

East Saginaw Civil War Enrollment List by Darren Nemeth

The <u>East Saginaw Civil War Enrollment List</u> was a supplement published in the October 23, 1862 issue of the <u>Saginaw Enterprise</u>, an East Saginaw newspaper. This preliminary version of the city's "military census" was created after President Abraham Lincoln issued a formal request on July 2, 1862 for more enlistments to fight in the Union Army during the Civil War. It shows who was thought to have been eligible for the draft in East Saginaw. Each man was categorized by the ward he lived in.

According to Jonathan Robertson's book, Michigan in the War. Lansing, W. S. George & Co., 1880, the number of recruits Lincoln requested was divided up amongst all of the states, cities, towns and villages in the Union by a quota system based on number of people counted in the 1860 census. The State of Michigan's apportionment was 11,686 and by September 10, 1862 2,130 were found to be fit for the draft in Saginaw County. According to the Atlas of Saginaw Co. Michigan. New York, F. W. Beers & Co.,1877 there were 12,693 people in Saginaw County accounted for in the 1860 census.

The East Saginaw Common Council appointed a committee to correct the enrollment list after it was complied by military census assessors. This committee consisted of representatives from each of the three wards: Michael Jeffers, alderman of the first ward; Charles K. Robinson, the City Controller; and S. B. Knapp, a prominent citizen. When this list was published readers were requested "to aid the Committee appointed by the Common Council to correct and revise the above ENROLLMENT LISTS, by giving them information as to those persons enrolled who have removed from the City, those who are Aliens and those who should be exempt for any other cause, and also those persons liable to the Draft whose Names are not on the Lists. The object being to obtain a true and correct List of all persons residents of the City, liable to do military duty under the law."

For someone to be eligible for the draft during the time the East Saginaw enrollment list was being compiled they had to meet the requirements of Section 929 of the Revised United States Army Regulations of 1861; "Any free white male person above the age of eighteen and under thirty five years, being at least five feet three inches high, effective, able-bodied, sober, free from disease, of good character and habits, and with a competent knowledge of the English language, may be enlisted." The requirements of age and height did not apply to the re-enlistment of soldiers or musicians who had previously served honorably in the military and the exclusion of non-whites was abolished on January 1, 1863 when President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. Section 933 of the regulation book states that minors could also enlist, but only under the condition that his father or only surviving parent or guardian signed the appropriate declaration and consent form.

When President Lincoln made his declaration for more troops on July 2, 1862, (five months before this census was published), the Governor of the State of Michigan, Austin Blair (Governor from 1861 to 1864), commissioned and selected several people to carry out the draft in Saginaw County. A Sheriff Woodruff was appointed as the recruiting officer, Addison Brewer as the administrator, and Hiram C. Driggs as the surgeon. Driggs' job as surgeon probably was to perform or supervise physical inspections. Recruiting at East Saginaw began on July 15 and by September 13 a regiment named the Michigan 23rd Infantry was formed and mustered into service.

Later in the year, one month after the <u>East Saginaw Enrollment List</u> was published, when it was found that the rate of enlisting was slow throughout the state, Governor Blair issued the following proclamation. (*Reprinted from Michigan in the War.*)

To the People of the State of Michigan:

It is essential to the maintenance of the honor of the State, by meeting it's obligations to the Federal Government, that the quota of the troops required of Michigan under the call for 600,000 men should be speedily furnished. I have felt great confidence that this might be done without resort to a draft, but it will be impossible at the rate enlistments have been making for the last month and more. The number required of each town and ward in the State has been assigned upon the principle of giving credit for all recruits furnished Since the first of July last. Substantial justice in this respect has been

done toward all. To be exact was impossible, and to go back of the first of July was impracticable, both because the order of the Secretary of War did not authorize it, and because there is no reliable record by which such credit could be made up with any chance of fairness.

It is, therefore, indispensable that the several towns and wards of the cities should furnish the number of recruits assigned to them, and I take this occasion to assure the people that unless the men are furnished by voluntary enlistment they will be taken by the draft.

