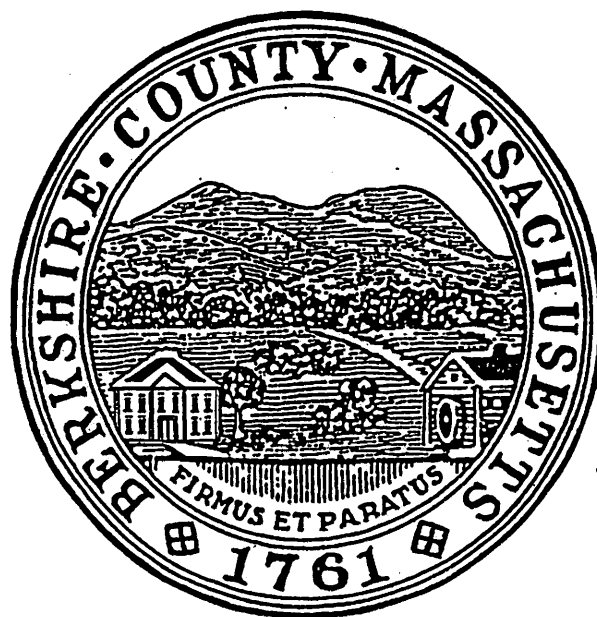

## BERKSHIRE BRASS BANDS

From *The Berkshire Hills*, April 1, 1901.

[Continued from Volume 31, Number 3, Page 80]

### PITTSFIELD BRASS BANDS

Pittsfield was dependent upon the old fifer and drummer for its martial, and on the old fiddler for dance music up to 1840, and on the latter for terpsichorean festivities for many years later. About this time a musician named Perry, who had organized and taught bands in other localities, came to Pittsfield and proposed to start one here. A number of enterprising young men got together, raised the money among themselves to purchase instruments and employed Perry to teach them. Not a single one of the number had previously received any musical education, and it was up-hill work for a time for both teacher and pupils. But perseverance was the order of the day, which was thoroughly backed up by native pride, and after a time the organization flattered itself as being the banner band of the county. This band started with five bugles - one E flat and four B flat, two cornets, two trumpets, two French horns, three trombones - one bass and two tenor, and one drum. James N. Strong, son of Noble Strong and now living in Fairfield, Iowa, its leader, and Henry Wells, born in Lenox in 1817, and now a resident of Brooklyn, N.Y., are the only members of this band known to be living. From the latter's remembrance, it has been possible to rescue a little of its history from oblivion.

### THE FIRST BRASS BAND

This band remained in full membership for several years, but death and removals finally reduced its make-up to six. But this half dozen bravely kept together until about 1848 or 1850, when they disbanded. The names that can be recalled are: James N. Strong, E flat bugle; Albert L. Backus, first tenor trombone; Isaac C. Conkey, second tenor trombone; Charles Bement, first cornet; James Armitage, bass horn; John Bates, second bass horn; James Woodruff, trumpet; Henry Wells, bass trombone.

Other sources of information make it possible that Reuben Goodrich was a

member of this band, who was at the time connected with William Pierce's organ works on North street, and that a son of King Strong, whose farm was near Tillotson's mill in the west part, played the key bugle in this organization. Of the latter it is remembered that on many summer evenings he used to delight the inhabitants of that portion of the town with weird music on this instrument.

### MASCHKE'S BRASS BAND

During the period from 1860 to 1865 Prof. E. Maschke, a talented German musician, kept a small saloon on Depot street on the site now occupied by Eagan's wholesale grocery store. He was highly proficient on the cornet and clarionet, and in fact was a good player on all wind and string instruments, besides being a composer of up-to-date band and other music. He was very popular not only with his own countrymen, but with all the older and younger citizenship of the town during his residence here. To him and the musical talent of German residents, Pittsfield was indebted for its first successful brass band and orchestra. In 1868 Prof. Maschke removed to Troy, N.Y., and it is known that he was a resident and leader of a band in Washington, D.C. as late as 1872.

