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

Dear Mr. Shepard:

I Have located volumes 3 & 4 of your Berkshire Genealogical Notes and wonder if you have compiled the birth records of Berkshire, also.

I am trying to verify the birth of Martin Kimball, (my date Dec. 25 - 1804.) Family notes say in Rhode Island - census and printed history say Vermont. I can locate no records in those states. From what I can gather some of his father's brothers had land in Adams, so probably his father did, too. I believe his father was Noah Kimball.

Martin's marriage to Lucena Smith is listed in your Berkshire Notes #3, so I am writing to you hoping you can give me some clue as to where to hunt for this birth record.

We who are hunting records in the Pownal, Vermont area are grateful for the notes you have compiled. I'd still be hunting Martin's marriage record if it weren't for the notes you have compiled. Hoping to hear from you soon, I am

Dear Mrs. Benfer:

I appreciate your letter and am glad that my Pownal Marriages were helpful to you. I have a file of about 1500 cards on Pownal families which I compiled from the Town Birth and Death records and from a record of grave stones in the several grave-Pownal is the South West corner town in Vervards in the town. mont, just North of Williamstown. From our living room windows I have an uninterupted view to the mountains in Pownal. Pownal records are awaiting publication at present, along with similar records of the Massachusetts towns of Savoy, Plainfield, Cummington and Chesterfield. Since retiring from College teaching four years ago I have been working on a much larger job - a digest of the Probate records of the whole of Berkshire County, from which I am taking all the genealogical material and combining it with anything in the Town records, less than half of which have been published, and any other information of the family which I can get. In this I now have over 30,000 cards, and hope some day to publish it as "Berkshire County Families" with each town making a volume of 100 to 200 pages. The great difficulty

will be, as you probably will guess, is handling the cost of publication.

However in Town Rec. I 395 I find Noah Kimball b [1766] d 20 Or 21 Jul 1841 and his wife Azuba Salisbury b [21 May 1765] d 23 Aug 1843 or 8 (last figure illegible) bur in Cem #6.

From the names of Martin's son and fifth daughter it is very probable that this Noah and Azuba were his parents. No Pownal record of any children born to them. About one third of the Pownal families came from Rhode Island, some stopping on the way in Cheshire and Adams which had a large Quaker immigration in the early days.

It seems to me quite probable (tho an investigation of Rhode Island records would be necessary for proof,) that Samuel Kimball b [1760]; Noah Kimball b [1766]; and Isaac Kimball whose first child in Pownal was born in 1798, may have been brothers. Of the list of Kimballs in my Pownal Marriages Benjamin has already been located as a grandson of Isaac; Joseph was Isaac's son and Benjamin's father; Marian was Martin's daughter; this leaves Elizabeth m 1807; Lydia m 1820; Martin m 1835; Merriam (which may be Miriam or Mariann) m 1813; Samuel and Hannah m 1809; and Zuba m 1817. You think Martin was son of Noah and names of his children certainly indicate that. Also that Zuba was a daughter of Noah. Samuel quite probably may have been son of Samuel, in which case Hannah was probably a cousin and as we do not find her as a daughter of Isaac, and anyway her marriage date is too early to place her in that family, it leaves her as probably a daughter of Elizabeth, Lydia and Merriam might also be daughters of Noah or of Samuel. I find it sometimes helps to put down pure conjectures like this for it helps you to know what to look for.

As to Martin's wife Lucena (or Lucinda) Smith - the only Smith family I have found in Pownal is:

Lucena could possibly be an earlier daughter of the first wife.

There was a Martin Albro and wife Mary 1790 Census 1-3-2 who had a large family born in Pownal from 1776 to 1798. Among these children was Else b 11 Mar 1779, d 17 Sep 1827; Wait b 18 Apr 1781; and Martin Jr. b 17 Apr 1785.

Could this Else be the first wife of Oliver Smith? The dates don't agree but are not too far away. This would explain Else Smith being buried next to her brother Wait in the Albro lot. For Martin Jr., see Noble Genealogy #3306 p 396

Of course your Martin Kimball was named long before he knew

Lucena Smith, but the names Martin in the Albro family suggest that the families may have been acquainted. Martin is not a common name.

