### Lutes Receives National Award

#### AWARD OF MERIT IN RECOGNITION OF DISTINGUISHED WORK IN GENEALOGY

THE NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

TAKES GREAT PLEASURE IN PRESENTING THIS AWARD TO

DONALD L. LUTES, JR.

So begins the national award presented to the President of the Berkshire Family History Association, Don Lutes, by the National Genealogical Society (NGS) at their annual meeting, this past May, in Denver, Colorado. It goes on:

"Donald Lutes has devoted much of his time to indexing genealogically valuable books at the Berkshire Athenaeum. The books he indexes were compiled in the 19th century, but lack a complete or sufficient index. . . . He has recently completed every-name indexes for at least five out-of-print and in-demand publications . . . Donald is currently serving as President of the Berkshire County Family History Association and editor of the Berkshire Genealogist."

The fact is that over his "career" with the Berkshire Family History Association, Inc. (BFHA) Lutes has indexed almost four <u>hundred</u> books, periodicals and documents - all relating to families whose lives touched the various regions of New England, during the past three hundred years.

The NGS award "is presented to recognize distinguished work in American genealogy by an individual or institution." And Don travels in good company. In addition to his award, other recipients this year included Everton's Genealogical Helper "for its outstanding service to the genealogical community since 1947" and Marian L. Smith, Historian, for the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Smith . . . "has worked to create an atmosphere of mutual cooperation between and among agencies holding INS records."

While Lutes appreciates the recognition and the award from NGS, he makes it very clear that he did not do this alone. He is quick to point out that "Ann Hunt, Brad Cooper, Roger Anderson, Barbara Griffin, Betty Quadrozzi, Esther Leidhold, and all those wonderful staff people at the Athenaeum all helped out. And of course, none of it would have happened without Steve Blanchard's innovative [computer] programs."

A native of Pittsfield, Don Lutes has lived and worked all his life in the Berkshires. He got "a little involved in genealogy," he says, "after my (maternal) grandmother died and left me a box of stuff" about her and her husband's family. Don's family goes back to the settlement of Massachusetts Bay which began colonization about "ten years after Plymouth." The name Lutes is an anglicization of the German name, Lutz, whose forebears settled first in Pennsylvania then in New Brunswick, Canada. Typical of the melting pot phenomenon in the U.S., Don's ancestors claim England, France, Germany and Scotland as their birthplaces.

An only child, Lutes went into business with his father, who was a traveling salesman. Their business was manufacturing and marketing religious art products. The business was based in Pittsfield and was known as Lutes & Son. Don graduated from Babson College in 1951, with a degree in Business Administration. Beginning in 1952, he put in a couple of years as a radio operator and cryptographer with a Military Advisory Group to the Republic of Korea Army.

Asked how long has he been President of BFHA, he replies with a smile, "too long!" Then he adds with a touch of pride, "Actually, I've been president since 1985." He joined BFHA and attended its second meeting in 1975, the year the association was founded. Lutes got involved in "doing something" for the association in 1981 "when Brad Cooper suggested we index the quarterly (The Berkshire Genealogist)." And the rest, as they say, is history.

Of the almost four hundred documents that Lutes has indexed the most notable to his recollection are:

- A. The Rollin H. Cooke Collection:
- B. The Elmer I. Shepard Collection; and
- C. The Edward R. Knurow Collection.

A. The Cooke Collection is a set of sixty-six volumes relating to families in the Berkshire region. The collection was the work product of Rollin Hillyer Cooke (1843-1904) who was a Pittsfield banker and tireless collector and transcriber of genealogical records. Over the last fifteen years of his life he amassed a huge amount of material from nearly every town in Berk-

shire County, Massachusetts as well as towns in the surrounding area. Around the turn of the century, he copied his collection into a series of ledgers, which he bequeathed to the Berkshire Athenaeum.

Forty-four of the sixty-six tomes were indexed by the WPA (Works Progress Administration one of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal programs) in 1940. They did this before the era of computers. Three-by-five cards were used for the indexing process. Lutes indexed the remaining twenty-two volumes and then constructed a master index of all sixty-six volumes encompassing more than 180 thousand individual names.

- B. The Shepard Collection was developed by Elmer I. Shepard, a professor of mathematics at Williams College, Williamstown, MA and a dedicated researcher of early Berkshire families as well as families in surrounding Connecticut and New York communities.
- C. Edward R. Knurow was a Conservation Officer and Game Warden for more than thirty years here in the Berkshires. His avocation was to collect various and sundry records of land, census, old roads, foundations, Indian artifacts and facts, maps and the like. He photographed whatever he could to record the early history of the Berkshires and the people of all ethnic backgrounds who inhabited them in the colonial days. He sought out the archival records relating to the laying of the colonial roads and plotted them on graph paper, accurate right down to the last chain, rod and link. Knurow recorded early deeds and mortgages, and traced land ownership from the original grants down through their many subdivisions and changes of hands. If data could be classified as historical, Mr. Knurow collected it.

There were "more than seventeen books, all about three inches thick" according to Lutes, some of which were sold by Knurow to a local book dealer.

In addition to the Cooke, Shepard and Knurow collections Lutes also did sixty-five volumes of the *Berkshire Collection* which includes many Berkshire Church and Cemetery records, as well as the *Berkshire Histories* collection which puts the contents of one hundred forty-one sources into one index of over 200 thousand references.