This band enjoyed great popularity and during its existence was in general requisition both in and out of town. It had a membership of fifteen persons of whom were: Leader, Prof. E. Maschke, E flat cornet; Charles Hanrahan, Robert Newbert, Mr. Bodtz, B flat cornet; Jacob Gimlich, John Strichroot, Emil Newbert, B flat tenor; Charles Ambuch, tenor; Fred Strichroot, Charles Strichroot, basso; Mr. Frienthal, Mr. Ever, trombone; Emil Ende, trombone alto; Ed. Merry, snare drum; Louis St. Mary, drum major.

It is remembered that this band was very patriotic during the first years of the civil war, turning out of itself to escort troops to the Pleasure Park camps, to the railroad depot, to welcome troops passing over the railroads, at war meetings and in assemblages

at the old park when the town was trying to fill up its military quotas. There are many who will remember that it escorted the Forty-Ninth Regiment from camp to the cars on its departure to Louisiana. It also played at many of the old Berkshire Coffee House and United States Hotel banquets, at the Robert Pomeroy golden wedding and was often at festive gatherings at William Pollock's Grey Tower. Some of the charming evening serenades it gave to prominent old time citizens, among them the Plunketts, Kelloggs, Learneds and Bowermans, are still gratefully remembered. It furnished fine music at the laying of the corner stone of St. Joseph's Church on North street, and on one occasion was called by Father Lynch to play for a St. Francis church picnic in the Blackinton woods at North Adams, and was afterwards given a banquet by him and his prominent parishioners in the home parsonage. Its band room was in Pierce's Block.

#### MASCHKE'S ORCHESTRA

Connected with the Maschke's Brass band was a splendidly trained orchestra, the first organization of the kind ever known in Pittsfield, though down through the years it has been succeeded by some very fine organizations of that character, and notably the Kingman's Orchestra of the present day. From 1860 to 1868 the then young people had formed a social society known as the Wintergreen Club, which during the cooler months of the year held its sessions and dancing parties at the residences of its members. For this popular club this orchestra furnished fine music and it was in constant demand. It was in 1868 that Prof. Maschke composed a "Galop" which he dedicated to the Wintergreen Club and which was printed and copyrighted. A member of this old club, who has seen a good many checkerberries ripen and fall since its palmy days, has a well preserved copy of this "Wintergreen Club Galop," which would to hear rendered and resurrected by Kingman's String Quartet, prove a decided novelty to modern musical ears.

#### GERMAN SINGING SOCIETY

It was at this period that Pittsfield had a very talented German organization called the "Liederkrantz Singing Society," whose rare

vocal skill was called to the front on many a public and private occasion. During the war Gen. W. F. Bartlett was once a guest at the Morewood mansion, now owned by the Country Club, and prominent young men with a cannon and this club went down and welcomed him with a salute and patriotic songs. The party were invited in and introduced to the General, who made his visitors a neat speech, which was replied to by the leader of the singing society in such a happy impromptu manner that the occasion, and the sumptuous set out of refreshments, was always an enjoyable recollection to all present.

#### ERDMANN'S BRASS BAND

This band, which through the efforts of Philip Schwartz and other enterprising German musicians was in evidence from 1871 to 1873, though of limited membership, was a talented organization. Its accomplished leader was W. B. G. Erdmann, who afterwards removed to Albany, N. Y. where but a few years ago he was the leader of Erdmann's Orchestra. Up to the time of the dedication of the Pittsfield Soldiers' Monument it had made no notable appearance, having confined itself to evening concerts in front of Erdmann's saloon on Depot street, playing for private gatherings and meetings, and the giving of serenades, etc. Citizens made up a purse and uniformed this band for its public appearance at the dedication of this monument, where it gave great satisfaction. The band music possibilities as developed in the home talent congregated in the membership of the Maschke's and Erdmann Bands, with the desire of German musicians to keep up such a musical organization in Pittsfield, attracted the attention of several prominent citizens of means, and the result was that the veteran bandmaster, Peter Killian, came to town and with Philip Schwartz enlisted the first membership of the Germania Band. As near as can be ascertained this was the membership of Erdmann's Band: Leader, W. G. B. Erdmann, Henry Polk, E flat bugle; Philip Schwartz, Mr. Fox, B flat cornet; Charles Erdmann, alto; Mr. Cobb, clarinet; Prof. Richardson, tuber, Henry Wurgler, baritone; Mr. Rudolph, trombone; Emil Ende, trombone alto; Charles Loynes, bass drum; Young Erdmann, cymbals.

