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# GENERAL SCHUYLER AND THE BERKSHIRE COUNTY MILITIA

Expecting the discharging of our militia; am fully sensible of the Necessity of their being upon their plantations at this season of the year. Enoch Poor, Brigadier General of New Hampshire Militia - June 10, 1777

General Poor and other Revolutionary War officers commanded thousands of militiamen who were farmers first and soldiers second. They realized these farmer soldiers lived and died by crop cycles and were not surprised when half the militia stationed at Fort Edward left to harvest crops. Unfortunately, these men walked away from the Northern Continental Army at a time when Major General Philip Schuyler wanted them to stop a British advance toward Albany. Many Berkshire men were among those who chose a ripened harvest over the call to battle. In the heat of the moment, Schuyler angrily labeled them deserters. In response, Berkshire County's Brigadier General, John Fellows, ungraciously accused Schuyler of being a traitor.

This was not the first time a Berkshire County official spoke unkindly about General Schuyler. Dislike for him was probably rooted in the long-standing conflict between so called Yorkers and New Englanders. While trust in Schuyler's leadership became an issue early in the Revolutionary War, a critical note of no confidence during July 1777 by several New England generals elevated the issue to a dangerous level. The security of the country was threatened. Only when Congress reassigned General Schuyler did the conflict subside.

In May 1776, uncertainty about Schuyler was obvious during a meeting of a confederation of eleven communities held at Richmond. Valentine Rathbun, Chairman of the Committee, heard testimony from an unidentified informant about treachery. Mr. Rathbun, a Baptist minister and mill operator in Pittsfield, was expressly warned about Tories in western Connecticut and Albany County who were plotting against the Continental Congress. The informant also said that General Schuyler "...was a true man for the King... (and)... had a commission from (him)..." When the Committee notified Washington about this damning testimony, the supreme commander did nothing. Apparently, Washington attributed it to a Tory strategy to create suspicion within the ranks of his army. Rathbun, an impulsive person, also accused the Shakers of Stillwater of being the "Principal Enemies of America" and "...the most wicked of all people on earth."

About the same time that Rathbun's confederation concluded its work, Eldad Taylor was told by Colonel Mark Hopkins of Great Barrington about a Tory plot to split the Colonies. Mr. Taylor represented the town of Westfield in the first "Continental" legislature of Massachusetts and was given temporary custody of gold and silver worth 1700 pounds. The money was earmarked for Washington's Northern Army, under the command of General Schuyler. Taylor informed General Benjamin Lincoln of his reluctance to give this money to Schuyler. He said that Colonel Hopkins recommended withholding it while Schuyler was being investigated.

Adding to the General's problems, another Berkshire committee questioned his leader-ship while meeting in Pittsfield. A letter to General Washington from the chairman, Asa Douglass, said that several committees of Inspection and Safety adjacent to New York questioned why an alleged Tory ringleader, who was captured during a battle at Johnstown, was "...not so much as put under moderate confinement..." by Schuyler. The committee blamed the reluctance of Berkshire men to enlist in the 1776 Fort Ticonderoga expedition on his

apparent leniency.

Mr. Douglass supplemented his committee report with a personal and confidential letter to Washington, in which his accusations were more critical. His introductory remarks revealed much about his character: "May a Grey headed Farmer speak freely? Will your Excellency allow me to unbosom myself...when I fear to do it..." He resented the defeat of the patriot army in Canada during the winter of 1775. Having invested personal wealth in this tragic campaign, he blamed the Continental Congress, New York's Provincial Congress, cheating teamsters and the expedition's leader, General Schuyler. He inquired, "...Can't General Schuyler be removed with honor to some other post...to satisfy the minds of people...?" He also warned, "I think few or none of New England Officers or Soldiers will serve two Campaigns under General Schuyler."

Following a congressional investigation, Schuyler was exonerated and Colonel Hopkins, acting on behalf of the Committee of Safety at Sheffield and Canaan, New York, advised Washington that accusations about Schuyler being a Tory were groundless. On June 24, 1776,

William Whiting released the money that was being held.

