proprietors" the analysis proceeds to "Growth of the Official System", to "Townsmen", the office of "Constable", "Town Meetings", "Rates and Fines" and finally "Town and Colony".

This work presents an excellent overview of how a movement of people to an uninhabited area develops over time into an integrated society and is able to cope with the vicissitudes encountered along the way. There is an index of persons mentioned in the text, in the notes or as sources. The text is supplemented by copious notes and is well documented.

*Customs and Fashions in Old New England*, by Alice Morse Earle (1853-1911), 5½ x 8½ soft bound, pp 388, facsimile reprint 1992 (1893). Published by Heritage Press, 1540-E Pointer Ridge Place, Suite 300, Bowie, MD 20716. Price \$25.00 plus \$3.00 S/H

The skill with which Alice Morse Earle portrayed early American life made her a favorite writer about olden times. The fifteen chapters of this work present many of the customs and fashions associated with several aspects of early New England life from the cradle to the grave.

Appropriately enough the first chapter heading is Child Life and the last, Funeral and Burial Customs. The second chapter, Courtship and Marriage presents an interesting observation - "In the early days of the New England colonies no more embarrassing or hampering condition, no greater temporal ill could befall any

adult Puritan than to be unmarried". Then follow Domestic Service; Home Interiors which contains a complete list of household furnishings given to a 1720 wedded couple by the bride's father; Table Plenishings; Supplies of the Larder with some comments on a 1728 family budget; Old Colonial Drinks and Drinkers; Travel, Tavern and Turnpike; Holidays and Festivals; Sports and Diversions one of which was public attendance at executions; Books and Bookmakers; "Artifices and Handsomeness" gives an insight into the early cosmetic field; Raiment and Vesture touches on the sumptuary laws; Doctors and Patients with its many cures of the day.

*Scotch Irish Pioneers in Ulster and America*, by Charles Knowles Bolton, 1910. 1989 reprint soft bound, pp 398, 5½ x 8½, illustrated, index. \$21.50 plus \$3.00 S/H. Published by Heritage Books, Inc., 1540-E Pointer Ridge Place, Suite 300, Bowie, MD 20716.

The author was a noted antiquarian, librarian and writer on early American life. This work is the principal reference on the subject.

The first two chapters outline the personal relationships existing between Ireland and New England and with the southern colonies prior to 1714 followed by a discussion of economic, political and religious conditions in Ulster 1714-1718. The work is mostly concerned with the settling of the Scotch-Irish in Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts but there is also coverage of Pennsylvania and South Carolina. There are lists of settlers and hundreds of immigrants are mentioned.

Sources are given in footnotes. The book is attractively illustrated with pen and ink sketches of Ulster scenes related to the text together with maps of Ulster and the American colonies. This is interesting reading whether or not one has a personal involvement with any of the many people mentioned in the work.

*Vital Records of Dunstable, Mass. to the end of the Year 1849* Paperback reprint, 1991. Heritage Books, Inc., 1540-E Pointer Ridge Place, Suite 300, Bowie, MD 20716.

First published in 1913 by the Essex Institute of Salem and widely distributed throughout the state of Massachusetts - part of the so-called "official series" - it is a great service to make this material available across the country in paperback format.

Dunstable on the northern Mass. line just to the west of Lowell may be small geographically today, but in the 1700's, especially before 1741 when the divisional line was established between N.H. and Mass., it was quite large, as was Rehoboth in the early days, including such towns as Nashua (entirely), Nottingham, Litchfield and Tyngsborough. For instance, the "1st Book of Dunstable Town Records", which includes a great many of the vital records found in this 1991 publication, is at the City

Hall in Nashua, N.H. By the same token, many of the cemetery records herein are taken from yards north of the line. Thus, this book casts a wide net and is much more than it seems.

## SEARCHING FOR ROOTS IN SCOTLAND

Recently, I spent two weeks in Scotland with my older daughter. She has a stepdaughter with four children living near Glasgow, and we planned to visit them, go into the Highlands to see the country there, visit friends in North Berwick, and do family research in Glasgow, Dumbarton and Aberdeen on my mother's paternal family, the Leys, Cruickshank, Howat and Blair families.