For the purpose of still giving abundant opportunity to fill the quota of the State by voluntary enlistment, recruiting will be continued as follows:

- lst. Recruits will be received for new regiments now forming in the State, and for all the old regiments now in the field, until and including the 29th day of December the next. These must be enlisted for the term of three years or during the war.
- 2d. From the 1st to the 16th day of December next volunteer recruits will be received for the old regiments only. to serve for nine months, in pursuance of the act of Congress.
- 3d. On the 30th day of December next the draft will commence and proceed until the requisite number is obtained in all those towns and wards which shall then be found delinquent.

Less than four thousand men are now required to fill the entire quota of the State, and I earnestly hope that they will be found to come forward cheerfully and *enlist for the war*, as all our troops thus far have done. And I desire this not so much because there is anything discreditable in a draft, as because it is exceedingly desirable that all the troops from Michigan should stand on the same footing in the army. Let the people of Michigan make one more loyal and vigorous effort, and the entire number required can be obtained, and the high reputation of the State for patriotism and promptness will be maintained.



This mandate by Governor Blair may have made it necessary for other places in Michigan to create military censuses such as this one to prepare for the inevitable draft.

At the time the East Saginaw Civil War Enrollment List was taken the city was divided into three wards, each containing two aldermen, two school inspectors, a supervisor, a constable, and a five member ward committee. After many hours of searching through books and microfilm the boundaries of these wards could not be determined as of this writing. The council proceedings of the late 1850s would contain this information. Unfortunately, the only copies of the city government proceedings that I have found are hand written and are barely legible. Those ones that were published in the newspapers at the time are on microfilm, but some issues are sadly incomplete or missing.

A look at maps of the city published during the mid 1800s may give indications where the boundaries of the three wards may have been. Pages 42 and 43 of the 1877 Atlas of Saginaw Co. Michigan shows that by 1877 East Saginaw had six wards in the area that is covered by the accompanying illustration of the city, a detail from the Map of the Saginaw Valley, Showing the Position of its Salt and Lumber Manufactories surveyed by E. W. Wiggins, published in 1863. Is it possible that when the city grew larger the original three wards were expanded and each divided into two? This theory may be correct. Separating this map into three equal portions, top to bottom, closely matches the second and third ward boundary on Johnson Street and also the southern line of the fifth ward at Webber Street shown in the 1877 map. Through my research of the Potter Street Station area I have found that some of the people on this list, including Henry C. Potter (3rd ward, 1862 East Saginaw Civil War Enrollment List; 5th ward 1877 Atlas of Saginaw Co.) and Michael Jeffers (1st ward 1862 East Saginaw Civil War Enrollment List; 2nd ward 1877 Atlas of Saginaw Co.), resided in the same area in the city throughout their lives.

The following list has been rearranged in alphabetical order. It includes all of the information contained in the original <u>Saginaw Enterprise</u> supplement. There are 343 men listed as being in the first ward, 465 in the second, and 154 in the third, giving a total of 962 names. Corrections were not made for those names that were misspelled.

IS THIS YOUR ANCESTOR? By Anna Mae Maday

Mrs.Stephen DOUGLASS died leaving a husband and 3 children. Her husband was a conductor for the Pere Marquette Railroad. She died in Detroit, January 8, 1894 and is buried in Woodmere Cemetery there. (Source: Saginaw Courier Herald, Jan. 14, 1894 p.7)

Fred DONNER a would-be kisser is heavily fined by court. (Saginaw Daily News Sept. 22, 1914 p.7)

Thomas DONNELLY had been a soldier and a member of the Longshoremen's Union. He died in Bay City. (Saginaw Courier Herald Jan.24, 1890)

The DIEHL family consisting of 2 boys, 5 girls and parents break up. (SaginawEvening News June 28, 1905 p.6)

