AMONG SOME OLD LETTERS, newspaper clippings and other memorabilia, left by her father when he died in 1965, Mary Allen, #914, found this translation in English of an 1844 marriage contract between her great-great grandparents. It is believed the contract originally was written in French. As Americans, they changed "Gätz" to "Goetz".

The couple emigrated with several children, including Mary's great grandmother (Mary, 3) to Ohio in 1853, where more children were born. Joseph Goetz built furniture for the home in America. A jelly cupboard of 1" black walnut attests his skill. Passed down, it graces the Allen living room and holds Mary's china.

Mr. Joseph Gätz, soldier, Living at Bantzenheim, oldest and legitimate son of the late Anthony Gätz and Ann Marie Keiner, both deceased at the same place---

acting and contracting for himself and in his name as future first part and Miss Elisabeth Graff, oldest and Legitimate daughter and without profession, of Joseph Graff and Marie Ann Knonenberger, both deceased at Bantzenheim where she resides — acting and contracting for herself as the future wife as second part, who in view of their impending marriage have agreed upon conditions relating to this future union as follows:

### Anticle I

The future husband and wife declare that they will accept the law of partnership as regarding the property of married people established by the civil code, thus all household goods and real estate which they acquire during their married life shall be owned jointly, one half of which shall after the death of the survivor and the other half to the heirs of the deceased.

### Anticle II

All household goods and real estate which they bring into marriage and which by inheritance, gifts or deeds shall belong to and be used for the benefit of each the husband and the wife until the dissolution of the partnership when they shall revert to the original owner.

### Anticle III

In view of this manniage, the future husband and wife declare to make over by deed of gift his on her property to his on her sunvivon:

Ist. In case there should be no children to have a lifelong and free use and enjoyment of all household goods and real estate composing the estate of the one who dies first.

2nd. In case there should be children to have a lifelong interest in and lifelong use of the house and other buildings which he on she might possess at time of death, be it that they were acquired during their mannied life on formed pant of the estate of the deceased.

In these two cases the survivor is exempt from giving bonds by reason of his or her right to use the possession: of the deceased, but is held responsible to make good use of them and give a minute account of them in compliance with the obligations imposed upon him or her according to the law.

The pensonal property of the future husband and wife consists of the property which they have inherited from their respective father and mother.

Such is the agreement entered into by the two parties and executed at Bantzenheim at the home of Mr. Michel Schnebelin, city clerk, on December 26, in the presence of Mr. Gaspand Haas, merchant at Habscheim, and Joseph Reidweeg, cabinet maker, at Bentzenheim, witnesses who with the future husband and wife and the notary have signed this document after it had been read and translated into German.

REGISTER OF BURIALS IN THE CHAPEL ROYAL OR ABBEY OF HOLYROOD HOUSE 1706-1900 THE COMMISSARIAT RECORD OF GLASGOW edited by Francis J. Grant, W.S. 546 pages. Included are the burial records pertaining to the entire County of Ayr, the County of Dumbarton (except a part of the Parish of Cardross), the County of Renfrew (except the Parish of Renfrew and part of the Parish of Cathaart), and many parishes in Lanarkshire. The Register of Testaments begins 4 November 1547, and is not conclusive. Please see the Preface for omitted records and the specific record types the volume includes.

GUION MILLER ROLL "PLUS" OF EASTERN CHEROKEE EAST AND WEST OF THE MISSISSIPPI 1909 by Bob Blankenship. 276 pages. Applicants for monetary award passed by a 1905 U.S. Court of Claims decision for treaty violations are listed in this publication. The 1898 Dawes and 1909 Miller Rolls have been combined. In the first section of the book, the accepted Cherokee are listed. Section two lists the applicants who did not qualify, and gives the reason. Those accepted are arranged alphabetically by surname, and numerically by Miller Roll number. Applicants who were rejected are listed alphabetically by surname then first name.

KINSHIP VALLEY QUARTERLIES. Regional Quarterlies for New York State, located on compact disc. These are origional source materials from archives and attics. Included are a variety of records, different time periods through 1899. Spellings used in the origional records are used, and similar surnames have been grouped. THE CAPITAL, which includes Albany and Rensselaer counties from 1630-1900, THE COLUMBIA which includes Columbia county and also the former Livingston Manor, THE SARATOGA, which covers Saratoga county and THE MOHAWK are the publications included. This is a valuable source for people looking for avenues other than census records to identify ancestors. Tax lists, road lists, area directories, church membership, confirmation and communion lists are some of the sources available.

