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MYSTERIES AND MEMORIES

This article was originally written for an issue of Archival Anecdotes that featured a number of articles exploring the use of autograph, friendship and memory books for genealogical research. What follows is a description of three such items that are in the collections of the Berkshire Athenaeum, with some strategies for using these types of materials to uncover interesting details concerning your ancestors.

Dispersed throughout our archival collections, the Athenaeum has a number of memory and autograph books. In this article, I will offer a brief description of three examples, each a bit unique in its own way, and ranging over time from 1839 to 1917.

The first example is a somewhat worn black book with gold embossing with the word "Album" on the spine in small letters. Measuring 6 ¼ inches by 7 ¾ inches the book itself was published by J.C. Riker of New York. It consists primarily of blank pages for inscribing but has a number of pages interspersed that are pre-printed with line drawings.

The book is inscribed in the front
"Miss Martha D. Platt
Presented
Stephentown September 19, 1839..."

As the first passage written into the book is titled "Departed Sister" and dated Sept. 21st 1839, we originally thought this was created at the death of Miss Platt and inscribed by friends and relatives. However, a bit of sleuthing in the Stephentown records in our collection revealed that Martha D. Platt was born Dec. 11, 1822, the daughter of Henry Platt, Jr. and Martha Chapman. We were also able to discover that she married Jonathan J. Sweet, Jr., lived in Stephentown, died there June 22, 1879 and is buried there. Perhaps the book was given to her at the time of her wedding? Or for some other special occasion? We wonder if the first passage to "Departed Sister" indicates that a sister or sister-in-law had died, but have not found an answer in our records. There are inscriptions throughout from friends and relatives. Not all are dated but those that are range from 1839 to 1860. There is a small picture of a young woman inserted between two of the pages and we wonder if this was Martha. The book presents many avenues for further investigation for anyone interested in the history of this family.

Moving forward a bit in time, the second example is somewhat similar in appearance, being an 8 ½ by 9 ½ inch red leather book, also with gold embossing, and the words "Friendship Album" on the cover. It also has primarily blank pages, with engraved prints interspersed. This one is a bit different in that the paper used for the blank pages is of various pastel hues. Bradley, Dayton and Co. of Boston published the album in 1862.

The first inscription reads as follows:

Dedication

"May all the names recorded here In the Lambs' Book of Life appear" Ever your friend Samuel H. Webb Burrillville. June 1865

This Samuel Webb, who we currently know nothing about, gave the Album to Emily Guild. What we do know is that this volume was given to us by Gladys King, a BFHA member who resides in Pittsfield to this day. The Album came from her husband Walter's line. Emily Guild and Ebenezer King were his grandparents. Gladys tells us that Emily was the daughter of Loren and Harriet Guild, probably born c. 1843 in Cumberland, RI, although the date and place remain un-substantiated. Emily and Ebenezer moved to Pittsfield in 1872. They raised 4 boys and 1 girl. Ebenezer first worked for the Pontoosuc Woolen Mill, later owned a store and was postmaster. He then took a job for GE and died in 1921. Emily died April 4, 1919 at the age of 76. We are fortunate to have this information from Mrs. King, as the book itself has only a few inscriptions in it, primarily from the time before Emily married Ebenezer and came to Pittsfield. Research into those inscriptions might provide some further insight into her life in Rhode Island.

The third item is quite a bit different from the first two. It presents as a standard school composition book with a label on the front that reads:

Dorothy Staples
Our Lady of the Elms
Scrapbook
1916 and 17

Donated to the Athenaeum by Mary Scamman of Windsor, MA the book documents Dorothy's graduation from St. Joseph's High School in 1916 and some highlights of her first year in attendance at Our Lady of the Elms College. We get an idea of her interests, her activities and her friendships. If Dorothy kept similar books documenting the rest of her school years, they have not come to us. However, through our records we were able to determine that Dorothy Elizabeth Staples was born in Pittsfield on April 24, 1898, the daughter of William and Margaret (Hanrahan) Staples. William was an electrician. Dorothy became a school teacher. She taught at Dawes school until 1925. In 1930 she married Leo Francis Brown, who had moved to Pittsfield from Brighton, MA and was employed at Follwell's Florist. On Ancestry.com we find that Dorothy died Aug. 10, 1980 in Quincy, MA. There is lot's of room for researching the rest of her story!

