WEST STOCKBRIDGE AND THE BLIZZARD OF 1888

Before there were departments of public works, a town's citizens provided the labor to maintain a community's "infrastructure," as it's called today. Mending wooden bridges wrecked by floods, road repair and snow clearing, school house maintenance and other tasks were accomplished by the residents who were paid by the town. Annual Town Reports are a valuable source for information about them.

"Breaking" roads (in the same sense as a piece of land newly broken up by a plow) referred to winter road work. Before there were mechanized road plows, a wooden roller as much as six feet high was hauled by several yoke of oxen to flatten and pack the snow for sleds. To maintain a snow packed road, a large three-sided sled full of snow was shoveled off to fill any holes or uneven places. A rolled winter road was favored especially to move heavy loads by sled.

But none of this applied after the blizzard of 1888 in the middle of March in the Northeast. Railroads, the postal service, the milkmen, doctors, and any others who needed to travel were snowed in. Farmers had difficulty getting to their livestock in their barns. Drifts in some places in the Berkshires were as high as thirty feet.

The county literally shoveled out. In Pittsfield thousands of men did so for fifteen cents an hour. In Egremont the citizens shoveled roads all day. In West Stockbridge, fifty-seven men took on the huge task of making all the roads passable. The Town Report of 1889 lists their names and what they were paid.

The Berkshire Courier published the best account of what the storm was really like in south county with a description of the Baldwin brothers attempting to get home from the center of West Stockbridge village. (The Baldwin family store is still there today.)

A TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE

"The experience of C. W. Baldwin and Edgar Baldwin, in endeavoring to reach their homes two miles from this village, on the first night of the storm, reads very much like an

extract from a Dakota paper of blizzard notoriety. They started from here in a cutter drawn by a stout horse about half past five o'clock. While they expected to encounter difficulties in the shape of drifts before reaching their journey's end they had no idea of the suffering they were to encounter. Shortly after passing W. H. Day's house the horse gave out from exhaustion. The wind was blowing a gale and the snow flying so that to see ten feet ahead was an impossibility. They were chilled to the very marrow of their bones and it was only by constantly rubbing their eyes that the lids were kept from freezing. At the foot of the hill beyond Mr. Day's, C. W. Baldwin got out and endeavored to stamp down the snow in front of the horse. He had only gone 30 feet when he found his strength to be about gone and he returned to the sleigh on his hands and knees. Finding they could go no further, the travellers thought to return to Mr. Day's. They unharnessed the horse, and taking the buffalo robe with them, took a track back. Every few steps, they turned their backs to the cutting wind, and threw the robe over their heads and paused for breath. The horse followed them and when they stopped, stuck his head in under the robe, as if endowed with human instincts. They floundered through drifts, at times on their hands and knees until the gate to the Day house was reached. There a ten foot drift confronted them and they feared that even while in sight of shelter they might perish. The elder brother entirely gave out but Edgar kept on. He climbed through and over the drift, reached the door, opened it and after exclaiming that Curt was freezing at the gate, fell senseless to the floor. Mr. Day and his man went to Curt's rescue and brought him to the house. They it was found that their hands, faces and ears were frozen. They were cared for and given a bed for the night, and Tuesday reached home after an experience that they will never forget."

We are reminded of another blizzard in south Berkshire in 1969. A record of 96 inches for the year was twice the average snowfall. The Southern Berkshire Regional School District had to extend the Christmas vacation, which was pleasing to students, and possibly teachers. It was several days before Silver Street in Sheffield was cleared. A D-9, an enormous bulldozer, the largest available, did the job. We heard it, like continuous thunder, long before we saw it. It had come over Cooper Hill all the way from Canaan, Conn. The Malnati dairy farm on Cooper Hill was no doubt anxious for the milk tanker truck to get through. That much hasn't changed. As for the operator of the D-9, he looked like the king of the snowy world that day. He was.

EARLY INDUSTRY AND OCCUPATIONS IN DALTON, MASSACHUSETTS

In the beginnings of the Ashuelot Equivalent (Dalton) community, which started at the base of Washington Mountain Road, there was lumbering, trapping, and farming. Pittsfield was incorporated in 1761, and provided a market and a source of sustenance to the growing settlement. There is a limited source of water power here, but it is not the great Housatonic.