## ST. JOSEPH'S CORNET BAND

The credit of forming the first brass band in Pittsfield to hold itself in organization a quarter of a century, is due to the enterprise, skill, patience and indefatigable industry of C. Robert St. James and a few Irish citizens who bravely took the matter in hand as early as 1872. They named their organization after the first Catholic church and commenced practice under the tuition of Mr. Farrell of Albany, a talented member of Sullivan's Tenth Regiment Band of that city. Their first band-room was in the third or dormer story of the Allen or Pittsfield Sun Block, and there are many citizens in Pittsfield who can remember the faithfulness with which they studied and rehearsed to obtain mastery over music and instruments.

At the end of nine months C. Robert St. James was elected leader, which position he has held with marked ability ever since, having brought this organization up to its present excellence and prosperity from its infancy. In 1875 the band removed to its present quarters in Pierce's Block, where at the present time it is as industrious and progressive as when it first commenced its juvenile life in the Allen Block, is thoroughly up to date in skill and music and was never so well prepared for active duty as in 1901. Its charter members were C. Robert St. James, E flat cornet; cornets, L. Melody, Joseph Cullen, John Flannigan, John Seigle; alto, Thomas Walsh, John Fitzgerald, Peter Cullen; trombone, James Leonard, John Gorman, John Burke; bass, Mr. Lawrence; snare drum, Christopher Whitmire; bass drum, Patrick Cullen; cymbals, Joseph Daley. Of these now living are C. Robert St. James, J. Fitzgerald, J. Cullen, J. Leonard, John Burke, Mr. Lawrence, C. Whitmire, Patrick Cullen, J. Daley.

The members of this band as now constituted are Theodore Killian, piccolo; Albert Killian, E flat clarionet; C. G. St. James, C. H. Frank, B flat clarionet; C. R. St. James, E flat cornet; J. P. Gorman, Ed. Gorman, W. Weason, H. Mountford, B flat cornet; J. J. St. James, J. O'Brien, C. Daniels, J. Fitzgerald, alto; M. Gorman, baritone; J. Walsh, Arthur Paine, W. Gorman, George Holderness, trombone; Peter Cullen, John Qua, bass; R. J. Steele, Harold Steele, A. M.

Wilbur, snare drum; L. Black, bass drum; W. Newton, drum major.

The band is finely uniformed and uses the best Besson instruments, the best brass instruments manufactured. Since its first public appearance it has met with a thoroughly merited patronage, having been called to every city and town in the county, and to Springfield, Worcester, Holyoke, Hudson, Catskill and elsewhere.

## MALLORY'S BAND

The fifth band in Pittsfield was called Mallory's Band and remained in organization hardly two years. It was gathered together by a Mr. Spencer, formerly of the British army, who was its first leader. He was succeeded in this office by John Hastings of New Bedford, who afterwards was a circus musician. H. C. Kells was a tenor and baritone in this band.

## THE GERMANIA BAND

The sixth brass band in Pittsfield and a most notable and popular one during its ten years of existence, was the Germania Band, which was organized in 1881 under the leadership of Peter Killian. From the very first this band was a musical success, and it soon attracted the attention of prominent Pittsfield citizens, who not only gave it aid and countenance in many ways, but forty of whom for several years contributed \$400 annually towards its support. This movement of citizens was led on by the late E. S. Francis, who was an enthusiastic lover of band music and who made this organization one of his many musical pets. In fact, during his life, all Pittsfield musical organizations and enterprises were at their best, and the Germania Band as well as vocal musical festivals went out of sight after his death.