About one year later, dark days returned. After being driven from Fort Ticonderoga on July 5, the main parts of Schuyler's army were in retreat toward Castleton when several companies of militia and Continental troops regrouped in the vicinity of Fort Edward. The Berkshire County men were part of this group. Schuyler planned to include these men in a body of resistance against an army described by General John Fellows as, "...British, Germans, Canadians and Savages; who [were] flushed with victory, and [inflamed] against [us]..." Fellows further described their leaders as "...lawless Banditti..." who "...abused and greatly stressed [New York]..." General Fellows acknowledged the importance of stopping the British army, defending his neighbors in New York and the interests of his own county. His challenge was to incorporate ripe crops that would feed Berkshire residents and the Northern Continental Army during the upcoming winter with military maneuvers.

General Washington's orders to Fellows and other New England officers clearly demonstrated his sensitivity to balancing the needs of war with the demands of the season. He gave them latitude in allocating manpower when he wrote, "...it will be also more convenient for the men, part of which may be gathering their harvests while the others are bravely defending their country." In an apparent attempt to relieve tensions, he assigned the Berkshire militia to General Arnold. This prompted Fellows to order out the companies of Captains John King,

Ashley's regiment. These companies probably filled in for men from Captains Lankton, Woodbridge, Wilcox, Low, Portor, and Lt. Dibble's companies, who left with Fellows on July 22.

General Schuyler, dispirited by the loss of militia and the prospect of certain defeat, wrote from Fort Edward to the President of the Council of Massachusetts, "The great Impatience expressed by the Militia from the County of Berkshire...to return to their Habitations to harvest their crops has (induced) a Council of General officers held at this place to advise that half of them should be sent back, lest the whole should have left..." On July 24, while at Moses Creek he wrote, "...of the Berkshire (Militia) not above Quarter - and of Colo. Ashley...only thirty from Rank and File are left...the...Rest have infamously deserted before they had been four Days on the Ground and many of their officers are with them..." He requested immediate replacement of these men, specifically, "...two thousand, at least, be detached to me immediately and I hope that no Delay will take place in complying with this Requisition, and that orders may be given that the Militia do not March so tardily as is too often the case." This ungracious scolding did not induce much sympathy with the Massachusetts Council.

At the end of July, New York's congressional delegates advised the New York Council of Safety that, "The eastern states openly affirm that their troops have no confidence in General Schuyler..." Schuyler eventually recognized his loss of popularity and advised his superiors, "...The militia are daily decreasing, and I have no prospect of a reinforcement...I which I could say that the troops...were in good spirits; they are quite otherwise."

General Fellows determined that Schuyler was not to be confided in. His reply to the Massachusetts Council and Schuyler's malicious accusations was, "...upon the first Intelligence that the enemy had arrived at Crown Point I (marched) with one half of my brigade and soon after the remainder marched in pursuance of my order and continued in services without a single desertion, until part were discharged by the advice of a council of (officers)..." Fellows claimed that approximately 500 men were on the ground at the time General Schuyler said there were only a few.

General Horatio Gates, the officer who replaced Schuyler, later credited the Berkshire Militia with delaying the march of the British Army by felling trees and obstructing roads and bridges in the area north of Fort Edward. This tactic bought time for the patriot army to build a significant defensive force and later mount a successful offensive at Saratoga. On October 17, 1777, the British capitulated to the patriot army, an event that turned the tide of the war.

During this war, General Schuyler's loyalty was evaluated at the highest levels of the New York Provincial Convention and the Continental Congress. Charges of his being a traitor were never validated. Because of his property holdings in the Hudson River Valley, he probably walked a precarious line between these interests and his command. This exposed him to suspicion and criticism from many patriots, but his ambivalence helped the American cause more than it hurt. Eventually, Philip Schuyler landed solidly on the patriot side and his command of the Northern Continental Army was restored. Because of repeated incursions from Canada by the British, Schuyler frequently called on Berkshire County farmers to defend the frontiers of New York. General Fellows quickly responded to his pleas, except during harvest time.

# HOSKINS/HASKINS/HOPKINS

We would like to call readers' attention to a current article by Audrey Alexander Sommer' in the *New England Historical and Genealogical Register*, Volume 157 (Oct., 2003), Page 370, which states:

"When the Vital Records of Alford, Massachusetts were published in 1902, the transcribers read the surname Hoskins as 'Hopkins.' Consequently, researchers have not been able to relate the few Hopkins records therein to the right family."

