OLD HOUSES OF SOUTH STREET, PITTSFIELD

By Fanny Elizabeth Colt, 1926

The old houses of South Street are so rapidly disappearing before the march of modern improvements that it has been deemed of sufficient interest to jot down these fragmentary memories of old acquaintances and friends for the pleasure of those now living and perhaps for the amusement of those who are to come after us - who may scarcely refrain from smiling at the quaintness and simplicity of life on our street in earlier days. There was an air of substantial comfort and stately dignity about these old homes that will not be effaced from the memories of those who, as children, had the happiness to sit around the open fires or to gather fruits and flowers in fields and orchards now built over by solid blocks of shops and apartment (so-called homes) and garages and filling stations.

"I feel like one who treads alone Some banquet hall deserted, Whose lights are fled, whose garlands dead And all but he departed."

I will try to bring before us the buildings and houses of the west side of the street as I remember them and as I have been told by my father. The United States Hotel on the corner of West Street -- 'tho not so interesting historically as the Old Berkshire on the opposite corner, seemed to me more stylish. We entered over a flight of stone steps with iron balustrades ending in brass balls. The drug store of Charles D. Willis was a popular resort, where we purchased ju-ju paste drops and Kibbes candies in red, white and blue packages -- price six cents. The Sperry millinery establishment (we called Mr. S. the "man milliner.") rather new for those days. One of his daughters now living in Pittsfield, the venerable Mrs. James Burbank, a prominent member of the Methodist church. Comfort Platt's hat and fur store. Fenn & Carter's carpet emporium, later the Pittsfield National banking rooms and now Chamberlain's. On this spot stood the store of James D. and S. D. Colt, still standing on West Housatonic Street, just southwest of the filling station. James D.'s house was south of the store and was built by my grandfather about 1790, and he lived here for several years. Because of business reverses, following the failure of the Old Berkshire bank, he was obliged to give up his home and sold it to his half-brother, Samuel D. Colt. It is now the home of Elizabeth Campbell and Mrs. Van Norden. There have been other occupants. I recall the rector of St. Stephens, Mr. Bowdoin, who died during his ministry. His family sold it to Mr. George W. Campbell. Here he always lived with his wife, Harriet Atwater, whom we all hold in loving remembrance.

Next south still stands the fine old house built in 1792 by Ashbel Strong, known as "Old Ashbel Strong." My father once asked my grandmother how old was "Old Ashbel Strong," she replied, "Let me see, I think he was 59 when he died." My early remembrance of this house was of Cashier J. D. Adams and his wife, Ellen Catlin (a school friend of Miss Mary Colt.) Mr. Adams remodeled the interior and to my eyes it was very grand indeed. The red velvet paper on the north parlor has only recently been removed. It was purchased later by Mr. George Campbell in 1862, known as "Little George." The Campbells moved from Pontoosuc, a delightful family -- the eldest daughter, Nannie, married in Pontoosuc to Mr. William J. Harding -- Abbie, Grace, Jessie, Mary and David. Grace, Mrs. William Swift was married here.

During Mr. Todd's prayer the lights suddenly went out, the minister continued; "Of course," said a bright woman, "The Doctor would keep on praying until he found light." William Plunkett descended to the lower regions and soon supplied gas. Jessie Campbell married here to John K. West.

Another member of this household was the genial bachelor, David, known as "King Campbell" who always greeted you with "Good morning, how've you been." It was he who erected that marvelous brown-stone lamp post, with bright red and blue sides, prompting Robert Pomeroy on beholding the unusual brilliance, to drive furiously down South Street crying, "Fire, fire!"

King used to bestow diamond rings upon his nieces and friends. Mine is now the property of my grandniece, Mary Alice. We will never forget Miss Nellie Briggs and her interesting paying guests in this old home. The house was rented one summer to Mrs. Ogden of Chicago, and because of this fortunate transaction, we are now being entertained by Fred and Annie West. Don't we remember Annie Ogden and her dog cart? Quite a whip she was.