These small books give us a glimpse into the lives, memories and dreams of three women, Martha D. Platt, Emily Guild and Dorothy Staples. It doesn't appear that any of them were famous but each was spoken of with love, affection and pride. Anyone interested in pursuing their stories is welcome to do so at the Local History Department of the Athenaeum.

Those readers who have similar items in their family history materials, may glean some hints for further research from the techniques described above that were used to gather background information concerning each of these items in our collection.

HANNAH FAIRFIELD

Hannah Fairfield, born March 20, 1772, was the first female born in the town of Pittsfield after its incorporation as a town in 1771. She deceased here February 11, 1856, aged 84. Her father was Joseph Fairfield, a Pontoosuck pioneer settler in 1749, and who died in Pittsfield March 27, 1827, at the age of 88 years. Her mother, Thankful Fairfield, died in Pittsfield January 27, 1825, aged 85 years. The Joseph Fairfield lot and house was on what is now called Newell Street. near the Blackman bridge on the old road formerly running to Lanesboro, and the site of the old cellar is still to be found. Tradition has it that Joseph Fairfield was the first keeper of the town's poor and was very conspicuous in both the early history of the plantation and afterwards the town. His daughter, Hannah, often related that her father used to take her mother and herself on horseback, with his musket, when he went

out to plant and hoe corn in the north part of the Pontoosuck Plantation, and of seeing Indians lurking about in the edge of the woods. On one of these occasions she saw her father shoot an Indian at the foot of Oak hill, where he buried him, gun and all.

Hannah Fairfield's first husband was named Robbins, by whom she had four children, Samuel, Harry, Hannah and Phoenie. Her second husband was Nathan Clark, who died suddenly in 1838, and their children were Joel D., Mary F., William B., Lucy R., Elizabeth, Mehitable and George W. The latter was born in 1815 and is now living near Pontoosuc. Five of her grandchildren are now living in Pittsfield - Sanford Drake, Ward B., Fred and William H. H. Clark and Mariette Ayres. At the time of the death of Hannah Fairfield her grandchildren and great grandchildren numbered 144.

PITTSFIELD'S FIRST FAMILY

From The Berkshire Hills, October 1, 1900 & December 1, 1900.

The name of Berkshire was given to this County by its Massachusetts Governor, Sir Francis Bernard, in 1761, after a shire of that name in England. The same Governor at about the same time named Pittsfield, (whose original name as a Plantation was "Pontoosuck," and was derived from the aboriginal Indians), from William Pitt, a famous British minister and statesman, who had made himself most popular in the New England states and especially with the pioneers in Western Massachusetts, by his vigorous measures to protect the inhabitants from the French and their hostile Indian allies. The act to erect the County of Berkshire passed to be engrossed in the Senate of the General Court at Boston in 1771, the same day that the act to incorporate the town of Pittsfield (the first incorporated town in the county), passed to be enacted. This legislation was successfully brought about by Col. William Williams, who appeared and took up a lot in Pontoosuck Plantation as Ensign Williams in 1743, and afterwards constructed the old line of frontier fort defenses between the Connecticut and Hudson rivers,- Fort Shirley at Heath, Fort Pelham at Rowe, Fort Massachusetts at Adams and Fort Anson at Pontoosuck.