The article provides five pages of information that can be used in correcting this error. It includes a letter dated 1909 written by Theodocia Merrella Haskins, granddaughter of Benoni Haskins to Marion Belle Haskins, great-great-grandaughter of Benoni, and contains transcriptions of Benoni's account book, the Haskins family Bible, and miscellaneous records the source of which is not indicated.

# DANIEL STEARNS, HIS FOUR SONS AND THEIR MILLS IN STEARNSVILLE

# ANCIENT HISTORY OF THE SOUTH-WEST PART OF THE TOWN OF PITTSFIELD

As published in the *Pittsfield Sun*, February 9th, 1876 Contributed by Emilie S. Piper

Dr. Baird of Philadelphia, many years since, wrote a history of Watertown, Essex county, Mass., giving the names and genealogy of the original proprietors of this town. In his investigations and researches he found that the original settlers came from England about 1625 to 1640. Among these were some who bore the name of Sterne, Sternes, or Stearns; many of them, or their descendants, emigrated to what is now other states, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and probably other states. Those now living, bearing that name, probably

sprang from the original settlers of that name in Watertown.

Mr. Daniel Stearns was born in Killingly, Conn., in the year 1764, and was apprenticed to Col. Danielson of the town of Colchester, (after whom the town or village of Danielsonville, on the Norwich and Worcester R.R. was named) and learned the trade of cloth dressing and dyeing cloth and yarn for family use. After serving his apprenticeship, he established himself in business in the town of Brookline, Conn., where he remained until about the year 1795, when he sold out his works and purchased the real estate and all the water power which is now owned by the Plunkett Woolen Co., Messrs. Hinsdale & Bro., and the falls below, which were situated in what was known as Partridgefield.

Out of this original town was incorporated the town of Peru, and afterwards the town of Hinsdale. Mr. Stearns removed to what is now known as Hinsdale in the fall of 1795, and the succeeding winter made preparations to erect suitable buildings in the spring and summer following, adequate to the wants of the business in which he was engaged in Brookline. The

winter proved a very severe one, with an unusual amount of snow.

In the spring, having a favorable opportunity to dispose of his purchases, he embraced it, and removed to Lenox Furnace, and again resumed his business, where he remained for seven years. While there, the style of goods for ladies' cloaks - bright scarlet made from cochineal - was introduced, and he, with a Mr. Maynard of Pittsfield, (who was in the same business) came into possession of the secret of making this beautiful color, and they became

renowned all over the country in this particular line of goods.

In 1803 the water power at Lenox Furnace was required wholly to supply the furnace, so Mr. Stearns sold out his right in the water privilege and other property there, and removed to Salisbury, Ct., where he located on the water power lately owned by the Washinee Co. The country being new and only partially cleared and settled, the family were nearly all afflicted with fever and ague and billious fever, and as a consequence they all became exceedingly homesick. Embracing the first opportunity, Mr. Stearns sold out, and purchased what was then known as the Valentine Rathbun cloth dressing and dyeing works, situated on the outlet of the Richmond Pond, called the "southwest branch of the Housatonic River," and the real estate is the same now owned and occupied by Messrs. J. Barker & Brothers. Here Mr. Stearns followed the business of dressing cloth in the fall and early winter, and dyeing linen and cotton yarn indigo blue in the spring and summer.

At this early day there was no machinery invented for carding wool, but it was all carded and made into rolls by hand, by what are known as hand cards, and many families not being able to card the wool for their own use, employed the cloth-dresser to do it for them, who made the same into rolls, when it was spun into yarn by the farmers' wives and daughters, on a hand spinning wheel, one thread at a time. The linen yarn was used for making stripes and checks for ladies' dresses, aprons, etc., and men's and boys' striped trousers," etc. The fabrics thus manufactured were not only serviceable, but were really beautiful, and are referred to, even in these days, by aged people, with a great deal of pride and pleasure.

Shoddy and flax were then used for fertilizing the land.