Entire apart from your family, the Seth Myers and his wife Sally mentioned on p2 of this letter were of interest in that they gave all their children names beginning with the same initial, viz. Homer; Harvey; Hester Ann; Harry; Harriet F.; Henriette; Hinsdale; Hulda Jane; Hannah Adelia; Hiland H.

You speak as if you had a printed Kimball genealogy. If so, perhaps what I have given you will let you connect up with it or at least supply some missing links. Here we have a very small library and I have to go to Albany, Hartford or Boston for such.

If this information is helpful to you, I should appreciate your check for \$15.00 which would cover my time in searching my records, and would go into my publication fund.

I should be glad to add your line down from Martin to my Pownal notes.

ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS OF NATHAN HASKINS AN EARLY SETTLER OF SAVOY, 1630-1930

Part 1 by Charles Tyler Haskins, 1930 Part 2 by Laurence L. Haskins, 1947

PART 1

In preparing this brief history of our emigrant ancestors and descendants of Nathan Haskins, who was one of the first settlers in Savoy, their traditions here given have been traced from father to son through generations and they may be regarded as trustworthy and correct statements of facts. This should have been written fifty years ago, during the lifetime of some of the families who were familiar with the earlier history of our ancestors which they had learned from older ones with whom they conversed in their younger days, who in turn had learned theses stories from the early settlers. Many of the incidents herein mentioned were told the writer by his grandfather in his boyhood and by his uncles and great-uncles and aunts in later years. I desire to make acknowledgement of assistance by friends and relatives and especially to Mrs. Carrie Leach of Amherst and Belle C. Knowlton of Providence, R.I., rendered in this work.

Previous to the time Nathan Haskins emigrated to Savoy, it is necessary to follow the paternal side by searching town records, which in some cases, unfortunately, have been destroyed by fire, church records, library books, history by E. W. Pierce, contributions, biographical, genealogical and historical and the following families: Barnaby, Booth, Brownell, Haskins and many others. He also writes of his own memory and experience and by advice of others of the hardships and privations during the King Philip's War and after. Among the names of noted men, William Haskin's name is mentioned many times. Also a history of the town of Middleboro, Massachusetts; Holland's History, Volume 2; sketches from Eddie's Note Book, and other sources have supplied valuable information.

This work is submitted with the many imperfections and mistakes which a work of this kind must necessarily contain, but the author has endeavored to set forth the facts as near correct as possible and something of the lives, habits and ways of these families that they may not be forgotten amid the stirring scenes of the present age and generation.

These descendants of Nathan Haskins herein mentioned were born, lived and died

in Savoy, unless otherwise stated.

In order to study the history of the Haskins families of Savoy, it is necessary to go back nearly three hundred years and follow the lines of the first emigrant who was William Haskins. He came from England to Plymouth about 1633. He might have arrived before that date but the records show that he was a freeman that year. We will not attempt to follow the lines on the maternal side, who married into other families only to mention them briefly, but will confine our energy and thoughts to those who retain the name of Haskins through life. Otherwise it would require a large volume.

Savoy being situated as it is, on a southern range of the Green Mountains of Vermont, did not seem to appeal to the first settlers as an ideal place to locate in for life, for as early as 1733 there were along the Westfield, Hoosac, Connecticut and Deerfield Rivers, many families. Perhaps the rough, uneven, rocky mountainous surface of the country had something to do with it. And is it to be wondered at? However, with all the disadvantages and inconveniences they had to contend with, nature supplied them with some of the most precious gifts which go to make life worthwhile. First, the abundant springs of good water which, besides supplying farms and families, formed some of the best fishing streams in New England. They also furnished power to turn wheels in many different mills. There have been thirty-eight different mills since about 1780 in the town operated by water power. These include one tannery, one scythe snath shop, three grist mills, many lumber mills and wood turning shops. At the present time, there are two mills run by water power. All the water that supplies these sixteen small streams comes Haskins 91

from springs in town, except one small stream that flows in from the town of Windsor. Another of these precious gifts was the healthy and invigorating atmosphere that adds strength and joy to every living soul. The abundance of wild game of all kinds that ever roamed the hills was of the greatest assistance in providing for the families.