Edward J. DIEHL, a plumber was seriously injured when a trench caved in (Saginaw Daily News July 22, 1914p.12)

John DIEBEL was married in 1886 to Minnie HAENLEIN. He was 79 when he died in Saginaw. He had operated a lumber lighter in the Saginaw River. He is buried in Hollwood, California. (Saginaw News Sept.15, 1942 p.ll)

Wilhelmine DICKSHEIDT wanted a divorce from husband Anton. They had been married May 27, 1873 at Essen, Germany. They had 10 children, 7 were living in 1905. (Saginaw Evening News April 17, 1905)

Mrs.Sarah Vinton DICKINSON who was born in 1833 claimed to be the first white female born in Saginaw County. She died in 1918. (SaginawNews Courier Jan. 1, 1919)

Albet COLEMAN, son of George was born in Milton, Kent Co., England and died in Saginaw at the age of 26. He was buried in Rochester, New York (Saginaw Courier Hearld July 31, 1917 p.3)

Dr. McLAREN formerly of Saginaw was involved in erecting a hospital at EurekaCalifornia called the Sequoia Hospital. (Saginaw Courier Hearld Feb. 19, 1903 P.3)

William S. McLAIN who was the proprietor of the Hotel Ames, was a Civil War and Spanish American War veteran. He was born 1847 in Pennsylvania and was buried in Pittsburgh when he died in 1908. (Saginaw Evening New Feb. 17, 1908 p.2)

Colin McLACHLAN was the father of "Red" the boxer. He died in Miami Florida at the age of 60. (Saginaw Daily News Jan. 24, 2936 p.4)

Mayme Oakes McKINNON was born in Saginaw. Her first marrage was to Charles Ross, the second ws to GeorgeMcKinnon. She had resided in Saginaw for 50 years, and in Los Angeles for 10 years. When she died she was buried in Los Angeles. She left 3 sisters and 1 brother. (Saginaw News March 1, 1940 p.18)

John McKINNON at 103 was once Michigan's oldest man,. He was born in Scotland, and came to Canada 53 years ago. He died at St.Charles. (Saginaw Evening News Jan. 14, 1910 p.10)

Angus D. McKINNON was born in Nova Scotia. In 1902 he married Mrs. McIntyre. At age of 65 he fell down a mine shaft at the Caledonia mine and broke his leg. He was buried in St.Andrews cemetery. (Saginaw Courier Herald Jan 24, 1918 p.7 and Saginaw Courier Herald Feb. 23, 1918 p.3)

Dr. W.C. McKINNEY proprietor of the Everett House took a trip to Europe and while over there was on a big Zepplin airship. He took pictures of German soldiers marching through Cologne. (Saginaw Daily News June 3, 1914 and Aug. 7, 1914)

Arbide BLONDIN buried an infant child in his yeard at 315 Eddy St., The city ordered the child to be reburied in a cemetery. (Saginaw Evening News Jan. 20, 1906 P.10)

John BLOHM drowned while bathing at McEwan's mill in Bay City. The body wa recovered. (Saginaw Mornming Herald July 8, 1881 p.2)

Carl BLOHM was born 1862 in Pommerin Germany, he died in Zilwaukee in 1908 and was buried from St.John's Evanelical Lutheran Church in Zilwaukee. High water caused problems for the funeral. (Saginaw Evening News March 16, 1908 p.6 and Saginaw Evening News March 20, 1908 p.11)

WORLD WAR I SELECTIVE SERVICE SYSTEM DRAFT REGISTRATION CARDS, 1917 - 1918

On May 18, 1917, the Selective Service Act was passed authorizing the President to increase temporarily the military establishment of the United States. The Selective Service System, under the office of the Provost Marshal General, was responsible for the process of selecting men for induction into the military service, from the initial registration to the actual delivery of men to military training camps.

The Selective Service System was one of "supervised decentralization." The office of the Provost Marshal General in Washington was responsible for formulating policy and transmitting it to the governors of the 48 states, the territories of Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. Under the administration of the PMGO it was the states, territories and the District of Columbia which managed the operation of drafting men for military service in World War I.

