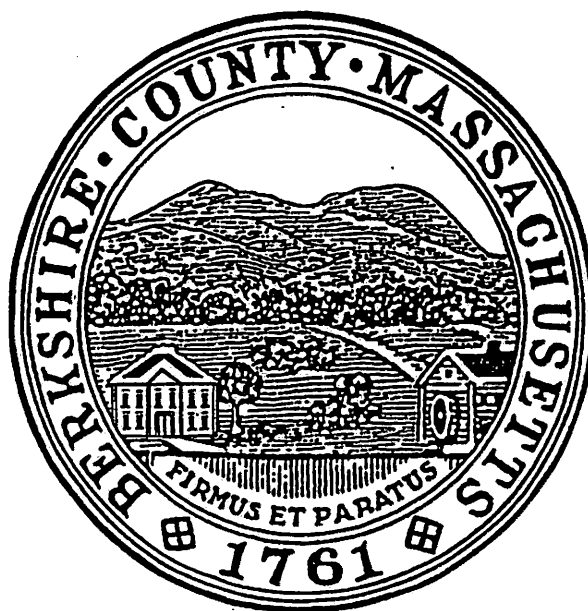

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A NOVEL WAY TO GET A MIDDLE NAME

Polly Reed Ford she was usually called. She was my gg-grandmother, but I knew virtually nothing about her. The little booklet *American Descendants of James Latta* compiled by Emmitt Girdell Latta (her grandson) gave the date of her marriage to Isaac Schultz Latta as Nov. 7, 1821 in Geneva, Ontario County, NY. Emmitt provided no other information about her - but then, genealogy at the turn of the last century was primarily concerned with the descent of the Y chromosome: the family name.

From census searches I knew that she was born about 1797 in either MA or PA. What I could not know is whether I was searching for Mary or Polly Reed, the widow of some Mr. Ford; or someone born as Mary (or Polly) Reed Ford. Many hours were spent trying to identify possible parents. Of course the most obvious path was to check out all of the marriages between Reed women and Ford men, thinking that her middle name might well be her mother's maiden name. Another path was to look for all the Ford men who disappeared from their home area in MA and PA between 1800 and 1820 and showed up in Ontario County, NY, thinking that her family probably moved and she with it. There were dozens of prospects, none of them right in every respect.

Polly had a son whom she named Josiah Reed Latta, so I was also on the look-out for Josiah Reeds, figuring that there probably was someone of that name in her ancestry. That proved to be another very common name.

A solitary lead appeared in an index of the *Geneva Gazette*, which carried a notice of the marriage of Mary Ford and Isaac Latta in the November 15 issue in 1820 (not 1821). My mission became to find that particular issue of the *Gazette*. The index was prepared by a man who was on the faculty or staff at the William Smith and Hobart Colleges in Geneva, NY. Letters to him and to the university had failed to get a response. Interlibrary loan of the microfilmed newspaper brought a roll of film which nominally covered the year 1820, but did not include the issue in question.

I reasoned that if the author knew to include the article in a recently prepared index, he must have seen a copy of the paper. I determined that the only way to see the actual newspaper was to go to Geneva. In the summer of 2000 on a genealogy expedition through NY, I visited Polly's grave in Friendship, NY, and found that her exact birthdate was given on the tombstone. (If only it would prove to be correct!) Now I would be looking for a Polly or Mary, Reed or Ford born on 8 Nov. 1797.

At the Geneva Historical Society I discovered that the paper for which I was searching was probably in their vaults, but the papers are very fragile and were not available to the everyday genealogist. At the Geneva Public Library I looked at the filmed *Geneva Gazette* and discovered that it too was missing the issue of interest. At the William Smith and Hobart Colleges library the same was true. All three were copies of the same filming.

At the University the archivist was helpful and interested in the search. We looked at the filing cards which had been prepared in order to compile the index. The card for the Latta/Ford marriage contained no new information. As a parting comment when we were leaving, the archivist asked whether we had been to the Reed Cemetery in town. We had not.

It was nearby and became our next stop.

