PROGRAMS IN REVIEW

by Leland R. Watrous

Our regular meeting of September 8, 1986, found Peggy Lugthart explaining the primary and secondary sources for the Michigan Sesquicentennial Project. She also mentioned the difficulty and costs of obtaining Canadian information on microfilm, through the Inter-Library Loan System in which the postage had increased to almost \$5.00 Canadian.

Donna McKinley, in the "Show and Tell" portion of the evening, reported that she had written to England for a name which she was researching and had received an answer, reviewing quite a bit of the family history. Through this letter, she eventually got in touch with relatives and obtained additional information.

Marcia Mason started off her portion by blowing a whistle and produced two dog pictures and her explanation of the reason for the showing. Her grandfather, the whistle and the dog pictures provided the story that he was a well-known dog fancier and trainer and one of the dogs was a champion. Marcia received the pedigree of the dog back to the year 1500, far earlier than most people can prove their pedigrees. Her grandfather, D. C. Sanborn, got her interested in Genealogy and basically, she traced her grandfather through the dogs.

Pat Anker reported on the Michigan Genealogical Council and their speaker, from the Michigan Department of Health, who listed the various vital records on file. The death records index project of the Department of Public Health is moving very slowly.

Alice Schiesswohl mentioned that while she was doing research in Illinois, she ran into a problem when the clerk who made a copy for her, insisted on much more additional information from her before making the requested copy. This seems to be an indication of a trend toward closing all records.

Nancy Van Wormer, while in Canada, visited a local county office in Ontario and was greeted cordially. She has a computer and has a genealogical program to go with it. Ken Himmelein assisted her in working out her problems and she showed some examples of how the program operated. Her program is "Family Roots", but she says that Radio Shack also has a similar program--Marcia Mason spoke up to disagree with the second program. Nancy's program produces pedigrees, family charts and family sheets. She is very excited about it.

Program Chairman, Donna McKinley, introduced President Roy Allen, who in turn introduced Alice Schiesswohl as a former President, who worked hard to obtain necessary funds for purchases. Alice presented Cathy O'Connell of the Saginaw Public Library with a new microfilm reader on behalf of the Society.

Fred Pike was then introduced, and remarked on the many materials of the Zorn Collection, describing them, and recommended that these materials be given over into the care of the Saginaw Public Library.

Fred went on to reminisce about his memories of Lenard and Ruth Zorn to those present, for the benefit of the newer members and to refresh the memories of the older members.

It was the wish of Lenard to ensure the reading and recording of

all known cemeteries of the county, of which only four remain to be done, with the exception of the large municipa and Catholic cemeteries of Saginaw, which also maintain records of their own. He noted that Lenard & Ruth did much research on land records and vital records, which have been printed in Timbertown Log. Fred then went on to list some of the many items acquired from the Zorns.

Fred then introduced the members of the Zorn family who were present, and they were given a very warm welcome. The meeting was returned to President Allen, who reintroduced Cathy O'Connell who responded to the gift to the library of the Zorn material, with the message of how much this will mean to the genealogists of the area, and to the library, and thanked the members of the Zorn family.

Our meeting of 10 November 1986 covered the topic of "Storage and Preservation of Genealogical Materials", by Charles and Genevieve Molenaar. Chuck had reflected on his many hobbies, genealogy being the most recent. Each person in genealogy is unique--each has her or his own problems and experiences. His retirement blends very well with genealogy in traveling and visiting. He went on to slides of his trip to Alberta, British Columbia, the LDS Library in Salt Lake City, and elsewhere, explaining the facilities of the world-famous library. He showed a computer printout of materials pertaining to Saginaw-40 pages-which he passed on to the library. This was catalogued material from the LDS Library. His book on the Molenaar family was also presented to the LDS Library and a few weeks later, he received a microfilm copy from them of his book.

He spoke of keeping copies of records on microfilm, to be stored in a safe place. Basements are prone to floods, buildings burn, and since most records are on paper, they are destroyed. He showed examples of booklets and bindings which he had copied or compiled. For storage of prints, negatives and slides, there are several types of sheets available, but many are of a plastic, which tends to degrade the photo material. When removing photographs from an album, peel the backing or the page away from the photo, rather than trying to pull the photo loose. Some copy machines also do a better job than others in reproducing photos. Records can also be stored on computer disks or compact disks, such as now used for music. If you are considering long-time storage for posterity, use acid-free or Permalife paper. A special pen can show whether the paper is neutral pH or acid. When pasting material down, do not use rubber cement or white glue--Chuck states that the glue sticks, which can be purchased at most office supply stores, work best and will not damage the material. Do not store material in the basement, because of humidity. He recommends a polyethylene material such as Glad Wrap, which can be used to enclose items for storage. Attics are also bad for storage because of the extremes of heat and cold. Black and white film has better keeping quality than color film, but both types of film can be stored over a fairly long period of time in the freezer (but let it thaw before using). Color films and prints should be stored in a low moisture, low temperature

and low light.

Editor's Note: Although we do not usually publish letters, written by members, in the Log, Marcia Mason relates that, due to the September flood, two feet of water backed up from the sewer into her basement. She managed to save her computer and disks, but lost 12 notebooks documenting various branches of her family along with a number of original family pictures and documents. Some of the documents can be replaced, photographs can be restored, but books and notebooks are in trouble. With the aid of her hairdryer and some cornstarch, she managed to restore some of the papers and books, but she recommends strongly that genealogists make duplicates of the materials in their files...microfilms are fairly inexpensive and can be stored in a safe deposit box at the bank. Marcia also mentions that Yvonne Domson is in a similar situation.

