

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Dwelling Part Of Fort Saginaw

SAGINAW'S OLDEST RESIDENCE

In a history truly representative of America's famous "melting pot" tradition, the story of this home begins when the red man lived here, progresses to a French-Canadian blacksmith, continues with a staunch German settler, an immigrant Italian to its present day owners Neil & Dawn Denzer.

Built in the earliest days of "Sagana" by the U.S. Government, the home's earliest recorded occupant was a French-Canadian blacksmith Benjamin Cushway, who was born in Grosse Pointe, February 7, 1810. The son of John B. Cushway. After working his father's farm until the age of 17, he spent seven years learning the trade of blacksmith under the direction of an early Saginawian, Harvey Williams. In 1834 he received an appointment from Governor Lewis Cass as Indian blacksmith at Fort Saginaw.


The blacksmith's home occupied by Cushway faced the blockhouse and other buildings which were erected as the stockade of old Fort Saginaw in 1822.

Cushway eventually became a very wealthy farmer and had a large family. Nine sons and five daughters. He died in 1881 in Bay County.


During the time that Cushway lived in the house it was also used as a church by a Detroit Catholic priest who visited the settlement once a month. Holding services for both white and Indian.

In 1850 Jacob Vogt, an early grocer and farmer, lived in the building for a while before the sale of various plats in the fort area made it necessary to move the building. The house was moved in 1869 to the S.E. corner of Perry and Fayette.

During the 1920's Mr. Samuel Nacarto and his family became tennants and eventually purchased the residence from the Vogt estate in 1928. In 1967/Mrs. Nacarto was still living in the house. The owners today are Mr. & Mrs. Neil Denzer.

FULL ROSTER OF THOSE WHO LIE IN SAGINAW CEMETERIES

"Some one has figured out that the year 1945 will see the last of the survivors of the civil war; the last of the "Grand Army of the Republic"; the last of the Confederate veterans in the South; the last of the active participants in and sufferors from that great struggle for the supremacy of the government. But no one has sought to foretell the end of Memorial Days. The G.A.R. marker and flag may give place to other symbols for the designation of the graves of those who fought in the wars. Their graves will yet be known and decorated whenever Memorial Day rolls round. The veterans in blue may not appear in the parades nor be represented in the exercises of commemoration; but their memories will be cherished, their lives, deeds and fame honored then as now. The fires of patriotism will continue to be rekindled by the placing of wreaths upon the graves of our soldier dead, the narration of their battles, their heroic deeds and the cause that called them forth to war."

"The graves in Brady Hill and Calvary cemeteries were yester-day marked by flags, and a potted plant placed at each. The work was done by Mrs. Mary MORGAN, president of woman's Relief Corps, No. 57, of Saginaw post, and the executive committee: Frances NEWEL, Mary TATER, Rose HARTWICK, Mary STARK, Mary QUINBY, Enie MORGAN, Cornelia YOUNG, Bernice McLAIN, Mary CANTWELL, Libbie TERRY, Jane BRIMINGSTALL, Frances WINSTON, Mrs. WILSEY, Emma VANCE, Tillie BORTELL, Anna LEATHERS.

NEW YORK RESEARCH

One of your most needed references is French's Gazetteer of the State of New York. It gives you the genealogy of each county. Out of state people refer to this continually to locate places and to decide which county a place was in as of a certain date. For example:

These dates are important wher you look for census records, and when you look into census data. If several members of a family seem to be born in different counties, it is possible that some of these counties were formed after the dates of other siblings' births.

Towns in the early years had different boundaries. For example, French tells us that Nunda and Ossia were formed from the town Angelica in 1808 Angelica at one time included about 49 town plots. Allegany county was divided into five towns. The town of Nunda included Eagle, Pike, Genesee Falls, Portage, Centerville, Hume, Granger, and Grove. Note that these towns in the present day are in three counties. Grove was formed from Nunda in 1827. Granger was formed from Grove in 1838. Pike was formed from Nunda in 1818. Cenerville was formed from Pike in 1819.

New York Research cont.

Hume was formed from Pike in 1822. Eagle was formed from Pike in 1823. Portage was formed in 1827. Genesee Falls was formed from Pike and Portage in 1846.


