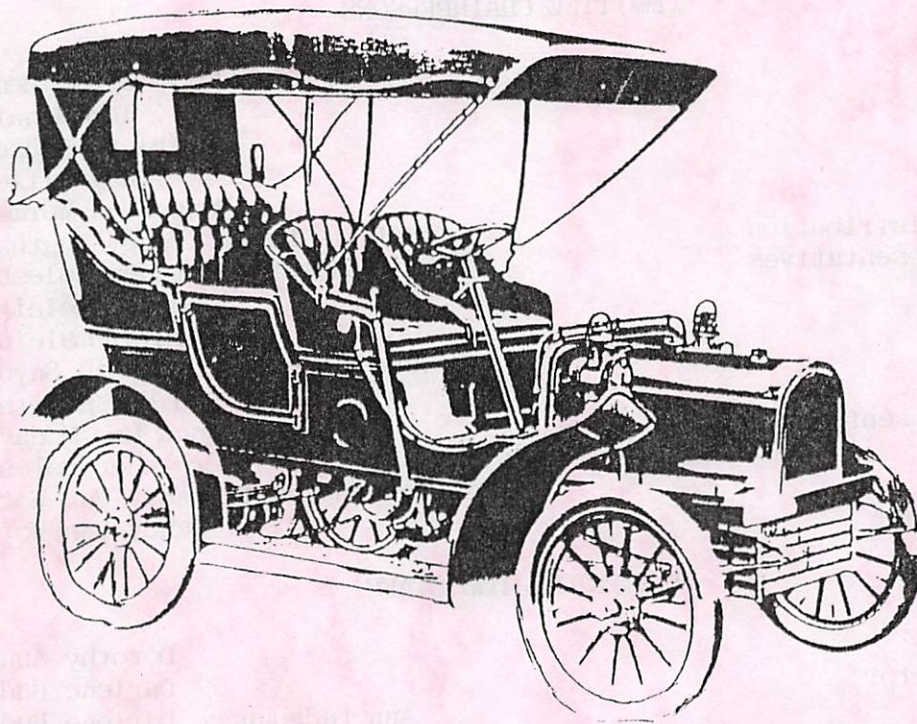

CURTIS AND ALLIED FAMILIES....

In the last issue, receipt of CURTIS AND ALLIED FAMILIES was mentioned. The author, our member OSCAR FRANKLIN CURTIS, has provided an exceptional addition to our archives. This is the best "stonewall" genealogy your editor has had the pleasure to review.

Bibliographic data: CURTIS, OSCAR FRANKLIN (1995), CURTIS AND ALLIED FAMILIES. Bloomington IN; Author, private printing by BookCrafters, Chelsea MI. 241 pages. Full index. Surnames of allied families given chapter headings: Campbell, Hale, Logan, Raymond, Rowley, Schmedeke, and Schmiedeke. Printed end-papers with pedigree chart from the author back four to eight generations. \$40 from the author at 773 South Village Drive, Bloomington IN 47403-1953.

As may be deduced from the title, most of this book is devoted to the descendants of a Curtis-surnamed progenitor. Unfortunately, the progenitor is a "stonewall" whose ancestral line Mr Curtis has been unable to trace, despite years of research. This is Eljeroy C Curtis and it is his descendants who fill most of this book. The other surnames are covered fully but succinctly, normally from their immigrant ancestor through the direct line, for the generations shown on the endpaper pedigree charts.

Selections from a few paragraphs from the beginning of Eljeroy's sketch set the stage.

"Eljeroy C¹ Curtis was born, 25 October 1822, in New York. According to his tombstone, he died, 9 October 1903 in Edgar Springs, Phelps County, Missouri and was buried in Edgar Springs Cemetery...Eljeroy's middle name has been variously given as Cushman or Cusion by family members; however, the official records list only the initial "C".

"He married Catherine Rosanna Herbert, daughter of John Herbert and Elizabeth Broombaugh, 5 September 1845, in Carlisle Cumberland County, Pennsylvania. She was born, 14 May 1826, in Baltimore, Maryland. She died, 12 August 1908, in Edgar Springs...and was buried in Edgar Springs Cemetery...