And the songbirds. Any one who has spent a few weeks on the hills during the summer months and who has an ear for nature's music never can forget the song birds such as the Robin Red Breast, the Bob-O-Link, the swallow, the Night-In-Gale, the Whip-Poor-Will, the Brown Thrasher, and scores of others combine to make us feel that the hills are the only place to enjoy life, and we who were born and who spent our early happy days in the old hill towns regret that they cannot be repeated. But most of the birds herein mentioned are a thing of the past. Like the people, they are fast leaving town. Why and where do they go? The Black Crow remains.

WILLIAM HASKINS THE FIRST

William Haskins the first was born in England. He came to Plymouth when a young man. It is supposed he was of Scotch-Irish descent. He was twice married.

His first wife was Sarah Cushman, who died soon after marriage.

His second wife was Ann Hines (Haines, Hinds)

They lived in Plymouth, Scituate, Taunton and Middleboro.

We find by tracing his descendants the following:

William Haskins¹ and Ann Hines William Haskins² and Sarah Caswell William D. Haskins³ and -----Shadrach Haskins⁴ and Elizabeth Cole Nathan Haskins⁵ and Phebe Linkon

Upon the incorporation of Middleboro as a town in 1669, William¹ Haskins was chosen town clerk and continued in that office until 1693. He lived in a house owned by William Clark and kept the original deeds and records of the Prince and Coombs Purchases and the records of the town which were destroyed by a fire during the King Philip's War, which broke out on June 24, 1675. He was one of the men in the Twenty-six Men's Purchases. These twenty-six men purchased from Joseph Wamp-

ton, Indian Sagamore, for seventy pounds.

His name is also mentioned in the Purchade Purchases.

Tradition says that the first twelve years he kept records as town clerk from 1657 to 1669 he received no compensation for his services, but at a town meeting held on May 24, 1681 the town agreed that he should receive a load of fish, taken from the herring weir and delivered at his house for each year's services. He served as clerk until March 28, 1693. At that time he was getting old and feeble, and resigned.

During King Philip's War he served from the town of Middleboro. At the close of the war the town of Middleboro was nearly or quite devastated. The settlers has lost their habitations, their lands, and their records. Consequently many were forced to withdraw from them. But on June 9, 1677, sixty-eight men, including William and John Haskins, met at Plymouth with the governor and the general court to negotiate plans for resettlement of the town. William Haskins was appointed town clerk. It was agreed that if they succeeded in their attempt, each man should receive a grant of land as a reward. They succeeded, but it was more than ten years before they received their grants. William's grant was in Narragansett township, now in the town of Greenwich, R.I.

He was on a jury with John Thomas and Sergeant Ephraim Tinkham and others to try an Indian for murder. In 1674, the Indian was convicted and executed. This had something to do with the breaking out of King Philip's War. On Feb. 6, 1665, he was appointed administrator of the estate of Nicholas Hodgis, alias Miller, deceased. Previous to this, he had received a grant of land in Lakenham. He applied to the general court for and received a grant of land for having one of the first born American children, Sarah Haskins. There is no official record of his death nor the death of his wife, but Eddie's Notebook says, "Ann died previous to the Indian War and he died at the home of his son in Middleboro at an advanced age."

PART 2

This is a preliminary survey, and does not pretend to mention all of the information available. In some cases, for example, where the records do not positively distinguish between the different William Haskins, these entries have been, for the present, ignored. All data are factual; and where reasonable doubt exists, that is clearly stated.

On of the difficulties involved is the destruction by fire of the records of both Taunton and New Salem.

Note that, in this account, the surname is spelled HASKINS. This is done only for the sake of continuity, and is somewhat inaccurate because the commonly accepted spelling for the first few generations was HOSKINS.