Next came the South Church, with its graceful spire which twice fell before our fierce west winds.

Then we recall the First Church parsonage, the home of Dr. John Todd and his large family, afterwards occupied by our pastors, Bartlett, Jenkins and Davis. Anna Todd and Dr. Paddock were married while living here. A church wedding on a fearfully rainy evening. Anna forgot to remove her rubbers in the vestibule and was married in them.

Next door, now Miss O'Herron's antique shop, and the Open Book, lived for a time Judge James D. Colt, and his wife, Elizabeth Gilbert; and here, Bessie Watson was born. Dr. Charles D. Mills and the Bassetts, also. And here occurred the tragic death of Mr. Frank Kernochan.

The Thomas Strong house came next. Mr. Benjamin Chickering lived here and later it was the home of Dr. Wentworth, now the Economy Store, Chinese Laundry and gasoline station.

On the corner of South and West Housatonic Streets, stood a comfortable old house built by Mr. James Buell, the grandfather of Kate Brown. One day he discovered his cellar windows were broken, and meeting my father -- a small boy, said, "Henry Colt why did you break my windows?" Henry with great honesty stammered, "Because I wanted to hear them rattle."

Nathaniel Messer and Albert Learned lived here, and for a short exciting period, the bachelors, Frank Hinsdale, William Tillotson and William Hall. Later Mr. Charles West, the father of Mrs. Frank Backus. It remained in their family until sold to Mr. William Butler, who built the present business block.

On the south corner stood a small house, once occupied by James Dunham, and a

rector of St. Stephens, Mr. Stuart, an Englishman and his charming mother. She used to bring calves-foot jelly to my young brother, Henry, in his illness. Perhaps the Oakey boys are recalled on this corner, the favorite gathering place for all the boys of the neighborhood. "Can I go up to the corner?" was the daily request, especially after supper. Dr. Edward Strong built upon this site, his large mansard-roofed house. Beyond here was the Dillingham place. Mr. Charles Dillingham conducted a school for young boys in 1826 in the house now known as "Mohawk Inn," which was originally built by John Dickinson, the grandfather of Elizabeth Axtell and Emma Carter. Mr. D. died in 1834 and was succeeded by Mr. Robert Chapman, who married the Widow D. a deaf mute. At the wedding she appeared, dressed in deep mourning, veil, etc. For the surprised guests, she wrote "Mr. C. said I might wear it for my dear Charles." Maria Dillingham, her daughter, was one of the three belles of Pittsfield known as the three Graces, very beautiful and vivacious. Mr. Ezekiel Colt was her guardian and she was married from his home to Mr. Bakewell of Louisville. Her granddaughter, within a few years, married Harris Washburn, son of Margaret Pomeroy Washburn, interesting in uniting two old Pittsfield families.

Later Mr. Nash conducted a boys' school; then Mrs. Mary Lee, mother of Mrs. Maitland, a girls' boarding school, and as we know, Mrs. Salisbury and our distinguished and successful educator, Mira Hall. Mr. Gilbert West erected his home on the Dillingham property, where he lived to a good old age; and it was until very recently, occupied by his son, Harry West.

Below Mr. Samuel Cooley's house. Then my grandfather's house, which was moved from the site of Ezekiel Colt's mansion. This house was again moved to lower East Street, and the land having been purchased by Mr. D. M. Collins, he build a fine house which was later owned by Mr. Frank Hinsdale and Mr. Tillotson and Mrs. J. M. Stevenson, now the Brewer garage.

My parents lived here for a time after their marriage in 1839, and here my brother Tom was born.

Beyond, south and to the west, open field and orchard — farm barns in the rear. Later the Henry Pierson house was built, then the Fenn & Carter, the first double house in Pittsfield. Next to this, the lane where our cows were driven home from Pasture, now Henry Avenue.

Below was the orchard, now C. C. Gamwell's and previously Dr. Mills' and S.