Under the office of the Provost Marshal General the Selective Service System was made up of 52 states (or territory) offices, 155 district boards, 1319 medical advisery boards and 4648 local boards. These organization were responsible for registering men, classifying them, taking into consideration needs for manpower in certain industries and in agriculture, as well as certain special family situations of the registrants; handling any appeals of these classifications; determining the medical fitness of individual registrants; determing the order in which registrants would be called; calling registrants; and placing them on trains to training centers.

District boards were established by the President (one or more for each Federal Judicial District). The average district board had jurisdiction over approximately 30 local boards, each with an average registration of 5000 men. The district boards had appellate jurisdiction over the decision of local boards in some claims and original jurisdiction in others.

Local boards were established for each county or similar subdivision in each state, and for each 10,000 persons (approximately) in each city or county with a population over 30,000. The local boards were charged with the registration, determination of order and serial numbers, classification, call and entrainment of draftees.

During World War I there were three registrations. The first, on June 5 1917, was for all men between the ages of 21 and 31. The second, on June 5 1918, registered those who attained age 21 after June 5, 1917. (A supplemental registration was held on August 24, 1918 for those becoming 21 years old after June 5, 1918. This was included in the second registration) The third registration was held on September 17, 1918 for men 18 through 45.

The information included on each registration differs somewhat but the general information shown includes order and serial numbers (assigned by the Selective Service System), occupation, personal description, and signature.

The registration cards consist of approximately 24,000,000 cards of men who registered for the draft, (about 23% of the population in 1918). It is important to note that not all of the men who registered for the draft actually served in the military and not all men who served in the military registered for the draft. Moreover these are not military service records. They end when an individual reports to the army training camp. They contain no information about an individual's military service.

After the signing of the armistice of November 11, 1918, the activities of the Selective Service System were rapidly curtailed. On March 31, 1919, all local, district, and medical advisory boards were closed, and on May 21, 1919, the last state headquarters closed operations. The Provost Marshal General was relieved from duty on July 15, 1919, therby finally terminating the activities of the Selective Service System of World War I.

The records are arranged alphabetically by state, including Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia; thereunder alphabetically by county or city (except for Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island which are arranged by divisions and counties); thereunder alphabetically by the names of registrants.

In rural areas one should be able to find a registrant's card knowing his name and the county in which he registered. In large cities and in some larger counties the search could be more difficult. In New York City, for instance, there were 189 local boards.

Related records include Classification Lists or Docket Books obtained by local boards to show the process of classification, physical examination, claim for exemption or discharge from the draft, and the appeals process for each registrant. Each local board also maintained lists of men ordered to report to the board for induction. These show (for each individual ordered to report) name, the mobilization camp to which he was to report, and the date he was to report, and the certification of officials of the mobilization camp that the man had (or had not) reported as ordered. These records are in the Field Archives branches in the appropriate regions.

There are also records of the appeals process, and records relating to American registrants living abroad and aliens living in the United States. These records are held in the National Archives in Washington DC.

August 6th 1885

Henry Shulz of this Township much respected Citizen and old resident of North Eastern part of the Township died at his residence on the 6th of August - aged sixty years four months and two days - born in Warendenhagen in Mulinborg Germany 1825 - died of Heart disease after a lng and distressing illness of more than two years - buried upon his family Lot No.12 - large funeral and the services were in the German language by Kip Handt - Minister.

July 20th 1885

Esther Brown born in Albany in the State of New York and eighty three years of age - died in this Township of general debility after a short illness at the residence of E.H. Bartlet - Servids at the Church of Bridgeport - Methodist - Haynes officiating. Lot No. 65 (Kochka)*

* this name was written in pencil after original entry.