The successor of Peter Killian as leader, teacher and manager, was Ed. Clapp, a noted musician and well-known in eastern New York and western Massachusetts, and who after leaving Pittsfield managed a successful band in North Adams for a number of years, and who is now the leader of the Greenfield Band with residence in Montague. Under his leadership in 1884 the Germania Band was at the height of its success. It struggled along a spell after his departure under the leadership of E. C. Kells, but finally went to pieces in

1892. In 1884 its members were: Ed. Clapp, leader; William Reeves, John Durkee, first and solo cornet; William Reed, Henry Polk, Ed. Phillips, William Weiser, second cornet; Frank Chamberlain, piccolo; Fred Liddle, E flat clarinet; L. B. Colburn, solo, B flat clarinet; Paul Koepka, John Niland, second clarinet; H. Lambert, John Qua, J. Gordon, tuber; George Gordon, baritone; E. W. Collins, George Burnham, first trombone; J. Arthur, trombone and baritone; H. E. Barker, John Hunt, James Cooney, Frank Newton, solo alto; Frank Weiser, piccolo and flute; William Humphrey, flute; H. Lawrence, snare drum; H. Hines, C. Heminway, bass drum; P. McManus, cymbals.

#### LAFAYETTE CORNET OR CITY BAND

The seventh Pittsfield band was started by members of the French society of Sons of Lafayette about five years ago with fifteen instruments. Its first leader was Eugene Dietrich, who after holding the position one year, deceased. He was succeeded by H. C. Kells, who has held the office up to the present date. The band is composed of 35 members, there being 10 members of the old Germania Band in its ranks. On August 1, 1900 it took the name of the Pittsfield City Band.

#### THE AMERICAN BAND

The eighth Pittsfield band was called the American Band and was mainly composed of the employees of Robbins & Kellogg's shoe factory. It was led for the first three months by a Mr. McKenna, who had previously left the Germania Band to study music in Boston. It was afterwards led for about a year and a half by H. C. Kells, when it disbanded.

#### LENOX CORNET BAND

Lenox has been very fortunate for fully twenty years in having a fine band which its citizens and cottagers have handsomely sustained, its evening out-door concerts having been a great feature in Lenox life through the summer and early autumn months. This band was organized somewhere about 1880 by Ralph Gorman who taught and led it continually for about 18 years, and who was succeeded for about two years by Joseph Monroe, who deceased at North Adams in 1900, holding the leadership of its City Band, formerly the Germania. Mr. Gorman brought this organization up to a high degree of proficiency, and only because of his business requirements, being the leading pharmacist of the town, relinquished its teaching and management to others. Under his management it was finely uniformed and furnished with the famous Silver Conn instruments which are manufactured in Elkhart, Indiana. The assertion made by one of its members that the band cleared \$1400 in 1900 would go to show that it is the enjoyment of the patronage which it so well merits.

Who were the original members of this band seems to be past finding out. It is said to have been reorganized several times, and probably a good many of its charter members are embraced in its present make up; Leader and teacher, H. C. Kells of Pittsfield; members, Ed. Wheeler, L. M. Rowland, H. Peters, C. Tucker, F. Bryant, Thomas Hall, J. A. May, Frank Pierce, W. Henry, L. B. Collam, L. Killian, T. Killian, J. Gorman, F. L. Bull, G. Guilford, Ralph Gorman.