The early settlers were investors and risk-takers from Hatfield, Hadley, Westfield and elsewhere along the Connecticut River valley. The French and Indian Wars were over, and the Indians were a minimal threat in the middle of the county. Many of the settlers were of private means, or otherwise favoured by the Crown. These newcomers were loyal tories. Soon, a new breed of settlers arrived, and would establish a western frontier of fiercely independent and freedom-loving people. Their independence and self-sufficiency would become evident during the Shays' rebellion in 1786, and would live on.

The settlers expanded the population of the Equivalent secondly in the northeast valley (then Windsor), and then in the eastern and southeastern Housatonic river valley (then Partridgefield). The services and industry necessary to support these people also grew accordingly. Located here was the greatest asset in the valley -and the County, the Housatonic River.

Occupations and crafts are recorded in The Dalton Papers and on early maps. Collec-

tively they define the town's earliest industries:

Farming of grains, flax, and animal husbandry. Grains had to be ground by the water-powered grist mills, flax harvested and processed for linens, wool processed and dyed, and milk-products processed for consumption and trade.

Lumbering of first-growth timber served the needs of the growing communities. Abundant water power served well in primitive saw mills to make shingles, wooden tools, and

later charcoal for other emerging industries.

A potash factory is located on Lot no. 78 (now Main St.) in a deed¹ dated 1784. Potassium, a key ingredient of potash, is used in fertilizers, soaps, and gunpowder.

A tanning mill for processing leather is recorded, and at least one furnace for making

iron products or pig iron to ship to Pittsfield.

The first paper mill would be built near the clean, fast waters of the Housatonic by

Zenas Crane, who arrived in 1799.

Ninety workers of 1780/1790 are recorded, by name, and include the following fifteen trades: Blacksmith (1), Clothier (2), Cooper (1), Cord Wainer (4), Esquire (4), Gentleman (10), Husbandman (10), Inn Holder (4), Joiner (2), Labourer (2), Mason (1), Miller (1), Physician (1), Preacher (2), Quarryman (1), Taylor (1), Yeoman/Farmer (43).

THE GOOD OLD DAYS?

From the Journal of the Rev. John Taylor, New York Documentary History, Vol. 3, page 692. "Sept. 2d At the house of a Rhode Island Baptist. Here is a mixture of all the physical and moral evils that can well be conceived of. Here may be found filth of all kinds, such as dust, mud, fleas, bedbugs, gnats, rotten meat, and sour bread; and, as to moral evils, you may here find ignorance, self-will, self sufficiency, ill manners, pride, boasting, fanaticism, and witchcraft; and this description, I believe, will apply to all the families in the town, Mr. Hackley's excepted." [We would be willing to give odds that Mr. Hackley was this peripatetic preacher's host. Ed.]

CERTIFICATES OF CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

DALTON AND THE CHURCH 1808-1819

A number of church membership certificates were found during a record inventory of the Town Clerk's vault. They contain names of many resident and non-resident property owners who participated in non-Congregational religious societies in Dalton. The certificates identify the earliest *circuit rider* church membership known.

Methodists and Baptists with property in Dalton were taxed to support the town's meetinghouse and the Congregational Church, since at that time they were one and the same. Objections arose from these religious groups concerning the support of the Congregational meetinghouse. People who had property in Dalton, but attended circuit rider meetings in Dalton and neighboring towns objected to the support of the meetinghouse also being used for Congregational worship. Signed certificates were used by the town assessor to reduce that part of property taxes attributable to the support of the Congregational Church, preacher, and

parsonage.

It is important to reflect on the colonial period before the separation of church and state. Excepts from the book New England Dissent 1630-1833 reveal a century-long history of bickering and court cases to legalize personal freedom. "During its first nine years Massachusetts tried to follow a policy of volunteerism in the support of its ministers, but two factors made it unworkable: First the people were poor and did not feel they could give...second a policy of limiting church membership to visible saints made those outside the church...feel they were not responsible for supporting the church as those who were actual members...The Cambridge Platform in 1648 firmly established the policy of compulsory religious taxes; further laws in 1642 and 1654 confirmed and expanded the practice to include taxes for building and repairing meetinghouses and parsonages. Boston was the only town exempt from this law because it was able to sustain its churches by voluntary gifts from its members and well-to-do congregations."

"The first known court case regarding exemption of a Baptist minister from civil taxes

occurred in 1762 in Huntstown (now Ashfield) Massachusetts..."

"The (church tax) laws became so vague that in 1799 it became necessary to remodel them. A new act assumed every inhabitant belonged to the original (town's) parish unless he annually procured a certificate signed by the pastor of some other parish, and also by its committee specially elected for that purpose, that he commonly and usually, when in health, worshiped with them. Under this system, the people of Pittsfield, in common with the rest of the State, lived until the amendment of the Constitution in 1834."

