

Eastern European Microfilm Records:

Genealogists often think that microfilming of records in East Germany did not occur until after the reunification of German. This is not true. Filming started in East Germany in 1949, three years before filming started in West Germany.

During WWII, the National Socialists stored many governmental and genealogical valuable records in abandoned mines and castle ruins which were considered unlikely military targets. Some concerned Mormons tracked down the records in salt mines at Strassfurt and in castles at Rothenburg and Rathsfeld. The records were kept out of the hands of former Nazi and Russian officials and were transported to Berlin for return to their proper place of origin or were placed in various Berlin repositories. Many of these records were filmed before the end of the work in 1952.

While Poland was still under Communist rule in 1967, the Director General of the Polish State Archives asked the Mormon film crews to film Polish civil registration records. There were 10,675 rolls of such film made between 1967 and 1975. The Roman Catholic Church also asked to have many of their records filmed.

German Emigrants:

There may be information you need for your German ancestors in an index which includes deserters from the armies of Prussia, Wurtemberg and Saxony, 1871-1918; or persons who were sought as missing heirs and may have left long before; and persons who were absent from their hometowns who were searched for by the authorities.

This index covers the entire former German Empire, i.e., Prussia, Alsace-Lorraine, Bavaria, Saxony, Wurtemberg, Baden, Oldenburg, Hesse and the other minor German states.

To find out whether the German place or origin of your emigrant ancestor is on file, send his/her full name, birth date, occupation, denomination, year of emigration and the same data for all known family members. If you have an idea of the said state, please indicate that on your request. Send your inquiry to: Germanic Emigrants Register, P.O. Box 1720, D-2840 (W) Diepholz, Germany. 1880 KANKAKEE COUNTY DEATHS

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette (publication date in parentheses).

(24 Feb 1881) In Limestone, Feb. 20, Sabra Ann Byrns, daughter of George Byrns, aged 13 years, 6 months and 14 days.

(24 Feb 1881) In Sumner, Jan. 30, of pneumonia, Alice Josephine Jewett, aged 18 years, 7 months, 20 days.

(24 Feb 1881) In Kankakee, Jan. 6. of acute rheumatism, Mrs. Mary Gernetz, aged 54 years.

(24 Feb 1881) In Kankakee, Feb. 6, of inflammation of the lungs, S. B. Johnson, aged 71 years.

(24 Feb 1881) John Kane, aged 63 years, for the past twenty-seven years an employee of the Illinois Central railroad, and for over twenty years a resident of Kankakee, was almost instantly killed last Saturday evening while shoveling snow or cinders on the sidetrack just north of C. W. Johnson's warehouse. The old man is said to have been somewhat deaf which together with the muffler about his head prevented him from hearing the approach of Conductor A. S. McDowell's train, which was slowly backing in upon the track. No one witnessed the accident to the old man, but John Dilly who was at work on top of a telegraph pole heard the victim shriek a couple of times, but supposing the

sound came from some boy at play paid no attention until the cries were repeated several times. Looking in the direction whence they came, he saw Kane under the wheels of the train. He then motioned to the brakeman on the forward end of the caboose to set the brake and then notified the conductor who stopped the train. The old man was found with both arms grasping a brake beam, dead. The upper part of his head was done, but there were no other injuries upon his person. A deep trail in the snow indicated that he had been dragged quite a distance. A jury, consisting of the following persons, was impaneled by Coroner Wunderlich: H. Licht, foreman; Wm. Ming, A. R.. Vanmeter, Frank McKee, A. Forman, Chas. Schneider. A verdict of accidental death was returned together with a censure against the railroad company for not having a man stationed at the rear of the backing train.

The deceased leaves a wife and several children, most of whom are grown. He had accumulated a little property which will ensure his family against want. A daughter is teaching school in the county.

(03 Mar 1881) In Otto, Jan. 14, of rheumatism, Anthony Shieke, aged 52 years.

(03 Mar 1881) William Allers, of the town of Rockville, met an instant death last Saturday night while going home from this city with a load of lumber. On the high grade near Charles Shreffler's his sled slowed around and tipped over. Mr. Allers fell under the load which crushed in his chest. His only words were, "Oh, Will, I'm a dead man!" spoken to his son who was driving a loaded sled in front of him. Mr. Allers was 69 years of age and leaves a family of three daughters and two sons, grown.

(10 Mar 1881) Lucy A. Moore, wife of Stephen R. Moore, our well-known attorney, died at her home in this city last week Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Four weeks ago she went to Cincinnati to attend the funeral of her mother. She was then convalescing from a dangerous illness, but the exertion of the journey, together with the contraction of a cold, brought on a relapse, and she steadily failed from that time. On Friday night of last week Mrs. Moore suffered intensely and it then became apparent to herself and her husband that her death was but a question of a few days. She viewed the coming event with perfect resignation, saying that the children had now reached an age when the mother-care could be relinquished with little probability of making any noticeable changes in their future. A moment before her death she remarked to her husband who was holding her, as he had done for the past four nights, that he was getting faint, his hand trembled, and insisted upon his going into the kitchen and getting a stimulant. He has been out but a minute or two when the attendant hastily summoned him to his wife's bedside, but the change had taken place and the spirit had winged its unseen flight to the other shore.