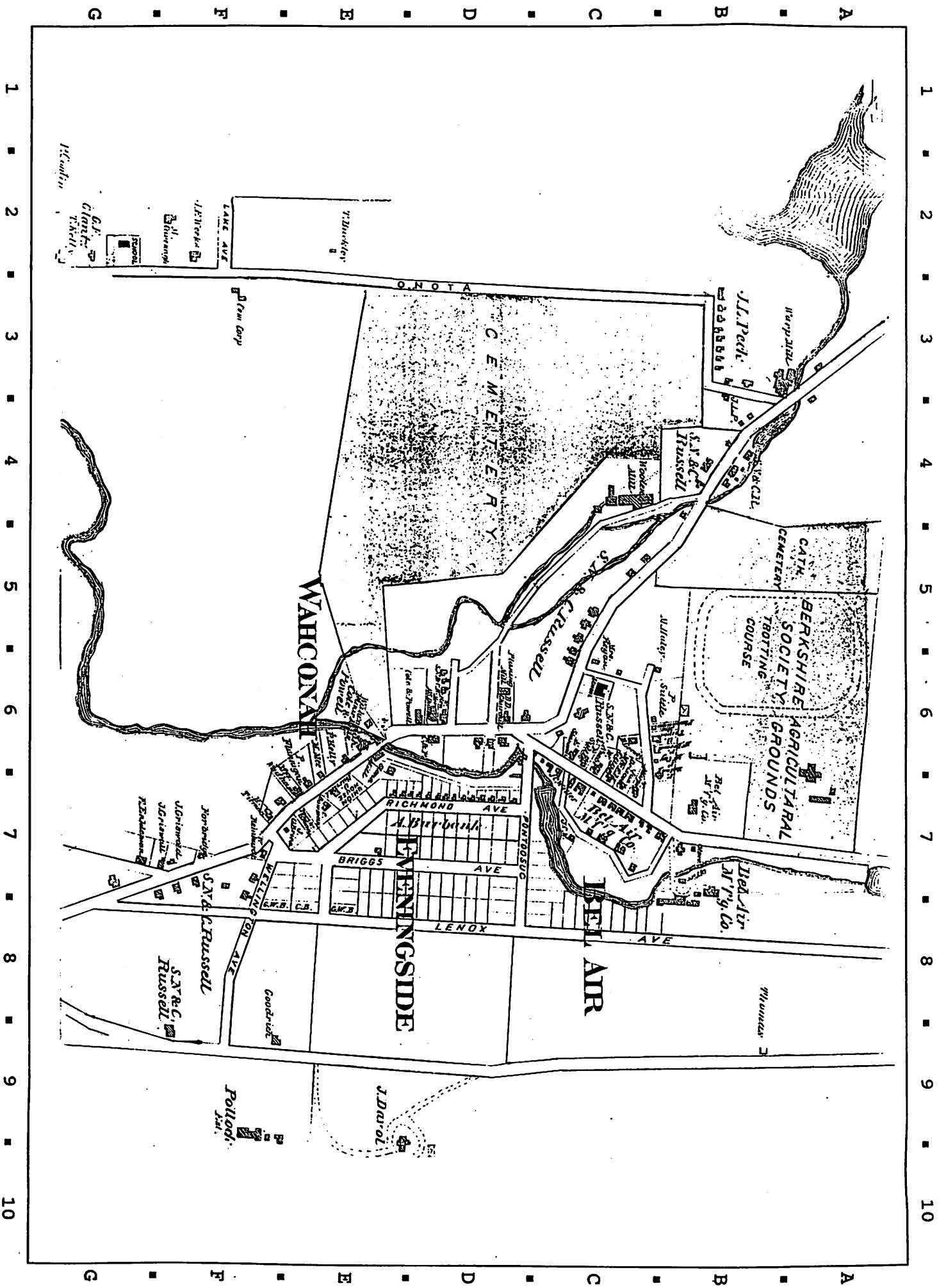

Noah's fifth child was David<sup>4</sup> who moved to Shelburn Falls, Mass. in 1772 when he was 49 years of age.

## CAPT. JEREMIAH COLEGROVE OF NORTH ADAMS

From *The Berkshire Hills*, November 1, 1900.

Captain Jeremiah Colegrove was born in Rhode Island in 1758, and having learned the trade of blacksmith, was when twenty one years of age drafted into the Revolutionary Army and served therein for three years. Though a man of iron nerve and great presence of mind, being skilled as a gunsmith, he was constantly employed at this work during his war service, though longing to be at the front in the sanguinary battles in which his father and three brothers participated. He was six feet in height, athletic, nimble, a stranger to fear and ready to lead the way in any emergency. Besides, he was prompt, persevering, thorough and quick to decide and act, and of a most commanding presence.

Removing from Rhode Island to central Massachusetts he followed the profession of blacksmith for ten years, and coming to North Adams in 1794, he asserted that the then great water power of the Hoosac branches "wasn't made for nothing, and that it was a site for a future city." He was always accredited as being able "to see into a millstone" farther than most men, and future events verified his talents in this last prediction, though after many years. He had a marked career in many business enterprises, but his keen foresight and practical judgment were of more service in developing the resources of the village than in enriching himself. One of his first public services was to organize a "bee" of fifty men and teams to clear Main street of huge pine stumps, the troublesome remnants of a great pine forest filling the entire valley previous to the advent of the first settlers, who were devoted to the lumber business rather than to tilling the soil, and in fact made that their principal occupation.