Russel Lysle of Buena Vista Township - born in the State of New York and old resident in the Co (county) aged sixty years died very much regretted and was buried in the family lot beside his Father - Union Ground -Clergyman Morgan

August 19th 1885 **Bridgeport**

Margarette Bennet aged seventy two (72) years died at ther residence in this Township of hart disease - Born in Werneth England.

Oct 5th Bridgeport

Louis Neffin aged 48 yars and born in Canada died in this town of consumption at his residence. Buried in this Cemetery - private funeral. Buried on Lot 3 NEC (see map No.1).

Bridgeport Nov 22nd 1885

Mrs. Barbara Narader wife of Henry Narader died at her residence in this township - aged forty eight years - having been born in Germany - of disease unknown in Record. Rev'd Voltz of East Saginaw officiated the Funeral Obsequies.

GENEALOGICAL EXCERPTS FROM The Saginaw Enterprise by Leland R. Watrous (Continued from Volume XX, Issue 4, page 124)

Saturday, 6 August 1859

The East Saginaw Common Council enacted an ordinance relative to Ball Alleys, Billiard, and other tables; (must have been trouble in River City!); also enacted were ordinances relative to shows, theatrical entertainments, &c, as well as one to prevent Street Bell ringing and other nuisances.

Thuesday, 9 August 1859

Sheriff J. W. Turner was holding a Sheriff's sale on some property owned by William S. Driggs.

Thursday, 11 August 1859

- F. A. Curtis of East Saginaw, found a dark iron grey mare, 14 hands high.
- At the East Saginaw Common Council, 8 August, the clerk reported that M. L. Gage and A. H. Mershon had accepted and taken the oath of office as Commissioners on the Geneseee Street improvement, and that Norman Little, being interested in the premises was unable to serve; Eastman was appointed to the vacancy. Saturday, 13 August 1859

Mr. William A. Bryce, a practical printer, proposed to commence paper in Bay City, to be called the Bay City Times.

- Rev. G. B. Engle would speak to the Baptists at the Common Council rooms; George W. Willcox announced that the grist grinding for customers would be done promptly at the upper Steam Flouring Mill on Wednesdays and Saturdays of each week.
- Sears, Treasurer of the Cass River Boom and Rafting Company, announced the auction sale of saw logs.

Thursday, 18 August 1859

A new and elegant steamer, the Ella Marie, made its appearance during the week - 70 feet long, 9 feet beam; she hails from St. Charles and will run between that place and the Saginaws.

E. R. Shimmons was building a fine two and one half story grist mill at the foot of Mackinaw Street, adjoining the ferry landing, which was to be ready for custom work by the first of October.

Charles Miller, master builder, was getting ready to erect a Mr. three story building on the river bank, with docks, &c.

A number of splendid, first -class residences were springing up; N. Barnard, Esq., had erected a palatial residence, corner of Throop and Hamilton; A. S. Gaylord, Esq., H. F. Purmort, Esq., Butman, Esq., Hon. J. G. Sutherland, Smith Parmer, Jacob Vogt, Dr. Simon, D. Benjamin & Lewis Webster are each building first - class residences; Mr. F. A. Rathke, merchant tailor, has put up a fine building on Water Street, near the Post Office - Spirit of the Times, 13 August.

Married - At the residence of W. H. Taylor, Esq., Carrollton, by Smith, Mr. James Stinson of St. Rev. W. C. Catherines, Canada West, and Miss Jane Ann Potter of East Saginaw.

Died - In this city, 13 August, Joseph Alois, infant son of Anthony and Margaretha Grohman, aged 14 months.

Died - In this citey, 17 August, Eddie P., infant child of B. 3 B. M. Buckhout, aged 10 months.

Thursday, 25 August 1859
A. Ilgen, late school teacher in Blumfield Township, advertised to give instructions in the German language.

Tuesday, 30 August 1859

It was reported that a number of the saw mills in the vicinity had stopped running, from the fact that they had no more logs to saw; with favorable prices and increased demand for lumber, everything that could be reached was sawed up for shipment - the continued low water renders many of the logs inacessible.