The "cemetery" is now actually about a six-foot square of land, enclosed by a wrought iron chain, containing the remnants of the gravestones which were extant when the cemetery was "consolidated" to make room for other uses. It is very near to an Assembly of God Church and the pastor's home is adjacent. As we were looking at the stones, the pastor emerged to inquire about our interest in the Reeds. I had to admit that at this point I didn't know for whom I was looking, but the name Josiah Reed was of interest to me. He brought out a paper which contained all of the information legible on the stones when they had been moved. On the list was "Sibel," wife of Josiah Reed. Within the enclosure was a very tall foot stone, 3 to 4 feet high of the purest white marble, engraved with the initials SR. Sybil was the only person on the list with the initials SR, and I "adopted" the stone as being hers. I left Geneva feeling as if I had failed. I still didn't know anything about Polly Reed Ford.

The next week we were in Berkshire County, MA where my husband was participating in the Berkshire Choral Festival. One morning I drove into Great Barrington hoping to pick up my e-mail at the local library. In spite of information to the contrary, the library was not yet on the internet. I had a couple of hours until lunch, so I asked about their local history section, which turned out to be quite extensive. They had scores of volumes of the vital records of Massachusetts before 1850 - a set which contains one town per volume. Since one of the choices for Polly's birth was MA, I began reading. I looked at all of the towns from which I had other ancestors, but found nothing. The most convenient volumes to reach started with the M's, so I began there.

It was nearly time for lunch and I was only in the P's. The next volume was pretty small and bore the interesting name of Peru, so I checked one more book. There she was! Mary Ford, born 8 Nov. 1797 to Elisha Ford and his wife Sibbel. My reaction was incredulity and an upset stomach! After looking for so long, I somehow found it hard to accept that she had been sitting there in print in a book which I had probably passed in other libraries without opening. It seemed at that moment to be too easy, too clean. There was no indication that her middle name was Reed. The Elisha part made sense, as she named her first son Samuel Elisha Latta, one name from each grandfather.

Peru was formerly Partridgefield and is in Berkshire County, just "up the road" from Great Barrington. After returning to tell my husband what I had found, I was off for Peru to see the lay of the land. The fog and drizzle hid most of the territory from view and I will have to return again. The next day it was a hasty trip to the county clerk's office for a look at land and probate records. There I found a gold mine. Elisha died in 1799, leaving a will naming his wife Sibbel and only child Polly. It also named his three brothers Charles, John and Roswell and a sister Polly Lamphear, wife of Oliver. Elisha had died on a trip to Bozrah, CT, but the will was filed in MA. Many other documents were filed with the will and they included proof that before 1806 Polly's mother had married Josiah Reed!

After returning home I read the church records of Bozrah, CT, which gave baptisms for Elisha and his siblings (but no parents were listed in any baptisms of that period.) Elisha Ford and Sybil Hammond were married in Bozrah on 7 Jan. 1797. Other sources named Joseph Ford as the father of Charles, John and Roswell. A 9-volume set on the Ford family by Hannibal C. Ford cites the will of Joseph referring to his sons Charles, John and Roswell, Polly the daughter of his deceased son Elisha, and a daughter Mary Lamphear. In the Ford book Joseph is shown as the gg-grandson of William Ford, with the intimation that William came to Plymouth on the Fortune in 1623, son of "Widow Ford." Whether that proves true or not, William was there very early and his son Michael married Abigail Snow, the granddaughter of Richard Warren who was indeed on the Mayflower. One you get back to that period, you find you are related to just about everyone in the colony.

So now I had a picture of my great great grandmother... Born in the lovely Berkshires where her father and Uncle Charles had gone to settle the frontier, left fatherless at 2, she and her mother remained in Partridgefield at least until after the 1800 census. Charles remained and is noted in histories of the town. I do not yet know how or where Sybil met Josiah Reed, but I take it from censuses that he was a widower with young children, and Sybil married into a number of siblings for Polly and added more children with Josiah. Polly was an "only child" growing up in a large family. As an adult Polly probably did not remember her days in the Berkshires, for the Josiah Reed family lived in Ontario County, NY. Polly evidently had a good relationship with her stepfather, as she always used his name as her middle name and she named a son after him. It leads me to wonder why we have no Sybils in later generations - perhaps because no one could agree on how to spell it!