In 1794 Captain Colegrove with a partner bought of Giles Barnes for \$1200 the old saw and grist mills, mill dam and privileges, and eighty acres of adjacent land on both sides of the south branch of the Hoosac river, afterwards known as the Phoenix mill property, and now owned by the Arnold Print Works. He built a new dam, a grist mill on the east side, where the Hodge mill now stands, and a

saw mill on the west side, Captain Colegrove buying out his partner at the end of one year. These mills did a large business, but one built by him soon after for the manufacture of flax seed oil, proved less remunerative. The grist and saw mills were burned in 1820 and the flax oil mill in 1854. In 1795 Captain Colegrove with Israel Jones, David Estes and David Darling were the principal village land owners, in which in 1794 there were but eleven dwellings. In 1805 he commenced wool carding, cloth fulling and dressing, in a building north of his grist mill, which he carried on for fifteen years.

Captain Colegrove was a Justice of the Peace for more than twenty years. Only Israel Jones and James Cummings acted officially in this office before him, and Ezra D. Whitaker and Abel Wetherbee after him. During his incumbency of this office he was a terror to evil doers. He was an ardent Federalist in Politics, though in a total of 250 votes the town had a 100 Democratic majority. He was a challenger at the polls and a noted political tactician, and his counsels were in demand from the Federalists both far and near. He was of spotless moral character and integrity, of great hospitality and benevolence to the sick and unfortunate, - a truthful sympathizing man and a whole-souled friend.

About the year 1802 a colored woman who had fled from slavery in the state of New York came to North Adams with her master and party in hot pursuit. She was wounded and exhausted and in the direst extremity. She was directed to Captain Colegrove, whose warm sympathy for the suffering, ready faculty for circumventing oppressors, great physical strength and unshrinking courage made him conspicuous. She ran to his house, crying as he opened the door "for God's sake, save me!" Her under lip was torn and mutilated as if from the bite of a dog and this, with an ugly wound from some weapon on one of her cheeks, was bleeding profusely. Her pursuers were already in sight upon the brow of Furnace Hill and were rapidly approaching upon horseback.

Captain Colegrove, taking the poor crea-

ture by the hand, quickly led her through his house, across his garden and by a side door into the grist mill, on the site of the present Phoenix mill, now conducted by Frank Walker. He ordered the mill stopped and told his faithful miller, Captain George Ray, not to allow the gate to be hoisted by anyone until further orders. He then secreted the panting and trembling fugitive in the under-shop water wheel. He had hardly retired to his house when her pursuers appeared and demanded that he give up the Negro woman, whom they had seen enter there a few moments before. He coolly replied that they might find her if they could.

The searched the house from cellar to garret, then the woodshed, and finally the grist mill. Though they looked in upon the water wheel, they were in such a hurry, or so much under the influence of liquor, that they failed to discover the hidden fugitive. Blapheming and furiously blustering they retired to the old Black tavern to imbibe a further quantity of black strap (rum and West India molasses) to revive their Dutch courage. After a long consultation, they again visited Captain Colegrove, demanded that he deliver up the woman, and upon his refusal to let them search the premises a second time, grew very insolent in their attempt to exhort from him a confession that he had harbored her. Finally, he not only refused to have any more parley with them, but informed them if they placed foot on his premises again they would have to step over his dead body. They

looked for a few moments at his stalwart form, and quailing before his flashing and determined eyes, ingloriously retreated, soon left the village behind them, and none too soon for their own safety.

In the meantime Captain George Ray, suspecting another search might be made, and in order to avoid any suspicion on account of the grist mill being stopped so long, removed the hopper and commenced sharpening up his millstones, having previously removed the fugitive and secreted her in a tool room in the second story of the building. After nightfall the colored woman was secretly conveyed to the home of John Waterman, a short distance south of the village, where she lived for three years as a faithful servant in that household, never afterwards being sought for by her New York owners.