"The most elusive and probably the most important character, in the long search for Curtis would be Eljeroy C Curtis. He moved often and over great distances during his long life. He was born in New York, maybe Eric County, but we don't know the names of his parents. He moved to Saginaw County, Michigan just after his marriage joining many other Curtis families. For example, there was a large groceries and provisions store named Curtiss and Bliss on Water Street in Saginaw City near the ferry

in 1856. C M Curtis had a wholesale and retail hardware store also on Water Street near the Ferry. There was a Dr Curtis, physician, on Water Street, north from Genesee Street. Two of the members of the Hook and Ladder Company, No 1 were Jay S Curtis, treasurer, and Clark M Curtis.

"Of particular interest is a Curtis with the same name as Eljeroy's oldest son, Lorenzo Benjamin Curtis. This 'other' Lorenzo Benjamin Curtis was a year or two older than Eljeroy and could well have been a brother or cousin...."

By 1850 Eljeroy had moved to Harrisburg, Dauphin Co., Penn. In 1860 he was in Little Piney Township, Phelps County, Missouri. A daughter was born in Chenoa, Illinois on 23 August 1861. He was a resident in Richland Township, Saginaw County, Michigan on 31 March 1863 and stayed in that county until 1873 when he moved back to Missouri. In 1880 he was living in Edgar Springs where he spent the remainder of his life.

Children of Eljeroy and Catherine (Those traced in this work are in bold face type. Catherine's obituary states that they had ten children; only eight are listed in the family group.):

- v. **MARY ALICE²** CURTIS, b. Chenoa, McLean Co., Illinois 23 Aug 1861, d. St James, Phelps Co., Missouri 1 July 1928, m 3 Oct 1880 Henry Warren Judevine. Five children.
- vi. **WILLIAM E²** CURTIS, B. Michigan 1864, m. Edgar Springs 1 Sep 1889 Isabella Keith.
- vii. **EMMA L²** CURTIS, b. Michigan 1867, m. Lecom 15 Mar 1885 George Shook.

The production values of this book are excellent. The book

is well made and will stand up to library usage. The typefaces were well-chosen and are easy to read. No errors were found in the index. There is an appropriate number of interesting and informative photographs and illustrations which were reproduced with quality.

If you are looking for a model smaller genealogy, this is it. The several lines are adroitly handled - always a difficult task. There is enough personal information given so that you get the feeling of knowing the people discussed. Some full transcripts of key documents are included. The work is fully documented through the use of footnotes.

Although this is without question an excellent work, not all of a reader's questions are answered. Where did the investigator look for the ancestry of Eljeroy without success? The "other" Lorenzo Benjamin Curtis was suggested as a possible brother or cousin of Eljeroy. How was this investigated and what was the result? What research was done into the records and backgrounds of the other Curtises in the Saginaw area (who might well be relatives of some kind)? Catherine's obituary says there were ten children born of their marriage, eight living at the time of her death. But only eight children were discussed in the family group. Readers can probably safely assume the other two were infant deaths, but what efforts were made to prove or disprove the ten given in the obituary?

The examples cited above are certainly not intended as criticism. They are provided to stress that no genealogy is ever complete and that there is always more that can be provided-and this work is of such high quality that it will be used as the basis for research by others for generations to come.

I hope it is clear that this is a Curtis genealogy well worth adding to your library-if only as a good example. Mr Curtis is now approaching 91 and is still interested in continued research into his line. He may be contacted at the address given earlier in this article.

SMASHED THINGS UP

A Horse Becomes Frightened at a Gratiot Street Car

Yesterday afternoon as two men, one named GOULD, were driving up Gratiot street their horse became frightened at an electric car and, suddenly jumping to one side, broke the wheel of the light gig to which it was attached. Both the occupants were thrown upon the pavement and considerably bruised, although no bones were broken. They were taken into Charles SHIMMON's residence. Meanwhile the horse had succeeded in breaking things generally, there hardly remaining a whole piece of harness upon him, and the gig was badly broken. Luckily no one was injured except the occupants of the rig, and they not seriously.