THE SEQUEL - A PAIR OF GRAVES

The year after I had discovered Polly Reed Ford's identity, we returned to the Berkshires and revisited Peru. This time I had some land information and a lot more specific items to look for. Polly's uncle Charles Ford had eleven children, the last eight of whom were born in Partridgefield or Peru, after the town's name was changed. Polly's nearest age mate would have been her cousin Harris, just six months her junior. I imagine that he was the preschool playmate of choice. They lived "next door" and Polly had no siblings of her own.

In reading cemetery records I had discovered that Harris and his sister Lora Visa had both died in 1831 and been buried on the Charles Ford homestead. If I were to locate their graves I could be sure of where the Ford homestead was located, so I set off one day to find them. From land records and a map it seemed that the Ford place was now owned by a Camp Danbee.

I paid a visit to the camp and asked to speak to the director, who kept me waiting a long time, while I observed with great dismay what has become of a week at camp. The music over the loudspeakers was dreadful. The campers were swimming at the lake, and I do believe the music was audible to a depth of ten feet! The director was not at all interested in previous owners of the land and certainly had no knowledge of any graves.

By a stroke of good luck, the young woman acting as receptionist in the office overheard some of the conversation and knew of a pair of headstones in the woods across the road. She passed them every day on the way to her dormitory. She was given permission to leave her post and take me to them. She was a delight. She had wondered about previous occupants of the land, had traced out former walls and fences. She took me to the graves, but she had never been up to really look at them. The inscriptions were on the face away from the trail and she had never seen the front side. They were incredibly clear and easy to read. When I told her that Lora Visa was a twin whose sister's name was Laura Disa, I think that pushed her credulity past its limit, but she remained cordial and friendly.

She took me to the foundation of a small house in the area which I had identified as Elisha's land. The front steps were still discernible and some of the fencing walls could be followed. We sat on the stoop and spoke of the little family who had probably lived here. I told her the story of Charles Ford's move to the area from New London, Connecticut. He walked, as did his livestock. The story goes that a pig was very footsore and Charles, having cobbler tools and supplies at hand, made the pig a set of shoes, which the animal wore the rest of the way. PITTSFIELD INDENTURES OF APPRENTICES, 1781-1807

From Town of Pittsfield Original Papers, Box 3, File XIV, Folders 1-17, Berkshire Athenaeum.

1781-1807

1. May 13, 1781. Indenture of Ann Briton, a poor child, as a servant maid to Woodbridge Little, of Pittsfield.
2. December 8, 1784. Indenture of Zebulon Reed, of the age of seven years, apprentice to John Partridge.
3. October 22, 1785. Indenture of Tryphena Reed, a poor girl, age five years and two months, to Nehemiah Bull.
4. November 5, 1785. Indenture of Lucy Leonard, a minor and poor child, daughter of Widow Leonard and Daniel Leonard, late of Pittsfield...to William Williams and Dorothy Williams.
5. November 25, 1785. Indenture of Jonathan Blakesley, a poor child, to Justin Clark of Southampton, [MA].
6. September 7, 1789. Indenture of David Janes to James Hubbard.
7. December 22, 1789. Indenture of Oliver Janes to John Snow, blacksmith, approved February 23, 1790. William Williams and Eli Root, Justices of the Peace.
8. December 9, 1790. Indenture of James Buckway, son of Peter Buckway of Pittsfield, to Francis Plummer of Richmond, as an apprentice to learn the "art, trade, and mystery of husbandry..."
9. July 6, 1791. Indenture of Cyrene Gillet, a poor child, as a servant maid, to David Bush, Jr. for seven years.
10. October 15, 1792. Indenture of Pender Negro, a poor black child, daughter of Hagar a Negro woman of Pittsfield, to Hannah Williams (Reverse - 2nd side: "Indenture of Peter Bailey to Mrs. Williams" - but Peter Bailey not named in text. See also Pender Negro's indenture of May 2, 1796, below.)
11. February 28, 1795. Indenture of Harvey Williamson, son of Mrs. Williamson, lately of said Pittsfield, to Andrus Hunter of Canaan, New York, to learn the "art and occupation of a farmer and tiller of the earth..." as an apprentice.
12. May 2, 1796 to March 27, 1803. Indenture of Pender Negro, a poor black child, daughter of Hagar, a Negro woman, to Calvin Waldo, as an apprentice "to learn the art housekeeping and spinning..." (Reverse: "1796 Indenture of Pender Bailey to Mr. Waldo")
13. December 10, 1799. Indenture of Ruth Stiles to James Hammon, his wife and heirs, as an apprentice.
14. December 10 & 23, 1799. Indenture of Sophia Hale, daughter of Joseph Hale, late of Pittsfield deceased, to Thomas Steel Jr. and wife of Lenox, to learn "the art, trade and mystery of housekeeping..." as an apprentice.