FIRST GENERATION

WILLIAM¹ HASKINS first appeared in the records of Plymouth, Massachusetts where he was admitted Freeman, recorded in an undated entry, probably between 1633 and 1635. He undoubtedly arrived in Plymouth a single man, but there is some likelihood that he had a sister, Elizabeth, who married, in 1634, William Palmer, and that she, and possibly his mother, came to America with him.

William was granted land in Plymouth in 1637, 1638 and 1641. In 1637 a parcel of land was deeded from Dotey to Derby with the provision that William Haskins be allowed to harvest "the present crop and two more crops." Two years later, William deeded eight acres near "Playne Dealeing" to George Clarke for eight pounds in money, corn or cattle. Later grants in 1660. at Lakenham, may have been either to William or his son.

William was listed for jury duty some 23 times between the years 1636 and 1681. He was listed, in an undated entry, with Francis Billingham and Nicholas Hodges on Goodman Winter's team for the purpose of cutting and drawing wood. In 1644/5 he was administrator of the estate of Nicholas Hodges, and in 1683/4 probably the administrator of the estate of Peter Riffe. The date of William's death is not known. It was, however, later than May 17, 1686 when he successfully defended his title to a parcel of land against John Tomson and John Soule. The court decided that William owned the land by "grant of the Court and also by possession above forty years."

William was twice married.

First on Nov. 2, 1636 to Sarah Cushman who died shortly after the birth of a daughter, Sarah.

Secondly, on Dec. 21, 1638 to Ann Hynes who came over when "aged 25 years or thereabouts" to serve Richard Darbey. Ann is last mentioned in the records in 1665, and the date of her death is not known.

INGRAHAM FAMILY IN BERKSHIRE COUNTY

From the Thelma Wells Collection, Berkshire Athenaeum, Pittsfield, Massachusetts.

The name Ingraham is English. Its origin is uncertain, but it is believed to have been derived from the name Inge, which was taken into English by a Viking leader named Ingebar, and the word Ham, signifying a town. It is probable that the town received its name from Ingebar and that the first bearer of the surname took it from that place in which he was living at the time of the adoption of surnames in England. The two forms of the name, Ingraham and Ingram, were used interchangeably until the latter part of the eighteenth century and were undoubtedly of common origin. Families of this name were found at early dates in Essex, Hereford, Warwick, Scotland, Lincolnshire, Somersetshire, Surrey and Sussex.

There were several Ingraham settlers who came to America in the seventeenth century. Edward Ingraham came to Salem, Massachusetts at age 18 "in the good ship, Blessing" in 1635. William Ingraham settled in Boston about 1654. He had three children, but it is not known if they had any descendants. Sometime before 1662, Jared Ingraham also settled in Boston. John Ingraham or Ingram settled in Hadley, Massachusetts at an early date. He and his wife Elizabeth Gardner have many descendants. A Henry Ingraham was living in Boston

prior to 1672. Richard Ingraham settled in Rehoboth, Massachusetts about 1639.

In the eighteenth century, an Edward Ingraham came to America and was living in York, Maine in 1730. another Ingraham, Alexander, came from northern Ireland to St. John.

New Brunswick, about 1820. His son Arthur settled in Littleton, Maine.

Our ancestor was probably Richard Ingraham, settler of Rehoboth, Massachusetts. In 1645 Richard was living in Rehoboth with his family. His first wife is thought to have been Elizabeth Wignall. In 1668, he was living in Connecticut, where he had married a widow, Joan Rockwell Baker. In Rehoboth, Richard was a tax collector in 1643, and a proprietor in 1645. Richard Ingraham had two known children, William and Jarrett, and a probable third, Benjamin. I have seen information that he had a daughter Elizabeth, but this is probably not reliable.

William, son of Richard, married Mary Barstow. They were the parents of six children, one of them being Timothy, born July 2, 1660. Timothy married fortune when he married Sarah Colwell, daughter of Sarah Wilson and Edward Colwell, for Sarah was the heir of a large estate, six miles long and three wide, on which the city of Leeds, England, is now located. The fortune was lost, however, in later years, due to the loss of the original will. A concentrated effort was made more than one hundred years ago by descendants of Timothy and Sarah, to recover the estate, all to no avail. At that time, the estate was worth 40,000 pounds a year.