1. Declarations of Intention, 1852-1966. Includes two indexes. The first is, for the most part, an update of the second and should be used as the main index. The second index is best used as a cross-check.
2. Oaths 1889-1897. Includes both oaths and declarations of intention. Indexed by vol 36, ca 1889-1965
3. Journals, 1884-1903. Contains both oaths and declarations of intention
4. Petition and Record, 1906-1965
5. NATURALIZATION Certificate Stubs, 1907-1926. County copy of the certificate of citizenship sent to the naturalized citizen
6. Record of citizenship, 1892-1897. Bound volumes that contain the final acceptance of the petitioner as a citizen
7. Monthly reports, 1939-1966. Contain total numbers of declarations and petitions filed, and a list of individuals naturalized each month
8. Log book, 1941-1946. Lists dates, names and addresses, and checks for first and second papers, date naturalized and comments
9. Card File, ca 1858-1945. Lists surname of naturalized citizens

"First" Events, Buildings Illustrative of City's History

Interesting Chronology Assembled by W B Marshon, Saginaw Pioneer

(The following was prepared for readers of The News by William B Marshon, Pioneer Saginaw Lumberman and conservationist.)

Among the most interesting chapters of a local history is that which embraces a list of first events. To such belongs the history of everything connected with the county, and in such a list many of those events, any of which would scarcely afford subject for a chapter, are noted. Beginning with the year 1819, when one of the brightest characters on the pages of Michigan history visited this region to negotiate a treaty with the Saginaw Indians, let us pass the years which have elapsed in review.

In 1822 the United States troops took possession of the Indian campground and erected the first fort built by Americans north of Detroit. During the same year the first deaths were recorded among the white inhabitants, a few of the infantry having died here.

In 1823 the first white children born in the district claimed the old fort as their birthplace and the wives of soldiers as their mothers. Harvey WILLIAMS, John HAMILTON, E S WILLIAMS and Schuyler HODGES arrived at Saginaw in 1822.

In 1824 the American Fur Company established the first regular trading post here, under McDONALD. Rev Mr HUDSON was the first missionary appointed by the government to administer to the spiritual wants of the Indians. Provencal was the first Indian blacksmith. On account of the red man having no "spiritual wants", Rev Mr HUDSON left the district, while the man of iron remained.

The first deaths among the white inhabitants occurred in 1822, when four or five members of the garrison fell before the advance of disease.

The first celebration here of Independence day was on July 4, 1832.

The first house was that erected by Louis CAMPEAU in 1816.

The first farmer, Asa WHITNEY, purchased his land in 1822, and began farming in 1826.

Dr C LITTLE located in Saginaw City in 1822

Eleazer JEWETT was the first American settler within the county as now constituted. Having arrived in 1826, he made it his home until his death

The first orchard was set out in 1828.

Saginaw township was organized in 1831 and comprised the county of Saginaw as then known, the counties of Midland, Tuscola, Alpena, Iosco, Bay, Cheboygan, Roscommon, Ogemaw, Gratiot, Isabella, Clare, Gladwin and Oscoda. Gardner D WILLIAMS was first supervisor.

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The first local roads were laid out by Deputy-Surveyor JEWETT

In 1834 the first sawmill was built by Harvey WILLIAMS, G D and E S WILLIAMS

The first frame house was built by Eleazer JEWETT in 1831

Miss Mary JEWETT, who became Mrs N D LEE, was born Feb 11, 1834. She was therefore the first white child born within the American pioneer period

The first cargo of lumber was shipped from the EMERSON mill in 1836

William WILLIAMS born March 12, 1834, was the first white male child born in Saginaw county

Judge Albert MILLER taught the first school in the valley

In October 1835 the county of Saginaw was organized under authority of the territorial legislature. The plat of Saginaw was enlarged and the first map of the city drafted. A clearing was made on the east bank of the river. C A LULL raised the first crop of wheat in 1835. He brought the first sheep into the district