The funeral occurred at the family residence on Friday afternoon, Rev. Mr. Phillips conducting the service according to the rites of the Episcopal church, assisted by Dr. Axtell, of the First M.E. church.

Lucy A. Cady, daughter of Henry Cady, one of the early settlers of Cincinnati, was born in that city, August 24, 1838. She was married to Stephen R. Moore, February 25, 1858. On the first of the succeeding month the young couple moved to Kankakee where they have since resided. Mrs. Moore was a woman of gentle disposition and charitable instincts. Ever thoughtful of the welfare of her own family she had the time, the opportunity and the inclination to remember the needy of her neighborhood Her husband and four children (the youngest of whom is 14 years of age) will not alone mourn her death.

(17 Mar 1881) At the residence of his son, the Rev. Chas. R. Hodge, March 12, 1881, Russell Ray Hodge, born Feb. 29, 1816.

(24 Mar 1881) In Pilot, Feb. 26, of consumption, John Heimburger, aged 26 years.

(24 Mar 1881) in Kankakee, Dec. 20, of old age, Mrs. Mary Lyons, aged 50 years.

(24 Mar 1881) At the hospital, March 18, of paralysis, James O'Donnell, of Chicago, aged 40 years.

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette, March 17, 1881.

Mr. J. C. Dunkelberger and family leave today for Sac county, lowa. Their stock and goods left Saturday afternoon.

John Slater has moved onto the old Levi Munger farm which he bought last fall. Hod Hubbard will work the Slater farm now owned by Julius Tuttle.

Dr. Caldwell was in Chicago last Saturday with Mrs. James Brazier and her little baby that was so severely burned about the face some time ago. It was necessary for a delicate operation to be performed about the eye. We have not learned the result yet but will report the benefit derived.

Albert A. Ayres and John B. Blain will go to Onarga this week as delegates to the convention of Good Templars from Orent lodge.

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette, March 24, 1881.

A. P. Farley, the traveling photographer who was with us for several weeks, has gone to Braceville.

Will Wright and lady, of Waldron, are visiting in this vicinity.

Allie James and Charley Bowlby returned from Valparaiso, Indiana, last week, where they have been attending school.

- C. W. Sumner, clerk of Milk's Grove township, received a broken leg from the fall of a horse on Thursday last. Mr. Sumner is one of our eldest residents and formerly resided near Lisbon, Kendall county.
- J. S. Martin, formerly a grain dealer in Chebanse, now representing some life insurance company, was in town several days last week.

Abe Updyke left for O'Brien county, lowa, last week. He loaded his goods at Campus, on the Wabash road, by getting a car thirty dollars cheaper than from Herscher.

NORTON - 1881

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette, March 10, 1881.

Mr. B. L. Comwell is making arrangements to build a fine dwelling house on his place, two miles north of Buckingham.

Horace Hedges, of this town, has sold out and departed for lowa, where he has a farm. Mr. T. P. Eldred has also sold his farm and intends locating in Kansas. I understand he intends locating near Topeka.

Mrs. Bell, wife of the Rev. J. Bell, has been quite ill some weeks, and although she is slowly improving, is yet under the physician's care.

Quite a number of the citizens of Norton, who are informed that their names appeared on the petition of P. Wagner, for a license to keep a dram show, emphatically deny signing or giving him any authority to use their names.

Mr. W. L. Conrow, of Buckingham, formerly editor of the *Monitor* died February 22d, 1881, of consumption, aged 42 years. The deceased was born in New Jersey, February 18, 1839. In 1859 he came West and for the last three years has been a resident of this town.

Mr. Geo. C. Van Doren, editor of the Norton News, met with a serious accident last Wednesday. He was returning home from his office riding with a neighbor, leading his own horse behind the sleigh, when the team became frightened and started to run. George Jumped, or was pulled out of the sleigh. The led horse in passing over struck him in the face fracturing the upper jaw. The wound is severe, and he is only able to take nourishment in a liquid state. The attending physician reports that he is doing well, and will in time be all right with, with the exception of a slight disfigurement of the face.

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette, March 24, 1881:

Rev. J. Bell, of Eldredgeville, is conducting a series of meetings in Kempton. There is a good interest.

Mrs. A. H. Fuller, who has been seriously ill for the last two or three weeks, is convalescent.

Farley, the photographer, has gone to Gardner. He made many friends while in Cabery and Buckingham who are sorry to see him go.