About the year 1808 or 1809, Mr. Arthur Scoldfield came to Pittsfield, from England, and brought drawings of a carding machine and also a spinning Jenny, and commenced the manufacture of the same for his own use, and for sale. His works were on the north branch of the Housatonic river just above the Iron Bridge, on West street, near the brewery of Gimlich & White, and the residence of J. H. Dunham, Esq., about one-eighth of a mile west of the new

passenger depot.

In 1810, Mr. Stearns bought of Mr. Scoldfield a spinning Jenny, containing twenty-four spindles. This machine was deemed a wonder, and was visited by all the neighborhood, who were astonished at this great improvement in labor saving machinery. In 1811, Mr. Stearns built what was then known as the "New Woolen Factory," which was a building 30 X 40, one story high and a basement. In 1812 he removed the spinning Jenny into this "new woolen factory," and the following year he bought of Mr. Scoldfield what was called a "double carding machine," for carding rolls for the farmers of the surrounding country. This excited about as much wonder and astonishment as the twenty-four spindle Jenny. In 1823, the Hancock Shaker society built what is known as the "Shaker mill dam," the second water fall on the stream, being about 26 feet, and the following year built the Shaker Mill. It was, a few years since, enlarged and improved, making it one of the best flouring and feed mills in this county.

In 1826, J. Stearns and Brothers (the firm being composed of four brothers, Jirah, Daniel, Henry and Charles T. - all sons of Daniel Stearns) built on the next fall of 22 feet, below the Shaker mill, a woolen mill 70 X 40, four stories and attic, put in two sets of machinery, and run it for many years on all wool broad cloths. They also built, in 1828, on an

eleven foot fall, below their new mill, a saw mill and finishing shop.

In 1832, J. Stearns & Bro's, having succeeded their father, sold the water power improved by him - being the original "Valentine Rathbun" property to Messrs. J. Barker & Bro's, who, a few years since, removed the original mill, and in its place erected a first class fancy cassimere mill of eight sets. The have also added, by purchase, a large amount of real estate in the vicinity, and it looks as though they are in a fair way to become possessed of all the real estate adjoining them.

In 1835 the junior partner in the firm of J. Stearns & Bro's, Charles T., withdrew, sold his interest to the other partners, removed to Michigan, and has since resided in Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Minnesota and Louisiana. He now lives in Mobile, Alabama, being under

appointment as land register for that state.

In 1843 the senior partner, Jirah Stearns, disposed of his interest to the remaining partners, removed to Graham, N.Y., and now resides at Newburgh-on-the-Hudson. The firm name was then changed to D. & H. Stearns.

In 1849, the new firm added two more sets of machinery to their establishment, and changed from all wool broadcloths to satinets and union cassimeres. This mill was operated by them until July 5th, 1861, when it was destroyed by fire. In 1853-4, D. & H. Stearns having purchased the water power below their works, consisting of about 28 feet fall, built and put in operation what constituted an eight set mill. It was operated by them for about eleven years, or until December, 1865, when they sold the same to J. Barker & Bro's, who have operated it ever since, making them (having 16 sets of woolen machinery) one of the largest private companies in Berkshire county.

In 1866 D. & H. Stearns sold the balance of their water power, about 33 feet fall, together with about 45 acres of land, upon which were 30 tenements, store, etc., to a stock company, organized under the title of the "Stearnsville Woolen Co.," who built and put in operation in 1866-67, upon the lower fall of 11 feet, a woolen mill of four sets, and in 1867-8 they built upon the upper fall of 22 feet, a mill 156 X 46, two stories, with an ell 60 X 40, three stories, and put it in partial operation in 1868, which was burned in December of the same year.

The ell was immediately rebuilt, but the main buildings were not, and they continued running the four set mill until 1872, when the woolen business not proving successful, they shut down. Some of the largest stockholders, living in Boston and New York,

got burned out in the great Boston fire, and being compelled to suspend and compromise with their creditors, their stock having to be sold, was bought by D. & H. Stearns, who also purchased the remaining stock of the other shareholders, the property was transferred to them, and the affairs of the Stearnsville Woolen Co. were wound up.