The first attempt to settle Pontoosuck was in 1745, when the clearing of some of the forty lots laid out and sold therein was commenced, but on account of the dangers encountered in this wilderness the pioneers retired until 1749, to find that their previous work on thirteen lots had not amounted to much. In the summer of 1752 a number of the pioneer settlers had log cabins erected and a few brought hither their families. Among these came Solomon Deming, from Wethersfield, Conn., with his young wife Sarah mounted on the pillion of his saddle. Their lot and cabin was in the eastern outskirts of the plantation in a region much frequented by tramping about Indians. She was the first white woman making her home in Pontoosuck Plantation, now Pittsfield, and the mother of the first white child born within its limits. She died here in 1818, aged 92 years, and the town erected an obelisk, with suitable inscriptions thereon, to preserve her memory, at the head of her honored grave in the little burial ground on Honasada Street, near the site of her home in 1752. This has become a historic spot, and though now somewhat isolated, is visited by many who still have interest in the life of the first brave woman who dared the privations and dangers of the once forest wilderness, thickly peopled with Indians, to make it her home and to rear up its first frontier family therein.

Besides David Bush, Solomon Deming, Nathaniel Fairfield, Gideon Gunn, Timothy Caldwell, David Ashley, Samuel Taylor, Daniel Hubbard, Stephen and Simeon Crofoot, Joseph Fairfield, Jessie Sackett, Josiah Wright, Hezekiah Jones, Abner and Isaac Dewey, and Elias Willard of the known settlers of Pontoosuck Plantation in 1749, there is no authentic record of these early pioneers.

The west face of the Sarah Deming Monument has for its inscription: "Sarah Deming, born in Wethersfield, Conn., Feb., 1726. Died at Pittsfield, March, 1818, aged 92 years." On its east face: "A mother of the revolution and a mother in Israel." On its south face: "This monument is erected by the town of Pittsfield to commemorate the heroism and virtues of its first female settler and the mother of the first white child born within its limits." On its north face: "Surrounded by a tribe of hostile Indians, she defended, in more than one instance unaided, the lives and property of her family, and was distinguished for the courage and fortitude with which she bore the dangers and privations of a pioneer life."

Down Elm Street about a mile beyond the Pleasure Park and on the south side of the highway this earliest cemetery of Pittsfield can be found. It is surrounded by a painted board fence, has a main gateway, as also a wooden stile for entrance, and the yard gives evidence of being carefully kept. It contains upwards of 100 graves, fronted for the most part with aged and moss-grown headstones. The Sarah Deming monument stands east of the main entrance avenue, near a corner of the yard, and is easily seen from the highway.

The following is a sequel article to the above.

Since the appearance of the October number there has been no little curiosity on the part of our readers in reference to the descendants of Sarah Deming, the first white woman settling in Pittsfield. Information has been given us that Solomon Deming was married Oct. 27, 1748, to Sarah Kirkum of Wethersfield, Conn., born in Wethersfield Feb. 15, 1726, and who died in Pittsfield March 1818, aged 92. She was the daughter of Henry and Martha (Burr) Kirkum of Wethersfield and granddaughter of Samuel Burr of Hartford. Solomon Deming brought his wife here on the pillion of his saddle in 1752. He is noted on the Pittsfield town list, November, 1772, as having a family of five persons. He was appointed a warden, May 11, 1761, and was one of the signers of a call, July 30, 1753, for a meeting of proprietors for selling lots held Sept. 12, 1753. In Nov., 1757, he was a signer of a petition to the General Court in relation to the building of a fort, and the resettling of the township. Both himself and wife joined the First Church in 1764. November 1, 1789, he appears in the list of dissenters from the Congregational church who are liable to a minister's tax, claiming to be a Baptist.

Solomon and Sarah Deming had one son, Noadiah, who was born in Wethersfield, July 14, 1749, and who married Michel Phillips of New Britain. This son was a Revolutionary soldier. That he was about three years of age when his parents came to Pittsfield, would seem to be fully established, but there is no record of the fact that he accompanied them hither in 1752, though he might have been one of the persons in the Solomon Deming family, as shown by the town list of 1772. As he afterwards was married in New Britain, Conn., it is probable that he became resident there, though he has been traced as a Revolutionary soldier.