1800-1807

1. February 11, 1800. Indenture of Moses Feathergill, son of Joseph Feathergill, as an apprentice to John Fairfield to learn the "art, trade, and mystery of husbandry..."
2. February 11, 1800 (1798). Indenture of Lucy Rathbun, daughter of Daniel Rathbun, now a resident somewhere in Vermont, to John Wright of Pittsfield, yeoman. (See below for this indenture, offered as a sample.)
3. February 11, 1800 and June 9, 1802. Indenture of Anson Fields, son of James Fields, late of Pittsfield, laborer, as an apprentice to Robbart Stanton...to learn husbandry.
4. February 20, 1800. Indenture of Frederick Augustus Hale to Peter Strong of Chesterfield, Hampshire Co., his wife and heirs, as an apprentice.
5. July 28, 1800. Indenture of Ester Smith to Lemuel Pomeroy, his wife and heirs as an

- apprentice "to be taught to sew and spin, and all other branches of good housewifry."
6. August 5, 1800. Indenture of Philander Kane to Reuben Rathbun, his wife and heirs, as an apprentice in the cooper's trade, and to learn to read, write, and cypher.
 7. April 18, 1801. Indenture of William Rhimes to Lemuel Pomeroy, his wife and heirs, as an apprentice in the blacksmith's trade.
 8. April 5, 1802. Indenture of Jacob Buckway, his parents being dead, to Nathaniel Fairfield, Jr. as an apprentice in farming, and to be taught to read, write, and cypher.
 9. April 21, 1802. Indenture of Joshua Robbins Hays to Elisha Brewster of Worthington, with full consent of his mother Betsy Hays; to be schooled and taught farming.
 10. June 14, 1802. Indenture of Anson Fields to Sylvester Robbins, to be schooled and taught farming.
 11. June 26, 1802. Indenture of Sophia Taylor to Jabaz Loomis of Verona, Oneida Co., New York as an apprentice, and to learn reading, writing, cyphering, and housewifery.
 12. September 7, 1802. Indenture of James Goodrich to Andrew Kenedy, as an apprentice to be taught the shoemaker's or cordwainer's trade.
 13. April 13, 1804. Indenture of Mary Nogard to George Butler of Pittsfield, as an apprentice to be taught to read and write, and learn good housewifery.
 14. January 1, 1805. Indenture of Philip Suil/Suill [Sewell?] to Oliver Belding of Lenox, as an apprentice, to be taught reading, writing, cyphering, and farming and good husbandry.
 15. March 3, 1807. Indenture of John Breck to David Dewey of Hancock, the apprentice to be taught to read, write and cypher and the art and mysteries of husbandry.
 16. April 23, 1807. Indenture of William Bates to David Campbell, as an apprentice, to be taught to read, write, and cypher as far as the Rule of three...and to teach husbandry.
 17. October 17, 1807. Indenture of Franklin Taylor to Elias Naramore of Unadilla, New York, as an apprentice in husbandry.

INDENTURE OF LUCY RATHBUN TO JOHN WRIGHT
[Presented as a sample document.]