The next fall of about 8 feet below J. Barker & Bro's mill, bought of D. & H. Stearns, in 1865, is owned by Geo. W. Sprague, upon which he has a fine feed and grist mill, with four run of stone. Below the mill of Mr. S. is the fancy cassimere mill of Tillotson & Collins. They have a fall of 32 feet, but only require 14 feet of it to drive their 4 or 6 set of machinery.

The whole fall of the west branch of the Housatonic river, from the top of the reservoir dam at Richmond Pond, to still water, below Tillotson & Collins' mill, a distance of about two miles, is 154 feet.

### RICHMOND POND RESERVOIR

The improvements at this point were begun by J. Stearns & Bros., in 1836, who purchased of John L. Plummer the right to flow about 3 feet in depth an area of some 100 acres, Mr. Plummer to cut a new canal for the water discharge, for which the Messrs. Stearns paid him \$1,200. They afterwards expended some \$300 in repairs and improvements. In 1865, the Messrs. Stearns, together with the Barker Brothers, the trustees of the Shaker Society, and others interested, ascertained by surveys and levels, that the west branch of the Housatonic river afforded great advantages for a splendid reservoir at small expense, by raising the Richmond Pond nine feet above the former level, which would flow an area of over 300 acres. The reservoir was completed by the parties in interest, and has been of incalculable benefit to all the water privileges below.

This reservoir is supplied by some of the most noted springs and mountain streams, as pure as crystal, and hence it is the favorite breeding ground of the trout, which are caught in large numbers yearly, by lovers of this most healthful sport and exercise. This reservoir is at an altitude of 1000 feet above tide water, very clear and free from impurities, and furnishes ice

of a superior quality.

It has been ascertained from medical statistics that New England is not only the most healthful portion of the United States, but that Massachusetts is the healthiest state in New England, Berkshire the healthiest county in the commonwealth, Pittsfield the most healthful town in the county, and the physicians of Pittsfield have very naturally concluded that the southwestern part, including Stearnsville, Barkersville, a part of the Shaker Village and the Richmond Pond Reservoir, is the healthiest part of the town!!

# COLONEL JAMES GRAY

From a typescript found in Historical Sketch of the Congregational Church in Stockbridge, by David D. Field, 1853, in the Local History Department of the Berkshire Athenaeum. Labeled as a "Copy of a clipping loaned to B.C.S. by Miss Sarah Goodrich." Miss Goodrich's mother's name was Mary Gray, a descendant of James Gray. A footnote states "See also account in Williamstown Origins, pp.489-490."

A professional genealogist states that the first James Gray of this family was a weaver from the north of Ireland who married, about 1690, Mary, daughter of Grace Williams and

grand-daughter of Robert Williams, born in Norwich, England.

James Gray emigrated to this country and lived at Hadley. He had two sons: John, who lost his life in the French and Indian War, and James Gray, Jr., who was a Major in the French war and Colonel and Quartermaster in the Revolutionary Army. He married Sarah Spring, who died Oct. 26, 1809, and is buried in the Stockbridge Cemetery.

Col. Gray, who had moved to this town before the Revolution, died here Aug. 25,

1782, aged 49 years.

They had two daughters: Sarah, who married Thomas Hunt, died in 1788. She had two sons, John and James. Mary, born at Stockbridge, 1764, where she died in 1808. She married Barnabas Bidwell in 1794. Their children were: Sarah, born in 1796, died 1804, and Marshall Spring Bidwell, born in 1799 and died 1872 in New York where he had lived since 1838.

# **JOSIAH JONES**

Josiah Jones emigrated from Berkshire, England, in 1665, the period of the last dispersion of the Puritans. He settled in Weston.

Josiah Jones, his son, was born in 1700; married Anna Brown in 1724. Had 14 chil-

dren; died in 1769, aged 69.

Capt. Josiah Jones was born in Weston in 1725. He married Mabel Woodbridge, daughter of Joseph Woodbridge. Capt. Jones, as he was usually called, learned the Indian language and was long remembered by the Indians who spoke of him as "a good man always kind to Indians." They gave him the old conch shell which called them to worship and a beautiful belt of wampum. He died April 22, 1795, aged 70.

Deacon Josiah Jones died Feb. 10, 1834, aged 66.

Fidelia, his wife, died Sept. 20, 1859, aged 84.