The Presbyterian Society was organized in 1838, being the first religious association established

The same year Norman LITTLE purchased the United State government block-houses and military reserve from Dr MILLINGTON of Ypsilanti. He also brought with him type and newspaper press from New York and projected the Saginaw Journal. The "Citizen's Library Association" was formed and the era of improvement was entered upon

The first steam sawmill at East Saginaw was built in 1836

The first dock was constructed at Saginaw City in 1836

The first boring for rock salt or brine was done by Douglass HOUGHTON in 1838

The financial crisis was brought under control in 1838

The first turnpike road was begun in 1840

The first ferry was chartered in 1842

E W PERRY made the first attempt to clear the rivers of driftwood in 1837

The same year Nelson SMITH built and launched the schooner "Julia Smith"

The first plank road to Flint was built in 1850

The first stave yard was established by Humphrey SHAW in 1850

SN 21 Jan 1940 continued

The first Union school building was erected in 1851

The first brick yard was established in East Saginaw in 1852

The first secret society organized here was the Odd Fellows Lodge No 42 in 1849. The first Masonic lodge was formed in March 1854

The first select school was established at East Saginaw in 1852

The first steamboat "Buena Vista", was launched in 1848

The first German settlement was made under Rev George CRAMER in 1845

The first efforts to detach Bay county from Saginaw were made in 1855

The first bank was opened by W L P LITTLE in 1855

Gardner D WILLIAMS was elected first mayor of Saginaw City in 1857

Capt Leon SNAY was the first white settler of East Saginaw

The first association of salt manufacturers was formed in April 1859 and the first salt well sunk in the same year. The same year the city of East Saginaw received a charter, when W L P LITTLE was elected mayor

C W GRANT was the first town clerk of Buena Vista and Curtis EMERSON the first supervisor. The former was the first American pioneer to settle on the east side in 1849

The first ice house was built in 1862

The first school on the east side of the river was built in 1851

The first teacher was Miss Carorie INGERSOLL

The first Saginaw street car track, 2 5/8 miles in length, was laid down in 1864

Alfred M HOYT was the first postmaster at East Saginaw and M B HESS the first mail carrier

The first birth was that of Lyman ENSIGN in 1850

The first death which was recorded at East Saginaw occurred in 1852

The first business men of East Saginaw were Curtis EMERSON, C W GRANT, W F GLASBY, M B HESS, George HESS, Alfred M HOYT, James LITTLE, Col W L P LITTLE S W YAWKEY, Alex english, John ELSFFER, A FERGUSON, F H KOEHLER, Thomas WILLEY Mengo STEVENS and Seth WILLEY. The first lawyers who opened offices here were William L WEBBER, J L T FOX and Charles HUNT

The first rail of the F & P M railway was laid Aug 19, 1859

SN 21 Jan 1940 continued

The J L & B railway was completed in 1867 and the first through train from Jackson entered the city

In 1864 the first bridge was built across the river by the citizens of East Saginaw and in 1865 those of Saginaw City constructed another equally substantial viaduct one mile south

The Holly waterworks were constructed in 1872

The Mayflower mills were built in 1851, being the first flouring mill of the valley

WARNER & EASTMAN erected the first iron foundry in 1854

The first military encampment was held in the valley in September 1860. The commands present were Flint Union Grays, Saginaw City Guards, East Saginaw Guards, and the East Saginaw Light Artillery, all under Col T W B STOCKTON

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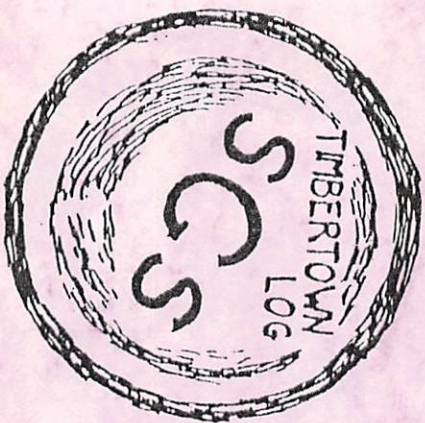
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