Dorothy Deming was the daughter of Solomon and Sarah Deming, and was the first white child born in Pontoosuck Plantation, or Pittsfield. Whether there were any more children of this first family is not known. From the venerable Samuel M. Gunn, who will have attained the age of 93 years next June, we learn that Solomon and Sarah

Deming were his great-great-grandparents. That his great-grandfather, Gideon Gunn, married Dorothy Deming, and that they resided on what is known as the Gunn farm, now occupied by Mr. Strong in the eastern part of the city. They had four children, Reuben, Calvin, Annie and Fannie.

Reuben Gunn had three children, Reuben, Lyman, a daughter who married Linus Parker, and one who married Philip Sears, all of whom are deceased. Linus Parker had eleven children and Philip Sears two, none of whom are thought to be living.

Calvin Gunn had five children, Gideon, Samuel M., Calvin, Betsey and Emily, of whom our informant, Samuel M. Gunn of this city, only survives at his advanced and vigorous old age. The mother of Samuel M. was Betsey Markham of New Hartford, Conn., and he knows but one of all his relatives living, that being a cousin on his mother's side, Ora Markham of Atlanta, Ga. His grandfather, Gideon Gunn was a revolutionary soldier and participated in the battle at Fort Ticonderoga.

Tracing down the descendants of Solomon and Sarah Deming from Samuel M. Gunn, are his four children, Lester B. Gunn of Lanesboro, Hulbert S. Gunn of Oakland, California, Louisa, wife of Sterling D. Milliman of Green Island, N.Y., and Elizabeth, wife of A. N. Chapin of Pittsfield.

Samuel M. Gunn has a memory of his great, great-grandmother, Sarah Deming, as he saw her when he was about ten years of age in the old Deming house on Honasada or Elm Street, which house has been known in later years as the Robert Stanton place. He describes her as being small in stature and very light in weight and hardly weighing 110 pounds. She was very gray, wore a little white cap and was quite active for 92 years of age, this being the year of her death. The old Deming house is still standing on Elm Street, and the same chimney and fire-place with the crane and hooks therein, on which Sarah Deming used to do her cooking. A little wood-house is still standing on the premises which was originally constructed of spruce poles by Solomon Deming. The old family well still yields good drinking water, was dug down into the side of an earth mound, and this is fed by an unfailing spring. The facts given in our October number and

the continuation of the subject as above, will probably be all the reliable historic sketch obtainable of the Solomon Deming family, of which Mrs. Deming was the first female settler of Pittsfield and without doubt the last of both the old male and female settlers when she deceased in 1818. In preparing a paper for a meeting of the "Daughters of the Revolution" of Pittsfield, Miss Fanny E. Brewster made a thorough search for facts relative to the history of this pioneer family. From one of the two oldest women living in Pittsfield, who was three years old at the time of Mrs. Deming's death, she learned that this old lady's grandfather bought the Solomon Deming house after the former's death, with the understanding that he should take care of Mrs. Deming (who was then about 70 years

old) as long as she lived. Therefore, Mrs. Deming occupied a room in the old homestead until her death. This old lady remembers when a child of there seeing Mrs. Deming in her grandparents' house. She says Mrs. Deming was of medium size and wore a cap, but cannot recall her features, though she remembers some articles of furniture that were in her room.

There are three men by the name of Deming on the list of soldiers credited to Pittsfield in the war of the Revolution, but it has been impossible to locate their graves or to trace them as the sons of Mrs. Sarah Deming, who according to the inscription on her monument was "A mother of the Revolution."

PIONEER COLORED PEOPLE OF BERKSHIRE

From The Berkshire Hills, September 1, 1900.

Among the first "colored folks" ever putting in an appearance in Central Berkshire was a sprightly eighteen year old ebon-hued girl, with beautiful white teeth and a queer brogue mixed in with her pronunciation of the English language, which bespoke her native-born African descent. At the time of her sudden appearance at the then considerable settlement on the west shore of Lake Onota, Massachusetts had but recently abolished slavery, though New York and others of the Middle States had not, though they were not long in following the example of a Commonwealth from first to last in our national history to take the first decided steps for freedom and the right in any emergency.