W. Bowerman.

We now come to the Brown homestead, built by a Mr. Ward, who was engaged to Mary (Polly) Campbell, later the first Mrs. Calvin Martin. Mr. Ward died before the completion of the house and it was sold to Major Henry C. Brown, father of Miss Helen. This house was later sold to George Brown and charming Abby Buell, the parents of the present owner, Miss Kate.

Open fields from here to the Redfield's. No Buell or George Streets then. In the rear of the Brown lot stood a cluster of evergreen trees, which we children called the "bower" and where we spent many happy hours. It

was our Country Club.

The so-called Redfield house was built by Dr. Timothy Childs, known as "Young Tim." His widow sold it to Albert Learned and he to Mr. Charles Redfield, an Albany business man. It was always a most hospitable, friendly home, and until very recently occupied by the family. Do we not recall the Redfield's white horses driven by William Haskall and the barouche open shay, Mrs. R. and Julia driving out to pay afternoon calls, Mrs. R. with her sables and Julia in her ermine?

Mrs. Abby Neill was married here and here was the wedding reception of Caroline and William Adam. They had a church wedding and I gasp when I remember that for once a Redfield was a little behind time. We shall always speak of "The Redfields" forgetting its present sanctity.

Next came the Martin and Colt cow pastures to the Deacon Taylor home, once the Hollister place, where Mrs. Kellogg and Mrs. Brown used to play with Mary (?)

Hollister.

Deacon Taylor, a good Christian, belonging to the South Church, "fervent in spirit serving the Lord," quite emotional and in prayer with tears coursing down his cheeks would invariably pray, "Oh Lord doubtless thou art our Father, though Abraham be ignorant of us and Israel acknowledge us

not."

His granddaughter, Miss Isabel Dunham, now owns and occupies the fine old house.

Then came the Housatonic River, where we will re-embark for the east side of South Street.

1. Backus Block -- tin shop and stoves. Outside stairs where we used to sit and watch the circus parades and which led to the millinery emporium of Electa Smith. A bell tinkled as you opened the door and Electa emerged from the rear, where she had been steaming velvet or restoring crepe. Brown calico below the high counter concealing boxes. The latest styles were here displayed and you could always depend on having your hat Saturday night in time for Sunday.

2. The fine old brown house where had lived Mr. & Mrs. Center, connections to the Pepoons, Pomeroys, Buells and Jenkins, a boarding house; and Judge Rockwell board there when a young man. From here the beautiful Mary Jenkins eloped with Robert Pomeroy on a cold winter's morning. In later years occupied by various tenants and within a few years removed and the ground

taken for the Museum.

3. Mr. Calvin Martin's house and law office, afterwards the woman's exchange and Drs. Bailey and Wentworth office.

4. Then Miss Clara Wells' female seminary, responsible for the education of Cousin Lizzie and possibly for her matrimonial alliance, since next door lived the interesting bachelor, James D. Colt -- Now the Berkshire Home for Aged Women.

5. Of Uncle Ezekiel's and Aunt Electra's home, what can I say more than we all know and love to remember -- dignified, hospitable, charming; always a warm welcome and a seat before the open fire. In the north parlor in the winter, the glowing coal; cool summer days and autumn, the wood fire in the south room. Lemonade, cookies and cider Sunday

nights. Cocktails not in vogue.

Thanksgiving dinner with extra tables for the small folks, and Harriet Jones, the serious colored woman to serve us. Cousin Mary's pies and Cousin Kate's Trifle, and Cousin Electa's late pears, cherished for this occasion. Cousin Mary made 22 one year and carefully placed them in the southwest room, when Tom Colt crept slyly in and filched a very choice one. I remember Uncle Ezekiel,

who always asked me, "Fanny, how do you spell Lake W." striking terror to my soul.