GERMAN GENEALOGICAL QUERIES AND RESEARCH REPORTS PERTAINING TO BADEN-WURTTEMBERG AND OTHER GERMANIC REGIONS by Dr. Burkhart Oertel. 738 pages. Specific genealogical queries are the body of this work. The information is indexed in four ways. The Submitter index lists persons providing family information, Every Person Index lists all names (except for submitters) which appear in the volume. Place index organizes information from cemetaries and churches alphabetically by name as well as by municipal location (if known), Ship Index lists names as they appear on the queries.

Dear Dorothy:

I received the following information from one of our Assn. members (who received it from researcher, Siegfried Rein). I though it might be of interest to anyone able to do research in Germany. If they write in German to the Archiv they may get information on contacting a researcher to help them, but I don't know this to be a fact...

The State Archive of Nuremburg has two collections of the names of emigrants:

- 1) "Auswanderer aus Mittelfranken 1837-1874" 5 volumes
- 2) "Auswandererkartei" drawers of index cards

In both, the names of those who emigrated from Bavaria to other countries are recorded. Sometimes the records in both are identical; sometimes they are not. If the record mentions "Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken Teil B,..." it means the person had applied for permission to emigrate and the name had to be published in this newspaper for official announcements of the Central Franconian (provincial government) with the text: "Mr. X/Mrs. Y wants to emigrate to ... If anyone has any claims against him/her, he has to notify the county office within two weeks." If no claims stood against these people, they received passport/visa (Reissepasse).

### OLD SAGINAW DIRECTORIES

Facts About Them and Some Thoughts About Their Times

In The News a few days ago there appeared an interesting paper on the City Clerk's "library" of the Saginaw Directories, the oldest of which is for 1879-1880. In a recent "Valley Tales" column, Miss Elaine FRUEH reporst that she has a directory issued in 1466, published by Lewis Lyon of East Saginaw, and describes it briefly. In the same column, Miss Marie MADER reports another directory published in 1866 "by Thomas Galatian of East Saginaw".

As a matter of fact, these supposed two directories are one and the same, and the title page reads as follows: "Indian and Pioneer History of the Saginaw Valley, with histories of East Saginaw, Saginaw City and Bay City from their earliest settlements. Also Pioneer Directory and Business Adviser for 1868 and 1867. Compiled and published by (James M) Thomas and (A B)Galatian, East Saginaw, Saginaw City and Bay City, and of adjoining villages in the Saginaw Valley." so we find Salina, (South Saginaw), Bridgeport Center (Bridgeport), Portsmouth (South Bay City), and Wenona (West Bay City) included.

### THEN EXERA BROWN

In 1872 the first separate directory for Saginaw City was published by Williamson & Co, St Louis, Mo. At that time there were no street numbers with very few exceptions, possibly a dozen in all, as for instance, "Amasa RUST, lumberman 507 Adams". A typical entry is "VOYER, Edmond, speculator, r Oakley nr Monroe" There are about 80 pages, text and advertising, with erroneous paging.

In 1873, C Exera Brown published a Directory of the Saginaw Valley, including "Bangor, Banks, Bay City, Carrollton, Crow Island, Dolsenville, East Saginaw, Essex (Essexville), Florence, Melbourne, Saginaw City, Salsburg, Wenona and Zilwaukee.

C Exera was quite a character in his day, and lists his own residence with his name in very large capitals "res s e cor Miller and Webber, unfinished". Certain houses called at by the solicitors refused any information, and are duly listed as "word sent" Throughout the entire pages of Saginaw City, East Saginaw and all the rest of the book, in the middle of the left hand page between heavy black lines, there appears a single line of advertising in heavy type by clowning mountebank "Little Jake". A sample or two: "No Bantering at Little Jake's" "Largest Stock in the State at Little Jake's" "Little Jake & Co Undersell Everybody."