Electa F. Jones died Nov. 24, 1853, aged 47 years. She was a daughter of Deacon Josiah Jones and wrote *The History of Stockbridge*.

Mrs. Fairchild was a daughter of Frances E. Jones and descendant of Deacon Josiah

Jones.

Sergeant house was built in 1740. The Jones house in the same year. When Fidelia died, her son Frederick lived there until he sold to D. D. Field about 1866, having lived there 50 years. He died in Horwah(?), Wis., aged 94, in Aug. 1910. at the house of his son Frederick. This homestead was ceded by Stockbridge Indians to his grandfather, Capt. Josiah Jones, who had the shell and wampum.



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# RECORDS OF THE CHURCH OF CHRIST IN STOCKBRIDGE

In Berkshire Genealogist, Volume 19, Number 4, Page 111, The Congregational Church in Stockbridge, Massachusetts, we presented a list of Church admissions from 1734 to 1853 which gave no indication as to where the member came from, or in the case of dismissals, where the person went to. We have recently discovered, deep in the vault of the Berkshire Athenaeum, a typescript titled Records of the Church of Christ in Stockbridge from June 1759 until August 1819 taken principally from manuscript left by Dr. Stephen West.

# THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF CHRIST IN NEW PROVIDENCE

From the William Bradford Browne Collection at the Berkshire Athenaeum.

Organized by the pioneers August 28, 1769, it was a daughter of the Communion founded by Roger Williams. It became the Mother Church of the Baptist denomination in western Massachusetts. A list of the names of the brethren and sisters that came from Coventry (Rhode Island).

The first meeting house was built about 1774 and stood in the neighboring cemetery. In 1794 the church had 194 members living within a radius of ten miles. This meeting house was abandoned in 1817 and in 1820 was removed to the Glebe Farm on this hill for a Ministerial house. The second Meeting House was dedicated January 1, 1818 and stood a few rods east of this spot. It fell into disuse about 1850.

Whereas the subscribers being desirous of retaining the services of the Reverend Samuel Bloss in the Gospel Ministry of the First Baptist Church and society in this town do promise to pay the sums set against our respective names annually to the Collector of the said Church and society for the support and maintenance of the Rev. Mr. Bloss so long as he shall continue to preach the Gospel to the said Church and society to our mutual acceptance as long as we live within said Society. Dated at Cheshire (New Providence) this 31st day of December 1821. Witness

### SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR WRITING QUERIES

- 1. Give the full name, including middle name or initial, of the person subject to enquiry.
- 2. Establish identity of the person by giving place and date of birth, place and date of death, parentage, place and date of marriage and identity of spouse to the extent these data are known, as:

John DOE b Hartford, CT 12 Jan 1900; d Fairfield, CT 19 Mar 1967 s/o Richard & Abigail (WESTON) DOE m Hartford 11 June 1923.

- 3. If unable to give a complete description of the person under enquiry, start with a son or daughter for whom more information might be available and ask for that person's ancestry.
- 4. Identify spouse in manner described in (2) above.
- 5. State what information is desired, as:
  Need ancestors of John and Abigail.
- 6. Place the question at the end of the query.
- 7. Do not abbreviate the names of persons or towns.
- 8. For any locale outside Massachusetts, be sure to identify the state.
- 9. Dates should be written: day, month, year as: 13 Oct 1743.
- 10. Use multiple queries rather than several parts to the same query.
- 11. Queries should not exceed four or five lines and should be submitted as an ASCII file on a diskette or E-mailed to bfha@berkshire.net marked as a query on the subject line. Printed or typed queries will also continue to be accepted.
- 12. Well-known abbreviations may be used but elaborate use of them is not required.
- 13. Address for reply should be stated on each card so that the Editor is not obliged to keep their envelope as well in order to have a complete record.
- 14. Acknowledge receipt of all replies and reimburse respondent for postage, and the cost of any material copied. One should not be left out of pocket for having answered a call for help. If the submitted material is of little use, that is the risk assumed in transactions by correspondence.
- 15. When requesting information, always include a SASE.
- 16. Help your query editor judge the effectiveness of this section. If you make a contact that provides significant help with your search, won't you let us know?