Asked if there were anything that members of BFHA should know about Don Lutes, he replied in his usual humble manner, "I've led a very uneventful life." If indexing approximately four hundred books, covering hundreds of thousands of names and leading the Berkshire Family History Association, Inc. for the past thirteen years might be considered as uneventful, by Lutes, it is certainly a very productive slice of life. For that, the Association and people from all parts of the country doing genealogical research in the Berkshires, are in his debt and wish to thank and congratulate him on his well-deserved National Award of Merit from the National Genealogical Society.

reported for duty then, and Benjamin A. was allowed to resign and return home. In March 1863, 1st Lieut. Benjamin F. Morey was appointed A.A.D.C., 3rd Zouaves 5th N. Y. Vols. Co. B, for whom he desired to obtain a commission. A lieutenant's commission was promised conditionally upon the enlistment of a stated number of men and the commission should be given to the young man, & also his discharge from his enlistment. The men were enlisted and taken into Brig., 3rd Div., Dept. Gulf. March 11, 1864, Benjamin F. Morey was mustered as Capt. and assigned to Co. A but served through the red river campaign as Benjamin A. Morey were mustered in at Boston, February 19, 1862, by Capt. John W. Goodhue, 11th U. S. Inf. The Regt. then accepted by the State as the + Copy of a letter on file in the Office of the Adj. Gen. of Mass. "Benjamin A. Morey, druggist of Lee, Mass. received authority to recruit for the Western 31st Mass. Inf. Vols. was soon afterward ordered to leave for service, but Benjamin F. Morey being unable to obtain his discharge at that time, Benjamin A. Surgeon of the Regt., leaving the commissions of the other officers to be issued upon the recommendation of the Colonel. Benjamin F. Morey succeeded in Bay State Regt. in the fall of 1861. He was 45 years old and had a son Benjamin F. Morey about 19 years old, then serving as an enlisted man in Duryea's obtaining his discharge, which was soon after the battle of Antietam, in which he took part. That is in September or October of 1862\*. Benjamin E. Morey camp at Pittsfield where they were mustered into service by Capt. Nettleton of the Regt. January 8, 1862. The officers of the company including 1st Lieut. Morey went with the Regt. mustered and acting as 1st Lieut. of Co. I, but not commissioned - since Gov. Andrew had commissioned only the Colonel and A.A.G.C. of the 5th Brig. Cav. Div. 19th A.C. Capt. Benjamin F. Morey resigned Sept. 9, 1864.

been furnished in the Navy by the Commonwealth. The national government recognizing the claim as set forth by Gov. Andrew, ordered that all men who enlisted in Massachusetts in the Navy and passed to the Receiving Ship known as the "Ohio", at the Charlestown Navy Yard, who had enlisted prior to the appointment of the commission, or who should enlist up to February, 1864, should be counted upon the quota of Massachusetts. The Governor appointed a Massachusetts represented to the national government the injustice of no recognition being made by the government of 26,000 men (or thereabouts) who had Information dictated by the custodian of the Archives, Office of the Adjutant-General of Massachusetts: "In 1863, when the Draft was ordered,

Although some of these men had enlisted long before the appointment of the commission (say in 1861), for one year, and were discharged in 1862 by expiration of term of service, yet they were counted upon the quota of the towns set against their names, the said towns receiving the benefit of this quota, and, consequently having less men to furnish upon the Draft. The units were three one-year men counting as an enlistment for three years; three two-years' men counting for two three-years' men; - the unit being three years. #### THE TRIBULATIONS AND PEREGRINATIONS OF LUCY CUTLER

We the Selectmen of the Town of Pittsfield do hereby certify that Lucy Cutler was born in Killingly in the State of Connecticut and always lived in that town and in the town of Coventry in the State of Rhode Island until eight years since when she was Married to Levi Edson in said Coventry then moved to Killingly and lived there three years then to Northampton in the State of Massachusetts being the first time she came into this Commonwealth lived in Northampton two years then moved to Pittsfield where she has since resided until the month of September last past when the said Levi absconded and the said Lucy and her two children became chargeable and continued so for a short time when we find she was transported to the town of Killingly the said Edson had a settlement in the town of Bridgewater but we have ascertained that he now has a wife living to whom he was married previous to his marrying the said Lucy. Lucy's father and mother were born in Killingly and resided there until they died which was about thirty years since. Edson's first marriage was in the town of Pittsfield at the Revd Mr. Allens to a woman by the name of Morse more than ten years since which woman is now living in the town of Castleton in the State of Vermont.

We further certify that the said Lucy has not gained a settlement in any town of district within this Commonwealth in any of the ways pointed out in an act passed February Eleventh in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety four specifying what shall constitute a legal settlement and also has no kindred within the Commonwealth by law obliged to support her. We the subscribers being chosen by the Town of Pittsfield to make such alterations in the School Districts in the Town as we should think proper - Report

Your Committee therefore from the Representations of a Number of Inhabitants & from our knowledge of their Local Situations Beg leave to report -

1st That Mr. Joseph Fairfield, Mr. Jonathan Western, Mr. Jeremh Silvey & the Farm formerly owned by Mr. Hickok with the Lands belonging to different persons in Lanesborough within said Lands belonging to different persons in Lanesborough within said District be annexed to the North District near Mr. Zadock Hubbard's.

2nd That John Wright, Timothy Hollebert, John Churchell, Seth Janes, John Francis, Mr. Isom, Joshua Boynton & Daniel Talcut be annexed to the North District near Mr. James Taylor's. Pittsfield 28th Feby 1791

Daniel Weller, Major Daniel Weller & the late Eli Bushes Estate with the other Estates, be taken from the Middle district & annexed to the fourth district - after hearing the parties and on the most mature deliberations, we are unanimously of the oppinion, that the above arrangment will have the greatest tendancy to provide Harmony and will best accommodate the Individuals in said district generally - all of which is submitted. 26 March 1804. 