October 24, 1856

Curtis Emerson filed suit in Chancery court against Samuel T. Atwater, Philo Durfee and William H. Green.

November 7, 1856

A number of people were to be assessed for sidewalks (planked) on

the east side of Washington and the east side of Water Street.

November 14, 1856

Died-In East Saginaw, November 9, Mary Barnaby, infant dau of C. M. & Lizzie B. Curtis, aged 1 year and 11 months.

November 21, 1856

The Enterprise Office is removed to the new building on Water Street, nearly opposite Driggs' store, entrance on the South side, back of Verner's Tailor Shop.

The steamer *Superior* was lost on Lake Superior during a gale on the night of October 20th. She sprang a leak and was run for the shore, but struck upon the rocks and went to pieces. Thirty six lives were lost and only sixteen saved. Those saved suffered severely from cold and hunger.

Married-In East Saginaw, on the 25th inst., by the Rev. S. Clements, Jr., Mr. Henry P. Thayer to Miss Amanda Jane Hazen, all of Portsmouth.

At an election held November 4, 1856; Thomas Whitney, Senator, 24th district; Representative, Timothy Jerome; Hiram T. Ferris, County Clerk; Joshua Blackmore, County treasurer; Charles V. Grant, Sheriff; Eleazer Jewett beat out DeWitt C. Gage for Probate Judge by 5 votes; John Parrish, Jr., Register of Deeds; John Moore, Prosecuting Attorney; Jabez G. Sutherland, Circuit Court Commissioner; Abram Butts won over D. A. Pettibone for County Surveyor; Jerome H. Gotee and John B. Hart beat out Octavius Thompson and William J. Cranage for Coroners.

December 12, 1856

River navigation season had just closed.

Married-At Flint, on Thursday, the 27th inst, by the Rev J. S. Goodman, George Schram of East Saginaw, and Mary, eldest daughter of E. Adams, Esq., of Flint.

Friday, December 19, 1856.

The friends of the Rev. J. Levington propose giving him a Donation visit on Tuesday evening, the 22nd inst.

Sad Accident-Oliver Beach, a young man aged about 22, was killed on Wednesday afternoon by a saw log rolling upon him. He was at work in company with another, cutting logs, a few miles up the Tittabawassee.

January 9, 1857

The friends of the Rev. Mr. Belknap propose giving him a Donation Visit at his residence on Friday evening of next week, the 16th inst.

Married-In Buffalo, December 31st, by the Rev. Dr. Chester, George J. Dorr, Esq., of this place, to Miss Mary E. Kimball of Buffalo, NY.

Rev. John Levington thanked the good people of Saginaw City for the donation of \$153.

January 16, 1857.

Married-At Orion, Oakland Co., January 7th, by Warren Churchill, Esq., Mr. Wheaton W. Howard of Flint, Genesee Co., to Miss Sarah J. Sandbrook of Bloomfield.

A copartnership was formed by Samuel Copeland and William J. Bartow as Copeland & Bartow, East Saginaw, December 10, 1856.

Copartnership of Judson & Baldwin was dissolved at Lower Saginaw (now Bay City), November 21, 1856 by J. S. Judson and T. J.

Baldwin.

Sheriff's Sale-To be sold at auction, the property of William Johnson of East Saginaw on 3 May 1857; also the property of Amos Miner to be sold on June -- 1857. Also the property of Cornelius L. Russell of Portsmouth to be held on February 28, 1857. The Common Council of East Saginaw organized the fire department, December 20, 1856.

Dissolution of partnership of S. W. Yawkey & Co., dissolved on December 13, 1856 by S. W. Yawkey, John S. Estabrook, Clark Moulthrop.

February 23, 1857

The Amboy, Lansing & Traverse Bay Railroad Company, organized several days since at Lansing; Hiram L. Miller represented Saginaw City and Morgan L. Gage, East Saginaw.

In accordance with Order No. 573 of the General Land Office, dated January 11, 1857, the US Land Office at Genesee was to be closed on March 20th and would be opened for business on April 1, 1857 at East Saginaw.

James Bissett of Zilwaukie lost a brown mare and John McEwen of Lower Saginaw lost a sorrel mare colt.

Partnership of Fox & Moore of East Saginaw, dissolved January 17, 1857 by Daniel P. Fox and E. A. Moore.

On Saturday evening last, a large meeting of the citizens of Lower Saginaw convened at Birney Hall to express views in reference to a division of the county of Saginaw. James Birney, Esq., was in the chair and S. P. Wright was Secretary; a resolution was passed requesting that a line running east and west be drawn and that the name be made "Bay County". James Frazer, Col. Henry Raymond, James Watson, George Lord and James Birney were to go to the state capitol and to attend the legislature.

February 20, 1857

Bill had passed the legislature providing for a vote of the people regarding partitioning off of Bay County. Saginaw City had a city charter, under which they were planning on organizing as a city. Name of Lower Saginaw was changed to Bay City by law. On the previous Monday evening, a fire took place in a tar barrel, supposed to have been Beech & Moore's dock, later assumed to be a practical joke.

February 27, 1857

A Bill to organize the County of Arenac, and parts of other Counties by the name of Bay County; to be voted upon on 1st Monday in April.

Married-At Bridgeport, February 18th, by J. B. Garland, Esq., Mr. David H. Hill to Mrs. Sylvia Little of Birch Run.

Mr. Christie was injured by attempting to fire off an unsafe shotgun with an overcharge of powder in practice.

March 6, 1857.

The Saginaw County Republican convention was held at the Court House in Saginaw City on Friday, February 27th; D. W. C. Gage was elected chairman and H. S. Penoyer, Secretary; W. H. Sweet, B. F.