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts required that each town wanting incorporation set aside land for a Congregational meetinghouse. The Town, in turn, assessed each landowner the cost of erecting and maintaining the meetinghouse. The Town was also responsible for acquiring and supporting a religious leader. The meetinghouse would serve as both a place for religious worship and a place for town meetings. The Town and the church were therefore

inseparable, and would stay this way for many years to come.

The dominant religious society in Dalton was the Congregationalist. This denomination would last until 1788, when Methodism appeared in the southwestern part of the Town, near the Pittsfield town line. "Methodism was formally established in Pittsfield in 1792 by Reverend Robert Green who, on his way to New Lebanon, was detained by a storm at the house of Capt. Joel Stevens, on the eastern base of the Taconic Mountain, and there made excellent use of his time in preaching and organizing the *Pittsfield Circuit*." The itinerant preacher was called a *Circuit Rider*.

The Methodists were served by the circuit rider who served Pittsfield, Dalton, Hancock and Washington. They met in private homes rather than the Town's meeting house. More

information on this subject may be found in the book, A History of Dalton Methodism, by Cora Hitt Smith, 1927.

The following is one of several versions of the Certificate:

We certify that <u>signature</u> of the town of Dalton is a member of the Religious society in the towns of Pittsfield, Dalton, Hancock and Washington called Methodist.

Many certificates did not specify the residency of the applicant. Those that did may have related only to property ownership in the town, not residency. The Dalton census of 1800 through 1830 was reviewed to verify residency. If the applicant was in the census, a notation of the census-year(s) appears in the Certificate table. If an applicant was not in the census, the applicant might have lived in a surrounding town, may have moved, or may have been deceased at census taking.

The Committee members of the religious denomination are from Dalton, where a census-data is shown, or from Pittsfield

The certificates provide genealogical and church membership information by revealing:

- Applicant's denomination and date-reference.
- · Applicant's town of residency and/or indication of property ownership in Dalton.
- Church membership information and date-reference.
- Denomination and date-reference of committee members.



THE WILL OF WILLIAM WILLIAMS: A FOUNDING FATHER OF DALTON, MASSACHUSETTS

Williams, son of Israel, was born at Hatfield on June 10, 1734. He graduated from Yale College in 1754, was admitted to the bar, and later appointed Clerk of Hampshire County Court. He is not to be confused with his first cousin Colonel Williams (1713-1784), the son of Reverend William Williams of Weston, and later Hatfield, Mass. The Reverend was a brother of Israel. Colonel William Williams is perhaps best known for his service in the French and Indian Wars. He was an early, eminent settler in Pittsfield and active in town affairs as well.

After the royal courts were suspended in 1774, Colonel Israel and son, Deacon William, were no longer in business. They remained in Hatfield during the war. William moved to the family's holdings in the western part of Ashuelot Equivalent, which became Dalton, sometime in the early 1780's.

His father, Colonel Israel, was a staunch Tory who owed much of his wealth and success in real estate to the Crown. The son, Deacon William, on the other hand was wise enough to sense the politics of the day, stay moderate, and align himself with the patriots.

Prior to coming to the "Equivalent," William Williams was deacon in the Congregational church in his hometown of Hatfield. Later, he became deacon to the Dalton Congregational Society.

Deacon William Williams settled in the western part of Town near the Pittsfield line. An early map shows Deacon William Williams on lot 46, this would be along Grange Hall Road near a southeastward curve.

Deacon Williams served in multiple roles as the first Town Clerk, the first Treasurer, and first Assessor. He continued in these positions until he became a State Senator in 1797.

During his term in offices (1784 through 1799), the country acquired a Federal Constitution, Bill of Rights, a President, a Federal Congress, and freely elected county judicial courts.

Williams was instrumental in establishing the mission and the charter for Dalton's first library in 1796. It was operational until 1828 when it disbanded and the assets were sold off. The library served Dalton and Pittsfield people living within four miles, on either side, of what is now Dalton-Division Road. Annual meetings of the Library Committee often met at the home of Deacon William Williams. His personal library of 66 works, listed in his estate², did not duplicate the 135 books of the Union Library Society.

A cousin of Ephraim Williams, he was prominent in the administration of Ephraim's estate, and in carrying out the designs for Williams College.