Our trip was a fantastic success, and my family research left me very well satisfied. Aberdeen is known as the Granite City, and also as the City of Flowers. After a three-hour bus tour, we realized that it's a thriving city, due to the recent North Sea oil industry. On the tour, we actually stood in the beautiful Cathedral St. Machar's in Old Aberdeen. This was the church where the banns were made for the marriage of my great-great-grandparents, George Leys and Isabel Cruickshank in 1816. Isabel was apparently a member of that church, but the marriage was performed at the St. Nicholas Parish Church at the home of the minister of the Chapel of Ease on Belmont Street. The marriage record (which I found at the Society of Aberdeen and Northeast Scotland Family History Shop) gave me the name of her father, and through that I traced her parent's marriage, her christening and, I think, the name of her mother's father. The father was a flax-dresser as was the grandfather, and the husband a slater. Later on in 1828 at the christening of their son, George Cruickshank Leys, George Leys was listed as a brewer. The following is from "St. Peter's Church Monumental Inscriptions", page 13, #92:

"Erected by George Leys, brewer, in Aberdeen in memory of his wife and family; Jean Leys d. 18 Feb. 1836 at age 18; his wife Isabella Cruickshank, d. 12 Dec. 1838 age 43; Elizabeth Leys, d. 17 Aug. 1839 age 7; his grandchild Agnes Robertson, age 17 months; his brother Peter Leys land stuart (sic) d. 27 Apr. 1846 age 60; dau. Isabella, wife of (James Birrel?) - face off ..... Sale (sic) maker d. .... age 33." Quite a find!

We were returning to our Bed and Breakfast after the tour (it was a holiday in Scotland) and stepped into the Maritime Museum. Here we picked up a flyer on the Aberdeen Family History Shop at 152 King St., in Aberdeen, and we felt very lucky for this happenstance as it led to our spending the entire next day there, and it proved to be a marvelous place with advice, books on family history, research facilities, etc.

After we left the shop, we searched for Belmont Street and found it, but no Chapel of Ease. We also walked through the old churchyard of St. Nicholas, right in the midst of the busy center of Aberdeen. By the way, these churches go back centuries (St. -----

Machar's was founded in 580 A.D. by St. Machar who came from Ireland to bring Christianity to the Picts.)

At the Family History Shop they advised against going to Edinburgh to research, as with limited time it would not be worthwhile because it took too long to find your way about. By joining the Society, I can write and they will have members in Edinburgh who are very familiar with the records look up any information I need.

After returning to Glasgow, we visited the Mitchell Library at Charing Cross, which has so much available, but was very busy. We took the train to Dumbarton Public Library at Strathleven Place, where Mr. Graham Hopner, Local Studies Librarian, showed me old parish records for Dumbarton, Cardross and Bonhill, where my other great-great-grandparents were born and married. I found quite a bit and was able to photocopy some of the birth records. Unfortunately, our time was limited here as it was late in the day by then, and we weren't able to get back.

The following is an interesting highlight on the Leys Family: *The Clan Map, Scotland of Old*, which I brought back, shows *Ancient Territories of Scottish Clans or Considerable Families, with Arms of Their Chiefs or Heads*. No. 20 is Burnett of Leys. Regarding the Burnett Family; in the *Golden Hart Guide on the Scottish Highlands*, under "Banchory, Grampian Town on A93, 18 miles SW of Aberdeen. A small lavender distilling town set by the salmon-rich River Dee." 3½ miles East lies Crathes Castle (National Trust for Scotland) one of the most outstanding in NE Scotland. Basic design an l-plan tower house, building begun by Alexander Burnett in 1553, and completed by his great-grandson in 1594. The Burnetts were granted their lands by Robert Bruce in 1323 and a jeweled ivory horn (The Horn of Leys) was given as a token of tenure. The horn is still in the castle. Interesting painted ceilings c. 1600 in the interior. The Long Gallery has an oak-paneled ceiling, unique in Scotland. Very fine gardens with an excellent collection of trees and shrubs, and a surrounding yew hedge planted in 1702.

Unfortunately, we traveled by train, and did not have the opportunity of visiting this or any other castles. Maybe it was a good thing, because I fell and broke my hip coming out of the medieval castle Bunratty in Shannon, Ireland, on my last trip, and my friends advised me to stay out of castles!