Cousin Kate's wedding to Thomas Pingree of Salem, with the piazza enclosed in evergreens, Minnie Cady and I -- youngest guests. Cousin Mary and William Plunkett, bridesmaid and groomsman -- Cousin Mary in very modest decollette gown. This home was famous for its hospitality. It was first opened for a social occasion, when Henry Clay honored Pittsfield in 1825 and was tendered a reception here. We are grateful, that for several years we were welcomed to this unusual home, presided over by the beautiful and gracious granddaughter, whom we call "Kitty." I am sure no one who was present can ever forget the beautiful Christmas party given by Katherine Dawes -- the old house with its garlands of green -- the tree with real candles; Mr. Buhler's Christmas music; Bob Hibbard as Santa Claus with his pack of gifts; the generous supper with egg-nog; and best of all Kitty's reading, "Milton's Ode to the Nativity." Carols were sung outside the window. It was a joyous occasion for old and young were invited and all accepted. Now Odd-Fellows hall and motor salesroom.

Next door lived old Mrs. Clark, later the Bissells and the complex household of Talcott and Macy — now the Colonial Theatre.

Next Mr. John C. Parker and Mr. Chauncey Goodrich. Then came the Wileys. Mrs. Wiley with spectacles and corkscrew curls, and four daughters, who played the melodian and sang hymns Sunday afternoons. This is now the home of Mrs. Charles E. West. Dr. Abner Smith occupied the house below. Mrs. S. was fond of flowers and had night blooming cereus parties, the fragrance of which feebly disguised the odor from the pig-sty in the rear. This is now the Christian Science Church.

Next, Captain Amos Barnes, a cabinet maker, whose shop was in the old brick block on West Street. Mr. John Brown lived here, and later Mr. William Stevenson and Mr. William Backus, -- now Mrs. Mason's gift shop.

Next, William Cooper Wells, whom we children used to call "Cooper-Ding-Dong," afterward the home of William and Abby Colley. At present, I believe, a rooming house.

On the opposite corner stood the fine old house build by Major MacKay; later it became the home of Thomas F. Plunkett and was the birthplace of our esteemed Harriet Plunkett. If became the property of Mr. & Mrs. John C. West. The beautiful elmshaded lawn was a perpetual joy; it had a spacious hall and fine stairway, and it is to be regretted that it was moved to the rear of the present South Street Inn. Mr. John and Mr. Gilbert West were devoted brothers and business associates, living opposite each other. They wore tall silk hats, except during the summer, when they discarded them for straw -- not new every season as the manner of some is. They always walked home from the store together at night, pausing in front of J. C.'s home for a parting word. It was a sad evening for us on South Street when Brother Gilbert returned alone. We love to remember Mrs. John West, sitting on the north piazza in white cap and shawl and her welcoming smile.

Below the Wests stood a small white house where lived our family physician, Dr. Oliver Root, and his daughter, Love, who married Dr. Palmer of the University of Ann Arbor. Dr. Root married late in life, a young German woman, a governess in the Emerson family. I hated the Doctor, who used to call me John, because I played with the boys and walked fences. Later Theodore Bartlett and sister lived here with Deacon Daniel Stearns. Dr. Withington now doing valiant work in the Kentucky mountains. The Wollison family — and now a garage.

On May 8, 1791, before the afternoon sermon in the little brown meeting house under the elm, James D. Colt, son of James D. Colt, 1st, was married by Reverend Thomas Allen to Sarah, daughter of Ezekiel Root, one of the first settlers of Pittsfield, and in accordance with the custom, the marriage festivities were continued through three days, commencing in the house of the bride's father in the village and terminating in feasting and joy at the homestead on the hill between Stearnsville and the Shaker village. The guests accompanied the wedding pair all on horseback in a happy cavalcade. Their married life thus auspiciously commenced, continued for sixty-five years, until the death of Mr. Colt at the age of eighty-eight years, without abatement of the love and respect they bore each other.