From Mrs. Caroline A. Tolman, Mrs. Gilbert West and Mrs. Lydia Parker of Pittsfield have been gleaned the following relative to this historic early colored settler, whose family and descendants, with the exception of a single unfortunate grandson, are no longer traceable. "Old Flora." as in the later years she was always called in Pittsfield, gave this as her early history: When, as she supposed, she was about eight years of age, with three or four other little black girls she was paddling her feet in the waters of the sea, as she thought on the shores of Africa. Suddenly a big ship came to anchor near the coast and a boat load of white men put out for shore. The children were so frightened at such strange creatures that they could not run back to their huts and people, and were seized and carried aboard the ship.

Her next remembrance was the landing of the captured colored people from the ship at the West Indies, where she was sold to a master. Here she was put to work in the sugar fields and at making molasses until she thought she was about sixteen years old. Then came more tall white men in a ship, to whom she was sold and taken to the United States, and sold again to a master somewhere in New York.

Her instincts always seemed to tell her of freedom and a better life farther on, which seemed to be located somewhere beyond the setting sun. She ran away one dark night and followed a bright light in the heavens which she afterwards recognized as the north star. Picking berries and occasionally securing food at some remote hovel, hiding by day and walking at night,

after a long and tedious journey she reached Poughkeepsie, N.Y. Skirting that then old town with sun and star alone to guide her, for many days and nights she pressed forward through the wilderness, ragged and penniless, footsore and famished, yet never for an instant doubting to find the goal which her instincts for many years had been restlessly urging her forward to attain.

Thus she reached the top of Lebanon mountain and first looked down into the great hill amphitheater in which Pittsfield is the centreplate. It was on the old mountain road that a good Samaritan picked the poor waif up and gave her a ride as far as Onota Lake, where she was cared for by the Esquire Orrin Goodrich family and at once found work among the West Pittsfield and Center Pittsfield families, such as the Wests, Pomeroys, etc. All through her life she fairly idolized Esquire Orrin and "Missah" Goodrich, his wife, as well as their daughters, to whom we are indebted for these facts, and well she might be, for not a great while after her arrival, her old master traced her hither and came on after the runaway.

But old Flora had so endeared herself to her new found friends that after her brave struggles for freedom they could not bear the thought of her being taken away by the slaveholder. Esquire Goodrich, though a staunch old Democrat arose to the emergency and paid her old master \$300 for Flora's freedom, which was quite a small fortune in those days, and for which generous deed he never asked any recompense, but was always fairly worshiped by the poor slave woman whom he had thus made free.

Old Flora finally married a mulatto by the name of Peter Foster and both worked for the Goodrich family for many years and their faithful service is still gratefully remembered by those of that family now living. The Esquire Orrin Goodrich farm was originally owned by Daniel Sackett and the wife of the former was Mehitable Sackett. The church, school house and residence of the father of the late Deacon James Francis stood near the Goodrich residence. The Goodrich mansion was afterwards removed to Tillotson's, where it was destroyed by fire. Old Flora's home was a wing of the Orrin Goodrich house, which

was moved a short distance from the main structure by Mr. Goodrich and given to her. She had quite a family of children which good Peter Foster and Esquire Goodrich insisted should receive as good an education as the common school of that day afforded. While the two girls were named by the mother Flora and Rainey, the father chose the Bible names of Moses, Aaron & Joel, and one grandson was called Jeremiah. The old Sackett farm, after the death of Esquire Goodrich, passed into the hands of Levi Childs and Amos Chapman, and is now the property of Wirt M. Walker of Chicago.

It is said that one of the grandsons of Old Flora was caught out years ago in a terrible storm while returning from a drive, and both legs became frozen so badly that they had to be amputated. Thus made an object of charity through no fault of his own, and thrown upon the town of Pittsfield, in consequence, he is still kindly remembered by his grandmother's old friends whom she so faithfully cared for in their childhood. The husband of Flora and all her children were, light colored and it was a favorite remark of hers, "That she was no yaller body, but a clean mink direct from Africa."



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A PLUCKY BERKSHIRE VILLAGE

From The Berkshire Hills, March 1, 1901.