Captain Colegrove lived for many years on Main street on a site just north of the present North Adams Savings Bank Block, where he deceased in 1837, aged 79 years. He married a Miss Waterman, sister of Col. Waterman of Williamstown, in 1782, a most estimable lady, who survived him for fourteen years, and we believe both were buried in what is now known as the Colegrove cemetery at the west base of Drury Academy hill. They were survived by one son, B. F. Colegrove, now deceased. The daughter of the latter, Mrs. E. M. Hodge, resides in North Adams, as also a granddaughter, Mrs. Nettie Potter. ■

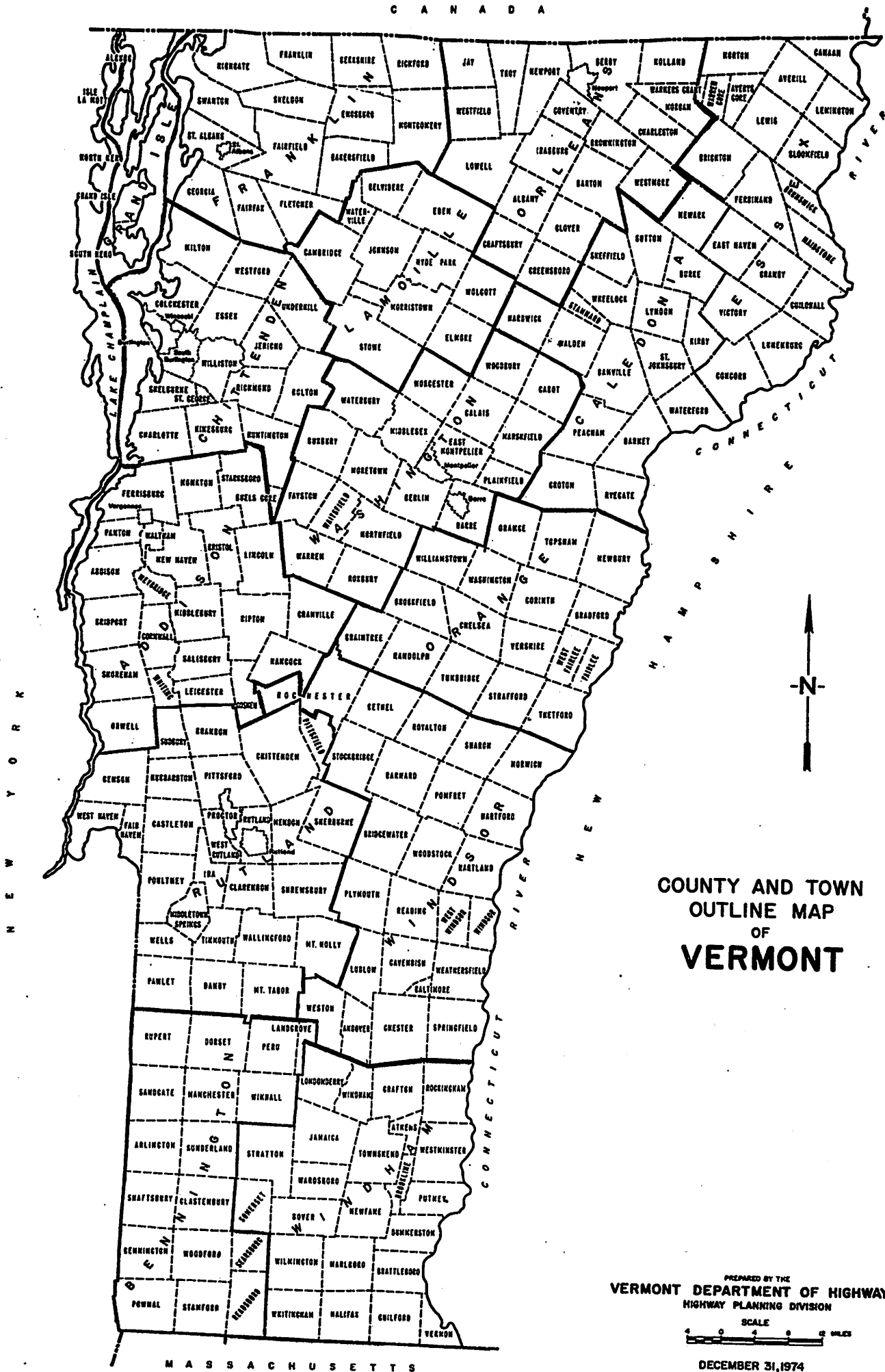