William married Dorothy Ashley of Deerfield. Nine children survived him. He died March 1, 1808 and was buried in Pittsfield's first burial grounds. He was later reburied in the family lot in the "rural cemetery of that town" (Pittsfield Cemetery). Dorothy Williams died in Dalton in 1832.

William Williams' will, which follows, is especially interesting for its arrangements for his wife and daughters, and for his clock.

In the Name of God, amen!

I William Williams of Dalton in the County of Berkshire, feeling bodily infirmities increasing upon me, have thought fit to make and publish and do accordingly this fourteenth day of September in the year of our Lord 1805 make and publish this my last will and testa-

ment, rejoicing that whilst I commit my soul to God and my body to the earth (for which I ask a decent interment) I may comfortably hope for a resurrection to everlasting life through the infinite merits of my adorable Saviour Jesus Christ - The worldly substance a kind Providence has bestowed on me and by which He has made me and mine comfortable (may we never forget his benefits!) I dispose of in a manner following- First I order and direct that my just debts and funeral charges be duly paid by my executors- of what shall remain I give and bequeath in manner and in the proportions hereafter expressed in this my last will-To wit. I give to my affectionate and beloved wife The one half of my household furniture (my desk clock and clock case not to be included) - And the other half of the said household furniture, with the aforesaid exception, I give to my three daughters Dorothy Charlotte and Sarah in equal shares- the said furniture to be divided by Legatees and not inventoried.- I also give to my wife the use & occupancy of all my new or front house, except the west chamber; and of the cellar under it so long as she remains my widow, together with a right to use the kitchen. the ovens and other apartments and appendages of the old house so far as the use of the same shall be necessary to render that occupancy convenient and comfortable to her, with the limitation however, And it is my will that such maiden daughters or daughter as shall survive me shall dwell and be cohabitant with the mother, and have a right, if such daughters or daughter shall so choose to possess.... the east chamber and its appendages so long as they or she shall remain unmarried and the mother remain my widow- In case the mother should marry again I give to such maiden daughters or daughter so long as they or she shall continue in that state, the use and occupancy of the aforesaid east chamber, the room under it and half the new cellar with their appendages-also the use of the kitchen the ovens and other appendages of the old house so far as may be necessary to render the occupancy useful and comfortable, together with a right to cut their necessary firewood the farm on which I live. Provided however and it is my will that such daughters or daughter shall have an exclusive right to the said Chamber only & the presis? (premises) belonging to it - provided also that the several occupants of my dwelling house shall have a right to use the pasins? (passages) from one part to another so far as shall be necessary to the full enjoyment of there respective apartments-

I also give to my Wife one third part of my personal estate over and above what is herein before bequeathed her of the same, to be at her own disposal- I also give to her the use of one half the barn standing near my dwelling house so long as she remains my widow and my dwelling houses and barns deducted, I give her the use and improvement of one quarter part of my remaining real estate during the same term-

I give my wearing apparel in equal shares to my sons John, Jeremiah W., William, Nathan, Ashley, and Israel to be divided by them and the mother, in case Israel should be a minor when the division is made, and in this case I empower her to act for him- and I direct that no inventory hereof be taken-

I also give to my wife the use of my clock and desk whilst she remains my widow. when her term therein shall be expired I give my clock to that son who shall own my present dwelling house, he allowing to my other children in the same proportion they are respectively to share the last remainder of my estate, his share being first deducted from the appraised value.

The known filial feelings of my children towards their mother and the great obligation they are under to her will render any special injunctions on them to make her future life comfortable and easy quite needless-

I give to my son John forty dollars and a new saddle in consideration of his faithful services whilst a minor-

I give to my son Jeremiah Wadsworth one hundred dollars, a new Saddle, and my fowling piece for his faithful services during his minority.

I give to my son William one hundred dollars, my sealing ring & a new saddle for the like-

I give to my son Nathan fifty dollars and a new saddle for the like-

I give to my son Ashley one hundred dollars and a new saddle for the like. I also give him my (unreadable) for a T(unreadable)-

I give to my son Israel my silver seal and a new saddle- If he should live to the age of twenty one years-if not, I give the seal to my son John.

I give to my wife and daughters each a suit of mourning after my decease and direct my

executors to provide the same for them.