Harry Worth, hardware merchant of Buckingham, is very ill.

Van Doren, of the *News*, is so far recovered that he is able to be in his office and attend to business. He is very fortunate in getting around so quickly.

A donation was given on Tuesday evening, March 8, at the house of Thomas Crawford in Buckingham, for the benefit of the Rev. Joe Bell. On the day of trial she failed to put in an appearance, but there was in attendance a "cloud" of witnesses who testified, somewhat reluctantly, to all that was necessary to obtain a judgment for the people, and she was fined \$300 and costs. S. M. Moore, of Kankakee, conducted the case for the prosecution. I understand the defendant loaded her truck upon a wagon and departed for unknown parts before the day of trial. There is one less nuisance in town and the people are satisfied. Tally another for the Anti-Licence club.

A well-read, honorable and thoroughly sociable man he will be an acquisition to any community. School in district 5 (Mt. Langum), Arthur J. Byrnes, teacher, closed on the 15th inst. Edwin H. Riggs has been employed for the spring term.

NEW BUILDINGS - 1881

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the confederates formed again and gave another volley, wounding, among others, Colonel Busey and Captain Hughes.

"Then the seventy-sixth charged them again and they laid down their arms and ran into the woods toward the landing.

"Colonel Busey sent detachments in pursuit of them and upwards of four hundred prisoners fell into the hands of the seventy-sixth. It had five men killed inside the works. The whole number killed was sixteen, of whom, besides those already mentioned, were Sergeant Perkins, and Corporals Hopkins and Tremain.

"There were eighty wounded, some mortally, so that its entire casualty was in the neighborhood of one hundred. Among the wounded were Lieutenants Martin and Warner.

"The Seventy-sixth entered the redoubt over the seventh salient and over the breastworks extending south. Its national colors were planted on the breastworks. It is claimed by his comrades that Eldrick Brouillette of Company D was the first over the works. He was killed fifty yards inside the works by a confederate captain and he in turn was killed by Brouillette's comrade.

"The regiment used the bayonet in the charge and displayed throughout the highest degree of valor. No regiment on the field suffered so heavily that day, none exhibited more intrepid bravery, and higher praise than that cannot be awarded troops. The colors of this regiment were the first on the rebel works, and of all the regiments engaged in the charge none lost so heavily. It lost in killed and wounded one hundred and eighteen men, out of the two hundred and sixty that advanced to the assault at the sound of the signal gun. Seventeen graves mark the spot where that brave boy, Charles Goldwood, fell with the folds of the flag wrapped around him." Some years later the government established a National cemetery east of Mobile, in which place the Union dead were reinterred.

In 1891 the survivors of the regiment caused to be erected in this cemetery a beautiful granite monument, surmounted by a bronze eagle, with the name and company of each of the brave men engraved thereon.

Peace be to the ashes of the comrades who fell here and happiness to those who survive.

Monuments of granite will crumble and fade away, but the story of the devotion to the

country of the patriotic Union men who died on this and other battlefields, that the republic might live, will continue. Their names and fame will live forever and go on and on.

"Until the sun turns cold.

And the stars grow old.

And the leaves of the Judgment Book unfold."
After the battle of Blakely the regiment took boat and steamed across the bay to Mobile and captured the city without resistance. Later they embarked on the Steamer "Herman Livingston" for Galveston, Texas, at which place it remained until July 22, 1865, when it was mustered out, returning, by rail, to Chicago, for final pay and discharge.

KVGS MEETINGS & NEWS

The June Meeting was a cemetery walk of Richardson Cemetery in Yellowhead Township. There was no meeting in July and the August Meeting was a picnic at Marcia Stang's house. Due to no regular meeting for three months, September's business meeting was so long that no program was presented.

The October Meeting was planned as a cemetery walk of Union Corners Cemetery but it had to be canceled due to rain. Instead we had a regular meeting with an audio tape entitled "Frontier Genealogy". This program was presented by James Hanson and the following are some of the highlights:

- 1. Broaden your search geographically, then chronologically and then biographically in search of your elusive frontier ancestors. Counties may not have been organized so you will need to look for territorial, province, national or federal level records.
- Establishing a county was a three part procedure as follows:
 - a. The county has been named but is still attached to the parent county.
 - b. The county has been organized and land record offices have been established. The County Board and governmental controls have started.
 - c. The county is fully organized with full judicial powers.
- 3. You need to research in more than just genealogical type records. You should start by finding out exactly what records are available.
- 4. Land records are a key resource of information.
- 5. Military records are another key source for military information including muster rolls and compensation records such as bounty lands.
- 6. Religious records are also a key source, especially missionary records which will probably be filed at the home congregation of the missionary.
- 7. So many original records have been moved from original locations to archival storage areas.
- 8. Lastly, don't expect the record to be in a logical place!

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

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
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INTERESTING FACTS