Treasurer V. A. Whitaker of the North Adams Savings Bank recently called to the editor's attention a very interesting document found by him among the papers of his father, E. D. Whitaker, who served the village for many years as acting Justice of the Peace. While this document shows that as far back as 1853 the agitation of the temperance question was a very lively issue in this locality, it also thoroughly demonstrates the law-abiding and respecting character of its citizenship, and most significantly illustrates the unity and purpose of action on the part of its leading men of that day which has always in village, town and city most thoroughly conduced to its prosperity and final growth from a little hamlet to the largest of the two Berkshire cities.

In conformity to a law of the state, on complaint of William E. Brayton, George Millard and James E. Marshall, two warrants were issued by Justice E. D. Whitaker, dated June 24 and 25. 1853, for the seizure of sundry casks of liquors lying in the freight depot of the Pittsfield and North Adams Railroad. These liquors were seized by Deputy Sheriff William Hodskins, duly advertised and destroyed by him at command of said Justice and in accordance with the law of the state. Individual owners of these liquors who were thus aggrieved threatened the Sheriff with an action at law for damages. To sustain the law and the action of its officers the thirty citizens whose names are given, signed an indemnity agreement to become responsible for the costs of such suits, if brought against this officer, and to pay such costs pro rata to a committee consisting of George Millard, William Martin and Isaac Holman.

These citizens were William E. Brayton, J. N. Chapin, S. Burlingame, I. Holman, E. D.

These men thus boldly stepping up to the front comprised every professional, manufacturing and mercantile resident of the village and its then prominent agricultural residents. Of course no one losing the spirituous according to law felt aggrieved enough to go to law against the then plucky village and no suit was brought. It was these men and this unity which built up North Adams, and who have been singularly succeeded in 1900 by a generation of men cut out of the same pattern of cloth, and in whose hands invention has placed the grand weapons of modern growth and success. It may be interesting to learn that of the above "indemnity pledgers" there are but seven survivors, all but one of whom have arrived at advanced age: Jeremiah Wilbur, A. B. Darling and E. R. Tinker of North Adams, Henry L. Dawes of Pittsfield, James E. Marshall of Sandusky, Ohio, F. W. Waterbury of Saratoga, N.Y., and Henry N. Wells of Brooklyn, N.Y.

GUIDE TO INTERPRETATION OF THE 1855 MASSACHUSETTS CENSUS

The taking of a census in 1855 was mandated by an act of the General Court of Massachusetts, 21 May 1855. The act provided that a census of each city and town be taken between 1 June and 1 October 1855. The census was to be "as of" the first day of June of the census year.

Reports on the taking of the census stated that the instructions were generally "well observed". Some enumerators, however, were so negligent or heedless that their reports were "scarcely fit to be received". Cautions, still appropriate, were given against relying too absolutely on the census because of "the great liability to error", and the "usual difficulty of arriving at the truth" arising from ignorance and prejudice.

To secure uniform reporting, blank forms were provided and the following data were to be recorded:

- 1. Dwelling houses numbered in the order of their visitation.
- 2. Families numbered in the order of visitation, ("family" being all those living in one house, public house or institution.)
- 3. Name of every person whose usual place of residence was in this family 1 June 1855. Note: Excluded were those born after 1 June. Included were those who had died after 1 June and those temporarily absent. Relationship of household members to the head of the household was not recorded. An aid in establishing relationships exists, nevertheless, in the requirement that the enumerator arrange names in a given order:
 - (1) Master
 - (2) Mistress
 - (3) Children in order of age
 - (4) Male domestics, etc.
 - (5) Female domestics, etc.
 - (6) Boarders, etc.
- 4. Age. To be given as of last birthday unless next birthday would be within four months, then age at next birthday.
 - 5. Sex.
 - 6. Color. B for Blacks, M for Mulatto, no entry for Whites.
- 7. Profession, occupation or trade for each male over fifteen. For clergymen, initial letters of denomination.
- 8. Place of birth. State or territory if native born; country if foreign born.
- 9. Whether deaf and dumb, blind, insane, idiotic, pauper or convict.

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