Of what shall remain of my estate after the debts and foregoing legacies are deducted. I give to my dutiful and beloved sons nine twelfth parts in equal shares- and to my very affectionate and beloved daughters the other three twelfth parts in equal shares- What may have been advanced by me to any of my children and charged in account against them in my book as advanced towards their portion or shares of my estate is to be considered as part of my estate and added to the rest to make the aggregate from which the forementioned deductions are to be made and the sum or sums advanced and charged as aforesaid to any one shall be considered and taken as and for so much of his or her share there of already received. And in order that the nearest equal justice may be done or that which, best satisfies my own mind half the amount of the lawful interest of the sum which shall have been advanced to any one or more of my children from the time it was received shall be deducted from the dividends or aggregate amount of my estate which is to be divided and shared in the manner and proportion aforesaid, before such one share thereof shall be found and ascertained. And if it should appear at my decease that one of my children has received more than his or her share of my estate according to the will, such child shall refund to each of the others, who may demand it, his or her proportion of such overplus- If any of my sons shall have received a new saddle of or before my decease, such saddle shall be considered as having satisfied the above bequest of a saddle to such son any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding-

I have given a joint bond, some years since, with my son Jeremiah to Simon Larned to secure the said Larned from all losses which he might sustain on account of the said Jeremiah malfeasance or negligence as a deputy sheriff under him, and direct and order that the said

Jeremiah save my heirs from harm on account of that bond.

I thereby empower my executor hereafter named, or any two of them or the survivor of them if necessary and any case may require it, to make and execute any deed or deeds of real estate which, if I had lived I might have been holden in law or equity to have made or executed in consequence of any contract or agreement I have already made or may make.

And leave unfulfilled at my decease as fully to all intents and purposes as I my self might or ought to have done thereby ratifying and confirming what they, any two of the survi-

vor of them shall lawfully do in this respect.

And I thereby appoint my wife and my sons John and Ashley Executors of this my last will and testament thereby revoking all former wills by me made. In Witness whereof I have hereto set my hand & seal the day and year first above written--

Signed, sealed published pronounced and declared as and for the last will and Testament of the said Wm Williams by him in presence of us the subscribing Witnesses, who set our Names hereto in his presence & presence of each other

Through inattention and carelessness the following article was omitted in making the foregoing draught of my will- I have there... the 19th day of September 1805, added it as a satisfied and not of my lost will and Total and the satisfied and the

I give and bequeath management and support of missions to the heathen or to the infant settlements in the United States, or both, as the missionary society which may receive the same shall judge most expedient- And I direct my executors to pay over the said sum, within two years from my decease, to the treasurer of the missionary Society in the County of Hampshire, or to the treasurer of the like society in the County of Berkshire, as they may find most convenient. In witness whereof I there set my hand and seal in the day and year last aforesaid. Signed sealed and declared by the said William, to be a codicil to and part of his last will, in the presence of us, who set our name hereto in his presence and in presence of each other

SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR WRITING QUERIES

- Give the full name, including middle name or initial, of the person subject to enquiry.
- 2. Establish identity of the person by giving place and date of birth, place and date of death, parentage, place and date of marriage and identity of spouse to the extent these data are known, as:

John DOE b Hartford, CT 12 Jan 1900; d Fairfield, CT 19 Mar 1967 s/o Richard & Abigail (WESTON) DOE m Hartford 11 June 1923.

- 3. If unable to give a complete description of the person under enquiry, start with a son or daughter for whom more information might be available and ask for that person's ancestry.
- 4. Identify spouse in manner described in (2) above.
- 5. State what information is desired, as:
 Need ancestors of John and Abigail.
- 6. Place the question at the end of the query.
- 7. Do not abbreviate the names of persons or towns.
- 8. For any locale outside Massachusetts, be sure to identify the state.
- 9. Dates should be written: day, month, year as: 13 Oct 1743.
- 10. Use multiple queries rather than several parts to the same query.
- 11. Queries should not exceed four or five lines and should be submitted as an ASCII file on a diskette or E-mailed to bfha@berkshire.net marked as a query on the subject line. Printed or typed queries will also continue to be accepted.
- 12. Well-known abbreviations may be used but elaborate use of them is not required.
- 13. Address for reply should be stated on each card so that the Editor is not obliged to keep their envelope as well in order to have a complete record.
- 14. Acknowledge receipt of all replies and reimburse respondent for postage and the cost of any material copied. One should not be left out of pocket for having answered a call for help. If the submitted material is of little use, that is the risk assumed in transactions by correspondence.
- 15. When requesting information, always include a SASE.
- 16. Help your query editor judge the effectiveness of this section. If you make a contact that provides significant help with your search, won't you let us know?