This Indenture. Witnesseth that Eli Root Simon Larned Oliver Root Joseph Fairfield Jr. Timothy Childs

Select Men of the town of Pittsfield in the county of Berkshire & Overseers of the Poor of the said town, of course (There being no Overseers of the Poor, especially chosen by virtue of the Law of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in such cases made & provided & with the assent of two of the Justices of the Peace for the said county have placed and by there presents so place & bind out Lucy Rathbun, a poor child, daughter of Daniel Rathbun now resident some where in the State of Vermont & who is unable or neglects to support & maintain her, unto John Wright of Pittsfield aforesaid Yeoman to learn & he to instruct in the occupation, business & employment offering riting, sowing, housekeeping with such other matters usually taught other females in her condition & if convenient he is to learn her to weave and she is to dwell with & serve the said John from the day of the date hereof until the eleventh day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and six at which time if the said Lucy should be living she will be eighteen years of age during all which time or term the said Lucy, well & faithfully shall serve the said John, his secrets kept and his lawful command everywhere readily obey. She shall do no damage to the said John nor willingly suffer any to be done by others, and if any to her knowledge be intended she shall give him reasonable notice thereof. She shall not waste the goods of the said John nor lend them to any without licence; of cards, many unlawful games she shall not play, fornication she shall not commit nor matrimoney contract during the said term, licentious & disorderly places she shall not frequent, from the service of the said John she shall not absent herself without licence but in all things and at all times she shall carry & behave herself in a decent, honest & becoming manner and the said John on his part doth promise and agree to teach & instruct, or cause her to be

taught & instructed in the business of housekeeping & such other matters as are before mentioned, in the best way & means that he can; and also to teach or cause her to be taught and instructed in the knowledge of reading, writing & cypering so far as proper for one in her condition or usually practiced & required at the present period, provided the said Lucy should be capable of learning, and shall well & truly find & provide for her good & sufficient meat, drink, lodging, cloathing & other necessities fit & convenient for one in her condition both in health & sickness, during the said term of service & in all things treat her with humanity & kindness; at the expiration of the said term the said John shall provide & give the said Lucy, two substantial suits of wearing apparel, compleat throughout, one suitable for Lord's Day & the other for working days. Also if she behaves well during the said term the said John shall at the expiration thereof give her one good featherbed or in lieu thereof, one good cow.

In testimony whereof, the parties aforesaid have hereunto interchangably set their hands & seals this _____ Day of February AD 1800

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GREYLOCK INSTITUTE - A FAMILY SCHOOL FOR BOYS

From the Vault Pamphlet File at the Berkshire Athenaeum.

This South Williamstown school was established by Benjamin F. Mills in 1842. The design of the Institute was to combine the advantages of a school of a high order with the influences of a refined home. Teachers and pupils were members of the Principal's household, and associated together, not only in the work of the school, but also in the social enjoyments of the family life. The pupils were thus brought under the influence of cultivated gentlemen, who exercise careful supervision over the physical needs, the intellectual growth, and the moral culture of those committed to their care. Charges for students under 14 were \$75.00 per term (half year) for English; \$12.50 extra for higher branches of English science and the classics. For those over 14 the charge was \$80.00, which included board, washing, mending, use of library, lights, fuel, bed, bedding and tuition. Readers may note that there are a few decidedly female names included. We assume that they were local day students, perhaps daughters of staff. Unless otherwise indicated, home towns are in Massachusetts.

THE "FIGHTING PARSON" vs. THE SHAKERS

Elder Valentine Rathbun introduced the Baptist faith to Pittsfield, and in 1772 he and several neighbors formed a society of Baptists. This small group flourished for a while until Mother Ann Lee, the Shaker prophetess, set out from Watervliet, New York on a proselyting tour which drew thousands from neighboring New York towns and Massachusetts to listen to her novel doctrines. Elder Rathbun soon became carried away by the contagious enthusiasm and converted to the Shaker faith. However he soon found the practices of his new association unsatisfactory, and hastened to renounce his connection with them, even publishing a book opposing their creed and denouncing their practices.