Mrs. Colt died at the homestead April 8, 1865, at the age of ninety-four, being the oldest person in town. She was of an age to remember such early scenes of the War of Independence, as the battle of Lexington and Bunker Hill. She especially remembered Burgoyne's army on their way to Boston, as their camp fires lined each side of South Street. She was wont to describe with great vividness the scenes at the Peace Party at the John Chandler Williams house, upon which she looked with admiring eyes at ten years of age.

Next came Dr. Henry Child's house with ample grounds, the garden extending to our line and the apple orchard to Wendell Avenue. There was a long back piazza where the Dr. used to walk in the morning and indulge in loud sneezing. There were large barns in the rear and perhaps some may recall the wonderful double sleigh which carried the family to church in the winter and the commodious carriage in summer. While Henry Merwin, the grandson, delighted to drive the horses. The house was very charming. A long south parlor, with wide fireplace. Dr. Child's daughter and her family came every summer from Boston and Kate Merwin was my contemporary. She was very handsome and dressed every afternoon which I thought very grand indeed and envied her, her fine city garments.

The Childs were considered very aristocratic (with reason) but I heard my grandmother say, with a chuckle "Mrs. C. always borrowed my cut glass bowl for company." On one occasion Mrs. C.'s granddaughter came to invite the family to a supper party saying "She hopes you can come, for she wants the fuss over." (Note - my father was born in the Child's house in 1812.) This property was purchased after Dr. Child's death by Mr. Edward Learned, who opened Taconic Street and sold building lots to Mr. John Wolfe and Dr. Bailey, and later a house was built by Miss Eliz. Lewis, and is now owned by Miss Farrell, our neighbor on the north. The Childs house was moved to Learned's Lane and used as a tenement again moved to Bartlett Avenue and became the home of Walter Hawkins, and now is owned by Mr. Crafts of the Gas Co.

The next house on the street was the home of my father and his wife Eliz. Bacon. They "moved in" in 1843. Here they lived a life of happiness for nearly 50 years. Our brother Frank was born here, and the celebrated Dr. Colt and his somewhat garrulous sister and last but by no means least, Frances; enough to make any house famous.

It may be of interest to note that our great grandfather Ezekiel Root owned and occupied this property.

For years there was nothing between us and Broad Street, then Lucy P. Clapp built on the corner, a house for her son and his wife Mary Stuart Robinson. Here Stuart Clapp was born.

Later Mrs. Foxcroft purchased land and erected the house south of us afterwards owned by DeWitt Bruce and now by Charles Genovese, the Italian banker. South of Broad Street the old "Coffee House" - the former Campbell Tavern moved down from Park Square and used as a summer boarding house by Mr. & Mrs. Hubbard, the grandparents of Arthur Wood - and later by Mrs. Backus. There were always agreeable and distinguished guests - The Henry G. Marquands family, the Wards, Mrs. Dr. Smith of N. Y. and the superb Miss Sutton, Mrs. Ellen Thayer Fisher, the artist and her brother Abbott Thayer, the three Miss Clinches(?) and General Greely and family - at one time the well known playwright Clyde Fitch adorned it.

Beyond the open fields to the Berkshire Medical College famous in its day - It was burned and the High School replaced it. At present the site is graced by the Soldiers' and Sailors' War Memorial, dedicated July 8, 1926.

Just over the hill was the home of Joel Monthrop(?), a spinner in the Pomeroy mill and our first market gardener. What luscious asparagus he raised! At the foot of the hill the home of Deacon Crofut, one of the Foundation Men of our church - Later the home of Jarvis N. Dunham and now owned by his heirs.

Then the Housatonic River and "Taylor's Bridge," of fragrant memory!



In the first of the two books of early Plainfield Church records, pages 9 to 26 contain admissions from the organization in 1786 10 1827. About 1830, when Rev. Mr. Robert Stephenson leaves no family behind him. His wife died many years ago, and he remained a widower, so that the direct line from George Stephenson, an eminent English engineer, has died out. James Watt, the noted British inventor, left no descendants. It appears that the men noted for mechanical genius, like many of those famous in literature, science and government in Great Britain, leave no children to perpetuate their names.