Aside from the Thomas & Galatian directory, this is probably the most interesting directory ever issued, and even C Exera Brown's protrait as a frontispiece, while it may excite the riabilities of the present generation of drably smooth faced men, is worth looking at. And the intentionally humorous likeness of a musical exquisite in an advertisement of a musical instrument seller is also well worth looking at. There are over 750 pages and

the historical and descriptive matter adds greatly to the value of this unusual complication

Holland's Directory of 1868-9 was for both cities, East Saginaw and Saginaw City. A few of the streets in East Saginaw had been numbered to a certain extent, but Saginaw City still had few numbers. The "estimated" population was given at around 7,000 but was probably inflated.

It is interesting to note that internal revenue taxes caused by the Rebellion were still being collected on "manufacturers and productions, sales, gross receipts, incomes, legacies, gold watches, carriages, silver plate, bank capital and deposits".

The Polk Directory of 1879-80 was an innovation, for there was no separation of Saginaw and East Saginaw and in the "introduction" we read "...by giving the names in one general alphabetical list, placing the letters 'S C against residents of Saginaw City, also designating those who reside in Florence, Carrollton, etc, by giving the names of these towns after the name and street. All others, it will be understood, are residents of East Saginaw. This arrangement will avoid the confusion inevitable from having two or more separate directories in one book."

The writer heard many years ago that "confusion" in the minds of some Saginaw Citypeople was manifested in unseemly remarks about the directory people and their work, for an inconspicuous "S C" hardly satisfied their pride of being the oldest city in the Saginaw region and it was deemed a trick of East Saginaw to swallow up their proud municipality.

### Values Different Then

The reversible directory of the 1889 edition was the backwash of its predecessors and may be unique in its upside-dorn and reverse arrangement. But it seems to the writer that it was not original, althought he cannot at this moment be positive. At any rate, it was an effort by the directory publishers to be absolutely inpartial—and it was. However, it was said that certain "old timers" when they opened the book at the wrong city, were inclined to throw it in the fire, while others growled out their disapprobation at having to "turn a book upside down to read it".

Present day city directories are as colorless as plate glass, for we are living in a thoroughly commercialized age when most values are indicated by the dollar mark, and the word More! is borne on our banners as our talisman.

We may not wish to recall the days of C Exera Brown, but some of the simplicity, individuality and personal initative would do no harm. Pioneer days were resourceful days, and produced a product of MEN who built our city, grew up with it and passed on, leaving a heritage of solid worth that is worthy of our emulation.

In the 1860 census before and following the information for the WEBER and LOESEL families I found on page 434 "enumerated 25 July 1860 by Charles W Grant". Also on page 436, I quote "Enumerated 25 July 1860 by Charles W Grant". A year difference in age is understandable but the name differences are not. Because of the above discrepancies I feel Mr Grant made errors in the Frankenmuth part of the 1860 census because he didn't understand the answers given him by the German and dialect Frankisch speaking people living there. All the descendants of Johann C and Kunigunde WEBER have always spelled their last name with one "B". Even today a glance through the Frankenmuth phone directory will show all last names of WEBER spelled "WEBER". The family name "BICKEL" pronounced in Frankisch does make it sound like a "G" instead of the correct "ck". I believe that the census report for the Frankenmuth area in 1860 is filled with errors due to the language difference between the people living there and the census taker. The information should not be accepted at face value.

The Express reporter was informed by a gentleman this morning that a proposition to convert the Barnard & Binder block into an elegant opera house was favorably talked of by those who had the means and disposition to undertake such an enterprise. The block reverts to Mr BARNARD soon, and he is a public-spirited man, and if by himself or in concert with others, the project is undertaken it will be carried to a successful end. It is also intimated that the rearranging of the building might be so accomplished as to afford ample accommodation for the post office. These rumors may have slight foundation but a first-class opera house would be a grand thing for this city, and we believe, those competent to judge, have expressed the opinion that the block could be remodeled into just such an opera house

### ACCIDENT

Chas HILL, a switchman employed at J H PEARSON & Sons mill, was seriously injured about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning. He was engaged in coupling tow cars loaded with lumber, which projected beyond the ends of the cars, and his head and shoulders were caught between the lumber. His jaw bone was broken on the right side, and quite serious scalp wounds were received above each ear, causing a slight hemorrhage from the right ear; his left shoulder was also badly burised. He was taken to the office of Dr BLISS, where his wounds were dressed. Unless the injuries to his head are more serious than external appearance indicate, he will recover, although time alone can determine the full result of the injuries.