Elder Rathbun then went even further; in the March meeting of 1781 he moved and carried a resolution appointing a committee to devise "some measures to take with those people known as Shakers," who, it seems, in his opinion, were exceeding the bounds of even Baptist toleration. The committee consisted of Rev. Thomas Allen (called "The Fighting Parson" as a result of his participation in the Battle of Bennington), Elder Rathbun, Elnathan Phelps, Eli Root and Woodbridge Little. At the next meeting the following report, prepared by Mr. Allen, was submitted and adopted.¹

The Committee, appointed on Mr. Rathbun's Motion respecting those People in the Town who are known by the name of Shakers, beg leave to report,

That they have attended to the object of their Commission so far as they imagined in Duty & Prudence they ought, and that they have Reason to apprehend that those People called Shakers are in many Instances irregular, and disorderly in their Conduct and Conversation, if not guilty of some high Crimes and Misdemeanors - The Committee therefore recommend it to the Town to Direct their Select Men to take such cognizance and Care of all disorderly and idle persons in the Town and of their Families as in Prudence and by Law they may and ought - and further that the Town give particular Instructions to their respective grand Jurors to be chosen for the next Courts to enquire into all the Conduct and Practices of said People which are contrary to Law and make due Presentment thereof particularly all Blasphemies, Adulteries, Fornication, Breaches of Sabbath and all other Breaches of Law which they may have been guilty of, and that all Tything Men and other persons use their best Endeavour according to Law to suppress all Disorders and Breaches of the Peace of every kind.

And also that the Town direct their Town Clerk to inform the Commissioners or other proper Authority in the County of Albany That great and manifest inconveniences and Dangers arise from the Correspondence and Intercourse subsisting between the People of Niskeuna called Shakers and some People of this Town and County disposed to embrace their erroneous Opinions and that they be requested to cooperate with us in endeavouring to prevent such Intercourse and Correspondence and by all possible Ways & Means.

Pittsfield April 2nd 1781 Thomas Allen per order of the Committee²

Mr. Rathbun did not succeed in leading back to the Baptist fold all who, with him, had wandered from it: some even of his own kinsmen adhering firmly to the Shaker faith; but he recovered, in a great degree, the confidence of community and of his co-religionists. He resumed his pastorate and the church which, after his return to it, continued for seventeen years under the charge of its founder, was not unprosperous for the greater portion of that time, although doubtless weakened by the unfortunate lapse of 1780.³

From the Town of Pittsfield Original Papers, XIII A#3, Berkshire Athenaeum

COMMONWEALTH of MASSACHUSETTS.

By His EXCELLENCY

JOHN HANCOCK, Esquire,

Governor of the Commonwealth of MASSACHUSETTS.

Proclamation.

Whereas an unhappy dispute has subsisted between some of the citizens of the State of New York, and the people inhabiting the territory called the New Hampshire Grants, or State of Vermont; and it being probable from the present disposition of the parties, that the same controversy may be recommenced, to the great distress and calamity of all concerned therein; and there being great reason to fear that some of the citizens of this Commonwealth, who live on the borders of the said State of Vermont, may, by incautiously intermeddling with the contention, involve themselves and families in that distress which is at all times the consequence of civil dissensions, unless care is taken to prevent it:

I HAVE THEREFORE, at the request of the General Court, thought fit to issue this Proclamation, commanding and enjoining it upon all the citizens of this Commonwealth, that in all and every controversy now existing, or that may hereafter exist between the citizens of New York, and the people inhabiting the said State, or between any of them, in whatever former manner the same may exist, they, the citizens of this Commonwealth, conduct themselves according to the strictest rules of NEUTRALITY; and that they give no aid or assistance to either party: but that those who live on the borders of said State, and within this Commonwealth, sell to each party, indifferently, such things as they have to sell, without giving preference to either: that they send no provisions, arms, ammunition, or necessaries to a fortress, or garrison, besieged by either party. And all the citizens and inhabitants of this Commonwealth are absolutely and most solemnly forbidden to take arms in support of, or engaging in the service, or contributing to the conquest, success, or defence of either of the said parties, as they will answer it at their peril.