Timothy and Sarah Colwell Ingraham were the parents of several children. Among

their descendants are many Timothys.

Most of the data I have given here is from a small booklet on the Ingrahams by Alice W. Thompson of Nova Scotia. In the booklet, Mrs. Thompson states that widely separated branches of the Ingrahams have traditions of ancestral wealth. While there is no such story in my immediate family, one of our cousins in New Ashford, Mass. knows of such a legend. For this reason, I believe our descent is through Timothy Ingraham and his wife Sarah Colwell.

The information I have, to date, begins with a Timothy Ingraham of Berkley, Massachusetts, a town very close to Rehoboth. The following data on Timothy, his wife and chil-

dren, is from the old records of the Congregational Church in Berkley.

Old Bible records, however, in the possession of Mrs. Forrest White in New Ashford, list the birth of Molly and her marriage to John Elliott, while no marriage of Sarah is given in the Bible records. Neither Molly's marriage to John Elliott or her death is given in the V.R., so the only supposition I can make is that John married Molly first, she died, and he then married Sarah. I do not believe the situation can ever be cleared up beyond doubt.

Dear Friend Mr. Haight:

Yesterday in looking over some old clippings I was so astonished at one group of items that I am passing it on to you, although you may already know of the facts.

"John H. Adams was born in the town of Hancock, Mass. His father's house and farm was situated on the ridge of the mountain between New Lebanon and Pittsfield in a lonely road running north from Hancock Shaker Village.

He received from his parents the rudiments of education, and one winter when about 16 years of age, he attended school in a schoolhouse which stood near Broad's Tavern, on the old post road leading from Albany to Pittsfield, and on the summit of the mountain. Shortly after this, John's father and mother joined the Shakers, turning in their property to that society, leaving John and his sister Susan - to get along in the world as best they could."

There is more in the article, which I will not quote. I know the location of this farm and think I have mentioned this mountain road - which joins the mountain road from Lebanon Springs to Pittsfield - at what we know as the "Lily Brook" near the top of the mountain - just beyond "Fiddler's Elbow." Can it be this "Broad's Tavern" of early days - became what we of today know as having been the "Old Mountain House," which was mysteriously torn down one night in the days of my father's young manhood? I have always suspicioned there must have been as school around the mountain summit, as there were a number of families living on Tower Mountain and on the eastern slope and in the vicinity of the large brick house at the base of Tower Mountain and it seemed there must have been a school provided. Many, many times I have heard my father mention this Adams farm and point out to me the road leading to it- when as a child I often went with him to Pittsfield, but it never occurred to me it was connected in any way with the John Adams of West Lebanon, or that his parents became members of the Shaker Society.

I think I wrote you I had been given the name of Mrs. Ella Atwater, at Garfield, N.Y. as one who might give information about White's Hill, Ebenezer Knapp, etc.

I wrote her and enclosed stamp for reply but have not received any word from her. She is an elderly lady and of course may not be able to write, or may not be able to give any information. I am hoping we may get trace of Ebenezer Knapp through Mrs. William Adams (whose mother was one of the Lebanon Knapp family) as she thinks some cousins in Spring-field have records that may include Ebenezer.

Another item of interest I found was that the quaint old stone barn, circular in shape, with its strange interior - at the Hancock Shakers, the architect and builder was Daniel Goodrich - one of the famous twelve Goodrich brothers, on whose farm the Church family of Hancock Shakers resides. You may remember my reading to you of a brother of Charles Goodrich, who purchased a strip of land in Hancock - which extended to the line of town of Richmond, and that he had 12 sons. In "Gleanings from Old Shaker Journals" mention is made of Mother Ann at the home of Daniel Goodrich in Hancock, so we can positively locate where Daniel lived.

Have heard there has been a delay in the Lincoln Sackett family going back to Lebanon on Apr. 15th, as they had planned, so I am going down to see if they are yet at the Appleton Ave. apartment, and will drop this in street mail box on the way.