Given under my hand and the public seal of this Commonwealth, at Boston this twenty-sixth day of March, in the year of our Lord, one thousand, seven hundred and eighty four, and in the eighth year of the Independence of the United States of America.

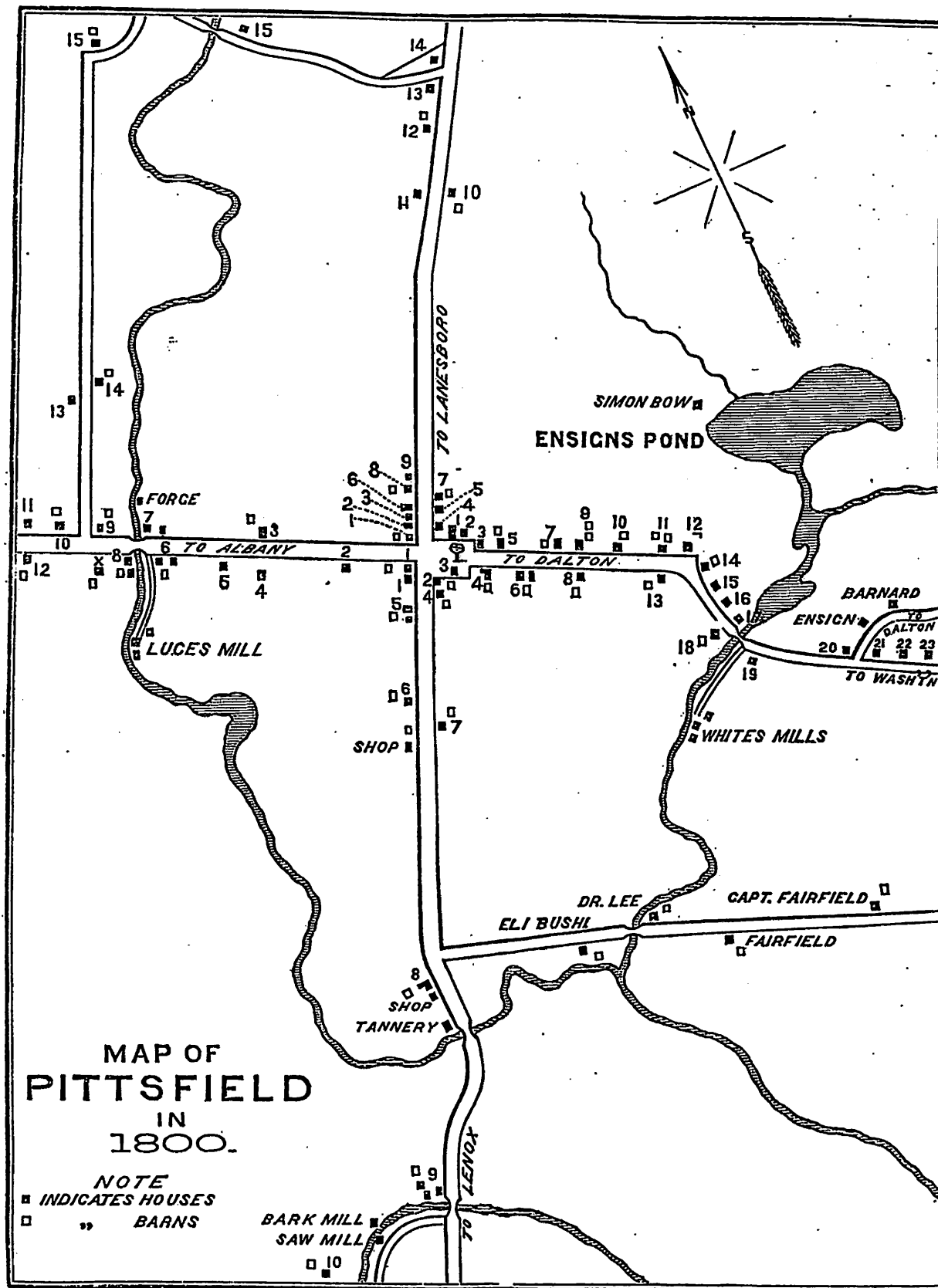
